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### **HISTORY**

The National Park Service (NPS) was officially established as a bureau under the Department of the Interior (DOI) in 1916, in accordance with the National Park Service Organic Act (39 Stat. 535, 16 U.S.C. 1, as amended in 1935 by 48 Stat. 389). Following the urgings of men such as George Caitlin, David E. Folsom, Henry D. Washburn, and Ferdinand V. Hayden to preserve natural wilderness of the United States, particularly in the west, popular opinion began to swing in favor of preservation and the seeds for national parks and a way to manage them were sown.

National parks existed decades before under the management of various federal departments. Hot Springs (designated as a national park in 1921) was originally established as Hot Springs Reservation in 1832, making it the oldest unit in the National Park System. Yosemite was originally transferred to the State of California as a preserve and public recreational area in 1864 and then brought back as a federal park in 1890. Yellowstone, then barely explored, became the first officially designated national park under the Department of the Interior in 1872 thanks in part to popular support from Montanans and the Northern Pacific Railroad company. In 1875, the majority of Mackinac Island became a national park under the Secretary of War due to the Army's presence there.

The Forest Reserve Act of 1891 gave U.S. presidents the right to designate federal forest preserves on public domains. By 1916, presidents had reserved 176 million acres for this purpose. A similar movement begun around the same time focused on preserving prehistoric and historic sites of the Southwest as national monuments. Casa Grande in Arizona was the first of these national monuments in 1889 authorized by Congress.

The Antiquities Act of 1906 expanded the authority of the President to proclaim historic landmarks, structures, and other objects of national interest on public lands as National Monuments. Over the next one hundred years, U.S. presidents reserved over one hundred sites under the authority of the Antiquities Act of 1906. Many of these sites were established under and administered by Agriculture and War Departments.

By 1916 DOI oversaw fourteen national parks, twenty-one national monuments, and Hot Springs and Casa Grande sites without any systematic management. DOI regularly called on the Army to develop and police Yellowstone and parks in California. The other parks were attended to by untrained civilians or part-time custodians. Most were not well developed or maintained for public use and enjoyment or the continued preservation of resources.

In 1914, Stephen T. Mather – a business executive, civic leader, and conservation proponent – complained to Secretary of the Interior Franklin K. Lane, about the condition of national parks. Lane, an old friend of Mather's, appointed Mather to be a special assistant to work on park issues. With his top aide Horace M. Albright, he laid the groundwork to establish a system of National Parks and worked with Members of Congress to secure passage of the National Park Service Act in 1916 bringing all DOI managed parks under NPS jurisdiction. Under Mather, as the first NPS director and Albright, assistant director until 1919, NPS improved the preservation and interpretation of current parks, primarily in the West, and established guidelines for identifying potential new sites, such as Mt. McKinley in 1917.

In 1933 historic sites, landmarks, and monuments held under other government bureaus – such as several Civil War battlefields, which were originally administered by the Department of War – were transferred to NPS after years of fighting by NPS officials to interpret and manage these sites. New legislation signed by President Franklin D. Roosevelt also guaranteed all new national sites established would also be under NPS jurisdiction. This reorganization created the system of parks which would continue into the 21st century and increased the visibility of NPS and their parks with Congress and tourists. Following reorganization, President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal in 1933 created onsite and regional park offices to better provide onsite administration and protection of the sites. Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC), established under the New Deal, spread six hundred camps across the U.S. by 1965 to perform further maintenance, preservation, conservation, and rehabilitation of park structures, roadways and trails, and exhibits. The scientists, historians, engineers, curators, and others originally hired under the CCC would remain on at many of the parks to form regional and site administrations.

After declining during World War I, the Great Depression, and World War II interest in national parks soared in the late 1940s. Director Conrad Wirth responded to the crisis of overcrowded facilities with Mission 66 in 1951; a ten year plan to rehabilitate and expand the use of the parks for public enjoyment, education, and preservation. The National Survey of Historic Sites and Buildings, begun in 1935 with the Historic Sites Act, was reinstated to evaluate each park's current status and needs. George B. Hartzog, director after Wirth in 1964, added sixty-nine new parks to the service as part of the expansion policies of Mission 66. The National Register of Historic Places, begun in 1966 as a response to urban expansion and administered by the NPS, also expanded national historic site recognition.

In 1964, Secretary of the Interior Stewart Udall signed a management policy which created three distinct areas of focus for National parks: natural, historical, and recreational. The third was a departure from a 1953 directive by Congress for the NPS to avoid recreational uses, due to concern of preservation spoiled by use. NPS added one hundred thirty-one new parks, including large tracts in Alaska, as it continued to expand the interpretative, educational, and environmental resources for many of its holdings and to acquire sites across the U.S. These acquisitions were aided by the Land and Water Conservation Act Fund Act of 1965 which allotted certain fees and charges to be used in the purchasing of new sites.

The Wilderness Act of 1964 addressed growing concerns that the parks were becoming overdeveloped. Although Wirth opposed the act, believing that the NPS managed its wilderness areas sufficiently, the act was passed and a careful examination of all parks was begun. By 2005 more than half of NPS lands were designated wilderness areas. During this time, both historical and recreational park sites increased, including twelve presidential sites and over a dozen water-activity sites (national seashores and reservoirs).

During the 1970s, 1980s, and 1990s the NPS system continued to expand greatly. Against this expansion, park selection criteria were more strictly defined and Congress supported the Service's Park Restoration and Improvement Plan to allocate resources to strengthening the services and access of current parks. By 1974 the three designation system was out of date and a single management policy for the park system was adopted in 1975. Also in the 1970s great portions of Alaska were deemed national sites, ending one of the 20th century's largest conservation campaigns.

The idea for Harpers Ferry Center (HFC) dates back to the early years of George Hartzog's tenure as director of the National Park Service and the implementation of Mission 66. Hartzog became director in January 1964 and one month later named Bill Everhart chief of the new Division of Interpretation and

Visitor Services. The new division's job was to centralize the various interpretive functions – audiovisual, publications, museum exhibits – and coordinate their activities. For example, the Museum Branch was split into two main factions, the East Museum Laboratory in Washington, D.C., and the West Museum Laboratory in San Francisco.

Opened in 1970, the Harpers Ferry Center was conceived and staffed as a "think tank" environment for interpretive services. The center was located near Mather Training Center for easy access to training and Harpers Ferry National Historical Park as a testing ground for new interpretive products and services. This centralization of services created the need for a local service-wide collection devoted to preserving agency history, better known as the National Park Service Archives.

The idea for a central archive had been around for decades but it took the approaching 1972 NPS Centennial to put a plan into action for the collection. As historians began to compile sources and materials for a one-hundred year history of the NPS publication, they expressed their frustration in locating essential agency records and instances of missing documentation to the central office in Washington, D.C. Everhart, along with NPS oral historian and retired NPS Chief of Information Herbert Evison, pressured Director Hartzog for approval of an archives program.

Assistant to the Director, Cornelius W. Heine was officially put in charge of the development of a central archives program in 1967. Heine compiled reports from over one-hundred ninety parks on specific recommendations for the new program, including scope, staffing, and location. On 1970, Director Hartzog approved creation of the NPS archives, established under Everhart at the Harpers Ferry Center, with David H. Wallace as the first head archivist.

The creation of the archives included an oral history project and collection of artifacts such as uniforms and badges (eventually separated into the NPS Material Culture Collection"). In 1975 the name of the collection was changed from "NPS Archives" to the "NPS History Collection" to avoid confusion between official NPS records housed with the National Archives and Records Administration and unofficial records housed with the Harpers Ferry Center.

Over the decades, as the collection grew and services expanded, the archives were moved from the Shipley School building (1972) in Harpers Ferry, WV to the Lewis W. Anthony building (1975) also in Harpers Ferry, WV. In 2009 the collection was moved to Charles Town, WV in the Harpers Ferry Center Willow Springs facility. This brought together the History Collection, NPS History Photograph collection, and the Cultural Material collection under one roof and management.

SERIES I: RECORDS OF THE NPS DIRECTOR'S OFFICE, 1856-2001 (bulk dates: 1914-2001)

Organized into eight subseries by office or subject: Subseries A: Records of the NPS Directors; Subseries B: Director's Office Meetings and Conferences; Subseries C: Records of the NPS Deputy Directors; Subseries D: Records Related to the U.S. Department of the Interior; Subseries E: NPS Laws and Regulations; Subseries F: NPS Policies and Manuals; Subseries G: Servicewide Planning Records; Subseries H: Director's Office Newsletters.

Correspondence, memoranda, telegrams, meeting minutes, newsletters, and other communications from the Office of the NPS Director. Records associated with individual directors primarily represent desk files, personal papers, and certificates of awards received. Planning documents, press releases, and newspaper clippings are included. Biographical information for and text of various speeches give by NPS directors and various U.S. Secretaries of the Interior is included. Reports and articles written by NPS directors include annual reports to the secretary of the interior, internal reports, and summaries of programs or initiatives. Copies of laws and regulations related to the National Park Service and which guide its management practices and development of internal policy are present. NPS management policies, director's orders, and guidelines to assist field staff with managing NPS resources and implementing policies is also included.

#### SUBSERIES A: RECORDS OF THE NPS DIRECTORS, 1914-2001

U.S. Department of the Interior responsibilities for national parks began with the establishment of Yellowstone National Park in 1872. Parks were initially under the immediate supervision of the U.S. Secretary of the Interior, exercised through the Patents and Miscellaneous Division. In 1907 park functions were transferred to the Miscellaneous Section of the Office of the Chief Clerk.

Although Stephen T. Mather was the first director for the National Park Service, he was not the first to try to cohesively manage the various national parks, monuments, and reservations that existed at that time. The "superintendent of national parks" title preceded that of director, while serving a similar function. The Secretary of the Interior appointed Mark Roy Daniels (1881-1952) as general superintendent and landscape architect of national parks in 1913, headquartered in San Francisco, CA. After Daniels resigned on December 9, 1915, Robert B. Marshall was appointed superintendent of national parks and the office was moved to Washington, D.C. Stephen T. Mather, assistant to Secretary of the Interior Franklin K. Lane since January 1915, supported Marshall's appointment. Both Daniels and Marshall worked to provide administrative guidance to the independently operated national parks, national monuments, and reservations.

Although the National Park Service was established by law on August 25, 1916, Marshall served as superintendent of national parks until December 31, 1916. An appropriations act on April 17, 1917 provided funds for NPS operations and Mather became the first director of the National Park Service on May 16, 1917.

Correspondence, news clippings, reports, articles telegrams, and other documents to, from, and about the directors of the National Park Service. Includes the original telegram sent to Stephen T. Mather by Horace M. Albright informing him that President Woodrow Wilson has signed the Organic Act establishing the National Park Service in 1916. Text of speeches given by directors and their staffs are included, including many by Directors Wirth and Hartzog in particular. Director Kennedy's reading files include a substantial amount of correspondence. A number of certificates and awards for Director Drury and personal copies of NPS Director's Annual Report to the Secretary of the Interior also included. Biographical information, obituaries, and articles about the

directors make up much of the available material for early directors.

SUB-SUBSERIES 1: RECORDS RELATED TO STEPHEN T. MATHER, 1916-1983 (bulk dates: 1916-1932)

Stephen Tyng Mather was born in San Francisco, California on July 4, 1867. In 1887, he graduated from University of California, Berkeley, and worked as a journalist for the New York Sun. In 1893, he married Jane Thacker Floy and started working for the Pacific Coast Borax Company in advertising. In 1898, he and partner Thomas Thorkildsen created Thorkildsen-Mather Borax Company.

Mather came to Washington from Chicago in January 1915 as Special Assistant to Secretary of the Interior Franklin K. Lane for National Park Concerns. There, he met Horace M. Albright, who became his assistant. Mather's vigorous efforts to build public and political support for the parks helped persuade Congress to create the National Park Service in 1916. While Mather was touring the parks out west during this period, Albright sent him a telegram: "Park service bill signed nine o'clock last night have pen used by president in signing for you..." Albright later sent the pen and a letter detailing the same information to Mather.

Appointed the first NPS director in May 1917, he continued to promote park access, development, and use and contributed generously to the parks from his personal fortune. He traveled often to the parks, often bringing government officials, senators and representatives with as guests to showcase the work the National Parks were achieving.

During his tenure the service's domain expanded eastward with the addition of Shenandoah, Great Smoky Mountains, and Mammoth Cave national parks. Periodically disabled by manic-depression, Mather left office in January 1929 after suffering a stroke and died a year later. Horace Albright succeeded him as Director

Following his death, Albright sent a telegram to park staff out west to alert them of this change. A memorial service was planned in Yosemite, and, a year later, there was a National Memorial Broadcast honoring Mather's memory. Albright requested a memorial Sequoia tree planting in Mather's honor in all National Parks.

For more information on Stephen T. Mather, see Horace M. Albright's interviews, correspondence, and draft book on Mather in the Robert Cahn Papers (HFCA 1829).

Correspondence between Stephen T. Mather and various NPS staff during his time as director. Most correspondence is between Mather and Yosemite Superintendents W.B. Lewis and C.G. Thompson relating to itinerary plans, bills and invoices, and other administrative tasks. Excerpts from Mather's travel diary are also included. Of particular interest is the original telegram Horace Albright sent to Mather confirming that President Woodrow Wilson had signed the law establishing the National Park Service. A letter from the White House to Mather transferring the signing pen to him is also included (the signing pen is catalog number HFCA 1603).

Articles and publications by and about Mather, an address by the Honorable Louis Cramton to the House of Representatives following Mather's resignation as NPS director, and a map of the United States national guard, army, and reserve locations addressed to Mather are included. Correspondence by Albright following Mather's death, including the telegram send to Thompson alerting the staff of Mather's death are included. Telegrams documenting Albright's efforts to track down Mather's sleeping bag (HFCA 206) and other camping equipment are included. There is also correspondence to Mrs. Jane Mather. Pamphlets from Mather's memorial service and subsequent memorial broadcast, as well as posthumous correspondence and speeches related to dedications to Mather and Mather plaques are included.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 2: RECORDS OF HORACE M. ALBRIGHT [RESERVED]

Horace M. Albright came to the Interior Department from California in 1913 at the age of 23. After Mather's arrival Albright assisted him in overseeing the department's national parks and monuments and working for passage of the National Park Service legislation. Appointed NPS assistant director in May 1917, he acted as director for nearly two years while Mather was disabled by depression and launched the bureau's operations. From 1919 to 1929 he superintended Yellowstone National Park but continued to play a leading role in servicewide affairs. As Mather's successor in January 1929, he engineered the further expansion of an essentially western, natural park system to a truly national park system encompassing historic sites and memorials. He left for a private business career in August 1933 after obtaining the Agriculture and War departments' national monuments and military parks and the national capital parks, but he retained close ties to the NPS until his death in 1987.

This sub-subseries is reserved for the records of Horace M. Albright.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 3: RECORDS RELATED TO ARNO B. CAMMERER, 1919-1982 (bulk dates: 1931-1941)

Arno B. Cammerer, known affectionately as "Cam" in the NPS, was born in Arapahoe, Nebraska in 1883. After finishing his junior year of high school, he moved to Washington, took the Civil Service exam, and became a clerk for the Treasury Department. Taking night classes, he finished high school. In 1911, he received his Bachelor of Laws degree.

In 1919, Cammerer replaced Albright as assistant director, serving as Mather's right-hand man in Washington and acting for him in his frequent absences over the next decade. He advanced to the new rank of associate director in 1928, then succeeded Albright as director in August 1933. Under his leadership the NPS became involved with recreational area planning and management, supervised the Civilian Conservation Corps in both national and state parks, and began to survey and record historic sites and buildings outside the parks. Strained relations with Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes impaired his effectiveness and health, and he stepped down after a heart attack in 1940 to become the service's eastern regional director. He died in that position the following year.

Fort Harrison, and newspaper clippings related to his resignation and death are included.

SUB-SUBSERIES 4: RECORDS RELATED TO NEWTON B. DRURY, 1914-1999 (bulk dates: 1940-1950)

Newton B. Drury was born in San Francisco in 1889. After graduating from University of California, Berkeley in 1912, he served in WWI. He later said that the destruction from WWI was what had pushed him toward conservation.

In 1918, Drury married Elizabeth Schilling. In 1919, Drury, his brother, and a few professors started the Save-The-Redwoods League.

Newton B. Drury declined appointment as director of the NPS in 1933, but accepted the job in 1940. He was the first director without prior national park responsibilities but came with strong conservationist credentials from his time with the Save-the-Redwoods League in California as executive secretary.

During World War II, he successfully resisted most demands for consumptive uses of park resources. Less eager than his predecessors to expand the park system, he opposed NPS involvement with areas he judged not to meet national park standards. Differences with Secretary of the Interior Oscar L. Chapman over Chapman's support for dams in Dinosaur National Monument contributed to Drury's resignation in 1951.

After his resignation from the park service, Drury took on the role of Head of State Parks and Beaches in California. In 1959, he retired and returned to the Save-the-Redwoods League, eventually becoming president and chairman. He died in 1978.

SUB-SUBSERIES 5: RECORDS RELATED TO ARTHUR E. DEMARAY, 1917-1982 (bulk dates: 1951)

Born in 1887 in Washington DC, Arthur E. Demaray began his government career at age 16 as a messenger. He eventually became a draftsman with the U.S. Geological Survey, and moved to the NPS when its headquarters were first staffed in 1917. His brief tenure as NPS director in 1951 before his planned retirement was a reward for his long and distinguished service, after serving as associate director since 1933. In the second spot during the tumultuous New Deal and the difficult wartime years (when he remained in Washington while the headquarters office relocated to

Chicago), he proved an extremely effective administrator. Perhaps his greatest accomplishment was to maintain good working relations with Harold Ickes during the irascible secretary's 13-year regime (1933-46). Demaray died in 1958.

Demaray personal copies of the Annual Reports of the Director to the Secretary of the Interior. Articles and newspaper clippings, some correspondence and official statements by the NPS regarding Demaray's term as director are included. Also includes information regarding the whereabouts of other related Demaray material, as much of it was donated to the University of Wyoming.

SUB-SUBSERIES 6: RECORDS RELATED TO CONRAD L. WIRTH, 1936-2001 (bulk dates: 1956-1975)

Trained as a landscape architect and previously employed by the National Capital Park and Planning Commission, Conrad L. Wirth joined the NPS as an assistant director in 1931. With the coming of the New Deal he supervised the service's Civilian Conservation Corps program in the state parks. His administrative ability marked him to succeed Demaray, whom he served as associate director before advancing to the top job in December 1951. Wirth's crowning achievement was Mission 66, a 10-year, billion-dollar program to upgrade park facilities and services by the 50th anniversary of the NPS in 1966. After the 1961 change of administrations Wirth fell out of favor with Secretary of the Interior Stewart L. Udall and departed in early 1964. He died in 1993.

Speeches include those made by Wirth and his staff, including Daniel B. Beard and Howard Stagner. A 1975 speech on Mission 66 by Wirth is also present. Also includes a drawing of an NPS Ranger at a park entrance station, used in a Mission 66/Petrol 66 joint brochure of the parks. Includes a video of a Mission 66 themed comical skit (Conrad Wirth Had a Mission in Mind) preformed at Wirth's retirement party.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 7: RECORDS OF GEORGE B. HARTZOG, JR., 1949-1989

George B. Hartzog, Jr. was born in Smoaks, Colleton County, South Carolina, on March 17, 1920. At the age of 17, he became the youngest Methodist preacher appointed by the church at that time. After one semester of college, he left school to help support his family, but read law and was admitted to the bar in South Carolina in 1942. In 1945, Hartzog became an attorney for the General Land Office (now the Bureau of Land Management) in the Department of the Interior, and six months later transferred to the National Park Service (NPS). While in Washington, D.C., Hartzog took night courses at American University, receiving a Bachelor of Science degree in 1953.

Named superintendent of Jefferson National Expansion Memorial in 1959, he left the NPS in 1962 to become executive director of Downtown St. Louis, Inc. In 1963, Hartzog returned to the NPS as associate director and became the seventh director of the National Park Service in 1964, succeeding the retiring Conrad Wirth. During his tenure, Hartzog accomplished much toward three major goals as director: to expand the system to save important areas before they were lost, to make the system

relevant to an urban society, and to open positions to people who had not previously had much access to them (especially minorities and women).

Under his guidance, 69 areas were added to the NPS. In 1968 he appointed Grant Wright to head the U.S. Park Police, the first black man to head a major police force in the United States, and selected several women to be park superintendents, including Lorraine Mintzmyer at Herbert Hoover NHS. The first major urban recreation areas, Gateway (New York) and Golden Gate (San Francisco) National Recreation Areas, were acquired in 1972. The "Summer in the Parks" urban program was started at Richmond National Battlefield Park and in Washington, D.C., and living history interpretation was advanced.

Hartzog operated in the style of first NPS Director Stephen Mather in gaining the cooperation of members of Congress. He was instrumental in getting congressional approval for the 1971 Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act, allowing 80 million acres of Alaska wildlands to be withdrawn for new national parks, wildlife refuges, and wilderness. Former Interior Secretary Stewart L. Udall said that Hartzog, "was a consummate negotiator, he enjoyed entering political thickets; he had the self-confidence and savvy to be his own lobbyist and to win most of his arguments with members of Congress, Governors and Presidents." In 1972, Hartzog was forced out of office after the Service revoked a special use permit allowing President Richard M. Nixon's friend, Bebe Rebozo, to dock his houseboat at Biscayne National Monument, Florida.

Upon leaving the NPS, Hartzog served as Director of the White House Historical Association from 1973-1998. In 1988, Clemson University awarded Hartzog an honorary doctorate of humanities degree. Hartzog also practiced law in Washington, D.C. until his death in Northern Virginia in 2008, at the age of 88. He and his wife, Helen, had three children: George, Nancy, and Edward. Hartzog was awarded the Department of Interior's Distinguished Service Award in 1962. He was profiled by John McPhee in The New Yorker magazine in 1971 and wrote an autobiography, Battling for The National Parks, in 1988.

Clemson University has the bulk of the personal papers of George B. Hartzog, Jr., the majority of which document his long career with the National Park Service, 1946-1972. These papers are primarily related to his position as Director of the National Park Service, 1964-1972. However, there is some material related to his earlier job positions in the National Park Service. In addition, there is some information regarding his book, Battling for the National Parks, and the period following his resignation from the National Park Service. George Hartzog's gift/donation of this material to Clemson University in September 1984 initiated efforts to develop a major research collection for studying the National Park Service.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 8: RECORDS RELATED TO RONALD H. WALKER, 1972-1975

Born in 1937 in Bryan, Texas, Ronald H. Walker spent his childhood abroad in the Middle and Near East. He earned a degree in political science from the University of Arizona. Between 1961 and 1964, Walker served in the army before leaving military service to work in the commercial sector as an insurance and marketing executive. In 1969, he became staff assistant, and later special assistant, to President Richard M. Nixon.

In January 1973, President Nixon appointed Walker to replace George B. Hartzog as director of the National Park Service, a move that caused upheaval and concern among career NPS staff. He was only the second NPS director appointed from outside the Service. Former Director Horace M. Albright wrote a memo expressing his displeasure at the removal of Hartzog from office, and correspondence between Herbert Evison and Frank Kowski shows the difficult battle Walker faced both with the NPS ranks and the general public.

Recognizing his lack of park experience, Walker appointed Russell E. Dickenson, a career NPS employee, his deputy. Walker advocated a policy of "stabilization", foreseeing that NPS funding and staffing would be inadequate for a continuing high influx of new parks and program responsibilities. Fourteen areas nevertheless joined the park system during his two years as director, including the first two national preserves, Big Thickett and Big Cypress National Preserves. Walker also realigned NPS regional boundaries and added North Atlantic and Rocky Mountain offices. Under Walker, the early planning was done for the Servicewide American Revolution Bicentennial activities.

President Nixon's resignation in August 1974 presaged Walker's replacement five months later. After his resignation as NPS director, Walker served in a variety of roles before starting his own consulting company in 1977. In 1985, he served as chairman of the Committee for the American Presidential Inaugural. In 2009, he became president of the Richard Nixon Foundation. In 2010 he became chairman of their Board of Directors. Walker has three children with his wife Ann.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 9: RECORDS RELATED TO GARY EVERHARDT, 1971-1977

Gary Eugene Everhardt was born on July 8, 1934 in Lenoir, North Carolina. He earned a degree in civil engineering at North Carolina State. He married Nancy Poovey and they had two children.

Everhardt started working with the National Park Service as a student engineer surveying lands in the Blue Ridge area near Grandfather Mountain. He began his NPS career as an engineer in 1957. He served in the U.S. Army for six months in 1958. In 1962 he was promoted general engineer in the Southeast Regional Office in Richmond, VA. In 1966 he transferred to the Southwest Regional Office in Santa Fe, NM. He became assistant superintendent of Yellowstone National Park in 1969. He was appointed superintendent of Grand Teton National Park in 1972.

While at Grand Teton, Everhardt was awarded the Department of the Interior's Meritorious Service Award for planning and executing a global conference for national parks. This and other favorable notice at Grand Teton propelled him to the directorship in January 1975, under President Gerald R. Ford.

As director Everhardt oversaw a large increase in park development and interpretive programming for the American Revolution Bicentennial. NPS acreage doubled during his tenure as he pushed wilderness designations and hailed a presidential proposal for a \$1.5 billion Bicentennial Land Heritage Program. During his directorship, a policy council was created, which produced management objectives for the Service. Other firsts during his tenure were the first national symposium on urban recreation; the first national conference on scientific research; the first Native crafts sales program in the parks; and the first international park publication, PARKS.

Everhardt made several trips to Alaska during his tenure and helped shape the designation of Alaska's national forests and national parks, which was enacted during the subsequent Carter Administration.

After the previous appointment of Ronald H. Walker as director, the return of an NPS careerist to the job was much applauded by park employees and supporters. However, Everhardt's leadership fell short of expectations, and the new Carter administration returned him to the field. He served briefly as special assistant to the NPS director until he assumed the position of superintendent of Blue Ridge Parkway in October 1977. As superintendent he oversaw completion of the parkway with the construction of the Linn Cove Viaduct around Grandfather Mountain in North Carolina.

Everhardt was awarded the Department of the Interior's Distinguished Service Award on April 24, 1985. His dedication to park conservation led to him receiving the Cornelius Amory Pugsley National Medal Award in 1990. The Blue Ridge Parkway headquarters building is named in his honor. Everhardt retired from the NPS in 2000.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 10: RECORDS RELATED TO WILLIAM J. WHALEN. 1977-1982

William Joseph Whalen was born July 18, 1940 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. As a product of an urban upbringing, Whalen once joked that he grew up thinking that trees grew from cracks in the pavement. He graduated from Clarion State Teachers College in 1960, earned a Master's in Psychology from Indiana State University in 1964 and then joined Job Corps.

Whalen worked as a Job Corps counselor and then joined the NPS in 1965. He became the deputy superintendent of Yosemite National Park in 1971, where he pioneered a tram service to reduce traffic congestion. In 1972 he was appointed superintendent of Golden Gate National Recreation Area, where in 1973 he pushed to open Alcatraz Island to the public.

His experience in the burgeoning urban parks field contributed to his appointment by President Jimmy Carter as NPS director in July 1977. The most significant event of his tenure was President Carter's proclamation of much of Alaska's wilderness as national monuments in 1978, doubling the acreage under NPS jurisdiction.

Friction with park concessioners led to a rebuke by Arizona Congressman Morris K. Udall and he demanded that Whalen be dismissed. In 1980, Secretary of the Interior Cecil D. Andrus returned him to Golden Gate National Recreation Area. In that position he launched the Golden Gate National Parks Conservancy which raised more than \$100 million for the park. He left the NPS in 1983.

Whalen and his wife Mary had four sons together. He died in 2006 of a heart attack at age 66 in Greenbrae, California.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 11: RECORDS OF RUSSELL E. DICKENSON, 1969-1984

Russell "Russ" Errett Dickenson was born in Melissa, Texas. He served four years in the U.S. Marine Corps during World War II, reaching the rank of captain, and graduated from Arizona State College in 1947.

Dickenson began his NPS career as a ranger at Grand Canyon National Park in 1946 and served in a wide range of park and central office assignments, including at Big Bend, Glacier, Grand Teton, Zion National Parks, Chiricahua National Monument, and Flaming Gorge National Recreation Area. From 1966-1969, Dickenson was chief of the division of resource management and visitor protection in the Midwest Region. He also held positions as associate regional director and regional director of the National Capital Parks.

In 1973 he was named deputy director of the NPS under Director Ronald H. Walker. During his tenure as Walker's deputy, Dickenson preferred improving the Service's stewardship of its existing parks to seeking new ones. Following Walker's dismissal, Dickenson thought he was an obvious choice for director. Instead, Gary Everhardt was appointed and Walker stayed in Washington briefly to aid in the transition. Dickenson then became regional director for the Pacific Northwest Region.

In May 1980, Dickenson was appointed NPS director during President Ronald Reagan's administration. Having risen through the traditional ranks and enjoying the respect of his colleagues, Dickenson was enthusiastically welcomed to the job and supported in his effort to restore organizational stability after a succession of short-term directors. As director, his focus was on stewardship of existing parks, rather than seeking to add new ones. This approach was in step with the views of James Watts who became secretary of the interior in 1981. Dickenson obtained the Reagan administration's support and that of Congress for the Park Restoration and Improvement Program, which devoted more than a billion dollars over five years to park resources and facilities.

Dickenson received the Distinguished Service Award in 1974. He also received a Special Achievement Award for his work under Director Walker. He received the Pugsley Medal in 1974 in recognition of outstanding service in the management and conservation of NPS resources. Dickenson also received the U.S. Department of the Interior's Meritorious Service Award. He received an honorary doctor of science degree from Northern Arizona University in 1982. He was the first American to receive the Golden Flower of Rheydt Award from Germany in 1983 for contributions made in national and international environmental preservation.

Following his retirement from the NPS in March 1985, Dickenson co-authored a book with former director Horace M. Albright titled "National Park Service: The Story Behind the Scenery." He served on the National Park Advisory Board from 1985-1989. He was also president of the Washington National Parks Fund from 1985-1998. He served on the board of directors of Eastern National Parks and Monuments Association from 1990-2004.

Dickerson was married to Ollie Maxine Dickerson for over 60 years and together they had three sons and one daughter. He retired in March 1985. Russell Dickenson died in 2008.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 12: RECORDS OF WILLIAM PENN MOTT, JR., 1968-1992

William Penn Mott, Jr. was born on October 19, 1909 in New York City. He moved to Jonesville, Michigan in 1925, where his interest with nature blossomed. This passion led him to dedicate his life to the preservation of the nation's natural resources. Mott earned his bachelor's degree in landscape architecture from Michigan State University in 1931, and his master's degree from the University of California-Berkley. Mott married his wife Ruth in 1934 and settled in the San Francisco area.

Mott began as a landscape architect for the NPS western regional office in 1933. In this role, he served as supervisor of landscaping projects of the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) and Works Progress Administration (WPA). The constant travel required for this position left him with little time to spend with his family. In 1940, Mott left the NPS to start his own landscaping business, which allowed him to spend more time at home.

His work was highly regarded and led to his appointment as Superintendent of Parks for the City of Oakland in 1946. Over the next seventeen years, Mott helped reshape the city's parks and held the respect of his staff through his open management style. In 1962 he was named General Manager of the East Bay Regional Park District in San Francisco. During his tenure he more than doubled the land allocated for parks, increased the number of parks from five to twenty-five, and attracted more than triple the number of visitors to the city's parks.

Governor Ronald Reagan appointed him as Director of California's Department of Parks and

Recreation in 1967. Mott added an additional 154,000 acres to California's 800,000 acres of state park system. His work led to the addition of twenty-four new areas to the state system, some of which after he left the position in 1974. After his departure, Mott continued his efforts to improve the parks of California. He served as general manager of the East Bay Zoological Society (overseeing the Oakland Zoo) and as president of the California State Park Foundation, a non-profit organization he founded in 1969.

President Reagan turned to his former appointee in 1985 and appointed Mott as the twelfth Director of the NPS in 1985. During this tenure, he introduced his "Twelve Point Plan," in order to: protect the parks, better serve the public, and generally improve the management of the NPS. Points of his plan included the development of long-term strategic plans, encourage public interest in the interpretation programs of the parks and advance the understanding of the functions of the NPS, improve facilities at parks, and develop better relationships between the parks and concessioners.

Mott served as NPS Director until April 1989 when President George H. W. Bush replaced him with James Ridenour. However, he continued to work with the NPS as a special assistant for the director of the Western Region overseeing the transition of the Presidio in San Francisco from a military unit to a National Park site. Mott died from pneumonia in 1992.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 13: RECORDS OF JAMES M. RIDENOUR, 1989-1995

James M. Ridenour (1942-) was born and raised in Wabash County, Indiana. After attending DePauw University as a freshman, he transferred to Indiana University where he earned a B.S. and a M.S in Recreation and Park Administration in 1964 and 1965, respectively. He earned a Master of Science degree from the University of Colorado in 1972. Prior to joining the NPS, Ridenour worked for a variety of organizations, including the Colorado Department of Agriculture, the Council of State Governments in Kentucky, and the Indiana Department of Natural Resources, where he was director from 1981-1989.

In 1989, President George H. W. Bush appointed Ridenour director of the NPS. Ridenour had no prior NPS experience and the appointment was considered controversial by environmental groups that opposed the nomination. As someone that did not come up through the NPS ranks, Ridenour

did not wear the NPS uniform while director, believing that as he had not gone through all the training and experience that NPS employees had, it was not appropriate to do so.

Less willing than previous directors to accept additions to the park system that were driven by local economic development interests, Ridenour sought to retain the initiative from Congress in charting its expansion. He favored alternatives to full federal acquisition of proposed parklands and he stressed the importance of working with other government bodies and private entities to protect lands in and outside the system. Ridenour was a strong supporter of the concept of the Land and Water Conservation Fund and it led him to the heritage area concept—the idea that not all areas lived up to the standards of national park status. The heritage areas program was designed to support local and regional areas in their need for parks without making them units of the NPS. This approach is where Ridenour's concept for the phrase "thinning the blood" came from. He believed that too many park units were coming into the system at the expense of existing parks. In Ridenour's view, "Congress seemed willing to fund new pet projects while not funding the needs of the Yellowstones and Yosemites of the NPS."

Under Ridenour's direction, the NPS underwent an intensive review of its responsibilities and prospects for the future during its 75th anniversary celebration in 1991. This effort culminated in October 1991 with a symposium in Vail, Colorado that included hundreds of participants from within and outside the NPS. The gathering resulted in a program, known as the Vail Agenda, outlining six strategic objectives and the identification of a variety of issues and recommendations. Ultimately, these recommendations were published in a book entitled "National Parks for the 21st Century: The Vail Agenda." As part of the 75th anniversary celebration, Ridenour and others also recreated the Mather Mountain Party from 1915; the celebratory trip was called the Diamond Mountain Party.

Additionally, Ridenour was successful in negotiating reform of the NPS concessions contracts, most notably in Yosemite National Park where his efforts kept concession operations in US hands rather than being sold to a foreign company. That victory resulted in a completely different climate for NPS negotiations with concessionaires, creating a little known but important change in the business end of NPS management.

Director Ridenour departed the NPS directorship with the Bush administration as President Clinton's administration took office in January 1993. He is the author of the book "National Parks Compromised: Pork Barrel Politics and America's Treasures" (see HFCA-01216).

Copies of incoming and outgoing correspondence from Ridenour's tenure as director. This correspondence spans the entire term of Ridenour's directorship beginning in 1989 through 1993 and includes correspondence from several prominent individuals. Among the notable figures are former President George H. W. Bush, former Secretary of the Interior Manuel Lujan, and former Chief of the U.S. Forest Service Dale Robertson. Major topics documented here within include the NPS's response to the Exxon Valdez oil spill incident in 1989, the Yellowstone fires of 1990, and the NPS's 75th anniversary celebration in 1991. Also comprised is a correspondence file regarding concessions at Yosemite National Park, which documents Ridenour's efforts to keep the park's concession operations in US hands. This file pertains to the National Park Foundation's purchase of all the Park's stock and its main concessions vendor, the Curry Company, after the company acquired by a Japanese parent corporation in the early 1990s. In addition to correspondence, this sub-subseries also contains one folder of remarks and speeches given by Ridenour between 1993 and 1995, a photograph album documenting the Diamond Mountain Party at Sequoia and Kings Canyon National Parks in 1991, and a Certificate of Commendation, awarded to Ridenour in December 1992. Records include correspondence, photographs, award certificate, and speeches.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 14: READING FILES OF ROGER G. KENNEDY, 1992-1997

Roger Kennedy was born on August 8, 1926 in Minnesota where he grew up canoeing, hiking, and leading guided expeditions – a family business. After serving in the Navy during World War II, he graduated from Yale in 1949 and University of Minnesota Law School in 1952. An unusually varied professional life included working as a lawyer, banker, press correspondent, and museum administrator, but always with a passion for the preservation of America's history and culture.

His work as a lawyer included stints at the Department of Justice, the Department of Justice, and the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. Kennedy was also a writer, producing more than a dozen books, including "Hidden Cities" about Native American civilizations and "American Churches."

Kennedy led the Smithsonian Institution National Museum of American History as Director for 13 years, where he sought to expand visitation by introducing more current cultural exhibitions and reorganizing collections. While many criticized him for acquiring pop culture items, Kennedy felt these items would attract more visitors and thus bring more exposure to all the Smithsonian exhibits. Some of the objects he obtained during his tenure includes: Archie Bunker's chair from the television show "All in the Family," the set from "M\*A\*S\*H," a cardigan sweater Fred Rogers wore on "Mister Rogers Neighborhood," and the ruby red slippers from the "Wizard of Oz."

In 1993, Kennedy was selected by the Clinton Administration to head the National Park Service (NPS). He focused on representing often overlooked communities – eight new park sites under his tenure, for example, celebrated Native and African Americans cultures. He was also interested in NPS' role as educator, and in pushing for exhibitions that highlighted popular culture as a way of attracting a more diverse park attendance. He wanted the NPS to see itself as custodian of its many historic sites, not just its large western parks that were more famous for their natural or scenic qualities. He stood against a Congressional proposal to privatize NPS employees and certain other Federal workers, and also opposed a move in Congress to assign values to Park structures and landmarks for corporate bidders. He was required to preside over the downsizing of the NPS under

the Clinton Administration's mandated reduction of the number of Federal employees. One of Kennedy's greatest accomplishments for the NPS was leading the development of the NPS' strong on-line presence. He resigned as director in 1997 at the end of Clinton's first term. Kennedy died on September 30, 2011 in Rockville, Maryland.

Kennedy's Reading Files are arranged chronologically, and thereafter by report or publication title.

Correspondence comprises the bulk of these records. Also included are reports, studies, and publications Kennedy acquired during his tenure as director. Subjects include individual park and servicewide personnel matters, letters of thanks thank-yous for articles, publications and compliments sent to him; responses to suggestions, complaints, and requests from all areas of the country and some from abroad; comments on reports or other papers that he reviewed; leadership; and refusals regarding requests for endorsements. Some correspondence also refers to Kennedy's book "Hidden Cities." Correspondents include park visitors; NPS personnel; Federal, State and local government officials; schools and universities; museums; environmental, historical heritage, and conservation groups (including the National Park Foundation); publishing houses; archeologists; historians; architects; writers; and Native American Tribal representatives.

Included within the correspondence files are reports and publications on a variety of topics, including biodiversity, park boundary studies, the Channel Islands Environmental and Cultural Center, the National Parks and Conservation Association, the controversy over the proposed Disney theme park near Manassas National Battlefield, the redesign of Pennsylvania Avenue in Washington, DC, rural tourism, historic preservation guidelines and standards, technology and culture, the National Constitution Center, and the Native Hawaiian Culture and Arts Program.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 15: RECORDS OF ROBERT G. STANTON, 1997-2001

Robert G. Stanton was born on September 22, 1940 in Fort Worth, TX. He earned a B.S. in physical science (chemistry and mathematics) in 1963 from Tilloson University, a black college in Austin, TX. During the summers of 1962-1963, Stanton worked as a seasonal ranger at Grand Teton National Park. His experience as a NPS ranger marked the beginning of his career in Federal service. Upon graduating from Tilloson, the college provided him with a grant to pursue graduate work in public relations and communications at Boston University with the objective of him returning to fill the role of Director of Public Relations and Alumni Affairs. Stanton held this position from 1964-1966, when he left to return to the NPS.

In 1966, Stanton accepted a position as Personnel Manager/Public Relations Specialist at the NPS headquarters in Washington, DC. He held this position until 1969 when he first took on the role of Management Assistant, National Capital Parks-Central (1969-1970). He went on to serve as Superintendent, National Capital Parks-East (1970-1971) and, from 1971-1974, Superintendent of Virgin Island National Park (St. Thomas). He was promoted to Deputy Regional Director of the Southeast Region (Atlanta, GA), a position he held from 1974-1976. He returned to Washington, DC and held several positions between 1976-1997 including: Assistant Director of Resource Management (WASO), Assistant Director of Operations (WASO), Deputy Regional Director (National Capital Parks), Associate Director of Park Operations (WASO), and Regional Director (National Capital Region).

In early 1997, Stanton retired from civil service. However, President Bill Clinton asked him to come back to serve as Director of the NPS. Stanton agreed, and was appointed as the 15th Director in August 1997. His appointment was also historic as he became the first African-American to serve in this position. Under his leadership, the NPS added nine units including: Little Rock Central High School National Historic Site (1998), Tuskegee Airman National Historic Site (1998), Minuteman Missile National Historic Site (1999), Black Canyon of the Gunnison National Park (1999), Cuyahoga Valley National Park (2000), and First Ladies National Historic Site (2000).

Stanton left office at the end of President Clinton's tenure in January 2001. Thereafter, he continued to be active in policy, planning, and management. His work after retiring from NPS included a stints with International Union for the Conservation of Nature and Natural Resources (2001-2003); appointment as visiting Professor of the Practice of Conservation at the School of Forestry and Environmental Studies at Yale University (Fall 2002); and appointment as Visiting Adjunct Professor in the Department of Recreation, Park, and Tourism Sciences at Texas A&M University. In 2009, Secretary of the Interior Ken Salazar appointed Stanton as Deputy Assistant Secretary for Policy, Management, and Budget.

Stanton participated as a member in a variety of organizations. He represented the National Park Service and the U.S. Department of the Interior on the John F. Kennedy Performing Arts Board of Trustees, Wolf Trap Performing Arts Board of Directors, the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Council, the Committee for the Preservation of the White House, and the National Park Foundation. Other organizations with which he was involved include: Chairman of the Advisory Commission, Salt River Bay National Historic Park and Ecological Preserve (St. Croix, U.S. Virgin Islands); Roundtable Associates, Inc.; Board of Directors member, National Audubon Society and the Institute for the Advancement of Multicultural and Minority Medicine; Fellow, American Academy for Park and Recreation Administration; Council Principal of The Council for Excellence in Government; Co-founder and Chairman Emeritus, African American Experience Fund of the National Park Foundation; and Life Member of the Employee and Alumni Association of the National Park Service.

Stanton received numerous awards for outstanding public service, conservation leadership, youth development, and diversity in employment and public programs. Awards include: Meritorious Service Award, the U.S. Department of the Interior (1982); Distinguished Service Award, the U.S. Department of the Interior's highest award (1987); President's Rank of Distinguished Senior Executive Award, Office of the President of the United States (1993); Walter Cox Environmental Leadership Award, Clemson University (1997); Presidential Award, Frederick Douglass Memorial and Historical Association, Inc. (1997); and Cornelius Amory Pugsley National Medal Award, American Scenic and Historic Preservation Society (2003). In addition, Stanton received four honorary degrees: Doctor of Public Policy, Southern University and Agricultural and Mechanical College, Baton Rouge, Louisiana (December 1998); Doctor of Environmental Stewardship, Unity College, Unity, Maine (May 2000); Doctor of Science, Huston-Tillotson College, Austin, Texas (October 2000); and Doctor of Letters, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas (August 2007).

Robert Stanton married Janet Milijoice Moffatte, of Chester, South Carolina, on July 27, 1968 in Washington, D.C. They have two children: Braniff Lamont and Rhonda Lynn.

Documents from Stanton's tenure as Director of the NPS. The files consist primarily of correspondence and speeches written for individual events, as well as a small number of subject files on such topics as Equal Opportunity, park planning, and other matters. The correspondence files contain general greetings, invitations, and thank-you notes, and correspondents include State and local officials, First Lady Hillary Clinton, Members of Congress, and NPS staff.

Speeches and Visits files include invitations correspondence discussing the logistics and itineraries for Stanton's visits, drafts of speeches, and transcripts of speeches. Stanton delivered the speeches at National Parks, universities, scholarly and professional conferences, staff recognition events, training courses, and workshops. Many of the speeches were focused on dedication ceremonies for new parks and anniversary commemorations of important historical events. In his speeches, Stanton also addressed NPS and general park planning policy issues, environmental concerns, youth programs, environmental concerns, historic preservation initiatives, American Indian Tribal governance, and public administration.

Records of minutes taken at Director's Staff Meetings and Director's Conference Meetings from between the years 1939 and 1986. Missing years include: 1948-1953, 1955, 1957-1958, 1974, 1978.

Also includes reel to reel recordings of Director's Meetings and one Director Conference in 1970.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 1: DIRECTOR'S STAFF MEETING MINUTES, 1939-1986

Arranged chronologically.

Director's staff meeting minutes from 1939 through 1986, with gaps. Directors tenures represented by these minutes are Arno B. Cammerer (1933-1040), Newton B. Drury (1940-1951), Conrad L. Wirth (1951-1964), George B. Hartzog (1964-1972), Ronald H. Walker (1973-1975), Gary Everhardt (1975-1977), William J. Whalen (1977-1980), Russell E. Dickenson (1980-1985), and William Penn Mott (1985-1989). Missing years are 1948-1953, 1955, 1957, 1958, 1974, and 1978.

The minutes all share a similar format, including names of staff present and a summary of topics discussed. Meetings were held approximately once a month, although earlier years appear to be closer to biweekly. Starting in 1965, awards were presented at the beginning of each meeting. The 1942-1945 meetings were held in Chicago as the NPS headquarters had been moved to that city. The 1973 meetings are referred to as "meetings of the director's managers" rather than "director's staff meetings."

Notable topics discussed in the meetings include: Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC); introduction of regional staff meetings; temporary vs. permanent structures in parks; land acquisition; various dedications; World War II; Mission 66; NPS policy changes; NPS Centennial preparations; American Revolution Bicentennial preparations; and the agency's equal opportunity goals.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 2: AUDIO RECORDINGS OF DIRECTOR'S STAFF MEETINGS, 1969-1976

Arranged chronologically.

Reel to reel audio recordings of the Director's Staff Meetings from the years 1969-1976. Missing year 1974. Records are not all present. Records have not yet been transcribed, although minutes exist in Sub-Subseries 1.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 3: DIRECTOR'S STAFF CONFERENCES, 1946-1949, 1970

Arranged chronologically.

Minutes from the director's staff conferences. Minutes are only available for years 1946-1949 during Director Newton B. Drury's time in office. Also includes reel-to-reel audio recordings for conferences held in 1970. Minutes for 1970 do not exist and the recording has not been transcribed yet. Topics of interest discussed in the meeting minutes include concessions operations and ownership of concessions; fiscal year summaries; pre-war vs post-war standards; safety in the parks; and NPS Advisory Board presentations.

#### SUBSERIES C: RECORDS OF THE NPS DEPUTY DIRECTORS, 1963-2006

Organized into sub-subseries by deputy director: Sub-subseries 1: Records of Denis P. Galvin; Sub-subseries 2: Records of John J. Reynolds.

Correspondence and memos, clippings, press releases, reports, notebooks, schedules, photographs, audiovisual material, publications, and speeches from desk files of NPS deputy directors.

SUB-SUBSERIES 1: RECORDS OF DENIS P. GALVIN, 1963-2006 (bulk dates: 1990-2001)

Denis P. "Deny" Galvin (1938-) was born in South Boston to a blue-collar Irish immigrant family. He graduated from Northeastern University in 1960 with a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering. After graduation, Galvin continued employment he began in 1956 working in heavy industrial manufacturing at General Alloys Company in Boston, MA, rising to the position of chief of quality control by July 1961. From July 1961 through July 1963, Galvin served as a surveyor with the Peace Corps in Tanzania, East Africa. Projects Galvin implemented included providing the water supply at Ngorongoro Crater and the building the entrance road at Lake Manyara National Park. He also designed and built major river crossings at Arusha and assisted in the survey of Arusha-Moshi International Airport.

Upon Galvin's return to the United States in 1963, he began his career with the National Park Service (NPS), accepting a civil engineer position at Sequoia & Kings Canyon National Parks in California. As a park civil engineer, he provided project supervision on accelerated public works projects and conducted extensive snow removal studies, even training Yosemite National Park regarding snow removal study methods. Over his 38-year career, Galvin contributed to and guided the NPS from positions in various national parks, regional offices, training centers, service centers, and the NPS headquarters in Washington, D.C.

After leaving Sequoia, Galvin worked as an engineer at Mount Rainier National Park from July 1965-March 1967. His role was primarily to provide programming assistance and technical direction to the road crew throughout the park but he also provided design, technical assistance, and surveying layout for buildings and utilities operations. Galvin's career as a civil engineer continued with a position at the NPS Southwest Regional Office. From March 1967-September 1969, he performed engineering work associated with program management and technical assistance to parks throughout the seven-state region. In September 1969, Galvin became a training specialist at the Horace M. Albright Training Center in Grand Canyon National Park. He served as instructor, training developer, coordinator, and counsellor for activities ranging from maintenance to outdoor skills.

In December 1972, he became the management assistant at the NPS's New York District Office, serving as principal assistant to the district director in charge of park operations in New York and New Jersey. This period of Galvin's career was dominated by the creation of Gateway National Recreation Area and he participated in preliminary planning decisions, created the initial development programs, and assisted in the initial operations, including major land transfers and working with U.S. Park Police on law enforcement matters.

In January 1974, he was appointed associate regional director for park operations at the newly established North Atlantic Regional Office in Boston. In this role Galvin was responsible for overseeing visitor services, law enforcement, maintenance, and interpretation but he was also involved in the logistics of setting up the new regional office. He was the principal member of the Bicentennial Action Group for the region. Two years later in April 1976, Galvin became the region's deputy director. As principal assistant to the regional director, he served an eight-state region, addressing a variety of complex issues. Legal matters included zoning issues and off-road vehicle use at several parks. Galvin also addressed planning problems at several parks, complex interactions in difficult urban areas, and the establishment of three national park units in Massachusetts.

In October 1978, Galvin became program manager (engineering) at the Denver Service Center (DSC) in Colorado, where he was responsible for executing the major planning, design, development, and construction program for the NPS. As manager, Galvin placed particular emphasis on system development (e.g. workload analysis, project management, national priorities) and improved obligation rates by 20%. During Galvin's tenure, DSC obligated over \$750 million in project funding, including line-item construction. As manager of DSC, he testified annually before Congressional hearings to explain the character for the construction request and was regarded as the principal expert on the physical facilities of the NPS. Galvin also oversaw NPS international assistance to the governments of Saudi Arabia, Tunisia, Colombia, Guatemala, and other nations regarding establishment of their own national parks.

In October 1985, Galvin was appointed deputy director of the NPS. As deputy director, he was called upon frequently to serve as acting director; by his own estimate, Galvin spent approximately 50% of his time acting while the NPS director was on travel. During his tenure Galvin was a principal witness before the House and Senate Appropriations Committees and was repeatedly called upon to testify before Congressional committees. For example, the 100th Congress passed eight-eight pieces of legislation related to the NPS and Galvin testified for fifty-one of them. He also provided instrumental support in a major legislative effort to modernize the park entrance fee system, allowing gate receipts to support park operations (passed in December 1987 as Public Law 100-203).

As a result of conflicts with the Secretary of the Interior's Office, Galvin's position as deputy director became tenuous beginning in February 1989. In April 1989 he was detailed to Harpers Ferry Center for 90-days, as a special assistant to the director. In June 1989, Galvin was given a directed reassignment by Director Ridenour to serve as regional director for the North Atlantic Regional Office, with an initial detail to the Office of the Director. Galvin declined that reassignment, seeking instead the assistance director for visitor services position. Ultimately, in July 1989 Galvin was reassigned to the position of associate director for planning and development, a post he held for c. eight years. Galvin became NPS deputy director again in 1997, a position he held until his retirement on January 3, 2002.

From the mid-1980s through 2001, Galvin worked on a wide variety of management efforts, resource issues, and NPS programs. He developed an action plan to implement Director Mott's 12-Point Program without new budget initiatives. Under Galvin's leadership, the first systematic surveys of NPS cultural and natural resources were completed. Other resource management issues he addressed included Yellowstone bison management, snowmobile use in parks, and the Cerro Grande fire. Galvin also played key roles in employee housing initiatives, a program to celebrate the Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution, and a planning effort to prepare for the Quincentennial. Galvin led a US Parks/Preservation Delegation to the Soviet Union in 1987. Those meetings resulted in a protocol with a number of specific cooperative projects to be undertaken for mutual benefit of the US and USSR including a proposal to establish an international park in Alaska-Siberia (known as Beringia).

Galvin frequently served as an administration spokesperson, addressing print and television media on a wide variety of issues, including: the firing of Lee Ioccocca from the head of the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island Commission; the impact of Gramm-Rudman-Hollings Balanced Budget Act on the NPS; national resources policies; the fee initiative; expansion of Manassas National

Battlefield; the Yellowstone fires; aircraft overflights at the Grand Canyon, and other controversial topics. Throughout his career, Galvin retained a strong interest and expertise in NPS management policies. Guiding him was his belief that the NPS should be recognized more as "stewards of heritage rather than managers of land."

Upon his retirement from the NPS, Galvin continued to work aggressively in support of parks and conservation. In 2008-2009 he served as member of the National Parks and Conservation Association's (NPCA's) Second Century Commission for the National Parks. He also served as an advisor to the Coalition to Protect America's National Parks and as a member of the NPCA Board of Trustees. Galvin's important contributions have been widely acknowledged within and outside NPS. The National Park Foundation awarded him the national Pugsley Medal for his role in advancing parks and conservation in 1991. He also received the Federal Government's Presidential Rank Award in 2001 "for exceptional achievement in the career Senior Executive Service," and was named a Fellow of the National Academy of Public Administrators. In 2013, Galvin received the George Wright Society's George Melendez Wright Award, which cited his "distinguished lifetime record... on behalf of America's national parks."

Organized into five sub-sub-subseries: Sub-sub-subseries a: NPS Management Records; Sub-sub-subseries b: Subject Files; Sub-sub-subseries c: Project Files; Sub-sub-subseries d: Publications and Reports; Sub-sub-subseries e: Early Career Records

This sub-subseries documents Denis P. Galvin's career with the National Park Service and spans from the beginning of his career in 1963, through his retirement in 2002, as well as some of his post -retirement work advocating for parks and conservation. Although comprehensive in dates, this sub-subseries more robustly documents Galvin's tenure as the deputy director of the NPS (1985-1989; 1997-2002) and associate director for planning and development (1989-1997) than it does his earlier career appointments. However, these records constitute a subset of Galvin's records as deputy director, as Galvin reported that he left his "active files" for the incoming deputy director. No electronic records or email were received with this material. Records include correspondence and memos, clippings, press releases, reports, notebooks, schedules, photographs, audiovisual material, publications, and speeches.

#### SUB-SUB-SUBSERIES a: NPS MANAGEMENT RECORDS, 1978-2006

Arranged chronologically by year.

This sub-sub-subseries comprises records created or maintained by Galvin, beginning with his position at the Denver Service Center in 1978 and carrying through his tenure as deputy director of the National Park system until his retirement in early 2002. Also included are some documents Galvin collected as he continued to work in support of the NPS after retirement. Represented within

each year are photographs depicting events and programs, calendars reflecting Galvin's appointments and appearances, remarks and speeches, reports from various projects and initiatives, conference materials, and correspondence. Also included are awards Galvin received in the course of his career, including the Engineer of the Year award in 1983, the Performance Award in 1986 and the Distinguished Service Award in 2000. Of particular note is a comprehensive series of spiral bound notebooks containing Galvin's meeting and project notes. Each year has several associated notebooks with paperclips marking events or issues Galvin considered significant or time-consuming for that year. Galvin marked those passages, and prepared the annual "summary of activities" documents in c. 2014-2015 while reviewing his records in advance of oral histories conducted by NPS Oral History Program Manager LuAnn Jones, prior to depositing his records with the NPS History Collection. As a result, those paper clips were not removed during processing.

### SUB-SUB-SUBSERIES b: SUBJECT FILES, 1969-2001

Arranged alphabetically by subject, park name, title of document, or activity.

This sub-sub-subseries comprises files documenting special projects and events within the NPS that were of interest to Galvin. Paramount among this material is a file unit of records pertaining to the creation and management of the New Orleans Jazz National Historical Park, housing within the national parks, correspondence, reports, and meeting materials generated by the Taliesin Advisory Commission between 1989 and 1995, and reports regarding the Vail Agenda dating between 1990 and 1992. Records include correspondence and memos, reports, clippings, publications, and press releases.

#### SUB-SUB-SUBSERIES c: PROJECT FILES, 1984-2001 (bulk dates: 1992-2001)

Arranged alphabetically by project.

This sub-sub-subseries comprises records pertaining to projects Galvin worked on in the later years of his career, especially between 1992 and 2001. The majority of this sub-sub-subseries documents his work on the Shared Beringian Heritage Program; a program which sought to establish an international park between the USSR and the United States across the Bering Strait. Galvin participated actively on this effort from its origin in the late 1980s through the mid-1990s. Also documented here is Galvin's work to establish policies surrounding snowmobile use in national parks in the early 2000s, reports and correspondence regarding the Yellowstone Bison Management Plan between 1997 and 2000, and records regarding Fire Management and the Cerro Grande fire, which date from 1993 to 2000. Records include correspondence and memos, briefings, trip reports, reports, photographs, clippings, publications, and press releases.

#### SUB-SUB-SUBSERIES d: PUBLICATIONS AND REPORTS, 1963-2002

Arranged alphabetically by title of document.

This sub-sub-subseries comprises published works pertaining to a number of projects and subjects studied by Galvin throughout the course of his career. Topics include US General Accounting Office reports, management and operations guides, general information on planning, design, and construction, and resources regarding interpretation, programing, and visitor services. Records

include reports, books, manuals, guidebooks, plans, studies, journals, and magazines.

## SUB-SUB-SUBSERIES e: EARLY CAREER RECORDS, 1964-1977

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

This sub-subseries documents Galvin's pursuits in his early career beginning in his second year of service with the NPS in 1964 and ranging through 1977, at which time he was serving as deputy director of the North Atlantic Region. These records illustrate the various jobs and appointments held by Galvin in his first decade and a half of work and include training materials from the Horace M. Albright Training Center in Grand Canyon National Park, reports, manuals, and pamphlets issued to NPS personnel in the 1970s, and some photographs. Also included is a "personnel file," which chronologically documents Galvin's promotions, reviews, and awards earned between 1964 and 1977.

### SUB-SUBSERIES 2: RECORDS OF JOHN J. REYNOLDS [RESERVED]

This sub-subseries is reserved for the records of Horace M. Albright.

Reports, speeches, biographical documents, and other materials prepared by the National Park Service or the Department of the Interior that relate primarily to the Department of the Interior, the NPS role within the Department, and Departmental impacts on the NPS. Includes Annual Reports of the Director of the National Park Service to the Secretary of the Interior as well as the Annual Reports of the Secretary of the Interior to the President. Secretary's reports include some which predate the establishment of national parks in 1872 and the National Park Service, but retained as historic documents which are part of a run of reports which does include NPS-related materials. Text of speeches given by secretaries of the interior and other DOI officials are also present. Biographical information on secretaries of the interior within this series were complied by NPS History Collection staff for reference and general information.

are cataloged as part of their papers in see Subseries A of this series.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 2: ANNUAL REPORTS OF THE SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, 1856-1963

Arranged chronologically by year.

Bound hard cover copies of the Annual Reports of the Secretary of the Interior to the President of the United States. Missing reports for 1857, 1863, 1866, 1884, and 1922. Includes personal copies belonging to Fred W. Johnson, and (Carl?) Russell. Personal copies belonging to Directors Cammerer and Drury are cataloged as part of their papers in Subseries A of this series. Also includes supplemental reports about natural resources in parks.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 3: SPEECHES OF SECRETARIES OF THE INTERIOR AND OTHER DOI STAFF, 1928-1981

Arranged alphabetically by surname.

Speeches and remarks made by Secretaries of the Interior, including Stewart Udall and James Watt, among others. Speeches by other Department of the Interior employees include those given by Assistant Secretaries of the Interior, Commissioners of Reclamation, Assistant Commissionesr of the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, Assistant Regional Directors, Under Secretaries of the Interior, Directors of the Buearu of Outdoor Recreation, Directors of the Office of Oil and Gas; Directors of the Office of Saline Water; Assistant Directors of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, Directors of the Beauru of Mines, Deputy Assistants of the Secretary of the Interior, Director of Water Resources Research, and Assistant Secretaries forthe Department of Energy and Minerals. Laws, regulations, and legislative histories of the National Park Service and individual NPS units. Includes bound volumes of laws and regulations, and park-specific rules and regulations. Park

legislative histories are microfiche copies of documents at the NPS Technical Information Center (TIC).

SUB-SUBSERIES 1: NATIONAL PARK CIRCULARS/ RULES AND REGULATIONS, 1912-1916; 1918-1940

Arranged chronologically by year.

Bound volumes of National Park Circulars (1912-1916, 1918-1919), National Park Rules and Regulations (1920-1927), and National Park Circulars of General Information (1928-1940) providing visitor information, including park rules and regulations, for the national parks that existed at the time of each publication. Earlier publications stressed park regulations; by 1926, the "Circulars of General Information" included more information about cultural and natural resources, visitor facilities, and historical notes, with lesser emphasis on rules and regulations (although they are still present). Parks include Acadia, Bryce Canyon, Carlesbad Caverns, Crater Lake, General Grant (Sequoia), Glacier, Grand Canyon, Grand Tetons, Great Smokies, Hawaii, Hot Springs, Mesa Verde, Mt. McKinley (Denali), Mt. Ranier, Olympic, Rocy Mountain, Shenandoah, Wind Cave, Yellowston, Yosemite, and Zion. Missing volume for 1917.

SUB-SUBSERIES 2: LAWS REGARDING NPS AND RELATED RESOURCES, 1913, 1915-1916, 1933-1949, 1963, 1971-1972, 1978, 2013-2014

Arranged chronologically by year.

Bound volumes of laws concerning the National Park Service and agencies with related resources, such as those managing national forests and national cemeteries. Includes periodic supplements to NPS laws.

SUB-SUBSERIES 3: CODE OF FEDERAL REGULATIONS, 1938-1992 (bulk dates: 1960-1984)

Regulations are written to explain in detail how U.S. laws (statutes) are to be carried out. They are written by the government agencies responsible for the subject matter of the laws. The Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) codifies those general and permanent rules published in the Federal Register by the departments and agencies of the Federal Government. The Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) is the official record of all regulations created by the Federal government.

The CFR is divided into 50 volumes, called titles, each of which focuses on a particular area. It is divided into 50 titles that represent broad areas subject to Federal regulation. Each title is divided into chapters, which usually bear the name of the issuing agency. Each chapter is further subdivided into parts that cover specific regulatory areas. Large parts may be subdivided into subparts. All parts are organized in sections, and most citations to the CFR refer to material at the section level. CFR Title 36--Parks, Forests, and Public Property contains regulations for the National Park Service. CFR Title 36 is updated as of July 1 each year.

Management directives issued to NPS staff as "special directives" and "staff directives." Includes the Washington Office's review files for directives which evaluates directives to determine if they are still valid or have been superceded by other orders or policies or are no longer relevant.

SUB-SUBSERIES 4: DIRECTOR'S ORDERS [RESERVED]

This sub-subseries is reserved for NPS directors orders.

SUB-SUBSERIES 5: NPS GUIDELINES, 1975-1997

Arranged alphabetically and thereunder by directive number.

NPS Guidelines, inleuding initial approved documents and subsequent releases which update guidelines for NPS field staff. Also includes review files which document Washington Office's (WASO) reviews of the guidelines to determine if they are current or obsolete and if so, why.

SUB-SUBSERIES 6: MANUALS AND HANDBOOKS [RESERVED]

This sub-subseries is reserved for handbooks and manuals.

SERIES II: WORKFORCE MANAGEMENT RECORDS, 1894-2003

Organized into three subseries: Subseries A: Workforce Management; Subseries B: Equal Employment Opportunity Records; and Subseries C: Records of Work Programs.

Includes records related to human resources management in the NPS, including workforce management and equal employment opportunity (EEO) programs. Work program records include those regarding the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC), Job Corps, and NPS youth employment

programs. Material includes correspondence and memos, photographic material, reports, brochures, manuals and guides, maps, newsletters, press releases, clippings, articles, certificates, meeting minutes and agendas, project files, and various publications.

# SUBSERIES A: HUMAN RESOURCES RECORDS [RESERVED]

This subseries reserved for human resources records.

# SUBSERIES B: EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY RECORDS [RESERVED]

This subseries reserved for EEO records.

#### SUBSERIES C: RECORDS OF WORK PROGRAMS, 1933-2003

Organized into three sub-subseries: Sub-subseries 1: Records of the Civilian Conservation Corps; Sub-subseries 2: Records of the Job Corps; and Sub-subseries 3: Youth Programs.

This subseries documents the various work programs of the National Park Service. Programs like the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) and Job Corps were created to provide job seekers with employment opportunities. Both programs also provided the opportunity to address the various conservation and preservation needs of various NPS sites and areas. Youth programs such as the Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) and the Young Adult Conservation Corps (YACC) were established to provide young Americans the opportunity to assist in the conservation efforts of the natural, cultural, and historic resources of the country. Material includes correspondence and memos, photographic material, reports, brochures, manuals and guides, maps, newsletters, press releases, clippings, articles, certificates, meeting minutes and agendas, project files, and various publications.

### SUB-SUBSERIES 1: RECORDS OF THE CIVILIAN CONSERVATION CORPS, 1933-2003

During the Great Depression, President Franklin D. Roosevelt proposed to Congress that a program be established that focused on the conservation of the nation's natural resources while providing young men with the opportunity for employment. Congress agreed, and the Emergency Conservation Work Act (ECW) was authorized on March 31, 1933. Five days later, President Roosevelt issued Executive Order 6101 which established the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC). The first director of the CCC was Robert Fechner, the Vice President of the American Machinists Union. Four departments - Labor, Agriculture, Interior and the Army - worked together to establish and operate the camps. Labor selected the enrollees and provided their work standards, while the Army ran the camps. Both Agriculture (primarily the Forest Service) and Interior (primarily the National Park Service) were the technical advisors since most of the work was done on lands they managed.

Initially only young unmarried men between the ages of 18-26 could enlist in the CCC, for a minimum period of six months and with the possibility of re-enlistment. On May 11, 1933 President Roosevelt issued Executive Order 6129, granting permission to men of any age (married or single)

to enroll. This was done in part to provide work opportunities to veterans (nearly 25,000 of whom enrolled). By June 29, 1933, 270,000 young men were working in 1,330 camps. Additionally the program employed educational advisors, which allowed enrollees opportunities to further their education upon leaving the CCC. Average strength was 300,000 in 1,500 camps, or about 200 men per camp. The height was reached in 1936 with over 500,000 enrollees.

The CCC established camps in all 48 states as well as the various U.S. territories (including Hawaii and Alaska). In total, almost three million men enrolled in the CCC. Most of their earnings were sent home to their families, inasmuch the CCC provided room, board, medical care, and uniforms although individual CCC enrollees usually kept a portion of their salaries for incidental expenses.

The CCC included Native Americans and African Americans among its enrollees. Most camps were segregated with white officers supervising both white and black the workers, while Native Americans performed work on their own reservations and did not live in camps like other enrollees.

CCC enrollees performed various types of jobs, all in some way related to conservation. These jobs were in forests, on military and Indian reservations, and in parks. The National Park Service (NPS) was in charge of the work in the parks, including municipal, county and state, as well as national parks.

With the government-wide Land Planning Committee, the NPS initiated the Recreation Demonstration Areas, most of which later became state or national park areas. As an agency of the Department of the Interior, the NPS also became responsible for all work done by the CCC in the territories. Enrollees cleared underbrush, helped in historic excavations and stabilization of buildings and ruins. In addition, they built and constructed numerous features including: roads and trails, park buildings and structures, campgrounds, picnic areas, fireplaces, signs and exhibits, and erected telephone poles and electric lights. Enrollees also did some reforestation in the parks (although most of this was done under the Forest Service), organized eradication campaigns against harmful insects and tree diseases, and fought fires and helped in natural disasters.

From the beginning, an NPS official served as Interior's representative on the CCC Advisory Board. NPS Director Horace Albright helped set up the initial organization and then was replaced by Director Arno Cammerer. Conrad Wirth, who was in charge of the state and local parks program, replaced Cammerer on the Board in 1937. The CCC also influenced the NPS administration by prompting NPS to regionalize for administrative purposes (with NPS regionalization reflecting the CCC regionalization). The Historic Sites Act of 1935 (the result of NPS efforts to protect "historic and archeological site, buildings, and objects") allowed the NPS to hire historical technicians to work at CCC camps. Many of these technical advisors later became Park Service historians.

One of the sites that benefitted from the CCC was Saratoga National Historical Park. After years of local efforts to preserve the Saratoga battlefield, it became a New York State Historical Preserve in October 1927. A decade later, on June 1st, 1938, Congress passed Public Law 576, which authorized the creation of the park. The CCC helped build infrastructure necessary to make the park accessible to the public. Enrollees conducted surveys as well as historical and archeological research; removed fences, orchards, houses and barns; and provided roads and grounds maintenance.

In June 1937, Congress extended the CCC for three more years, as well as making Civilian Conservation Corps its official name. In addition, limits were also placed on the number of enrollments an individual could serve. In 1939, the CCC was placed under the Federal Security Agency. Later that year, Fechner died and his assistant, James J. McEntee assumed the directorship. Beginning in 1940, the CCC focused its efforts on military reservations. With the entry of the United States in World War II, Congress, against Roosevelt's wishes, abolished the Corps on June 30, 1942.

Arranged alphabetically by subject or document type.

This sub-subseries documents the efforts of the CCC at various parks of the NPS including Saratoga, Shenandoah, Great Smoky Mountains, and Hawaii. Material includes correspondence, memos, articles, clippings, meeting minutes, directories, reports, maps, training manuals, publications, and press releases.

## SUB-SUBSERIES 2: RECORDS OF THE JOB CORPS, 1933-1990 (bulk dates: 1964-1967)

Sargent Shriver, the first Director of the Office of Economic Opportunity, modeled the Job Corps after the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC). The program was established in 1964 under the Economic Opportunity Act (U.S. Public Law 88-452), and was a central part of President Lyndon B. Johnson's "War on Poverty." Job Corps is the nation's largest and most comprehensive residential education and vocational training program for at-risk youth ages 16 to 24. With 125 locations nationwide, Job Corps center campuses are administered by the United States Department of Labor's Office of the Secretary and operated by private companies and other Federal Agencies including the National Park Service. The current program is authorized under Title I-C of the Workforce Investment Act of 1998.

#### Arranged alphabetically by subject.

This sub-subseries consists of the organizational records of the Job Corps Conservation Center at Harpers Ferry National Historical Park. Material includes training manuals, handbooks, articles, photographic material, reports, notes, and a thesis. Also contained is memoranda and correspondence from the desk files of Lawrence C. Hadley, Chief of Information, and L.F. Cook, Job Corps Coordinator regarding various topics including: the establishment of the Job Corps and related programs; war on poverty; the support, operation, and responsibilities of Job Corps Conservation Centers; establishment of, recruitment for, and activation of the Job Corps Camps. Additionally, the personal notes of Fred Mallery Packard, Senior Wildlife Foreman, Rocky Mountain National Park in Estes Park, Colorado (1940), and a thesis by John Douglas Dolstad titled, "Analysis of the Status of a Volunteer Student Conservation Program Combining Education and Work Experience in Olympic National Park (1960)," are also located within these records.

### SUB-SUBSERIES 3: YOUTH PROGRAMS, 1957-1992

Arranged alphabetically by program, and thereunder by type of document.

This sub-subseries highlights some of the youth programs associated with or managed by the National Park Service, including the Boys Scouts of America, the Student Conservation Program, Young Adult Conservation Corps, and Youth Conservation Corps. Material includes status reports,

proposals for program expansion and recruitment, memoranda and correspondence, news releases, photographic material, clippings, printed material, and training handbooks and manuals. Items of note include a daily log of activities and photographs of participants from the 1971 Youth Conservation Corps program at Harpers Ferry Center, and project photographs of Navajo and Hopi youth recruits from the 1971 Neighborhood Youth Corps program at the Glen Canyon National Recreation Area.

# SERIES III: RECORDS OF THE PARK PLANNING, FACILITIES, AND LANDS OFFICE, 1915-2004

Organized into seven subseries: Subseries A: Design and Construction Records; Subseries B: Infrastructure Records; Subseries C: Records Regarding Administered Areas; Subseries D: Records Regarding Abolished Areas; Subseries E: Records Regarding Proposed Areas; Subseries F: Maps and Plans; and Subseries G: Alaska Files.

Records which documents the activities of the Design and Construction Division of the NPS, including technical manuals, correspondence, memos, studies and reports, meeting agendas and notes, maps, drawings, and photographic material. Also includes records regarding administered, proposed, and abolished NPS areas, such as brochures, maps and charts, reports, news releases, clippings, registries, correspondence, manuals, and acreage listings. A major component of the records deals with the local and national interests in the preservation and land use in Alaska following its statehood, including native tribe claims and the designation and expansion of national parks and monuments. The majority of those records relate to the action of the U.S. government by agencies such as the Department of the Interior, Bureau of Land Management, and the National Park Service. Materials include reports, bills and legislation, research files, notes, reference guides, correspondence, meeting agendas and minutes, articles, photographs, and maps.

#### SUBSERIES A: DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION RECORDS, 1915-1994

Arranged alphabetically by subject or document type.

This subseries documents the activities of the Design and Construction Division of the NPS. That division provides assistance in all matters related to site improvement including: project management, quality assurance, compliance, and support for projects on new and existing building and structures. Additionally, the division manages projects throughout all phases of a typical five-year design and construction life-cycle, from project initiation through post-construction. Materials include technical manuals, correspondence, memos, studies and reports, meeting agendas and notes, maps, drawings, and photographic material.

## SUBSERIES B: INFRASTRUCTURE RECORDS [RESERVED]

This subsessies is reserved for infrastructure records.

#### SUBSERIES C: RECORDS REGARDING AREAS ADMINISTERED, 1934-2003

Arranged alphabetically by subject or record type.

This subseries highlights some of the geographic areas and regions administered by the National Park Service. Material includes brochures, maps and charts, reports, news releases, clippings, registries, correspondence, manuals, and acreage listings.

#### SUBSERIES D: RECORDS REGARDING ABOLISHED AREAS, 1919-2004

Arranged alphabetically by park, and thereunder alphabetically by subject or record type.

The number of sites administered by the National Park Service (NPS) has expanded since its creation in 1916. As of 2013, there were 401 units under the guidance of the NPS. Sometimes areas are redesignated (e.g. – Platt National Park to Chickasaw National Recreation Area), incorporated into a larger unit (e.g. – Ackia Battlefield National Monument and Meriwether Lewis National Monument into Natchez Trace Parkway; General Grant National Park into Kings Canyon National Park), or divided into multiple sites (e.g. – Hawaii National Park into Hawaii Volcanoes National Park and Haleakala National Park), but remain in the system. In addition, Congress has voted to to abolish or de-designate several National Parks, owing to budget concerns, poor visitation, or diminshed integrity of the site. Delisted areas are usually transferred to State Governments or other Federal agencies, most of which continue to keep these areas open to the public.

This subseries documents the parks that have been delisted or abolished as NPS Sites including: Castle Pickney National Monument, Flaming Gorge National Recreation Area, Fossil Cycad National Monument, Shadow Mountain National Recreation Area, and Verendrye National Monument. Materials include correspondence, reports, clippings, photographs, brochures, manuals, and legislative acts abolishing area.

#### SUBSERIES E: RECORDS REGARDING PROPOSED AREAS, 1920-1993

From the time of the establishment of the National Park Service, the Director's Office took on the task of investigating proposed areas. Oftentimes, investigations would be assigned to the superintendent nearest the proposed area. The establishment of the Secretary's Advisory Board on National Parks, Historic Sites, Buildings, and Monuments by the Historic Sites Act of 1935 had a major impact on this process. The Board, now named the National Park System Advisory Board, recommends new areas as one of its principal duties. Since the establishment of Regional Offices in 1937, regional historians and other regional staff have conducted initial investigations regarding prospective NPS sites. The Advisory Board then inspects the proposed area through visits around the time of the annual spring and fall meetings before making a final recommendation.

It is rare for an area to be authorized by Congress without NPS and Advisory Board approval. Often it takes some time for an area to be authorized by Congress after its approval. Occasionally, areas are authorized, but not funded. In some cases, as an alternative to approving NPS acquisition of a particular area, the Advisory Board may recommend that a state or private agency, or a Federal agency other than NPS (such as the Bureau of Land Management or the Forest Service), manage an area.

Arranged alphabetically by type of proposal or by office of origin, and thereunder alphabetically either by region, state, site, or subject.

This subseries highlights the expansion efforts of the NPS. Material includes area resumes, articles, books, brochures, clippings, data summary sheets, histories, information sheets, lists, maps, pamphlets, reports and plans, press releases, proposals, reprints, resolutions, statements, and studies. Additional information about specific parks is located in the Park Historic Reference File under the name of the new area.

In addition to materials accumulated by the Advisory Board and superintendents, this subseries also contains files (parallel in many instances) kept by the WASO Office of Public Affairs, which monitored the process of proposing new areas. Another substantial segment of records within this collection came originally from the working files of Dr. Francis Ronalds, Coordinating Superintendent at Morristown National Historical Park. More information on Dr. Ronalds is located in the following series/subseries: Series II, Subseries C, Sub-Subseries 1: Records of the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC); Series V, Subseries B: Historic Preservation Records; and Series XIV, Subseries A: Ronald F. Lee Papers and Working Files.

# SUBSERIES F: PLANS AND DRAWINGS [RESERVED]

This subseries is reserved for plans and drawings.

### SUBSERIES G: ALASKA FILES, 1938-2003

Organized into eight sub-subseries: Sub-subseries 1: Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act (ANILCA); Sub-subseries 2: Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (ANCSA); Sub-subseries 3: Alaska Task Force; Sub-subseries 4: Articles; Sub-subseries 5: Federal Interests; Sub-subseries 6: Legislation; Sub-subseries 7: National Park Service; and Sub-subseries 8: State Interests.

This subseries documents the local and national interests in the preservation and land use in Alaska following its statehood, including native tribe claims and the designation and expansion of national parks and monuments. The majority of the records relate to the action of the U.S. government by agencies such as the Department of the Interior, Bureau of Land Management, and the National Park Service. This includes the establishment of Alaska statehood, passage of public laws, and the creation of national parks. Materials include reports, bills and legislation, research files, notes, reference guides, correspondence, meeting agendas and minutes, articles, photographs, and maps.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 1: ALASKA NATIONAL INTEREST LANDS CONSERVATION ACT (ANILCA), 1972-1982

The Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act (ANILCA) was created to address the concerns of the environmental community and the potential for over-development of the natural lands (referred to as d-2 lands) of Alaska. Section 17 (d) (2) of the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (ANCSA), directed the Secretary of the Interior to withdraw 80 million acres of significant federal lands from development. These lands were to be available for potential congressional designation as national parks, wildlife refuges, wild and scenic rivers, or national forests.

A provision in the Act set a deadline for Congress to respond; if it did not act to designate these lands earmarked for special protections by 1978, the withdrawal would expire and the lands would

be reopened to development. As contentious and lengthy negotiations dragged on and numerous versions of ANILCA were considered, the ANCSA deadline for addressing "d-2" lands was drawing near. Using the Antiquities Act, President Jimmy Carter designated 100 million acres for federal land use as national monuments by withdrawing them from development by executive order on December 1, 1978 as a way to prevent this land from being subjected to development. Congress finally passed a final version of ANILCA (Public Law 96-487) that President Carter signed into law on December 2, 1980.

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Records contain research files, reports, correspondence, and memos. Also included are notes on the enforcement, access and use, and management of the selected lands.

### SUB-SUBSERIES 2: ALASKA NATIVE CLAIMS SETTLEMENT ACT (ANCSA), 1966-1979

Alaska became the 49th state on January 3, 1959. Under the Statehood Act (Public Law 85-508), Alaska was allowed to select 104 million acres of "vacant, un-appropriated, unreserved" land as state property to be used to generate revenue. This created conflict with Alaska Natives, who felt their land was being taken away from them, and the state, which believed the land to be uninhabited and therefore open to claim. Secretary of the Interior Stewart Udall got involved and tried to reach an agreement between the state and the Alaska Natives. However, after oil was discovered in Prudhoe Bay in 1968, more private industries became involved in advocating a lands claim settlement for the native tribes. Passed as Public Law 92-203, the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (ANCSA) was approved by Congress on December 18, 1971. It created twelve Native-owned regional corporations which could select and purchase land in Alaska.

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Records contain initial complaints by Alaska Natives, correspondence, and reports. Also included are memos, press releases, correspondence, and research following the establishment of the Act and its subsequent enactment.

### SUB-SUBSERIES 3: ALASKA TASK FORCE, 1965-1983

The Alaska Task Force, created in 1972, served an integral role in the National Park Service's decade-long project for identifying and prioritizing Alaskan lands for preservation. Coordinated by Theodore Swem, the work of the task force led to greater knowledge of Alaska's proposed areas and areas of ecological concern. The task force's efforts culminated in the passage of ANILCA in 1980, which extended national park system protection to ten new areas and additions to three existing ones. All together, the Alaska units added 43,600,000 acres to the National Park Service.

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Materials include reports, correspondence, and research files. The bulk of the records were created and used by specific members, including Ted Swem (Assistant Director to the Director, 1971-1976) and John Wise (Superintendent of Wupatki National Monument, 1974 to 1977).

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Files contain articles and news clippings related to a variety of issues in Alaska including the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act, Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act, oil drilling, development and conservation of lands, and publicity for the natural wonders of Alaska.

### SUB-SUBSERIES 5: FEDERAL INTERESTS, 1938-1983

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Files contain briefings of the Bureau of Land Management, Department of the Interior, National Forest Service, and other non-National Park Service federal divisions relating to interests in Alaska. Other material includes correspondence, memos, and reports.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 6: LEGISLATION, 1970-1990

Arranged alphabetically by subject and numerically by bill number.

Materials include bills, comparisons, notes, and related congressional speeches. These files refer to actions proposed by Congress regarding Alaska. The majority of the records relate to House of Representatives bill H.R. 39, introduced by Stewart Udall, Secretary of the Interior, and President Dwight D. Eisenhower to preserve the Arctic coastal plain in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 7: NATIONAL PARK SERVICE, 1940-2003

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Files contain plans, reports, memos, briefings, and correspondence of areas created and managed by the National Park Service. Also included are master plans for each established park.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 8: STATE INTERESTS, 1944-1984

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Materials include correspondence, reports, and news briefs. Also included are petitions from various state departments, such as Fish and Wildlife, and non-profit groups interested in the development of Alaska.

# SERIES IV: RECORDS OF THE NATURAL RESOURCES STEWARDSHIP AND SCIENCE DIRECTORATE. 1920-1960

Organized into nine subseries: Subseries A: Administrative Records; Subseries B: Naturalist Monthly Reports; Subseries C: Animal and Plant Life Records; Subseries D: Biology Management Records; Subseries E: Forestry Records; Subseries F: Habitat Preservation Records; Subseries G: Water Management Records; Subseries H: Wilderness Records; and Subseries I: Nature Notes.

This subseries contains administrative records related to managing natural resources in the NPS, including plants and animals, their habitat. Also includes records related to managing forestry resources, wilderness, and water resources. Copies of park naturalist monthly reports and the the newsletter "Nature Notes", which focused on the natural resources of the NPS sites, are also present.

# SUBSERIES A: ADMINISTRATIVE RECORDS [RESERVED]

This subseries is reserved for adminstrative records.

# SUBSERIES B: NATURALIST MONTHLY REPORTS [RESERVED]

This subseries is reserved for naturalist monthly reports.

# SUBSERIES C: ANIMAL AND PLANT LIFE RECORDS [RESERVED]

This subseries is reserved for records related to animal and plant life.

### SUBSERIES D: BIOLOGY MANAGEMENT RECORDS [RESERVED]

This subseries is reserved for biology management records.

# SUBSERIES E: FORESTRY RECORDS [RESERVED]

This subseries is reserved for forestry records.

### SUBSERIES F: HABITAT PRESERVATION RECORDS [RESERVED]

This subseries is reserved for habitat preservation records.

### SUBSERIES G: WATER MANAGEMENT RECORDS [RESERVED]

This subseries is reserved for water management records.

#### SUBSERIES H: WILDERNESS RECORDS [RESERVED]

This subseries is reserved for wilderness records.

#### SUBSERIES I: NATURE NOTES, 1920-1960

Arranged alphabetically by park, and thereunder chronologically.

This subseries contains copies of the newsletter Nature Notes, which focused on the natural resources of the NPS sites. National Parks include Acadia, Glacier, Hot Springs, Mount Rainier,

Yellowstone, and Yosemite. Material includes newsletters and indexes.

# SERIES V: RECORDS OF THE CULTURAL RESOURCES, PARTNERSHIPS, AND SCIENCE DIRECTORATE, 1895-2007

Organized into five subseries: Subseries A: Archeological Records; Subseries B: Historic Preservation Records; Subseries C: Library and Archives Material; Subseries D: Museum Management Records; and Subseries E: Oral Histories.

This series documents the activities of the Cultural Resources Divisions of the National Park Service. The records provide an overview of daily division operations, projects, goals, studies and reports, and general service history. Materials include correspondence, meeting agendas and minutes, clippings, magazines and journals, photographs, brochures, and reports.

# SUBSERIES A: ARCHEOLOGICY PROGRAM RECORDS, 1904-2004

Organized into two sub-subseries: 1: Archeology Program Records, 1904-2004; 2: Reserved.

This subseries documents the archeological resources management by the National Park Service, including published manuals, guidelines, project proposals, region reports, legislation affecting archeological programs and resources, and general and administrative information from various parks. Publications, reports in both bound and unbound form, correspondence, brochures, and manuals are included.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 1: ARCHEOLOGY PROGRAM RECORDS, 1904-2004, 1904-2004

Arranged by record type, and thereunder alphabetically by subject or title.

This subseries documents the archeological dealings of the National Park service, including published manuals, guidelines, project proposals, region reports, legislation affecting archeological programs and resources, and general and administrative information from various parks. Publications, reports in both bound and unbound form, correspondence, brochures, and manuals are included.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 2: RESERVED

## SUBSERIES B: HISTORIC PRESERVATION RECORDS, 1905-2005

Organized into four sub-subseries: Sub-subseries 1: Administrative Records; Sub-subseries 2: Organization and Program Files; Sub-subseries 3: Project Files; and Sub-subseries 4: Reference Material.

This subseries documents the efforts of the Historic Preservation Division of the National Park Service. The records highlight both the administrative activities as well as the projects undertaken by the division. Material consists of correspondence and memos, reports and studies, meeting and conference material, publications and handbooks, photographs, and clippings.

### SUB-SUBSERIES 1: ADMINISTRATIVE RECORDS, 1905-1999

Arranged by record type, and thereunder chronologically.

This sub-subseries documents the administrative and decision-making policies of the Historic Preservation Division. The records provide an overview of daily division policies, project status, decisions, and general park history. Materials include correspondence and memos, reports, meeting minutes, conference notes, and draft and printed copies of legislation that authorizes the historic preservation functions of the NPS.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 2: PROJECT FILES, 1936-1999

Arranged alphabetically by project, and thereunder by record type.

This sub-subseries documents the service-wide preservation activities of the division. Files include manuscripts, reports, studies, correspondence and memos, reprints, and clippings.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 3: ORGANIZATION AND PROGRAM FILES, 1935-2005

Arranged alphabetically by name, and thereunder by subject.

This sub-subseries documents the various preservation organizations and programs under the guidance of the NPS. Programs documented include Historic American Buildings Survey/Historic American Engineering Record (HABS/HAER), National Historic Landmarks Program, National Register of Historic Places, National Survey of Historic Sites and Buildings, Advisory Council on Historic Preservation, American Scenic and Historic Preservation Society, National Council for Historic Sites and Buildings, and National Trust for Historic Preservation. Materials consists of data sheets, reports, Federal Register notices, handbooks, press releases, nomination forms, catalogs, memos, correspondence, meeting minutes, and inventories.

## SUB-SUBSERIES 4: REFERENCE MATERIAL, 1936-1995

Arranged by record type, and thereunder chronologically.

This sub-subseries contains information used by personnel for historic preservation reference purposes. Materials include memos and directives, handbooks, manuals on general NPS policies and standards related to conservation and historic preservation, and serial publications on historic preservation issues.

#### SUBSERIES C: LIBRARY AND ARCHIVES MATERIAL, 1933-2007

Arranged by record type, and thereunder alphabetically by subject.

This series documents the activities of the National Park Service Library and Archives, located at Harpers Ferry Center in Charles Town, West Virginia. The records provide an overview of daily division operations, projects, goals, studies and reports, and general service history. Materials

consists of correspondence, meeting agendas and minutes, clippings, magazines and journals, photographs, brochures, and reports.

# SUBSERIES D: MUSEUM MANAGEMENT RECORDS, 1895-2004

Organized into five sub-subseries: Sub-Subseries 1: Administrative Records; Sub-Subseries 2: Regional Offices Records; Sub-Subseries 3: Museum Collections Documentation; Sub-Subseries 4: Exhibit Files; and Sub-Subseries 5: Reference Files.

This subseries documents the activities of the Museum Management Branch of the National Park Service. The records highlight both the administrative activities as well as exhibits created by the division. Material consists of correspondence and memos, meeting and conference materials, publications, reports, catalog records, inventories, and clippings.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 1: ADMINISTRATIVE RECORDS. 1934-2003

Arranged alphabetically by format (Cartoons, Cases, Central Files, Conferences, Correspondence and Memos, Dailies, Directories, Meetings, News Releases, Newsletter, Policies, Programs, Reports, Speeches, and Training), and thereunder chronologically.

This sub-subseries documents the administrative and decision-making records of the National Park Service. The records provide an overview of daily park operations, policy decisions, studies, project status, and general park history. Materials include central files, correspondence, meeting agendas and minutes, clippings, magazines and journals, training material, and reports. Central files arranged by alpha-numeric codes (A=Administration, D=Development and Maintenance; F=Fiscal, H=History and Archeology, K=Interpretation and Information, L=Lands, S=Supplies, Procurement and Property).

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 2: REGIONAL OFFICES RECORDS, 1932-2000

Arranged alphabetically by regional office, and thereunder alphabetically by format.

This sub-subseries highlights the museum management activities of the regional offices. Files include correspondence, reports, meeting agendas and minutes, clippings, project files, and reference material.

## SUB-SUBSERIES 3: MUSEUM COLLECTIONS DOCUMENTATION, 1926-2001

Arranged by record type.

This sub-subseries contains records documenting the museum collection activities of the NPS. Materials include catalog records, inventories, loan agreements, and reports.

### SUB-SUBSERIES 4: EXHIBIT FILES, 1895-1996

Arranged by record type. Administrative files are arranged alphabetically by format; exhibits are

arranged alphabetically by park; and history files are arranged chronologically.

This sub-subseries documents service-wide exhibitions and related activities. Files include correspondence, reports, clippings, photographs, meeting agendas and minutes, planning documents, and research files.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 5: REFERENCE FILES, 1928-2004

Arranged by record type.

This sub-subseries contains information (such as manuals, correspondence, newsletters, and publications like the Conserve-O-Gram) used by personnel for museum management reference purposes. Materials include clippings, manuals, newsletters and other publications, and reports.

# SERIES VI: RECORDS DOCUMENTING SERVICEWIDE HISTORY AND ORGANIZATIONAL CULTURE, 1892-2014

Organized into five subseries: Subseries A: Advertisements and Publicity for NPS Areas; Subseries B: Publications of the American Planning and Civic Association; Subseries C: Park Historical Reference Files; and Subseries E: Park Reports

Advertising materials documenting campaigns used by various railroad companies and travel agencies launched to encourage the public to visit the national parks. Companies/agencies include Ames Brothers Company, Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, Pennsylvania Railroad, Sanger Tours, and Union Pacific Railroad. Also includes bound volumes and pamphlets including "American Civic Association Annual", "American Planning and Civic Annual", "Civic Comment" and "Parks". Publications include articles by several secretaries of the interior as well as many NPS directors such as Horace M. Albright, Arno B. Cammerer, Arthur Demeray, and Conrad Worth. Topics of articles about national parks include the history, policy, and future of the NPS, management of park cultural and natural resources, and recreational uses of parks. Park historical reference files include park-specific materials such as brochures, trail guides, news clippings, superintendent's annual narrative reports, museum plans, interpretive plans, correspondence, and ephemera. Also includes reports on natural and cultural resources specific to NPS units. Other material includes brochures, time tables, rates, maps, memos, press releases, and newsletters.

## SUBSERIES A: ADVERTISEMENTS AND PUBLICITY FOR NPS AREAS, 1886-1996

Organized into two sub-subseries: Sub-subseries 1: Railroad Publicity; Sub-subseries 2: Reserved.

This subseries documents the advertising campaigns used by various railroad companies and travel agencies launched to encourage the public to visit the national parks. Companies/agencies include Ames Brothers Company, Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, Pennsylvania Railroad, Sanger Tours, and Union Pacific Railroad. Material includes brochures, time tables, rates, maps, memos, press releases, and newsletters.

Railroads were associated with national parks even before the National Park Service was formally established in 1916. The "Diamond Jim Line" was built between Malvern and Hot Springs in 1875, althought Hot Springs in Arkansas was not yet a national park until 1921. The Northern Pacific completed "the Park Branch Line" in 1883 from Livingston to Cinnabar, Montana, to bring tourists to Yellowstone National Park. The main line of the Great Northern across the northern United States was built just south of Glacier National Park in 1893, and the railroad supported establishment of the park in 1910, promoting visitation and constructing several lodging facilities including the Many Glaciers Hotel.

A subsidiary of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway constructed a line from Williams, Arizona, to the South Rim of the Grand Canyon in 1901. To accommodate travelers, the railroad, through the Fred Harvey Company, built the El Tovar Hotel in 1905. Recognizing that national parks were becoming a great attraction for the public, the AT&SF successfully led the lobbying effort to establish Grand Canyon National Park in 1919.

Tourism was widely recognized by the railroads as a good source of income and lines were constructed for access to Yosemite National Park, the North Rim of the Grand Canyon, Bryce Canyon, Zion National Parks, and Cedar Breaks National Monument. The Utah Parks Company, a subsidiary of the Union Pacific, built the lodges, inns, and many other tourist facilities in these parks. Many other railroads took advantage of their proximity and actively promoted the parks such as the Rio Grande Southern and Denver & Rio Grande Western for Mesa Verde National Park; the Tonopah & Tidewater and Death Valley Railroad in Death Valley National Monument; the Alaska Railroad to Denali National Park; the White Pass & Yukon to Klondike Gold Rush National Historical Park; and the Union Pacific, Colorado & Southern, Denver, Northwestern & Pacific, and the Denver, Boulder & Western to Rocky Mountain National Park.

This early association with promoting the National Parks as a place to visit was important to not only the development of the individual parks, but in gaining public recognition and support of the National Park system. At the first National Parks Conference in 1911, Secretary of the Interior Walter L. Fisher congratulated the railroads for their national park publicity efforts, attributing this to "enlightened selfishness" on the railroad's part. President Louis W. Hill of hte Great Northern Railway, one of six railroads represented at the conference, replied that the railroads were interested in passenger traffic to the parks because it was a net gain for their business. Later in the conference, the six railroads attending the conference agreed to increase their promotional efforts.

Representatives from ten railroads attended the second National Parks Conference. By the third conference in 1915, the railroad companies were also promoting exhibits about the parks. The Santa Fe and Union Pacific Railroads sponsored close to a half million dollars of National Park exhibits at the San Francicso Panama-Pacific Exposition. In 1916, the railroads distributed two million copies of park literature. That same year, 17 railroads combined to contribute \$43,000 for printing the first "National Park Portfolio." NPS Director Stephen T. Mather contributed the remaining funds needed.

Mather had personal close ties to many railroad businessmen and he was very interested in their activities as concessioners as they all recognized the role good food and comfortable sleeping arrangements would play in successful vacations. Although some railroads had begun providing such services earlier, Mather encouraged reluctant railroads to get into the hotel business as well. The Northern Pacific or Great Northern operated in Glacier National Park; the Union Pacific in

Zion, Bryce Canyon, and on the North Rim of the Grand Canyon; the Santa Fe on the South Rim of the Grand Canyon; and the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul operationed in Mount Rainier National Park. As a result, these parks had large quantities of promotional materials prepared and distributed by the railroads.

Railroad promotions of national parks continued even during World War I when the U.S. Railroad Administration took over the railroads. This service mailed over 2.5 millioin pieces of park material, promoted parks by sponsoring the circulation of lantern slides and films, supplied photographs and texts of national park articles to railroad magazines, placed photographs of national parks in ticket offices, and worked for a more complete representation of national parks in joint tariffs. The railroads believed that the U.S. government regulation of these tariffs (rates) and the U.S. Railroad Administration were important factors in their downfall, although the automobile was likely a larger contributing factor.

Although train travel to the western parks continued throughout the 1920s and into the Great Depression, many people, including NPS Director Arno B. Cammerer, acknowledged that the railroads were suffering from a lack of riders. In his speech at the 1934 conference (which still had 12 railroads represented), Cammerer stated "Years ago, I know one of the prime objectives of the railroads in this country was to stimulate travel to the National Parks and the record of achievement and the cooperation of those days are still matters that we point to with considerable pride. And I know the railroads do also "

SUBSERIES B: PUBLICATIONS OF THE AMERICAN PLANNING AND CIVIC ASSOCATION, 1926, 1929-1957

The National League for Civic Improvement was established in 1900, and merged with the American Park and Outdoor Association in 1904 to form the American Civic Association (ACA). J.

Horace McFarland served as president from 1904-1925. McFarland, a civic leader and newspaper editor in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, spearheaded the Association's activities and broadened its scope of action to campaign for state and national parks. He is also credited with determining that the parks should be run by a single government bureau, similar to the U.S. Forest Service.

At McFarland's urging, Secretary of the Interior Richard A. Ballinger included the need for a national parks bureau in his 1910 annual report. The ACA and McFarland continued to be vocal promoters for creation of a bureau of national parks, arguing that national management of the parks was critical to protect them. The ACA's seventh annual convention, held in Washington, D.C. December 13-15, 1911 included a session on the national parks. Speakers addressing the need for a bureau of national parks included President William H. Taft, Secretary of the Interior Walter L. Fisher, Senator Reed of Utah, and McFarland. Enos A. Mills spoke about wild life in national parks and Herbert W. Gleason presented "Picturesque Features of Our National Parks" illustrated with over 100 of his colored "" views. In 1929, former NPS Director Horace M. Albright credited the organization's efforts toward establishing the NPS, stating "My recollections of the beginnings of the National Park Service are also recollections of American Civic Association activity. They are inseparable . . ."

McFarland also induced President Taft to give a special message to Congress on February 2, 1912. On January 12, 1915, Secretary of the Interior Franklin K. Lane hired wealthy Chicago businessman Stephen T. Mather to replace Miller as special assistant for national park concerns. Mather was also a member of ACA. Together, along with many other politicians, businessmen, publishers, and other citizens, they continued advocating for a parks bureau within the Department of the Interior. The National Park Service was authorized on August 25, 1916.

In 1935 the American Civic Association and the National Conference on City Planning merged to become the American Planning and Civic Association. The purpose of the organization was "the education of the American people to an understanding and appreciation of: local, state, regional, and national planning for the best use of urban and rural land, and of water and other natural resources; the safeguarding and planned use of local and national parks; the conservation of natural scenery; the advancement of higher ideals of civic life and beauty in America; the improvement of living conditions and the fostering of wider educational facilities in schools and colleges in the fields of planning and conservation."

Frederic A. Delano followed him as president of the ACA from 1925-1935 and then of the American Planning and Civic Association from 1935-1937. Former NPS Director Horace M. Albright served as president of the American Planning and Civic Association from 1937-1947 and was chairman of the board in the 1950s. Major General U.S. Grant III became president in 1947 when Albright stepped down. In 1970, the American Planning and Civic Association merged with Action, Inc., the State Urban Action Center, and Urban America, forming the National Urban Coalition.

The ACA and later the APCA published an annual that was sent to all paid members and subscribers of the American Planning and Civic Association as well as subscribers of the National Conference of State Parks. Members of the public could also purchase the volumes. The annual was supplemented with the occassional or bi-weeekly "Civic Comment" through 1934. Afterwards it was called "Planning and Civic Comment." In 1942 the APCA began publishing "Parks", a small

pictoral magazine.

Arranged chronologically by year and thereunder alphabetically.

Bound volumes and pamphlets including "American Civic Association Annual", "American Planning and Civic Annual", "Civic Comment" and "Parks". Publications include articles by several secretaries of the interior as well as many NPS directors such as Horace M. Albright, Arno B. Cammerer, Arthur Demeray, and Conrad Worth. Other NPS staff writing articles for the publications include George Wright, Vern Chatelain, Jessie L. Nesbaum, Roger Toll, Ben Thompson, Hillory A. Tolson, B. Floyd Flickinger, Herbert, Carl P. Russell, Thomas C., and Joseph Dixon, among many others. Topics of articles about national parks include the history, policy, and future of the NPS, management of park cultural and natural resources, and recreational uses of parks.

### SUBSERIES C: PARK HISTORICAL REFERENCE FILE, 1907-2016

The Park Historical Reference File was intitially established as a non-circulating collection within the Harpers Ferry Center Library, to serve as a park-specific resource for researchers and NPS personnel. The collection became a convenient way to organize documents and emphemera on a park-by-park basis. The distinction between "library material" and "museum archives" was lost and over time, staff often "dispersed" materials accessioned into the NPS History Collection into these boxes. As a result, this subseries may contain documents relevant to projects, programs, and records of individuals that are found elsewhere in the Assembled Records of the NPS Collection.

Arranged alphabetically by park and thereunder unarranged.

Information circulars, park brochures, flyers, travel brochures, articles, reprints, and historical pamphlets. Includes correspondence, park legislative histories, superintendent annual reports, interpretive plans, museum plans, and other types of management studies, plans, and reports. News clippings and press releases are present. Pamphlets and other publications on park structures, natural resources, cultural resources, special events, anniversaries, and historical events and people are also included. Most materials have been produced by the National Parks Service (including Harpers Ferry Center), cooperating associations, unversities, concessioners, the travel industry, and media outlets.

#### SUBSERIES D: PARK REPORTS

These publications and reports were initially compiled as the "NPS Reports" sub-collection within the Harpers Ferry Center library.

Arranged alphabetically by park acronym and thereunder by report number.

Publications and gray literature related to historical themes, cultural and natural resources, interpretation, and management of NPS sites. Includes published reports and studies and photocopies of reports.

The Washington Office (WASO) Cultural Resources Management Repository, referred colloqually as the cultural resources bibliography (CRBIB), was created to catalog and manage cultural resources-related information related to NPS cultural resources. Developed as a computerized, multi-disciplinary inventory of professional reports, books, articles, and other publications addressing park cultural resources. The CRBIB was not intentended to be a definitive bibliographic source for all literature available about a particular park's cultural resources but it captured information about reports and gray literature prepared by NPS staff, contractors, and others. NPS-28 Cultural Resource Management Guideline required entry of the information about these reports into the CRBIB. Disciplines represented in the bibliography include archeology, history, ethnology, cultural landscapes, historic structures, and museum programs.

The Cultural Resources Management Directorage in the Washington Office maintained physical copies of reports and other materials cataloged in the CRBIB database. Those documents comprise this subseries. Some NPS regions also developed their own CRBIB repositories and those records are not included here. In 1992, the WASO Cultural Resources Management Repository was transferred from WASO Cultural Resources to the NPS History Collection. The agreement stipulates that the materials are non-circuculating, will be maintained as a collection within the NPS History Collection, and the Park Historic Architecture Division, as manager of the CRBIB, may at reports over time.

Arranged alphabetically by park.

Park-specific cultural resource reports, studies, and management plans, including historic furnishings reports; historic structures reports; cultural landscape reports; archeological reports; historic resource studies; and park administrative histories.

SERIES VII: RECORDS OF THE INTERPRETATION, EDUCATION, AND VOLUNTEERS DIRECTORATE [RESERVED]

This series is reserved for interpretation program records.

SERIES VIII: RECORDS OF THE VISITOR AND RESOURCE PROTECTION DIRECTORATE [RESERVED]

This series is reserved for law enforcement program records.

SERIES IX: PARTNERSHIPS AND COOPERATING ASSOCIATION RECORDS, 1925-1990

SUBSERIES A: NATIONAL PARK SERVICE WOMEN'S ORGANIZATION, 1925-1990

Prior to the 21st NPS Superintendents' Conference "Area Operations," held at Glacier National Park, Director Conrad Wirth, looking for support in selling the concept of Mission 66, asked the female employees and wives of male employees for their ideas in improving the housing situation in the parks. The women agreed, and held an initial meeting on September 9, 1952. They decided to form an organization for wives, female employees, alumni wives, and alumni of the National Park Service (eventually called the NPS Women's Organization).

Herma Baggley, who chaired the initial meeting, went on to chair the housing survey while Bea Freeland headed the organization. During the 1970s, the general chairperson position rotated throughout the regions. The NPS Women's Organization mirrored the three-part structure of the National Park Service: area, region, and national. In 1969, the position of historian was created at the national level. The national organization along with each region, is governed by a chairperson and a Board of Directors

During the 1950's the organization developed area handbooks and orientation booklets. It has also worked with the Employees and Alumni Association (EAA) since their inception, especially with their efforts to raise support for the group's scholarship fund. Starting in 1967, regional chapters began issuing newsletters, including "Smoke Signals" (Southwest Region), "Pacific Northwest Breeze" (Pacific West Region), "Capital Comments" (National Capital Region), "Lava Flow" (Hawaii), and Yankee Doodle (Northeast Region). In 1981, the regional newsletters were combined into a single national edition, the "Breeze-Northwinds," then shortened to the "Breeze" in 1986.

In 1972, the NPS Women were asked to assist in the Centennial celebration of Yellowstone National Park. After some discussion, the group determined that a stronger organization was needed in the National Capital Region, and the Metropolitan Washington Chapter of the NPS Women's Organization was formed. The by-laws were revised in 1977, and the organization changed its name to National Park Women.

The National Park Women continued to be active on all three levels - area, regional, and national - well into the 21st Century, involving itself in housing issues, EEA scholarships, welcome and orientation activities, information sharing, scientific concerns, communications, and hospitality.

Arranged alphabetically by subject, and thereunder chronologically.

This subseries documents the activities and accomplishments of the NPS Women's Organization. Materials include correspondence and memos, newsletters, clippings, by-laws, reports and plans, policies and guidelines, photographic material, conference related documents, directories, reference files, and member information. Newsletter titles found in this subseries include "Capital Comments," "Lava Flow," "New Voice," "Pacific Northwest Breeze," "Roundup," "Smoke Signal," "Trade Winds," Trailblazer," and "Yankee Doodle." For additional information on NPS Women, please refer to Series XI, Subseries C, Sub-Subseries 1: National Park Conferences, as well as the Dorothy B. Huyck Desk Files (unprocessed).

#### SUBSERIES B: NATIONAL RESOURCES PLANNING BOARD [RESERVED]

This subseries is reserved for natural resources planning board records.

# SUBSERIES C: RECORDS REGARDING EASTERN NATIONAL PARKS AND MONUMENTS ASSOCIATION

This subseries is reserved for records related to Eastern National.

# SUBSERIES D: RECORDS REGARDING THE SOUTHWEST PARKS AND MONUMENTS ASSOCIATION [RESERVED]

This subseries is reserved for Southwest Parks and Monuments Association records.

# SERIES X: RECORDS REGARDING RECREATIONAL PROGRAMS AND USE [RESERVED]

This series is reserved for recreational program records.

# SERIES XI: RECORDS OF NPS ANNIVERSARIES, SPECIAL EVENTS, AND CONFERENCES, 1886-2006

Organized into five subseries: Subseries A: Anniversaries; Subseries B: NPS Dedications; Subseries C: NPS Conferences; Subseries D: Events; and Subseries E: NPS Programs.

Includes records related to NPS anniversaries such as the 75th anniversary, 100th anniversary of Yellowstone National Park, and the NPS Centennial in 2016. Records regarding national anniversaries which the NPS were involved in such as the Bicentennial of the American Revolution are also included. Records documenting dedications of NPS sites are included. Conferences such as National Park Conferences and National Park World Conferences and Congresses are also included. Events the NPS were involved in such as the 1984 Olympics are present. NPS programs such as the Mission 66 Program and the Artists in the Parks Program are also documented. Materials include correspondence, reports, news clippings, and other documents.

#### SUBSERIES A: ANNIVERSARIES, 1931-2006

Organized into four sub-subseries: Sub-Subseries 1: National Parks 1972 Centennial; Sub-Subseries 2: NPS 75th Anniversary; Sub-Subseries 3: United States Bicentennial; and Sub-Subseries 4: Other Anniversaries.

This subseries highlights the celebration activities of service-wide and national anniversaries by the NPS. Events include the centennial of the establishment of Yellowstone National Park (1972); the Bicentennial of the U.S. (1976); the 25th (1941), 50th (1966), 65th (1981), and 75th (1991) anniversaries of the NPS; the Columbus Quincentennial (1992); and the Bicentennial of the Constitution (1987). Materials include press releases, press clippings, pamphlets, cards, correspondence and memos, books, meeting minutes, media production notes, invitations, photographic materials, audiovisual materials, presentations, plans, reports, newspapers, maps, posters, and pamphlets.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 1: NATIONAL PARKS CENTENNIAL (1972), 1943-1984 (bulk dates: 1966-1973)

On March 1, 1872, President Ulysses S. Grant signed the Yellowstone National Park Act (17 Stat. 32), establishing Yellowstone National Park, the first national park in the nation and the world. In preparation for the 100th anniversary of this event, on July 10, 1970, President Richard Nixon signed Public Law 91-332 which created the National Parks Centennial Commission to coordinate

activities for a nationwide celebration of the centennial anniversary of Yellowstone National Park. The Commission was in charge of planning the celebration, culminating in the Second World Conference on National Parks held September 18-27, 1972 in Yellowstone and Grand Teton National Parks

Commission officers included: William J. Briggle, Centennial Director; T. Sutton Jett, Staff Director,; and George B. Hartzog, Jr., Executive Director and Director of the National Park Service (NPS). When Director Hartzog was dismissed in December 1972, Ronald H. Walker succeeded him in both positions. Also on the Commission were Presidential appointees Lawrence W. Lane, Jr. of California, Chairman (through January 1, 1972); Edmund B. Thornton, Chairman (after March 13, 1972); Elmer L. Anderson of Minnesota, Henry Phillips Hoffstat of Pennsylvania, W.W. Keeler of Oklahoma, June Larkin of Connecticut, and Richard P. Mellon of Pennsylvania. Commission members appointed by the President of the Senate were Senator Henry M. Jackson of Washington, Senator Alan Bible of Nevada, Senator Paul J. Fannin of Arizona, and Senator Clifford P. Hansen of Wyoming. Commission members appointed by the Speaker of the House were Representative John Melcher of Montana, Representative Thomas S. Foley of Washington, Representative Joe Skubiz of Kansas, and Representative John P. Saylor of Pennsylvania. Statutory members were: Rogers C. B. Morton, Secretary of the Interior, and Laurance S. Rockefeller, the Secretary of the Interior's Representative. Members of the NPS Washington Office staff also worked with the Commission, including Cornelius Heine, Staff Assistant; and Jean Henderer, Director for Public Awareness

Members of the Secretariat of the Second World Conference on National Parks were: George B. Hartzog, Jr., and Gerardo Budowski, Co-Chairmen; Roger J. Contor, Secretary General; C. Gordon Fredine, Cecil Lewis, and Robert Standish, Deputy Secretaries General; and John Miele and Cornelius Heine. Staff Assistants.

On January 5, 1972, Nixon signed a Proclamation designating 1972 as "National Parks Centennial Year." Also in that year, thirty-nine state governors issued state proclamations recognizing the values of the national parks, and one-hundred twenty-eight mayors issued municipal proclamations.

On March 1, 1972, the 100th anniversary of the creation of Yellowstone National Park, a gala Centennial Banquet was held in the Shoreham Hotel in Washington, DC, with 1,300 guests in attendance.

Commemorative postage stamps were issued depicting five NPS sites: Yellowstone NP, Cape Hatteras NS (North Carolina) Wolf Trap Farm Park (Virginia), City of Refuge NHP (Hawaii), and Mount McKinley NP (Alaska). First Day of Issuance of Stamp Ceremonies were held at these sites as well as in Washington, DC. The National Park Foundation entered into a contract with Roche Jaune, Inc. of Kalispell, Montana, to produce a National Park Heritage Series of thirty-six medallions and a "Keystone" medallion for the National Parks Centennial.

Fifteen Establishment Day ceremonies and three Dedications were held at various units of the NPS and an estimated three-hundred commemorative programs were held in other parks throughout 1972.

On September 18-27, 1972 the Second World Conference on National Parks was held in

Yellowstone and Grand Teton National Parks. The conference was officially convened by Edmund B. Thornton, on September 19, 1972 at the Old Faithful Lodge. Later in the day, First Lady Pat Nixon rededicated Yellowstone National Park by holding a torch symbolic of the historic Yellowstone campfire of September 19, 1870. Representatives from eighty-three countries attended, with the Department of State providing interpreters and simultaneous interpretation equipment.

In 1971 and 1972, the Commission launched a large public information effort. Approximately 2,200 news stories and other articles on the Centennial appeared in the press during 1972. NBC aired a special program of the "Today Show" honoring the national parks, which received 15 million viewers. The network also aired a special production, "From Yellowstone to Tomorrow," with 40 million viewers tuning in to see the program. Other documentary works were produced for British television and for educational distribution.

The Smithsonian Institution sponsored an exhibition of art, "Nineteenth Century Artists Look at National Parks," from June 23-August 27, 1972 at the National Collection of Fine Arts in Washington DC.

William Eddy of the Conservation Foundation produced the film "Earthbound" with National Park Service financial support. It was shown at the Second World Conference and copies were distributed to conference attendees. Book publications marking the Centennial were "Yellowstone: A Century of the Wilderness Idea," by Ann and Myron Sutton; "Family Tree of the National System," by Ronald F. Lee; "The National Park Service," by William C. Everhart; "National Parks of the West," and "National Parks and Monuments," by Sunset Magazine; and "Consider the Process of Living," a companion to "Earthbound."

Corporate sponsors included Eastman Kodak Company, Del Monte Corporation, Union Carbide, California and Hawaiian (C & H) Sugar Company, Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company, the Recreational Vehicles Division of Dodge Motor Company, Trans World Airlines (TWA), Continental Oil, Reader's Digest, and Glenmore Distilleries.

The Commission contracted with the Conservation Foundation, of Washington, DC, to conduct a study of the National Parks System. They submitted a written report entitled "National Parks for the Future," on September 20, 1972. The final report of the National Parks Centennial Commission, "Preserving a Heritage," was published in book form in 1973. This included policy recommendations of the Commission for future direction of the National Park System.

Arranged alphabetically by subject or document type. Includes groupings for Cornelius Heine, Howard Baker, Jean Henderer, the National Parks Centennial Commission, Photographs, Press Clippings, and the Second World Conference on National Parks, as well as ungrouped files.

This sub-subseries documents the efforts of the National Parks Centennial Commission in planning the celebration activities for the centennial anniversary of the establishment of the first national park (Yellowstone National Park) in 1872. Files were produced by the Commission for both internal communications and public release. Materials include correspondence, books, meeting minutes, memoranda, press releases, press clippings, media production notes, reports, invitations, guest and donor lists, reference material, photographic materials, textile objects, posters, maps, audiovisual materials, and oversize documents. Materials were produced by the office of the National Parks

Centennial Commission or by contracted parties for the Commission, for both internal communications and for public release. The bulk of the records were held maintained by staffers Cornelius Heine and Jean Henderer.

Additional information on the Second World Conference can be found in Series XI, Subseries C, Sub-Subseries 2.

SUB-SUBSERIES 2: NPS 75TH ANNIVERSARY, 1936-1992 (bulk dates: 1989-1992)

Arranged alphabetically by subject or record type.

This sub-subseries documents the planning and arrangement efforts, marketing and advertising campaigns, and the celebration activities for the 75th anniversary of the National Park Service in 1991. The files of William Sontag, chairman of the 75th Anniversary organization committee, are located in this sub-subseries. Materials include correspondence, reports, clippings, photographs, ephemera, news releases, meeting and committee minutes, publications, marketing files, and speeches.

SUB-SUBSERIES 3: RECORDS REGARDING THE UNITED STATES BICENTENNIAL OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION [RESERVED]

This sub-subseries is reserved for the Bicentenial Records.

SUB-SUBSERIES 4: OTHER ANNIVERSARIES, 1931-2006 (bulk dates: 1941-1990)

Arranged alphabetically by subject

This sub-subseries documents anniversaries of historical events relevant to American history as presented at National Park Service sites, the National Park Service itself, and the Department of the Interior. Anniversaries include the 25th (1941), 50th (1966), and 65th (1991) anniversaries of the NPS; the Columbus Quincentennial (1992); Sesquicentennial of the Victory at Yorktown (1931); and the Cuarto Centennial of the Coronado Explorations (1540-1542). Materials include press releases, press clippings, pamphlets, cards, correspondence, presentations, plans, reports, photographs, newspapers, posters, pamphlets, decals, and one 5.25 in. floppy disk. Related materials can be found in the other sub-subseries under Series XI: Themes, Activities, and Events; Subseries A: Anniversaries.

SUBSERIES B: DEDICATIONS [RESERVED]

This subseries is reserved for park dedicatin files.

SUBSERIES C: CONFERENCES, 1911-2005

Organized into two sub-subseries: Sub-subseries 1: National Park Conferences and Sub-subseries 2: World Conferences.

This subseries contains materials related to conferences, meetings, and symposiums related to the interests of the National Park Service. The records include programs, agendas, brochures, correspondence, planning documents, minutes, reviews, and recommendations generated by conference planners, host sites, and attendees.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 1: NATIONAL PARK CONFERENCES, 1911-2005

The number of national parks and monuments had grown by the early 1900s. This expansion emphasized the need for more uniformity and better communication among parks and their management personnel. In September 1911, the first National Park Conference was held in Yellowstone National Park. The purpose of the conference was to determine the best course of action in the administration of these sites. The second conference was held in October 1912 at Yosemite National Park and the third in March 1915 in Berkeley, California. By the time the National Park Service was established in 1916, a biennial pattern had emerged. The biennial meetings of superintendents continued until 1965 when regional meetings took their place.

As the National Park Service grew and became more complicated, conferences were developed to support the needs of other park personnel. Interpreters have met since 1929 and the first National Park Service Women's Conference took place in 1979.

Arranged alphabetically by conference category.

Record groups include Interpreters' Conferences, Regional Conferences, Resource Management Conferences, Scientific Conferences, Special Meetings, Superintendents' Conferences, and Women's Conferences. Materials include proceedings, programs, agendas, brochures, correspondence, planning documents, minutes, reviews, recommendations, photographs, and audiovisual materials.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 2: NATIONAL PARK WORLD CONFERENCES AND CONGRESSES, 1958-1984

The First World Conference on National Parks was organized by the International Union for Conservation of Nature and Natural Resources (IUCN) and held at Seattle, Washington, from June 30 to July 7, 1962. The Conference was co-sponsored by United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO), the National Park Service and the Natural Resources Council of America.

The First World Conference participants recommended that another conference be held at Yellowstone Park on the centennial of its establishment in 1972. The conference was sponsored and organized by the National Parks Centennial Commission, the NPS, and the IUCN. It was cosponsored by UNESCO, FAO, and the Natural Resources Council of America.

The World National Parks Congress was held in Bali, Indonesia, October 11-22, 1982. As with the First and Second World Conferences, it was organized and sponsored by IUCN. Co-sponsors included the United Nations Education Program (UNEP), UNESCO, FAO, World Wildlife Fund (WWF), Parks Canada, NPS, and the Government of Indonesia.

Arranged by conference group.

Contains the records of four world conferences hosted by the NPS to further the awareness and management of national conservation areas, historic sites, and recreation areas around the world. Conference groups include First World's Conference, Second World's Conference, World National Parks Congress, and First World Conference on Cultural Parks. Materials include proceedings, programs, agendas, brochures, correspondence, reviews, and recommendations.

### SUBSERIES D: EVENTS, 1981-1984

Organized into two sub-subseries: Sub-subseries 1: 1984 Olympics; Sub-subseries 2: Reserved.

Records regarding national events which NPS employees participated in as official representatives of the agency or which the NPS was an official partner. Records from the 1984 Olympics include correspondence, publicity materials, and budget information.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 1: 1984 OLYMPICS, 1981-1984

The summer Olympic games took place in Los Angeles, California from July 28-August 12, 1984. In advance of the games, the Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee (LAOOC) invited the NPS to provide information on various park sites and areas for the visiting athletes and tourists, and to act as a federal agency partner and host in the Olympic Villages. Accepting the invitation, the NPS assigned responsibility for coordinating its activities to the Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area, and named Chief of Interpretation Mary Gibson Park the Olympics coordinator.

The NPS focused much of its planning efforts on constructing exhbits in the Olympic Villages, creating and disseminating publicity for NPS sites and other tourist attractions in the Los Angeles area, and recruiting and training staff. The centerpiece of the the NPS approach featured an early version of an interactive kiosk. Issues the NPS faced as part of its role in the Olympics included budgeting, contracting, policies and procedures, and media relations.

Arranged alphabetically by subject, and thereunder chronologically.

This sub-subseries documents the participation of the NPS in the staging of the 1984 Summer Olympic Games, held in Los Angeles. Materials include contracts, reports, press releases, clippings, newspapers, correspondence and memos, brochures and flyers, drawings, maps, and ephemera.

#### SUB-SUBSERIES 2: RESERVED

### SUBSERIES E: NPS PROGRAMS, 1937-2003

Organized into two sub-subseries: Sub-Subseries 1: Mission 66 Program Records; and Sub-Subseries 2: Records of the Artists in Parks Program.

Records relating to NPS national programs, including the Mission 66 Program and the Artists in the Parks Programs. Materials include articles, NPS and non-NPS publications, speeches by NPS Director Conrad Wirth and other members of the Mission 66 Advisory and Steering Committees, notebooks, photographs, planning documents, reports, and files regarding post-Mission 66 efforts.

## SUB-SUBSERIES 1: MISSION 66 PROGRAM RECORDS, 1937-2003 (bulk dates: 1955-1965)

The National Park Service (NPS) was established in 1916 (39 Stat. 535, 16 U.S.C. 1, as amended in 1935 by 48 Stat. 389) with the goal of preserving and protecting the natural resources of the country. In 1933, Franklin D. Roosevelt was inaugurated as the 32nd president of the United States. One of his first acts as president was to transfer fifty-six national monuments and military sites over to the NPS, thus expanding the agency's scope and mission. President Roosevelt also implemented his New Deal policies to provide relief, recovery, and reform to Americans suffering from the Great Depression. Work programs, including the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC), Emergency Relief Administration (ERA), Public Works Administration (PWA), Civil Works Administration (CWA), and Works Progress Administration (WPA), were created under the New Deal, and all provided the NPS with funds and personnel to improve and enhance the national parks. As the NPS grew, so did the number of annual visitors.

Upon the United States' entry into World War II, New Deal policies ended and park visitation decreased. When the war ended, park visitation increased, but park improvement policies did not resume. Limited funding and staffing, combined with the high volume of visitors, meant many parks could not maintain road, trails, and other facilities. Many parks fell into a state of disrepair. The conditions were so bad that NPS Director Newton Drury described the parks as "victims of war."

In 1953, an essay entitled "Let's Close the National Parks" by Bernard DeVoto appeared in Harpers Magazine. DeVoto believed that the poor conditions of the parks resulted from a lack of financial resources, and he proposed all parks be closed until they received appropriate funding. His story caught the interest of long-time park advocate John D. Rockefeller, Jr., who immediately wrote President Dwight D. Eisenhower regarding his concerns over the state of the national parks. His letter prompted President Eisenhower to ask Secretary of the Interior Douglas McKay for a briefing on the condition of the parks. While little resulted from the meeting, it highlighted an increasing level of concern about the state of the national parks. In 1955, NPS Director Conrad L. Wirth proposed a decade-long, congressionally funded program to improve the parks by 1966. Wirth called it Mission 66 and its ending coincided with the fiftieth anniversary of the NPS. On July 1, 1956, Congress approved money for the program.

Over the next ten years, nearly a billion dollars was spent on the Mission 66 program. This funding built visitor centers, fixed roads, upgraded sewer systems, and improved campgrounds. The NPS also expanded with the addition of sites such as Cape Cod National Seashore, Glen Canyon National Recreation Area, and Point Reyes National Seashore. Yet while the program made improvements, it still met criticism. Critics argued that improvements at urban parks such as Independence National Historical Park (Philadelphia, PA) and Jefferson National Expansion Memorial (St. Louis, MO) came at the expense of the urban landscape. For example, the creation of Independence Mall necessitated the demolition of 19th century structures and the Gateway Arch removed forty blocks from the city property.

Mission 66 critics argued that many of the structures built under the program eventually were demolished or fell into disrepair. Environmentalists were as likely to confront the NPS as they were to support it. Despite this, national parks remained widely popular. Mission 66 accomplished what Director Wirth envisioned when he created the program. The overall state of the national parks

improved. Every park in the system completed important construction projects. Museum exhibits, informational pamphlets, and audiovisual programs were developed. The number of personnel working in the parks increased, interpretation programs generated service-wide recognition, and annual visitation continued to grow.

Arranged alphabetically by subject or document type, and thereunder chronologically.

This sub-subseries documents the efforts and activities of the NPS under the Mission 66 program. The bulk of the collection contains informational brochures the NPS produced for each park describing the plans for improving that specific site. Other materials include articles, NPS and non-NPS publications, speeches by NPS Director Conrad Wirth and other members of the Mission 66 Advisory and Steering Committees, notebooks, photographs, planning documents, reports, and files regarding post-Mission 66 efforts.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 2: RECORDS OF THE ARTISTS IN PARKS PROGRAM [RESERVED]

This sub-subseries is reserved for records from the artists in the parks program.

# SERIES XII: RECORDS OF THE NPS OFFICE OF COMMUNICATION [RESERVED]

This series is reserved for Public Affairs records.

#### SERIES XIII: RECORDS OF THE NPS ADVISORY BOARDS, 1955-1976

Organized into tow subseries: Subseries A: Harold J. Fabian Papers; Subseries B: Reserved.

Files related to meetings of the National Park Service Advisory Board, including minutes and meeting materials, as well as correspondence and memos relating to Advisory Board activities. Correspondence with NPS Directors George Hartzog and Ronald Walker and former Director Horace Albright, correspondence and policy planning documents relating to Great Smoky Mountains National Park and Yellowstone-Grand Teton National Parks, and Gettysburg National Battlefield Park is also included.

## SUBSERIES A: HAROLD P. FABIAN PAPERS, 1955-1976

Harold Pegram Fabian was a lawyer and conservationist. He lived in Salt Lake City, Utah, where he was born April 1, 1885, to Ferdinand John and Minnie (Pegram) Fabian. After attending public school in Salt Lake City and the Mercersburg (Pennsylvania) Academy, Fabian received his A.B. from Yale in 1907, and went on to be awarded the L.L.B., by Harvard in 1910. After graduation he was admitted to the Utah Bar (1910) and in October married Ruth Chapman. The Fabians had two children, Ruth P. and Ferdinand J., II. Harold and Ruth later divorced, and he wed Josephine Cunningham on February 14, 1936. They remained married until his death on December 6, 1975.

Fabian began his legal career as a member of the firm Dey, Hoppaugh and Fabian (1910-1917). He left the practice to serve as an infantry major in the U.S. Army during World War I. Upon his discharge from the service, Fabian joined the law firm of Bayley, Fabian, Clendenin and Judd,

which subsequently became Fabian and Clendenin. He practiced there from 1919 until the 1970's.

An active member of the Republican Party, Fabian attended the 1920 and 1940 National Conventions, and served on the National Committee 1928-1932. He belonged to the American, Utah, and Wyoming Bar Associations. Additionally, Fabian was involved in the National Chamber of Commerce, serving as president 1930-1931, and was also on the organization's Board of Governors. He belonged to and held posts in both the Sons of the American Revolution and the Utah Society of Mayflower Descendants. He was also a member of the Alta, Bonneville, and Elihu clubs; Psi Upsilon; and Scottish Rite of the Freemasonry (he was a 32nd degree Mason).

As a conservationist, Fabian was concerned with preserving the parks and natural areas of the country. He was the principal representative of John D. Rockefeller, Jr. in purchasing Jackson Hole, Wyoming, in order to protect it from commercial development. This land was later turned over to the NPS, and became part of Grand Teton National Park in 1950. His work in expanding this park led him to continue his association with the NPS. Fabian served on the Advisory Board of National Parks, Historic Sites, Buildings, and Monuments (now the National Park System Advisory Board) from 1958 to 1964, including a term as Chairman (1962-1964). The purpose of the Advisory Board was "to advise the Secretary of the Interior on any park-related matters" which included making recommendations on park designations, restorations, conservation, and administration. The Advisory Board played a large role in NPS' Mission 66, a ten-year program intended to expand and improve the NPS visitor service in time for its' 50th anniversary in 1966.

Fabian was also very active in the following organizations:

Rocky Mountain Packing Corps (President, 1934-1935); Jackson Hole Preserve (Executive Vice President, Treasurer, and trustee, 1954); Grand Teton Lodge and Transportation Company (President and Director, 1946-1952; Executive Vice President, General Manager and Director 1952-1954); Jackson Hole Wildlife Park (Treasurer and Trustee, 1946-1952); Travelers Aid Society, Salt Lake City (President, 1957-1958); Utah Pony Express Commission (1959-1960); St. John's Hospital, Jackson, Wyoming (Trustee); Sugarhouse Park Authority, Salt Lake City (Board Member and President); Utah Heritage Foundation (Trustee); Nauvoo Restoration, Inc. (Vice President and Trustee); Utah Park and Recreation Committee (1957-1966); Chairman 1962-1966); Salt Lake City Board of Education (Member and Vice President); National Advisory Committee New York World's Fair; Citizens Defense, Salt Lake City (1941-1942); Board of Governors, Salt Lake Chamber of Commerce (President, 1947-48); Continental National Bank and Trustee Company (Director, 1929-1943); and Western Air Lines (Director, 1929-1943).

This subseries documents Harold P. Fabian's work with the NPS. These files were collected by him during the course of his work on the Advisory Board on National Parks, Historic Sites, Buildings, and Monuments. Included are Advisory Board minutes and meeting materials, as well as correspondence and memos relating to Advisory Board activities, as well as correspondence with NPS Directors George Hartzog and Ronald Walker and former Director Horace Albright, correspondence and policy planning documents relating to Great Smoky Mountains National Park

and Yellowstone-Grand Teton National Parks, and Gettysburg National Battlefield Park.

#### SERIES XIV: PAPERS AND WORKING FILES OF NPS EMPLOYEES, 1879-1992

Organized into ten subseries: Subseries A: Ronald F. Lee Papers and Working Files; Subseries B: Vera Craig Working Files; Subseries C: Jesse L. Nusbaum Papers and Working Files; Subseries D: Harold L. Peterson Papers and Working Files; Subseries E: Verne E. Chatelain Papers and Working Files; Subseries F: Robert M. Utley Working Files; Subseries G: Ernest A. Connally Papers and Working Files; Subseries H: Theodor R. Swem Papers; Subseries I: Herb Evison Working Papers; and Subseries J: Harold P. Fabian Papers.

This series contains the personal papers and working files of National Park Service personnel. Its records provide an overview of the contributions and efforts made by various individuals servicewide. Files were generated by archeologists, naturalists, historians, administrative officials, and park rangers. Materials include correspondence, meeting agendas and minutes, clippings, magazines and journals, photographs, brochures, reports, and research files.

#### SUBSERIES A: RONALD F. LEE PAPERS AND WORKING FILES, 1879-1985

Ronald F. Lee served the National Park Service as chief historian, Assistant Director, and Northeast Regional Director. He was born in Montevideo, Minnesota, September 18, 1905, to Ernest Powers and Maude Susan (Anthony) Lee. The family moved to Dickinson, North Dakota, and Lee was educated in the Dickinson public schools. He received a BS in economics from the University of Minnesota in 1927 and an MA in American history from the University of Chicago in 1929. Lee taught history as LaSalle (Illinois) Junior College during 1929-1931 and from 1931-1933 was a teaching fellow in the History Department of the University of Minnesota while pursing doctoral studies. In June of 1933, he along with several other members of the Minnesota History Department received jobs as historical foremen with the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) in the National Park Service.

Lee was assigned to a CCC camp at Shiloh National Military Park as a historian. In 1934, he transferred to Washington, D.C., to work with the Branch of History of the National Park Service. In 1935, he formed a History Division to conduct State Park CCC work. After the passage of the Historic Sites Act of 1935, he became Assistant to the Chief Historian, Verne Chatelain, and began his lifelong work to preserve historic buildings and structures. Lee himself became Chief Historian in 1938, and continued in that position until 1950. During this time, Lee was involved with the preservation of several historic sites, giving expert direction to the Historic Sites program, and serving as principle liaison to the Advisory Board on National Parks, Historic Sites, Buildings, and Monuments

During World War II, he served as a staff sergeant in the U.S. Army-Air Force in England assigned as an instructor in the maintenance and operation of the Norden bombsight and the automatic pilot used in bombing raids. He married Jean Prochaska in Denver, Colorado, October 24, 1942. They had no children.

Lee was instrumental in founding the National Trust for Historic Preservation and getting its legislation passed. He was a Trustee Member of the Executive Committee and for many years Secretary of the Board. From 1951 to 1953, he was Assistant Director of the National Park Service and instrumental in developing the National Preservation Program, which anticipated the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966. In 1953 departmental reorganization placed him in charge of a newly created Division of Interpretation. In this capacity he oversaw publications, museums, educational activities, and overall interpretation activities throughout the Park System, and helped plan many facilities under the Mission 66 program. Additionally he was instrumental in the establishment of the National Survey of Historic Sites and Buildings in 1957, which led to the creation of the National Historic Landmarks program.

In 1960, he moved to Philadelphia to become Regional Director of the Northeast Region. During his tenure he developed his lifelong interest in historic sites and historic preservation by joining several local societies, such as the Historical Society of Pennsylvania and the Philadelphia Society of Preservation of Landmarks. He also became interested in preservation of urban areas, seashores, and lakeshores through his involvement with groups such as the Wilderness Society and Philadelphia Conservationist.

Lee retired in 1966 and became a consultant to the NPS, devoting himself to writing. The Family Tree of the National Park System was published in 1972 just before his death. Previously written by Lee, "United State Historical and Architectural Monuments" (1951) became the official history of the Federal government's historic preservation efforts. Additional publications at this time include "1872-2000: Public Use of the National Park System" (1968) and "The Antiquities Act of 1906" (1970). Lee also served a columnist for "History News", the main publication of the American Association for State and Local History (AASLH) from 1966 to 1971. "Origin and Evolution of the National Military Park Idea" published posthumously in 1971.

Lee was a member many organizations including: AASLH, the International Council on Monuments and Sites, National Park Association, Society of Architectural Historians, Wilderness Society, Historical Society of Pennsylvania, Pennsylvania Horticultural Society, Philadelphia Conservationist, Philadelphia Society of Preservation of Landmarks, Philadelphia Art Alliance, The Athenaeum of Philadelphia, Philadelphia Art Museum, Museum of Modern Art of New York City, Phi Beta Kappa, Delta Sigma Rho, American Legion, Air Force Association, American Veterans Committee, the Print Club of Philadelphia, the Century Association of New York City, and the Cosmos Club of Washington, D.C.

He was chairman of a special committee on historic preservation of the National Park Service, 1966 to 1971, and a member of its Legislative Task Force during 1961 to 1970. In 1947, he served as the U.S. representative to the committee of experts on monuments of art and history, UNESCO at Paris, France. Lee served at various times as a trustee of the American Scenic and Historic Preservation Society and the Theodore Roosevelt Association; a member of the Council of the American Association of Museums; the American Planning and Civic Association and the Historic Savannah Foundation; a member of the advisory committee of the Hagley-Eleutherian Mills Foundation; and secretary of the Old Christ Church Preservation Trust Fund.

The American Scenic and Historic Preservation Society awarded Lee the Cornelius Amory Pugsley

Medal in 1952 for his accomplishments in the field of conservation and the George McAneny Medal in 1961 for his leadership in the field of historic sites preservation.

Organized into eight sub-subseries: Sub-subseries 1: Conferences and Committees; Sub-subseries 2: Correspondence; Sub-subseries 3: National Park Service; Sub-subseries 4: Organizations; Sub-subseries 5: Personal Papers; Sub-subseries 6: Publications; Sub-subseries 7: Reference; and Sub-subseries 8: Speeches.

This subseries contains the working files of Ronald F. Lee. The records include items generated for the park service and the numerous historic preservation organizations and committees which Lee was involved in, such as the National Trust for Historic Preservation, American Scenic and Historic Preservation, and National Survey of Historic Sites and Buildings. Record groups include conferences and committees, correspondence, NPS materials, organizations, personal papers, publications, reference materials, and speeches.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 1: CONFERENCES AND COMMITTEES, 1962-1972

Arranged alphabetically by name.

Contains reports, memos, notes, and minutes of committees Lee was involved or interested in such as the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation, National Park Service and Historic Preservation Committee, and Special Committee on Historic Preservation. Agendas, notes, and speeches are contained for those conferences which Lee attended or spoke at such as the Conference on Natural Beauty and Historic Preservation Conference.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 2: CORRESPONDENCE, 1947-1972

Arranged alphabetically by person or subject.

Contains correspondence between Lee and other NPS employees, organizations, and letters grouped by topic.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 3: NATIONAL PARK SERVICE, 1906-1981

Arranged alphabetically by subject, which includes general NPS, NPS Areas, and NPS Memorials and Monuments records.

Contains records of preservation and historical activities for the Northeastern region and specific parks and monuments. Records include memos, guidelines, correspondence, ordinances, plans and drafts, charts and inventories, brochures, announcements, photographs, slides, and photocopies of legislation.

## SUB-SUBSERIES 4: ORGANIZATIONS, 1931-1972

Arranged alphabetically by name.

Contains agendas, minutes, newsletters, correspondence, announcements, awards, invitations,

reports, legislation, and pamphlets of organizations which Lee was a member of or had a close relationship with, such as American Scenic and Historic Preservation Society, National Trust for Historic Preservation, Philadelphia Society for the Preservation of Landmarks, and UNESCO.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 5: PERSONAL PAPERS, 1933-1976

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Contains personal correspondence, notes, photographs, and slides. Also contains actions, correspondence, awards, and information from Lee's personnel file.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 6: PUBLICATIONS, 1906-1972

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Contains drafts, correspondence, research notes, and comments on Lee's publications including the "NPS Family Tree."

# SUB-SUBSERIES 7: REFERENCE, 1879-1972

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Contains publications, legislation, news clippings, and pamphlets on NPS sites, federal acts such as the Antiquities Act of 1906, and historical research published by others used by Lee in professional activities and publications.

### SUB-SUBSERIES 8: SPEECHES, 1947-1966

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Contains notes, drafts, references, and comments on speeches that Lee gave at a variety of functions. Speech topics include education, guest experience, historical preservation, and park planning.

# SUBSERIES B: VERA CRAIG WORKING FILES, 1889-1985

Vera B. Craig, a native of Morristown, NJ, started as museum assistant at Morristown National Historical Park in September 1947. Her appointment followed graduation from the local high school and wartime service in the Coast Guard. For ten years her responsibilities there included accessioning, cataloging and caring for the park's large, valuable collection as well as keeping the park's three museums presentable. In 1949 she was chosen a trainee in the first four week NPS Museum Methods Training Course.

Craig was transferred from Morristown in 1956 to prepare the NPS's first historic house furnishing plan for the Andrew Johnson Home at the Andrew Johnson National Historic Site in Tennessee. This plan proved a turning point in the development of furnished structures as effective interpretive

media in the parks.

Craig then transferred to a new position as staff curator in the Washington Office in 1957 to provide technical supervision for a new three year Museum program. Her role was crucial in the Service-wide effort to bring museum accession and catalog records up to date in professionally satisfactory form. She completed the museum records section of the Museum Handbook, procured the necessary forms and supplies, and collaborated closely with regional curators, whose positions were set up under this program. She remained on the staff of the Museum Branch and its successor units (Branch of Museum Operations, Division of Museum Services, and Division of Reference Services) until she retired in 1977. During these productive years she continued to lead in the operation of the NPS museum records system. She also set up specimen records for the museum laboratory and acted as registrar. As registrar she provided model catalog records for many park specimens that passed through the laboratory. National Capital Parks, in particular, benefited from her expert help in cataloging White House furnishings.

In the Museum Branch, Craig largely supervised the expanding program of furnishing plans for historic structures. She raised service standards in this area and assisted many parks in carrying out approved plans. She was an active member of the Ford's Theatre refurnishing committee and prepared a succession of excellent plans including those for The House Were Lincoln Died, the Harper House at Harpers Ferry, and the Ford House, Washington's headquarters at Morristown. Craig also managed the contracting of specimen conservation for objects which required facilities or skills not available within the NPS Museum Laboratory. She worked closely, for example, with conservators and the conservation scientist at the Textile Museum in cleaning and mounting historic clothing and flags for the Lincoln Museum.

The National Park Service was honored in 1965 when Craig was selected as one of fifteen U.S. museum professionals to take part in a traveling seminar with colleagues at museum in four Scandinavian countries. After her retirement in 1977, Craig donated to the Harpers Ferry Center Library her valuable collection of books, pamphlets, and pictures relating to American furnishing and decorative arts. Craig died on Christmas Day 1982 following a heart attack.

Arranged alphabetically by park.

This subseries contains the working files of Vera Craig. These records document her work and contributions in recreating historic furnishings for various sites service-wide. Materials include correspondence, furnishing plans & studies, photographs, clippings, and research files.

# SUBSERIES C: JESSE L. NUSBAUM PAPERS AND WORKING FILES, 1911-1970

Jesse Logan Nusbaum served as the archeologist in the Park Service, specializing in the study of ancient civilizations in the Southwest United States. He was born in Greeley, Colorado, September 3, 1887 to Edward Moore and Agnes Strickland (Moodie) Nusbaum. His parents and maternal grandparents were members of the original Greeley colony organized by Horace Greeley. Nusbaum attended local public schools in Greeley as well as the Colorado Teachers College there, receiving his V. Pedagogy in 1907.

Upon graduation, Nusbaum was hired to teach Science and Manual Arts at the New Mexico State

Normal in Las Vegas. The following summer he forged his connection with Mesa Verde as a photographer and archeological assistant to A.V. Kidder. Nusbaum spent the following summer (1908) in a similar fashion.

In June of 1909, Nusbaum became the first employee of the School of American Archeology and Museum of New Mexico, Santa Fe, under Dr. Edgar L. Hewett. While there, he conducted archeological surveys, investigations, excavations, and ruins stabilization in Guatemala, Honduras, Mexico, Colorado, and New Mexico including the Pajarito Plateau. Nusbaum's returned to Mesa Verde for the exaction, repair, and stabilization of Balcony House, and significant renovation/excavation that extended into the winter of 1910. He spent nine months in Washington, D.C., from September 1911 to June 1912, contributing to exhibits for the Panama-California Exposition to be held in 1915 in San Diego, California. His innovations at Mesa Verde and manual arts background served him well during his supervision of the restoration of the New Mexico Palace of Governors in Santa Fe, which was completed in the fall of 1913. Also in 1913, Nusbaum worked for three months in the Maya ruins of Yucatan, with Dr. S. G. Morley, and helped restore the Pecos Mission Church. He later used some of its design in the work of the New Mexico state art museum, built in 1916-1919 under his supervision.

Nusbaum aspired to be an aviator during World War I but instead chose to be an engineer and served in France. He enlisted in May 1918 and was discharged April 1919. From 1919 to 1921, he was employed at the Museum of the American Indian, Heye Foundation in New York City. While Nusbaum was working in New York he conducted several southwest expeditions, to such sites as Hawikuh Pueblo and Basketmaker Cave.

In 1921, while still in New York, he was selected by NPS Director Stephen Mather and Assistant Director Arno Cammerer to become superintendent at Mesa Verde National Park. Mather was disappointed by the conditions that had developed there under Nusbaum's predecessor. Although he encountered resistance with several Colorado politicians, Nusbaum was able to become an effective superintendent, advancing the development of the park. He discontinued grazing, built a museum and developed interpretive programs, especially ones designed to explain the Antiquities Act. His involvement with the Act led to his designation in 1927 as the lead archeologist and prime enforcer of the Act for the Southwest while still remaining Mesa Verde superintendent.

Nusbaum continued in this dual capacity until 1930, when he took a leave of absence to organize and direct the Laboratory of Anthropology at Santa Fe, New Mexico. He remained director of the laboratory until 1935, having earlier returned to the Park Service and resumed his duties as Mesa Verde superintendent and archeologist, enforcing the Antiquities Act. In the late 1940's he left Mesa Verde for Santa Fe and increased duties as the senior archeologist of the National Park Service. In this capacity, Nusbaum began one the of the first salvage archeology projects when he persuaded El Paso Natural Gas Company to allow archeological excavation along their pipelines. For this and many other accomplishments, Jesse L. Nusbaum received the Distinguished Service Award from the Department of the Interior in 1954. After a year's extension, Nusbaum took mandatory retirement from the National Park Service in 1957 at the age of seventy-one. However, he continued to do consulting work for many years. He passed away in Santa Fe in December 1975, at the age of eighty-eight.

Nusbaum married Aileen Baehrens O'Bryan on September 21, 1920, but was divorced in 1939. The

couple had one son, Deric. Nusbaum subsequently married Rosemary Lewis Rife, a nurse, on December 11, 1947. His civic associations were as follows: trustee, Laboratory of Anthropology 1923-1938; member, Advisory Board 1927; State Park Commission of New Mexico 1933-1936; council, American Association of Museums 1932-1935; trustee, Indian Arts Fund 1927; commission, Old Santa Fe Association 1946-1975; management board, School of American Research, 1947; U.S. International Park and Forest Commission; honorary life member, Museum of New Mexico; Pi Gamma Mu; fellow, American Association for the Advancement of Science; and chairman, Social Sciences, Southwest Division 1932-1933 as well as Vice President 1935 of the American Anthropological Association; Society for American Archeology; and American Planning and Civic Association. Nusbaum received an honorary doctorate from Colorado State in 1946.

Nusbaum was listed in Who's Who in American from 1931 until 1960 and was also included in Directory of American Scholars and American Men of Science.

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

This subseries contains the working files of archeologist Jesse Nusbaum. These records document his archeological contributions as well as his work as superintendent of Mesa Verde National Park. Materials include correspondence, reports, research files, clippings, and personal papers.

# SUBSERIES D: HAROLD L. PETERSON PAPERS AND WORKING FILES, 1933-1979

Harold Leslie Peterson was the Chief Curator of the National Park Service and a noted arms scholar. He was born May 22, 1922, to Leslie Chauncey and Mildred (Croft) Peterson in Peekskill, New York. After education in local schools, Peterson received his BA magna cum laude from Drew University, New Jersey, in 1945 and married Dorothy Parker. They had two children, Harold L., Jr., and Kristin Dorothy. Peterson worked for the Wisconsin Historical Society in 1946 while working on his Master of Arts from the University of Wisconsin. Upon graduation in 1947, Peterson went to work for the National Park Service as a historian and stayed until his death on January 1, 1978.

Peterson moved from historian to curator back to historian with the History Division, on a recommendation by Chief Historian Ronald Lee. He remained with the History Division for sixteen years, establishing and fostering cooperation between the curatorial and historical staff and dramatically increasing the number of historical objects and specimens the division held. In 1964 he became Chief Curator of the National Park Service and his primary duties related to historical acquisition and authentication. That year he was also appointed to the Museum Study Team organized by Director George Hartzog to alter museum organization and practice. He also was instrumental in advising on historical military reconstructions and displays for the Bicentennial.

Peterson was an expert on arms and armor and consulted outside of his work with the Park Service. He belonged to several professional organizations and received numerous awards and honors. Peterson served as advisor to such organizations as Colonial Williamsburg, Plymouth Plantation, Henry Ford Museum, and the West Point Museum. He served as president of the Company of Military Historians from 1960 to 1963 and held office in the International Association of Museums of Arms and Military History, the Company of Military Historians, and the Washington Regional Conservation Guild. Peterson served several terms as chairman of the board of directors for the Eastern National Park and Monuments Association.

He authored hundreds of magazine articles and twenty-three books on arms and armor, military and social history. Four of these books were written specifically for children. Peterson served on the editorial staff of a number of professional publications as well and lectured at the Williamsburg Antiques Forum, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the New York Historical Society, and many other institutions. He was also interested in and played military music, some of which was recorded.

Peterson carried on a long battle with illness and disease and passed away in 1978. He was an inveterate collector of arms, armor, and antiques in general. Peterson's expertise and qualities as a historical scholar were widely recognized. He received the United States Department of the Interior Distinguished Service Medal in 1958 for outstanding contributions in the fields of historical research and museum planning. Many of his works are catalogued in the Harpers Ferry Center library.

Organized into nine sub-subseries: Sub-subseries 1: Associations; Sub-subseries 2: Correspondence; Sub-subseries 3: Historical Evaluation and Research Organization; Sub-subseries 4: Manuscripts; Sub-subseries 5: Parks and Areas; Sub-subseries 6: Personal; Sub-subseries 7: Photographs; Sub-subseries 8: Reading and Daily Sections; and Sub-subseries 9: Reference.

This subseries contains the working files of Harold L. Peterson. The records include files generated for the National Park Service as well as non-federal associations that Peterson was involved with, including regional gun associations. Photographs of weaponry, uniforms, and other military-associated materials are included from both Peterson's personal collection and objects he consulted on.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 1: ASSOCIATIONS, 1955-1977

Arranged alphabetically by name.

Peterson was involved with a number of NPS and non-profit historical associations, including the Eastern National Park and Monument Association. He provided these groups with historical knowledge and consulted on the preservation of furniture, weapons, and a variety of other archeological objects. Files contain reports, memos, notes, newsletters, correspondence, and publications.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 2: CORRESPONDENCE, 1948-1977

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Contains correspondence of Peterson, primarily asking for historical expertise and consultation. Topics include arms and armor, the National Bicentennial, weapon inquiries, and administrative matters.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 3: HISTORICAL EVALUATION AND RESEARCH ORGANIZATION, 1965

Arranged alphabetically by title of reports.

Reports of the Historical Evaluation and Research Organization, kept and arranged by Peterson for use in an unidentified publication.

## SUB-SUBSERIES 4: MANUSCRIPTS, 1969-1975

Arranged alphabetically by title.

Contains bibliographic notes, drafts, and edited copies of several of Peterson's major publications, including "How Do You Know It's Old?" and "Interiors: Americans at Home."

## SUB-SUBSERIES 5: PARKS AND AREAS, 1935-1977

Arranged alphabetically by location.

History research notes for specific parks, exhibit planning information, correspondence, and photographs created and used by Peterson while serving as Chief Curator of the National Park System.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 6: PERSONAL, 1947-1979

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Files contain personal correspondence, lecture notes, photographs, and slides. Also included are non-confidential actions, awards, and general information from Peterson's personnel file.

### SUB-SUBSERIES 7: PHOTOGRAPHS, 1944-1976

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Contains images of weapons, uniforms, military items, and other historical objects. A majority of the photographs were used in Peterson's publications and are cropped and/or captioned. Interfiled textual material consists of correspondence and other documents containing general information about the depicted subjects.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 8: READING AND DAILY SECTION, 1968-1977

Arranged chronologically.

Articles, press releases, and memos compiled by Peterson on history, weapons, and furniture.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 9: REFERENCE, 1933-1977

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Newsletters, brochures, articles, reports, and other documents primarily on military history compiled and used by Peterson for his daily work.

# SUBSERIES E. VERNE E. CHATELAIN PAPERS AND WORKING FILES, 1919-1950

Verne Elmo Chatelain was born in Peru, Nebraska in 1895. He married and had two children, Richard and Shirley. He received his masters in history from the University of Chicago after attending Peru State College in Nebraska for his undergraduate studies. He held a law degree from Creighton College in Omaha and was a member of the Nebraska State Bar. He received his doctorate in the history of political science from the University of Minnesota. He also was chairman of the History and Social Sciences Department at Nebraska State Teachers College and Assistant to the Superintendent of the Minnesota State Historical Society before joining the National Park Service.

In 1931 he was hired as Park Historian by Director Albright to oversee the historical program of the NPS under the new Branch of Research and Education. Chatelain supervised the NPS's first two field historians, Floyd Flickinger and Elbert Cox, who were stationed at Colonial National Monument (then referred to as Yorktown) in Virginia. He was a strong proponent for interpreting the history of sites to the public, and advocated for interesting and informative brochures as a public introduction to park sites.

Throughout his career with the NPS, Chatelain strove to achieve academic respect and professionalism in the wider academia for the research, education, and interpretation done by his branch for the NPS. He also actively evaluated the historical potential of new NPS sites and created a set of criteria for site selection. He also advocated for the separation of management of eastern and western parks and fought for more trained historical staff at various park sites. Chatelain was heavily involved with interpretation and preservation work at Wakefield, Morristown, and Colonial National Monument specifically.

Chatelain's work, along with the support of Director Albright, helped to create the new Branch of Historic Sites and Buildings in 1935, which was better able to provide leadership and guidance of the interpretation and educational program for historical and archeological areas. Chatelain served as Acting Assistant Director of the Branch until he resigned in September of 1936.

Towards the end of his NPS career, he consulted with the city of Monterey, California in their plans to develop the historic areas of the city. After leaving the NPS, Chatelain went to work for Remington and Rand as a Research Consultant. He developed a new museum storage case and worked with several non-federal museums. In 1945 he joined the University of Maryland faculty and was active in history department of the Army Education Center in Germany from 1949-1950. He taught history here until retiring in 1965, but continued to lecture frequently on the history of Maryland in the Civil war to local groups. Chatelain died in 1991 in Maryland at the age of ninety-six.

Chatelain belonged to the American Historical Association, Mississippi Valley Historical Association, Nebraska History Teachers Association, and the Minnesota Historical Society. He was a prolific public speaker and wrote several books and articles on historical interpretation and conservation.

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Records primarily contain the correspondence and working documents of Chatelain in his NPS

positions. These include correspondence with park sites, Director Albright, and historical societies as well as numerous handwritten notes referring to potential park sites, staffing issues, and reviews of historical materials. The material also contains the final plan of the Monterey Historic Site development and some correspondence in his later professions. Records include correspondence, reports, notes, plans, abstracts, brochures, and photographs.

# SUBSERIES F: ROBERT M. UTLEY WORKING FILES, 1932-1978

Robert Marshall Utley was born October 31, 1929 in Bauxite, Arkansas, but grew up in Indiana. He studied at Purdue University where he graduated with a Bachelor of Sciences in history. Utley received his Master of Arts in history from the University of Indiana in 1952. His Master's thesis, entitled "Custer and the Great Controversy: The Origin and Development of a Legend," focused on his interest on the military history of the American West. After graduating from the University of Indiana, Utley joined the Army as a historian working for the Chief of Staff.

While an undergraduate student at Purdue, Utley began his association with the National Park Service in 1947 as a seasonal summer ranger at Custer Battlefield National Monument (now Little Bighorn Battlefield National Monument). In 1957 he returned to the NPS in a permanent position as a historian in the Southwest Region and later served as NPS Chief Historian from 1964-1973. Following a re-organization in 1973, he took over the role of Director of the Office of Archeology and Historic Preservation (OAHP) from Ernest A. Connally.

Department of the Interior order no. 2953 (1973 February 6) outlines Utley's role in the reorganization:

The Division of History, headed by the Service's Chief Historian, Robert M. Utley, provides professional services, judgments, and recommendations on all matters in the field of history with which the NPS is concerned, conducts the Service's historical research program and the National Survey of Historic Sites and Buildings, and supports as needed the National Register, grants-in-aid, and Advisory Council programs conducted under the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966.

Utley also held the titles of Assistant Director of Park Historic Preservation and Chief of the Cultural Resources Management Division before his 1980 retirement from the park service. That same year, he married Melody Webb, herself an NPS historian. After leaving the park service, he moved on to Yale University, where he was the Frederick W. and Carrie S. Beinecke Senior Research Fellow in Western and Frontier History. During his career, Utley received numerous acknowledgements for his work including two honorary doctorate degrees, six Outstanding Performance Awards, and the Department of the Interior Distinguished Service Award. He was also the recipient of the Wrangler Award, a Spur Award, and the Western History Association's Caughey Prize. The Western History Association has named the annual Robert M. Utley Book Award in his honor.

Since his retirement, he continued to write histories about the American Frontier. Specific subjects include Billy the Kid, the Indian wars, the Texas Rangers, mountain men, and Sitting Bull. His memoirs, entitled "Custer and Me," which foucsed largely on his years with NPS, appeared in 2004. As of 2013, he and his wife lived in Scottsdale, Arizona.

This subseries contains materials Robert Utley sent to Barry Mackintosh (NPS Bureau Historian, 1965-1999) for reference when writing a history of the NPS's response to National Historic Preservation Act of 1966. Reference copies of the Act as well as Utley's report entitled "Cultural Preservation in Japan, Some Lessons for America" are included. Files contain information regarding historic structures preservation management within the NPS, as well as the development and organizational management of relevant administrative bodies, such as the Office of Archeology and Historic Preservation. Materials include reports, memoranda, clippings, and correspondence. Records of Utley's professional collaboration and personal correspondence with Ernest A. Connally can be found in Subseries G: Ernest A. Connally Papers and Working Files, 1934-1992, undated.

# SUBSERIES G: ERNEST A. CONNALLY PAPERS AND WORKING FILES, 1934-1992 (bulk dates: 1963-1990)

Ernest Allan Connally had a long and distinguished career in the field of historic preservation, holding influential positions within academia, the federal government, and international committees. He was born in Groesbeck, Texas, on November 15, 1921. He had an early interest in architecture and attended Rice University (1939-1940) and the University of Texas at Austin (UT-Austin) (1940-1942) as an undergraduate. His studies were interrupted by World War II while he served as major in the United States Army Air Force (1942-1946). After this he travelled for a year in Europe, and studied for one summer at University of Florence (1947). He would graduate from UT-Austin in 1950 with a Bachelor of Architecture degree. He attended graduate school at Harvard, and received MA (1952) and PhD (1955) degrees in History and Principles of the Fine Arts, specializing in the History and Principles of Architecture. At Harvard, he met Janice Muriel Wegner. They were married August 28, 1951 and had two children: Marry Allen and John Arnold.

His academic career as a professor of architecture lasted fifteen years and included time as assistant professor at Miami University, Oxford, Ohio, (1952-1955); associate professor at Washington University, St. Louis, (1955-1957, returning as a visiting professor, 1962); and at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, where he was associate professor (1957-1961), and associate member of the Center for Advanced Study, (1961-1967). He was a Fulbright lecturer at the University of Melbourne, Australia (1963). He published books and academic articles. He directed several projects for the Historic American Buildings Survey (HABS); planned the restoration of the President Andrew Johnson Home in Greeneville, Tennessee; directed the restoration of a prime example of French colonial architecture, the eighteenth-century Louis Bolduc House in Ste. Genevieve, Missouri; and served as a consultant on other restorations and on various public panels.

Connally's association with the National Park Service began in 1952 when he did work as a member of a documentary recording team for HABS at Independence National Historical Park in Philadelphia, PA. He did further work of this kind at the Andrew Johnson House in Greenville, TN (1956), the Custom House in Salem, MA (1958), and at Cape Cod (1962). This brought him in contact with prominent park service professional Ronald F. Lee, who was a consultant on the Rains Committee, which produced the 1966 report "With Heritage So Rich," which was influential on the passage of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, during the Johnson administration.

In 1967, on the recommendation of Lee and archeologist J.O. Brew, Connally was appointed to the

initial NPS special committee on historic preservation by NPS director George B. Hartzog, Jr. At the committee's recommendation, Hartzog created the Office of Archeology and Historic Preservation (OAHP), which would unify disparate preservation efforts at a high level within the NPS, with Connally as head. Connally's work for the OAHP involved coordination with the HABS, the National Trust for Historic Preservation, and the newly-established National Register of Historic Places. The act also established the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation with an NPS officer as executive director. In 1976, the Council was reconstituted as an independent federal agency.

In 1971, the OAHP was moved down within the organizational structure of the park service, reporting to the associate director for professional services. In 1972, Connally was promoted to hold this office and Robert Utley was named director of OAHP. In 1972, Hartzog was replaced by Roland Walker, to whom Connally proposed a scheme calling for the separation of the OAHP from the NPS. Connally struggled to realize implementation of this plan throughout the mid-seventies.

During the Carter administration, the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation was redefined as the Heritage Conservation and Recreation Service (HCRS), and the OAHP was subsumed under this new service in 1978. The transition was not smooth and proved to be detrimental to the preservation goals of Connally and others. Connally stayed on as associate director at HCRS, but lack of support from HCRS director Chris T. Delaporte led Connally to relinquish his associate directorship (1979) and to focus on his role as Secretary-General to the International Council on Monuments and Sites (ICOMOS), a position which he had held from 1975, and would retain until 1981. The OAHP was dismantled in September of 1979. Delaporte came under heavy criticism from many preservationists, including the National Conference of State Historic Preservation Officers. With the change in administration in 1981, James G. Watt became new Secretary of the Interior and abolished the HCRS, restoring preservation functions to the NPS. Connally would return to the park service in 1982 as Chief Appeals Officer, responsible for final decisions regarding certification of historic structures for tax purposes. He retired in 1992.

Connally's prominence as a preservationist extended beyond his role as NPS associate director. He was deeply involved in many professional organizations both domestically and internationally. He was the US delegate to the UNESCO conference on cultural property (1968); a UNESCO consultant to the government of Nepal (1968) and to the government of Thailand (1982); the US representative to the International Conference on Recording Historic Monuments in Prague, Czechoslovakia (1969); and secretary-treasurer to the US committee of the International Council on Monuments and Sites (US-ICOMOS) (1969-73). He served on the editorial board of "Momentum," the ICOMOS publication (1967-1975), and was later chairman (1973-75), and secretary-general (1975-1981). He was US delegate to the International Centre for Study of Preservation of Cultural Property (ICCROM) in Rome (1971-1977). He was a member of the US-USSR Joint Working Group on the Urban Environment (1973-1981).

Connally was the recipient of many awards: a research award from the American Philosophical Society (1957), a distinguished service award from the Department of the Interior (1978), the Louise DuPont Crowninshield Award from the National Trust for Historic Preservation (1980), and was named a membre d'Honneur of ICOMOS (1981).

Connally maintained strong ties throughout the profession. His memberships included: the College

Art Association, the American Society of Architectural Historians, the American Institute of Architects, Colegio de Arquitectos (Puebla, Mexico), the Association for Preservation Technology, the National Trust for Historic Preservation, The Victorian Society in America, the American Association of State and Local History, the Gargoyle Architecture Honor Society, Alpha Rho Chi, Tau Sigma Delta, Phi Kappa Phi, and the Cosmos Club (Washington, DC).

Organized into eight sub-subseries: Sub-subseries 1: Correspondence; Sub-subseries 2: International Centre for the Study of the Preservation and Restoration of Cultural Property (ICCROM); Sub-subseries 3: Interviews; Sub-subseries 4: Legislation and Policy; Sub-subseries 5: NPS Organization; Sub-subseries 6: Professional Engagements; Sub-subseries 7: Reports; and Sub-subseries 8: Personnel.

This subseries contains the working files of Ernest A. Connally. The records include items generated for the park service and historic preservation organizations and committees which Connally was involved in, such as the National Trust for Historic Preservation and the International Council on Monuments and Sites (ICOMOS), as well as correspondence with a wide variety of professional, philanthropic, and academic historic preservation groups. Records include reports, plans, legal reference material, published literature, meeting minutes, notes, brochures, photographs, audio cassettes, newspaper clippings, letters, interview transcriptions, and photographic postcards.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 1: CORRESPONDENCE, 1957-1992

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Contains external correspondence of Connally, both personal and professional in nature. Connally maintained working relationships with a wide variety of organizations and individuals within the broad professional field of historic preservation, both domestic and international. Also included are recommendation letters for junior students and professionals, personal correspondence with colleague Ronald. F. Lee after Lee's retirement, and with Connally's alma mater, UT-Austin.

SUB-SUBSERIES 2: INTERNATIONAL CENTRE FOR THE STUDY OF THE PRESERVATION AND RESTORATION OF CULTURAL PROPERTY (ICCROM), 1963-1981

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Contains records generated for the International Centre for the Study of the Preservation and Restoration of Cultural Property (ICCROM), an organization to which Connally was influential as the US delegate. Items consist of correspondence, meeting minutes, proceedings, and notes.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 3: INTERVIEWS, 1980-1986

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Contains transcripts of oral histories and extended interviews conducted with three interviewers: historian Charles Hosner, PhD student James A. Glass, and NPS officer Boyd Evison. Topics include Connally's personal history, the development of the field of historic preservation in general, and the establishment and development of historic preservation offices and activities within the National Park Service and other administrative bodies.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 4: LEGISLATION AND POLICY, 1966-1989

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Contains internal correspondence, memoranda, reports, plans, and reference material on acts of Congress and Presidential directives related to historic preservation, organizational funding, and policy for administration of official archeological and historic programs. Topics include the National Historic Preservation Act, Bicentennial Land Heritage Act, The Comprehensive Preservation Act, the Land Resource Management Act, the National Environmental Policy Act, the National Heritage Policy Act, the Olmsted Heritage Landscapes Act, among others.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 5: NPS ORGANIZATION, 1934-1991

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Contains internal correspondence, memoranda, reports, plans, and reference material on establishment, organization, staffing, development, and multiple re-organizations of historic preservation offices within the NPS and the Department of the Interior. Records span the establishment of the OAHP, the proposed re-configurations during the mid-1970s, the creation of the HCRS during the Carter administration, as well as NPS Washington Office re-organizations in 1973 and 1978.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 6: PROFESSIONAL ENGAGEMENTS, 1968-1991

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Records contain correspondence, notes, brochures, invitations, and prepared material for speeches related to Connally's busy schedule as a public speaker and attendee at professional and social events related to historic preservation.

# SUB-SUBSERIES 7: REPORTS, 1968-1991

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Reports, studies, and publications collected as reference material. The bulk of the material originated within the park service. Two items, "1980 Threats of the Park Survey, Air Quality Threats as Reported by Park," and "Threat Information Management System, Detail List of Threats by Park" are large-format printouts of databases listing service-wide management details. Also included are a dissertation by PhD student James A. Glass, whose interview with Connally is in sub-subseries 3: Interviews; reports by park service historian Barry Mackintosh; and reports by Ronald F. Lee, whose papers and working files can be found in subseries A.

### SUB-SUBSERIES 8: PERSONNEL, 1966-1992

Arranged chronologically.

Correspondence, memos, notes, resumes, and brochures related to Connally's employment with the NPS.

## SUBSERIES H: THEODOR SWEM PAPERS, 1961-1978

Theodor R. Swem was born in Cedar Rapids, Iowa on December 6, 1917. He attended Coe College in Iowa and received his Bachelor of Science in Forestry from Iowa State University in Ames. Upon completing one year at the Biology School at Harvard, Swem worked for three years with the Colorado Game and Fish Commission, and then ten years with the Bureau of Reclamation at Denver in Recreation and Wildlife Planning. In 1957, he joined the National Park Service as head of Planning Studies for Region II in Omaha.

Swem transferred to WASO in 1961 as a planner in the Branch of Proposed Area Studies and then Park and Recreation Area Planning. He became Assistant Director, Cooperative Activities in 1964, moving over to National Capital Region in 1969 as Regional Director. After a year at NCR he moved back to WASO as an Assistant Director and in 1973 received an additional appointment as Chairman of an Inter-Bureau Alaska Planning Group within the Department of the Interior. From 1972 to 1976, Swem was responsible for the National Park Service activity in Alaska as related to the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (ANCSA), and was key to the development of National Park areas in Alaska. Swem retired in 1976, but his work led to the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act (ANILCA) which was signed by President Jimmy Carter in December of 1980.

After retiring, Swem served as president of the Wilderness Society Governing Council (1978-1980), a Board Member of American Rivers, Inc., and Management Consultant to Silvertrip Consulting and the Defenders of Wildlife. He and his wife, Helen were married for 57 years and had four children. Ted Swem died in 2006.

Arranged alphabetically by subject, and thereunder chronologically.

This subseries documents the activities of Theodor R. Swem. Most of these files pertain to his work in establishing the presence of the NPS in Alaska through the Alaska Task Force, general reorganization, and forming boundaries. Materials include reports, statements, policies, clippings, correspondence and memos, project files, and notes. For additional information about Alaska and Swem, please refer to Series III, Subseries G: Alaska Research Files.

# SUBSERIES I: S. HERBERT EVISON PAPERS, 1919-1984 (bulk dates: 1960s-1970s)

Samuel Herbert Evison was born on April 10, 1892 in North Tarrytown, NY. He received a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1913 from Trinity College in Hartford, CT, where he was a member of the Psi Upsilon Fraternity. In the winter and spring of 1911, Evison worked as a sports reporter and later a telegraph editor on the "Beaumont Enterprise" in Beaumont, TX. After returning to Trinity, he was a reporter on the "Hartford Sunday Globe" and also edited the "Trinity Tripod." After a year of teaching English and French at DeKoven Hall in South Tacoma, WA, Evison served as a reporter on the "Seattle Post-Intelligencer." Other positions held by Evison include: night editor in the Seattle office of the Associated Press (which he did during the summers until 1917), editor of the "Washington Motorist," and copy reader for the "Seattle Times." From 1917 to 1918, Evison served as executive secretary of Washington State Fuel Administration, and later wrote a history of

that organization. He then became secretary to David Whitcomb, president of Rainier National Park Company.

Evison's career in conservation began in 1919 as executive secretary of the Washington Natural Parks Association, which he had helped organize. In this role, he encouraged the 1921 passage of the State Park Act by Washington legislature, launching an extensive and successful state park program. He notably attended the organizational meeting of the National Conference on State Parks in 1921, which drew the attention of NPS Director Stephen T. Mather. He was named by Mather as the executive secretary of the Conference in 1928.

In 1933, the National Park Service drafted Evison to work under Assistant Director Conrad L. Wirth in the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) to supervise state park emergency conservation work. Three years later, NPS regionalized its emergency activities, and Evison became regional officer of Region One, extending from Maine to Louisiana. When NPS placed many of its regular activities under regional administration in 1937, Evison was appointed Associate Regional Director of Region One, and served in this role until 1940, and again from 1943-1945. When NPS Chief of Lands and State Cooperation Conrad L. Wirth was sent to Austria as a member of Allied Advisory Council in 1945, in the aftermath of World War II, he appointed Evison to act in his place. When Wirth returned a year later, NPS Director Newton B. Drury appointed Evison to be the National Park Service's first Chief of Information. He remained in that position until his retirement in 1958.

After retirement, Evison continued working with the NPS, as an unpaid collaborator. One of his most notable accomplishments included conducting an oral histories program in 1962-1963, which was revived again in 1970. Evison taped interviews with more than 400 men and women, both active and former NPS employees who had played integral roles in Service history (see HFCA 1817, NPS Oral History Collection for those records).

Additionally Evison prepared an unpublished manuscript regarding the history of the NPS. The original outline for the book dates to 1958, following his retirement from the NPS, and was prepared for a grant request to fund the research. Evison wrote the bulk of the manuscript, re-titled "The NPS—Manager of Land and People," from 1962-1964. During preparation of the manuscript, Evison corresponded with many early NPS employees, seeking clarification of specific issues or facts, and sending them draft chapters for review and comment. Some of his correspondents include Horace Albright, Conrad Wirth, George Hartzog, and his publishing house, Alfred A. Knopf.

In 1964, the manuscript was determined to be the property of the National Park Service, as Evison wrote it while working as an unpaid collaborator of the National Parks Service, and the grant money received had been awarded to the National Parks and then passed on to Evison. NPS Director George Hartzog declined to publish the manuscript, describing it as "part history, part news commentary, and part editorial opinion," and therefore "not the kind of manuscript that could be published under the sponsorship of a Federal agency." Instead, he encouraged Evison to modify the manuscript and to publish it as a non-governmental document. Evison reworked the manuscript into its third title, "The NPS-Conservator of America's Scenic and Historic Heritage." He was in contact with a publishing house at the time (Alfred A. Knopf) but the revised manuscript was never published.

Evison was awarded the Department of the Interior Distinguished Service Award in May 1959. He

was an active member of the NPS Employee and Alumni Association (see Series XVI: Records of the Employee and Alumni Association of the National Park Service, in this collection, for further Evison-related records.) He was a frequent contributor to the Association's "National Park Courier," serving as the editor in 1960-1961. He was also presented with the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters from Trinity College in 1984 for his long and distinguished career as a conservationist.

S. Herbert Evison married Shirley Edith Bain on October 1, 1919 in Seattle, Washington. They had two children: Shirley Ann Groomes and Boyd Evison. Boyd entered the NPS after his father's retirement and eventually became Alaska's regional director. After over 60 years of marriage, Mrs. Evison died in 1981. S. Herbert Evison died on November 18, 1988, at the age of 95.

Arranged alphabetically by subject or topic.

This subseries post-dates Evison's tenure as chief of information for the National Park Service. The files primarily relate to the preparation of his manuscript on the history of the NPS, during his time as a collaborator. Many of the research files associated with the manuscript preparation contain correspondence with prominent NPS individuals. Also included are complete drafts of the manuscript, "The NPS – Conservator of America's Scenic and Historic Heritage," and an additional draft of the manuscript included under the alternate title, "The NPS – Manager of Land and People." There are also drafts and revisions to the individual chapters. Other records include various articles written by Evison, and draft chapters which are not part of his NPS history manuscript. Correspondence, research, and articles related to the Blue Ridge Parkway are included A small amount of material includes correspondence, photographs, and information on the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC). Also includes general correspondence with friends and acquaintances within the NPS, after his official retirement. Letters to politicians and other individuals reflect his personal political views regarding President Ronald Reagan and social issues.

Materials include correspondence, memos, manuals, manuscript drafts, news clippings, articles, photographs, and research notes.

SERIES XVI: RECORDS OF THE EMPLOYEES AND ALUMNI ASSOCIATION OF THE NATIONAL PARK SERVICE, 1939-2005

The Employees & Alumni Association (E&AA) of the National Park Service, is a 501(C) (4) membership organization dedicated to promoting the values and ideals of the National Park Service family. The E&AA was organized in 1955 and was incorporated in 1957 to promote and nurture a bond between current and former National Park Service members in their dedication to the National Park Service's mission.

The E&AA through the National Park Service Employees and Alumni Trust Fund (the "Trust Fund"), a 501 (c)(3) tax exempt entity, supports the George B. Hartzog, Jr. Education Loan Program providing interest-free loans to National Park Service E&AA members for the higher educational needs of their children/grandchildren or themselves. In addition, the Trust Fund also supports disaster relief efforts to aid National Park Service families in the event of major disasters such as hurricanes, floods, fires, or earthquakes or incidents of personal calamity.

The E&AA, through the 1916 Society, encourages and recognizes specific individuals and organizations that actively support and promote the programs, activities, mission and goals of the National Park Service through fund-raising efforts.

Since May of 1987, Eastern National has managed the day-to-day operations of the E&AA. This arrangement was formalized through a Memorandum of Agreement between the two organizations. The Board of Directors of Eastern National serves in a voluntary capacity as the Board of the E&AA.

Biographical materials received from other sources and accessions were often incorporated into the E&AA files. Staff at Harpers Ferry Center continued to add to and expand the employee biographical files as time allowed.

Biographical data sheets, newspaper clippings, press releases and other documents which provide biographical and career information for employees of the National Park Service. Includes

biographical data for some affiliated individuals that were not NPS employees. Photographic prints present in a small number of files.

SUB-SUBSERIES 1: EMPLOYEE BIOGRAPHICAL FILES, 1932-2005 (bulk dates: 1960-1990)

Arranged alphabetically by last name of subject.

Contains biographical data sheets generated by the Employee and Alumni Association, Courier articles and press releases, newspaper clippings, award notifications, retirement announcements, photographs, death announcements, obituaries, correspondence, publications, and biographical sketches. Includes biographical data for some affiliated individuals that were not NPS employees. The dates represented range from 1932 – 2005, with the majority of dates represented from 1960 – 1990. The Employee and Alumni Association, organized in 1955, collected the bulk of the material for use in alumni directories, the Courier, and park newsletters to provide biographical and career information for employees of the National Park Service. Materials included are paper documents and photographs.

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Biographical data sheets completed by individuals, "Courier" newspaper articles and press releases, index cards with address information, newspaper clippings, award notifications, retirement announcements, photographs, death announcements, obituaries, and correspondence regarding widow's privileges. Includes biographical data for NPS employees and spouses. Primarily widows but some widowers also present. The NPS Employee and Alumni Association collected the bulk of the material for use in alumni directories, the "Courier" newspaper, and park newsletters to provide biographical and career information for employees and spouses of the National Park Service.
