

According to the Finance Report of the Chief Executive Officer, Mr. P. G. McQuillan, submitted to the October meeting of the South Eastern Health Board, the clear message emanating from last month's meeting between the Chairmen and Chief Executive Officers of the eight Health Boards and the Minister for Health, Dr. O'Hanlon, was that there would be no more funds available this year for any Health Board which is at present spending in excess of its allocation. Any of the Boards finding itself in such a situation must take measures to correct the position in good time before

# What Really Happened In

Lack of research on the part of some of those involved in that programme displayed a blatant dispersional for the foot of which disregard for the facts of such a major tragedy.

#### THE TRUTH

More than 40 years ago, I spoke to people who remembered the long hours of the tragedy that shocked the nation. I dy that shocked the nation. I recorded their stories and particularly those of Thomas O'Mahony who had a carpenter's shop opposite the Munster and Leinster Bank in Bridge Street now Allied Irish Banks, Tom Duggan of Loughmore who who were all the stories and the stories of th who was an authority on all affairs of the sea, Paddy Kenneally John (Lord) Duggan, Jaimsie Dwyer, Paddy Hurley, Nano Managhan, Barney Beat-ty, Willie Duggan, the postman of Mitchel Street, members of the Donovan family of Abbey-side and many more. I used the Donovan family of Abbeyside and many more. I used actual reports of the inquest which were made available to me by Paddy Morrissey of Chapel Lane and I had a good deal of other material from William Miller who had a huge shopping complex in Lower Main Street which was destroymain Street which was destroymain. In fact, I spent three years sorking on the collection of material for the Moresby story which appeared first of all in the DUNGARVAN LEADER in the DUNGARVAN LEADER in the mid or late 'forties. I intend to use this story in full in a book on Dungarvan which I am working on but I feel very strongly that it is my duty to do what I can to clear the air on a number of points made on that RTE programme which presented Dungarvan and the Captain of the Moresby in a very dark scenario. He camot defend himself or his crew from their grave in the Old Churchyari but the people of Dungarvan can make an effort Dungarvan can make an effort to clear the innuendo concerning a bitterness that does NOT

What I found hard to take as I watched that television programme was the statement programme was the statement that 32-year-old Capt. George Coomer jumped into the sea with his dog tied to his back. The truth is he jumped with his baby daughter Ivy street to his back. his baby daughter Ivy strap-ped to his back. At the same time his wife Ita Isabella was roped to the back of her bro-ther. Martin J. Louis who was mate of the vessel and they jumped into the sea also in the hope of reaching the shore.

One of them was an Englishman named Henry Blount who told the inquest: "The mate took the wife and the captain took the child and they jumbed overboard before I did. The ship's boats were carried away a long time before that. I was from a quarter to half an hour in the water before I was picked up. I had a lifebelt on."

Distress sig-nals were shown and were seen in Ballinacourty and in Dun-garvan. But they were ignored on Ballinacourty Head. This was the real tragedy and one that cannot be understood even to this day. A number of volun-teers in Ballinacourty wanted to go out to rescue all on board the Moresby but they were refused the use of the lifeboat

#### THE UNNAMED HERO

Word was sent to Dungarvan for more volunteers and to Hel-vick on the other side of the bay. In Dungarvan the message was delayed by one man's failwas delayed by one man's fall-ing and the records of the events allege that because of this man's delay twenty young lives were lost. The call was received in Dungarvan early in the night but did not bring the needed response until early the following morning. By this time the scene on board the Moreshy was one of heartbreak. She was all but wrecked and the crew scattered by the cold waves of the cruel Atlantic.

Dungarvan's bell-ringer on getting the belated message promptly collected a volunteer crew who headed for Ballina-courty with all speed. Other volunteers rushed in from Hel-vick using a horse and cart as transport. When the Dungar-van men reached Ballinacourty they had to overcome stiff rethey had to overcome stiff re-sistance in taking over the life-boat. Under the command of Capt. Veale who acted as cox-

After that I got a telegram from the secretary asking did the coxswain and medoat crew refuse to go to the vessel. I telegraphed to Dungarwan that the lifeboat crew refused to go. They were too tired after being out before. I shut up the boathouse and william Shaw, a coastguard and myself, thought it advis-able to go down to the other vessel (the schooner MARY SIN-CLAIR) and we went the best part of the way. When we did not see the rocket apparatus we returned to come home and we arrived here at four o'clock in the morning. I went and laid down with my clothe, on until just about six o'clock when the watchman came and called me and said that the vessel struck the bank. I went mred two more explosives to get a crew but I could not get a crew. Only three or four men came to the boathouse. I had everything ready for the boat to go out. These are but a few extracts from the inquest which was held at the coastguard station in Ballinacounty (now the Golf Clubhouse) a few days following the tragedy. My reason for using them is to show in some small way the two sides of the small way the two sides of the story. However, it is necessary to make it clear that there are many sides to the story—all of them worthy of careful consideration particularly today-93 years later. The Moresby was a fine new ship a three-masted schooner of the latest design and one any skipper could be proud of Capt. Coomer never believed she could founder as she did within Dungarvan Bay but he misjudged the strength of the gale that tore his pride apart.



Q.— I have an elderly relative who has been in hospital for the past few months but is due out shortly. Because of her age and condition she will need constant care and attention. Can I get any payment from the State to look after her?

A.— If your relative is in one of the categories listed below she may qualify for a Prescribed Relative Allowance:

—be getting a blind pension or an invalidity pension or:
—be aged 66 or over and getting a polymer and getting a polymer and getting a payment.

ting a social welfare payment be so incapacitated that

she needs full-time care and attention and be getting this and attention from a prescribed relative: —be living allone except for the prescribed relative, child-

The Allowance is £27.20 per week. The payment is made to the social welfare pensioner and not directly to the relative looking after him/her.
For the purposes of this payment the prescribed relative is one of the following:

-brother half-brother, step-son, grandson, nephew brother-in-law son-in-law —sister, half-sister, daughter, step-daughter, grand-daugh-ter, niece, sister-in-law, daughter-in-law.




