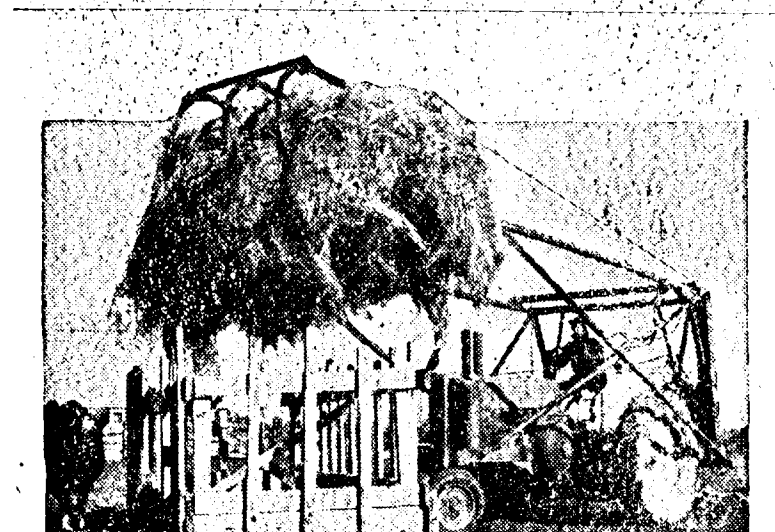

## The 10 Commandments of Safety

- 1 Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This is the first rule of gun safety.
- 2 Guns carried into camp or home, or when otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded, and taken down or have actions open; guns always should be carried in cases to the shooting area.
- 3 Always be sure barrel and action are clear of obstructions, and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying. Remove oil and grease from chamber before firing.
- 4 Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you stumble; keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.
- 5 Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know the identifying features of the game you intend to hunt.
- 6 Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid all horseplay while handling a gun.
- 7 Unattended guns should be unloaded; guns and ammunition should be stored separately beyond reach of children and careless adults.
- 8 Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.
- 9 Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water; when at target practice, be sure your backstop is adequate.
- 10 Avoid alcoholic drinks before or during shooting.

Farm Tips... Harvest Early Then Dry Corn to Avoid Heavy Field Losses

Farmers are asking the agricultural engineers at the University of Nebraska College of Agriculture if they should harvest their corn early and dry to storage moisture conditions.

Normal harvest loss at the earliest safe cribbing time is about three per cent without drying facilities. Experiments have shown, the engineer says that losses increase at the rate of three per cent per week during the next four weeks of harvest.

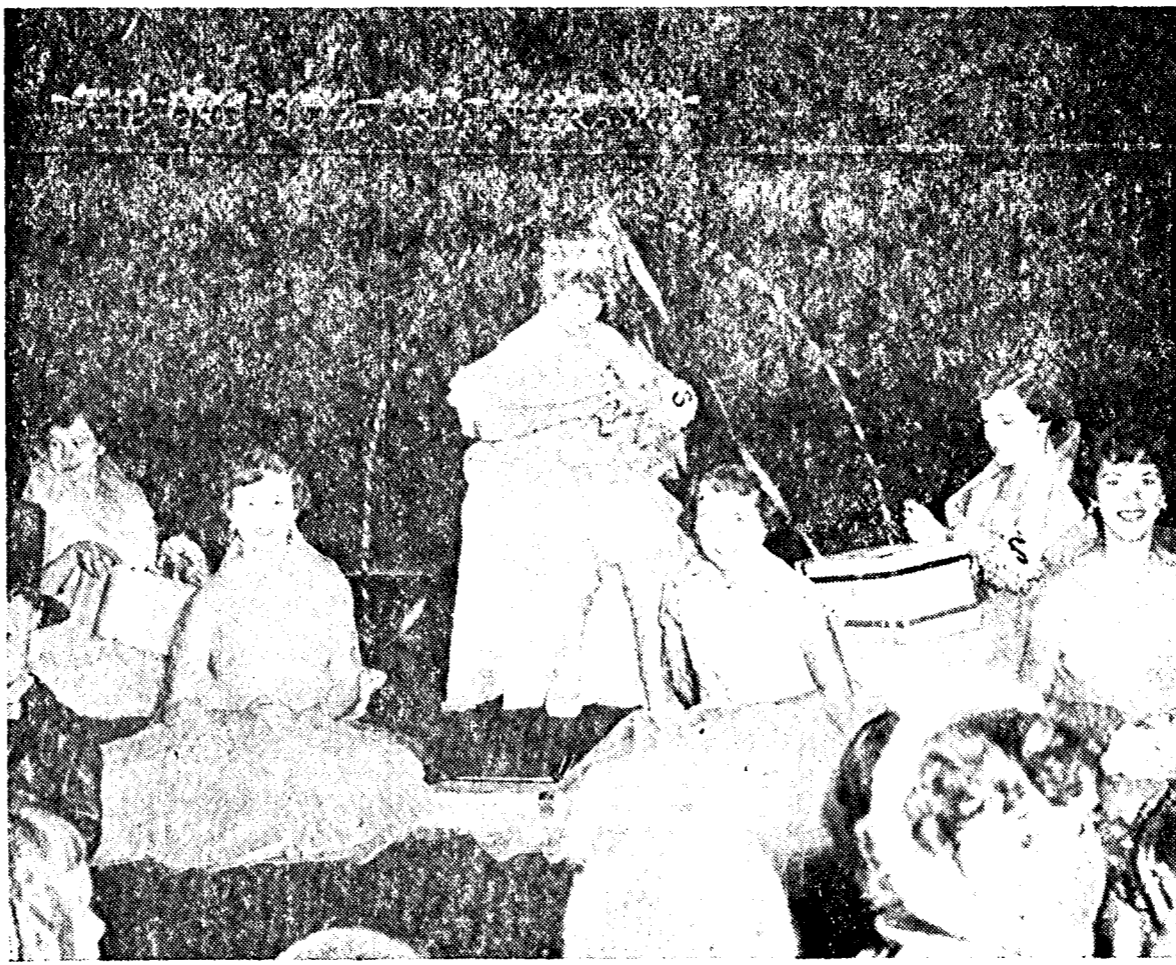

This will be opened with a proclamation by Gov. Robert B. Crosby, who was also present at the meeting. He was named an honorary member of the group.

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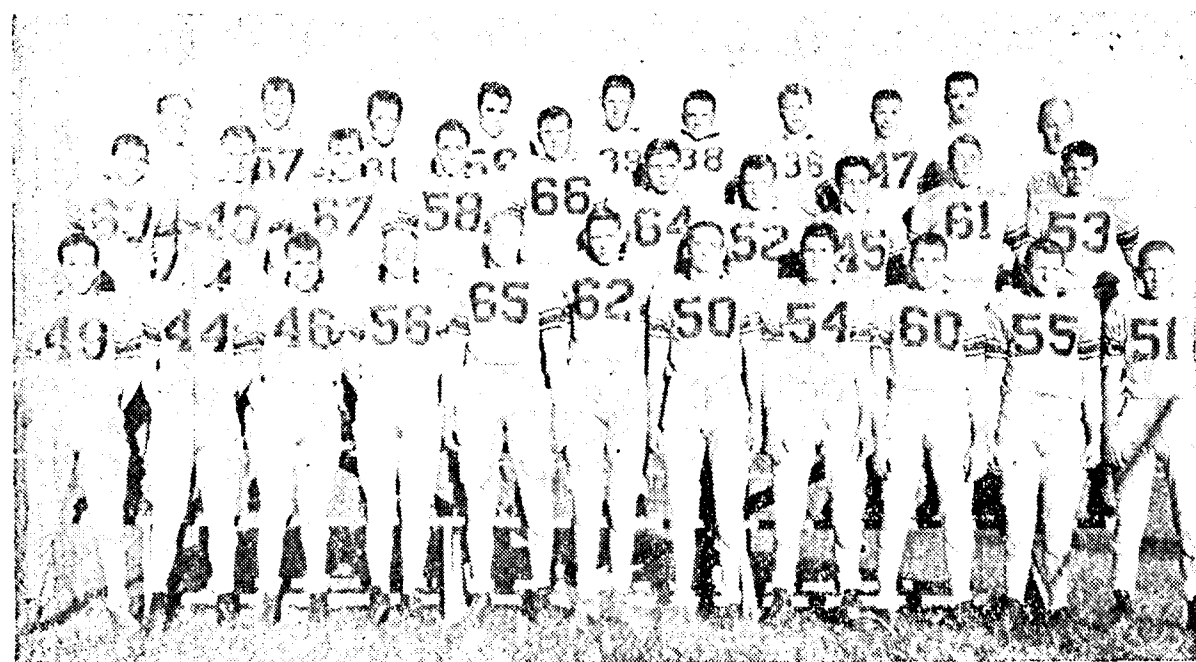

Most of the early game limelight shone on Arcadia Back Jim Carmody. Jim broke away for a spectacular 55 yard run in the initial canto.

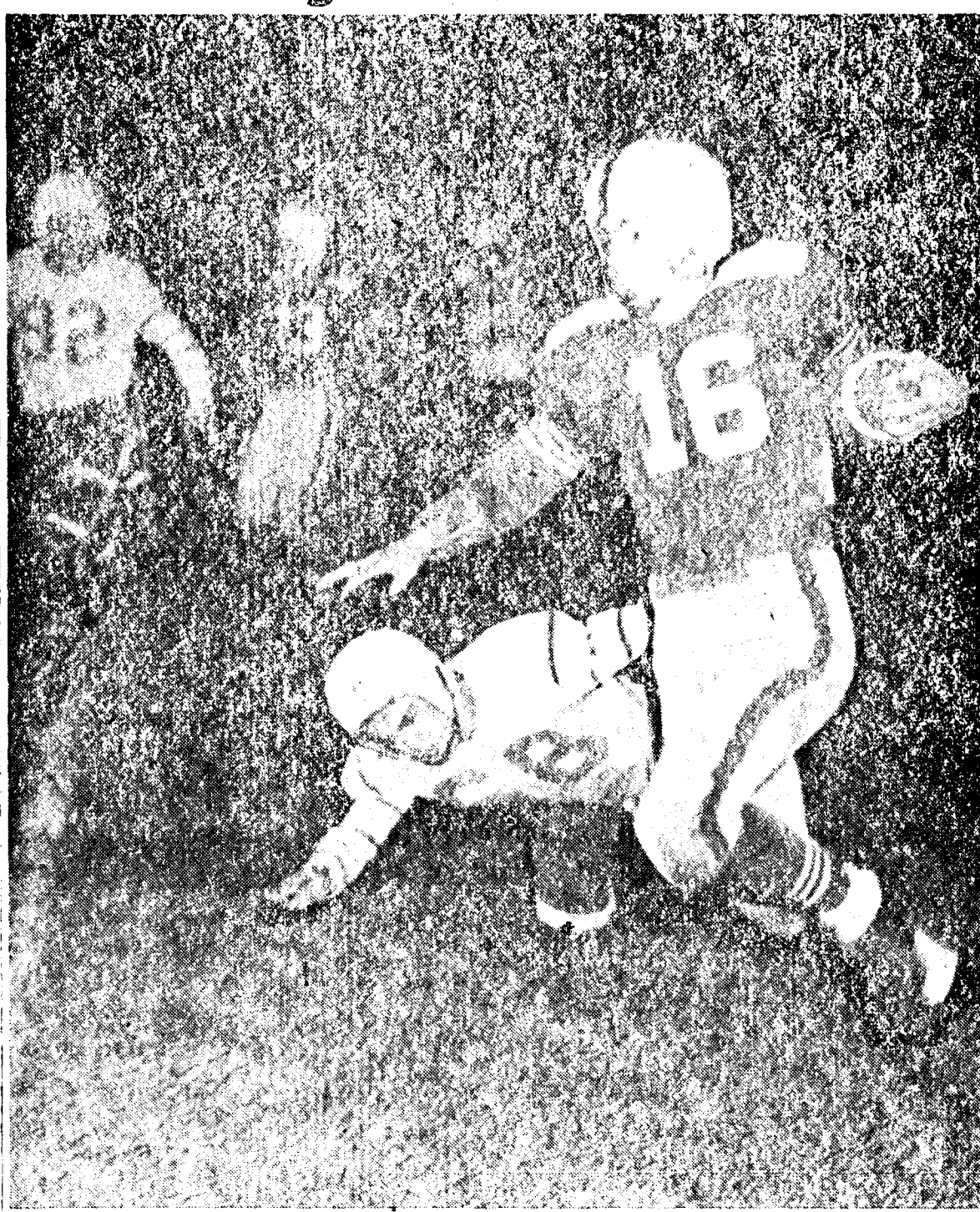
During most of the second quarter Arcadia retained possession. The Huskies racked up 19 first downs then pushed Back Bill Tuning across for the second counter.

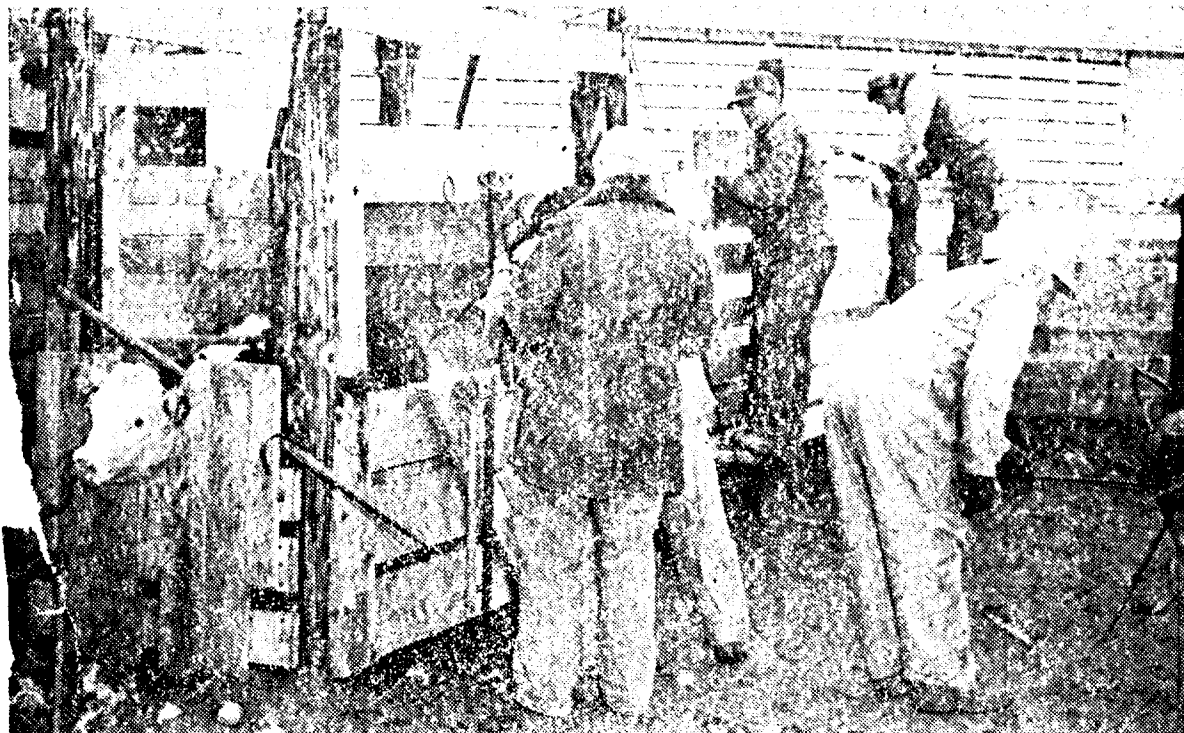

But the crew worked on tirelessly. Starting at eight in the morning they finished the 209 head of steers and heifers just before two o'clock.

Ward's Cokin' Column

Times have not changed much for us since we moved to Erierson. In North Loup we were on Highway 11. There we could hear the big trucks and transports go past any hour of the day or night.

Watching those big trucks wheel by I am reminded of the way we took stock to market fifty years ago. All stock shipped then had to go by railroad.

We usually got away about sun-up during the cold weather. The hogs to market and unloaded by noon, ate a dinner at the cafe then hauled a load of coal or building material home.

We always figured it would take about three hours to get the hogs to town, a distance of 7 or 8 miles. Today, that much time would take the hogs nearly all the way to Omaha.

When the train stopped, or started, there would be a couple of inches play in each pair of coupling bolts, and this would make a severe jolt at every change of speed. Those waycars had a seat along each side. One time I had just got to sleep on one of them, lying with my head to the front and my feet to the rear when the train stopped.

Back in those days the Rumbauchs had a huge flock of turkeys which they wanted to ship. Hauling several hundred of the birds in wagons would make quite a caravan, so they drove them. "I recall it was more than 30 miles, but the drivers took their time, and the turkeys put on weight by gobbling every grasshopper in sight along the way. They made the trip to Burwell in two days.

In those days most stock went to market on special trains, with only an occasional car on the regular freight. Old Quiz issues report special shipments several times a week, with often 100 cars or more. O yes, those special trains would often travel all night to get to Omaha, to the detriment of both the cattle and the men who went along. Trucks now cut the time in half or less.

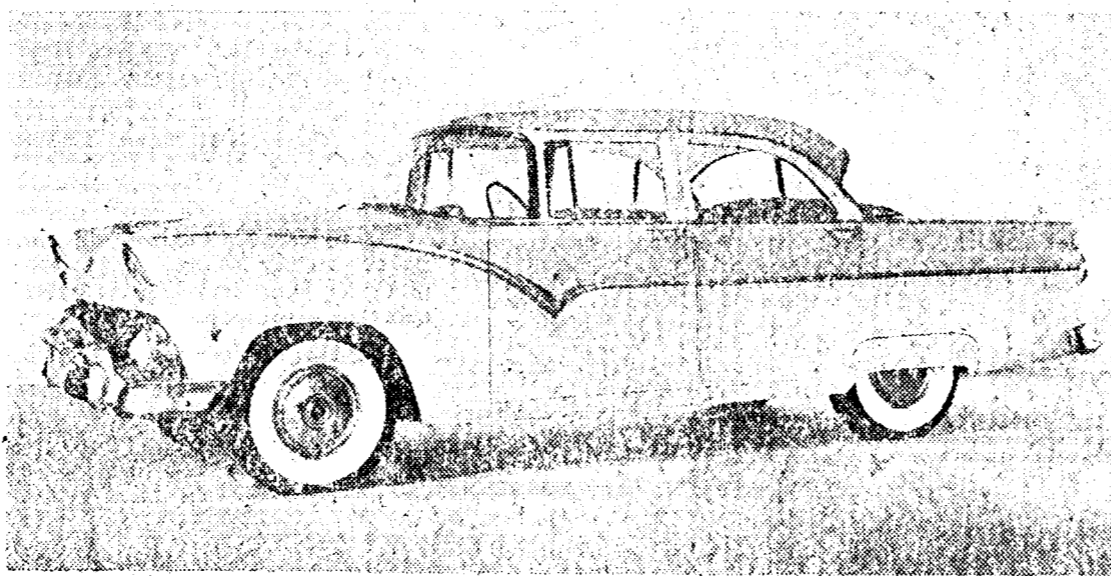

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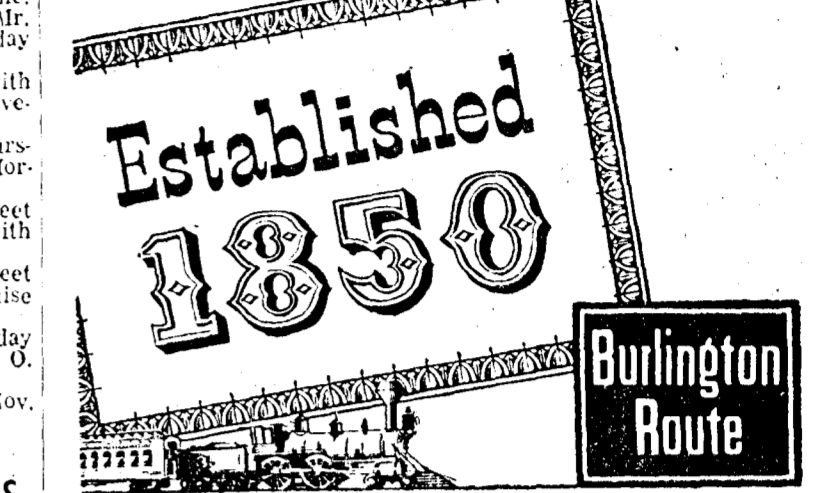

## State Audit Gives Courthouse Okay

**Minor Points Voiced to Sheriff, Clerk and School Superintendent**

All Valley county offices are in good shape, a state auditor's report indicated this week.

The report, approved by Ray Johnson, made only two or three recommendations.

The auditors discovered over recommended fees of \$150 in the offices of Leonard Woods, county clerk, then said there was no entry in supervisors minutes to indicate they had purchased \$4,000 worth of equipment from the Nebraska Tractor and Machinery Company.

The report also said, "We have previously called attention to the fact that this county does not require claims to be on file by most individuals drawing a regular monthly salary. There is no record kept in the minutes of the board proceedings of salaries paid to officials or regular full time employees. The salary payments are also omitted from the publication of the county board proceedings."

The report further stated: "We note deputy county clerk is paid a salary of \$185 and in addition draws \$15 each month for clerical work. It is also noted the county clerk's salary is \$216.66 and the warrant is drawn for \$241.66. The allocation of the \$216.16 is made to the clerk's salary and the other \$25 is charged to Miscellaneous on the budget for courthouse and grounds. Payments of \$25 per month started July 1 to the county clerk."

To county supervisors the report pointed out:

"We wish to inform this board that we do not have on file a copy of the sheriff's return on distress warrants to the county board. We do have on file a copy of the treasurer's return on the distress warrant issue of September, 1953. We note, in this return by the treasurer, that many names show no return by the sheriff. We believe it advisable for the supervisors to make a careful review of the distress warrant situation in Valley county."

To the sheriff the audit said: "We did not find a report to the county board on distress warrant collections."

To the county superintendent of schools the report said: "We recommend this office write receipts for all money received."

Next week the Quiz will publish a list of distress warrants issued September 24, 1954 covering the 1953 and years prior personal taxes.

Duck hunting improved slightly this week as hunters kept one eye on the skies and the other on office tasks for a quick retreat.

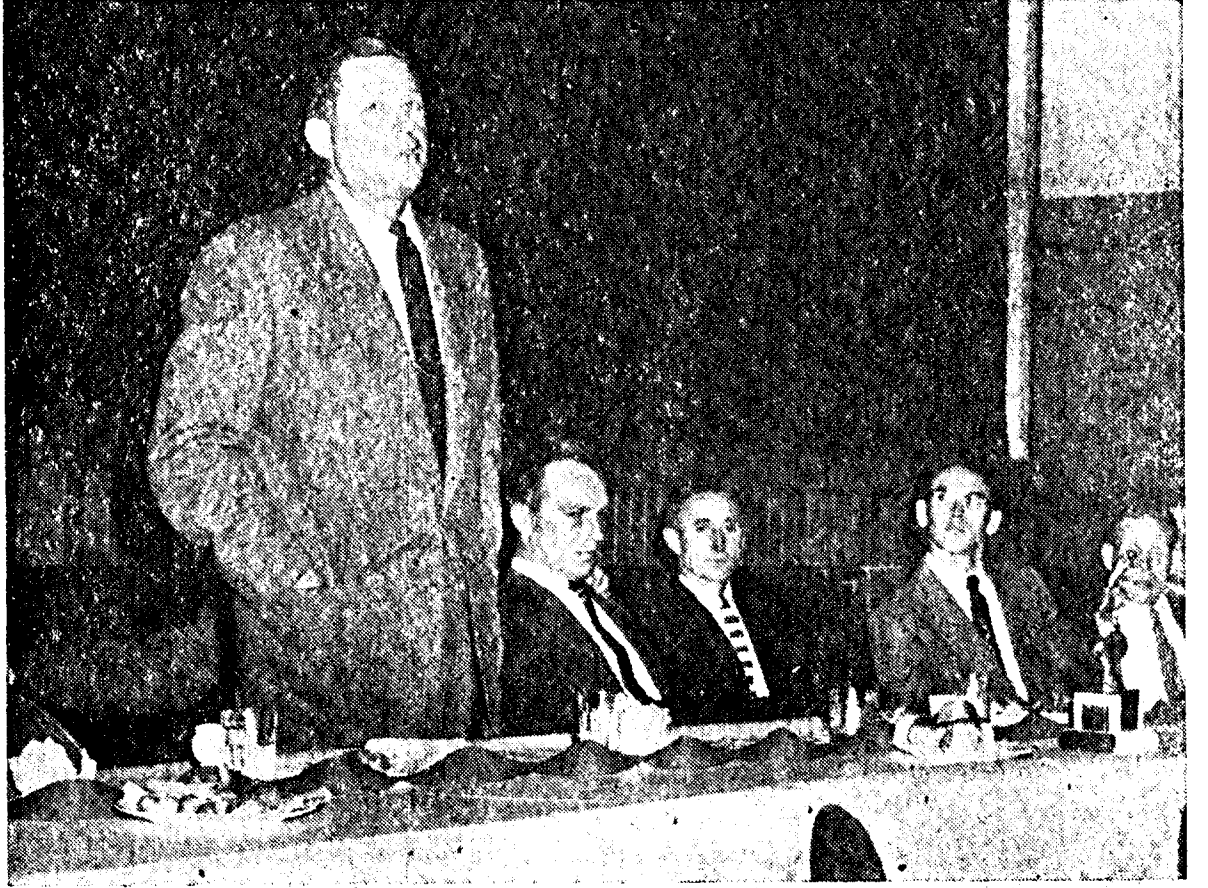

**State, County Accept New Sargent Road Contract Finished Under Overtime; One More Graveling Due**

Valley county and the state highway department have accepted six miles of new road running west towards Sargent, Ray Pockock, county engineer, told the Quiz Wednesday.

The complete cost of the project was \$83,000. In round figures Pockock said the bridges cost \$46,000, grading cost \$22,000, culverts cost \$10,000 and gravel cost \$4,000.

He added the contract was completed under a federal secondary road arrangement on a matching fund basis.

The construction has been checked by Pockock and state engineers. One more check must be made by federal engineers before the project gets a complete okay.

**Job Overtime**

Contractors went overtime on the job. Unless the overtime can be excused by contractors proving it was due to causes beyond control a per diem penalty may be assessed.

The Quiz could not determine the exact penalty. Some county officials placed it as low as \$15 a day. Others placed it as high as \$35 a day. The penalty can be waived by the state if final examinations warrant.

In overtime the Theisen Bros. company finished 56 days late. The Theisen firm had the grading contract. They were supposed to start on August 1. Work actually started August 27, Pockock said.

**Bridges Late**

On bridges the Diamond Bridge company of Grand Island was 15 days late. The Diamond firm started 18 days ahead of the start date but still finished after the 90 day allocated time.

Some of the delays were blamed on the late arrival of piling and cement. Weather was another factor. State officials will take all such claims into consideration before determining penalties, if any.

All bridges have been finished, all grading has been completed and the first course of gravel spread on the new road, Pockock said.

A second gravel course will be completed by the end of the year.

The new road starts at Highway 11 west of Ord near the cemetery. It bisects Michigan township for six miles and ends near the Rudolph Kokes corner.

## G. I. Firm Lowest on Sargent Canal

**Cops Sizable Earth Project for \$414,000; More Bids in Spring**

Diamond Engineering Co., Grand Island, submitted the apparent low bid on construction of the first section of the Sargent Canal.

The company's bid of \$414,711.95 was approximately 12 thousand dollars below the bureau of reclamation engineer's estimate of \$426,641.00.

Of the 10 bids read at the Sargent Legion hall Tuesday morning four were under the engineer's estimate.

The high bidder, the Bushman Construction Co. of St. Joseph, Mo., went about 135 thousand dollars over.

Principal items accounting for the nearly half million dollar phase of the irrigation project included excavation for canal waste ways at 15¢ cent per cubic yard, amounting to \$133,687.50; and concrete in structures at \$61 a cubic yard totalling \$66,010.

Forty-six items were included in the specifications.

Following the reading of bids Buchholz announced to the 40 representatives here Tuesday morning that there would be another call for bids early next Spring for canal construction.

The contract for construction of the Milburn dam has been awarded to Platte Valley Construction Co., also of Grand Island, according to the reclamation office in Sargent which reported a notice of the award had been mailed last Wednesday, Nov. 3, by Assistant Commissioner and Chief Engineer, L. N. McClellan, from Denver.

### FHA Girls Aid Christmas Seal Campaign with Envelope Stuffing

The Christmas seals, sold to fight tuberculosis were put in the mail the first of the week.

Katherine Helzer, Valley county chairman said 1700 letters were mailed.

The seals this year are two different indices alternating on sheets.

On the red seal are a boy and a girl each side of lighted Christmas tree topped with a star.

On the green seal there are three children. Both seals display the double barred cross.

None of the five children have features. They are "everybody's children."

The designer of this year's seals is Jorgen Hansen. The Christmas seal idea was started fifty years ago in Denmark. The choice of this design was a gesture in honor of the first seal sale.

Last year, Miss Helzer said, 575 letters were mailed back containing money. There was no reply from 1043 letters or 61.3%. Seventy-five letters were undelivered.

The sum of \$644 was collected from the letters. It was the lowest amount collected in five years.

Valley county had three patients in the state tuberculosis hospital in Kearney during the past year. Most of the money, raised from the sale of stamps, goes into the upkeep of state hospital.

Some goes for education on the care of patients. More is used for study in combating the disease.

The actual sale of Christmas seals will be launched on Nov. 22.

**Fall Cattle Run  
Jams Burwell Barn  
Auctioneers, Buyers  
Locked in Struggle;  
All are Determined**

by Bill Lee  
A Burwell cattle auction is 450 buyers entirely surrounding B. W. (Tiny) Wagner. Mr. Wagner and the buyers are locked in a never ending struggle. The buyers are out to steal the cattle, consigned to the portly Mr. Wagner, at the lowest possible bid. "Tiny" on the other hand, is just as determined they won't get the job done.  
Take the above conflict, mix it with 4,000 to 5,000 cattle of all sizes then add a rancher for seasoning. That's the recipe for any afternoon this fall at the Burwell Livestock market as the area resounds to the noise accompanying the fall cattle run.  
Last Wednesday was no exception. The barn was a melange of bawling cattle, pleading auctioneer's entreaties and sharp buyers. Over the three sifted a thick blanket of smoke, small talk and wise cracks.  
**Auctioneer Chants**  
A steady stream of cattle came through the chutes into the ring. The auctioneer started his chant. And the buyers responded with their individual set of bidding signals.  
The signals are difficult to catch. No buyer apparently wants another to know he's bidding. Some will look at the auctioneer. Others will remove a cigar from their mouth.  
Others will cross a knee and still others are "in" as long as they have their hat on.  
Knowing individual signs is a big part of the auctioneer's trade. He must be attuned to catch that flick of an eye. An almost imperceptible nod of the head, that means a jump in price. To help him three bid catchers stand at vantage points around the ring. A signal and the bid catcher yells, "Yep!"  
The auctioneer picks it up from there. And so on until the cattle are sold.

**Ranchers Help**  
Once in a while the bidding stalls. That's when the rancher is brought into play. Standing in the ring the rancher tells the bidders little known facts about the cattle. They may be "long haul" cattle. That means the shrink has been big and the offering is good. And there are hundreds of other rancher tid-bits all of which serve to increase the bid price 10c to 20c per hundred pounds.  
The ring isn't always reverberating to the steady drone and shouts of the auctioneer and bid catchers. Once in a while the cattle put on a little show of their own.  
Wednesday a wild eyed calf leaped to the backs of 30 or 40 others in the sale ring.  
Lloyd Geweke, an Ord buyer, saw the occurrence and said, "He's just looking around to see who's bidding!"  
A herd of Brahma-Angus crosses provided some fun when a pint sized calf charged a full grown horse.  
And a herd of Brahma steers, all over 1,000 pounds, had the boys busy for several minutes extracting one from behind the catcher's steel guards.  
It's a big afternoon anytime at the auction as long as the fall run is on. Stop up and see it sometime.

But take warning. Don't wave hello at anyone or brush a fly from your nose. You might wind up owning title to 40 head of prime feeder steers!

The fourth grade, taught by Miss Vybiral, presented a hill billy skit on crossing railroad tracks. The group was in costume. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jake Schmidt, Jean Ann, was a capable end woman.

The first grade, taught by Mrs. Goff, with puppets, recited a poem, Topsy Turvy. They also sang a song, The Clown, and demonstrated several action verbs. Then they presented a play.

The second grade, taught by Miss Soles, also gave a puppet show. With some excellent puppets the children gave a playlet, The Three Pigs. There was opportunity in the play for some choral work.

The first grade, taught by Miss Wicks, with letters and drawings dramatized the alphabet.

Students of the second and third combination grades, gave some pertinent safety rules. The same theme was also taken up by members of the fourth grade. Miss Swain is their teacher.

## Social Security Starts on Farms

Beginning January 1, 1955, social security insurance protection is extended by law to all farmers—including farm owners, operators, renters and workers.

Successful Farming magazine points out that after farmers pay in for the required length of time, they will be entitled to benefits for their wives and themselves of from \$45 to \$162.80 from age 65 the rest of their life.

Any farm operator who makes as much as \$400 NET profit in a year is entitled to the insurance and subject to the tax.

The tax for a typical farmer who owns and operates his own place is three percent of his net income up to \$4,200.

That would make the maximum social security tax \$126 per year.

**Farm Workers Eligible**

Most farm workers are also eligible for social security protection if they earn as much as \$100 in cash from any one employer in a year.

The employer deducts two percent from the workers' wages and pays two percent himself.

This means that it cost the farm operator an additional two dollars in tax for every \$100 he pays his workers.

Even farm operators who rent their land for cash are considered eligible as a farm operator in the social security program. Share operators have their social security tax handled somewhat differently. If the operator pays the owner a share, he is self-employed and pays his own tax. If the owner pays the operator a share, he is a worker and the owner pays the tax.

**Must Get Cards**

All farmers are required to get a social security card as soon as possible at their nearest social security office.

Social security tax is figured on income turned in for income tax through the Internal Revenue Service.

The first social security payments will be made as part of the 1955 income tax which will make the first payments in 1956.

## Inquiring Reporter

Most Valley and Garfield county farmers have yet to make up their minds as to whether or not they like the idea of compulsory social security.

Several told the Ord Quiz in a street survey Saturday they haven't had time to digest the act. Others preferred to voice no opinion.

Generally the farmers favored the plan.

Here was the question: What do you, as a farmer, think of the social security plan which becomes compulsory Jan. 1, 1955?

Edward Shoemaker, farms 760 acres five miles southwest of Ord: "I am undecided. Yet I can see where older farmers, who become eligible quickly for the plan, might like it."

Jens Nelson, farms 90 acres near Ord and another 100 south of here: "I am undecided. But regardless of whether we want it or not it looks like we'll have to get it."

L. M. Sautter, farms 600 acres four miles southeast of Scotia: "Generally I'd say the idea is all right. I've been reading about it in Wallace's Farmer and the plan seems okay."

Clarence Williams, ranches 1400 acres near Burwell: "Haven't made up my mind so I have no opinion. I've been under social security once before when I did some road work so I guess I'll just get my old number again."

Guy Cone, farms 160 acres 10 miles east of here, "I'm pretty much in favor of the idea."

James Blesse, share rents a quarter section eight miles northeast of Ord: "No opinion. Will have to discuss and read about it more."

Glen Wagner, farms 500 acres ten miles north and east of St. Paul: "I have pretty well accepted the idea. Old farmers should like it but it may be a burden on young farmers just getting started. Old farmers will probably farm just enough to get the six quarterly payments and then move to town and draw the pension."

Ben Sintek, farms 120 acres of irrigated land near North Loup: "Undecided but I believe the payments should be scaled to age. The old farmer, who will soon be eligible, should pay more than the young farmer who can't draw it for 40 or 40 years."

Mrs. Glen Wagner, (farmer's wife): "I don't like it!"

Mrs. Ben Sintek, (farmer's wife): "Just like my husband I'm undecided."

John Knapp, farms quarter section in Springdale: "I think the plan is right but the age for retirement should be reduced to 60 instead of 65."

## Family Without Radio a Rarity Survey Indicates

The family in Valley county that does not own a radio is a rarity, Mrs. Merle VanZandt told the Quiz this week.

She added there are more and more families buying television sets.

Mrs. VanZandt, employed by Pulse Inc., has made an extensive survey here during the past few months. She determines what shows are being heard. She has worked in Sherman, Loup, Garfield and Greeley counties.

Her polling technique is called the "roster-call method." She goes from home to home, shows the householder a list of programs then asks what shows were heard the preceding hours.

She also asks what radio or television show was listened to from 8 to 12 the evening before her visit. She attempts to determine what programs were listened to during the morning and afternoon.

She is supposed to make 30 calls a day and forty are made Saturday. One half of the homes visited are in town. The other half are rural.

She has found only one resident who refused to answer questions.

Mrs. Van Zandt said her survey reveals radio stations in Omaha, Lincoln, Lexington and Grand Island are the most popular. Women seem to be interested in serials. They plan work so they can listen to Helen Trent and John's Other Wife.

Young folks listen to the music and cowboy stories.

In the rural homes, the radio is used extensively to get weather, market reports and to determine what programs were listened to in the news.

She said many women, in answering questions as to the program being heard at the time of the visit, say they have "just turned it off."

Many women believe the question is another quiz program and that they will get a gift if they answer right.

Mrs. Van Zandt said she had finished her survey here. The result will be made public soon.

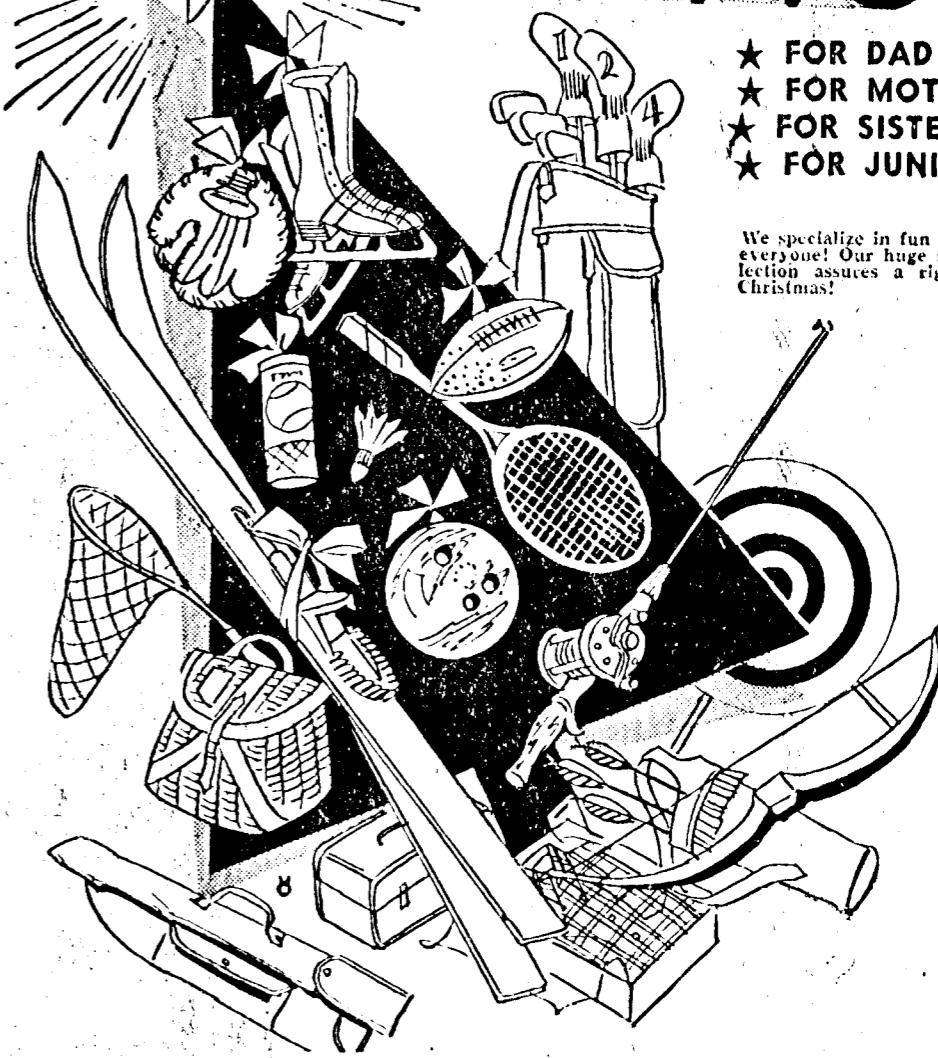

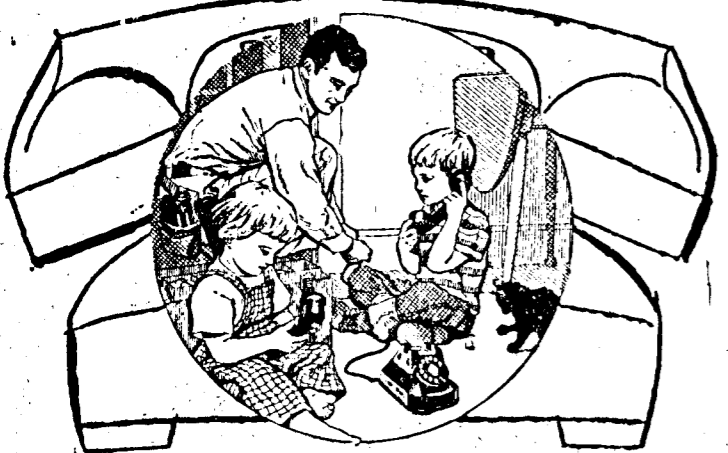

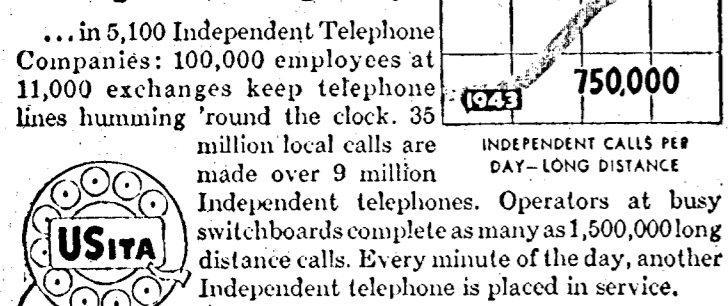

# 2,000 Witness Ord-Seward 0-0 Deadlock

## Conference Classic Draws Record Breaking Gate; Ord Muffs Chances

An estimated 2,000 frantic fans saw the Chanticleers completely dominate the first half of the Ord-Seward Central Ten conference championship game here Thursday afternoon in disbelief as the Ord phalanx muffed at least two chances which could have gained the crown.

The contest ended 0 to 0. Ord and Seward will share the Central Ten limelight as co-champions.

Four first half fumbles, all recovered by a scrappy Seward crew, nullified any scoring punch Ord might have mustered. One fumble occurred on the Seward 25.

That was the deepest the Chants penetrated. Thereafter they were confined to midfield or else kept busy fighting off the Bluejays who came back strong in the second half.

**Seward Starts**

In the second canto Seward started on their own 35 to drive steadily downfield with several spreads up the middle and around end. The drive ended on the 17 when Virgil Falter stole the ball for Ord.

Ord failed to gain then booted out to about the 10. Seward took over again. A spread yielded several yards and Dean Flock, the last man in line, saved a touchdown by dropping the ball carrier after a completed pass.

Seward made it first and ten with three minutes to play on the Ord 19.

**Ord Stiffles Threat**

Two plays later Ord intercepted a short pass on the Ord 7 to regain possession and stifle the Bluejay threat.

Ord moved out to their own 35 when the game ended.

**Run Thrills**

Ord Back, Ron Babcock sent pulses into high gear with a spectacular run late in the game. Ron latched onto a free ball then raced up the sidelines into the Ord end zone.

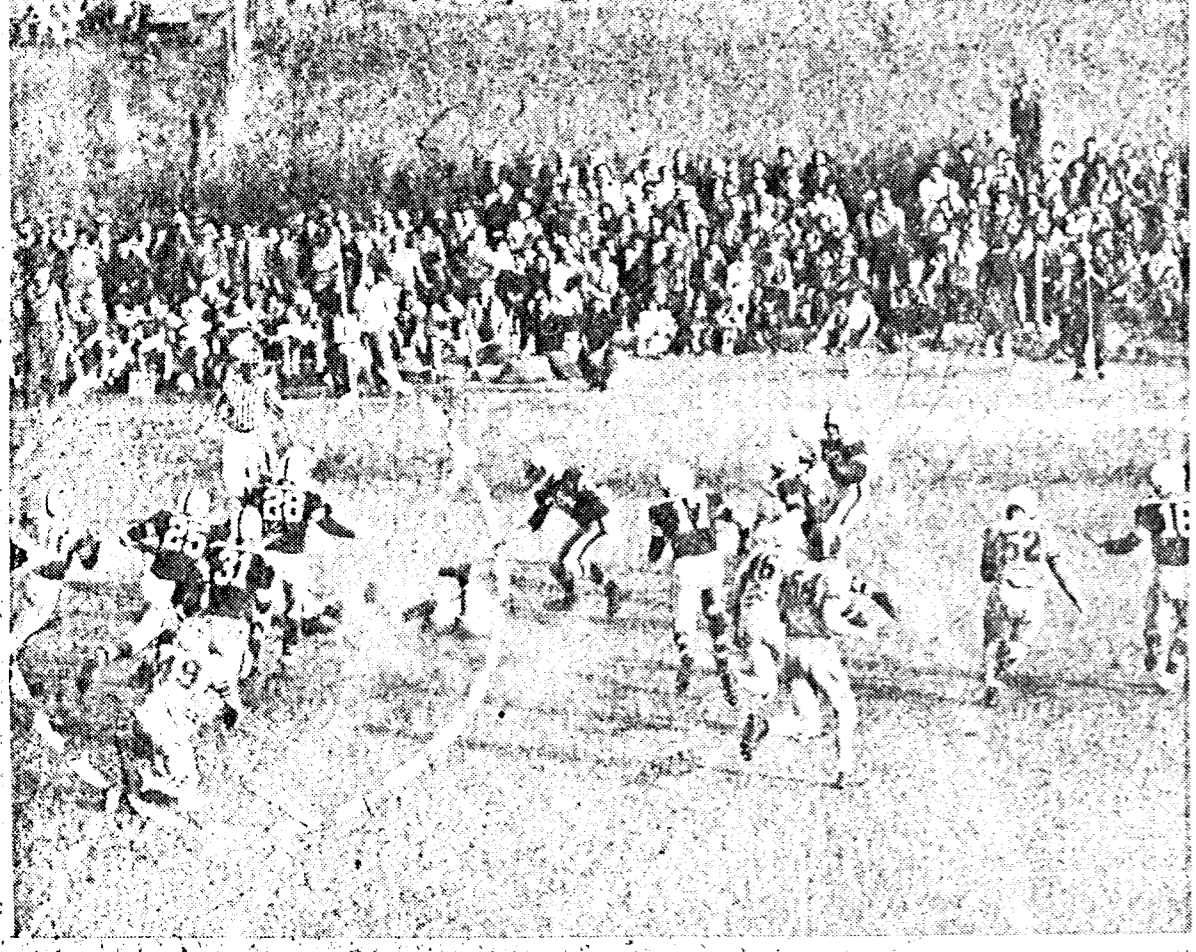
The play was called back however. Officials ruled the play an incomplete pass. The ruling sent a ming sized groan heavenward from the Ord grandstand.

In the first half Ord managed to gain eight first downs for 90 yards while Seward was netting 56 from three.

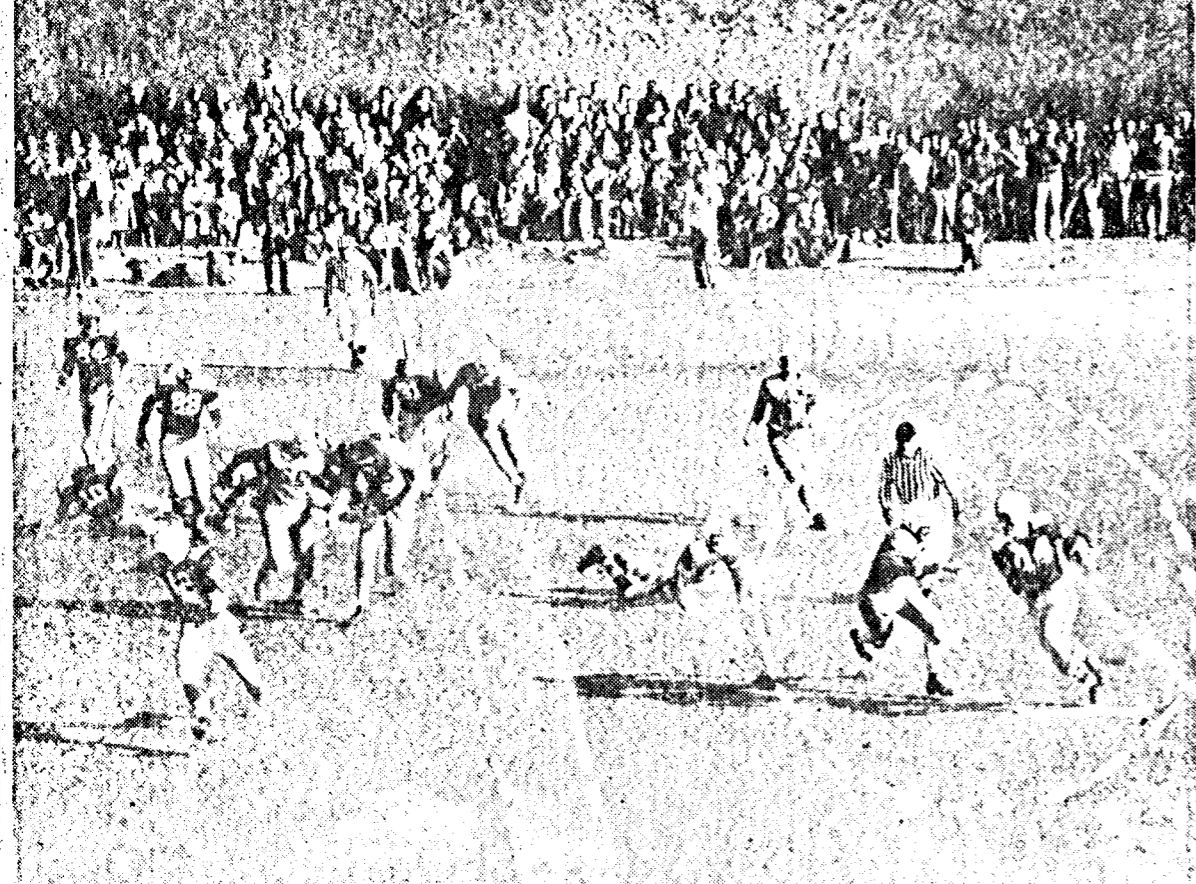
In the second, dominated by Seward play, the Jays gained 92 yards with six first downs while Ord could only manage 45 yards from two.

Statistically the game reflected the score. Ord gained 135 yards from 10 downs with Seward netting 141 for 9.

The east and west stands were full. Along the sidelines, following the play, trooped several hundred Ord and Seward spectators. At times the sidelines stood five deep on the field edge.

**Weather Perfect**

The day was perfect football weather. A bright sun lit the field until about three o'clock. Then it yielded way to clouds accompanied by a chilly east wind. Enthusiasm was so high few felt the discomfort.

Prior to the game the Firehouse Five plus Seven met the Seward bus near the county fair grounds. The band had been augmented for the occasion by the addition of several Ordlites home for the game.

**Rally Staged**

The band brought the Seward bus into the square to the Ord Grill where an impromptu welcome was staged. Coach Bowman, of Seward, former Ord Mayor F. L. Blessing, Reverend Keith Shepherd and Reverend Warren Porter made speeches to a highly partisan audience.

A banner proclaimed, Hello Seward, We're Glad You're Here!

Most Ord business firms closed for the contest. In others employees were allowed time out.

Summing up observers said the day was probably the biggest burst of enthusiasm in Ord history.

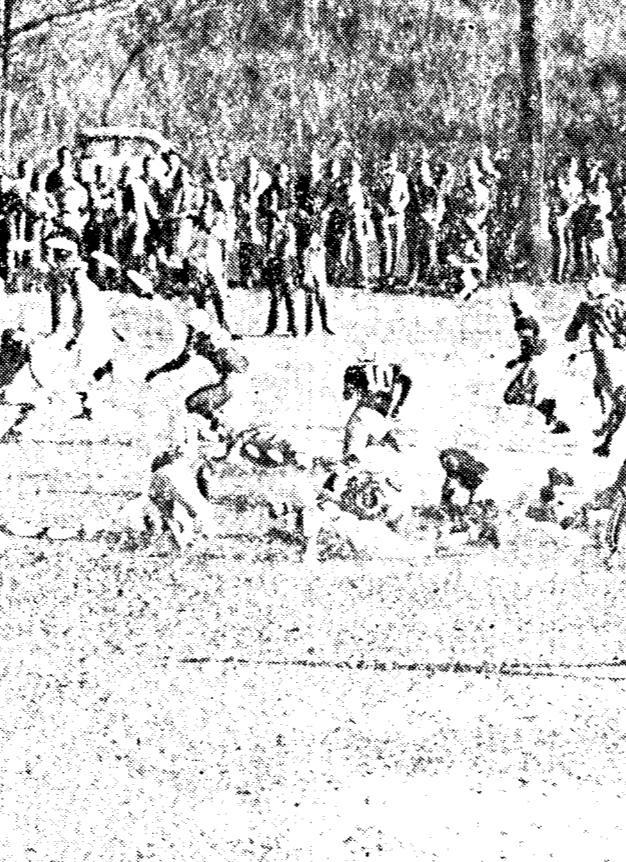

McBride was apparently impressed by Ord showings against Holdrege and Gothenburg. In Tuesday's edition McBride said:

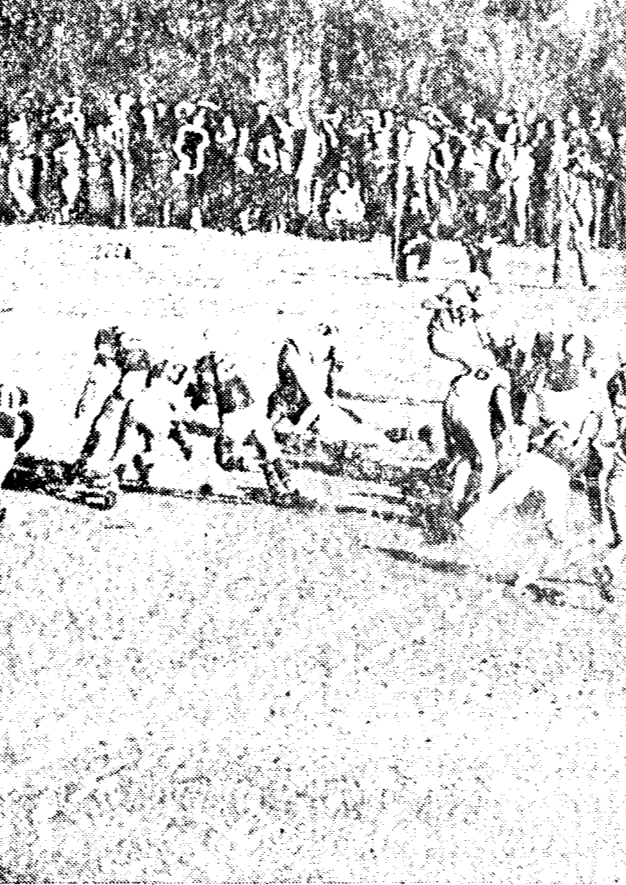
"Only losses were to Holdrege and Gothenburg both by one touchdown. Ranked on showing against leaders."

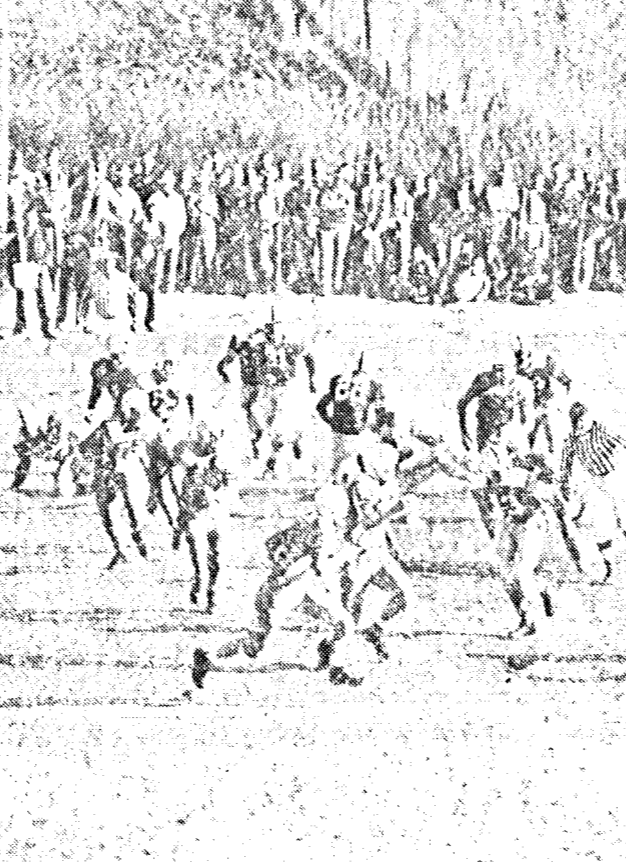

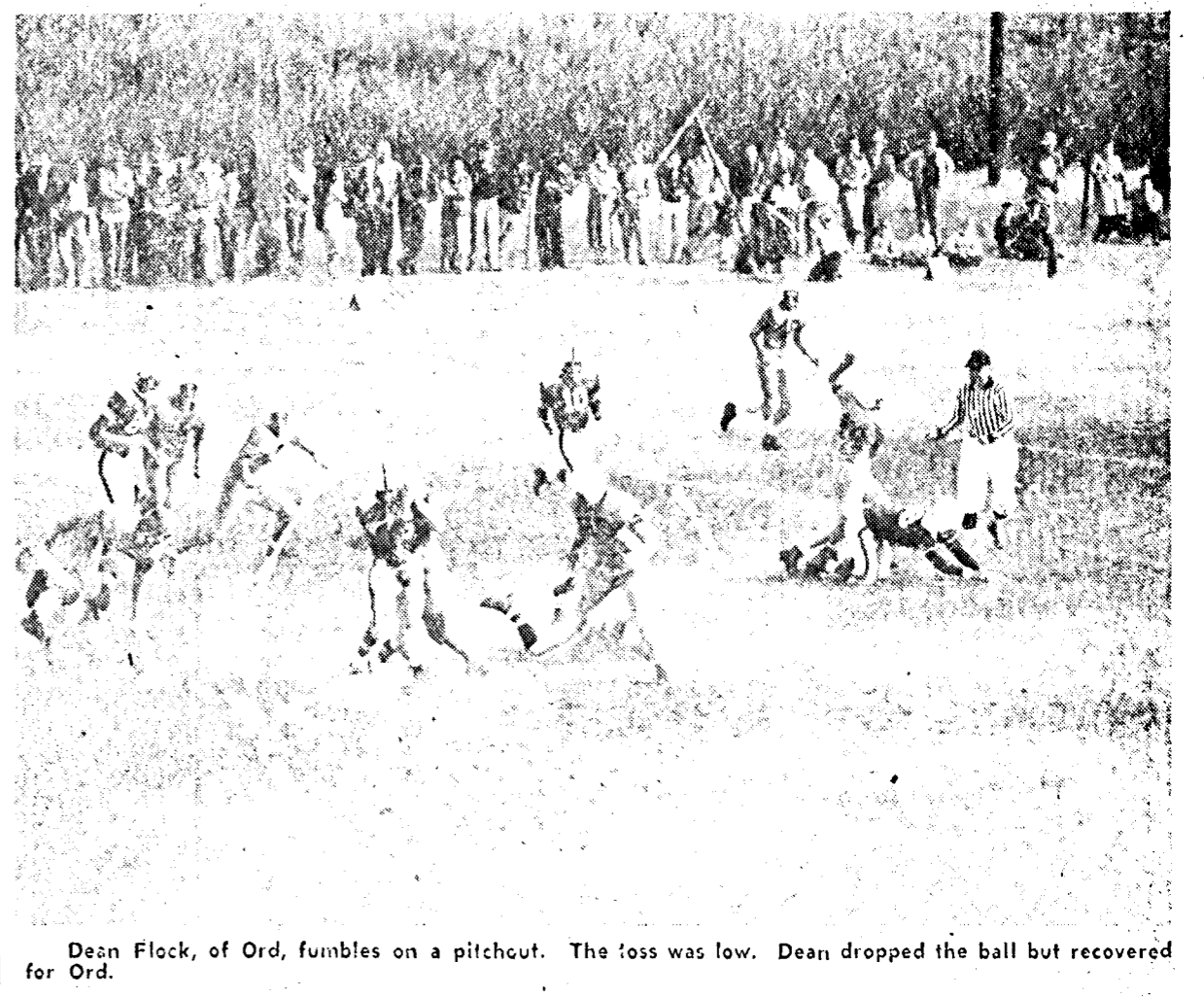

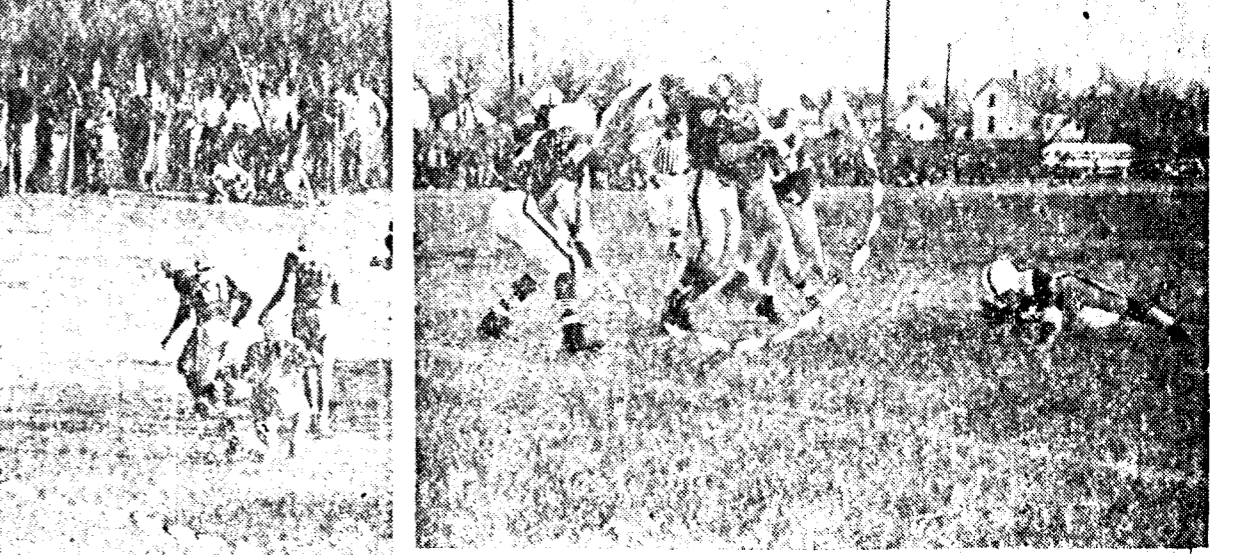
Ronnie Babcock (12) tries right end for a short gain. Ron's running and defensive play in the game rated the coach's nod for best.



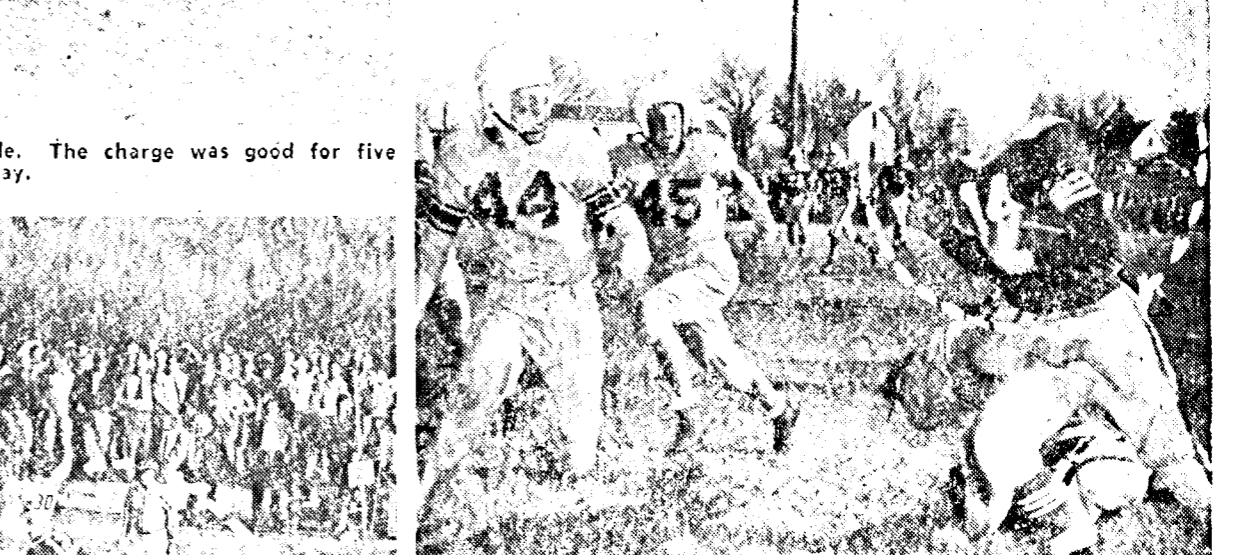
Don Kapustka (17) in another power run. It's Everett Davis (52) who has Don wondering where he's going now. All photos by Quiz telephoto and standard cameras.



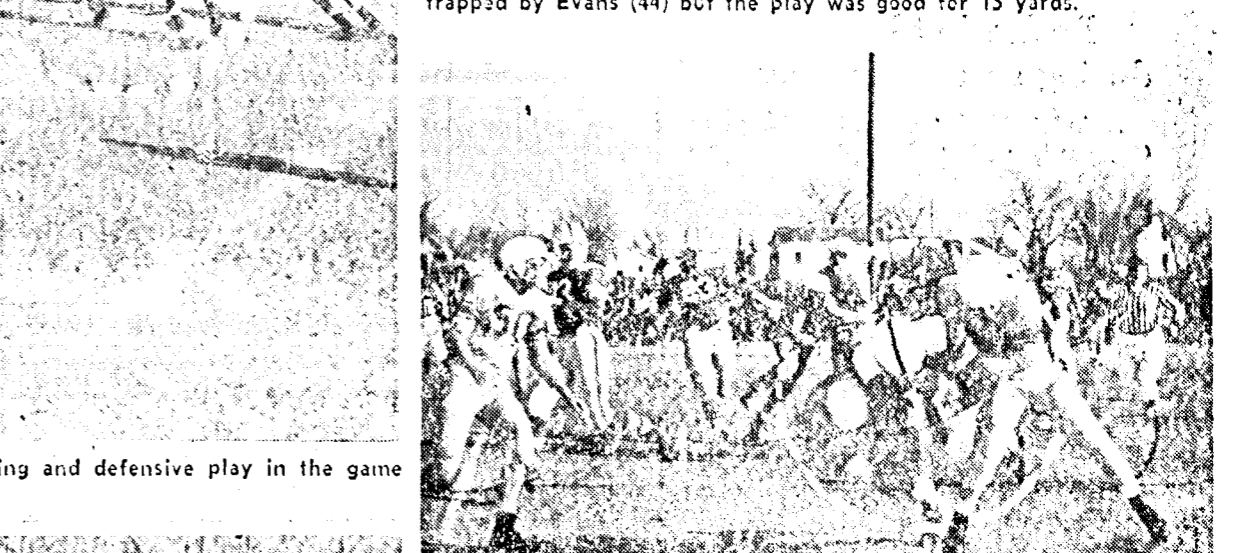
Dean Flock, of Ord, fumbles on a pitchout. The toss was low. Dean dropped the ball but recovered for Ord.



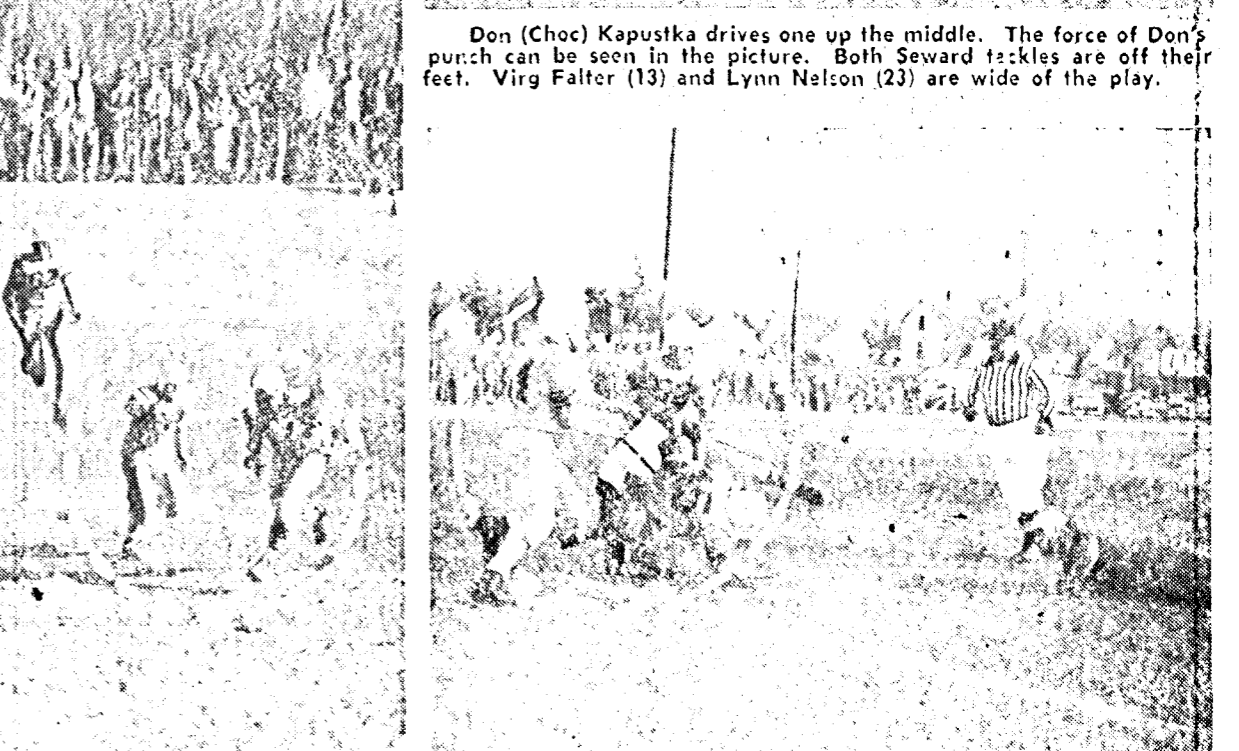
Ray Clark, Ord defenceman, makes a tackle. Ray hit this boy so hard he lifted him clear of the ground.

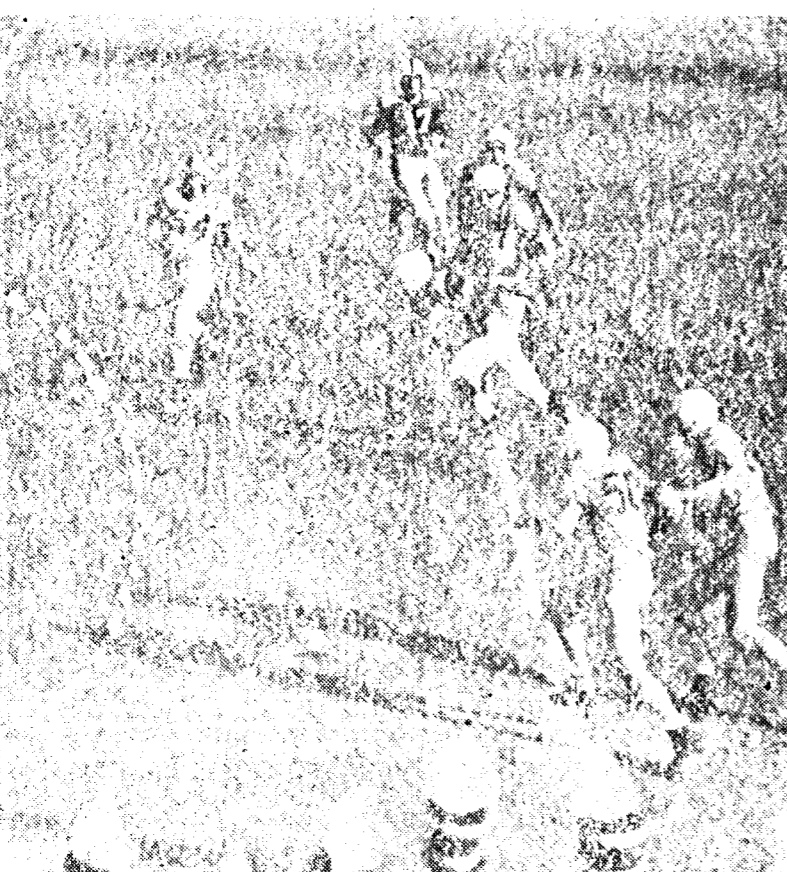

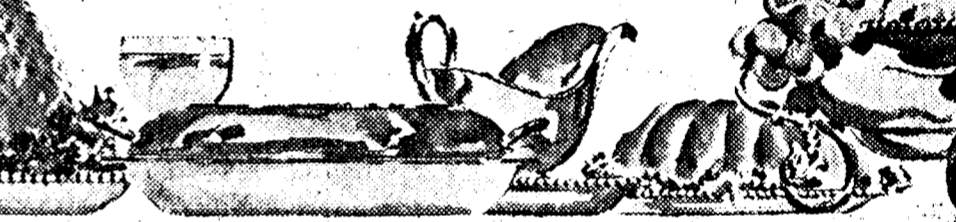

## Ord Firemen Seek Donations for Crash Truck Purchase!

### \$15,000 in Distress Warrants Still Unpaid Lists for '53 and Prior Years Show 179 Still Unpaid

Distress warrants, totaling about \$15,000 or about seven per cent of the total county tax budget, were still unpaid Wednesday at noon in the offices of the county treasurer.

But still a sizable backlog remains. The \$15,000 if unpaid will have to be made up by more widening tax papers when county dials set the mill levy.

Treasurer Lloyd Wilson said Wednesday last year he issued 326 warrants and 132 of them were paid by Nov. 25.

This year 301 warrants were issued. Ninety-five have been paid to date.

Here's the distress warrant list and the amounts for taxes uncollected for 1953 and prior years. About 165 persons have not paid.

### Head Lice War on in Schools

Schools here Wednesday declared an all out war on head lice.

Apparently lice have been creeping up in school rooms often enough to warrant action by school authorities.

Tuesday notices were sent to all parents.

The notices read:

"We have a serious outbreak of head lice in both grade and high school. Cooperation of parents is necessary so the lice may be wiped out. In the future any child found with head lice will be sent home—not to return until completely rid of them. Parents should closely check children's hair, be sure it is absolutely clean. If lice are found we recommend you secure one of several good treatments obtainable at your local drug stores.

This infestation is so scattered through the school there is reason to believe that any child in school could be infested."

### Census Progress Ahead of Average

Census completion results here were running slightly ahead of the state average in the agricultural survey, Director Emil Fafetta revealed.

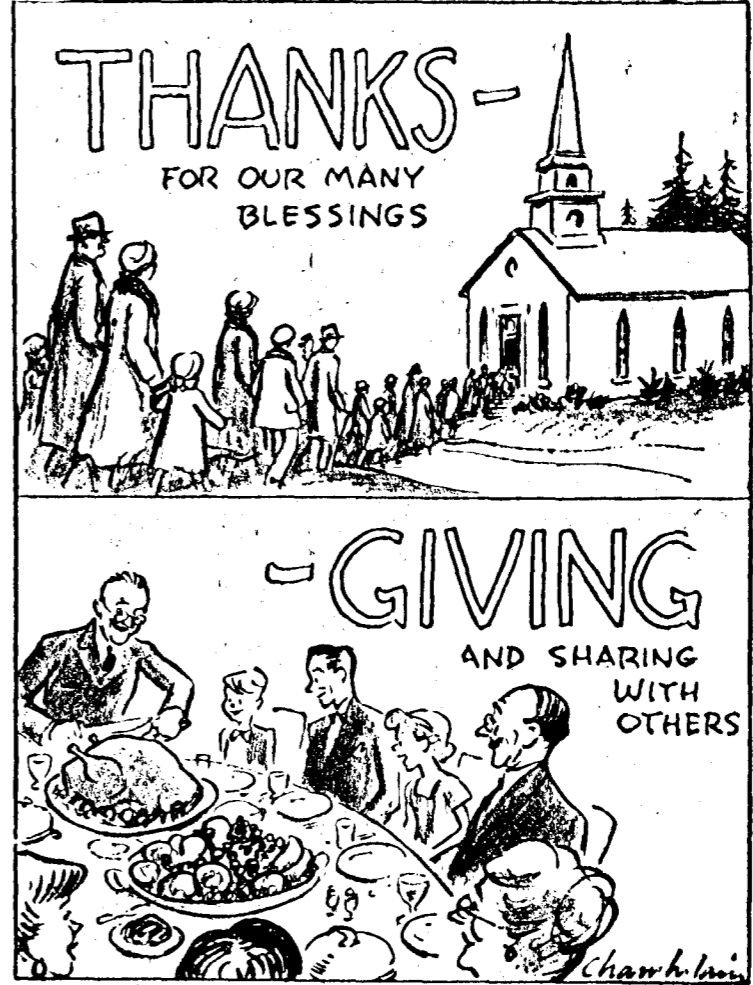
Fafetta said the Valley-Greeley nose count is "75 to 80 per cent" completed. The state average, according to news from North Platte, is 50 per cent.

Crews here were having no trouble.

"Most everyone has been quite cooperative," Fafetta said. "We had only one or two refusals."

Outside Money Offers to Rebuild to Suit Tenant on Old Site

The old Transit hotel in Ord will soon be nothing but a vacant lot. A crew of workmen headed by John Wojtasek, Ord contractor, will begin wrecking the building this weekend.

They plan to have the site cleared by Dec. 1. The lumber will be sold at public auction.

The property, owned by Sena Jones of Belvidere, was condemned 18 months ago by the state fire marshal.

Last week a court order was issued to demolish or repair the property. The hotel was the sixth of seven properties the city to receive action by the fire marshal.

All the others have either been removed or repaired. The last is a residence property in north Ord, owned by Wm. Heuck, on which nothing has been done yet.

Wojtasek told the Quiz as soon as the Transit site was cleared a group of private out of town investors would offer to construct a building to tenant's specifications. The corner property has an area of 125 x 125 feet.

### Polio Directors, Officers to Meet Here, December 14

Will Hear Talk on Salk Vaccine; Plan '55 Campaign

Officers and directors of the Valley county chapter, Infantile Paralysis Foundation, (polio), will meet in the courthouse at 7:30 p.m. November 26. President Stan Absalon announced this week.

The meeting has been called to plan the yearly polio campaign.

At the meeting, Chairman Absalon will sketch the development of the Salk vaccine which is currently being studied by the national foundation.

After wholesale vaccinations last year the results of the Salk tests will be released April 1, 1955.

"We are placing a lot of hope in the Salk tests," Absalon said, "but meanwhile we'll continue patient care until something is developed to stop polio."

Last year Valley county contributed over \$7,000 to polio to set an all time record. The per capita giving here was \$1.06, one of the highest in Nebraska.

Edward Swopes, Ord photographer, is the Valley county drive chairman this year.

### 'Nothing Alarming in Stock Losses', Says Dr. McGinnis

An Ord veterinarian, Dr. J. W. McGinnis, said Wednesday there is apparently nothing to be concerned about in several area livestock losses from "cornstalk disease."

Several area cattle have died within the last two weeks from eating cornstalks. The stalks produce a toxic condition. Losses have been reported from St. Paul, Burwell and public auction.

Dr. McGinnis said the disease is sporadic.

"It broke out about 20 years ago then died away until several losses were noted here a couple of weeks ago. But the death rate has been low," Dr. McGinnis said.

Cornstalks have a high feed value. Farmers have no way of telling whether or not the disease will break out. A farmer can only turn his stock into a field and then move them if toxin develops.

Doctors have no way of curing the ailment or preventing it, the Ord vet said.

He added most of the reported losses occurred about 30 days ago.

The Ord veterinarian placed no surmise in the "in fact," said Operator Harry Muirhead, "business is exceptionally slow for this time of the year."

### Business Women's Club Gives \$311.00 for Laura Anderson

Ord volunteer firemen, aided by the Business and Professional Women's club, started a drive here Wednesday for a crash unit.

The unit will be a panel delivery truck revamped to accommodate stretchers, resuscitator, welding torches, wrenches, jacks and first aid equipment.

Ready to operate the truck will probably cost \$1,200 to \$1,500. It will answer alarms with fire fire truck and stand by if needed.

The move is new among better equipped fire departments. It has been brought on by multiplying car wrecks, farm machinery accidents, and building collapses.

Victims Pinned

The only group capable of handling the accidents are firemen. They are usually called. Too many times firemen have arrived to find a driver pinned in a burning cab or a farmer crushed underneath an overturned tractor.

While the search goes on for equipment to move the vehicle time is consumed. Most times the victim dies.

The crash unit will give accident victims a better chance for life. At drownings it will have the resuscitator available.

Will Carry Jacks

On farm accidents it can furnish jacks and wrenches to free a pinned victim. On truck crashes it can cut an imprisoned driver from a crushed cab with an acetylene torch if needed.

To man the unit teams of firemen started preparations for first aid training. They'll be ready when the unit is ready to roll.

But the crash unit must be built by voluntary contributions from Valley countyans.

The firemen have an excellent start towards the \$1,200 goal. The Business and Professional Women started the fund with over \$300 contributed in memory of Laura Anderson a former BPW president killed in a motor crash near North Loup.

Donations Sought

But there's still another \$900 to be raised. To get the project going the firemen have purchased a second hand panel truck from the B and L Motors at cost.

The truck will be painted white and equipped as fast as donations roll in.

Rotarians Hear Irrigation Tips

Three Report to Club Following Wood River Tour

Rotarians Monday heard a report on irrigation from a tour in the Wood river area.

The report was placed out by County Agent Dale, Edward Kokes and Clark Weckbach.

The three told tour highlights among them this information:

"Farmers in Wood River, following corn picking, enter the fields with a stalk cutter. Plowing follows, then a fertilizer application is made to increase rotting. Irrigation status is immediately," the trio revealed.

Other informational tidbits were:

1. Wood River farmers spend as high as \$200 per acre for land leveling rather than use sprinkler systems.

2. Water pumping costs are 12¢ an hour with natural gas.

3. One 28 acre alfalfa and bromo field supported 200 head of cattle all year. The cattle were on full feed.

4. The big Wood River effort is to cut down production costs by eliminating labor. The break even price is near 50¢ a bushel. Here it is probably closer to \$1.

5. One farm boasts 13 wells on a 240 acre holding.

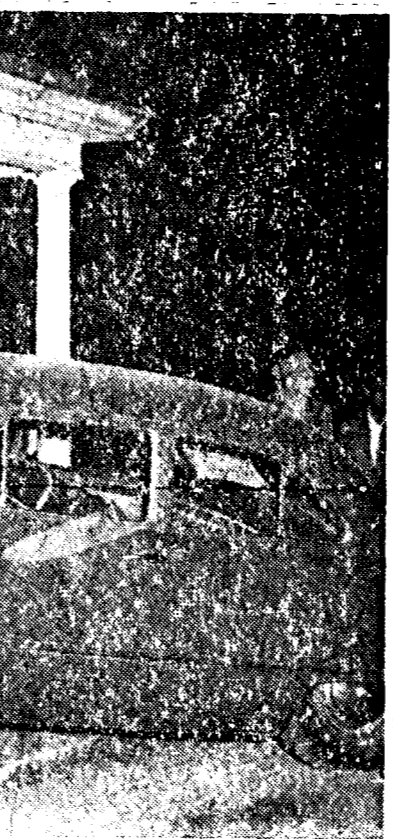
### Principal's Wife Named Scout Prexy

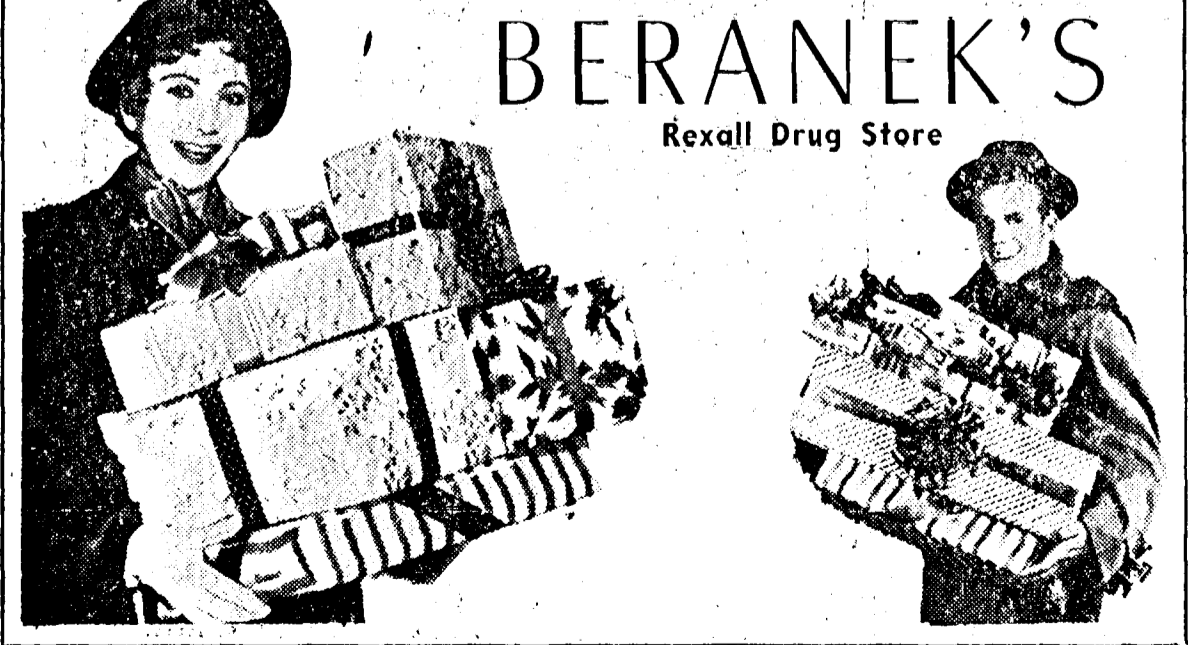

Fans here saw Evans in action in the Ord-Seward Central Ten Conference classic Veteran's Day, November 11.

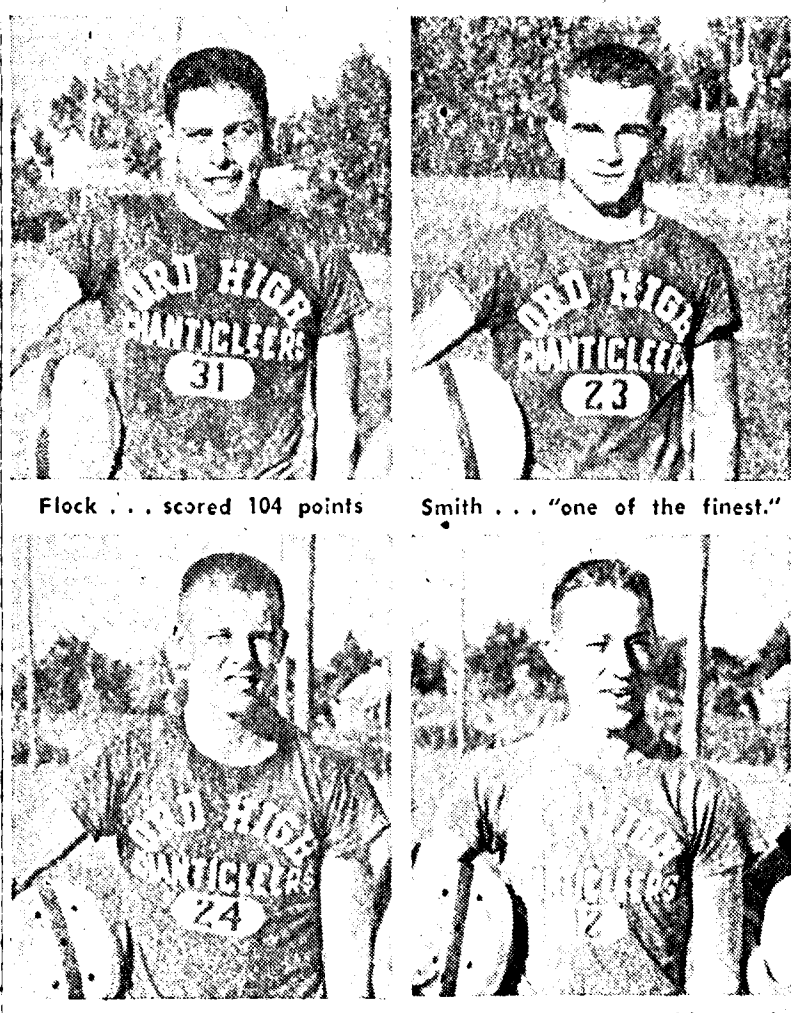
Three of the Ord men, Flock, Smith and Kokes, are seniors. Babcock is a junior.

It is a seasonal on each boy. FLOCK: Played fine defensive ball all season and consistently rated well up in securing tackles. Offensively he was the Chant's most consistent ground gainer. He scored 104 points and had five touchdowns.

SMITH: Termed by Coach Bill Gogan one of the finest football players developed in Ord. "Small, 140 pounds, Smith carried a big offensive load against far heavier opposition. His downfield blocking was excellent and his runback on punts was outstanding. Sherm was a converted back. His ball carrying ability stood out in past receptions. He showed a nice all around balance in handling important assignments. "A football player's football player," said team mates.

KOKES: One hundred and sixty-six pounds of rugged lineman Reggie was outstanding on offensive play at tackle. His drive was credited with being the reason the Chant "T attack worked." On defense Reggie shifted to end. He consistently turned plays in and was seldom, if ever, caught out of position. His all around play was so good Coach Bill Gogan, at the Cosmos banquet, said Reggie's position was a spot "never crossed" by the opposition. Lettered two years.

BABCOCK: Ron is a full back. His best facet was power running. His work in the Holdrege fray was so good opposition players made a special trip to the dressing room to compliment him. Ron drew heavy share of blocking assignments in the backfield. He handled them well and never whimpered. He showed tremendous improvement this year and probably will be a main cog in the '55 Chant attack. Coach Bill Gogan termed Ron the "best all around player on the field" in the Ord-Seward conference game. Lettered one year.

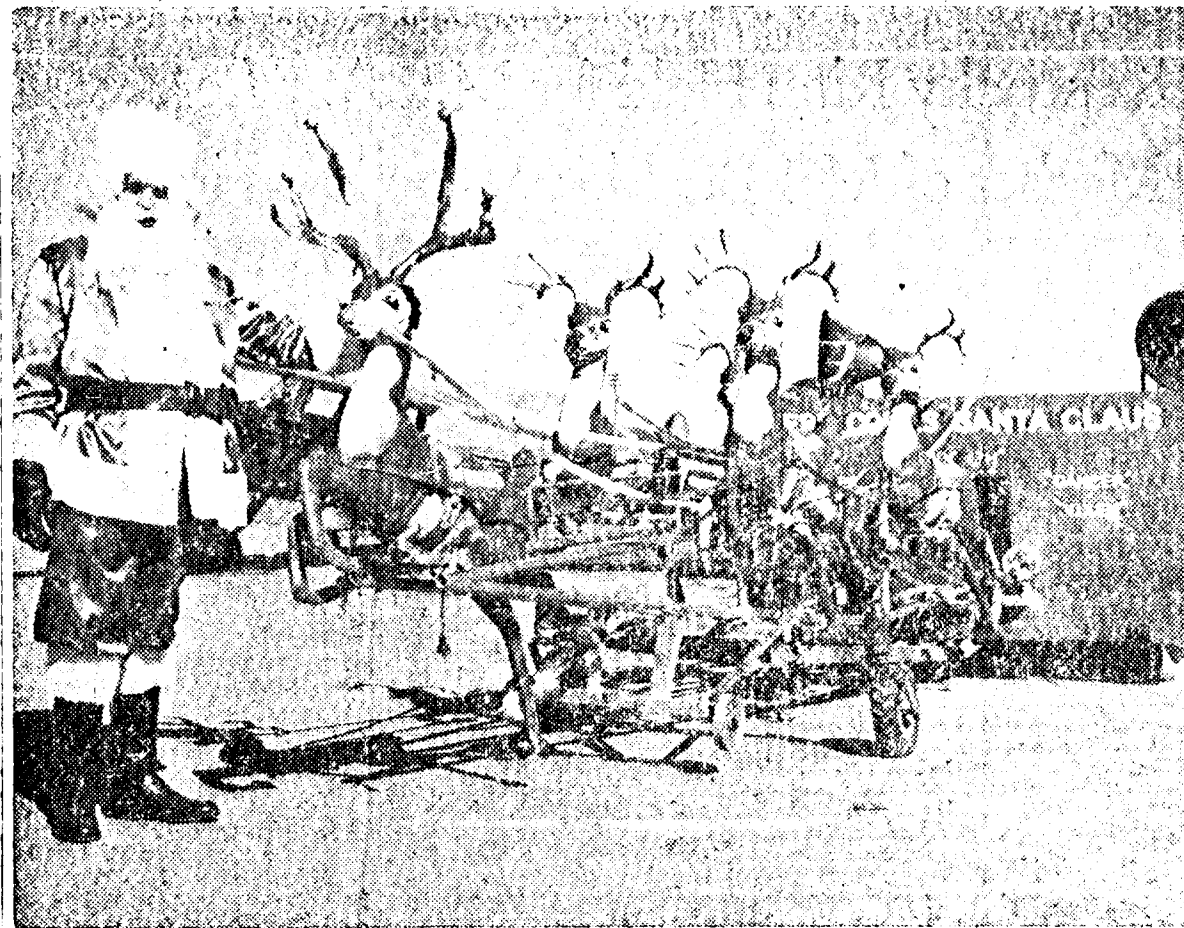

How To Candy Pineapple

What fun... what a saving... what feeling of accomplishment... and, on top of that, how easy it is to make your Candy Pineapple from canned pineapple. You'll use it in candies, cookies, cakes, and puddings during the holidays. But, by all means, be sure to save some to serve as a supreme confection just as it is.

Candied Pineapple  
1 can (1 lb. 4 oz.) sliced pineapple  
1 1/2 cups granulated sugar  
Confectioners (powdered) sugar  
Drain syrup from pineapple thoroughly. (Allow to drain in a colander several minutes.) Cover bottom and top of slices with the granulated sugar; store about 24 hours at room temperature. Empty into large skillet and boil 5 minutes; reduce heat and simmer 15 minutes. Turn occasionally during the cooking, taking care that it does not scorch or turn brown. Remove slices to a wire rack to dry about 24 hours. Pat sides and edges of slices heavily with sifted confectioners sugar. A crusty glaze will form after standing on the wire rack overnight. To retain crusty glaze, store in loosely covered container.  
NOTE: If surface is not dry after standing, re-roll in confectioners sugar.

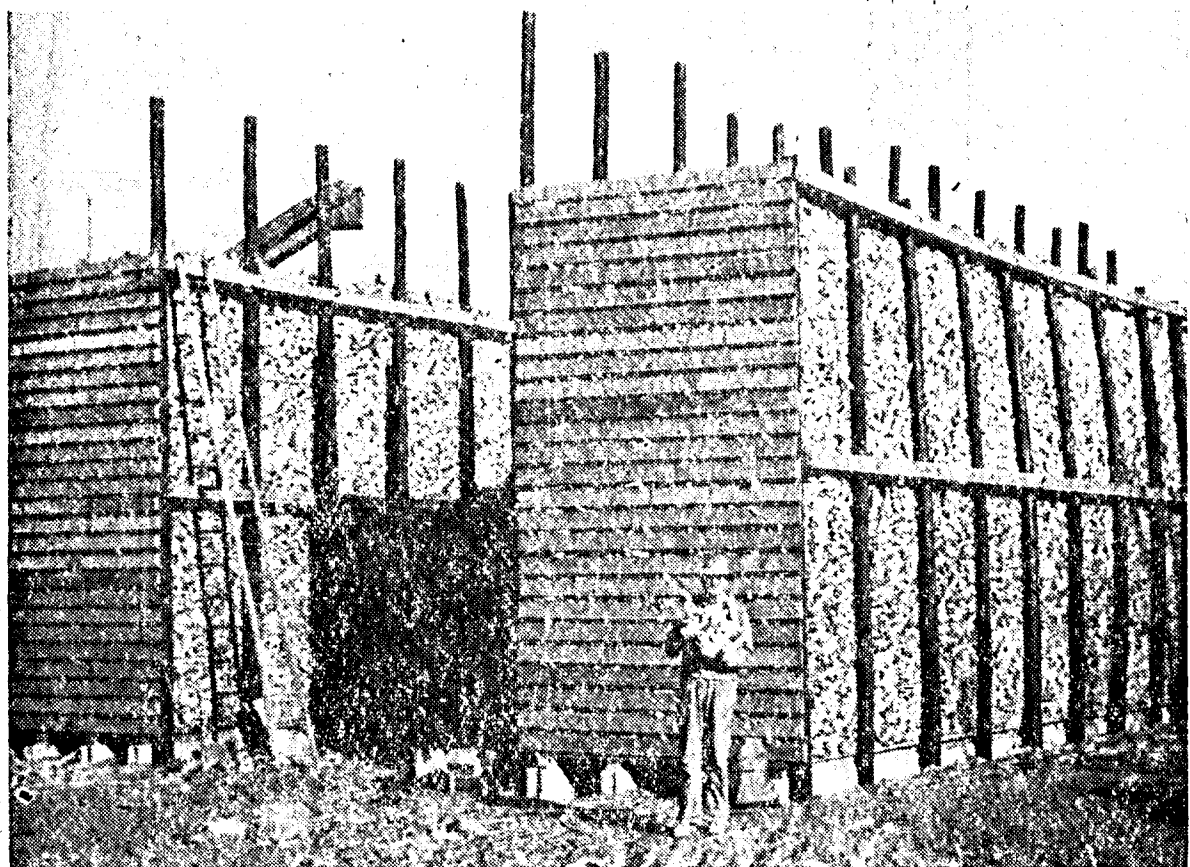

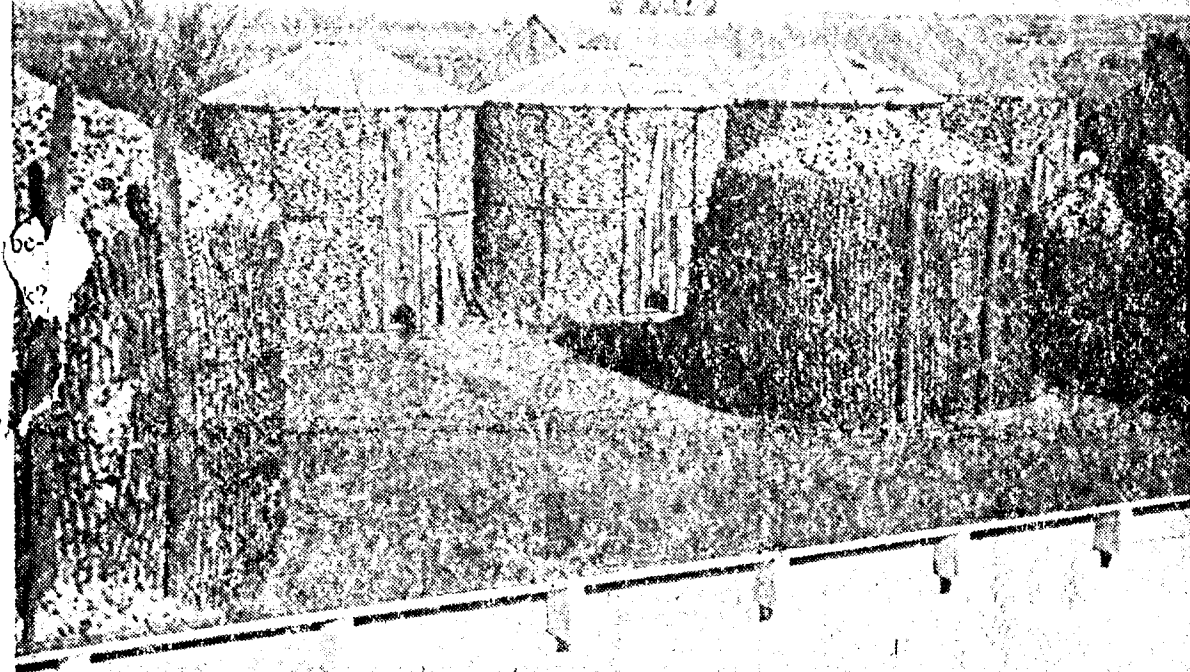

## Area Farmers Harvest Thumping Corn Crop; 100 Bushel Yields Seen

Most Valley county farm cribs were overflowing this week with one of the best corn crops on record. The yields this year were far over expectations voiced in July when the county shimmered under a heat wave.

Mid summer rains did the trick. That and some profitable irrigation moves by several dry land farmers.

County Extension Agent Carl Dale said the general yield for the county was "extra good" with the irrigated corn "the best we've ever enjoyed."

Piate said dryland yields of 50 bushels on single plots were not unusual. The general average was about 30 bushels per acre, he said.

Irrigated fields have reported well over 100 bushels in individual fields, Dale added. He said the general average for irrigated land yields was 65 to 70 bushels.

"Taking into consideration the mid summer heat wave that turned fields brown with white caps we can say it's been one of the best years for Valley counts," Dale concluded.

The Quiz checked a cross section of area farms last Friday and Saturday. The investigation bears out the county agent's belief.

**Zangger and Son Get 70**

W. O. Zangger and Son, reported 240 acres harvested with an average yield of 70 bushels. The farm is irrigated.

Charles Zangger, part owner, told the Quiz he and his father had "fooled around" more this year in experimenting with corn than perhaps any farm in the area.

The Zangger place was the scene of 43 soil tests prior to planting. A combination nitrogen-phosphorous-potash fertilizer (15-15-0) with added adrin was used as a starter.

Later 60 to 80 pounds of liquid or anhydrous ammonia was added as the growing season progressed.

The pair experimented with seven varieties of hybrid seed corn. And then to top it all off the remains of the seven were mixed and planted in a separate field.

"By golly," said Zangger, "you know that field produced as much as the best."

Charles said several methods and kinds of fertilizers were tried in varied applications.

**Biggest Surprise**

"But the biggest surprise we found," Charles concluded, "was the difference in hybrid yields. Sometimes they were as high as 25

bushels an acre and the differences were far greater than in where it was fertilized and where it wasn't."

Pressed for the reason for all the experiments, Charles said, "Well farming is sort of a challenge. We're out to get the best that the land will produce. If it wasn't for that farming, to me, would be pretty dull."

Another farmer, this time Ernest Lange of Mira Valley, has confounded the experts with an experiment there. Lange averaged two types of yields for the Quiz.

His dry land corn averaged 25 bushels. The irrigated land hit 70.

Lange installed an irrigation well this spring. He managed to spread water over 70 acres. He watered steadily throughout the sizzling July temperatures despite warnings by well meaning friends and "experts."

**Confounds Experts**

All told him the corn would blister and fall to yield.

"I guess some of those fellows weren't so sharp after all," Lange said. "If 70 bushels is a yield from a blistered field I'm going to blister some more."

To store the corn yield Lange was forced to construct two new cribs. His starter and later fertilizing methods were standard.

Joe Gregory, five miles northwest of Ord, was another farmer cribbing a bumper crop last Saturday during the Quiz survey. Joe had 140 acres. The land lies along Turtle creek. He pump irrigates about 30 acres from the creek.

Gregory told the Quiz his yield was averaging 50 bushels with a low of 40 and a high of 70. Cribs on the Gregory farm were loaded to the roof.

A farm owned by Leo Long and Adrian Remington east of Ord was another top irrigated producer. The pair told the Quiz they weren't sure of the exact yield but they believed it would hit 90 bushels. Some has been fed.

The farm had an early application of 15-15-0 with PV32 added later.

"I like PV 82," said Long, "she's a producer."

Other top yields were reported from Yale township where Howard Cook was harvesting a bumper crop and the James Sich farm where the crop was reported averaging 80 bushels.

## Greeley Notes First School District Merger

The First Greeley county school district merger, under a law passed two years ago, took place there this weekend.

Taxpayers of district 36 have decided to merge with district 18. The decision was reached in a courthouse meeting.

Only routine details remain to legally complete the merger.

Miss Ida Foster, county superintendent, presided.

School district 36, which is located in the northeast part of Freeman Valley precinct, has two children of school age. They have been attending nearby schools.

There are thirteen pupils attending school in district 18. It is known as the Troy school. Miss Betty Smith of Greeley is the teacher.

School district 36 was formed in 1895. It was carved out of districts 16 and 19.

The property valuation is \$311,855. District 36 has a valuation of \$136,440 while district 18 has a valuation of \$175,415.

The consolidated district has the third largest valuation of school districts in the county.

Miss Foster said a few more mergers may be made in the near future. A state law makes mergers imperative if districts are without pupils for more than twenty days.

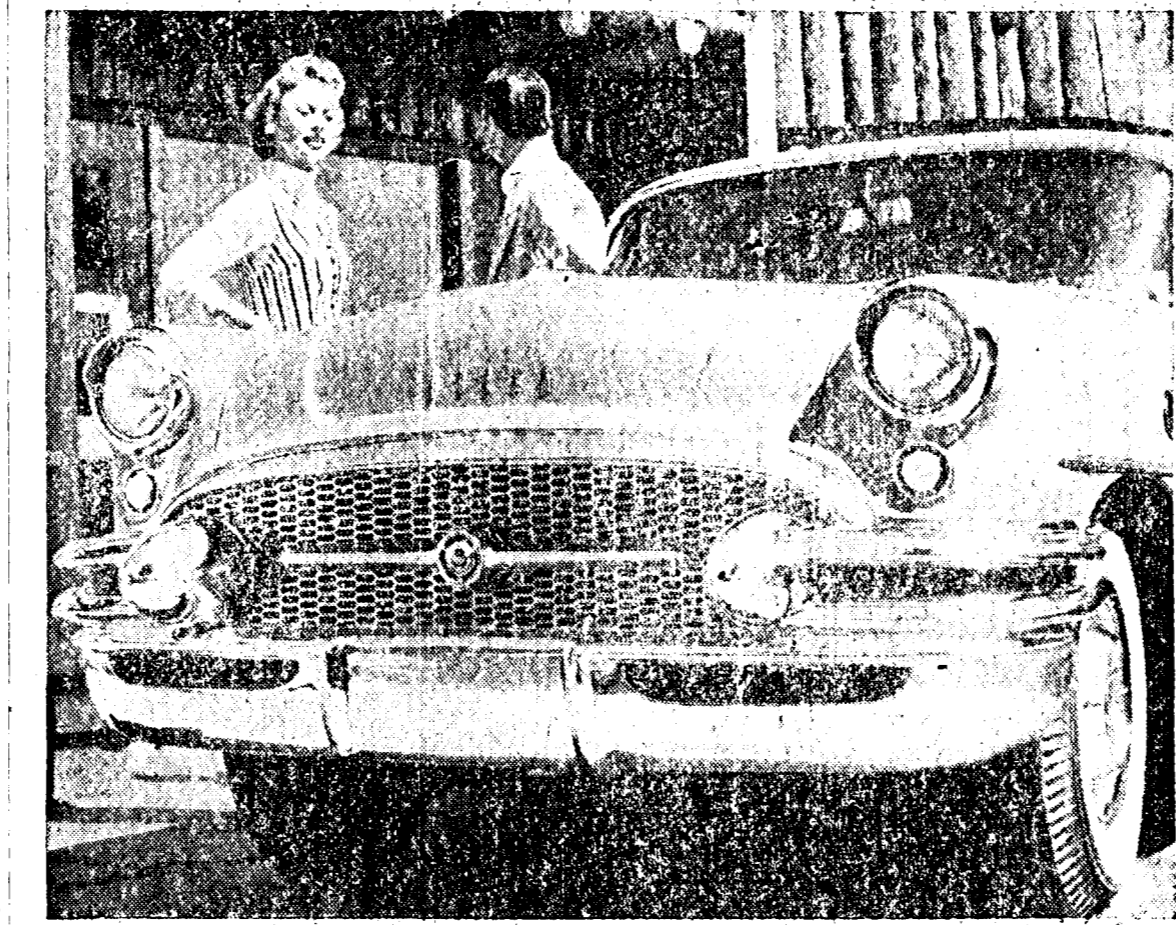

Farm - Ag Tips

The local group, which made a tour of pump irrigated farms in the Wood River valley in the vicinity of Kearney Thursday, saw a number of highly developed irrigation systems. Bill Pierce, former Ord resident and for the past 10 yrs. a partner in the Central Nebraska Irrigation system, development Company, was host and guide. The group was impressed by the amount of work done by the farmers there to secure complete water control through even water penetration on land. The work included a great amount of land leveling, underground and surface laterals of steel pipe and other devices to insure conservation and control of irrigation. Practically all the pumps are powered either by natural gas or electric. In many cases the irrigators have gone to considerable expense to have natural gas piped to farms claiming in the long run it is the cheapest fuel. It looked to us the expense of the development on some of these places has run into a very high financial figure. But it must be paying off because more and more farms in the area are being brought under this high development for efficient use of water. Another thing which attracted the attention of the local men was the amount of land preparation which is going on. Just as soon as the corn has been husked, many of these farmers get into the field with stalk cutters and as fast as the stalks are cut they are turned under by plowing. They leave the ground rather rough to prevent winter and spring soil blowing and then double disk before planting corn in the spring. Many were fertilizing now with anhydrous ammonia to hasten the decay of the stalks.
