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WILD ATLANTIC WAY

Wild Atlantic Way



Out at the very edge of Europe, the Wild Atlantic Way stretches for 2,500 km (1,500 miles) along Ireland's western seaboard. From Malin Head in Co Donegal down to Kinsale in Co Cork and passing along by famous landmarks and film locations, this is the longest defined coastal drive in the world.

Here, the Atlantic Ocean's force has carved a coastline of wild, raw Irish beauty. Jagged cliffs, wave-capped inlets, surfing-friendly strands and deserted beaches line a coast guarded by islands and lighthouses dotted along the way.

Highlights along the West include a Neolithic settlement at the Céide Fields in North Mayo, Achill Island and the island-strewn Clew Bay under the shadow of Croagh Patrick, and the haunting beauty of Connemara in West Galway. Feel the energy of Galway City ("City of the Tribes") before continuing your journey southwards to the unique Burren region, the towering Cliffs of Moher and Loop Head Lighthouse at the very southwest tip of County Clare.

Travel the entire Way or pick your part of the Atlantic coastline to explore using this Pocket Guide. Suggested experiences include meeting some unforgettable local characters or even venturing along part of the Way by kayak, bike or Connemara pony. Sit by a turf fire in a traditional pub for a seafood feast or to hear the Irish language, song and stories. Wherever you travel along the Wild Atlantic Way you will encounter moments of magic along one of the world's most unforgettable coastal routes.



Signature Discovery Point: **Downpatrick Head**

Forage for wild food along the Killala shoreline

Spend an afternoon with Denis Quinn of Wild Atlantic Cultural Tours – foraging for food along the shoreline under the huge skies of north Mayo. Against the backdrop of booming Atlantic waves and swooping seabirds, Denis will guide you around Killala Bay, across its mudflats and shores as you gather edible seaweeds and uncover cockles, mussels, clams and winkles from rock pools and the soft sands uncovered at low tide. Later he'll help you dry your seaweed, and prepare a feast from your finds. Cockle soup for anyone?



Signature Discovery Point: Keem Bay

Wander through a deserted village on Ireland's largest island

Cross the road bridge to Ireland's largest island – Achill Island – home to towering sea cliffs, bare mountains and sweeping sandy beaches. Follow the Atlantic Drive before turning north towards the Golden Strand to discover the settlement, known simply as the Deserted Village. Tucked under Slievemore Mountain, no-one knows exactly why it was finally abandoned in the early 20th century. However we do know it was one of the last places in Europe to be used as a "booley" or place where people lived in summer to graze cattle on the mountainside.

You can book a guided tour with expert archaeologists from the Achill Archaeological Field School who usually work on a dig here every summer. Or simply walk alone from cottage to cottage, imagining life here in this remote and poignant place down through the centuries.

Signature Discovery Point: Killary Harbour

Lights, cameras, action!

Follow in the path of filmmakers around Leenane and Lettergesh Beach, the settings for the iconic movies The Field and The Quiet Man. Just north of Leenane village is Aasleagh Falls, a picturesque waterfall located close to the haunting beauty of Doolough Pass.

Take a cruise (seasonal) along Killary Harbour, the Way's only fjord, or visit romantic Kylemore Abbey, built as a wedding present. 5,000 acres and the Diamond Hill trail await visitors and walkers in the Connemara National Park in nearby Letterfrack.

Signature Discovery Point: Derrigimlagh

Listen to the echoes of history in a sea-swept blanket bog

Hire a bike in 'Connemara's capital' - Clifden - and strike out across the single narrow road through a strange blanket bog, a mosaic of tiny lakes and peat.

Along this Bog Road, you'll uncover two remarkable events of 20th Century history. First, you'll pass the scattered remnants of the world's first permanent trans-Atlantic radio station which was built by Marconi and was burned to the ground during the Irish War of Independence. At its peak it employed several hundred people, transmitting world news across the ocean.

A nearby landmark is a white aeroplane wing-shaped memorial to Alcock and Brown, who crash-landed into Derrigimlagh Bog in 1919 at the end of their historic first non-stop flight across the Atlantic.

Two unique examples of transatlantic connections in one lonely spot in Connemara. And as they say in these parts, "Next parish, Boston".

Signature Discovery Point: Cliffs of Moher

Above and below the Cliffs of Moher

Standing 214m at their highest point, the iconic Cliffs of Moher are one of Ireland's most visited natural attractions. The much-photographed cliffs stretch for 8km along the Atlantic coastline of Clare and have even featured in the "Harry Potter and the Half-Blood Prince" film.

Set into a hillside is the Cliffs of Moher Visitor Centre and from here, discover the best vantage points along the 800m enclosed pathways for spectacular views of the cliffs, Atlantic Ocean, Liscannor Bay and the Aran Islands perched out in Galway Bay. Catch a ferry from the nearby seaside village of Doolin, a traditional music and surfer's haven, to the Aran Islands. Another seasonal excursion from Doolin is a boat cruise under the soaring cliffs to view the An Branán Mór sea stack, Hags Head and O'Brien's viewing tower from sea level.

Adventures and High Notes around the Burren

The Wild Atlantic Way meets the Burren region north of the Cliffs of Moher. Once a submerged seabed, the lunar-like landscape of the Burren National Park is the home of megalithic tombs and monuments older than Egypt's pyramids. Criss-crossed by walking trails, the Burren's unique habitat includes rare and Mediterranean flora.

Explore Doolin Cave with its Great Stalactite, carved out by time and nature, to the north of the namesake village. Famous for its traditional music sessions, Doolin also attracts surfers keen to tackle the Atlantic waves. Lahinch, a family seaside resort for generations, lies nestled within Liscannor Bay, while further south is Spanish Point, named after the wild Atlantic claimed part of the Spanish Armada offshore in 1588.

Signature Discovery Point: Loop Head

Watch rainbows on the Loop Head drive

Peaceful roads and deserted beaches stretch out along Clare's western tip of the Wild Atlantic Way and here the Loop Head Drive offers an off-thebeaten-track alternative to the popular Cliffs of Moher route.

At this narrow peninsula at the mouth of the Shannon, watch huge Atlantic swells smash into miles of sheer granite cliffs. Surf kicked high into the air catches this airborne spray to form endless rainbows.

An aerial view of the end of the peninsula shows a still-visible relic from WWII times when the words E-I-R-E were carved out in white letters on the grassy cliff top.

Climb the Loop Head Lighthouse for panoramic views of the coastline from Kerry to the Cliffs of Moher. A lighthouse has guarded Loop Head since 1690 and for that extra-special experience, you can even stay in the 19th century light keepers accommodation, courtesy of the Irish Landmark Trust And while there ...

See and hear the Shannon dolphins

Around 160 bottlenose dolphins have made the Shannon Estuary their home, just at the point where the Shannon River joins the wild Atlantic on the Loop Head peninsula. Follow the road from Kilrush to Aylevarro Point, to watch them frolic offshore or for more close-up views, take a dolphin watching boat trip from nearby Carrigaholt.



Clare

Unspoiled natural beauty and traditional hospitality are County Clare's treasured assets.

Follow the Wild Atlantic Way along Clare's coastline of striking beauty which is the perfect backdrop for outdoor activities. Walk through the lunar like landscape of the Burren, passing by many of the Burren's ancient monuments; go on dolphin watching tours off Loop Head; surf the renowned Lahinch beach; marvel at the world famous Cliffs of Moher or enjoy one of the many top class golf courses nearby.

Descend down into the still air of the caves of Aillwee and Doolin. Celebrate the founder of the largest cultural and sporting movements in Ireland, the GAA, at the Michael Cusack Centre. Drop in on a traditional music session in Doolin, 'the home of traditional music'. Take in the breath-taking views of the Shannon Estuary scenery from a working steam train, at the West Clare Railway.

Further inland, is the quaint County town of Ennis, known as the 'Boutique Capital of Ireland'. Ennis has narrow winding streets with connecting lanes that give the town an intimate atmosphere. One of Ireland's largest and most beautiful lakes, Lough Derg, forms the eastern boundary of County Clare and is the perfect location from kite surfing to walking, sailing, cruising, kayaking and fishing.

North Clare & The Burren

Experience the unique landscape of the Burren, "Europe's Largest Rock Garden", which extends over 160 square Kilometres.

Mostly made up of bare, grey limestone rock, the weather has cracked and creviced over time to produce amazing patterns on the land. Do watch your step but don't miss the opportunity to marvel at this lunar landscape on Earth! You may even see the rare Alpine plants that thrive here peeking up through the fissures. A short distance away you can visit the seaside town of Lahinch or venture further north to experience the world famous Cliffs of Moher.

North Clare - Towns & Villages

Doolin (G4) is renowned for its cosy pubs and their traditional music. Here you will find stores filled with all kinds of traditional Irish crafts and clothing. Doolin has everything a traveller to Ireland might be looking for.

Ennistymon (G4) has long been a bustling market town for the North Clare area and is renowned for its many attractive traditional shop fronts. The town neighbours the popular resort of Lahinch.

Kilfenora (G4) a mere half hour drive from Ennis, is the gateway to the Burren Region. A village steeped in rich history and culture, Kilfenora is known in ancient manuscripts as the 'City of Crosses'.

Lisdoonvarna (G4) in the north of the county is a popular town, long famed for its Spa Wells and its annual matchmaking festival.



South Clare, Ennis & Bunratty

Ennis, the capital town of County Clare, is a lively market town with medieval roots. Here you can enjoy the delightful riverside walk, admire the imaginative sculpture trails, or visit Glór Theatre.

Ennis is known as the "Boutique Capital of Ireland" and accredited with Purple Flag Status, it is a delight to wander through the narrow winding streets to come upon unusual shops, or refresh yourself in the cafes and bars that line the sidewalks. Located only 25kms from Shannon International Airport, you are only a stone's throw from Bunratty Village where you can experience the world famous Bunratty Castle & Folk Park and a culinary explosion with the many restaurants & hostelries on offer.

South Clare - Towns & Villages

Bunratty (H5) Bun Raite in Irish, means the 'bottom' or end of the 'Ratty' river. This river, alongside the castle, flows into the nearby Shannon estuary. When visiting Bunratty one should not miss the opportunity to visit Bunratty Castle and Folk Park which is open all year round. Medieval Castle Banquets and Traditional Irish Nights take place regularly at the castle and are a great way to spend an evening. Great shopping, restaurants & bars are dotted throughout the village.

Ennis (G5) is at the beating heart of Clare. The atmospheric, winding medieval streets of this historic market town reveal intriguing characters and stories that shaped its history and are brought to life by local walking tour companies. Ennis is home to some wonderful attractions such as the Ennis Friary, Ennis Cathedral and Clare Museum. Ennis is also known as the 'Boutique Capital of Ireland', due to the variety of unique retail outlets on offer in the town.

Shannon (H5) is Clare's youngest town and its international airport is the gateway to the West of Ireland and the world's first duty free zone.

An ideal way to experience this contrasting coastline is by taking the Loop Head Drive, which will take you through the villages of Doonaha, Carrigaholt & Kilbaha to the lighthouse at Loop head "where the Shannon meets the sea" and where you'll find the last pub before America!

West Clare - Towns & Villages

Doonbeg (H3) village was developed around Doonbeg Castle in the 16th century. Today, it's famed for its sandy beaches and Greg Norman Golf Course.
 Kilkee (H3) is a well-known seaside resort that has something for everyone; dramatic cliff walks, safe bathing and numerous activities.

Kilrush (H3) is a heritage town with fine attractions; from its marina, the Vandeleur Walled Gardens to the Scattery Island Visitor Centre.

Cop Head (I2) juts into the Atlantic Ocean like a gnarled finger pointing westward. Three villages in the area are Kilbaha, Carrigaholt and Kilkee.

Milltown Malbay (G4) situated on the Atlantic Coastline, is famed for its annual Willie Clancy School of Traditional Irish Music in July.

The picturesque town of **Killaloe** is a network of charming narrow streets alongside a 13th century Cathedral. It is also the birthplace of Brian Ború (941 AD), one of the most influential and colourful characters in Irish history. The pretty village of **Mountshannon** is one of the busiest cruising and yachting centres on Lough Derg. If walking or driving is more your thing, then the scenic beauty of the region will charm you as you travel.





Visit **Galway East & South** for a truly historical experience with a vast number of heritage sites to choose from. Literary fans will certainly appreciate the many sites along the Lady Gregory & Yeats Heritage Trail, particularly during 2015 with the 150th anniversary celebrations of the birth of W.B Yeats, who had strong connections with the area.

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Connemara & Offshore Islands

The picture postcard region of **Connemara** lies to the west of Galway City. Described by Oscar Wilde as a "savage beauty", Connemara's stunning scenery includes cloud-capped peaks, near-deserted beaches, colourful fishing villages and heather-clad bogs.

Experience romantic Kylemore Abbey, the Diamond Hill walking trail in Connemara National Park and the haunting beauty of Lough Nafooey, lined by the Maumturk mountains. Multi-lingual signposts point to the Gaeltacht areas, where the lyrical Irish language is often overheard from passing conversations and traditional sean-nós music can be listened to in the cosy local pubs.

Surrounded by water; from the wild Atlantic to Ireland's only fjord at Killary Harbour to Lough Corrib; Connemara is a magnet for outdoor pursuit enthusiasts. Exhilarating hill walks, cycling around the 'Sky Road', practising the perfect golf swing, fishing on Lough Corrib or horseback gallops along the beach all await. Connemara pony enthusiasts gather from around the world each August for the Clifden Pony Show, held in the "capital of Connemara". The annual horse race on Omey Island is another unique Connemara summertime fixture.

Or why not visit one of Connemara's **Offshore Islands**, such as Ceantar na nOileán, Inishbofin or the Aran Islands (Inishmore, Inishmaan & Inishere), where you can wander along a maze of stone-walled laneways and tiny fields. On Inishmore, a visit to the ancient cliff edge fort of Dún Aonghasa is a must. The islands are also havens for nature lovers, due to the multitude of flora and fauna and the many walking/ cycling routes available. Traditional music fans will also take delight in visiting the islands.



Connemara & Offshore Islands - Towns & Villages

Aran Islands (F3) The 3 stunningly beautiful Islands of Inis Mór, Inis Meáin & Inis Oírr are located at the mouth of Galway Bay. Ways to view the islands include walking, hiring a bike, taking a local bus tour or by Pony & Trap. There is also a selection of local craft shops, pubs and cafes on the islands. Ferries depart from Rossaveal (Co Galway) and Doolin (Co Clare). Flights depart from Inverin (Co Galway). More information on the Islands can be found on pages 150 - 152.

Clifden (D2) 78km northwest of Galway City, is Connemara's largest town. With fine hotels, guesthouses and restaurants, it is the ideal base for the holiday maker touring Connemara. In October 1907, a defining event in world communication took place when the first commercial transatlantic message was transmitted from Marconi's Station in Clifden to Glace Bay, Newfoundland, Canada. This message effectively launched the concept of telecommunication accessibility for all.

Cleggan (D2) on the southern shores of sheltered Cleggan Bay, 9km from Clifden, is the centre of the north Connemara sea fishing industry and the ferry port for Inishbofin Island lying 9km out in the Atlantic.

Clonbur (D4) lies near Cong and the Mayo border and is an ideal centre for the trout angler as it nestles easily between the two great lakes Corrib and Mask. Try your hand at the excellent and exciting fishing on three of Europe's premier trout and salmon lakes, as Lough Carra is also within easy reach.

Leenane (D3) is nestled snugly beneath the Maamturk Mountains on the southern inner shore of Killary Harbour – Ireland's only fjord. The village enjoys wonderful scenic views of Mayo's Mweelrea Mountains across the dark blue waters of the harbour. The film 'The Field' was shot here and Leenane is also known for its outdoor pursuit's centres.

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Letterfrack (D2) is a delightful village 13km from Clifden. Today the village's old Victorian school buildings house a number of enterprises that form the nucleus of what is now Connemara National Park. A Furniture College linked to the Galway Mayo Institute of Technology is a thriving centre of activity for local and regional development.

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Oughterard (E4) the 'Gateway to Connemara', offers the visitor an enjoyable and unforgettable experience. This is Lough Corrib's main angling centre and its hotels, guesthouses and pubs cater for the many anglers who come for the Mayfly dapping season in early summer and for the Daddy and Harry dap in early autumn.

Rossaveal (F3) village is 36km west of Galway City and is the county's main fishing harbour. The village is also the ferry port for the short trip to the Aran Islands.

Roundstone (E2) in the heart of Connemara is one of the oldest fishing villages on the west coast, and is an area of much natural beauty, as well as being the birth place and inspiration for much of Ireland's artistic creations. The village has been described many times as a botanist's delight as many of Ireland's rare wild flowers are found in the area known as Errisbeg which rises to almost 1,000ft (west of the village). Roundstone enjoys unparalleled views of the Twelve Bens and the vast Atlantic Ocean.

Spiddal (F4) is an area which still manages to value the culture and traditions of Gaeltacht heritage. Its charming stone church, traditional pubs and excellent restaurants combine with a fine sandy beach to make Spiddal a favourite tourist stop.




Galway City & Surroundings

Nestled on the north inner shore of Galway Bay is one of Ireland's most charming and best loved cities. Galway (Gaillimh in Irish) is known as the "City of the Tribes", after the 14 famous families who forged the city's history. It is a magnet for visitors with its rich Celtic and Spanish heritage, vibrant arts scene and lengthy list of festivals.

Galway City has a population of approximately 76,000 which makes it delightfully compact and easy to stroll around. Explore its cobblestoned medieval streets dotted with brightly-painted shop fronts, handsome limestone buildings and landmarks such as Lynch's Castle, St. Nicholas Church, (where the Galway market is held alongside each weekend), the innovative City Museum and the Spanish Arch. Surrounding streets are filled with unique craft, book and vintage shops (the world famous Claddagh Ring is a popular Galway souvenir!), alongside iconic pubs and restaurants. More award-winning restaurants and lively pubs are found in the 'West End' on the western side of the River Corrib around the Domnick Street area.

Salthill, less than 2km west of the City Centre, has been a favourite seaside resort for decades. The famous lengthy promenade is popular with both locals and visitors alike, for a fast paced jog or a gentle stroll that offers stunning views across Galway Bay to the hills of Clare.

Oranmore, less than 10km East of the City Centre, is a quaint village with some excellent pubs and restaurants, and much to do for all the family including the much loved nearby Rinville Park. One of the main attractions is the nearby Oranmore Castle.

The green octagonal dome of another distinctive Galway landmark soars above the city skyline and stands beside the Salmon Weir Bridge.

Galway Fisheries Watchtower Museum

Located alongside Wolfe Tone Bridge, the recently renovated former look out tower now houses an extensive collection of various historical artefacts.

Hall of the Red Earl

This original custom house, courthouse and banqueting hall was built by Richard De Burgo in 1271. Traces of the original structure and samples of unearthed artefacts are on display in the Druid Lane site.

Lynch's Castle

One of the most striking Galway streetscape sights in Shop Street is this Norman-era tower House, adorned with gargoyles and coats of arms.

Salthill Promenade

Stroll along the two kilometre long Promenade and enjoy stunning views of Galway Bay and the Clare hills. A local ritual is to "kick the wall" at the promenade's end to signify the completion of your Prom walk!

Spanish Arch

Originally built as an extension of the famous city walls, designed to protect the quays. Walk through the Arch to discover the innovative City Museum and stroll along Galway's famously picturesque "Long Walk".

The Claddagh

A former fishing village, this area is internationally famous because of the Claddagh ring (popular as both a friendship and wedding ring). Visit a small but very unique museum located at Thomas Dillon jewellers in Quay Street, one of the original makers of The Claddagh Ring. Also, visit the Arts Centre in the heart of the Claddagh with beautifully designed gardens, gift shop and event space.

Galway East & South - Towns & Villages

Athenry (E6) 23km east of Galway City, a medieval Heritage town famous worldwide due to the stirring ballad "The Fields of Athenry".

Ballinasloe (E7) 65km east of Galway City, the town lies on the banks of the River Suck and hosts one of Europe's oldest and largest horse fairs each autumn.

Gort (F5) 38km south of Galway City, the area has connections with literary greats WB Yeats and Lady Gregory, as well as impressive historical sites such as Kilmacduagh.

Headford (E5) 28km north of Galway City, a popular angling town known as the "Gateway to the Corrib" & is on the doorstep of scenic Joyce Country.

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Kinvara (F5) 30km south of Galway City, a picture-postcard village on Galway Bay featuring Dunguaire Castle, which hosts medieval banquets (seasonal) and the Cruinniú na mBád (Gathering of the Boats) festival each August.

Loughrea (F6) 40km east of Galway City, the town boasts an inland Blue Flag beach and the impressive St. Brendan's Cathedral.

Mountbellew (E6) 48km north east of Galway City. The town boosts beautiful wooded walks & is host to one of Ireland's oldest agricultural shows each September.

Portumna (F7) 70km south-east of Galway City, located on the shores of the River Shannon and Lough Derg. Interesting landmarks include Portumna Castle, Famine Workhouse and 1.000-acre forest park.

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Tuam (D5) 34km north of Galway City. St. Jarlath founded a monastery here in the 6th century. Today, the town boasts 2 magnificent Cathedrals.



A visit to the Flying Boat Museum at Foynes will reward you with the perfect end to a great day. Here, in 1940, some weary passengers sipped the first ever 'Irish coffee'. Adare Village, beloved for fairy-tale beauty, is dominated by thatched boutique shops and intimate eateries. If al fresco dining is more your thing, Curraghchase Forest Park offers picnic and BBQ facilities in unparalleled surroundings.

Limerick County is a playground for outdoor pursuits! Here you can go angling in plentiful waters, golfing on our world renowned courses, go biking on the longest trail network of its kind at the Ballyhoura Mountain Bike Trails in the south of the County or go horse riding in wonderfully scenic surroundings. Don't feel obliged to take part though – instead, come horse racing at Limerick Racecourse in Patrickswell.

It has often been said that perhaps Limerick's biggest attraction of all is the people themselves who are warm, witty and welcoming! So whether you are visiting city or county (or both!), you are sure to enjoy your stay.



Limerick County - Towns & Villages

Adare (I5) with its broad main street lined with thatched houses and colourful doors, Adare has long been a much-admired stopping place for tourists. It is often referred to as 'Ireland's Prettiest Village'. Must see features of Adare are its three medieval abbeys, a 13th Century castle and the Adare Heritage Centre.

Abbeyfeale (14) Abbeyfeale is the second largest town in County Limerick. This historical market town is pleasantly situated on the river Feale in the foothills of the Mullaghareirk Mountains which is a great spot for fishing.

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Athea (I4) This small rural village in the west of County Limerick hosts the famous Athea Motorcycle Road Races; an annual event which draws thousands to the village each June.

Askeaton (H5) This medieval village on the scenic N69 driving route was once a stronghold of the Anglo-Norman Earls of Desmond. Today, the impressive ruins

of Askeaton Castle dominate the town.

Ardagh Village (I5) near Newcastle West is the site of the discovery of the exquisitely worked 8th century Ardagh Chalice, now on display in the National Museum of Ireland.

Bruff (I6) See the habitat and artefacts of Neolithic Man in Lough Gur, just outside Bruff one of Ireland's most important archaeological sites.

Castleconnell (H6) a picturesque village on the River Shannon and home to well stocked fishing waters.

Croom (I6) The famous 5 line bawdy rhyme form, known as a limerick, was first devised here by 18th Century Maigue poets.

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Dromcollogher (J5) A small town in close proximity to the Cork border situated in the Golden Vale.



Foynes (H5) Relive the pioneering days of transatlantic aviation in the Foynes Flying Boat Museum. Irish coffee was invented here by barman Joe Sheridan for the cold, weary travellers of the flying boat days.

Glin (14) Glin is an attractive village overlooking the Shannon Estuary and is home to some fabulous scenic walking trails.

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Kilcornan (H5) Here you will find some fantastic family fun activities to keep you and your little ones entertained. Enjoy the great outdoors in the vast Curraghchase Forest Park consisting of some 600 acres of forest. Curraghchase was once the estate of the De Vere family and is known for its nature walks, ornamental gardens, arboretum and camping park.

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Kilfinane (J6) Kilfinane is a small market town in the south east of County Limerick, nestled within the Ballyhoura Mountain range in the Golden Vale region.

Kilmallock (16) The Walled Town's rich architectural heritage is evident in its many national monuments, an interesting museum and history trail. The town is close to the Ballyhoura Mountain Biking Trails, the largest trail network of its kind in Ireland.

Murroe (H6) to the east of the County is home to the Benedictine Monks of Glenstal Abbey, famed for their Gregorian chant.

Newcastle West (I5) is the County town of Limerick and well worth a visit. The town is a shopper's delight with fabulous boutiques and shops and is home to the Desmond Banqueting Hall, an imposing two storey structure used by the Earls of Desmond for banqueting and entertainment.

Patrickswell (H5) Derived from a holy well dedicated to St. Patrick, the village is also home to the hugely popular Limerick Racecourse.

Rathkeale (I5) Rathkeale is situated on the River Deel and dates back to at least 1289. It has been influenced by many periods of settlement over the centuries.

Mayo

With the Atlantic Ocean to the North and West, and counties Sligo, Roscommon and Galway to the South and East, Mayo boasts a beautiful unspoilt environment with magical attractions for visitors. Vast swathes of Mayo's spectacular natural scenery lies along the Wild Atlantic Way.

Unique highlights include The Great Western Greenway (longest offroad cycling and walking trail in Ireland), and Croagh Patrick (Ireland's holy mountain) with spectacular views of Clew Bay and its 365 islands from the summit.

History comes alive at the world famous Céide Fields in Ballycastle, North Mayo where man's imprint on the land dates back 5,000 years. The extensive Jackie Clarke Collection (one of the most important collections of Irish artefacts in the World) can be seen in the town of Ballina. Foxford Woollen Mills offers a glimpse of the county's industrial past while The National Museum of Ireland – Country Life (just outside Castlebar), houses the national folk life collection depicting everyday life in Ireland from the 1850s through to the 1950's.

Westport was voted the best place in Ireland to live recently, and offers plenty for visitors to experience.

Mayo - Towns & Villages

Achill Island (B2) is Ireland's largest offshore island and connected to the mainland by a bridge over the causeway – Achill Sound. The island has glorious cliff scenery, spectacular drives and walks, beautiful beaches and good sea and shore angling. Early Christian, famine and related artefacts make a visit to the island a must for the discerning tourist. Achill in recent years has become a hub for all kinds of water based activities – surfing, kayaking, canoeing and kite surfing. The island is also part of the Irish speaking Gaeltacht area.

Weak Ballina (B4) is a busy industrial and commercial town on the estuary of the River Moy and is the cathedral town of the Catholic diocese of Killala. The town, the River Moy and the local area are world renowned in angling circles with tremendous lake, river and sea fishing all on offer. Anglers the world over dream of landing a salmon at the Ridge Pool located in the centre of the town.

Ballinrobe (D4) on the River Robe is at the centre of south Mayo's Lake District, with the angling waters of Loughs Mask, Carra and Corrib all close by. The stained glass windows by the renowned stained glass artist Harry Clarke, in St. Mary's Catholic Church are worthy of perusal while a genealogical service is provided by the South Mayo Family Research Centre based in the town. Ballinrobe has good sports facilities, including an excellent golf course and a fine racecourse.

Weak Section Belmullet (A2) in the centre of the Barony of Erris and lying between the two bays of Broadhaven to the north, and Blacksod to the south, is the ideal place for a sea angling holiday. Nearby to the west is the renowned championship links golf Course at Carne. The Mullet Peninsula is an area of natural beauty and charisma and is also famous for the exceptional quality of birdlife found there.

Castlebar (C4) located in the centre of the county, is the county town and administrative capital. Until the collapse of the 1798 Rising, Castlebar was the capital of the 'Provisional Republic of Connacht' – a memorial now stands at the entrance to the Mall in honour of the French soldiers who died on Irish soil that year. The pleasant tree-lined Mall, once a cricket pitch of Lord Lucan, is now a town park.



Cong (D4) is a picturesque village nestled between the two lakes of Corrib and Mask. Whether you are an angler, a walker, a historian, or simply a lover of nature, a visit to this village is something you will always treasure. Cong Abbey, built in the 12th Century, was commissioned at the same time as the Cross of Cong, a masterpiece of religious art. The classic film 'The Quiet Man' was shot on location in the Cong area in 1951.

Claremorris (C5/D5) is reputably the fastest growing town in County Mayo. South of the town, McMahon Park is a peaceful place for a nature walk.

Foxford (B5) is a pleasant town on the River Moy and an angler's paradise. Foxford owes much to the Sisters of Charity who established the famous Foxford Woollen Mills in 1892. Admiral William Brown the founder of the Argentine Navy was born in Foxford.

Knock Village (C5) is best known for its religious associations. On 21st August 1879 Our Lady, St. Joseph and St. John the Evangelist reportedly appeared at the gable of Knock Parish Church. From this miraculous occurrence Knock has grown to the status of an internationally recognised Marian Shrine. The village also boasts a fine Basilica and Knock Folk Museum which documents the story of the apparition and places it in the context of life at that time.

Louisburgh (C3) at the mouth of the Bunowen River is the focal point of a region of innate beauty and is endowed with some fabulous beaches. Notable for angling, surfing, swimming and nature trails and is the starting point of the famous Doolough Drive going from Louisburgh along by Doolough Lake, passing by Aasleagh Falls and ending up in Leenane, Co. Galway.

Westport (C3) This delightfully laid out town boasts elegant Georgian streetscapes and effortlessly friendly character making it an authentic but lively holiday base. The Westport area offers a wide range of sporting and outdoor activities including golf, sailing, angling, walking, cycling and horse riding. In nearby Murrisk, Croagh Patrick provides an arresting backdrop to the town and has its pilgrim climb on the last Sunday of July each year.

Guides and video will tell the visitor the history of the Abbey restoration, Cromwellian burning, suppression and the story of the notorious priest hunter Sean na Sagart. The visitor is encouraged to spend some time to savour the atmosphere of quiet contemplation on the grounds or perhaps walk a few miles of Tóchar Phadraig Pilgrim Path.

More to Experience

The Great Western Greenway

Following the old Westport to Achill railway line which closed in 1937, this 42km traffic-free route is the longest off-road cycling and walking trail in Ireland. It is ideal for getting out on a leisurely cycle or stretching your legs. Along with taking in the fresh country air, you also get to marvel at the spectacular Nephin Mountains to the North and the iconic Croagh Patrick across Clew Bay to the South. Historical sites along the way include the seven-arch bridge over the Black Oak and Bunnahoona rivers, Grace O'Malley's Rockfleet Castle and a 15th Century Dominican Abbey.

If you don't have your own bike, then not to worry as there are plenty of options for bike hire in towns and villages along the route. For those who don't wish to complete the return leg of the route, then bike hire with a drop-off and collection service is also available.

3 looped routes from Westport town Centre in lengths of 8km, 14km & 24km.

Walking Routes

Croagh Patrick Heritage Trail

A 61km linear walking route that extends from the village of Balla (an early Christian monastic site with a broken round tower, between Claremorris and Castlebar) to the village of Murrisk (site of a 15th Century Augustinian Friary at the foot of the holy mountain Croagh Patrick). The route follows parts of an old pilgrim route as it wanders through the rural landscape of west Mayo.

Woodland Walks

Tourmakeady Loop is a great walk for all the family, it's relatively easy and the bonus has to be the waterfall (magical for all ages!). Cong Looped Walks give an excellent overview of the village. The walks commence at Cong Abbey and the walker is given a deep insight into the history of Cong en route through the local woodlands. Other excellent woodland walks in Co Mayo include Brackloon (near Westport) and Letterkeen (near Newport).

Rehins Wood Walks


A series of newly developed forest walks on an 81 acre site, located approximately 4km outside Castlebar Town on the Newport Road (R311).

Belmullet Looped Walks



ANGLING 100

Angling

Pristine waters, a wealth of fish and thousands of kilometres of coastline, riverbank and lakeshore, it's a dream holiday for devotees of rod and line! The West is home to some of the finest game, coarse and sea angling the country has to offer.

- Trout Fishing The Western Lakes are recognised as some of the greatest wild brown trout fisheries in the world and regularly produce specimen fish. Lough Corrib is the most famous. Lough Mask and Lough Conn are exceptional trout fisheries, while the Moy Estuary is the ideal location for sea trout.
- Salmon Fishing The River Moy is one of the most prolific salmon rivers in Europe. The famous Ridge Pool draws thousands of anglers each year. Castleconnell Salmon Fishery on the River Shannon is another renowned fishery. There are dozens more rivers to choose from in the West also offering superb salmon fishing, all in spectacular countryside.
- **Coarse Fishing** Anglers favouring coarse fishing should head for the inland rivers and lakes of Galway East and Clare. Numerous rivers and streams flow into the River Shannon offering some of the best pike and coarse fish stocks in Ireland.
- Sea Fishing The waters off the west coast are warmed by the Gulf Stream, ensuring a longer season and an unusual variety of warm water fish. There are plenty of Sea Angling operators who will take you out to some of the best waters. There is also excellent shore fishing to be had at numerous locations along the coast.

The following pages gives just a short sample of the more well known angling locations around the West, as well as a list of some angling operators and guides, and some general tips on angling regulations in Ireland. However, it is strongly advised to consult more in depth sources before undertaking any angling activities. Angling in Ireland is regulated by Inland Fisheries Ireland and their website (www.fishinginireland.info) should provide answers to most queries.

Angling in Mayo

Lough Conn & Cullin, Crossmolina, Foxford, Ballina

These lakes form part of the Moy system and are noted for their top quality wild brown trout fishing (particularly during Mayfly season). They also produce salmon. There is a big network of boat hire and angling guides available at all centres around the lake. The fishing is free and there is a 12-inch (30.48 cm) size limit for brown trout. The season runs from 15th of February until the 30th of September with the best period during the months of May, June and September. All legitimate angling methods allowed.

Lough Mask, Ballinrobe & Tourmakeady (Co Mayo) and Clonbur (Co Galway)

Lough Mask is the jewel in the crown of Mayo trout lakes, a large limestone lough of 21,000 acres and along with Lough Corrib, is one of the best-known brown trout fisheries in Ireland. The lough produces good catches to wet fly from around mid-April. Fishing is free, but there's also a big network of boat hire and angling guides available at all centres on the lake. Anglers on their first visit should hire an angling guide or boatman, as this lake can be dangerous with lots of hidden rocks and reefs. An updated weather report should be sought before venturing out on the lake. The famous World Cup competition takes place in August. Open season runs from 15th February until 30th September.

River Moy, Ballina, Foxford and Swinford

The Moy is Ireland's most prolific salmon fishery with a catchment area of 2080 sq km from the Ox Mountains in the east, to Castlebar in the south. The Moy offers a variety of fishing to suit all tastes and budgets. Permits are available from all fisheries and tackle shops in the area. The premier salmon angling stretch is the Moy Fishery in Ballina town, the Salmon Capital of Ireland, which includes the world famous 'Ridge Pool' and 'Cathedral Beat'. Other excellent fisheries include Mount Falcon, Foxford and Swinford. The season runs from the 1st February to September 30th.

Angling in Galway

Lough Corrib, Galway City, Headford, Oughterard, Moycullen

Ireland's second largest lake, stretching 33 miles from Galway City to Maum, is renowned for wild brown trout and salmon. The season runs as follows: Brown Trout (15th Feb - 30th Sep), Sea Trout (1st Jun - 30th Sep), Salmon (1st Feb - 30th Sep). Brown trout fishing is usually good from the first day of the season and the salmon fishing for grilse is best from around the end of May. Angling on Lough Corrib is free, whilst there are boats for hire at several locations around the lough, and boatmen are also available at most boat stations.

Moycullen Lakes, Ross Lake & Ballyquirke Lake, Moycullen

Spring and early summer provide some of the best catches on these smaller lakes, including excellent pike, roach and bream fishing. The lakes offer good banks with easy access.

Portumna Angling Centre, River Shannon & Upper Lough Derg

Good general coarse fishing with a number of competition stretches and festivals held annually. Spring fishing can be brilliant as shoals of Roach and Hybrids leave the vast waters of Lough Derg and move upstream into the river around Portumna.

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River Clare, Tuam, Claregalway, Galway City

Flowing from the north of Co Galway, the river flows into the southern part of Lough Corrib near Galway City. Decent trout fishing can be experienced throughout the season with good hatches of various olives, spinners and sedges. A permit is required to fish all stretches. The season runs from 1st of March until 30th of September, but the best period is generally April until June and September.

Angling in Clare

Lough Derg, Killaloe, Scarriff & Mountshannon

Lower Lough Derg, towards Killaloe is usually better for brown trout fishing. All legitimate angling methods are allowed, with a 14 inch size limit in force. There are plenty of boat hire and guide services available locally, along with a number of marinas and slipways. Mountshannon is also a good base for anglers with excellent Pike fishing around the shores and is within easy access of the East Clare Lakes. Scariff is also an ideal base for Pike fishing on Lough Derg or coarse fishing locally on the Scariff River, which can provide excellent fishing around April / May. Flowing into Lough Derg, the mouth of the Scariff River regularly produces decent catches of Bream, Hybrids, Trout, Pike and Roach.

River Fergus, Corofin, Ruan & Ennis

The river rises a few kilometres west of Corofin and makes its way southwards through numerous lakes and the town of Ennis, before entering the Shannon Estuary. Just outside Corofin is Lough Inchiquin, a trout fishery that is quite deep and so best fishing is from the shore, particularly from March to May and again in September. To the South East of Ruan, lie the Dromore Lakes (including Black Lake and Ballyline Lake). This system has about 400 acres of water, with a small stock of Trout in addition to Rudd, Tench, Pike and Perch. Best fishing is by boat as access for shore fishing is limited. Just north of Ennis is Ballyalla Lake, approx. 60 acres in size and is primarily a Pike fishery but also has Trout and Salmon in season.

River Shannon, O'Briensbridge & Killaloe

At the southern end of Lough Derg is Killaloe, a well-established Pike and Coarse angling centre with plenty of support services. The shores offer excellent bream and hybrid fishing. However, the shore line can be very rocky in places, so caution is advised and always check the weather in advance. Best time to fish is June, July and into August. Further south, O'Briensbridge is also an excellent coarse and pike angling centre. The upper section here is from 6 to 8 meters deep with a strong current where the banks are high but fishable all year round. The lower section is used as a match venue for the local clubs, with depths ranging from 3 to 8 meters. Both sections include species such as Roach, hybrids, Perch and Bream.

Angling in Limerick

River Maigue, Adare

This river flows into the Shannon Estuary and is tidal as far as **Adare**. It gets a good run of spring salmon and grilse, but the system is primarily a trout fishery. The spring fish normally run from mid-March to mid-May and the grilse from early June to the end of July. The stretch from the bridge in Adare downriver for about 1½ kms is open water but a State licence is required to fish for salmon.

River Mulcair, Annacotty

Joining the Shannon to the east of Limerick City near **Annacotty**, this river is an excellent Salmon fishery that is controlled by the ESB (Electricity Supply Board), from whom you must attain a permit. The lower stretches are best for the early spring run (March and April), but as the season progresses the upper stretches become more popular as the salmon and grilse disperse. There is also decent stocks of small brown trout on the upper stretches.

River Shannon, Annacotty, Plassey & Castleconnell

Plassey is an area in the east of Limerick City that sits alongside the University. Angling from a boat is prohibited in this area of the Lower River Shannon from 1st March to 30th September and access to the shoreline is also difficult, which means this section is very often under-fished resulting in excellent fishing for those that make the effort! Extending for about 1km upstream from the confluence of the Mulcair River, the **Annacotty 'Pumphouse'** stretch is a popular Pike fishery that can be fished all year round. About 10kms north east of the City is **Castleconnell**, a scenic village that is well known as a Salmon fishery. However, it also has two stretches (Woralls End and Clare Ville Waterworks) that are popular for Pike fishing.

Regulations

Ireland has developed effective conservation measures on all types of fishing, which ultimately contributes to more sustained and healthy fish stocks. Below are just some examples, please check with Inland Fisheries Ireland (www.fishinginireland.info) for more detailed information.

Licences & Permits

Licences - In the Republic of Ireland, you do not need a license to fish for pike, trout or coarse species, but a rod licence is required in Northern Ireland. If you intend to fish for salmon or sea trout, you must have a State Fishing Licence (available as a National Licence or a District Licence), which can be bought from most fishing tackle shops, the regional fisheries offices or on the website of Inland Fisheries Ireland (www.fishinginireland.info).

Permits - whether a licence is required or not, a permit is often required to fish most waters. They can be bought directly from the fishery owner and can usually cost from \notin 20 - \notin 50 per day.

Fines

On the spot fines of \leq 150 can sometimes be issued for a range of offences prohibited under Irish Angling regulations, such as fishing in a closed season, taking more fish than a bag limit allows etc.

General Freshwater Regulations

- The only legal method to catch freshwater fish is by rod and line
- A person may fish with not more than two rods at any time
- It is illegal to have or to use live fish as bait
- It is illegal to transfer live roach from one water to any other waters
- Killing and possession of foul hooked fish is prohibited

Foul Hooking

The killing and possession of foul hooked fish (i.e. fish not hooked in the mouth) in any fishery district in any year is prohibited.

Coarse Fishing

- No more than 4 coarse fish can be taken and killed on any one day
- Any coarse fish greater than 25 cm in length cannot be taken and killed

Pike Fishing

- It is prohibited to kill more than 1 pike in any one day
- It is prohibited to kill any pike greater than 50 cm in length

Blue Flag Beaches

- Environmental information & education
- Water quality
- Safety & services
- Environmental Management

Green Coast Award Beaches



Green Coast Awards are awarded to beaches for their natural beauty, clean environment and water quality. These beaches may not have the built infrastructure required for Blue Flag status, but

Green Coast Award beaches are wonderful places to visit and to enjoy our rich coastal heritage and diversity.



Coastal Driving Route...

The **Wild Atlantic Way** stretches for 2,500 km (1,500 miles) along Ireland's western seaboard, from Malin Head in Co. Donegal down to Kinsale in Co. Cork.

Highlights along the West include a Neolithic settlement at the Céide Fields in North Mayo, Achill Island and the island-strewn Clew Bay under the shadow of Croagh Patrick, and the haunting beauty of Connemara in West Galway. Feel the energy of Galway City ("City of the Tribes") before continuing your journey southwards to the unique Burren region, the towering Cliffs of Moher and Loop Head Lighthouse at the very southwest tip of County Clare.





Ballina Quay – Keem Bay Distance: 394km (245 miles)



Some Discovery Points along the Way!

Ballina Quay – world renowned in angling circles particularly for its salmon, Ballina is an area of recreation and leisure with many top class public houses and restaurants.

Downpatrick Head – an iconic Signature Discovery Point on the Wild Atlantic Way with the spectacular Dún Briste sea stack (50 metres high) just off shore.

Céide Fields – the geology, archaeology, botany and wildlife is interpreted at The Céide Fields Visitors Centre which showcases many historical treasures from the Neolithic period.

An Fál Mór – at the foot of the Erris Peninsula, consisting of sand dunes and fine beaches, this area would be considered one of the remotest areas in Ireland, characterized by its spectacular scenery.

Inis Bigil – nestled between the mainland and Achill Island, Inis Bigil maintains a traditional community where small farming and fishing are time-worn traditions.

Keem Bay – one of the most picturesque locations in Ireland, accessible by a winding cliff top road along the side of Croaghaun mountain. Dolphins are frequent visitors to the area.



Keel Strand – Killary Harbour

Distance: 149km (93 miles)



Some Discovery Points along the Way!

Keel Strand - a fine sandy horseshoe shaped beach stretching for 3km on Achill Island. Offering fantastic views of the Minuan Cliffs, the beach is popular with water sports enthusiasts and walkers.

Croagh Patrick View - St. Patrick like many an intrepid traveller choose this location for its outstanding natural beauty. Other highlights are Murrisk Abbey and The National Famine Monument and of course the holy mountain of Croagh Patrick.

Silver Strand – the natural beauty of Silver Strand epitomises everything that you want from the Wild Atlantic Way. On a clear day the islands of Inishturk and Inishbofin rise out of the Atlantic.

Doolough Valley - passing through the Sheeffry Hills and Mweelrea Mountain, the memorial reminds us of the people who died in the area during the Great Famine(1845-49).

Aasleagh Falls – a few KMs north of Leenane Village, this is a picturesque waterfall with excellent mountainous scenery all around, and is a much loved spot for photography enthusiasts. Parking facilities nearby.



Killary Harbour – Salthill Promenade Distance: 243km (151 miles)



Some Discovery Points along the Way!

Killary Harbour – start out at the picturesque village of Leenane and travel westwards along the shores of the 16km Killary Harbour, Ireland's only fjord!

Sky Road – rising high above the Atlantic Ocean, this is an exhilarating and iconic part of the Wild Atlantic Way with spectacular views of both the Atlantic and surrounding Connemara countryside.

Port Na Feadóige – a pronged inlet with two bays at the crest, with views of Inis Laken Island. The picturesque Dogs Bay is only two minutes' walk away.

Droichead Charraig An Logáin – this man made causeway links the islands with the mainland by road, and is the perfect viewing point to take in rugged coastline, sea-shell strewn beaches and crystal waters.

.....

Seanchéibh An Spidéil – a picturesque Gaeltacht village with a selection of local crafts, restaurants and traditional pubs. An iconic pier juts out into Galway Bay alongside a very pleasant beach.

.....

Salthill Promenade – on a clear day from this famous seaside resort, you will have views of Galway City to your left, the Burren on the opposite side of Galway Bay and the Aran Islands to your right.

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Rinville Park – Scattery Island

Distance: 257km (160 miles)



Some Discovery Points along the Way!

Rinville Park - a wonderful amenity, created around an ancient castle, a stately home and a fine estate demesne, which dates from the 16th Century.

Traught Beach - a rural beach in a Special Area of Conservation known as the

Galway Bay Complex. It's a gently sloping sandy beach suitable for families with unique views of Galway Bay.

.....

Murrooghtoohy - the most northerly point of Co. Clare! Marvel at your surroundings with the Wild Atlantic Ocean on one side and the Burren Limestone rock terrain on the other.

.....

Cliffs of Moher - these world famous iconic cliffs stretch for 8 kilometres and rise to 214 metres over the Atlantic Ocean. They are home to one of Ireland's largest nesting seabird colony with over 30,000 nesting seabirds.

Kilkee Cliffs - stop off for a well-deserved rest in this seaside resort with its horseshoe shaped bay. Enjoy a circular walk along the cliff path.

Loop Head - the most westerly point of Co. Clare! Take in the panoramic views from the top of Loop Head Lighthouse and keep an eye out for the many dolphins playing off shore.

Scattery Island - home to St Senan in the 6th Century. Explore its round tower and churches which are now in ruin.

Mayo

North East Mayo Drive

Distance: 135km (84 miles) Ballina » Crossmolina » Foxford » Swinford » Ballina

Mayo's 'Lake District' nestles in a valley between the Ox Mountains and Mayo's largest Mountain of Nephin. Lough Conn is to the north and Lough Cullin to the south. Learn about Mayo's political past in the **Michael Davitt Museum** (pg. 83) in



Straide near Foxford and its working past in the Foxford Woollen Mills (pg. 79).

South Mayo Drive

Distance: 100km (62 miles) Castlebar » Ballintubber » Ballinrobe » Cong » Headford » Castlebar

This southern 'lake district' route takes you to south Mayo passing between Lough Carra and Lough Mask. Along the way, visit **Ballintubber Abbey** (founded in 1216, pg. 76). In Cong village on the northern tip of Lough Corrib (famous for 'The Quiet Man'



movie and Ashford Castle), you can explore the ruins of Cong Abbey and enjoy some lovely forest walks in the area.

Galway

Joyce Country Tour Distance: 106km (66 miles)

Galway » Oughterard » Maam Cross » Cong » Headford » Galway

With spectacular scenery along the way, this tour follows the shore around the mighty Lough Corrib. Some of the attractions include **Connemara Marble** and **Celtic Crystal** (Moycullen,



pg. 37), **Brigit's Garden** (Roscahill, pg. 36), **Aughnanure Castle** (Oughterard, pg. 36) and the **Quiet Man Museum** (Cong, pg.84).

Galway

East Galway Drive

Distance: 150km (94 miles) Galway » Oranmore » Athenry » Ballinasloe » Portumna » Galway Highlights include Oranmore Castle (pg. 46), the medieval town of Athenry (including Athenry Castle and local Heritage Centre, pg. 52) and the popular cruising town of Portumna where you can see Portumna Castle & Gardens (pg. 54), Forest Park and Dominican Friary.



South Galway Drive Distance: 80km (50 miles)

Galway » Kinvara » Ardrahan » Gort » Galway One of the main highlights is Dunguaire Castle (pg. 53) in Kinvara. Travel on to Ardrahan, where you can still see the gable ruins of a Norman Tower in the churchyard and head south to the town of Gort where there are many sites linked with the great Poet W.B. Yeats.



Clare

Burren Beauty Drive Distance: 68km (42 Miles)

Kilfenora » Lisdoonvarna » Fanore » Black Head » Ballyvaughan » Carran » Kilfenora

Encircle the world famous landscape of the Burren, a UNESCO Global & European Geopark. Visit **The Burren Centre** (pg. 17) in Kilfenora and take in some amazing



Atlantic views around Fanore and Black Head. Heading south of Ballyvaughan, visit the **Ailwee Cave** (pg. 14), stop off at the ancient monuments of Poulnabrone Dolmen and **Caherconnell Stone Fort** (pg. 15) or visit the **Burren Perfumery** (pg. 14) and **Michael Cusack Centre** (pg. 16) near Carran.

Lough Derg Drive Distance: 125km (78 Miles)

Ballina/Killaloe » Ogonelloe » Mountshannon » Portumna » Terryglass » Dromineer » Nenagh » Portroe » Ballina/Killaloe An enchanting drive along the country roads that hug the shoreline of Lough Derg (the largest lake on the River Shannon!). Travelling north of Ballina on the Western



shore, excellent viewing points can be found at Ogonelloe and Mountshannon. At the head of the lake is Portumna, a busy cruising town where you can visit the delightful Forest Park and the restored **Portumna Castle** (pg. 54). The eastern shore offers plenty of attractive marina villages including Terryglass and Dromineer, whilst you can also visit the busy market town of Nenagh.

Limerick

County Limerick Drive Distance: 134km (83 miles) Limerick City » Adare » Newcastle West » Dromcollogher » Rath Luirc » Kilmallock » Hospital » Limerick City A circular route through the green and fertile countryside of Co Limerick. First stop is Adare village, famous for its Tudor style thatched



cottages and Adare Heritage Centre (pg. 68). Nearby is Coillte Forest Park Curragh Chase (pg. 68). The National Dairy Co-Op Museum is located in Dromcollogher, whilst Kilmallock is an ideal base to explore the Ballyhoura Mountains. Stop off at Lough Gur (an important archaeological site, pg. 69) on the way back to Limerick City.

Gardens

The gardens of the West of Ireland are well known for their beauty, variety and uniqueness. Rain, soft sunshine and the warmth of the Gulf Stream combine to make ideal conditions for the creation of magnificent and magical gardens.

The general landscape varies greatly throughout the region, from the stone walled farmlands to rolling hills and fresh waters of Lough Corrib and the River Shannon, to the wild mountains and valleys. Within this landscape lie garden treasures that have been laid out by a variety of local people.

The coastal location means that plants are adapted to a moist maritime climate, but the Gulf Stream ensures that the region does not suffer from the extremes of temperature experienced by many other countries on the same latitude. This proximity to the Atlantic can also cause problems as salt and storm can be a challenge to every plant and tree. The soil is acidic and shallow in many places and much needed nutrients must then be added to make it fertile. This is a challenging environment for gardeners, but they ensure that the flora and fauna follow the weather patterns of the West. Hydrangeas, rhododendrons and heather are common features in gardens here as are azaleas and camellias - and even the odd palm tree!

The gardens here range in size and style, from formal to wild. Many feature exotic plants which were imported at the turn of the 20th Century and others have concentrated on the discovery and preservation of gardens which are over 300 years old. Each garden has its own story which we hope you will explore and enjoy.



Islands

Looking out over the Atlantic Ocean, tasting the salt on your lips and feeling the sea breeze on your face, nothing invigorates like a visit to the islands off the West coast of Ireland. These islands embody the soul of Ireland and this is predominately where the Irish language and culture is still vibrant.

Wild and beautiful, the islands have captured the imagination for thousands of years and provided stimulus for artists and writers such as J.M. Synge, Paul Henry, Heinrich Böll and Graham Greene. The perception that the islands were remote has changed dramatically in recent years and now almost all are easily accessible by boat, plane or by road as in the case of Achill Island.

Be sure to plan carefully for your visit to the islands - some are very busy in high season (especially July & August) and very few have ATM banking facilities.

We ask that you please leave the islands as you find them. Respect the environment and dispose of litter in bins or take it away with you. Take care; a visit to the islands is a unique experience but always be aware that these landscapes are exposed to the elements, island terrain is mainly rugged and the Atlantic Ocean can sometimes be wild and unpredictable.

The three Aran Islands Inis Mór (Inishmore), Inis Meáin (Inishmaan) and Inis Oírr (Inisheer) are situated in a north westerly, south easterly direction at the mouth of Galway Bay. These islands are famous for their geological formation, historical monuments and cultural heritage. Irish is the first language of the islanders and is still spoken in everyday life. The islands are rich with flora and fauna and have wonderful clean beaches.

Inis Mór

Inis Mór is the biggest of the Aran Islands and one of Ireland's most popular tourist destinations. "Next parish Boston" one can truthfully say when gazing down on the sparkling clear Atlantic Ocean from the Dún Aonghasa cliff face (pg. 39). Also scattered throughout the island are the remnants of 12th Century high crosses and churches.

Here you can still see the Aran Jumper being knitted and experience other local crafts such as basket weaving.

The island is not all about history, it is quite common to stumble across a traditional music or dance session which have been known to continue into the early hours. While Kilmurvey is the island's Blue Flag Beach, there are many others to choose from where you can relax, stroll, swim, dive or surf.

Festivals include: St. John's Eve Bonfire; 23rd June 2015. Patrún Inis Mór; 26th – 28th June 2015. Halloween Night Masquerade; 31st October 2015.

Inis Meáin

Meaning 'middle island', is the least visited of the three Aran Islands and allows the visitor to immerse themselves in Irish culture and traditions. The unique and traditional Inis Meáin Knitwear is produced here and exported to the fashion capitals of the world. Inis Meáin too has many sites of historical interest, e.g. Church of the King's Seven Sons, a number of holy wells and the prehistoric stone fort of Dún Chonchúir which is very well preserved and from its high point you can enjoy breath taking panoramic views. While spending time here the famous writer, John Millington Synge got inspiration for his plays. Synge's Cottage is now a museum and is open during the tourist season.

Inis Oírr

You may not know it but you're probably already familiar with Inis Oírr! The opening credits of the Father Ted television series feature one of the island's shipwrecks – the cargo vessel 'Plassy'.

Inis Oirr, meaning "south island", is the smallest of the three islands and is a tranquil place, perfect for quiet contemplation and relaxed walks. The island is small enough to see entirely on foot.

Ancient monuments worth a visit include the ruins of Teampall Chaomhain (St. Kevin's Church), O'Brien's Castle - a 15th Century tower house which stands within a stone fort, St. Gobnait's Church and the Holy Well of St. Enda. At Áras Éanna Arts Centre, you can attend workshops, see exhibitions and learn about the island's traditional culture. As you'd expect there are superb beaches ideal for swimming or surfing, walking routes and magnificent views across to the mainland and Connemara.

Festivals include: Inis Oírr Currach Races; August 2015.



Inishbofin Island

Is located off the west coast of Connemara and is renowned for its impromptu music sessions featuring wonderful local and visiting musicians. Visitors here are captivated by the island's allure and magnificent scenery. Inishbofin is an ecologist's joy with its array of flora and fauna and boasts excellent loop walks, two Green Coast beaches and crystal clear waters ideal for scuba diving enthusiasts. The island's stunning natural harbour makes it an ideal sailing base.

Festivals include: Environmental Summer School; 6th - 10th July, 2015

The island boasts of spectacular sea cliffs, awesome scenery, stunning drives, walks and cycle routes and beautiful beaches (many of them Blue Flag Beaches) catering for all types of angling and water sports. Achill Island has the reputation of being an artist's retreat and has festivals and events to suit all. Sporting events and activities include half marathons, surfing, swimming, walking, cycling, scuba diving, climbing, angling and equestrian activities to mention but a few.

Scattery Island

Scattery Island is a small uninhabited island at the mouth of the River Shannon near Kilrush, in south west Clare.

The island has a rich and unusual history associated with it, most of which centres around the life of St. Senan, the founder of the monastery on the island, in the sixth Century. Scattery Island was an ecclesiastical centre in early times.

St. Senan's monastery suffered severely as a consequence of the Viking raids of the ninth and tenth centuries, an attack from Brian Ború and later it was almost demolished in Tudor times during the reign of Queen Elizabeth when she suppressed all monasteries in Ireland. Scattery has also served as a place of safe harbour for the Spanish Armada and as a defence outpost for the English government, from which time the 18th Century battery built to defend against a French invasion dates.

Today the island contains the ruins of the old monastic site featuring a round tower damaged by lightening, a primitive stone cathedral, an oratory, Teampall Senain and St. Senan's Bed, and the church of Ard na nAingeal, where the Archangel Michael is said to have appeared to St. Senan. Along with these monastic ruins, the island is adorned with beautiful semi-natural grassland which is of great interest to ecologists who visit here.

Explore the Island

Guided Tours operate from Scattery Island Visitor Centre located on the island, which is open from late May to early September (Tel: 087 9958427). Tours can be arranged out of season by prior arrangement (Tel: 087 9199725 or padraig.oruairc@opw.ie). Tours subject to demand and tides.

Holy Island

Holy Island on Lough Derg and the river Shannon is one of the most famous monastic sites in Ireland. Its many attractions include a well-preserved Round Tower, the ruins of six churches, a Holy Well, a unique graveyard with slabs dating from the eight Century, Bullaun Stones, a cell like structure, which is one of the most extraordinary buildings in Ireland and a 'bargaining' stone where many a marriage was brokered. Their secluded position has enabled them to survive in a wonderful state of preservation.

The Island is chiefly associated with St. Caiman who died in 653 AD. In his time it was a great center of learning. Like all monasteries it suffered badly from Viking attacks, the first recorded being in 836 AD. Brian Ború rebuilt the monastery and his brother Marcan was abbot there.

Travel Options

It's now easier than ever to get to and explore the West with more transport links, better road infrastructure and an increased array of guided tours.

Rail - in addition to the Dublin rail services, the West of Ireland is now inter connected to the south of Ireland via a rail link from Limerick City to Galway City via Athenry.

Air - Shannon International Airport, Co. Clare and Ireland West Airport Knock, Co. Mayo both provide a great selection of flights to and from the West of Ireland.

Road - the M6 and the M7/M18 motorways (tolled), link Dublin, Galway, Limerick and Ennis and have greatly reduced travel times to and from the West.

Toll Roads: ten of Ireland's eleven toll roads have conventional barrier toll plazas. Unless your car has an electronic tag, you will need to stop at the cashier's booth and pay your toll in cash. Dublin's M50 is a barrier-free toll road, traffic passes beneath a camera gantry between Junction 6 and 7 which records vehicles' registration numbers. Drivers must pay their M50 toll before 20.00 the following day to avoid incurring a late-payment penalty. Payment methods include: (1) Online at www.eFlow.ie, (2) cash or card at any retail outlet that has the Payzone sign, (3) Lo-Call: 1890 50 10 50.

Walking & Cycling

Discover the scenery and solitude of the West of Ireland and you'll soon see why walking and cycling off the beaten track are such popular pastimes.

Signposted walks are found in and around larger towns and cities, while further afield there are longer waymarked trails which typically combine on and off-road walking. Hill walkers will find their mecca in Connemara, along cliff tops in Co Clare or on the mountains in Mayo and Achill Island.

Three national parks in these counties – the Burren National Park in Co Clare, the Connemara National Park in Co Galway and Ballycroy National Park in Co Mayo – offer a wide variety of suitable walks and trails.

Guided cycling tours and bicycle hire are other great options for exploring the West which also offers one of the most unique cycling routes - the Great Western Greenway. This world-class attraction is a 42 km traffic-free route which winds along the northern shore of Clew Bay and follows the route of the old Westport to Achill Island railway line which closed in 1937.

Another great option is The Ballyhoura Mountain Bike trails, which are nestled into the beautiful Ballyhoura mountains straddling the counties of Limerick and Cork. The trails were designed by Daffyd Davis and are run over 90km of the most wonderful undulating hills and forests that Ireland has to offer.

Walking In Mayo

Mayo's beautiful unspoilt landscape offers all kinds of trails including Mountain, Coastal, Island, Rural and Urban Greenways, National Loop Trails and Ireland's most recent National Park.

Ballycroy National Park - 11,000 hectares of Atlantic blanket bog and mountainous terrain, covering a vast uninhabited and unspoilt wilderness dominated by the Nephin Beg mountain range. Excellent visitor centre (seasonal) and lovely accessible boardwalk. Colour coded trails include:

Green - easy, short 1 - 2hrs, suitable for all levels of fitness Blue - moderate, 2 - 3hrs, suitable for medium levels of fitness Red - hard, 3 - 5hrs, suitable for higher levels of fitness Purple - difficult terrain, usually more high level

Coastal Walks - Black Ditch (13km) and **Children of Lir** (10km) loops form part of the **Ceathru Thaidhg Loop Walks** along the northern part of the Mayo coastline. The terrain consists of grassy tracks and bog roads whilst offering some unrivalled views of the coastal cliffs.

Foxford Way - Foxford is perfectly positioned for an excellent range of walks. The **Ox Mountain Spur** and **Larganmore Loop** are just two of the half a dozen well mapped out walking trails that make up the 86 km **Foxford Way**. Recreational trails criss-cross the valley and radiate high into the Ox Mountains.

Woodland Walks - Tourmakeady Forest is a beautiful and historic woodland filled with native hardwood species that is a treat for any walker. **Tourmakeady Loop** (5km) is a great walk that is suitable for all the family and the bonus has to be the waterfall. **Cong Nature Trail** (3km) gives an excellent overview of the village. The walks commence at Cong Abbey and the walker is given a deep insight into the history of Cong en-route through the local woodlands.

Walking In Galway

As Ireland's 2nd largest county, it's no surprise that Galway lends itself to so many excellent options for walking. From mountainous walks to unique Island walks, to inland forest park walks, there is something for everyone.

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Connemara National Park - 2,957 hectares of scenic mountains, expanses of bogs, heaths, grasslands and woodlands. Some of the Park's mountains, namely Benbaun, Bencullagh, Benbrack and Muckanaght, are part of the famous Twelve Bens mountain range. The 400 metre high Diamond Hill offers stunning scenery across Connemara, with 4 walking trails leading out from the excellent Visitor Centre located at its base. The trails include **Ellis Wood Nature Trail** (0.5km), **Sruffaunboy Walk** (1.5km), **Lower Diamond Hill Walk** (3km), **Upper Diamond Hill Walk** (3.7km).

•••••

Islands - the many islands along Galway's stretch of the Wild Atlantic Way offers several refreshing looped walks, all of which give spectacular views of the unique surroundings. The terrain includes roads, laneways, bog roads, grass roads & tracks.

Inis Mór – 3 walks (10km, 12km, 16km) Inis Meáin – 3 walks (8km, 10km, 13km) Inis Oírr – 2 walks (8km, 13km) Inishbofin – 3 walks (5km, 5km, 8km)

Portumna Forest Park - set on the shores of the mighty Lough Derg just outside Portumna Town, this forest is dominated by coniferous woodland and also offers some excellent views of the lake from its 4 trails that are suitable for all types of walkers.

Bonaveen Walking Trail (10.5km) – forest tracks & open lakeshore. Moderate. Forest Friendly Walking Trail (1.5km) – wide smooth forest road & boardwalk. Easy. Rinmaher Walking Trail (10km) – mainly on single track (narrow). Moderate. Woodland Walking Trail (2km) – gravel & tarred forest road & wide boardwalk. Easy.

Coole Park - once the home of Lady Augusta Gregory, located 3km from Gort, this 1,000 acre park is closely linked with literary legends such as George Bernard Shaw, John Millington Synge and in particular W.B. Yeats, all of whom came to visit the park and carved their initials on the Autograph Tree, which can still be seen today. The park offers two trails: "The Family Trail" (1.75km) and the "Seven Woods Trail" (4.5km).

Walking In Clare

Walking in Clare is certainly unique! With such varied landscapes as Lough Derg, The Burren and the Cliffs of Moher, it is no wonder that the county is a walker's paradise.

Ballycuggaran Loop Walk

A fantastic 6km looped walk overlooking Lough Derg, the Annacarriga valley and the hills that stretch from Caherhurley to Ogonnelloe. The loop starts and finishes at Rinnaman Point (Two-mile Gate) and you should allow about 2 hours to complete it. It follows forest roads and tracks through dense forest and open hillside. The best views can be seen when walking the trail in an anti-clockwise direction.

Ballyvaughan - Black Head loop

Explore the north of the Burren with this fascinating 26km looped walk which starts and ends at Fanore on the north west coast of Clare. Experience the variety of the Burren's hill and coastal scenery, following green laneways, tracks, and mountain paths, whilst taking in the Caher Valley and part of Gleninagh Mountain.

Cliffs of Moher Coastal Walk

A very challenging walk along some of the most outstanding landscape scenery in Ireland. From Liscannor and Hags Head in the South, along by the majestic Cliffs of Moher and to Doolin in the North, with views over Aill na Searrach, the Aran Islands, and Galway Bay. The trail consists of exposed cliff-top paths, steep ascents and descents, and narrow/steep flagstone steps. Safety must be exercised at all times.

Lough Avalla - Farm loop

This 6km looped walk starts out at Mullaghmore Crossroads in the heart of the Burren National Park. It takes you through an old Celtic farm, and along by the shores of the little lake called Lough Avalla. The terrain is mostly minor roads, farm tracks, laneways and open Burren ground.

O'Briensbridge - Parteen Weir

A 5km loop marked with green arrows that travels upstream along the Shannon to the Parteen Weir Hydro Dam before returning to the charming village of O'Briensbridge via the Headrace Canal. This is a level walk on grassy and riverside paths.

Walking In Limerick

From numerous forest walks to mountain and hillside trails, to a unique walking and cycling trail developed on a disused railway line, there is something for all types of walkers in Limerick.

Ballyhoura Walking Trails - undulating green pastures, woodlands, hills and mountains, this area which sits on the Cork/Limerick border is a well established outdoor recreation hub. Numerous looped walks in varying lengths include: Blackrock Loop (11km) - minor roads & forest tracks. Hard. Trailhead: Greenwood Forest.

Darragh Hills Loop (10km) – forest roads & paths. Moderate. Trailhead: Darragh Bridge.

Canon Sheehan Loop (7km) - forest tracks, paths & riverbank. Easy. Trailhead: Glenanaar Forest.

Curraghchase Forest Park - situated about 22km south west of Limerick City, the park covers 313 hectares of mixed woodlands, parkland and lakes. There are 4 excellent walks:

Curragh Trail (2.4km) - multi-use walking and cycling trail for occasional walkers/cyclists

Arboretum Trail (1.1km) - stroll through the old arboretum of Curragh Chase Glenisca Trail (3.6km) – see mature broadleaf and conifer forest, an old cave, and cliff walls

Lake Trail (1.1km) - smooth forest road, fully accessible for all

Great Southern Trail - following the route of the Limerick-Tralee railway line which closed in the mid-seventies, this trail has now been developed along a 37km stretch that is suitable for walkers and cyclists. There are numerous trailheads along the route, which include:

Rathkeale – Ardagh (9km)

Ardagh – Newcastle West (4km)

Newcastle West – Barnagh (10km)

Barnagh - Abberyfeale (15km)

Clare Glens & Slieve Felim Mountains - situated about 18km east of Limerick City is the village of Murroe, which is a good base for accessing top quality walks in the nearby Clare Glens or Slieve Felim Mountains. The Clare Glens consists of a picturesque red sandstone gorge through which the Clare River flows and has numerous waterfalls. The 'Clare Glens Loop' (4km) and the 'Nature Loop' (2km) are both of an easy grade on woodland paths. The Slieve Felim Mountains include the 'Glenstal Woods Loop' (15km).




