Firefighters extinguish brush blaze

Dry weather has been a persistent threat this year

BANDON - Wildland firefighters had their hands full battling a two-acre blaze near Bandon on Wednesday afternoon, May 8.

The fire broke out sometime around 2 p.m. on Winterberry Lane off Rosa Road across from Chandler Lane in Bandon. A plume of smoke was visible from town.

The Coos Forest Protective Association and Bandon Fire Department dispatched multiple engines, tanker trucks and at least two bulldozers to contain the blaze. CFPA Unit Forester Nils Storkeson said firefighters had the blaze mostly under control by 4:15 p.m.

The fire is one of several that have broken out on Coos County forest lands in the past month. Fire season has not yet been declared but the lack of rain this year may bring an early start, said CFPA prevention specialist John Flannigan.

"It is too late to burn most large machine-built piles," Flannigan said. "We have seen piles burned last fall rekindle this spring. Hand piles can be burned safely, but precautions must be followed. You have to clear above and around your pile, have water and tools immediately available and never leave a burn unattended. Picking the right day and time is also important. A foggy morning can turn into a hot or windy afternoon. Double checking that the pile is out is also prudent."

Drobot added that the creamery wouldn't be in Bandon without the support of many people 8,000 square-foot facility on land owned by the city of Bandon and leased to the creamery. The city

also paid to construct the public restrooms adjacent to the building.

Drobot said he was able to fund the venture because of loans from Craft3, the Port of Bandon Economic Development Fund, the Oregon Business Development

Wildlife Service adopts final plan for refuges

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service adopted Final Comprehensive Conservation Plans for Bandon Marsh, Nestucca Bay and Siletz Bay National Wildlife Refuges. These plans provide goals, objectives and strategies for management of the three refuges over the next 15 years, according to a news release from USFWS.

The final CCPs emphasize expanded habitat management, restoration and monitoring along with increased public use opportunities. The CCPs were developed to provide reasonable, scientifically-grounded guidance for improving the refuges' wetlands, grasslands, riparian and upland forests and


Golf tourney for BHS football

The suspect in a May 2 shooting near Bandon has been arrested in California.

According to the Coos County Sheriff's Office, 27-year-old James Housego of Bandon was arrested by the California Highway Patrol on Wednesday morning near Yreka. Housego faces criminal charges in that state stemming from his arrest there.

In Oregon, Housego is suspected of shooting 34-year-old Joseph McNeil at a Bandon residence last week. Police say two other individuals also were terrorized at the residence, 50-year-old Don Chambers and 35year-old

Langlois Library awarded grant to save newspapers

The Langlois Public Library has been awarded a grant from the Curry County Cultural Coalition to preserve the content of some very fragile issues of a newspaper published in Denmark, Oregon, in 1884-1885.

The Southwest Oregon Recorder was published in Denmark beginning in 1884, but within a few years the paper moved to Bandon where it was renamed the Independent Recorder. Publication ceased in 1916. Very few copies of the paper survive, and as far as we know none of the issues in the Langlois Library exist anywhere else.

Newspapers were the Internet of the nineteenth-century — they were usually the only way people had to get news and information. Up until the 1840s newspaper publishing was a relatively small market, because paper was an expensive commodity. Before the mid-1800s paper was made from cotton and linen fiber.

However, beginning in the 1840s wood pulp replaced cloth and the price of paper plummeted, meaning that newsprint could be mass produced. This coincided with the westward expansion of the U.S., and hundreds of new publications appeared.

The drawback to wood pulp paper is that it is highly acidic and over time, especially if exposed to air or light, it breaks down. Our copies of the Southwest Oregon Recorder have deteriorated to the extent that they cannot be read as print.

That's where the Curry County Cultural Coalition comes in. Thanks to their generous support, we will work with the Oregon Digital Newspapers Program to digitize our collection; once complete the project will allow patrons to access this interesting slice of north Curry County history online.

The Oregon Digital Newspaper Program was established in 2009 with grant funding from the Library Services and Technology Act, the Oregon Cultural Trust, the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Association and private donations. Additional grant support has been provided by the Library of Congress and the National Endowment for the Humanities' National Digital Newspaper Program.

Fact vs. fiction at the port

As an incumbent candidate for the Port of Bandon Commission, I have tried to maintain the high ground and not engage the other candidates directly. I prefer to tell my story and let the voters decide. However the facts have been played fast and loose on several issues, on several occasions so I would like to clear the air with some verifiable information about the port and our activities

Fact: We have only owned the Old Blue Building (now green) for two and a half years. We acquired it in November 2010. We opened for business as the Old Town Marketplace June of 2012. We had it up and running in less than 18 months, providing a venue for 66 local vendors who are ecstatic with the opportunity.

Fact: The port acquiring the old fish plant and repurposing it as a marketplace for local producers is probably one of the biggest things to happen in the Bandon area in years. Dozens of vendor families are positively affected and it is now one of the top two positive cash flow sources for the port – and we have a new seafood market to boot.

Fact: According to a recent study, port activities generate about \$50 million in annual economic impact to the area.

Fact: The Port of Bandon has an existing business plan which was commissioned by the port in 2006 and is in the process of being updated and reformatted to comply with new state requirements.

Fact: I have served on many committees and commissions during the last 35 years. I have never served on a board more committed, ethical and thoughtful as the Port of Bandon Commission. Port manager Gina Dearth lives and breathes the port's business providing port and community leadership seven days a week. Gina Dearth has been the leading voice in the 5Ports Group that was formed years ago to band together the southern ports after the news of the potential defunding of small port dredging. Any claims of lack of leadership are unfounded.

Fact: The port is in weekly, and sometimes daily, contact with our national representatives' offices regarding the dredging issue. We will get this worked out. We will get dredged one way or another.

Fact: The port has clearly and repeatedly expressed its lack of interest in participating in the Bandon Marsh expansion proposal.

Fact: The port commission meets every month in alternating cities of Bandon and Coquille and sets aside time on every agenda for public input. The budget committee is made up of public-at-large persons and the annual budget is submitted to the commission and the public for its review and adoption. Every step of the way is open and transparent. Fact: Port operations and activities are strong. Based on historic revenues from basin operations, we made a budget projection of \$38,000 in revenue for 2012 and actually brought in approximately \$50,000 in basin related revenue. The weekend of Windfest, a port activity, brought more than 5,000 people to the waterfront last year. From June until October our restrooms serviced more than 100,000 users. The Port of Bandon's considerable activities are highlighted in virtually every edition of the newspaper.





"It was a great publicpartnership private between Greg and the city's urban renewal agency," Schamehorn said. "I think it's going to be a big boost for Bandon."

Cheese production, which was once huge in Bandon, halted in 2000, a couple of years after the Tillamook County Creamery Association purchased the former factory. The building was demolished in 2002.

Two years ago, the city purchased the lot from Tillamook using urban renewal money with the idea they could attract a developer to build a new cheese factory.

After ground-breaking in August and construction beginning in October, Drobot announced he had hired Brad Sinko, son of former Bandon cheese factory owner Joe Sinko, as head cheese maker for Face Rock Creamery. The younger Sinko began his cheese making career at his father's factory and made a name for himself at Beecher's Handmade Cheese in the Pike Place Market in Seattle. He has won major awards for his cheese, an accomplishment Drobot feels confident will continue at Face Rock.

Along with Face Rock cheese, an array of local products also are available at the factory, including clothing with the creamery's logo, Northwest cheeses, Coastal Mist Chocolates, Misty Meadows Jams, Hazel's Cranberry Catsup, Raven Soaps, Northwest wines and beers and even a recently released historical photo book about Bandon.

Wednesday, people lowly filed into the building and tasted and purchased cheese and generous scoops of Umpqua Dairy ice cream. Drobot and Joe Sinko cheerfully served cones alongside employees while Brad Sinko and his crew were visible behind heavy glass making cheese curds. People came from all over the county for the opening.

Katy Downard of Bandon, who works at First American Title just past the creamery, said they've gotten inquires for years from people asking what happened to the cheese factory. Now they can direct them to the new one.

other habitats for the long-term conservation of migratory birds, anadromous fish and native plants and animals.

"These plans represent years of effort among the service, state and other federal agencies, local communities and other stakeholders," Oregon Coast NWR Complex Project Leader Roy Lowe stated. "They build off of established partnerships working to conserve the exceptional natural resources along the Oregon coast."

Government agencies, conservation organizations, private citizens, local landowners and other stakeholders provided input for each CCP. The service evaluated written comments and public input on the draft plans in the fall of 2012 and revised the plans to include the new information received.

"The service is committed to the conservation of wildlife and their habitat and these plans provide the best balance in sustaining or improving the biological integrity, diversity and environmental health of the refuges," Lowe said in a statement. "It also provides the best possible balance of expanding popular recreational opportunities while limiting impacts to wildlife and their habitat."

The CCPs only focus on future management actions that will occur within refuge-managed lands. Bandon Marsh NWR is currently undergoing a refuge boundary expansion study. Since the refuge boundary expansion study is not within the scope of the Bandon Marsh CCP, the final CCP does not propose a boundary expansion. However, all substantive comments received during the draft CCP comment period regarding potential refuge boundary expansion will be addressed and incorporated into the Bandon Marsh Draft Land Protection Plan/Environmental Assessment, which will be presented to the public as soon as the required analyses are completed, according to Lowe. Copies of the CCPs are available in the references section of the public libraries in Bandon, Coquille, Newport, Lincoln City, Pacific City and Tillamook. Printed or CD-ROM copies can be requested from the Refuge Office at 541-867-4550. The CCPs may be downloaded online at www.fws.gov/oregoncoast/ccp_nes_slz_bd m.htm. 



The combined total proposed fiscal yea 2013-2014 budget for Area 1 and Area 2 is \$2,814,228, which is \$804,095 (40%) more than last year. The primary reason for this increase is higher Beginning Balances esulting from larger than previously anticipated proceeds of bond sales for improvements.






