Xaver pleads not guilty in SunTrust murders

SEBRING — Zephen Xaver, 21, pled not guilty on five counts of premeditated first degree murder of the SunTrust Bank employees and customer. Public Records with the Highlands County Clerk of Courts show the official plea entered on Wednesday. On Thursday, the waiver for appearance

at the arraignment on Feb. 25 was entered.

Xaver is being represented by Public Defender Howard L. “Rex” Dimmig II and Assistant Public Defender Blair Allen.

District 10 State Attorney Brian Haas said in a press conference on Feb. 7 that he will seek the death penalty in Xaver’s case.

Xaver is accused of

shooting four female employees and one female customer at the SunTrust Bank at 1901 U.S. 27 South on Jan. 23. He then called 911 and told dispatch that he had just shot five people.

After a two-hour stand off with law enforcement, Highlands County Sheriff’s Office SWAT Team finally rammed a

Florida legislature is discussing a bill to allow the smoking of medical marijuana in the form of pre-rolled filtered marijuana cigarettes dispensed by Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers (MMTC).

Floridians may soon be able to smoke medical marijuana legally

SEBRING — Florida legislature is considering a bill to allow the smoking of medical marijuana for patients over the age of 18.

The new law could take effect as soon as July 1 of this year, according to proposed legislation.

“Gov. [Ron] DeSantis has been clear in his demand for a smokable marijuana bill,” Republican Representative Cary Pigman said. Pigman

is an emergency room physician at AdventHealth Sebring who serves as the House committee’s vice-chairman for the proposed bill.

“If the court’s decision striking down the current statute stands, then it would be unclear how the Department of Health could accomplish rule-making regarding smokable marijuana without some enabling legislation,” Pigman said.

Although the proposed bill would allow people to smoke marijuana, people can’t just buy their marijuana on the streets and roll it up with cigarette paper. A physician must prescribe the medical

Archbold raises concerns for hydrology, future development

SEBRING — Commissioners on Tuesday unanimously granted a land use change for 200 acres of citrus grove on State Road 70 from agriculture to mixed use.

This was despite objections by Dr. Hilary Swain, executive director of the adjacent Archbold Biological Station, and Ross Macbeth, attorney representing Archbold Expeditions, the not-for-profit independent research institution that runs the station.

In a letter provided to commissioners, Macbeth said they couldn’t change the future land use map for the property, because the future land use element of the county’s comprehensive plan was not in line with Florida law.

Under Section 163.3177(6)(a)3.h. of Florida Statutes, a future land use plan should have guidelines for implementing a mixed-use development, including the types of uses allowed and the density and intensity of each use.

Macbeth said, since no criteria had been provided in the county’s plan, the

county could not approve a mixed-use development.

Commission Chair James “Jim” Brooks asked Macbeth who was the county attorney at the time the comprehensive plan was adopted.

Macbeth said he was. “I didn’t get that involved in the comp (sic) plan process,” Macbeth said, noting that county staff and

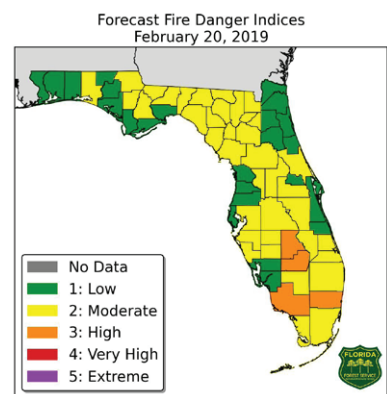

members of the Central Florida Regional Planning Council drew up the plan.

Wildfire danger raised to high

SEBRING — The dry season is heating up with the risk of wildfires being raised to “high” for Highlands County. Despite an initial good start to the season because of a wet December, the lack of rain has changed the fire forecast for the foreseeable future. The National Oceanic

and Atmospheric Association reported Avon Park as having more than 3.5 inches of rain as compared to the .36 inches of rain the year before.

According to The Weather Channel, the dry season starts about October and runs through the spring.

The Florida Forest Service Public Information Officer Melissa Yunas shared some sobering statistics on the

amount of acreage burned in the past couple of years. She included year to date in 2019, too. Since 2017 there has been a significant increase in the amount of acreage burned by the fires.

Highlands County Statistics: To date in 2019 – 9 wildfires for 50.3 acres
For 2018 – 70 wildfires for 1,811.2 acres
For 2017 – 125 wildfires for

2,225.1 acres
For 2016 – 85 wildfires for 798 acres
For 2015 – 89 wildfires for 997.2 acres
For 2014 – 85 wildfires for 1,100.7 acres
According to the Forestry’s website, there have been 206 wildfires in 2019 on state property and 14 on federal property.

‘Impaled’ man airlifted

Venus man injured in chest by tool

VENUS — A man injured Wednesday morning in his chest by a power tool was conscious when airlifted, according to the Highlands County Sheriff’s Office.

However, his name and condition were not available as of Thursday afternoon, said Highlands County Fire Rescue Chief Marc Bashoor, in accordance with the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA).

“I can say he left the scene as a trauma alert, on his way to Lee Memorial (Hospital),” Bashoor said.

He added that both a fire engine from Sun ‘N Lake of Lake Placid Fire Department Station 41 and a medical unit from Lake Placid Station 36 responded to the scene.

Central dispatch communicators relayed the call to fire and emergency medical personnel as an industrial accident of “impalement by a tool.”

He had already been transported when a

Highlands News-Sun reporter arrived at the rural residence in Venus. A trio of family and/or friends at the entrance to his driveway said they hoped he would be OK.

The tool involved, they said, was a chain-type power saw that “jumped up on his chest,” cutting a gash.

Highlands County Sheriff’s Office Public Information Officer Scott Dressel said the call came in at 9:11 a.m. and confirmed the patient was conscious when airlifted.

When is it enough?

Multiple arrests, multiple bonds

LAKE PLACID — The multiple arrests of Harrison Howes, 18, of Lake Placid, have coincided with just as many times being bailed out of jail for the same charges.

Howes has been arrested three times since Jan. 16 for impersonation of a law enforcement officer/fireman; unlawful use of blue lights, simulate criminal process under the color of law fraudulent actions, and obstruction of justice.

On Jan. 16, Howes was arrested for allegedly pulling over a man on an ATV on Dec. 28. Howes told the man he had the power to make an arrest.

On Feb. 1, a female victim came forward and said Howes made a “traffic stop with her too” on or about Jan. 17 or 18.

A third victim said he was pulled over by Howes two times – once in early January and again about five days later.

Each time the young man was arrested, he was bailed out the next day. He has also pleaded not guilty.

According to Assistant State Attorney Steve Houchin, the arrest and release on multiple occasions is perfectly legal and common.

“If a person commits crimes and they all happened some time ago – and the victims are just now coming in and say it happened – there could be charge after charge,” Houchin said.

There is a standard bond schedule that the judges can use to set bond on their first appearance. Houchin said he assumed Judge Peter Estrada used the schedule in Howes’ cases. Bonds can be higher if the judge deems someone a habitual offender. However, there has to be convictions in order to be

deemed habitual.

In the case of Howes, there have no convictions in the adult court system.

He waived his rights on Feb. 18 for a speedy trial. A court date is scheduled for April 17.

Jimmy Sottile, owner of Sottile Bail Bonds, said he has had people ask him about the case as well.

The bail bondsman said it comes down to Parker vs. State. He explained the charges may be new, but the crimes are not. They happened before he was out on bond. Even if more victims came forward, and he were arrested again for the same charges, Howes would still be eligible for bond.

Conversely, because of the same law, if someone were to be arrested on

new charges, their bond would be revoked on the previous charges and the new charge(s) may be eligible for bond. It would make no difference if the person could make the new bond; they would still be in custody for the revocation on the old charges.



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Hit and run leads to drug charges

SEBRING — Daniel James Welkes, 28, of Lake Placid was arrested Sunday evening by the Sebring Police Department. He is facing a misdemeanor charge for hit and run, leaving the scene of a crash involving property damage; two counts of felony drug possession of a controlled substance without a prescription; and another misdemeanor charge of possessing marijuana, under 20 grams.

The arrest report shows a witness called 911 when he noticed a driver in a gold Lincoln pickup truck driving erratically. The witness said the driver crossed the double yellow lines multiple times and went into oncoming traffic. The witness also said the driver hit and knocked over a mailbox with his passenger side mirror on Lakeview Drive.

The arresting officer estimated the damage to the mailbox at \$100.

The witness followed the driver, later identified as Welkes, to the Gate gas station at 300 U.S. 27 N. Welkes entered the store and the witness was able to describe him and his clothing. The witness also described Welkes' passenger.

The officer made his initial contact with Welkes and the passenger at the gas station. The officer asked Welkes about his erratic driving and the mailbox he allegedly hit. Welkes denied knowledge of hitting the mailbox.

While looking over the truck for damage from the mailbox, the officer could smell cannabis emitting from the pickup truck, the report said. Because of that, the officer peered into the cab of the truck and saw a clear baggie with "eight yellow, rectangular bars" in the center console

of the interior cabin. He knew what the bars were based on his many years as a policeman. He determined they were Alprazolam, a schedule four controlled substance — also known on the street as Xanax.

The officer handcuffed Welkes and the passenger, and continued his search. In addition, he found a bag with two blue pills, two other oblong pills and a rolled-up paper with a green leafy substance in it. The leafy substance field-tested positive for cannabis.

The four pills were identified as Xanax and Diazepam, both schedule four controlled substances. The oblong pills were Gabapentin, which the report says is not a controlled substance.

The officer issued Welkes a citation. He is due to appear in court on March 13.

Other officers informed the home owner whose mailbox was damaged. The report does not say what happened to the passenger.

hole into the building and brought Xaver out peacefully. Xaver went into the bank with a 9mm handgun and a bullet proof vest on but left without either.

Xaver had exchanged communication with a former girlfriend stating he was dreaming about killing people and die by "suicide" by cops.

There are some gaps in Xaver's history, but he was from Indiana and received his GED there. He did at least one stint in a mental health hospital in Indiana. He moved last

year to Sebring and was living with his mother.

He joined the United States Army but did not complete his training. Xaver got a job, despite his mental health issues, with Avon Park Correctional Institute and was in training to

become a prison guard. He quit after a short time, nearly two weeks before he entered SunTrust Bank that fateful day.

Records show he did not have any disciplinary problems at APCI. He does not have a criminal adult record.

The state acreage burned is 2,583 and federal acreage is 2,109.

Dustin Norman, meteorologist with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association, said more rain could lower the risk of wildfires.

"In January, the county received about 3 to 4 inches of rain," he said. "I have not put everything in the computer for February yet but it was significantly drier than January."

High humidity is keeping some of the wildfires at bay because the fuel, such as vegetation, has a hard time drying out.

Norman said fires thrive in low humidity and dry air. Cold fronts that do not have a lot of rain tend to dry the fuel even more. They also tend to have high winds that drive the fires.

Despite the increased fire danger risk, Highlands County is not under a burn ban.

However, before burning anything, know the rules and safe practices. If a homeowner loses control of his fire, they can be held responsible for the cost of the fire suppression.

Vague reports are disappointing

After Sept. 11, 2001, it took about 34 months to establish an investigative commission and publicly release a final report on the worst terrorist attacks in American history.

The Pulse nightclub in Orlando was attacked by a single gunman 32 months ago, and the public still hasn't seen the FBI's final report.

Instead, it's been a drip, drip, drip of vaguely worded statements by other agencies, the latest coming last week from the office of Orange-Osceola State Attorney Aramis Ayala.

The highlight was a conclusion that none of the 49 victims had been shot by police. The basis for that conclusion included a Florida Department of Law Enforcement use-of-force investigation, which reviewed video and audio evidence, along with police and witness statements.

What's still missing, however, is the FBI's full report on the massacre, including detailed ballistics findings important in determining who shot whom. This delay despite the passage of time, despite the death of the gunman, and despite the acquittal of the gunman's wife on a charge of assisting her husband.

So why the secrecy? Why — more than 2½ years after the massacre of club-goers — can't the public see what the FBI has found? A spokesperson for the agency said the case hasn't been formally closed, citing "administrative items that need to be finalized." Oh.

Other investigations haven't proceeded so slowly.

As the Sentinel reported last week, an FBI investigation into the motives behind a mass shooting at a Las Vegas concert was released in January, 16 months after the killings.

Canned statements from the region's representatives in Washington don't give us much confidence they're holding the agency's feet to the fire.

"I am in the process of receiving full briefings by the FBI and FDLE," wrote U.S. Rep. Val Demings, whose district includes the Pulse nightclub. "The public deserves to know as much as the law allows. Through full transparency we become better and safer."

"I am satisfied with their investigation but believe it's time for them to release the forensics report," Rep. Darren Soto said in written answers to the Sentinel's questions. "It appears their investigation has concluded and this report is critical for public policy analysis."

U.S. Rep. Stephanie Murphy's treacherous response gave us even less hope that she's fighting for the release of the FBI's findings.

The FBI's slow walk is emblematic of the vague and dissatisfying outcomes following the Pulse massacre.

Speaking of policy changes at the Orlando Police Department following the shootings, former Orlando Police Chief John Mina — now the Orange County sheriff — hazily answered, "We're always adjusting training based on incidents that happen and best practices that are done around the country."

Not very reassuring, considering the absence of details about what the department has learned or what it could do better in the future.

Aside from not having mixed-use criteria in the comprehensive plan, Macbeth said the application marked as "unknown" such specific development criteria as how many residential units it would have per acre, the maximum business intensity or the access for public utilities, such as potable water.

Highlands County Planning Supervisor Jodene Thayer said those parts of the application are marked "unknown" because they are unknown at this time.

She said any development on that property would have to go through a planned development process, which would require more overview by the Planning & Zoning Commission/Board of Adjustment and the Highlands County Board of County Commission.

Discussion on Tuesday also revealed the property is subject to the land use overlay created for the Lake Placid Regional Plan, and would have to comply with stipulations in that plan, as well.

The owner of the proposed sand mine is Black Bear Citrus LLC, represented by Bert J. Harris III, who is also managing member of the company.

Harris said the Teal family owns the other half.

Harris had requested a special exemption to the code to allow extraction of sand, removing earth or topsoil from a 33.47-acre portion of the 200-acre parcel at 25 Pump Road, between State Road 70 to the south and Lake Placid lake to the north.

His application said mining had taken place there in the past. The land is currently a commercial grove.

Having a sand mine would let him sell the sand while creating a pond along the east property line along with areas that were mined in the past, to make a buffer.

Harris asked Macbeth if he would not be in conflict on the matter, under rules of the Florida Bar Association, by attacking the code of his former employer without written consent by the employer. "I have a problem with him attacking the code drafted under his watch," Harris said.

County Attorney Joy Carmichael said she didn't know of any prohibitions to Macbeth coming back before the board to argue points of law.

Macbeth said he didn't believe he had a conflict, given that he advised the County Commission but did not draft the comprehensive plan.

"I'm not attacking the plan. I'm asking the board to comply with the plan," Macbeth said. Harris then argued

that the Lake Placid Regional Plan, to which his property belongs, supersedes the comprehensive plan and would allow mixed use.

Also, Harris said there were no plans to do anything with the property in the foreseeable future except grow citrus, even though the land is compatible with residential or business development.

Swain had previously stated concerns for how plans to create a sand mine on the grove property could open up the water table and draw down Lake Annie, which is immediately south of the property, beyond SR 70, on Archbold land.

The lake, as Swain described in a previous Planning and Zoning Commission meeting, is one of the few deep-water lakes in the subtropics that did not originate from a melted glacier, as the Great Lakes did.

She said it has never dried out, fed by groundwater seep from the east, south and west. From the lake, water flows as groundwater to the north, toward the proposed sand mine and Lake Placid lake.

The lake is so unique, Swain said, it belongs to the Global Lake Ecological Observatory Network. It draws interest from scientists around the world due to its ancient sediments and unique hydrology, she said.

marijuana for a specific condition.

In addition, the marijuana can only be "in the form of pre-rolled filtered marijuana cigarettes dispensed by MMTCs (Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers)," the proposed bill states.

According to the proposed House bill, medical marijuana may be prescribed for the following medical conditions:

- cancer,
- epilepsy,
- glaucoma,
- positive status for human immunodeficiency virus,
- acquired immune deficiency syndrome,
- post-traumatic stress disorder,
- amyotrophic lateral sclerosis,
- Crohn's disease,
- Parkinson's disease,
- multiple sclerosis and
- medical conditions of the same kind or class as or comparable to those enumerated above.

When the Highlands News-Sun asked Pigman about the last condition, which appears to be a vague catch-all classification, he said, "The catch-all phrase was intended to be broad to respect any reasonable treatment decision between a physician and a patient."

The proposed version of the House of Representatives' bill states, "To certify a patient for medical use of marijuana, a qualified physician must determine that medical marijuana would likely outweigh the health risks to the patient and obtain informed consent of the patient using a standardized form."

Monitoring the smoking of medical marijuana will create a financial burden for the Department of Health. The legislature has planned a response to the increased cost of monitoring. "The DOH will be funded by the legislature for all necessary expenses, through licensure fees and appropriations from general revenue," Pigman said.

"As a physician I can think of no condition that benefits from smoked marijuana," Pigman said. "As an elected representative, I must respond to the court's decision regarding the medical marijuana amendment to the Florida Constitution," he said.

"The intent of this year's bill is that the certifying physician, who is prescribing smokable marijuana, must firmly assert the reason why other forms of marijuana consumption — pill/tablet, oil, edible, or vaped — are not appropriate for a given patient," Pigman said.

"It is hard for me to understand how combusting, or burning, plant material, and then inhaling the ash products, along with an unknown mixture of various chemicals is superior to the other forms of consumption — pill/tablet, oil, edible, or vaped," Pigman said.

The proposed bill referred to research from the National Institute of Health (NIH) that states, "Marijuana smoking is associated with large airway inflammation, increased airway resistance, and lung hyperinflation, and

those who smoke marijuana regularly report more symptoms of chronic bronchitis than those who do not smoke."

What about the effects of second-hand marijuana smoke? "A 2016 study in rats found that secondhand exposure to marijuana smoke affected a measure or blood vessel function as much as secondhand tobacco smoke, and the effects lasted longer," the bill stated.

Although Pigman has expressed his concerns about smoking medical marijuana, he still respects other doctors and their decisions. "Nevertheless, I would respect the treatment decision between a patient and her/his certifying physician regarding the most appropriate route of ingestion of marijuana, as long as that decision is clinically sound and reasoned," he said.

When asked what his constituents were saying about smokable marijuana, Pigman said, "Other issues predominate, agriculture, water policy, protecting the second amendment, school safety, infrastructure improvement, and others. They say very little to me about smokable marijuana."

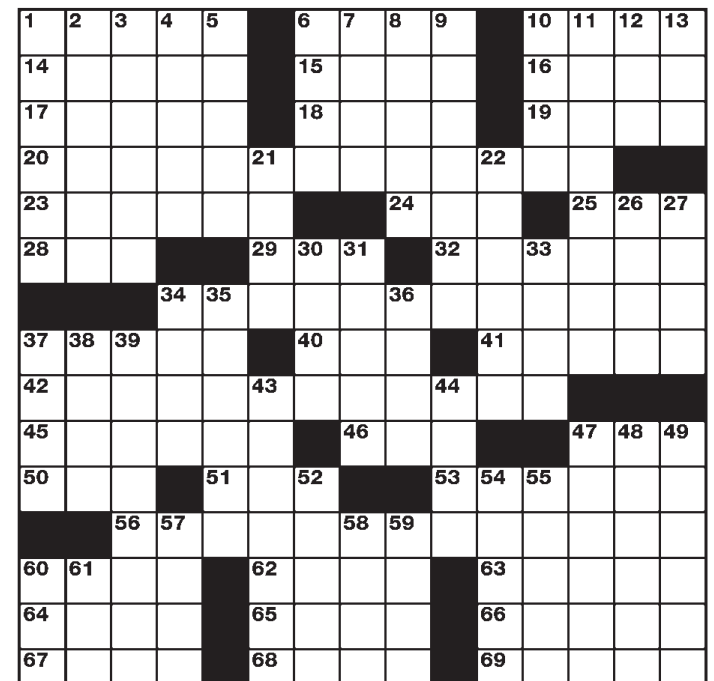
Will people be allowed to smoke medical marijuana in public? According to current proposed legislation, the answer is no. "The bill retains the ban on public use of medical marijuana in all forms, except the ban for low-THC marijuana, but adds a prohibition on smoking low-THC marijuana in public," the proposed bill states.

Don Cunningham enjoys the good times of senior softball and "the friendship of players from all walks of life." Quite a statement for a guy whose own life was nearly cut short in infancy.

A native of the mean streets of Paterson, New Jersey, Don's maternity ward suffered an epidemic that killed 20 of the 25 babies in the hospital. At three days old, an IV tube inserted in his brain kept him alive. He was administered the Last Rites (Extreme Unction) by a Roman Catholic priest.

He sold the company and started wintering in Lake Placid in 1998. A friend took him to the Lake Placid league and to his own surprise, discovered he had athletic ability. "Don was a project, but the raw talent was obvious," reminisced his first manager.

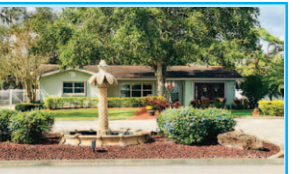

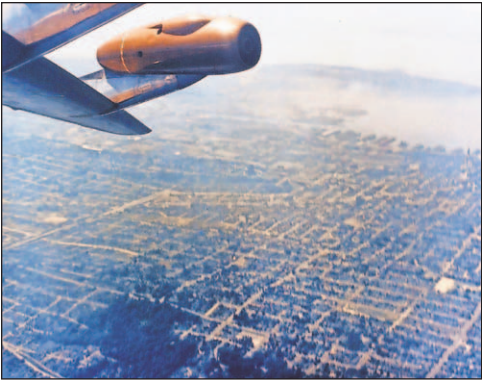

Seattle skies

The roar of engines came in from the east as most of the key executives of the airline industry were on the shores of Lake Washington in Seattle watching the hydro-plane races as guests of the Boeing Company. Bill Allen, president of the Boeing Company had arranged for a fly-by of their new 707 jetliner prototype. As the eyes of the industry looked up on Aug. 7, 1955 few realized they were about to witness something as significant as the first flight of the Wright Brothers.

Boeing Senior Test Pilot Tex Johnson was at the controls. With the roar of the four jet engines, Johnson pulled the aircraft nose up and then executed a perfect barrel roll. Back in straight and level flight, he did a 180 degree turn and came back around and did another barrel roll. The airline industry was never the same.

In the early 50s, Boeing had just lost 1.5 billion dollars in government aircraft contracts. The future of the Boeing Company was uncertain. The one aircraft they still had was the B-47 jet bomber, the aircraft that would take the United States Air Force into the jet age. In the summer of 1950 Allen decided to ride in the B-47. He was soon at an altitude much higher than current piston powered airlines were flying. It was smooth and quiet up there. This is where you wanted to be, traveling at 600 mph above the weather. He also realized that this is where airline passengers would want to be.

Winston Churchill once said; "Play for more than you can afford to lose, and you will learn the game." In other words, you go "All In". That is what Bill Allen did in 1952 by spending over 20 million dollars on developing the Boeing 707 prototype. Most airlines would order 30, 40 or 50 aircraft of a new design and would help off-set the cost of development for the aircraft manufacturer. Allen was betting the future of the company on a one-of-a-kind new design, of a totally different type of airliner.

There was great skepticism about the new jet technology. Airlines had vast fleets of piston powered aircraft and a worldwide maintenance and support system. The airline service personnel were skilled handling piston powered aircraft and changing to a jet engine program would be changing the status quo and be very costly. The public was also concerned as there were fears of traveling that fast might be harmful. The cards were somewhat stacked against Bill Allen and Boeing, until the barrel roll.

The airline industry saw the future and soon there were hundreds of orders for the Boeing 707 jetliner. On October 26th, 1958 Pan American Boeing 707 "New York Clipper" took off from New York to Paris and the "Jet Set" age was born. The Beatles, Rolling Stones, and celebrities flew on the 707, and everyone wanted to be a part of it. Within the next year, there were more people crossing the Atlantic in jet aircraft than those traveling by ocean liner. The rest is history as they say.

Tex Johnson had told no one he was going to do the barrel roll. The plan was for a nice straight and level fly-by over of the airline industry heavy weights as they watched the hydro-plane races on Lake Washington. The flight engineer on the aircraft said to Johnson he was going to lose his job over the maneuver. He was called in to Bill Allen's office the following Monday as was asked; "What were you doing?" His response was; "I was selling airplanes." That was exactly what happened, although it took many years for Allen to get over the shock of the barrel roll.

Bill Allen had a vision and the flight in the B-47 gave him the confidence to take a risk, bet the company and bring us the jet age. There have been many innovations

Lake Istokpoga, Florida's fifth-largest lake, comprising approximately 28,000 acres, and located about five miles northeast of the Town of Lake Placid, is recognized as one of the finest fishing lakes for largemouth bass in the entire state. Other popular catches include speckled perch (croppies) and bluegill.

Lake Istokpoga is also one of the most scenic lakes in Florida. Osprey, wading birds and snail kites dot the landscape and give bird watchers plenty to view. Remnant cypress swamps on the western side of the lake provide habitat for wildlife. Alligators, ducks, and frogs are plentiful. Sunsets are fabulous.

From December to early April retired Northerners (snowbirds) who enjoy fishing are a significant presence at the six local fish camps which surround the lake. Many of them come to the same camps year after year.

Indiana resident Dave Mills has been coming to Trails End Fishing Resort for seven years. Kyle and Loretta Rose, who hail from Virginia, have been staying at Mossy Cove Fishing Resort for 13 years. Chuck and Jane Green from North Carolina were founding members of Lake Istokpoga Marina and RV Resort and have been winter residents for 15 years and Bob and Phyllis Hoffman



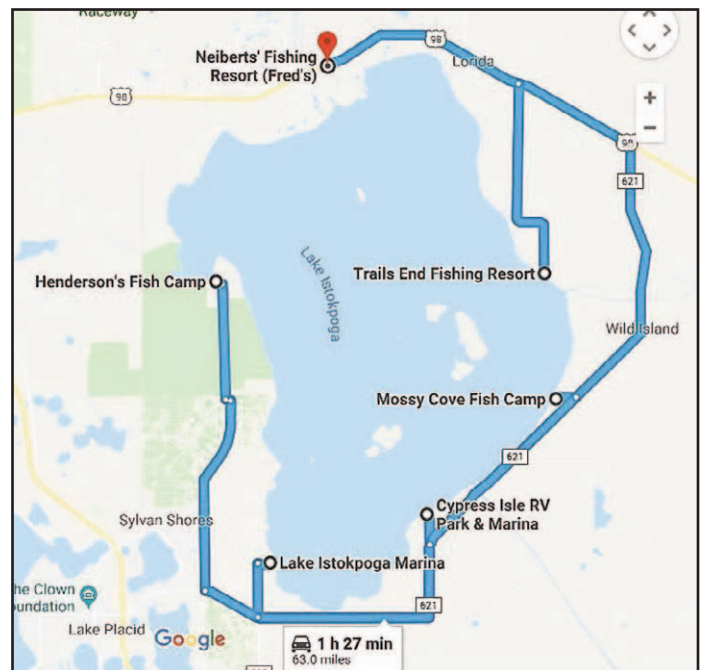

from Connerville, Indiana have enjoyed Henderson's Fish Camp for eight years. Other fish camps include Neibert's Fishing Resort and Cypress Isle RV Park and Marina.

So what exactly are fish camps? Back in the 1930s, according to an article called "Get Hooked on Fish Camps" on a Florida tourism website, "they were a place for men to hang out, go fishing all day, set up camp on site and after a long day of tall-tale stories and a couple of catches, they would gut em', clean em' and cook em' up for dinner."

Today, fish camps include air-conditioned cabins with TV, WiFi, and internet and RV sites with full hookups.



The camps come equipped with boat slips, bait and tackle shops, gas, fish cleaning stations, and boat ramps. They also provide boat rentals and referrals for fishing guides. Exact numbers of cabins, RV sites, and boat accommodations differ from fish camp to fish camp.

All cabins are rentals, with the exception of Lake Istokpoga Marina which has beautiful, substantially built log cabins made of solid pine. Residents purchase the cabins; prices vary, depending upon the size.

Most anglers are passionate about their avocation. They establish a routine and stick to it day after day. Some wives, especially those who don't fish, find it difficult to understand their husbands' "obsession."

Former Mossy Cove

fish camp resident Daisy Williams wrote tongue-in-cheek a few years ago about what she called "the chronic unrelenting drive to take to the water every morning from December 1 until April 1....[It] binds all the hyperactive senior males together in a brotherhood that surpasses and nullifies any differences in their politics, religion, bank accounts and fishing finesse. They are all equal under this four month umbrella of insane fishing frenzy."

But Williams speaks favorably about the transformation that comes over the anglers at their home away from home. "They are not those same men who left home before the first snowfall. Now they are fishermen

This is to give notice that the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO) has conducted an evaluation as required by Executive Orders 11988 and 11990 in accordance with U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) regulations at 24 CFR 55.20 to determine the potential effect the Rebuild Florida Housing Repair and Replacement Program's activity in the floodplain and/or wetland will have on the environment.

DEO has considered the following alternatives and mitigation measures to be taken to minimize adverse impacts and to restore and preserve natural and beneficial values. The alternatives were: (i) to proceed with the housing rehabilitation of affected homes located within Clay County, Hillsborough County, Palm Beach County, St. Lucie County, Osceola County, zip code 32145 and 32084 in St. Johns County, zip code 32771 in Seminole County, zip code 33935 and 33440 in Hendry County, zip code 33523 in Pasco County and zip code 33825 and 33870 in Highlands County, and (ii) not undertaking the action "No Action". No additional alternatives were considered.

The proposed project involves housing rehabilitation to be funded by HUD. The Rebuild Florida Housing Repair and Replacement Program may include properties located within the floodplain area. At this time, the exact number and locations of the properties to participate in the program are unspecified, however, eligible applicants are homeowners whose primary residence was damaged by Hurricane Irma in the above listed counties and zip codes. With roughly 1,893,529 acres within the 100-year floodplain, DEO anticipates assisting homes throughout each county and zip code. The Rebuild Florida Housing Repair and Replacement Program will consist of the following activities:

- Repair to, reconstruction or replace of housing units damaged by Hurricane Irma, which may include code compliance and mitigation against future storm impacts, including elevation.

- The completion of work to homes that have been partially repaired.

- Repairs to, or replacement of manufactured, modular and mobile homes impacted by Hurricane Irma.

- Temporary housing assistance based on individual homeowners needs and their participation in the Housing Repair Program.

- Temporary Housing Assistance based on individual tenant needs and their participation in the Housing Repair Program.

This activity will have no significant impact on the environment because of the following mitigation measures that will be taken to minimize adverse impacts:

Option A: Homes to be rebuilt in their original location are to be elevated adhering to the federal and/or state requirements.

Option B: Homes damaged may be relocated to a new area within the current developed property with possible elevation per floodplain requirement.

Option C: Refer the homeowner to either the Land Acquisition for Affordable Workforce Housing or Voluntary Home Buyout Program.

A no action alternative was rejected because no action would not provide the residents with financial assistance to rebuild and recover from Hurricane Irma.

Although the project may be located in the 100-year floodplain and/or wetland, the improvements cannot be undertaken in any other location due to the scope of the project. Therefore, it has been determined there are no practicable alternatives other than to proceed with the outlined work.

The proposed improvements will conform to applicable floodplain protection standards. The proposed action will not affect natural or beneficial floodplain values, and residents of the community will benefit from the project. Failure to provide these improvements will make it difficult for residents to recover from Hurricane Irma.

There are three primary purposes for this notice. First, people who may be affected by activities in floodplains and/or wetlands and those who have an interest in the protection of the natural environment should be given an opportunity to express their concerns and provide information about these areas. Second, an adequate public notice program can be an important public education tool, and can facilitate and enhance federal efforts to reduce the risks and impacts associated with the occupancy and modification of these special areas. Third, as a matter of fairness, when the federal government determines it will participate in actions taking place in floodplains and/or wetlands, it must inform those who may be put at greater or continued risk.

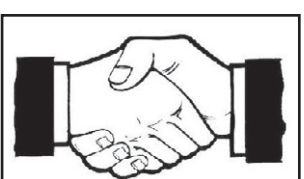

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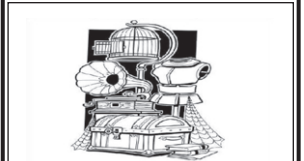

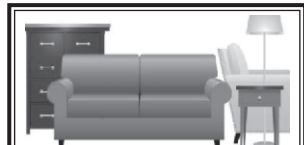

and fishermen only... They have checked into the carefree, continuous camp of happiness."

But this season has been a tough one for Lake Istokpoga anglers, especially those fishing for bass. Anglers who used to catch high numbers of bass say their ability to do so has diminished substantially in the last two to three years. Naturally the topic comes up often in conversations at the fish camps.

Anglers believe the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's removal of exotic invasive plants (hydrilla, water lettuce, water hyacinth, and water primrose) has led to the elimination of much of the aquatic vegetation cover that the fish need for feeding and spawning. Anglers also are skeptical of FWC's use of herbicide spraying when other tools to eliminate invasive plants are available.

FWC is required by law to remove invasive plants in order to keep the lake, fish and plants healthy and to make the lake accessible to boaters. But it's a double-edged sword because a moderate abundance of aquatic plants is also needed for fish populations to thrive and for angling. Finding the right balance is the challenge.

FWC is responsive to the criticism it has received. Last year, it contracted with the University of Florida/Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences to develop an Aquatic Habitat Management Plan for the Lake. First step has been to hold public meetings to gather input for the plan which is scheduled for publication later this year. On January 27, FWC also put a temporary moratorium on spraying.

FWC acknowledges that there are many tools in the aquatic plant management box besides herbicide spraying that it can use to reach management goals. But each tool has an associated cost and effectiveness that must be considered when

developing a management plan.

According to the FWC, other factors unrelated to aquatic vegetation cover may be affecting the ability of fish to feed and spawn and the ability of anglers to catch fish. Largemouth bass and black crappie populations in Lake Istokpoga are typically cyclical, fluctuating naturally based on a variety of factors, including spawning success, mortality from natural causes, prey availability, and more. Weather conditions, including hurricanes, strong gales, and very cold temperatures, can cause fluctuations in fishing effort and success, as can variations in lake water levels.

Even the most passionate fishermen can't fish all the time. Fortunately, there are many other reasons to enjoy fish camps.

George and Karen Ripberger from Kentucky have been winter residents at Lake Istokpoga Marina and RV Resort since 2005. "The camp is our home away from home, and the people that stay here are our family. We have community fish fries and cook outs and communal dinners on Christmas Day and New Year's Day. The men play cards twice a week, and we often gather on one another's porches just to chat," he said.

Residents have erected a memorial at the

entrance to the Marina to honor friends who have passed away. In the center of the memorial is the name Joe Crowley. Crowley and his wife Jan established the camp in 2004. "He passed away two years ago. Jan continues his legacy," Ripberger said.

Camaraderie is evident at the other fish camps too. "We've made some really good friends here," Henderson Fishing Resort resident Bob Hoffman said. "Back home in Indiana, we've even exchanged visits with a couple whom we met here who live in Kentucky." Hoffman's wife Phyllis does not fish. "But crocheting keeps me busy, and I enjoy walking with some of the other ladies who are staying here," she said.

Just about any guest you talk to at Trails End acknowledges that this fish camp is a tight knit community. Residents celebrate Happy Hour together and hold occasional cornhole tournaments. Residents at a neighboring facility sometimes join in. "Our guests even call us after they go back up North to find out how everything is going," said owner Tracie Gillespie.

Despite the fact that fishing this year is not up to par on Lake Istokpoga, most Northerners remain hopeful that the current situation will reverse itself. "We're willing to wait and see what FWC does; they're working on the problem," said Mossy Cove winter resident Kyle Rose.

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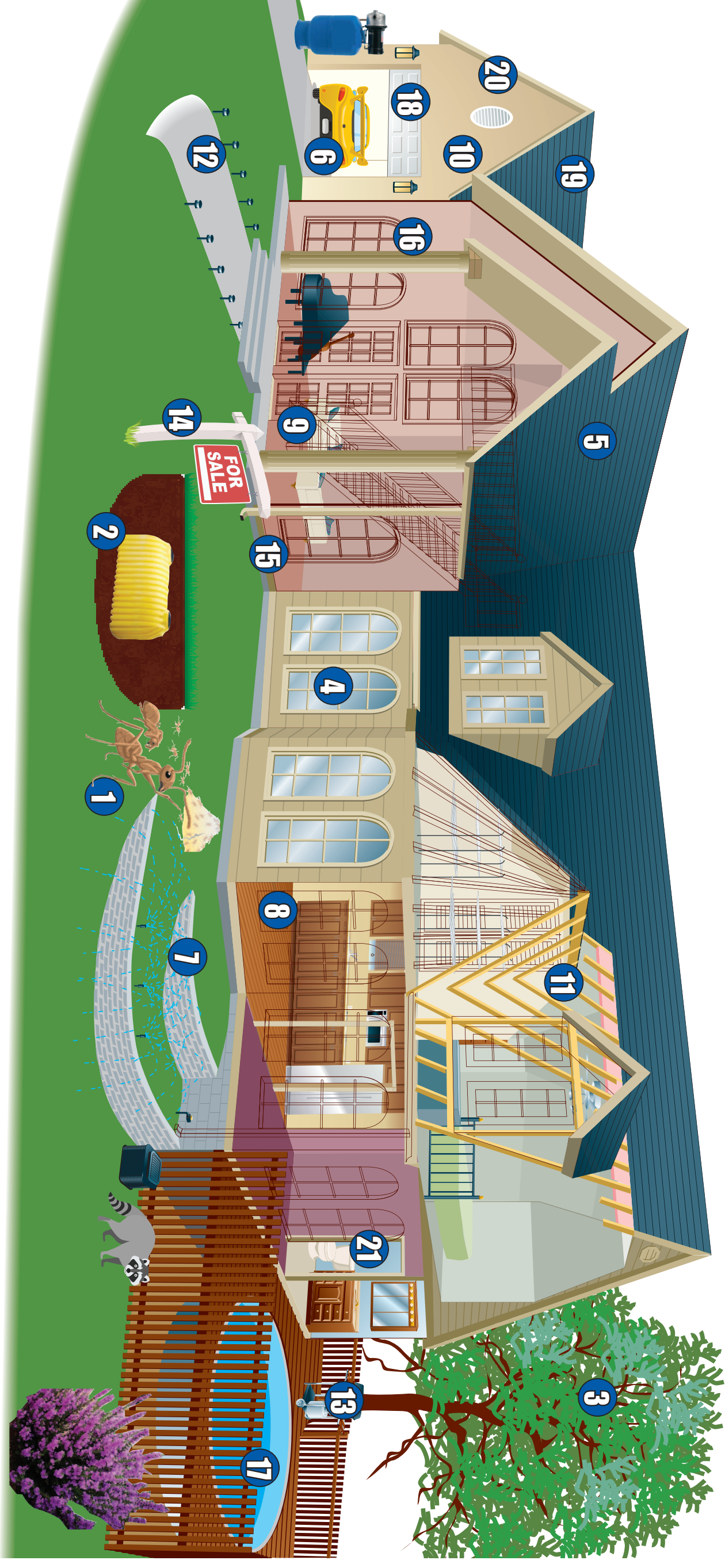

Searing testimony at Vatican abuse summit

Pope Francis warns bishops that Catholic faithful are demanding more than just condemnation

VATICAN CITY — The day began with an African woman telling an extraordinary gathering of Catholic leaders that her priestly rapist forced her to have three abortions over a dozen years after he started violating her at age 15. It ended with a Colombian cardinal warning them they could all face prison if they let such crimes go unpunished.

In between, Pope Francis began charting a new course

for the Catholic Church to confront clergy sexual abuse and cover-up, a scandal that has consumed his papacy and threatens the credibility of the Catholic hierarchy at large.

Opening a first-ever Vatican summit on preventing abuse, Francis warned 190 bishops and religious superiors on Thursday that their flocks were demanding concrete action, not just words, to punish predator priests and keep children safe. He offered them

Some stores, home delivery services not giving up on less-than-perfect produce market

URBANDALE, Iowa — Is the "ugly produce" trend already reaching the end of its shelf life in supermarkets?

Walmart and Whole Foods in recent years tried selling some blemished fruits and vegetables at a discount, produce they said might otherwise be trashed because it's not quite the right size, shape or color. But the two chains and

others quietly ended their tests, suggesting dented apples and undersized potatoes may not be all that appealing in stores where better looking fruits and vegetables are on display. "Customers didn't accept it as much as we had

hoped," said Mona Golub of Price Chopper, a grocery chain in the Northeast that also discontinued its offering of ugly produce.

Still, some stores and home delivery startups

Case against 'Empire' actor resembles detailed movie script

Prosecutors say Smollett gave detailed instructions to accomplices in staged 'attack'

CHICAGO — As authorities laid out their case against "Empire" actor Jussie Smollett, the narrative that emerged Thursday sounded like that of a filmmaker who wrote, cast, directed and starred in a short movie.

Prosecutors said Smollett gave detailed instructions to the accomplices who helped him stage a racist, anti-gay attack on himself, including telling them specific slurs to yell, urging them to shout "MAGA country" and even pointing out a surveillance camera that he thought would record the beating.

"I believe Mr. Smollett wanted it on camera," Police Superintendent Eddie Johnson told reporters. "But unfortunately that particular camera wasn't pointed in that direction."

US says sanctions could ease with greatly reduced North Korea threat

WASHINGTON — The U.S. will not move to ease economic sanctions on North Korea until it is confident that the nuclear weapons threat from Pyongyang has been "substantially reduced," Secretary of State Mike Pompeo said on Thursday.

Pompeo didn't elaborate, but his comment seemed to leave open the possibility that sanctions relief was possible short of complete and verifiable denuclearization of the Korean Peninsula.

Pompeo told NBC's "Today" that he hopes North Korean leader Kim Jong Un will make good on his pledge to give up

his nuclear weapons during his second meeting with President Donald Trump next week in Vietnam.

But a senior administration official said the U.S. is still not sure if North Korea has decided to give up its nuclear weapons. Asked if North Korea was negotiating in good faith, the official said the nations are in a

genuine negotiation, and it will take time to "tease out" exactly what is Kim's full commitment.

The official, who is familiar with the talks and spoke only on condition of anonymity, also said that reducing the 28,500 U.S. troops stationed in South Korea has not been a topic of the talks.

There has been discussion,

however, about using the summit as a venue to declare the end of the Korean War — something that Kim has sought. The fighting ended with an armistice in July 1953. That armistice has yet to be replaced with a peace treaty, leaving the peninsula in a technical state of war.

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Judge wants 2020 trial in Parkland shooting

FORT LAUDERDALE — Trial should begin in early 2020 for the suspect in a Florida high school massacre that left 17 people dead last year, a judge said at a hearing Thursday.

Circuit Judge Elizabeth Scherer said she intends to set a definitive trial date soon for 20-year-old Nikolas Cruz, who faces the death penalty if convicted. No exact date has yet been set, and even aiming for the first part of 2020 would be quick for such a high-profile murder case.

But Scherer told lawyers that would prevent things from getting bogged down. "I'm asking both sides

to take that into account. Pace yourselves," she said. "I just ask you to keep that in mind as a goal moving forward."

Assistant State Attorney Jeff Marcus said prosecutors and defense attorneys are working as rapidly as possible to identify and interview witnesses, sort through evidence and begin planning what would likely be the biggest trial in recent Broward County history — if not ever.

"It does give us a place to work toward," Marcus said of the 2020 goal.

Cruz is accused of killing 17 and wounding 17 in the February 2018 mass shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland. He is also accused of assaulting

a jail corrections officer while in custody.

Cruz's attorneys have said he will plead guilty in return for a life prison sentence, but prosecutors have refused that offer. Investigators say Cruz confessed to the shooting the day he was arrested and prosecutors released cellphone video of Cruz describing beforehand exactly what he planned to do at the school.

With the issue of guilt in little doubt, the trial would likely focus more on Cruz's mental and emotional problems and fascination with violence, guns and death. Those issues also would play a central role in whether a jury chose to impose the death penalty.

UCF board accepts president's resignation over misused funds

ORLANDO (AP) — The board of the University of Central Florida accepted the resignation of the school's president Thursday, two days after he offered to step down to appease state lawmakers upset about the school using operating funds to pay for construction.

UCF President Dale Whittaker will leave the school immediately and the acceptance of the resignation is subject to reaching a settlement agreement in the next few weeks, university officials said.

A university vice president, Thad Seymour, was named interim head of the school while a search for a new president is conducted.

The university had come under heavy criticism from lawmakers and state education officials in recent months after the disclosure that it had spent tens of millions of dollars meant for operating expenses on construction, a violation of state rules.

The revelation infuriated state lawmakers, and

last week a top Florida lawmaker suggested — somewhat tongue in cheek — shutting down UCF for five to 10 years over the misused money.

Whittaker has said he didn't know leftover operating funds couldn't be used on new buildings. Four high-ranking administrators were fired in the wake of the scandal and the board's former chairman, Marcos Marchena, resigned from the body last week.

In his resignation letter, Whittaker concluded that a change of leadership was needed to restore confidence in UCF, especially among state education and legislative leaders.

"Our loss will be some other institution's great gain," Robert Garvy, chairman of the board of trustees, said after Thursday's emergency meeting. "Dale Whittaker has demonstrated great courage and sacrifice for the students, faculty and administration at UCF."

Whittaker was named president of one of the nation's largest universities only last year.

Florida closer to repealing smokable medical pot ban

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — The Florida House and Senate are in position to pass medical marijuana bills that repeal a ban on smokable forms of the plant when the legislative session begins next month.

The bills won't be the same, however, which means each side will have to make compromise if they want to beat a mid-March deadline set by Republican Gov. Ron DeSantis to repeal the ban.

The House Appropriations Committee approved the House bill on a 28-1 vote Thursday, the day after the Senate bill was unanimously approved in its final committee stop. Among the differences:

The Senate bill allows children to use smokable medical marijuana under certain conditions, and the House bill doesn't. Also, the two bills differ on how marijuana flowers can be used by patients.

Sheriff: Town mayor fired at deputies during raid

PORT RICHEY (AP) — The mayor of a small Florida city fired two shots at sheriff's deputies who raided his home Thursday to arrest him on allegations of practicing medicine without a license, authorities said.

Port Richey Mayor Dale Massad fired at Pasco County deputies during an early morning raid, but no one was hit and they did not return fire, Sheriff Chris Nocco said. The deputies retreated and Massad, 68, soon surrendered.

"He's lucky he's not dead," said Nocco, who said Massad will be charged with attempted murder.

He said Massad has a history of drug use, violence and threats and owns several guns, which is why deputies raided the 3,200-square-foot, waterfront home rather than make a routine arrest. He

said Massad fired after deputies announced their presence. Three other people in the home were not charged. It couldn't be immediately determined if Massad has an attorney.

Record 126.1 million tourists for Florida in 2018

MIAMI (AP) — Florida tourism officials say a record number of visitors came to the state last year.

Visit Florida, the state's official tourism marketing corporation, announced Wednesday that 126.1 million out-of-state visitors came to Florida in 2018. That's the eighth consecutive record year for Florida tourism, exceeding the 118.8 million visitors in 2017 by 6.2 percent.

Visit Florida estimates 111.8 million domestic visitors traveled to Florida in 2018, plus an estimated 10.8 million overseas visitors and 3.5 million Canadians.

Officials say travel at 18 Florida airports increased by 7.6 percent last year over the previous year, with a record 93.9 million airline passengers.

Twitter account of Tampa's mayor hacked; threat posted

TAMPA (AP) — The Twitter account of Tampa, Florida's, mayor was hacked with the hijacker posting racist and pornographic images and a threat against the airport.

The Tampa Bay Times reports that Tampa Mayor Bob Buckhorn's account with 52,000 followers was hacked early Thursday and police detectives are trying to determine the hijacker's identity.

The hacker posted several racist and vulgar tweets and a threat saying he had planted a bomb at Tampa International Airport and was "looking forward to seeing some minorities die."

The airport says it

doesn't view the threat as credible but had taken "appropriate action" to ensure passenger safety.

New jail guard shoots himself in leg at agency gun range

LOXAHATCHEE (AP) — Officials say a Florida corrections deputy accidentally shot himself in the leg at a gun range.

The Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office reports that the shooting occurred Thursday morning at the agency's gun range near Loxahatchee.

A news release says the sheriff's office was conducting a firearms qualification class for new hires when the jail guard discharged his firearm and struck himself in the right outer leg.

The employee, whose name wasn't immediately released, was transported to a nearby hospital. His wound wasn't considered life-threatening.

More than 150 IS militants from Syria handed over to Iraq

OUTSIDE BAGHOUZ, Syria — U.S.-backed Syrian forces fighting the Islamic State group handed over more than 150 Iraqi members of the group to Iraq, an Iraqi security official said Thursday, marking the biggest repatriation from Syria of captured militants so far.

The official said the IS militants were handed over to the Iraqi side late Wednesday, and that they were now in a "safe place" under investigation.

The transfer comes as the U.S.-backed Syrian Democratic Forces is involved in a standoff over the final sliver of land held by IS in eastern Syria, close to the Iraqi border.

Many believe the IS threat won't end with the pocket's recapture and that an insurgency is underway. In a foreboding sign Thursday, the IS claimed responsibility for back-to-back suicide attacks that hit a village miles away, leaving more

than a dozen people dead in a rare targeting of civilians.

A few hundred people — many of them women and terrified-looking children — were evacuated Wednesday from the group's tiny tent camp on the banks of the Euphrates River, signaling an imminent end to the territorial rule of the militants' self-declared "caliphate" that once stretched across a third of both Syria and Iraq.

Some 300 IS militants, along with hundreds of civilians believed to be mostly their families, have been under siege for more than a week in the tent camp in the village of Baghouz. It wasn't clear how many civilians remain holed up inside, along with the militants.

More trucks were sent in Thursday to the tip of a corridor leading to the camp to evacuate more people, but Associated Press journalists on the

ground outside Baghouz said no civilians emerged.

"We thought more civilians will come out today and we sent 50 trucks over," said an SDF commander who goes by his nom de guerre, Aram. "We don't know why they are not coming out."

Another SDF official said IS militants closed the roads so the civilians could not come out, citing an absence of military pressure on the group as a possible reason.

Fire guts oldest part of Bangladeshi capital, killing dozens

DHAKA, Bangladesh — In the day since a devastating fire erupted in the oldest part of Bangladesh's capital, Awal Hossain has been searching for his younger brother.

Hossain stood outside the Dhaka Medical College Hospital on Thursday evening along with others holding pictures of family members missing after the blaze. Others brought relatives out of the morgue in coffins.

"The body of his acquaintance has been found, but I can't find him," Hossain said.

The fire raced through densely packed buildings in a centuries-old district of Dhaka, killing at least 67 people, officials and witnesses said Thursday.

The fire in the Chawkbazar area was mostly under control after more than 10 hours of frantic firefighting

efforts. About 50 people were injured, with some critically burned.

The district dating to the Mughal era is crammed with buildings separated by narrow alleys, with residences commonly above shops, restaurants or warehouses on the ground floors. Denizens of the Muslim-majority nation throng to Chawkbazar each year for traditional goods to celebrate iftar, when the daily fast is broken during Ramadan.

The blaze started late Wednesday night in one building and quickly spread to others, fire department Director General Brig. Gen. Ali Ahmed said.

Many of the victims were trapped inside the buildings, said Mahfuz Riben, a control room official for the Fire Service and Civil Defense in Dhaka.

Fire officials initially said 81 bodies had been recovered, but later lowered the number to 67.

New election ordered in disputed North Carolina House race

Republican candidate conceded his lead was tainted by evidence of ballot-tampering

RALEIGH, N.C. — North Carolina's elections board Thursday ordered a new election in the nation's last undecided congressional race after the Republican candidate conceded his lead was tainted by evidence of ballot-tampering by political operatives working for him.

The State Board of Elections voted 5-0 in favor of a do-over in the mostly rural 9th Congressional District but did not immediately set a date.

In moving to order a new election, board chairman Bob Cordle cited "the corruption, the absolute mess with the absentee ballots."

"Today was a great step forward for democracy in North Carolina," the Democrat in the race, Dan McCready, tweeted afterward. He said the voters deserved justice "from the moment the

first voice was silenced by election fraud."

The vote came after GOP candidate Mark Harris, in a surprising turn, dropped his bid to be declared the winner and instead called for a new election. He reversed course on the fourth day of an election board hearing at which investigators and witnesses detailed evidence of ballot fraud by operatives on his payroll.

"Through the testimony I've listened to over the past three days, I believe a new election should be called," Harris said. "It's become clear to me that the public's confidence in the 9th District seat general election has been undermined to an extent that a new election is warranted."

At the same time, Harris denied any knowledge of the illegal practices allegedly used by his operatives.

Harris left the hearing room without answering

questions. It was not immediately clear whether he intends to run in a new election.

The decision Thursday could leave the seat empty for months. The elections board's attorney plans to review the laws on scheduling new primaries and a new general election and propose dates to the elections board for its approval.

Harris led McCready by 905 votes out of about 280,000 cast last fall in a district that includes part of Charlotte and extends eastward through several counties along the southern edge of the state. But the state refused to certify the outcome as allegations surfaced that Harris political operative Leslie McCrae Dowless may have tampered with mail-in absentee ballots.

According to testimony and other findings detailed at the board hearing, Dowless conducted an illegal "ballot harvesting" operation

while working for Harris. Dowless and his assistants helped voters obtain absentee ballots and then gathered up the filled-in ballots from them by offering to put them in the mail, the board was told.

Dowless' workers in rural Bladen County testified that they were directed to collect blank or incomplete ballots from voters, forge signatures on them and even fill in votes for local candidates.

It is generally against the law in North Carolina for anyone other than the voter or a family member to handle someone's completed ballot.

Harris told the board that he is still dealing from health problems caused by a blood infection that landed him in a hospital and led to two strokes since the election, adding, "I struggled this morning with both recall and confusion."

But he insisted:

"Neither I nor any of the leadership of my campaign were aware of or condoned the improper activities that have been testified to in this hearing."

Harris also testified that Dowless had assured him that he wouldn't collect absentee ballots in violation of state law. "I'll never forget. He said it again and again. He said, 'We do not take the ballot,'" the candidate testified.

Judge imposes gag order on Trump confidant Stone

WASHINGTON — A federal judge ordered Roger Stone not to discuss his criminal case with anyone and issued a stinging reprimand Thursday over the longtime Trump confidant's decision to post a photo on Instagram of the judge with what appeared to be the crosshairs of a gun.

U.S. District Judge Amy Berman Jackson said that Stone would "pose a danger" to others in the case unless she modified the terms of his release to include the gag order.

Stone had taken the witness stand to try to explain his post and apologize to the judge, repeatedly telling her that he had made an egregious and inexcusable mistake.

"Thank you, but the apology rings quite hollow," the judge shot back before instituting the gag order.

The 66-year-old Stone has pleaded not guilty to charges he lied to Congress, engaged in witness tampering and obstructed a congressional investigation into possible coordination between Russia and Trump's 2016 presidential campaign.

US stocks decline, breaking S&P 500's 3-day winning streak

Health care and energy companies led U.S. stocks lower Thursday, ending a three-day winning streak for the S&P 500 and giving the benchmark index only its fourth loss this month.

The modest sell-off came as investors weighed mixed economic data and company earnings reports while keeping an eye on Washington, where U.S. and Chinese negotiators resumed high-level talks aimed at ending their costly trade dispute. Treasury yields rose and the price of gold fell.

The S&P 500 fell 9.82 points, or 0.4 percent, to 2,774.88. The Dow Jones Industrial Average lost 103.81 points, or 0.4 percent, to 25,850.63.

The Nasdaq composite declined 29.36 points, or 0.4 percent, to 7,459.71. The Russell 2000 index of smaller companies gave up 6.11 points, or 0.4 percent, to 1,575.55.

Threat allegations keep Coast Guard officer jailed

GREENBELT, Md. — A Coast Guard officer suspected of drawing up a hit list of top Democrats and network TV journalists spent hours on his work computer researching the words and deeds of infamous bombers and mass shooters while also stockpiling weapons, federal prosecutors said Thursday.

Lt. Christopher Paul Hasson, 49, was ordered held without bail on drug and gun charges while prosecutors gather evidence to support more serious charges involving what they portrayed as a domestic terror plot by a man who espoused white-supremacist views.

Hasson, a former Marine who worked at Coast Guard headquarters in Washington on a program to acquire advanced new cutters for the agency, was arrested last week. Investigators gave no immediate details on how or when he came to their attention.

Federal agents found 15 guns, including several rifles, and over 1,000 rounds of ammunition inside his basement apartment in Silver Spring, Maryland.

In court papers this week,

federal prosecutors said he compiled what appeared to be a computer-spreadsheet hit list that included House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, Senate Democratic Leader Chuck Schumer and presidential hopefuls Sens. Kirsten Gillibrand, Elizabeth Warren, Cory Booker and Kamala Harris. Also mentioned were such figures as MSNBC's Chris Hayes and Joe Scarborough and CNN's Chris Cuomo and Van Jones.

In arguing against bail Thursday, federal prosecutor Jennifer Sykes said Hasson would log onto his government computer during work and spend hours searching for information on such people

as the Unabomber, the Virginia Tech gunman and anti-abortion bomber Eric Rudolph.

Sykes said the charges so far are just the "tip of the iceberg" and called Hasson a "domestic terrorist" who appeared to be planning attacks inspired by the manifesto of Anders Behring Breivik, the Norwegian right-wing extremist who killed 77 people in a 2011 bomb-and-shooting rampage.

Public defender Julie Stelzig accused prosecutors of making inflammatory accusations against her client without providing the evidence to back them up. "It is not a crime to think

negative thoughts about people," she said.

She also questioned whether the government is trying to make an example out of Hasson, given criticism that authorities have overlooked domestic terrorists.

"Perhaps now they can say, 'Look, we're not targeting only Muslims,'" she said.

Stelzig said Hasson doesn't have a criminal record and has served 28 years in the Coast Guard. She described him as a "committed public servant" and a loving husband and father.

Hasson spent about \$14,000 on weapons, survival gear and other equipment, Sykes said. However, Hasson's public defender argued that the number of firearms found in Hasson's apartment is "modest, at best" for many gun collectors in other parts of the country.

"There is nothing I'm seeing in here that would show he was stockpiling weapons," Stelzig said.

U.S. Magistrate Judge Charles Day agreed to keep Hasson behind bars but said he is willing to revisit his decision in 14 days if prosecutors haven't brought more serious charges by then.

Ford begins probe into whether gas mileage was overstated

DETROIT (AP) — Ford Motor Co. has launched an investigation into whether flaws in an internal mathematical model may have caused it to overstate gas mileage and understate pollution from a wide range of vehicles.

The company says a group of employees reported possible problems with the model in September, prompting the company to hire an outside firm to run tests. Testing will start with the 2019 Ford Ranger small pickup truck, and if problems are found, the company will start looking at models dating back to 2017.

Ford says it has no evidence yet that mileage or pollution numbers are wrong, but the investigation has just started. The company says it's too early to tell how many and which models might be involved.

Oakland teachers walk off the job in latest teacher strife

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Teachers in Oakland, California, went on strike Thursday, part of a national wave of discontent by educators over classroom conditions, pay and other issues. Recent walkouts have taken place in West Virginia, Los Angeles and Denver.

The city's 3,000 teachers want a 12 percent retroactive raise covering 2017 to 2020 to compensate for what they say are the among the lowest salaries for public school teachers in the expensive San Francisco Bay Area. They also want the district to hire more counselors to support students and more full-time nurses.

The district initially offered a 5 percent raise covering 2017 to 2020, saying it is squeezed by rising costs and a budget crisis.

In negotiations Wednesday aimed at averting a strike, the district increased its proposal to a 7 percent raise over four years and a one-time 1.5 percent bonus.

Advocates say US still separates migrant families needlessly

HOUSTON (AP) — Months after the Trump administration announced an end to its widescale separation of migrant parents and children, the policy remains a heated issue in the courts and at the border as critics contend the government is still needlessly breaking up immigrant families.

The Texas Civil Rights Project released a report Thursday that counts 272 separations at a single Texas courthouse since June, when President Donald Trump issued an executive order ending widespread separations amid public outrage.

The bulk of those cases involve children who cross the U.S.-Mexico border with relatives other than their parents, such as grandparents, uncles and aunts, or adult siblings.

Thirty-eight cases involved a parent or legal guardian, the majority of whom had criminal convictions, the group said.

In a statement, U.S. Customs and Border Protection argued the group incorrectly categorized cases involving other relatives because the Homeland Security Act "does not make concessions for anyone other than a parent or legal guardian." CBP includes the Border Patrol, which apprehends people entering the U.S. illegally.

The government and the American Civil Liberties Union were due back in court Thursday to discuss what might be thousands of children who were separated before a June court order requiring the speedy re-unification of families.

Concerns about contamination with stem cell treatment

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am a 76-year-old male who's thinking of having fetal stem cell therapy for Parkinson's disease. Please tell me your feelings and offer advice on this subject matter? — S.C.

ANSWER: I am frequently asked about stem cell treatment, and my answer is usually that the theory makes sense and preliminary results are encouraging, but further research is necessary before I (by nature, a conservative physician) feel comfortable advising it for various conditions, including Parkinson's disease.

However, recent reports from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention have made me even more concerned — this time, about infection. In December, the Food and Drug Administration issued a warning about stem cell treatment from umbilical cord blood. Twelve patients became ill with infections from E. coli and other fecal bacteria after injection, and the bacteria were found in unopened vials of the stem cells. The FDA plans to increase inspec-

tion of stem cell operators. There have been other adverse events reported, such as loss of eyesight (after injections into the eye) and growth of a spinal tumor.

I do not recommend stem cell treatment at this time, apart from its use in combination with chemotherapy for cancer or immune system diseases. More data is needed to prove its effectiveness, and better procedures are necessary to reduce infection risk.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am an 81-year-old woman, in very good health, with the exception of

glaucoma and macular degeneration, both of which are under treatment. So far, I can drive in the daytime and I read the newspaper with the help of a magnifying glass and eyeglasses.

I've heard of hypoxia therapy to increase red blood cells and provide general health benefits. Do you know anything about it? I've found it easy to do for a brief span of time, a few times a day, or a 20-minute session. Breathing in through the nose, then out through the nose, expelling as much air as possible, and then holding my breath for 12 seconds or so.

Is it considered safe and effective for any health condition, or is it just another health fad? — E.M.

ANSWER: I was unable to find reliable information supporting the use of this type of breathing for any specific condition or to increase either red blood cells or general health benefits. I have two concerns about it:

The first is physiology. It is true that having persistently low oxygen levels will increase

erythropoietin, which is a hormone promoting red blood cell production. This is why people who smoke or have chronic lung disease sometimes have higher-than-normal blood counts. However, I doubt that your oxygen level will drop out of normal after 12 seconds of not breathing. Having experimented with a pulse oximeter, which gives immediate results on oxygen level, I know it takes a while — as long as a minute of not breathing — to get the oxygen level to go down. Further, even if your oxygen level does go down, I don't know if the purported benefit is worth the cost of damage done while having low oxygen.

Secondly, blood cell levels are highly regulated to be optimum in healthy people. Getting more is not necessarily better (athletes who have taken erythropoietin to improve athletic performance have died from stroke due to the blood actually being too thick). If your blood counts are low, it may indicate a serious problem requiring evaluation.

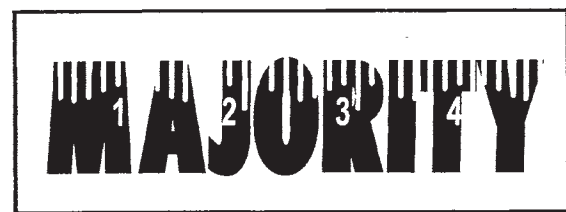

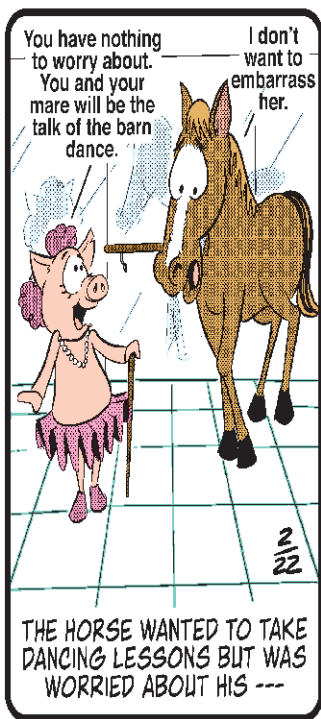

Opening lead: King of ♥

Had today's deal occurred in a social game or in a rubber bridge game, declarer would surely have started on trumps after winning the opening heart lead. He would hope to hold his losers to two trumps and a heart, which is exactly what would happen with any normal lie of the trump suit. The deal was played in a

duplicate pairs game, however, and the struggle for an overtrick yielded a surprising result.

South won the opening heart lead in hand and decided to try to discard his losing heart. He cashed the king of diamonds and led a diamond to dummy's ace. East ruffed the queen of diamonds with the five of spades and declarer over-ruffed with the six. Dummy was re-entered with the king of clubs and South led dummy's jack of diamonds. East discarded a heart instead of ruffing so South discarded his remaining heart.

"Why didn't East ruff?," thought South. South decided that either East didn't have any more trumps or he was down to a singleton ace. South tried leading a low spade from dummy and was not very surprised when East played the ace. South ruffed the heart lead from East and then led the jack of spades, running it when West played low. A trump to the king drew the last trump and South discarded a low club on the six of diamonds. That was two overtricks and a top on the board! Nicely done.

White House ends California talks on mileage dispute

WASHINGTON — The Trump administration on Thursday broke off talks on vehicle mileage standards with California, increasing the chances of a court battle that threatens to unsettle the auto industry.

The White House, which has proposed freezing the standards, said it would now move unilaterally to finish its own mileage rule later this year “with the goal of promoting safer, cleaner, and more affordable vehicles.”

The administration’s action challenges California’s decades-old authority to set its own, tougher mileage standards. California has used a waiver that Congress granted it under the 1970s Clean Air Act to help deal with its punishing smog. About a dozen

states follow California’s mileage standards; that group accounts for about one-third of U.S. auto sales.

Lawmakers and automakers had urged a settlement and warned that different standards could bring years of court battles and raise costs for automakers and consumers.

“The industry requires certainty about future regulatory obligations,” Honda said in a statement. State and federal government rules should aim for “continuous progress” on cutting fossil-fuel emissions and promoting electric vehicles, the automaker added.

It urged the two sides to find middle ground.

21 proposals to consider going forward, some of them obvious and easy to adopt, others requiring new laws.

But his main point in summoning the Catholic hierarchy to the Vatican for a four-day tutorial was to impress upon them that clergy sex abuse is not confined to the United States or Ireland, but is a global scourge that requires a concerted, global response.

“Listen to the cry of the young, who want justice,” Francis told the gathering. “The holy people of God are watching and expect not just simple and obvious condemnations, but efficient and concrete measures to be established.”

More than 30 years after the scandal first erupted in Ireland and Australia, and 20 years after it hit the U.S., bishops and Catholic officials in many parts of

Europe, Latin America, Africa and Asia still either deny that clergy sex abuse exists in their regions or play down the problem.

Francis, the first Latin American pope, called the summit after he himself botched a well-known sex abuse cover-up case in Chile last year and the scandal reignited in the U.S.

The tone for the high stakes summit was set at the start, with victims from five continents — Europe, Africa, Asia, South America and North America — telling the bishops of the trauma of their abuse and the additional pain the church’s indifference caused them.

“You are the physicians of the soul and yet, with rare exceptions, you have been transformed — in some cases — into murderers of the soul, into murderers of the faith,” Chilean survivor Juan Carlos Cruz told the bishops in his videotaped testimony.

Police said Smollett planned the hoax because he was unhappy with his salary and wanted to promote his career. Before the attack, he also sent a letter that threatened him to the Chicago studio where “Empire” is shot, police said.

Smollett, who is black and gay, turned himself in on charges that he filed a false police report last month when he said he was attacked in downtown Chicago by two masked men who hurled derogatory remarks and looped a rope around his neck.

The actor “took advantage of the pain and anger of racism to promote his career,” police Superintendent Eddie Johnson said.

“This publicity stunt was a scar that Chicago didn’t earn and certainly didn’t deserve,” Johnson added.

At Smollett’s first court appearance, one of his attorneys, Jack Prior, told the judge that the actor maintains “these are outrageous allegations” and

denies they are true.

Prosecutors released a four-page document that outlined their case against Smollett, who plays a gay character on the show that follows a black family as they navigate the ups and downs of the recording industry.

For the hoax, Smollett solicited the help of two muscular brothers. One of them was Abindola “Abel” Osundairo, a friend he worked out with and who worked on the show as a stand-in for another character. He also supplied Smollett with the drug Ecstasy, prosecutors said.

“He probably knew he needed somebody with bulk,” Johnson said of Smollett’s decision to hire the pair.

A few days before Osundairo and his brother, Olabinjo “Ola” Osundairo, were scheduled to fly to Nigeria, Smollett sent him a text that prosecutors said set the scheme in motion.

“Might need your help on the low,” he wrote his friend, according to the document.

During a meeting with the brothers, Smollett told them he wanted the attack

to happen Jan. 28 near his apartment in the city’s Streeterville neighborhood, and that he wanted them to get his attention by calling out slurs, prosecutors said. He instructed them to put the rope around his neck, pour gasoline on him and yell the MAGA remark, an apparent reference to President Donald Trump slogan during the 2016 campaign.

Smollett then gave one of the brothers \$100 to buy the rope, ski masks, gloves and red baseball caps that resemble those worn by Trump supporters. He drove them to the spot where he wanted the attack to take place, taking time to show them the camera that he said would capture it, prosecutors said.

He drove them home, wrote a check to one of the brothers for \$3,500 and flew to New York.

The time of the “attack” was pushed back to 2 a.m. Jan 29 because Smollett’s return flight was delayed. The brothers ordered an Uber ride to pick them up at their apartment and climbed into the vehicle toting their supplies, including bleach because

there was a decision to use that instead of gasoline, according to prosecutors’ summary.

Police know much of this, they said, because Chicago has one of the world’s most extensive video surveillance systems. Investigators, in effect, pieced together the route the two men took by cab and foot to and from the scene, Johnson said.

The encounter lasted about 45 seconds. The brothers, Johnson said, “punched him a little bit,” but the scratches and bruises that Smollett had on his face were “most likely self-inflicted.”

When police arrived, he told them what happened and pointed out the nearby surveillance camera, prosecutors said at the court hearing.

Smollett also tried to mislead police about the suspects, telling them that the area around one attacker’s eyes was white skinned, even though the brothers are black, prosecutors said.

Johnson said Smollett used one of the most terrifying symbols of racial hatred — a noose — that is

synonymous with lynchings during the Civil Rights movement.

“I’m offended by what happened and I’m also angry,” he said.

By the time Smollett appeared on “Good Morning America,” police already had a pretty good idea that he was lying, thanks to dozens of search warrants, subpoenas and extensive analysis of camera and phone records. They also knew the names of the brothers, and the fact that they had flown to Nigeria and were scheduled to return to Chicago on Feb. 13.

The men were arrested and questioned for hours. At hour 47 — one hour before police had to either charge the men or release them — Johnson said the two confessed to what they had done. They were subsequently released without being charged.

Prosecutors charged Smollett late Wednesday with felony disorderly conduct — the charge that is used for filing a false police. He turned himself in to police Thursday and was jailed until an afternoon court appearance.

haven’t given up on the idea of selling less-than-perfect produce to reduce food waste and say they’re doing well.

At a Hy-Vee store in Iowa, a recent display of “Misfits” produce included packs of apples, lemons and oranges that were either too big or small, or otherwise substandard in appearance. A sign explained that “6 million pounds of fresh produce goes unused each year,” though the packages didn’t specify why the produce might have otherwise been thrown away.

“I like the cost savings and it is good to help and not throw so much away,” said shopper Brian Tice, who bought a pack of small oranges.

Another shopper, Jamie

Shae, said she didn’t realize there was anything special about the fruit.

“I happened to see the bags of lemons,” said Shae, who was in a rush and grabbed two bags.

Shopper Joan Hitzel, who was browsing other produce nearby, said she thought the Misfits were a good idea given the tons of food that gets thrown away, but didn’t plan to buy any that day.

The supplier of the Misfits produce to supermarkets, Robinson Fresh, said about 300 grocery locations still sell the fruits and vegetables, including the Hy-Vee stores. Kroger also said it still plans to introduce its “Pickuliar Picks” this spring.

But among other regional chains that have stopped carrying ugly produce are Meijer in the Midwest, Hannaford based in Maine and Pittsburgh-based Giant

Eagle, which cited “inconsistent customer interest” for pulling the plug on its “Produce with Personality.”

Walmart no longer offers the damaged “I’m Perfect” apples it introduced in Florida in 2016.

The efforts channeled growing interest in reducing food waste. Government agencies say the best way to reduce waste is to stop producing too much food. The U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates that 31 percent of the 430 billion pounds of the nation’s food supply goes uneaten. That does not include the fruits and vegetables that get tossed at the farm level, before foods reach stores.

For fruits and vegetables that don’t meet supermarket standards, some may get processed for products like juices and some go to food

banks. Startups delivering ugly produce say there’s so much they’re not taking from food banks.

Shopper preferences may not be the only challenge for ugly produce in supermarkets.

“Retailers really prize their produce sections,” said Imperfect Produce CEO Ben Simon, whose company had partnered with Whole Foods on a

test at the chain. Grocers might worry that cheaper produce will cannibalize sales of regular produce, or give off a bad image, he said.

Delivery startups say they’re seeing interest in their services. But they are up against shoppers who inspect the fruits and vegetables they buy and those who worry about all the packaging.

Pompeo said he didn’t want to get into the details about what either side was willing to offer to make progress in the talks.

“The American people should know we have the toughest economic sanctions that have ever been placed on North Korea and we won’t release that pressure until such time as we’re confident we’ve substantially reduced that

risk,” Pompeo said, adding that he hopes the two leaders will take a “truly historic step forward” at their meeting in Hanoi.

Asked if the U.S. was willing to compromise on its goal of complete, verifiable denuclearization of the Korean Peninsula, Pompeo said:

“To keep the American people safe, we have to reduce the threat from a nuclear-armed North Korea and then, in turn, we can work on peace and security on the

peninsula and a brighter future for the North Korean people.”

Some lawmakers and North Korea experts worry that Trump will grant too many concessions to Kim without making him honor his pledge to give up his nuclear weapons.

They note that Kim still has a stockpile of nuclear warheads and ballistic missiles and the ability to produce the uranium or plutonium needed to make more. Kim has not yet signed any deal to

denuclearize his nation, and commercial satellite images indicate that he’s actually moving forward with his program.

“There are ample reasons to be skeptical that Chairman Kim is committed to a nuclear-free North Korea” the Democratic chairmen of the House Armed Services, Intelligence and Foreign Affairs committees wrote in a letter to Trump on Thursday.

Reps. Adam Smith of Washington, Adam

Schiff of California and Eliot Engel of New York, respectively, accused the White House of cutting off congressional access to intelligence about North Korea’s weapons and withholding information about the talks from Congress.

“A summit that amounts to little more than spectacle will further erode the public confidence and the credibility of the United States, an outcome that we all wish to avoid,” they wrote.

Pirates pull away down the stretch, reach Sweet 16

Defense, free throws overshadow Port Charlotte's struggles in victory over Clearwater

CLEARWATER — After beating Clearwater on Thursday, the Port Charlotte seniors caught a glimpse of what it looks like when your season ends. It's abrupt and heartbreaking.

They had no intentions of letting their season end.

Tied with 2:25 left in the Regional Quarterfinal, the Pirates (25-1) entered survival mode needing one run to close out the game against Clearwater High (19-8) on the Tornadoes' court.

After struggling to find their rhythm for much of the game, Brandon Gainey's 3-pointer and a heap of free throws gave the Pirates the 43-36 edge, extending their

season by at least one more game.

"Their perseverance and their overall grit down the stretch," Port Charlotte coach Kip Rhoten said. "They took the lead there near the end and the crowd got into it and then Brandon hits a huge 3 in that corner. I loved it because I looked back (at) a couple of the guys and they were like, 'everything's fine.'"

Neither team had much success on offense throughout the game. The two squads totaled five first-quarter points with Port Charlotte holding a 4-1 edge at quarter's end and led 18-13 at the half.

But low-scoring games play right into the Pirates' hands. They held Clearwater, a team that averages 64.5 points per game to just 36.

Though they're defense excelled, it took until the third quarter for the scoring to heat up.

Holding a 20-18 lead with just over four minutes left in the third, Gainey hit the Tornadoes with his signature slam off the toss from senior Tyler Perry. Clearwater then came back with a 4-point play to tie the game.

"The player that was there jumped up so I just faded to the corner," Gainey said. "We just had to lock in, keep our composure and win the game."

Down the stretch, it came down to free throws. The Pirates were 16 of 20 in the first half and hit 10 of 12 in the fourth quarter. The two

Tarpons put on defensive clinic, thrashing

PUNTA GORDA — Charlotte High School boys basketball coach Tom Massolio has coached his team for 22 years, and he has never seen anything like he saw Thursday night in the Tarpons Region 7A-3 quarterfinal matchup against Boca Ciega.

NCAA's best player injured knee after shoe ripped apart while playing UNC

DURHAM, N.C. — Soon after Zion Williamson's shoe ripped apart, Nike's image took a hit.

The freak injury during one of the college basketball season's marquee games immediately sparked debates about everything from the shoe manufacturer to insurance issues and whether the likely NBA lottery pick should risk his professional future by continuing to play for the top-ranked-for-now Blue Devils.

Coach Mike Krzyzewski said after Duke's loss to No. 8 North Carolina on Wednesday night that Williamson sprained his right knee and didn't know how long he will be out.

Braves considering changes to lineup

KISSIMMEE — If Ronald Acuna Jr. is dropped down in the Atlanta Braves' batter order, Ender Inciarte and Ozzie Albies could be the top candidates to lead off.

"I'm going to wait and see where we're at in a couple of weeks. I don't think we have to set a lineup right now, and it could change," manager Brian Snitker said. "I have different ideas but I don't think right now or even a week from now we have to have anything set."

Acuna hit .328 in 66 games as a leadoff hitter last season, when he batted .293 overall with 26 home runs in 111 games and was voted NL Rookie of the Year. Atlanta went 90-72 and won its first division title in five years.

"If it was up to me personally, I would like to stay in the leadoff spot, simply because I like hitting there," he said Thursday as the Braves held their first full-squad workout.

His power numbers could merit a spot closer to the middle of the batting order, which will get a makeover following the signing of former AL MVP Josh Donaldson.

Freddie Freeman hit third last year and Nick Markakis cleanup. Donaldson said he was attracted to the "chance

to be able to hit in front of Freddie and guys like that, and to have some speed in front of me to be able to drive some guys in."

Inciarte hit .223 in 54 games as the leadoff hitter and .326 in 23 games in the No. 2 hole.

Albies batted .234 in 40 games atop the order and .287 in 82 games hitting second.

Atlanta is searching for a fifth starter to join a rotation that includes Mike Foltynewicz, Julio Teheran, Sean Newcomb and Kevin Gausman. The Braves also will use spring training to evaluate shortstop Dansby Swanson and closer Arodys Vizcaino.

Swanson had offseason wrist surgery after playing in 136 games last season.

Vizcaino and Mike Soroka, a 21-year-old candidate for the fifth rotation spot, had sore shoulders in 2018. None of them will play in the early spring training games; Snitker said they are all on schedule to be ready for the regular season.

Swanson's training routine has included everything except taking batting practice against pitchers. No limitations have been placed on Vizcaino, who saved a game in the postseason but pitched only 38 1/3 innings during the regular season.

Marlins hope Victor Victor Mesa is a winner

JUPITER — For a franchise that has been a perennial loser, Victor Victor Mesa sounds like a winner.

The Miami Marlins can't be sure, however, because they've never seen Mesa play. They agreed to a \$5.25 million signing bonus last October with the highly touted Cuban defector and can begin to assess the investment Saturday when their spring training season starts.

It has been more than two years since Mesa's most recent game. The Marlins based their evaluation of him on videotape of his play in Cuba.

"That was the only opportunity we had, and every other major league team had," said Gary Denbo, vice president of player development and

scouting. "But I have a lot of confidence what we're going to see is going to be exciting."

Mesa, 22, left Cuba nearly a year ago to pursue a major league career and was considered the top international free agent last fall. Miami signed him and his 17-year-old brother, Victor Jr., after both tried out at Marlins Park for scouts from all 30 major league teams.

The session stoked the Marlins' enthusiasm for the elder Mesa.

"He took a batting practice that would rival any of our major league players, hitting head-high line drives all around the field," Denbo said Thursday.

The Marlins don't necessarily expect Mesa to do that in spring training, at least not right away. But he'll play a lot, working off the rust before heading to the minor

leagues to start the regular season.

"We'll get him as many at-bats as we can and see him in different situations," manager Don Mattingly said. "There's going to be a process, with him not playing games in a while and getting him up to speed."

That's something he has in abundance — speed — and he's regarded as an excellent defensive player. But the 5-foot-9, 165-pound Mesa didn't show much power in Cuba, and it's uncertain how quickly he'll adjust to big league pitching.

Mesa has gone about his business quietly since full-squad workouts began Monday.

"I'm happy just to be back on the field," he said through an interpreter. "I was out of the game for a long time."

The Mesa signings were part of a push by the Marlins to be more active on the international market under CEO Derek Jeter.

A Cuban star outfielder would be good business for the attendance-challenged franchise, and Victor Victor is already accustomed to being asked when he'll reach the majors. The question was raised at a news conference after he signed, and he addressed it again after reporting for spring training.

"I believe the moment will come," he said. "All I have to do is work hard."

The Marlins are rebuilding under Jeter and are in the midst of a playoff drought dating back to 2003.

They anticipate their climb into contention will include Mesa, but have no reason to fast-track him.

Woods commits to play in Arnold Palmer Invitational

ORLANDO — Tiger Woods, the biggest show in golf, has committed to play in the Arnold Palmer Invitational, set for March 7-10 at Bay Hill Club and Lodge.

A year after he contended for a win during his first start at Bay Hill since 2013, Woods seeks his ninth victory in the API, a milestone no player has accomplished at the same event. Woods' eight wins currently tie him with Sam Snead, who set the record with eight wins at the Greater Greensboro Open.

Woods' decision to play Bay Hill and The Players Championship a week later delivered a big blow to the Honda Classic, set for next week at PGA National in Palm Beach Gardens.

The retooled Florida Swing has forced players to make decisions about when to potentially take breaks.

But Bay Hill was an easy one for the 43-year-old, a former Orlando resident who has dominated the tournament since his first win in 2000.

"I always love playing at Bay Hill," Woods said in a statement. "I have such great memories of

Arnold and am happy to be back for the 19th time. Of course, it would be great to win and set a new record, especially here, but that's for me to do on the course. I made a little run at it last year and am hoping I can put myself in position again."

Woods finished tied for fifth place in 2018 with a 10-under-par 278 total, but he was in the hunt for the title until hitting his drive out of bounds on the par-5 16th hole. Rory McIlroy ended up winning the tournament.

Woods is seeking his 81st win on the PGA Tour, one short of Snead's long-standing record.

Boston Globe baseball writer Cafardo dies at 62

FORT MYERS (AP) — Longtime Boston Globe baseball writer Nick Cafardo died Thursday while covering spring training after collapsing on the sidewalk outside the Red Sox clubhouse. He was 62.

The newspaper said Cafardo appeared to have an embolism. The team's medical staff responded quickly but was unable to revive him.

"For over three decades, Nick was a fixture at Fenway Park and throughout ballparks across the country. His coverage was as consistent as the game itself," the Red Sox said in a statement.

Cafardo joined the Globe in 1989 from The (Quincy) Patriot Ledger. He covered the Red Sox and the Patriots.

Cafardo was covering spring training on Thursday when he collapsed on the sidewalk between the ballpark and the batting cages

where players were working out to prepare for the defense of their World Series title. The newspaper said it was his day off, but "Cafardo's love of baseball and commitment to his craft compelled him to report to JetBlue Park."

"Nick was one of the best people to ever walk through our doors — generous with his time and insights, immensely knowledgeable, deeply devoted to the Globe," editor Brian McGrory said in the paper's obituary.

Cafardo also wrote a book on the Patriots dynasty, "The Impossible Team: The Worst to First Patriots' Super Bowl Season."

He also wrote "If These Walls Could Talk" with Red Sox second baseman and broadcaster Jerry Remy and "Inside Pitch: Playing and Broadcasting the Game I Love," with Hall of Fame pitcher Tom Glavine.

Syracuse coach Boeheim kills pedestrian on highway

Police say coaching legend struck man while driving from game and trying to avoid accident

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP) — Longtime Syracuse basketball coach Jim Boeheim struck and killed a man standing along an interstate late Wednesday night as he tried to avoid hitting the man's disabled vehicle, police say.

Syracuse police say 51-year-old Jorge Jimenez was an occupant in a vehicle with three others when they lost control and hit a guardrail before midnight Wednesday on I-690 in Syracuse.

Boeheim struck Jimenez as he stood on the side of the road while trying to avoid the vehicle in the middle of the highway. Jimenez was taken to a local hospital, where he was pronounced dead, police said.

"I am heartbroken that a member of our

community died as the result of last night's accident," Boeheim said in a prepared statement. The 74-year-old Basketball Hall of Fame coach said he and his wife Juli "extend our deepest sympathies to the Jimenez family."

He said he would not comment further "out of respect for those involved."

Police said Boeheim is cooperating with the investigation.

"He stopped immediately and exited the vehicle," said Syracuse Sgt. Matthew Malinowski.

Police said sobriety tests administered to Boeheim and the driver of the other vehicle were negative for any signs of impairment. Onondaga County District Attorney

William Fitzpatrick said he has known Boeheim for 40 years and that the coach does not drink.

No tickets have been issued to Boeheim at this time and the investigation is continuing.

"At this point ... it appears to be just a God-awful tragedy," Fitzpatrick said.

Jimenez's daughter told the Post-Standard he was with friends buying cigarettes when he was killed. Yurisandy Jimenez Arrastre described her father — a native of Cuba who lived in the United States for 20 years — as a family man who loved to cook and tell jokes.

"My father was a man who was very sociable, very happy. He loved to help everybody without question," Arrastre

told the newspaper in Spanish.

Light rain and freezing rain were falling Wednesday night, though it is unclear if the weather had anything to do with the crash.

Just hours before, Boeheim's team defeated 18th-ranked Louisville 69-49 at the Carrier Dome.

He met his wife, his daughter and some friends for a dinner out after the game and was driving alone from the restaurant, Fitzpatrick said.

Boeheim has coached at Syracuse, his alma mater, since 1976 and is one of the most accomplished coaches in the country. He ranks second all-time in wins in Division I with 944, behind only Duke's Mike Krzyzewski.

Rory roars to hot start at World Golf Championship

McIlroy holds one-shot lead over Johnson in Mexico City, eight ahead of Woods

MEXICO CITY — Rory McIlroy flirted with a hole-in-one on the same par 4 where Tiger Woods hit out-of-bounds with his first shot in Mexico.

That's about how their days went Thursday in the Mexico Championship.

McIlroy, already off to a solid start on the back nine, hit a 2-iron on the 305-yard opening hole at Chapultepec Golf Club that landed on the front of the green and was rolling just left of the pin when it settled 6 feet away, leading to an eagle that carried him to an 8-under 63 and a one-shot lead over Dustin Johnson.

Woods got the raucous Mexican introduction for his opening tee shot, a 5-wood that also landed on the green — the wrong green. The ball bounced hard off a temporary green to the left and beyond the out-of-bounds stake into the bushes.

And then he nearly did it again, and ultimately had to get up-and-down from 60 feet away in a bunker to escape with double bogey. After a burst of birdies, he

struggled to make much the rest of the way and opened with a 71.

"I pulled across it to try and cut it and hit it dead off the toe," Woods said. "Hit both of them dead off the toe."

McIlroy's 2-iron was the signature shot in an exquisite start to this World Golf Championship. He was 6 under through an eight-hole stretch in the middle of the round, and a 20-foot birdie on No. 8 toward the end of his round is what gave him the lead over Johnson.

It was his second straight week with a 63. "I wouldn't say it was easy," McIlroy said. "I hit a lot of good golf shots, but I left myself a lot of tap-ins for birdies. As 63s go, I shot 63 at Riviera last week, but this felt probably a little more stress-free."

The only blemish on his round came at the par-5 sixth, when he pulled his tee shot into the trees and looked as though he would have to punch out back to the fairway.

"The one branch it could not hit, it hit," he said. "It all levels out at the end of the day. I'm just in a good frame of mind, managing my game well, putting went good."

Johnson won the Mexico Championship two years ago, part of three straight victories during the best stretch of golf he ever played. Johnson said he struggled with his swing at Pebble Beach and Riviera, and worked all week on the range in Mexico.

"It's starting to feel the way it did two years ago," he said.

Johnson only missed three of the tree-lined fairways and was rarely out of position except on No. 12, where he lost his drive well to the right. He had no shot to the green, so he tried to put it in the bunker.

It went in and out of the bunker, onto the fringe and he holed the putt from 20 feet for his third straight birdie to start the round.

He also had back-to-back eagle putts, driving the first green to 20 feet and hitting driver on the 383-yard second hole over the trees and onto the green — as Bubba Watson was putting — to 18 feet. He made birdie on both.

Justin Thomas, who lost in a playoff last year to Phil Mickelson, chipped in from 50 feet behind the green on No. 15 for eagle and was at 66. He was

tied with Matt Kuchar, who already won in Mexico once this season at the Mayakoba Classic.

Jordan Spieth, with his father filling in because caddie Michael Greller's father died, opened with a 75.

Woods was fortunate he only started with a double bogey. He didn't realize immediately that his first tee shot was out-of-bounds, and he had reason to think his

second tee shot would turn out the same.

"It was on the exact same line," Woods said, who added he thought for a second, "This could be a pretty big number."

He had to play from the bushes to punch it into the bunker, and blasted out to a foot for his double bogey.

After his stretch of three straight birdies got him under par, he twice missed par putts from

about 4 feet, though he holed a 15-foot par putt on the 17th.

He summed up his round aptly: "Got off to a bad start. Got it going after a little bit there, made three in a row. Couldn't make any birdies after that for some reason. It is what it is."

Mickelson could relate. He bogeyed three of his first four holes on the back, shot 40 on the front and opened with a 79.

said Matt Powell, a senior industry advisor for sports for the NPD Group, a market research firm.

Playing before a crowd littered with celebrities — from Spike Lee to former President Barack Obama — Williamson was hurt in the opening minute of the game as his Nike PG 2.5, from Oklahoma City Thunder star Paul George's signature sneaker line, tore apart. Williamson wears that model frequently during games.

The 280-pound Williamson is one of the most powerful players in the game, and he tried to plant with his left foot as he lost his right foot was slipping.

The blue rubber sole ripped loose from the white shoe and Williamson's foot came all the way through the large gap. He

ended up in an awkward-almost-split, clutching the back of his right knee. He walked to the bench and a few minutes later headed to the locker room, leaving the wrecked shoe under his chair.

George said Thursday that he has talked with Nike to see what went wrong and what happened to the shoe.

"It hasn't happened to me as long as I've been in this shoe," George said. "We've made three generations, going on four now of my shoe, of being successful. So I didn't necessarily feel any way about that part — the negative part of it. My only concern was for Zion, honestly."

Since Duke is a Nike-sponsored school, Williamson has his choice of that company's footwear.

But in the embarrassing moment for Nike, when Williamson planted hard near the free-throw line, the blue

rubber sole on the shoe ripped loose from the white shoe from the heel to the toes along the outside edge. Williamson's foot came all the way through the large gap. He immediately clutched his right knee, walked on his own to the bench and a few minutes later headed to the locker room, leaving the pair of shoes under his chair.

"I've seen guys bust through shoes but not sprain their knee," Krzyzewski said. "He's gone down a couple times where he's slipped and saved the ball. That's what I thought happened. He goes so fast that maybe if there's something slippery, that happened."

The injury also set off a fresh round of debate about whether Williamson — the possible No. 1 overall pick in the NBA draft, should he leave Duke after his freshman season — would be wise to end his college season in an attempt to avoid an injury that could jeopardize his pro

career. NBA Hall of Famer Scottie Pippen made the case for it a month ago, saying on ESPN that "I would shut it down."

Asked to respond on Feb. 5 to those comments, Williamson turned to his locker room sidekick, walk-on Mike Buckmire, and asked, "Buck, would you hate me if I shut down the season?"

"I couldn't do that to my teammates," Williamson continued. "Again, thank you for, like, seeing the confidence in me and the type of player I can become. But I love college too much to stop playing. I wouldn't give this up."

Now that he's actually hurt, it's unknown if his feelings have changed.

It's also unclear, if he decides to continue his college career, whether Williamson has an insurance policy to protect him in case of injury like many other elite college athletes have

purchased.

Duke spokesman Mike DeGeorge on Thursday could not confirm a report by Action Network that Williamson had an \$8 million loss of value policy written by Winston-Salem-based International Specialty Insurance that would pay out if he slipped past the 16th pick in this June's draft.

Loss of value policies are not offered by the NCAA, but the governing body does offer disability insurance.

Spokeswoman Stacey Osburn said the NCAA allows schools to purchase loss of value policies on a player's behalf.

She added that the NCAA also facilitates a disability insurance program for players in five sports, including men's basketball, in which athletes can purchase policies with pre-approved financing to protect against future loss of earnings due to injuries suffered in college.

Dwyane Wade scored 19 points for Miami, and Dion Waiters added 18.

Miami led 99-98 after Wade's runner with 1:56 left. Marjanovic made two free throws to put Philadelphia ahead 100-99.

Following Wade's missed jumper, Redick made the 3 from the top of the key to make it 103-99 with 1:04 left.

Kelly Olynyk then missed a 3-point attempt, and Marjanovic made the first of two free throws with 38.3 ticks left to put Philadelphia up five.

Marjanovic, starting for Embiid, had 11 points and seven rebounds to

help Philadelphia to a 23-13 lead before being lifted with 3:34 left in the first quarter.

He returned 3 1/2 minutes into the second, finishing the half with 16 points and eight rebounds while making all six of his field-goal attempts to help the 76ers to a 57-50 halftime lead.

The 37-year-old Wade, playing in his last season, was honored early in the first quarter with a highlight video that included a tribute from 76ers great Allen Iverson.

Philadelphia fans gave Wade a standing ovation following the video, and the Miami star pounded his heart and waved back in appreciation.

Cavaliers 111, Suns 98

Cedi Osman scored 19 points, Kevin Love had 16 points and 11 rebounds and Cleveland sent Phoenix to its franchise-record 16th straight loss.

NBA-worst Phoenix (11-49) topped the record of 15 set March 2-April 1, 2018. The Suns'

last victory was Jan. 12 over Denver.

Love played 22 minutes in his third game since returning from foot surgery. He was 6 of 13 from the field.

Devin Booker scored 30 points for Phoenix, and Kelly Oubre Jr. had 23.

Trail Blazers 113, Nets 99

Jusuf Nurkic had 27 points and 12 rebounds, new backup Enes Kanter added 18 points and nine boards in his Portland debut, and the Trail Blazers beat Brooklyn.

The center tandem was so good that the Trail Blazers didn't even need a big night from All-Star guard Damian Lillard, who was just 5 for 21 from the field.

He finished with 13 points, eight rebounds and eight assists.

Poole scores 22 to lead No. 7 Michigan over Minnesota

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Jordan Poole scored 22 points to lead a long-range shooting spree by seventh-ranked Michigan and the Wolverines beat Minnesota 69-60 on Thursday to set up a weekend matchup against rival Michigan State for first place in the Big Ten.

Jon Teske had 17 points and seven rebounds and Ignas Brazdeikis added 10 points for the Wolverines (24-3, 13-3). They are tied with the Spartans at the top of the conference, with Purdue a half-game

behind.

Cousins shares gripes about NCAA after Williamson injury

OAKLAND, Calif. — The topic first prompted DeMarcus Cousins to make a plug about his shoe.

Duke freshman star Zion Williamson both sprained his right knee during Wednesday's game against North Carolina and tore through the soles of his Nike shoe. Cousins mentioned that never happened to him since he is a "Puma guy."

"I don't have anything," Cousins said following morning shootaround on Thursday. "I'm a Puma guy."

Cousins still had plenty of sympathy and perspective regarding Williamson's injury. Not only did Cousins wish Williamson well. Cousins argued Williamson's injury illustrates his issues with the NCAA pertaining to the so-called one-and-done rule, if college athletes should be paid and if Williamson should sit out the rest of the season to protect his draft prospects.

"Knowing what I know now, college is bull---. College basketball and the NCAA is bull---," Cousins said. "My advice to him is do what is best for you and his family. Obviously college (basketball) isn't (doing that). It does nothing for you at this point. You're proving you're the No. 1 pick coming out and

proving your talent. Get ready for the next level."

Cousins stressed that he "loved my experience in college" during his lone season at the University of Kentucky (2010). Cousins called that experience "some of the best years in my life," as he helped the Wildcats reach the Elite 8 of the NCAA tournament. The Sacramento Kings (30-27), which play the Warriors (41-16) on Thursday at Oracle Arena, then selected Cousins No. 5 overall in the 2010 NBA draft. Still, Cousins took issue with "just how crooked the NCAA business is."

Cousins cited an ESPN report that said the cheapest ticket price for the Duke-North Carolina game cost \$2,500. The report noted one ticket sold for \$10,652.

"How much does Zion Williamson get?" Cousins asked rhetorically. "That's who they're coming to see. That's what the NCAA gets. Actually, who does it go to? How does it benefit any player on that team? But to get \$20 and a free meal, they are labeled a bad kid and get a bad rap, are called uncoachable or thugs or whatever the case may be. It's been bull---."

Therefore, Cousins argued that the NBA should eliminate the so-called one-and-done rule that requires players to play in college basketball or overseas for at least one year.

"I don't understand the point of it," Cousins said. "What's the difference between 18 and 19? Or 17 and 18? They're immature and young and ignorant to life in general. So what's the difference? They still have a lot of growing to do."

Cousins argued that players should explore skipping college and enter the G League. Former Syracuse commit Darius Bazley skipped college and planned to play in the G League. Bazley who signed with Rich Paul of Klutch Sports, changed course and agreed to a \$1 million show company internship.

Cousins also praised LaVar Ball, the outspoken father of Los Angeles Lakers guard Lonzo Ball who created the Junior Basketball Association. That league features eight teams and plays players between 18 and 20, including his son, LaMelo.

"It's not a popular thing right now, but I think it will grow over time. You've seen a couple of young guys enter that program early," Cousins said of the G League. "It's cool with what Ball did and his whole league. I think it's a cool thing. Obviously he doesn't have the greatest name and people look at him in a foolish manner. But what he's doing makes sense. He's helping his kids. He understands how the college level is corrupt."
