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An Afternoon With Dick Kohlschreiber

The winner of this year's President's Choice for the George French Award, Dick Kohlschreiber, may not be well-known to the majority of our members as he lives in San Pedro and we don't see him in San Diego very often, but he is an influential and enthusiastic epi supporter whose dedication has contributed to the success of all epi societies.

In addition to being editor of the South Bay Epiphyllum Society's newsletter, The Epi-Gram, Dick spent countless months updating the latest edition of the Epiphyllum Society of America's Epiphyllum Directory. At EpiCon V at Huntington Gardens, ESA presented Dick with an honorary lifetime membership: a well-deserved recognition for his many years of volunteering and educating members of all the epi societies.

His home is San Pedro is only six blocks from the Pacific Ocean and on a clear day you get a fantastic view of Santa Catalina Island. Dick's vard is packed with plants - 500 epiphyllums, 100 rhipsalis, dozens of echeverias, hybrid aloes, holiday cacti, and dahlias, not to mention the

dozens of epiphytic species enjoying the shade of a huge olive tree.

"I probably like the rhipsalis more than any of them," Dick remarked. "I wish I had each of the different species; although I'm not missing more than about 15." Dick has hung a "wall" of rhipsalis plants along the windows of his enclosed back porch - creating a lovely curtain with their varying lengths and sizes.

A retired veterinarian who still puts in Saturdays at the clinic, Dick's interest in horticulture began after he moved to Southern California and a friend got him interested in bromeliads and orchids. After filling up his apartment balcony with

plants, he bought his house in San Pedro in 1968. He then started growing dahlias and echeverias. He discovered epis in the late 70's or early 80's.

"A friend of mine, Maidie Martin, was involved with ESA and she got me started with epis," he commented. "She used to tell a story about how she and a couple of her friends would take a bus or trolley to Pasadena to Beahm's or Coolidge's nurseries and they would buy one cutting for about 75 cents and then divide it between them."

Dick's epis hang three deep under the eaves in front and along the side of his house. However, the majority hang at the back of the house where they are several rows deep. Below them are shelves with new cuttings and his collection of echeverias and aloes along the outside edges of the benches. The majority of his species are distributed throughout the branches of a large olive tree he planted years ago.

"I fertilize at least twice a year with granule fertilizer. In June and September I use a 20 -5-5. I don't use very much - a heaping half teaspoon to a gallon-size pot. In January or February I use 2-10-10," Dick explained.

"When I fertilize I take each plant down, clean it up, balance (trim) if needed and update my inventory. I often move plants around; if a plant is

not doing well in one area I'll put it in another."

When Dick pots up new epi cuttings, he usually waits a month before watering. "They really don't have much of a root system for a while. If you're not sure they're rooted, it's better to wait. Of course, I get a lot of humidity here, being only six blocks from the coast." In addition, his cuttings are on benches underneath the mature hanging epis, so they get water run off when the mature plants are watered.

Like the majority of us, Dick can't name on favorite epi. "I really like the pastels such as 'French Lipstick' over the really bright shades."

As Dick has been in charge of registering new hybrids as well as updating the directory, he is familiar with a lot of the advances in epi hybridiza"George French's 'Tele' x 'Jennifer Ann' cross is also a great cross- one of George's best," he continued. "That produced 'Calisto', 'Tele Ann', 'Martha Ellen', 'Masada', 'Willow Wand', and 'White Splendor'."

When Dick started updating the directory, he knew there were a lot of mistakes. "There were a lot I was aware of but I was not aware of the full extent of them," he said. The more involved he got, the more he found to correct. And he had help. "We had epi experts from all over – three in England, three in Canada, one in Germany, one in Australia, as well as people in the U.S. For instance, Eckhard Maier and Rudi Dorsch worked on the German. About half the German names were spelled wrong and many German hybridizers weren't given credit."

Dick pointed out other changes that have been made in the new directory: "Some Monmonier

tion. In addition to the unique color combinations of 'Clown' and 'Sakurahime' which have become extremely popular, he feels there have been a few crosses that have proven to be exceptional.

"I still think of the best overall crosses ever made was Wressey Cocke's crosses of 'Tassel' and 'Ruby Snowflake' which produced 'American Sweetheart', 'Pink Plumes', 'Epi Society', 'Hot 'N Spicy', 'African Queen', and others. There are still some plants from that cross that haven't been named."

There is another cross that has produced well – Bob Grimshaw's 'Ruby Snowflake' x 'American Sweetheart' which produced 'My-O-My', the flower that won Dick the George French award at our Mother's Day Show (1996).

"Bob Grimshaw gave the seed to Wressey Cocke who raised it," Dick explained. "Unfortunately the old directory only gave credit to Mr. Cocke. That's been corrected in the new directory; it's now listed as GRIM/WC (HST). The newly registered 'Perfect Moment' is also from that cross, as is the epi named 'Ethel Hurst'. Both crosses are good growers, bloom a lot, and have lots of petals.

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hybrids had been attributed to Poindexter, so we cleared those up. Cactus Pete had quit registering his hybrids after a disagreement with ESA, so we've added a lot of his, but we don't have them all yet. We changed a lot of the descriptions on the Fort and O'Barr hybrids. Some of the descriptions were the complete opposite of the flower. Greg Balvin did a lot of work on that.

"I had been told that ESA had based the original directory on old catalog descriptions," he commented, "and up until the last six months before the directory was reprinted I was under that illusion, but looking through the old catalogs myself I discovered that was not true. There are a lot of very thorough descriptions in the old catalogs that never made it into the directory. Some flowers were attributed to the nurseries instead of the hybridizer. So that's what has to be done now – research through all the old catalogs and update the directory accordingly."

This dedication to getting it right is what makes Dick invaluable to all epi lovers. How many of us would have volunteered to research and update a list of almost 10,000 epis? "I know most people (*Continued on page 6*)

From our Librarian: Outside of A Dog

Outside of a dog, a man's best friend is a book. Inside of a dog it's too dark to read. -- Groucho Marx

No new library acquisitions to report, so for this month's review I did some digging in the shelves. I'll be discussing a general interest cactus and succulent book. The title is Cacti and Other Succulents Catalogue, Collector's Edition,^{*1} by Nakanishi Yasuo. This is a gorgeous book filled with photos of all sorts of cactus and succulents, and an informative section in the back of the book.

Sounds great, right? Well, there is a catch: it's written in Japanese, so all that information is only available to those who can read the language. That said, the photos do have the binomial names in the Roman alphabet, so if there is a photo that catches your eye you will at least have the Latin name available to do more research. However this book was published in 1991, so some of the nomenclature may have changed. Even more annoying, cultivar names are only in Japanese.

Listing all these shortcomings, it may sound like I don't like this book. Actually I did enjoy it, but then again I can read the Japanese language characters. I found it interesting to learn the common (Japanese language) names for cacti and other plants that we





grow. For example, *Epiphyllum oxypetalum* is commonly called 'gekkabijin' which (read literally) means 'Beautiful woman in the moonlight', Disocactus flagelliformis (Aporocactus flagelliformis) is 'kinhimo', literally 'Gold strap', while Selenicereus pteranthus (Selenicereus macdonaldiae) is 'yorunojyouou', or 'Queen of the night'. And our beloved epicactus hybrids are 'kujakusaboten', literally 'Peacock cactus'.

However, you might be wondering if this book will still be interesting if you don't read the language. I would say yes, it could still be interesting; the reason being the photos in this book are nice and they make up about two-thirds of the book. You could easily use this as a wish book. There are only two pages of epiphytic cactus photos, but if your interests include terrestrial cactus and other succulents then this book is worth a look.

That's all for now. Get out to your garden and enjoy the species blooms and offseason flowers this month

don't feel that strongly about the directory, but if I have something in print, I want to be able to believe it is correct."


He gives Myron Kimnach credit for making the new directory the valuable research tool it is. "I'm really pleased with the species list. You can't find another place in the world where there is such a complete listing. I really hope people use it."

He applies this same criteria to The Epi-Gram. Throughout his newsletter, he talks about his experiences with his plants, the experiences of others who correspond with him and constantly passes on new information, clarification, tidbits, anything to

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




Volunteer Appreciation Party- always a fun event! -By Sandra Chapin

Now is the Time

- Maintain good grooming by eliminating unsightly and non-productive branches. This directs the plant's energy into the healthier branches which will produce stronger blooms next spring.
- Protect plants from excessive direct sunlight. Although the end of summer is in sight, in Southern California we can still anticipate some very hot days.
- Prevent soil from drying out. However, keep an eye on the humidity. Even though it may be very hot, too much watering during humid weather can contribute to root rot. Make sure there is air circulation around your pots.
- Protect new growth from wind damage. Hot, dry Santa Ana winds blow in September. Keep

an eye on your plants during these days.

- ✓ Protect apples (seed pods) from birds and rodents (or remove them).
- ✓ Give plants final feeding of a balanced fertilizer for the fall growing season.
- ✓ Mist or hose down branches to clean off dirt and pollutants.
- Some die-back is natural in epis and fall is a season you see this along with some new growth.
- ✓ Many species plants bud and bloom now. Remember to give them some fertilizer and don't move plants that are budding.
- ✓ Watch for pests. Late summer and early fall is an active time for snails. During dry weather, snails and slugs are drawn to moist, potted plants.


Mail Bag— Members are saying:


