A Word from the Curate

Dear Parishioners,

Jesus said, "Which of these three do you think was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of robbers? The one who showed mercy. Go and do likewise." (Luke 10: 36-37)

The familiar story of the Good Samaritan came alive for me recently. I was travelling back home with Paul and my son Alex, having spent the day in Sheffield celebrating our grandson's 2nd birthday. Snow began falling several hours before we began our journey home, so we decided to take the longer route via the motorway. The road conditions were bad, and the journey took much longer than usual, but we thought we were on the home strait when we saw the '10 miles to Stoke' sign. Then all the traffic suddenly came to a halt, and we sat in the same spot for an hour. A man walked past, and said he'd heard that the tailback stretched all the way back to Stoke. There had been an accident, and the

road had been closed for hours. It was not likely to open for a while. It looked like it was going to be a very long, cold night.

We decided to leave the car and walk to a nearby hotel, to see if we could use their toilets and perhaps get a hot drink. As we entered the hotel, a friendly receptionist greeted us and asked if we were stranded. We said yes, and she said something like, "Come in, make yourselves at home. Sorry we can't offer you a room - we've already given them all out to families with small children. But we're leaving the restaurant open all night for anyone else who's stranded – we'll give you some blankets and pillows, and tea and coffee, and you can stay all night if necessary. At least its warm and dry here!" Compared to the prospect of spending the night in the car, her offer seemed very inviting. Needless to say, we accepted, along with some 50 others who had already camped out in the restaurant. The staff, who should have gone off duty at midnight, stayed there all night to serve us and never stopped smiling. They even turned the heating up so we wouldn't get cold! The road eventually opened at 5am, but they said we could stay until morning if we wanted to. We eventually left at around 9am.

How much did the hotel charge for this extraordinary hospitality? Not one penny! They are part of a national chain, with premises all over the country, and are primarily in the business of making a profit. Yet in our hour of need, they made absolutely no attempt to profit from our misfortune. Their decision to help us was not just a case of the staff following company policy either - in many ways, they were breaking all the rules. They did it, simply because they could. And their kindness and generosity transformed the experience for all of us, from something that could have been very unpleasant, into something which was memorable for all the right reasons.

It was also a powerful reminder of the story of the Good Samaritan, and the fact that God works not only in the Church, but in the world, wherever he finds people who are willing to do the *right* thing. We can all try to be good neighbours, but there are also times when we all NEED a good neighbour. So who is our neighbour? The one who does the will of God, whenever we find ourselves in need in the world. Thank God for those people.





Off we went to the local snowy slopes In search of sledging joy or so we hoped Crowds of people had shared the same idea But there was plenty of room so no need to fear




To the top of the hill we dutifully trooped Sledging down how we shouted and whooped Repeating the walk to the top then ride down again Finally stopping when it started to rain

When we got home we discovered with dismay The dog had made his escape and run away Squeezing through the cat flap on the back door Freedom beckoned as the side gate was no more


As it got dark we recognised a cry for help The bark of our dog or more like a yelp Hunger had brought him home safe and sound We opened the door and in he did bound


Ursula died in December 2011 at the age of 90 at a nursing home near to Skegness.

She came from a Jewish Christian family with a long history. As a result, the family was targeted by the Nazis. She and her brother were got out of Germany two months before the outbreak of the Second World War by a group of Quakers, where she found refuge in Caverswall. She was taken in by the Gower Jones family, which was a life saver for her, being only 17 at the time.

I grew up in Caverswall, knowing Ursula for nearly the first 16 years of my life and

have been her friend ever since. She was a wonderful Christian, bringing joy to all she met. She and Lucy (Gower Jones) presented the sick communion set to the Church, which we still have.

'To Reach New Generations' - Ephesians 6 v 4: Jesus said, "Bring your children up in the training and instruction of the Lord."

Dear Friends,

Young people sometimes have a poor reputation. It's nothing new. In every generation it seems that children and young people are not given the respect they deserve. For many people, the lasting memory from last year's riots in London and elsewhere - including parts of the Black Country - will be of young people rampaging through the streets, throwing missiles at the police and looting. But I was more impressed by the large numbers of young people who took part in the community clean-ups in the affected towns and cities in the aftermath of the disturbances.

Children and young people are often overlooked in society and, despite Jesus' injunction to "let the little children come to him", we aren't much better in the Church. We often talk about children and young people as "the church of tomorrow." This approach is unbiblical. Jesus said: "Do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." He didn't say the Kingdom "will belong", but "belongs".

The Christian church in our country already does much good work with children and young people. In the Church of England alone, more than 116,000 volunteers work alongside 4,900 employed staff to provide activities outside church worship for 407,000 children ad young people under the age of 16. Churches in our diocese have some 54 paid and volunteer workers engaged in youth and children's work. But I want to do more. And so this year my Lent Appeal will support Christian initiatives overseas and here in the UK working with children and young people. Please support my appeal as generously as you can so we can help equip this vital area of Christian ministry.

CPAS Falcon Camps. Falcon Camps, run by the Christian agency CPAS, provide affordable and unforgettable Christian holidays for around 500 eight- to 18-year-olds each year. Many of these children come from families facing different types of disadvantage, including unemployment, financial difficulties, loss, separation or exclusion from education. There are 21 Falcon Camps in the country, including two here in our diocese at Oswestry and Dovedale. They are run by a team of committed and enthusiastic volunteers who are passionate about communicating the good news of Jesus Christ through their words and actions. Falcon camps help young people to grow in confidence, make new friends and have fantastic new experiences. It is also a time when many children hear the Gospel for the very first time. The monies raised in this appeal will go directly to bursaries towards those children who cannot afford the cost of a holiday.

Overseas we are supporting our companion Diocese of Matlosane in South Africa as they are working on an ambitious programme to train Sunday School teachers across the 27 parishes in the Diocese, to develop its Sunday Schools, and to build up a range of culturally relevant resources to help the leaders teach the youngsters about our Lord. This is part of a larger campaign by the Anglican Church in South Africa to 'Grow the Church', focusing on evangelism and spirituality. A group of people from the Lichfield Diocese will be visiting Matlosane after Easter to help train Sunday School teachers.

Algeria - Church Attacked in Ouargla, Algeria - Sources: VOM Contacts, International Christian Concern

On February 1, Muslim extremists attacked a church in Ouargla, eastern Algeria, damaging church property. According to VOM contacts, Pastor Mourad had received a threatening letter two weeks earlier demanding that he leave the area but had not taken the threat seriously. However, around midnight on February 1, several men broke through the rear gate of the church and destroyed some church equipment. They also tried to break into the church building but were unsuccessful. In 2009, Pastor Mourad's wife was beaten and seriously injured by an unknown group of attackers. And last year, an angry mob shouted death threats while throwing heaps of trash over the church walls. Despite these attacks, Pastor Mourad is convinced that the Lord has called him to serve in Ouargla, and he refuses to leave. "No matter what happens, we will stay here," he says. Praise God for his faithfulness. *Psalm 54:1-3*

Bosnia - Believer Uses VOM-Provided Book to Share Gospel - *Source: VOM Contacts*

A Christian in Bosnia recently shared the gospel with his neighbours by giving them some humanitarian supplies along with a VOM-provided gospel story book. After receiving a package of supplies from the Christian relief organization Samaritan's Purse, "Henry" offered the supplies to his neighbours, along with an illustrated Jesus: He Lived Among Us story book, which tells the story of Jesus from the gospels. A 25-year-old woman kept asking Henry questions about the difference between Croatian Christmas celebrations and Christian celebrations. "It came to my mind to use the book to talk more about Jesus and his plan for humanity," Henry said. "In the end, I told her to read the book and find out more about the life of this wonderful and unique man." Praise God for the creativity and willingness believers all over the world have to share Christ's message. *John 20:30-31*

Sudan - School Bombed by Government Forces - Sources: Samaritan's Purse, State Department, VOM Contacts

On Wednesday, February 1, 2012, Sudanese forces bombed a school run by Samaritan's Purse in the Nuba mountains in Southern Kordofan. The bombing occurred on the first day of school, when the Heiban Bible College campus was crowded with students, teachers and families. Although Sudanese forces dropped eight bombs, destroying two buildings, no one was killed. A statement from the United States' ambassador to the United Nations said the attack "underscores the viciousness of Sudan's ongoing military campaign in South Kordofan and Blue Nile states" in a conflict affecting 50,000 people. Samaritan's Purse reported that four churches in the region have been destroyed since August. Nearly 30,000 refugees from the Nuba mountain have filled a camp across the border in South Sudan. Please pray for those affected by the ongoing violence and for those who are bringing Jesus' name to the area. *Psalm 61:1-3*


