## Curriculum blossoms with Supt. Bruce Gray

Mr. Bruce A. Gray has proved himself a sincerely dedicated school administrator. His long record of achievements is proof of his qualifications for the job he did so well. After 12 years of service since 1957, he retired July 1.

Since Mr. Gray has been in his position, enrollment in the Marshall Public Schools has increased from 2,000 to 3,300 . A new elementary school, a new junior high school, a new gymnasium, additions to three elementary schools, and the addition of a cafeteria were among the improvements that have taken place under his administration.

Numerous changes in the curriculum took place as well. Programs for superior and talented students, programs, special education, exploratory classes for the junior high, building and trades courses, and a host of other enrighing additions improved the curriculum. Mr. Gray was and continues to be vitally interested in the improvement of educational opportunities for the children of our area. It is for these reasons that we, the 1969 Dial staff, dedicate this yearbook to him.

## Education makes great advances in 100 years

A century of change at Marshall High School consisted of dynamic changes in education both internally and externally. As some teachers left to retire or accept other positions, new teachers entered to continue the neverending cycle of change at MHS. The school expanded its curriculum from the basic "three r's" to include advanced science and mathmatics courses, foreign languages, and a complete vocational department. The ever-increasing number of students made the expansions necessary as graduating classes ranged from two students to the 100th graduating class of 259.

Student life activities varied through the years from picnics and bike races to sock hops and cruising. Hair lengthened as skirts shortened; boys sported sideburns in an attempt to imitate the styles of years past.

The old gym and Central school gave way to new and bigger buildings. As cars became the primary mode of transportation, parking space became increasingly limited. To ease the situation, the administration found it necessary to pave additional lots on Hamilton and Green Streets.

Sponsoring a computer dance April 11, attended by 300, Student Government added a new event to the school calendar. A faculty-student committee formed a plan for a Student Policy Board to review cases of improper attire. The board consisted of four students, two faculty members, and one administrator. Under jurisdiction of a newly implemented dance policy, Student Government required identification cards to be used to enter all school-sponsored dances.

This victorious Cry rang throughout the gymnasium on March 8, 1969, as the MHS Redskins won the district basketball title for the second consecutive year by defeating Albion. The Redskins won the first district game when they beat Pennfield 64-56. They then trounced Albion $61-55$ to win the trophy and advance to regionals at Lansing Waverly.
