## THE ARMORY NEWSPRINT

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IT'S OFFICIAL: THE NEW HAVEN ARMORY, KNOWN AS THE GOFFE STREET ARMORY, HAS BEEN ADDED TO THE NATIONAL REGISTER OF HISTORIC PLACES.\*

This designation recognizes the Armory's significance as a public building over many years—for military purposes, disaster relief, and major community gatherings like the Black Expo in the 1970s and Artspace Open Studios in the 2010s. It is owned by the City of New Haven.

Today, the Armory is closed to the public and the building is damaged. The parapet on the east side of the building (where the Drill Hall meets the Head House) collapsed due to heavy snow during the Winter of 2010-2011. It has not been fixed and conditions get worse every year.

But it's not too late to save the Goffe Street Armory and return it to use as an important public building. We ask you to join us in calling for the City to make the much-needed repairs to the structure. The Armory is a remarkable and irreplaceable civic asset that has the potential to serve the people of New Haven for many years to come

#### **ARMORY HISTORY**

A Selective Timeline

1928: Land acquired by State of Connecticut on Goffe Street between County St. and Hudson St.

1930: Armory Opens

1931: New Haven Auto Show held at the Armory

1940: Frank Sinatra plays at the Armory, his first concert in New Haven

Elm City Kennel Club holds 50th Anniversary Dog Show in the Armory

1969: Craftsmens Spring Market held at the Armory

1972-1977: Black Expo held at the Armory

1986: Call for the Armory to be used as temporary homeless shelter

2005: Armory used as collection center for donations received for relief work in the wake of Hurricane Katrina in New Orleans

2009: 2nd Company of the Governor's Foot Guard leaves for the Branford Armory

2009: Ownership of the Goffe Street Armory transferred from State of Connecticut to the City of New Haven

2011: The brick parapet (where the roof of the Drill Hall meets the Head House) fails.

2012: City-led attempt to secure renovation funds initiated without success.

2014-2017: Citywide Open Studios Armory Weekend held by ARTSPACE

2015-present: Armory Community Garden takes root on the east side of the Armory.

Organized by the Black Coalition of Greater New Haven, the Black Expo was held at the GoffeStreet Armory for six years between 1972 and 1977. The Black Expo was a major exposition, a gathering of "hundreds of displays and exhibits" created by "major corporations, small businesses, and community agencies." More than two-hundred booths representing Black-owned businesses were installed in the Drill Hall.


"The Black Expo will bring together black people from around the New England area to deal with common problems; to put black business into contact with major corporations for their mutual benefit; to create the opportunity for businessmen and women to exchange information and develop relationships on a day-to-day basis and, finally, to assemble black political leaders to work toward defining and developing a national strategy for the 1972 elections."\*

The first Black Expo in 1972, dedicated to the memory of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., drew more than 30,000 attendees over three days. Attendees were urged "to come together, to work together, to learn together... to make things different. To make things better."The second Black Expo honored legendary baseball player Jackie Robinson.

#### ARTSPACE OPEN STUDIOS








The Goffe Street Armory is a very large building. It contains more than 150,000 square feet of space on a two-acre lot. A three-story, U-shaped "Head House," full of rooms and corridors, wraps around the massive "Drill Hall." An additional wing extends toward Goffe Street; it was built for the 2nd Company of the Governor's Foot Guard. Three arches mark the entrance to the Armory in a central, four-story tower with the words "STATE ARMORY" engraved across the top.

Despite its size, the Armory can sometimes seem to hide in plain sight. We invite you to take a close look at the building and tell us what you see. 




