Peace Officers' Memorial Day was healing

SEBRING — Scores of law enforcement officers and civilians entered Grace Bible Church on Tuesday morning to mourn the community's fallen heroes. The Highlands County Sheriff's Office held the annual Peace Officers' Memorial Day to honor the dead and support the surviving family and friends.

The Sheriff's Office recognized Deputy Sheriff William J. Gentry Jr. along with 10 other Florida officers whose end of watch took place in 2018. Five additional local heroes were also honored. The day held special significance as it marked the one year anniversary when Gentry died from a gunshot he took in the line of duty on May 6, 2018.

Undersheriff Mike Brown acted as the Master of Ceremony and welcomed the large audience. Brown introduced the Honor Guard, which presented and posted the colors. Sheriff Paul Blackman led the Pledge of Allegiance.

As the guard presented the colors, the United States Military Veterans Motorcycle Club presented a floral wreath with black ribbon and a thin blue line on it.

Grace Bible's pastor, Dustin Woods, gave an invocation and the benediction. Lt. Tyrone Tyson read a poem

from an unknown author about a policeman who died and went to heaven. The officer did not expect to get in and did not need a fancy place but wanted to enter heaven. In the end, God told him to walk the beat in heaven because he had walked many beats in hell on earth already.

Cmdr. Curtis Hart of the Sebring Police Department performed a roll call with a slide show of the fallen. His voice choked with emotion at times, especially when reading the names of the local heroes. There was hardly a dry eye in the church. The tour of duties ran the gamut from a week to decades.

Brown spoke about sacrifices that peace officers make every day for those in the communities where they serve. He used some Bible scriptures to illustrate his talking points. John 15:13, NIV, "Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends" and Matthew 5:9, NIV, "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God."

Brown admitted that 2018 was one of the hardest years of his law enforcement career and said law enforcement officers are great at persevering. He quoted Romans 5:3-4, NIV, to show a correlation, "Not only so, but we also glory in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope."

He urged officers to put as much

time and energy into their families as they do their careers. He said to enjoy the sloppy oatmeal kisses from the kids and hug your spouse because in law enforcement, the end of watch is unknown.

A special highlight of the service was the presentation by a Texas police officer, Walter Henning, of a special chair in remembrance of Gentry. The wooden chair is made by Saving a Hero's Place, a company that is comprised of nine people, most of whom are law enforcement officers. The company was birthed out of the death of an officer and having to see their empty chair everyday at roll call.

The wooden chair has Gentry's name, badge and a Bible verse from Proverbs 28:1, NIV, "The wicked flee though no one pursues, but the righteous are as bold as a lion." The custom chair was inlaid with the cue stick logos on the tops of the stiles. Gentry made custom cue sticks.

The chair will be on display in the Sheriff's Office lobby through Friday. A live stream of the 21-gun salute was shown on a large screen and "Taps" was played as the audience stood on its collective feet.

"I get very emotional at these things," retired HCSO Maj. Paul Hinman said as the colors were retired. "I was a veteran and so I salute the flag. These types of

County may do an impact fee study

For 'flexibility'

SEBRING — County commissioners might do another impact fee study, depending on what they hear during budget discussions this summer.

The consensus from the Board of County Commission, based on discussions at Tuesday's meeting, is that they really don't want to spend an estimated \$92,000 for another study if they have no intention of reinstating impact fees after a 10-year moratorium.

Commission Vice Chair Ron Handley asked County Administrator Randy Vosburg if the county was under any obligation or deadline to have impact fees. Vosburg said, no, it isn't.

However, the moratorium is set to expire on June 30, 2020. If commissioners had any designs on having fees after that, Vosburg recommended doing another study.

If they don't, the old fees would go back into effect, at levels commissioners said were too high for the local market.

What we have

The existing fees are based on a study by Tindale Oliver consulting firm. The County Commission adopted those fees in 2006, to go into effect in 2007, but put a moratorium on them in 2009.

Commissioners on Tuesday said the fees were too high for the local market, and definitely too high during the Great Recession.

Another study by another consultant was done in Fiscal Year 2009-10, but the county did not adopt it, County Engineer Clinton Howerton Jr. said.

Vosburg told commissioners a study is only good for five years. After that, conditions and needs have changed, and so should the fees.

He wanted to know if commissioners were interested in updating the study, just to have that option.

"I personally am not interested," Handley said. "I think, I mean our local economy has turned to the good, right now, at a small degree."

He said he'd rather see it get back on its feet a little bit better before reimposing more fees.

Handley also cited Business Development Manager Meghan DiGiacomo, who had told them earlier in the meeting that incoming businesses' and land developers' "eyes light up" when she says the county has a moratorium on impact fees.

Commission Chair Jim Brooks said he agreed with Handley. He didn't want to re-institute them, especially after having just enacted a countywide fire assessment.

Fire and emergency medical services were two county impact fee categories. Development Services Director Benjamin

10 big issues from the 2019 session

TALLAHASSEE — Florida lawmakers finished the 2019 legislative session Saturday by passing a budget for the upcoming year.

During the two-month session, lawmakers considered hundreds of bills and made more than \$90 billion in

spending decisions. It also was the first session for Republican Gov. Ron DeSantis and began the two-year terms of Senate President Bill Galvano, R-Bradenton, and House Speaker Jose Oliva, R-Miami Lakes.

Here are 10 big issues from the 2019 session:

BUDGET: Lawmakers passed a \$91.1 billion budget for the fiscal year

that starts July 1, slightly smaller than the \$91.3 billion plan proposed by DeSantis. Republican leaders touted issues such as a \$242-per-student increase in school funding and an infusion of money for Everglades restoration and water-quality projects. The House and Senate also agreed on a tax package that includes back-to-school and

disaster-preparedness tax "holidays."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS: In one of the most-controversial issues of the session, lawmakers passed a plan that would carry out a constitutional amendment designed to restore the voting rights of felons who have fulfilled their

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Man charged with firing gun from car

LORIDA — A confrontation Saturday night between an armed man and another trying to break into his truck ended with the would-be burglar leaving in his own car. That is, except that the burglar then stuck his

arm out of the car window and fired a small revolver, yelling, "See, I have a gun, too."

Highlands County sheriff's deputies arrested Alexander Aaron Capps, 39, of Lorida, later that night and charged him with the second-degree felony of discharging a firearm from a vehicle, as he allegedly drove away from the Tawny Road address.

They arrived to meet a man who said he was at his girlfriend's house and heard a noise outside.

He grabbed a handgun and went outside to investigate, reports said.

It was then, reports said, that he saw Capps trying to break into his truck, which was parked in the girlfriend's driveway.

The armed boyfriend told Capps to leave and not come back, reports said.

When Capps wouldn't leave, the boyfriend pulled out his handgun, reports said, and again told him to leave.

At that point, Capps reportedly left and walked to his car, which was parked on the road.

The boyfriend told deputies that Capps drove a short distance down the road and stuck his arm out the window.

The boyfriend reported he saw Capps' gun, a small revolver, in his hand, then heard Capps fire the gun and yell he also had a pistol, just before driving away.

Arrest reports state that an independent witness at the scene saw a vehicle similar to Capps' car driving down Tawny Road in Lorida, and heard a gunshot as the vehicle drove away.

Six hours later, at 2:40 a.m. Sunday, deputies spoke with Capps

at his home on Fairview Lane in Lorida — 2.6 miles away on the other side of U.S. 98.

Capps told deputies he did go to the Tawny Road residence to speak with the boyfriend, but denied all other accusations, according to arrest reports.

ceremonies bring to the public the sacrifices the officers make.”

His wife Sandra agreed and said ceremonies bring up hard memories but it also brings back good memories.

“It’s kind of a healing,”

she said.

The Peace Officers’ Memorial service has been an annual occurrence for many years.

“The memorials let the families know they are not forgotten,” said Public Information Officer Scott Dressel. “It would be nice not to ever have to put another name or have another

ceremony. Unfortunately that’s not the world we live in. We want to thank Pastor Woods and his congregation for being such welcoming hosts.”

Gentry’s family was in the audience. They loved the memorial chair and felt the service was moving.

“It’s nice to know the community cares,” Karla

Braynt, Gentry’s cousin, said through her tears. “It’s nice to know he made a difference with his sacrifice. He is being honored. That restores my faith in humanity. We relive that day all the time. I hope this brings closure to people. One thing that stood out to me is how many people care; it’s important

to see. It carries us through.”

sentences. Critics argued the legislation was too restrictive and would prevent many felons from voting. In the final hours of the session, lawmakers also passed a bill that would make it harder to get citizens’ initiatives on the ballot.

ENVIRONMENT: After massive problems last year with red tide and toxic algae in Southwest Florida and Southeast Florida, DeSantis made a top priority of water-related issues. Lawmakers included about \$682 million in the budget for water-quality efforts and Everglades restoration. One of the highest-profile environmental issues of the session — a proposed ban on the oil- and gas-drilling technique known as “fracking” — did not pass.

HEALTH CARE: Oliva came into the session with a focus on overhauling health-care regulations and largely was successful. In part, he pushed through elimination of the long-controversial “certificate of need” regulatory process for new hospitals and services. Also, Oliva played a key role in passing a plan that

could lead to importing lower-cost prescription drugs from Canada, an issue that DeSantis has championed.

HURRICANE

MICHAEL: As lawmakers met in the Capitol, Northwest Florida residents, businesses and local governments continued struggling with the aftermath of Hurricane Michael. The House and Senate received hundreds of millions of dollars in requests for assistance and put about \$220 million in the new budget for recovery efforts. Also, a tax package includes measures to help farmers hammered by the October storm.

INSURANCE: In a big win for the insurance industry, lawmakers approved an overhaul of the controversial insurance practice known as “assignment of benefits.” The longstanding practice involves policyholders signing over benefits to contractors, and insurers contend that abuses and litigation are driving up insurance premiums. Lawmakers took steps such as limiting attorney fees in so-called AOB cases.

MEDICAL MARIJUANA: Going into the session, DeSantis essentially gave lawmakers an offer they couldn’t refuse as

he sought to eliminate a ban on smokable medical marijuana. If lawmakers didn’t act, DeSantis threatened to drop an appeal of a court ruling that said the smoking ban, included in a 2017 law, was unconstitutional. Lawmakers quickly went along with DeSantis’ request and eliminated the ban in March.

SCHOOL CHOICE:

The Republican-dominated Legislature continued expanding school choice, including passing a new vouchers program known as the Family Empowerment

Scholarship Program. Under the program, state money will be used to send as many as 18,000 students to private schools next year. Critics contend the plan is unconstitutional, citing a 2006 Florida Supreme Court ruling that struck down a similar vouchers program.

SCHOOL SAFETY:

Pointing to recommendations by a commission created after last year’s mass shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School, lawmakers passed a wide-ranging bill designed to bolster

school safety. The bill included issues such as improving mental-health services, but almost all of the debate focused on a controversial provision that would expand the school “guardian” program to allow armed classroom teachers.

TRANSPORTATION:

In a top priority for Galvano, lawmakers approved a plan aimed at expanding or building

three toll roads. The plan, which drew opposition from environmentalists, would extend the Suncoast Parkway from the Tampa Bay region to the Georgia border; extend the Florida Turnpike west to hook up with the Suncoast Parkway; and create a multi-use corridor, including a toll road, from Polk County to Collier County.

Far from free

Gov. Ron DeSantis continues to act like a Teddy Roosevelt Republican.

Having taken forceful moves to protect Florida's environment, DeSantis now is acting to protect Florida consumers against the outrageous prices of prescription drugs.

No reasonable person can defend the prices that gouge many Florida consumers. Instead defenders of the status quo set up straw men and use extreme examples.

DeSantis is acting to obtain approval for Floridians to obtain prescription drugs from Canada; this would require permission from the federal government.

AARP, the group that advocates for seniors, praised DeSantis at a recent press event in Tallahassee.

Al Salvi, a 57-year-old paraplegic and cancer survivor, said he pays \$13.50 for a pill that costs \$1.67 in Canada.

Desperate consumers must go to ridiculous lengths to obtain their prescriptions. Phillip Combs of Madison said he obtains samples from his physician because he can't afford the \$400 a month copay for medication to lower his cholesterol.

AARP CEO Jo Ann Jenkins said, "We as a country are better than this. We shouldn't have our seniors struggling every day to meet their basic needs."

DeSantis said Florida is about to enact a bill that would create state programs to import prescription drugs from Canada and other countries.

State Sen. Aaron Bean, who represents Nassau County and parts of Duval, submitted the measure in the Senate; Vermont was the first state to create such a program.

The Wall Street Journal Editorial Board ridiculed the plan by pointing out that Canada's 37 million residents couldn't possibly provide the needs for Florida's 21 million residents even on a limited scale — but nobody is suggesting a Canadian takeover of Florida's prescription drugs.

The Florida plan is narrow and wouldn't include importation of controlled substances. In fact, DeSantis is looking for drugs for serious illnesses like hepatitis C, multiple sclerosis and HIV that cost far less in Canada.

Such a plan could directly save the state money to provide drugs for prisoners.

Certainly there are plenty of prescription drugs in the U.S. that are as economical as Canada's. But there are too many cases of prices that simply look like gouging.

Another concern is safety, which is real but can be addressed.

Evidence for the issue can be found in a special report produced for the 9th Congressional District in the Orlando area.

The staff of the House Committee on Oversight and Reform looked into the prices of diabetes drugs for seniors and the uninsured.

"Over the past two decades, manufacturers have systematically and dramatically raised the prices of their insulin products by more than tenfold, often in lockstep," the report stated.

This forces people to ration their lifesaving insulin.

Diabetes is associated with heart disease, stroke, kidney failure and blindness.

Diabetes affects more than 30 million people in the U.S. and 1 in 4 seniors. In addition there are about 120,000 uninsured residents in Florida's 9th Congressional District.

Of the 50 most popular diabetes drugs for Medicare in the district, U.S. prices are five times more expensive than Australia's, four times more expensive than in the United Kingdom and three times more expensive than in Canada.

For Novolog Flexpen, a popular brand of insulin, uninsured diabetes patients pay an average of \$630 a month compared to \$28 in Australia, \$42 in the United Kingdom and \$47 in Canada.

Do manufacturers need to charge so much? One study noted that they could charge as little as \$11 a month for insulin and still make a profit.

Because federal law prohibits Medicare from negotiating directly with drug makers, seniors pay much more than those abroad. Since the United States does not have universal health insurance like other industrial countries, the uninsured are faced with sky-high drug prices.

A free market ostensibly would deal with price-gouging. Clearly the health care market is far from free.

A man and his ministry

I first met Randy Johnson when he and a group of friends pulled up at the old Avon Park Sun office in a big panel van. The fact that Randy was in a wheelchair didn't faze me any, it was the friends that came out of the van that caught my eye. I remember thinking to myself that he was one lucky person to have so many good friends.

They stopped at the office to share information about a new program they were starting called Teen Challenge. They would be operating it from the old walk-in movie theater, right down the road.

That was in the early 1980's. Just a few short years before we met, Randy was with some friends at Lake Isis swimming. He told me the story of how he was a bit of a rebel at that time and, like so many teens do, gave little thought to the things we know are not good for us. He dived into the water from the beach and broke his neck and severed his spinal cord. He was 21 and would never walk again.

He was not one to get discouraged. Instead, his ministry took on a life of its own.

Not only did he operate Teen Challenge, but after a period of time in Haines City, Randy and his wife moved to Zolfo Springs where they built Reality Ranch, a ranch ministry. Not only did the venue provide a place for cowboys and cowgirls of all ages to come on the weekend for rodeo fun, but it also became a summer youth camp. Campers and chaperones could bunk in the old milk barn that had been converted into a bunk house. They could experience hands-on ranch life, including cleaning out the horse stalls and leisurely horseback rides.

My family would go over in the early days

and actually helped build the rodeo arena. While the men worked, I could be found in the barn with the horses. Years later and after my divorce, I was often looking for lessons to teach my children while still having fun. Randy and his wife gave us permission to come over and set up camp in their pasture. He let us ride the horses and the kids learned the hard work of cleaning tack and keeping the stalls clean.

It was a great weekend get away and the look on the girls' faces was priceless when they realized there were cows around the tent the morning after our good sleep. My daughter still talks about it.

The ranch was also a place where we would go for some good singing and some heart-piercing preaching. Randy could find the right people to deliver the message, whether it was through song or through a sermon. His own testimony was one I could listen to over and over.

He told all who would

listen that you didn't have to be a cowboy to attend Cowboy Church.

Randy never hesitated to ask his prayer warriors to pray for a friend or a family member when the time came. That included himself.

As late as the end of April, he was inviting friends to come out to Cowboy Church and working to promote an event by the All Florida Junior Rodeo Association. Within days, the Reality Ranch Ministries Facebook page announced that Randy had a heart attack. Jesse, his son, kept Randy's followers updated on his condition. Sadly, Randy died Friday, leaving a tremendous number of people stunned at the loss.

He was loved by his parents, his siblings and his two children he chose for his own through adoption, but there is a large number of cowboys and cowgirls who are also in mourning while still finding a reason to celebrate the life of a very special friend to us all.

Workers deserve to prosper

Many of our middle and lower tier employees are not being paid a living wage with benefits so that they can have a good life, bright future and look forward to retirement. Consequently, they are drawn to the idea of \$1,000 per month for everybody as proposed by some liberal Democrats. Since many large profitable companies limit employees to part time and minimum wage, this \$1,000 exceeds some hard-working Americans monthly income and comes close to many others. there is no excuse for compensating employees poorly and limiting their hours to avoid paying benefits.

This practice by our highly profitable companies is a huge problem that is having dire consequences on our working class and must be corrected. Here is one way to fix it:

First step — Pass federal legislation that establishes the definition of a comfortable living wage, reasonable benefits, and adequate retirement and call it the "deserved wage." This can easily be done by reviewing and adopting the pay package of an employer who takes care of their middle and lower tier employees and pays them fairly.

Second step — Provide that all profitable companies with more than 100 employees must pay the "deserved wage." If they don't, then at the end of the year 50% of their net profit would be required to be distributed to their employees, proportionally, with a cap of the "deserved wage" plus 10-20% as a

penalty.

Third step — Pass a law that a private company must pay all employees the "deserved wage" to be taken public and traded on any stock exchange. It is at this point that corporate insiders rake in huge amounts of money and when billionaires are created.

Fourth step — Provide that any company that does not pay the "deserved wage" can not grant any insiders or executives stock options.

Fifth step — Provide that an amount equal to the amount paid to the investment bankers for taking the private company public be paid to that company's employees, proportionally, as a bonus, when they go public.

Individuals and insiders of high quality that own and control these companies won't have a problem with these proposed laws because they already take care of their employees. But we need these good people to become more political and team up with moderate Democrats and Republicans to pass such legislation.

Times have changed since 10 times the pay of a regular worker was normal compensation for a company executive, as in the Henry Ford era. In the late '90s, one year Michael Eisner, CEO of Disney, had compensation and exercised accumulated stock options that amounted to him being paid 23,000 times the average Disney employee for that year. That type of insider compensation has continued and still remains in place, to the detriment of the core workers. It's high time gross over-payment of compensation to corporate insiders be re-directed to those who earned it. All of our American workers deserve to prosper, share in corporate profits, live a great life, have a bright future and look forward to retirement.

These proposed laws are not the re-distribution of wealth. They are the sharing of the already re-distributed wealth with hard-working, deserving employees.

Dunn told the Highlands News-Sun that impact fees can only buy buildings, equipment and trucks.

The fire assessment can pay salaries and benefits, Dunn said, which has helped the county staff the previously volunteer fire services with full-time personnel.

What we 'need'

Commissioners Greg Harris and Arlene Tuck agreed with Brooks and Handley. Tuck said she would like to go further and see if county development services can lower its fees, to help development of more affordable housing.

Dunn said his department did a review of their fees last year and learned the county's fees are competitive, a statement backed up by Brooks. Commissioner Don Elwell asked what benefits impact fees would have. Dunn said impact fees can no longer raise enough to issue bonds for a \$50 million to \$60 million road.

Instead, Dunn said, they can be used to put in turn lanes or other improvements to improve flow at intersections. Some places use them for pedestrian/bicycle paths or crosswalk improvements, to encourage pedestrian travel whenever possible.

Brooks added the fact that impact fees can only pay for the impact of new growth, not improve existing deficiencies. He also said the county's land development regulations already require new development to pay for

improvements to roads, water/sewer lines and other infrastructure needed to serve their sites.

Using the example of a McDonald's restaurant building on U.S. 27, he said the developer would have to pay for their turn lanes anyway.

"What is the impact?" Brooks asked.

Howerton said not having funds to improve safety on roads can make it difficult, but conceded that that's part of his job.

What to do

Handley asked where money would come from for a study. Vosburg said it would likely come from the impact fee account — still-unspent funds collected before the moratorium — which should have been spent by 2017.

The closer the date moves to June 30, 2020, the less time the county will have to do a study, leaving the moratorium as the only option.

County Attorney Joy Carmichael suggested commissioners decide by January 2020 what they want to do. They need at least 90 days notice prior to adopting an impact fee ordinance, she said.

"I'm not 100% opposed

to giving us that flexibility — which I know means I've got to pay for a study, which I hate," Elwell said, "but I do believe that there might be some value in at least having that option."

He asked staff to get information back to the commissioners on where impact fees had been spent in the past.

Ray Royce, who served on the original impact fee committee, gave words of caution.

"It seems silly to me to spend big money if you know right up front that you don't have the stomach to do it," Royce said.

The bigger problem is not new development, he said, but development in old subdivisions.

Avon Park Estates, Avon Park Lakes, Highlands Park Estates, Orange Blossom Estates, Placid Lakes and Sun 'N Lakes South were all created before the land development regulations required good drainage systems, water/sewer lines or funds set aside for road capacity improvements.

"They're the problems," Brooks said, "not the guy building a new subdivision."

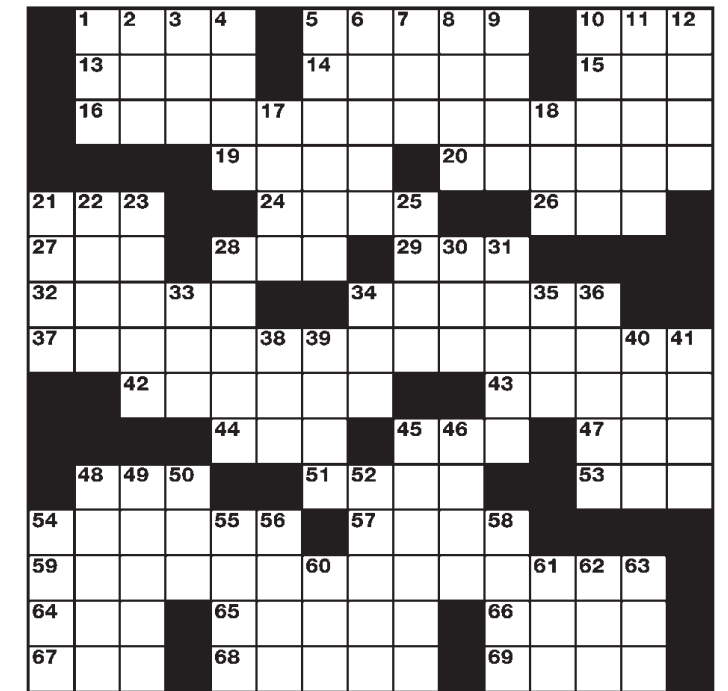

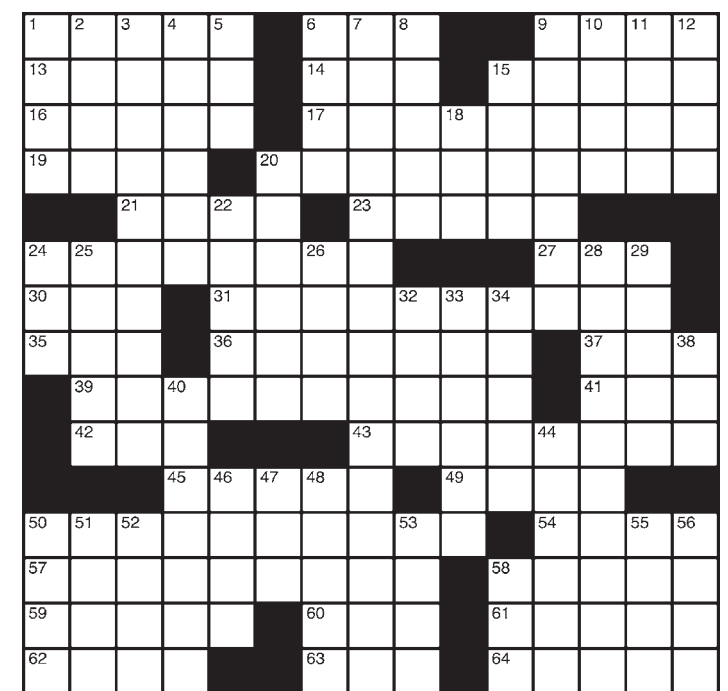

Finishes first for second straight year

LEXINGTON, Ohio – A year ago, Acura Team Penske celebrated its first IMSA WeatherTech SportsCar Championship victory in the Acura Sports Car Challenge at Mid-Ohio with a sweep of the top two podium spots.

No. 6 Acura ARX-05 Daytona Prototype international (DPi) co-drivers Juan Pablo Montoya and Dane Cameron came home second that day as their teammates in the No. 7, Helio Castroneves and Ricky Taylor, celebrated the victory. Following Sunday's two-hour and 40-minute battle at the 2.258-mile Mid-Ohio Sports Car Course, it was the No. 6 team's turn to celebrate.

Montoya and Cameron turned the tables on the weekend-long battle with Mazda Team Joest in Sunday's race – showing speed when it mattered most, both on the racetrack and on pit road.

Montoya took the lead with an hour and 18 minutes remaining following the middle pit-stop sequence and the No. 6 Acura outmuscled Tristan Nunez in the Motul Pole Award-winning No. 77 Mazda RT24-P DPi, pulling away on a restart with 24 minutes remaining to win by 2.022 seconds.

"I think we just executed well," Montoya said. "We had been unlucky with mechanical issues and stuff this year, but we executed today the way it needed to be. It's nice to finally put it together, it's a pretty big day."

It was the first WeatherTech Championship win for Acura Team Penske since last year's race at Mid-Ohio. Montoya picked up his first WeatherTech

Porsche scores GTLM victory

Momentum can mean everything in racing, and when you have it you don't want to let it go. Such is the case for Porsche, who continued its dominant stretch in the IMSA WeatherTech SportsCar Championship GT Le Mans (GTLM) class this season with its third consecutive victory in the Acura Sports Car Challenge at Mid-Ohio.

Points leaders Earl Bamber and Laurens Vanthoor co-drove to their second consecutive win in the No. 912 Porsche 911 RSR, beating the No. 3 Corvette Racing Corvette C7.R of Antonio Garcia and co-driver Jan Magnussen to the stripe by 2.340 seconds.

With the win, Bamber and Vanthoor have opened up a seven-point lead in the championship standings, 126-119, over Garcia and Magnussen – the defending GTLM champions – and nine points on their teammates Tandy and Pilet.

Despite going winless so far in 2019, the No. 3 Corvette Racing team is lurking with the type of consistency that has made it a perennial

GTLM stalwart with its third consecutive podium finish. The team led much of the middle part of the race before pitting from the lead with just over one hour remaining. During the sequence of pit stops, however, the No. 912 took advantage of less lap traffic to make up enough ground to inherit the lead, pacing the final 38 laps.

"From where we started to where we finished, today was a good result and good for the championship," said Magnussen. "At the beginning for me, the balance wasn't great and I had little grip. We made some adjustments for Antonio, and as the track built some rubber into it, things got somewhat better. So, we're happy with P2. But we really need a win. I don't know what we need to do, but we need a win."

The GTLM class now goes into its summer break with a number of its teams and drivers preparing for the 24 Hours of Le Mans. The next WeatherTech Championship event with the GTLM class in it is the Sahlen's Six Hours of The Glen on the weekend of June 27-30.

Great fishing days on tap

The Freshwater Fishing Forecast for the second half of the first week of May gives anglers the development of the first quarter moon phase and a rainy season weather forecast; three days of east winds, a day of southeast wind, then a south wind day followed by two days of westerly winds and then...

a 'wildcard wind day', meaning no one can know which direction the wind will be out of. With the water temperatures in the upper part of the ideal feeding temperature range, fish are feeding every other day and at the very least every third day. So even though an east wind occurs for three to four consecutive days, fish

will still feed normally.

However the greater atmospheric pressure-change periods have been occurring just before and after the winds shift out of the southeast—the greater the pressure increase the greater the concentration percentage of feeding fish.

When pressure rises and drops at above-average rates it's because of a high pressure system being pushed north by a strong low pressure from the south. The east wind will slow down and shift southward causing a sharp increase in pressure, then within six to eight hours a perfect fishing wind will occur from the south and pressure will drop dramatically.

Best Fishing Days: In my fourteen years of experience the days when the wind shifts from the east to the southeast, have been above-average fishing days. The extended weather forecast predicts Saturday will produce a

perfect southeastern wind fishing day. Depending on the timing of the wind shift---could occur Friday evening or even sooner—Friday and Saturday I predict will be the best days to be on the water. Check the weather forecast tomorrow to get the timing correct.

Major Fishing Period: Today the moon overhead period occurs at 4:50 p.m. and the sunset at 8:03 p.m. which will create a feed intensity rating of 5 from 4-8 p.m. Daily this period moves later by about one hour and will increase slightly in rating daily by a half number every two days.

Friday and the weekend the sunset period will produce two major periods, during the two and sunrise. Between the hours of 6-9 a rating of 6-7 will occur which is normal for the first quarter lunar period which occurs Saturday.

Minor Fishing Period: Today the moonrise occurs at 9:45 a.m. and solar noon at 1:22 p.m. which will create a feed intensity rating of 4-5 from 9 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. The atmospheric pressure plot of the past three to four days has produced

an average increase of about 0.05-07 In Hg an hour after the moonrise. I expect this to continue. Therefore peak feeding activity should occur in the late morning hours today. By the weekend I expect a midday pressure spike to trigger feeding as solar noon approaches. **Prime Monthly Periods:** May 15-20 full moon, June 1-5 new

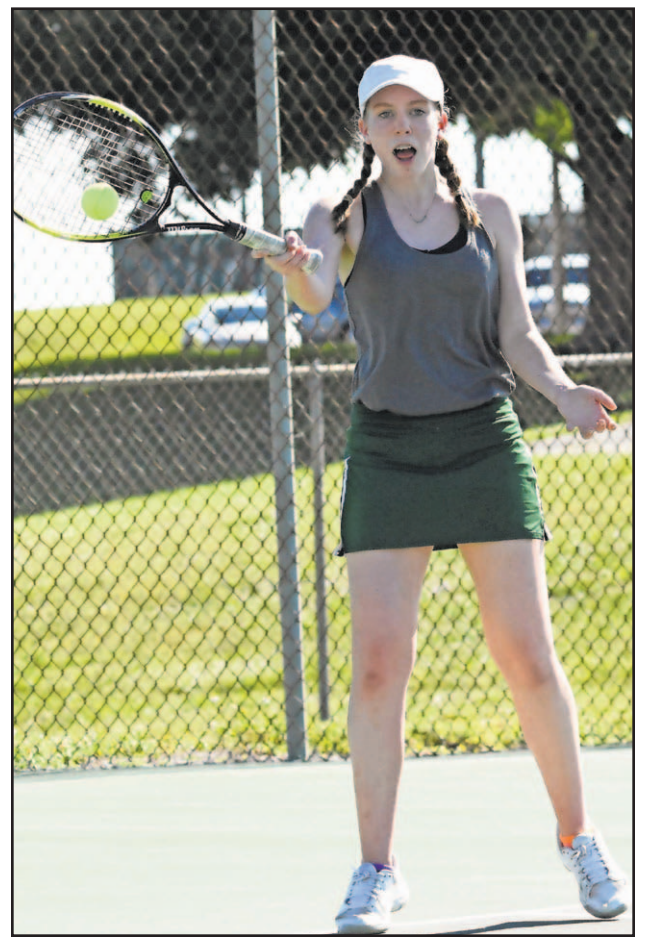

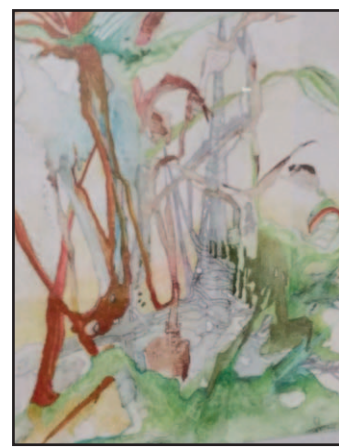

ways and eventually married other people. They met up again at a reunion and reconnected."

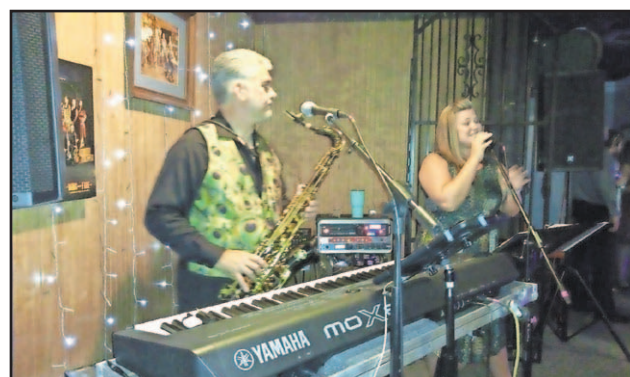
Spence puts her heart and soul into her paintings. You can sense the love of nature in her work. The colors used are soft and peaceful while the art itself tells a story.

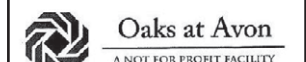

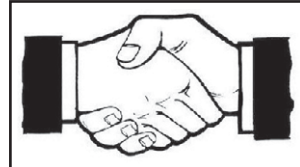

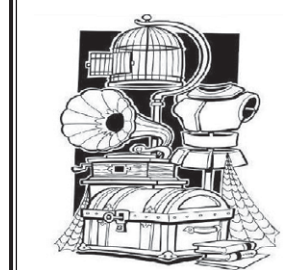

society and develop understanding, cooperation and peace among people. This is why International Museum Day is celebrated every May, on or around the 18th. As an ode to Florida's past, rangers at the Hammock are promoting the life and work of artist Charles R. Knight, who painted a mural for the Sebring Post Office in

1941 titled "Prehistoric Life in Florida." Knight produced the oil on canvas, depicting several saber-toothed cats underneath what appears to be an ancient oak tree with mammoths in the background, on commission under the Section of Fine Arts and Works Progress Administration. "Prehistoric Life in Florida" is now on permanent display in the Sebring Public Library.

Knight was born in New York on Oct. 12, 1874 and at age 15 he attended classes at the Metropolitan Art School. When he was just 20 years old, the head taxidermist of the American Museum of Natural History asked

Charles if he would use his knowledge and skill to recreate a fossil animal. The result made Charles very popular for similar assignments. He studied live animals at the Central Park Zoo, fossils, anatomy and physiology to hone his abilities. His models and murals can be found in some of the most prestigious institutions such as the National Museum of Natural History, Smithsonian Institution and the Carnegie Museum of Natural History, among many others.

The Hammock is including the Sebring Library into their celebration plans. On Tuesday, May 14 beginning at 11 a.m., the curator of the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) Museum, David Schmidt, will host an informal discussion on the mural hanging in the library. May 18, Darrel Smith will be hosting "The Best of Times, Worst of Times" Living History Program at the CCC Museum in Highlands Hammock State Park from 10-11 a.m. Also on May 18, Schmidt will host

"Charles R. Knight: The Artist Who Saw Through Time" program. There will be two showings of this presentation at the CCC museum, noon and 7 p.m.; park fees are waived after 6 p.m. To complete the International Museum Day circuit, on Tuesday, May 21, beginning at 11 a.m., Schmidt will visit the library again for an informal discussion pertaining to the mural painted by Knight.

If you'd like to "bone" up on your prehistory, check out the "560" call numbers in the nonfiction section at the library — that is the Dewey Decimal classification for fossils and prehistory. Swing by the Sebring Public Library anytime to view the mural "Prehistoric Life in Florida" and chat with David Schmidt on May 14 or May 21. Any of the Heartland Library Cooperative Branches can assist you in finding more information about prehistory, fossils, or Charles R. Knight.

Pompeo makes secret Iraq trip amid Iran tensions

Visit Tuesday night to Baghdad aimed at showing support for Iraqi government

BAGHDAD — U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo made a lightning visit Tuesday to Baghdad aimed at showing support for the Iraqi government as the United States has been picking up intelligence that Iran

is threatening American interests in the Middle East.

The top American diplomat's unannounced trip to the Iraqi capital began and ended after nightfall under heavy security following the abrupt cancellation of a visit to Germany.

Journalists from The Associated Press and other

organizations accompanying Pompeo were not told of his new destination until his plane left for Baghdad and were not allowed to report on his whereabouts until after his plane had taken off for London.

The secretary told reporters on the flight that his meetings with Iraq's president and prime

minister were intended to demonstrate U.S. support for "a sovereign, independent" Iraq, free from the influence of neighboring Iran.

Pompeo also said he wanted to underscore Iraq's need to protect Americans in their country.

"We wanted to let them know about the increased threat stream that we had seen and give them a little bit more background on that so they could ensure that they were doing all they could to provide protection

for our team," he said. "They understood, too, it's important for their country."

Pompeo's visit came as the Trump administration intensified its pressure campaign against Iran. The U.S. said this week that it was rushing an aircraft carrier group to the Middle East to deter or respond to any Iranian attack.

U.S. officials have said there were indications Iran was

1 dead, 8 hurt in Colorado school shooting, 2 in custody

Shooting occurred at a K-12 school, miles away from Columbine

HIGHLANDS RANCH, Colo. — Two students opened fire Tuesday inside a charter school in an affluent suburban Denver community not far from Columbine High School, killing a teenager, wounding eight and spreading terror before they were taken into custody with no injuries, authorities said.

Douglas County Sheriff Tony Spurlock said the pair walked into the STEM School Highlands Ranch and began shooting students in two classrooms. Within minutes, deputies at a nearby sheriff's department substation entered the school and arrested the two suspects after a struggle.

"As officers were arriving at the school, they could still hear gunshots," Douglas County Undersheriff Holly Nicholson-Kluth said.

Authorities did not release the name of the student who died, but said it was an 18-year-old man.

"I have to believe that the quick response of the officers that got inside that school helped save lives," Spurlock said. He did not identify the suspects, but said they are an adult and a minor who were not previously known to authorities. Authorities planned

to search their homes and a vehicle at the school, he said.

The shooting comes nearly three weeks after neighboring Littleton marked the grim 20th anniversary of the Columbine school massacre that killed 13 people. The two schools are separated by about 7 miles in

adjacent communities south of Denver. It also comes exactly a week after a gunman killed two students and wounded four at the University of North Carolina Charlotte.

Newspaper: Trump lost more than \$1B from 1985 to 1994

WASHINGTON (AP) — The New York Times reported Tuesday that Donald Trump's businesses lost more than \$1 billion from 1985 to 1994, based on tax information the newspaper acquired.

The Times said it has acquired printouts from the future president's official IRS tax transcripts, including figures from his federal tax form.

The newspaper said Trump reported business losses of \$46.1 million in 1985, and a total of \$1.17 billion in losses for the 10-year period.

After comparing Trump's information with that of other "high-income earners," the Times concluded that Trump "appears to have lost more money than nearly any other individual American taxpayer." Because of his business losses, the newspaper reported, Trump did not pay income taxes for eight of the 10 years.

The House Ways and Means Committee has asked the IRS to provide Trump's personal and business returns for 2013 through 2018. Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin on Monday refused to do so, saying the panel's request "lacks a legitimate legislative purpose."

Mnuchin's move, which had been expected, is likely to set a legal battle into motion. The chief options available to Democrats are to subpoena the IRS for the returns or to file a lawsuit.

Trump is the first president since Watergate to decline to make his tax returns public.

Georgia governor signs restrictive 'heartbeat' abortion ban

Law would ban most abortions at around 6 weeks

ATLANTA — Georgia Gov. Brian Kemp on Tuesday signed into law one of the nation's most restrictive abortion laws, a measure that bans the procedure once a fetal heartbeat is detected, which can be as early as six weeks, before many women know they are pregnant.

Kemp, a Republican, said he approved the bill "to ensure that all Georgians have the opportunity to live, grow, learn and prosper in our great state."

The signing caps weeks of tension and protests at the state Capitol and begins what could

be a lengthy and costly legal battle over the law's constitutionality. But a legal showdown is exactly what supporters want.

"We will not back down," Kemp said. "We will always continue to fight for life."

Anti-abortion activists and lawmakers across the country have been energized by the new conservative majority on the U.S. Supreme Court that includes President Donald Trump appointees Neil Gorsuch and Brett Kavanaugh. They are pushing abortion bans in an attack on the high court's 1973 Roe v. Wade ruling, which legalized abortion nationwide until a fetus is developed enough to live

outside a woman's uterus.

Staci Fox, the president and CEO of Planned Parenthood Southeast, said she had one message for Kemp: "We will see you, sir, in court."

At a news conference on the Capitol steps, she said the new law criminalizes doctors for providing lifesaving care. The organization vowed to campaign to unseat lawmakers who supported it, saying they would "be held accountable for playing politics with women's health."

The legal director of the ACLU of Georgia, Sean Young, has said the group will challenge the measure in court.

"Under 50 years of Supreme

Court precedent, this abortion ban is clearly unconstitutional," Young said in a recent interview with The Associated Press.

Melania Trump unveils next steps for 'Be Best'

WASHINGTON — A year after launching her first major initiative, Melania Trump unveiled plans Tuesday to make her "Be Best" children's program even best-er.

New steps in the first lady's second-year push include broadening the program's focus on drug abuse and social media use, along with her second international trip to promote its goals. She withheld the destination, however, saying the "details are still coming together."

Mrs. Trump launched "Be Best" a year ago to focus on child well-being, social media use and drug abuse.

She said she has spent the time since listening to and learning from parents, medical professionals, teachers, leaders in the fields of technology and social media and many others, and declared that she is ready for more of that give and take. In a short video that played on monitors in the Rose Garden before she emerged from the Oval Office to kick things off, the first lady said many children have written her to express concerns about drug abuse

and online safety.

Mrs. Trump said she has broadened the program's focus on drug abuse to include children of all ages, instead of just babies born dependent on opioids and other addictive substances, and their mothers. The social media aspect will be expanded to add online safety to the emphasis on bullying and good citizenship online.

In the past year, the first lady promoted "Be Best" in 15 states and nine countries, including during a weeklong Africa tour last fall. She has visited hospitals and schools, participated in children's events, participated in 18 round-tables and policy briefings and met with more than 30 foreign officials, she said.

She said the U.S. Agency for International Development, which partnered with her on last October's stops in Ghana, Malawi, Kenya and Egypt, appointed a "Be Best" ambassador in March.

"My hope is that together we can be the best at helping children and families find effective ways to educate themselves and become part of the solution to so many problems and issues," the first lady said.

Qatar to send money for West Bank, Gaza after Israel truce

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates — Qatar on Tuesday said it is sending \$480 million to Palestinians in the West Bank and the Gaza Strip after a cease-fire deal ended the deadliest fighting between Israel and Palestinian militants since a 2014 war.

Qatar's Foreign Ministry said \$300 million would support health and education programs of the Palestinian Authority, while \$180 million would go toward "urgent humanitarian relief" in U.N. programs and toward electricity. The Hamas-ruled Gaza Strip suffers from chronic electricity shortages.

The recent two-day outbreak of violence killed 25 people in Gaza, both militants and civilians, and four civilians in Israel.

Hamas spokesman Hazem Qassem said Egyptian mediators, along with officials from Qatar and the U.N., helped broker the cease-fire deal. The deal is believed to include a number of economic aid and development programs in Gaza, including providing additional electricity and creating temporary jobs in a territory where unemployment has skyrocketed to over 50%.

Israel approved the resumption of fuel shipments into the Gaza Strip on Tuesday after cutting off the supply during Sunday's surge of violence, according to COGAT, the Israeli defense body responsible for

Palestinian civilian affairs. It confirmed Israel would indefinitely ease restrictions on the movement of people and goods through its two main crossings with the territory next week, following the country's observation of Memorial Day and Independence Day.

The energy-rich, small nation of Qatar has become a major donor to the Palestinians.

The Palestinians have been divided between two rival governments since 2007, when Hamas drove forces from the internationally recognized Palestinian Authority out of Gaza. Hamas has ruled Gaza since then, with the Palestinian Authority administering autonomous zones in the Israeli-occupied West Bank.

This marks the first time in recent years that Qatar has funded the Palestinian Authority directly. In recent years, its money has only gone to Gaza, where it opened a hospital just last month.

The United States and the European Union classify Hamas as a terrorist group. Although Qatar doesn't pay directly to Hamas, its support since 2012, totaling \$755 million, has been a vital lifeline for the cash-strapped group, relieving it from having to fund civilian and infrastructure projects.

Omar Shaban, a Gaza economist, said the latest funding was extraordinary.

"This decision boosts Qatar's role in the coming phase and makes it as acceptable in Ramallah as it is in Gaza," he wrote

on Facebook.

Both Palestinian governments are in deep financial distress. The Palestinian Authority has been hit hard by cuts of hundreds of millions of dollars in U.S. aid, as well as a dispute with Israel over tax transfers.

Israel has begun to withhold money from these transfers that it says the Palestinians give to families of Palestinian attackers who have been jailed or killed in fighting with Israel.

Israel says the money rewards violence. The Palestinians say the payments are social welfare to families affected by conflict, and they have refused to accept the tax transfers unless the funding is fully restored.

The aid cuts and refusal to accept partial tax transfers have plunged the Palestinian Authority into a deep crisis in which it is only able to pay its workers half of their salaries.

In the West Bank, Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas thanked the Qataris and said the aid would "help the Palestinian people overcome some of their hardships, face the challenges and strengthen their steadfastness on their land."

In Gaza, meanwhile, the economy has been ravaged by an Israeli-Egyptian blockade, years of fighting with Israel and Hamas' isolation and mismanagement. Cuts in aid from Abbas' government, as well as U.S. cuts in funding for U.N. programs, have also hurt the coastal strip's population.

Florida residents want Trump to see post-hurricane suffering

They want the president to get a glimpse of continued suffering when he arrives for a campaign rally this week

PANAMA CITY — Residents in parts of the Florida Panhandle devastated by Hurricane Michael seven months ago hope President Donald Trump gets a glimpse of the continued suffering in the region when he arrives for a campaign rally this week.

Area officials said the communities that were in the storm's bullseye—Panama City, Mexico Beach and surrounding Bay County — had

received about \$1.1 billion in federal aid through mid-April. Mountains of debris have been removed, traffic lights work again and countless homes and businesses have been repaired.

Yet disagreements in Washington have left communities still waiting on other funding and many structures and neighborhoods appear much as they did the day after the storm with trees still atop splintered homes and blue roofing tarps flapping in the breeze. Tent cities have sprung up in some places.

In others, people are living in fractured houses or mobile homes.

For some, recovery has been slow in arriving.

Her home in Panama City destroyed by the Category 5 storm, Jessica Manson said she lived in a tent for 64 days before moving into a donated camper. She now lives there without running water on a small plot she's renting for \$160 a month in neighboring Springfield. A 5-gallon bucket serves as the toilet.

Manson, 42, said she used to earn money

cleaning condominiums in nearby Panama City Beach, where Trump's rally is planned Wednesday. But most of that work dried up after the storm and she was without transportation for a time.

Manson said she now spends her time navigating the recovery process and working when she can. She also tries to help neighbors, many of whom are suffering mental stress from living in a place that suddenly seems foreign because of destroyed buildings, missing trees and friends who left

without notice.

The hardest-hit area is Trump Country: The president carried 70 percent of the vote in Bay County in 2016. With a population of about 185,000 people that is more than 80 percent white, 25 people died there during Michael and about 70 percent of its homes were damaged.

Trump's opposition to more hurricane aid for Puerto Rico has sparked a standoff with congressional Democrats that is blocking assistance to the island and elsewhere, including the Florida Panhandle. Crews searching for missing 73-year-old off Florida Keys

KEY WEST (AP) — The U.S. Coast Guard and several other agencies are searching for a 73-year-old woman who went missing while diving.

In a news release, the agency said they got a call from the woman's husband Tuesday afternoon. He told officials they'd been diving in the Florida Keys on a vessel called Mai Tai.

The Monroe County Sheriff's Office, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission and a Naval aircraft crew are assisting in the search.

3 teens stabbed during fight outside Miami high school

MIAMI (AP) — Police say a South Florida high school student stabbed three other teens in the parking lot of a South Florida high school.

Miami-Dade County Public Schools spokeswoman Jackie Calzadilla tells WPLG that three teenage boys approached a student who was sitting in his car in the parking lot Felix Varela

Senior High School on Monday afternoon.

She says a fight broke out and the student pulled a knife and stabbed the teens.

Calzadilla says an investigation found that the teens were the main aggressors and will be charged with burglary and battery. The student will be charged with possession of a weapon on school grounds.

She says two of the stabbing victims are students at another school and the third no longer attends school in Miami-Dade County.

Man arrested, refused to remove obscene sticker from vehicle

LAKE CITY (AP) — Authorities say a Florida man was jailed after refusing to remove an obscene sticker from his vehicle's window.

A Columbia County Sheriff's Office report says 23-year-old Dillon Shane Webb was arrested Sunday and charged with misdemeanor counts of violating Florida's obscenity law and resisting an officer without violence.

It says a deputy stopped Webb in Lake City because of a sticker

crudely describing a sexual appetite. The deputy initially cited Webb for obscenity with a notice to appear in court.

Officials say the deputy told Webb to alter the sticker to change the derogatory part but Webb refused, citing his First Amendment free speech rights. The deputy then charged Webb with resisting and took him to jail.

Webb was later released on \$2,500 bond.

Man guilty of fatally shooting son, faces life sentence

FORT MYERS (AP) — A Florida man has been convicted of fatally shooting his 20-year-old son during an argument.

Court records show 41-year-old Jonathan Brunelle was found guilty Saturday of second-degree murder. He faces a possible life sentence at a June 10 hearing.

Prosecutors say Brunelle and his son, Shane, got into a verbal argument in June 2017 at their Lehigh Acres home. Brunelle called the Lee County Sheriff's Office and said deputies had better respond before he put a bullet in his son. The argument ended when deputies arrived

Cockpit voice recorder recovered from plane in Florida river

JACKSONVILLE (AP) — Crash investigators say they've recovered the cockpit voice recorder from a chartered jet that ran off a runway and into a river at a Florida military base.

The National Transportation Safety Board posted Tuesday on Twitter about finding the recorder for the Boeing 737 that skidded into the St. Johns River after landing at Naval Air Station Jacksonville. The flight data recorder was recovered Saturday, but the voice recorder had been underwater and inaccessible.

None of the 143 people onboard had serious injuries from the landing Friday night. A dog and two cats died in the cargo hold.

NTSB says a barge and a crane began moving the Miami Air International plane Tuesday morning. The aircraft will be transported to a secure location so investigators can continue their work.

planning to retaliate for the Trump administration's stepped-up sanctions on the country, although the threat information remains vague.

Pompeo would not be specific about the more recent threat information involving Iran except that they involved "imminent" plans for attacks. "We're taking every action to deter them," he said. "Other than that, I just can't say any more."

Before landing in Baghdad he said that he would make clear in his meetings that any attack by Iran or its proxies on

American forces in Iraq would affect the Iraqi government too.

The "campaign to continue to prevent ISIS terror inside of Iraq itself is something that's very central ... to the Iraqi government," Pompeo said.

In Washington, an American official said the decision to deploy the carrier group and a group of Air Force bombers to the Middle East was based in part on intelligence indications that Iran had moved short-range ballistic missiles by boat in waters off its shores.

Iran, meanwhile, was expected to announced Wednesday that it would partially withdraw from the nuclear deal it struck with world powers in 2015.

As tensions rise between Washington and Tehran, Baghdad in some ways is caught in the middle. Iraq has a close relationship with the U.S., which is leading the international coalition in the war against the Islamic State group in Iraq and Syria. More than 5,000 U.S. troops are stationed on Iraqi soil.

But Iraq is also tightly enmeshed with Iran in trade, security and political matters, and it has been loath to antagonize its larger neighbor. Iran won the ear of many top Iraqi politicians after it stepped in to fill the political vacuum following the 2003 U.S. invasion. It also can count on the loyalty of several powerful Iraqi militias, which have fought previously against U.S.

forces in the country and on the side of Iran's allies in Syria in that country's civil war.

Responding to a question about whether Iraq could protect U.S. interests from attacks by Iran and its proxy forces, Prime Minister Adel Abdul-Mahdi said Tuesday that Iraq takes its responsibilities seriously. "This is an obligation that Iraq honors," he said.

The Trump administration has made several recent moves to squeeze Iran. Last month, President Donald Trump announced the U.S. would no longer exempt any countries from U.S. sanctions if they continue to buy Iranian oil. The U.S. also designated Iran's Revolutionary

Guard as a terrorist group, the first time it has ever taken such a step for an entire division of another government.

Trump withdrew from the Obama administration's landmark nuclear deal with Iran in May 2018 and, in the months that followed, reinstated punishing sanctions, including those targeting Iran's oil, shipping and banking sectors.

While Trump has sought to dismantle much of President Barack Obama's policies, he particularly criticized the Iran nuclear deal for failing to address Tehran's ballistic missile program and what he described as its malign influence across the rest of the Mideast.

court, the new ban would take effect Jan. 1.

The measure makes exceptions in the case of rape and incest — if the woman files a police report first — and to save the life of the mother. It also would allow for abortions when a fetus is determined not to be viable because of serious medical issues.

In addition, the bill includes provisions for alimony, child support and even income tax deductions for fetuses, declaring that "the full value of a child begins at the point when a detectable human heartbeat exists."

The legislation would result in \$10 million to \$20 million in lost tax revenue for the state each year, according to its author, Republican Rep. Ed Setzler, who offered the estimate during a committee hearing in March.

But Democratic Sen. Jen Jordan said "there's nothing balanced about it: It's an all-out abortion ban."

Jordan said she is particularly worried that the new law will push obstetricians away from practicing in Georgia, worsening health care outcomes for women in a state that already has one of the nation's worst maternal mortality rates.

Lawmakers in other states including Tennessee, Missouri, South Carolina, Florida, Texas, Louisiana and West Virginia, are considering similar proposals. A bill that recently passed the Alabama House would outlaw abortions at any stage of pregnancy, with a few narrow exceptions.

and those surrounding it know all too well these hateful and horrible acts of violence," White House spokesman Judd Deere said in a statement. President Donald Trump had been briefed on the shooting and was in touch with state and local officials, Deere said.

The STEM School Highlands Ranch is a public charter school with more than 1,850 students in kindergarten through 12th grades.

Student Christian Paulson told television station KMGH that he was in study hall when he saw kids running and shouting, "School shooter!"

"And I'm like, what? Is this real or fake? And then I just went after them," Christian Paulson said. "And apparently, this is all real. And I tried to run with my life, but I'm out of breath."

Rocco DeChalk, who lives near the school, told television station KUSA that he saw so many students running past his house that at first he thought it was a gym class. He went outside and saw a

teenage boy who had been shot in the back being helped by a teacher and another student.

They brought the boy into his kitchen and alerted a police officer, who sent for an ambulance.

"He made a comment, 'Oh, I'm starting to feel it now,'" DeChalk said. "I told him that was probably the adrenaline kicking in and he was going into shock."

Three area hospitals reported treating eight people in connection with the attack. Two were listed in serious condition, two were listed as stable, one was in good condition and

three were released.

Lines of firetrucks, ambulances and law enforcement vehicles from multiple agencies were at the school, and medical helicopters landed on a grassy field.

The sheriff's office directed parents to a nearby recreational center to pick up their children. A fleet of school buses arrived and dropped off students, some of whom were crying and holding hands with their classmates as they were helped off. An ambulance also pulled up and let out a half-dozen children, none of whom appeared to be physically injured.

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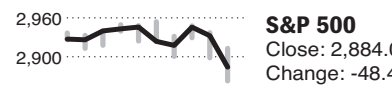

Postnasal drip by way of dust mite allergy triggers cough

DEAR DR. ROACH: For months, I have had a persistent cough that I have been unable to get help with. I saw an allergist about three years ago and was told I am allergic to dust mites (I understand a large number of people fit into this category). I was first referred to a lung doctor where X-rays showed that my cheek sinus drains were completely blocked, and then to an ear, nose and throat doctor, who also confirmed this diagnosis.

This ENT doctor recommended I have surgery to unblock the drains and clear out the sinus area. I understand that sinus drainage can cause coughing and wonder if this would still make me cough. I sometimes cough until I can cough up something, and this seems to stop my cough for a while. I was using a nasal rinse for a while until about two weeks ago when it caused my nose to bleed. The ENT doctor prescribed antibiotics and oral steroids that did not make any difference. It doesn't seem to make any difference whether I'm home

or sitting in the doctor's office, I'm still coughing. What is the best way to deal with dust mite allergy? — J.S.

ANSWER: There are many causes of chronic cough, but postnasal drip is at the top of the list. Dust mites are indeed a common allergen, and symptoms may include runny nose, watery eyes, sneezing and cough from postnasal drip.

Specific treatment for dust mites should include physical barriers, such as covers for pillows and mattresses, and sometimes for

other soft surfaces, like furniture cushions, but this is only part of an effective strategy. Removing as many fabrics as possible (draperies, carpets, stuffed children's toys) where dust mites can live is essential. Regular cleaning is necessary, and high efficiency particulate air (HEPA) filters for vacuuming have been shown to reduce dust mites. A low-humidity environment can be very effective in discouraging dust mites, and cooler air — especially at night — can reduce irritation of nasal passages caused by dry air. Many interventions for a prolonged period are necessary to reduce dust mite infestation and the symptoms associated with them.

This is critical, because the issue of the sinuses is probably secondary to ongoing allergic exposure. Fixing your sinuses will not fix your ongoing symptoms.

Without control of the allergens, you will continue to have symptoms and may even develop sinus blockages again, no matter how good a job the surgeon does on your sinuses.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am an 87-year-old man in good health. Recently my physician discovered that I was having atrial fibrillation. I had no symptoms. My pulse was 80. He placed me on Eliquis twice daily, which I am taking. I feel fine, but I dislike taking anticoagulants and prefer other treatment for my condition. Is there other treatment you recommend? — H.A.S.

ANSWER: Atrial fibrillation is a common rhythm disturbance. Treatment is designed to reduce symptoms, prevent heart damage from too fast a heart rate, and prevent a stroke from a blood clot. Since you have had no symptoms and your heart rate is normal, you need no therapy to control your heart rate. However, you are at increased risk for stroke just because you are over 75 years old, and oral anticoagulation from apixaban (Eliquis) or another agent is strongly recommended. Without treatment, you have about a 4% risk of stroke per year. With treatment, your risk is only about 1%. It's much riskier NOT to take the medicine.

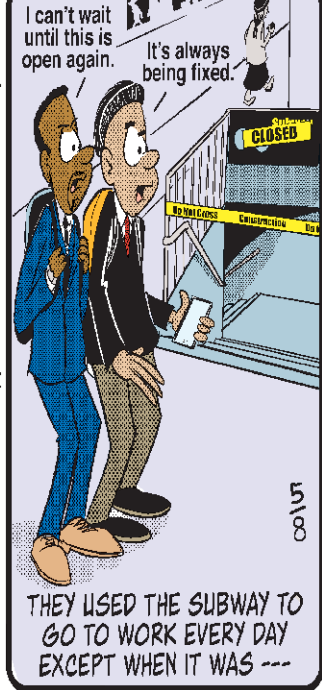

TAMPA — The Bucs could be without their top pass rusher this season.

Jason Pierre-Paul suffered a neck fracture in a single-car accident last week that could force him to miss the 2019 season, according to ESPN’s Adam Schefter.

Pierre-Paul, who led the Bucs with 12.5 sacks last season, will visit neck specialists this week but at the very least will be out indefinitely. The former USF and Giants star was involved a one-car accident when he crashed his SUV around 5 a.m. on May 2 near his home in Broward County.

“As we stated last week following the news of Jason’s auto accident, our immediate concern was for both Jason and his passenger,” Bucs general manager Jason Licht said. “While Jason was treated and released in South Florida the same day of the accident, we wanted to ensure that the medical team had an opportunity to perform a thorough evaluation here in Tampa and that process is ongoing.”

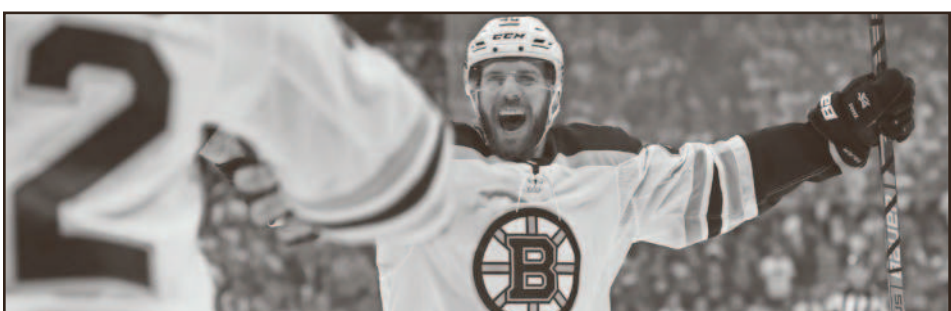

Rask comes up big as Boston Bruins advance to face 'Canes

COLUMBUS, Ohio — The Boston Bruins got some timely goals in their tight Eastern Conference semifinal series with Columbus, and when the goals weren't coming, Tuukka Rask stood tall.

The Finn turned in his best playoff performance so far in the 3-0 win over the Blue Jackets in Game 6 that clinched the series and sent the Bruins into the conference final against Carolina. Game 1 is Thursday night in Boston.

The Blue Jackets played hard and forechecked well enough to win every game, but were zero for 10 on power-play chances in the final three games of the series, all won by Boston. Much of that was due to Rask, who had 39 saves in Monday's game and did his part to shut down four Columbus power plays.

"We are halfway to our goal," said forward David Backes, who scored Boston's final goal in the third period. "You need to relish the plateaus along the way. We are certainly at one of those to be among the final

Carolina swept the New York Islanders in their second-round series.

Thunder's Paul George, Russell Westbrook have surgeries

Westbrook averaged a triple-double for the third straight season with 22.9 points, 11.1 rebounds and 10.7 assists per game.

Both players had their procedures in Los Angeles. ESPN was the first to report the surgeries.

George ranked second in the league with 28 points per game this season, and he led the league with 2.21 steals per game. Both shoulders hampered him in the final two months of the season.

Before that, he was considered among the leading candidates for the league MVP award and the Thunder were one of the top teams in the Western Conference.

With both stars banged up, the Thunder faltered late in the season and lost to Portland in five games in the first round of the playoffs.

"I just was frustrated," George said after the Thunder were eliminated

late last month. "I think it came at a terrible time, especially the team was rolling. We were playing good. I was holding up pretty, pretty, pretty good. I just thought it came at the wrong time, honestly. But again, I've never made no excuses on it. I was dealing with it for a long time throughout the season. It just got worse and worse as it went on."

George mostly played through the pain. His shoulders were heavily taped and he often had a heating pad on his right shoulder when he wasn't on the court.

"Injuries are part of the game," George said. "I've missed a season being hurt, so I was able to — the training staff assured me I was fine to play through it, and I will be fine going forward. I'd had no other thought in my mind but to be out there and play and ride it out with my guys."

NFL concussion fund pays out \$485M, but legal fights resume

Some retired players' lawyers say there aren't enough approved doctors in the program

PHILADELPHIA — The NFL concussion fund has paid out nearly \$500 million in its first two years, but some players' lawyers say there aren't enough doctors in the approved network to evaluate dementia claims.

They went to court Tuesday to oppose a rule to require retired players to be tested by doctors within 150 miles (241 kilometers) of home to prevent "doctor shopping" and suspected fraud.

Fund administrator Orran Brown said ex-players from around the country had flocked to four doctors now dismissed from the program who had "high-volume" traffic and some suspect findings.

"We didn't notice it until the claims were coming in," Brown said. "Forty-six million dollars went out the door on these claims before we could flag it."

Retired players can seek awards of as much as \$3 million for moderate dementia and \$1.5 million for mild dementia, although most men would get far less based on their age and years in the league. The settlement resolves thousands of lawsuits that alleged the NFL long hid what it knew about the risk of concussions.

Senior U.S. District Judge Anita Brody, who has overseen the case since 2011, suggested the travel limit is needed to prevent abuse.

"A few were brought to my attention where we had a lawyer from Pennsylvania and a player from Florida going to a doctor in Texas. And that was a red flag," Brody said.

Philadelphia lawyer Gene Locks, who represents some 1,100 retired players, urged Brody not to adopt the rule, saying his clients agreed to the settlement believing they could choose their own

doctors.

"They had bad experiences with the NFL benefit program, both during their playing time and after their playing time, when they felt they were used and abused, and were not going to the doctors they wanted to," Locks argued.

He said there are at least 30 different specialties of neurology, only a few of them well-suited to evaluate his clients.

Brown acknowledged he's still trying to recruit doctors in some parts of the country for the program. He suggested Brody adopt the 150-mile (241-kilometer) rule but allow him to grant exceptions. The fund, expected to pay out more than \$1 billion over 65 years, has paid out \$485 million so far, and another \$174 million in claims have been approved, Brown said.

The NFL has appealed about 30% of the approved claims, but closer to 15% if the four doctors removed

from the program aren't counted, according to players lawyer David Buchanan.

If someone wants to travel "to see a world-renowned physician, or a world-renowned neuropsychologist, they should have that right," Buchanan said.

Lawyers for the NFL monitored the hearing but did not take part in Tuesday's arguments.

The settlement, forged in 2013 and later amended, offers more than 20,000 retired players baseline testing and compensation of up to \$5 million for the most serious illnesses linked to football concussions, including Alzheimer's disease, Parkinson's disease, amyotrophic lateral sclerosis and deaths involving chronic traumatic encephalopathy, or CTE.

Many of the more serious — and more straightforward — claims were settled in the first years of the program.

DOVER, Del. (AP) — Denny Hamlin suffered from nausea and double vision from carbon monoxide that seeped into his Toyota at the end of the NASCAR race at Dover.

Hamlin felt ill after Monday's race and was attended to by medical staff on pit road after he finished 21st. Hamlin was treated and released from the NASCAR medical care center. Debris struck Hamlin's No. 11 Toyota during the race that knocked out the right rear

crush panel and allowed fumes into the car.

"That kind of hampered the very end of the race for us but it certainly wasn't the deciding factor if we raced good or bad," Hamlin said Tuesday. "It was just a tough race in general. It's one of the more physically grueling racetracks we go to anyway. Then you do something like that, it makes it even worse."

Hamlin said he felt fine on Tuesday and was ready to race this weekend at Kansas Speedway.

How Pierre-Paul's injury may affect the Bucs plans for defensive tackle Gerald McCoy is unknown. The Bucs have been non-committal about McCoy playing for them in 2019.

Federer returns to clay-court swing with easy 6-2, 6-3 win in Madrid

MADRID — Roger Federer looked as comfortable as ever on his return to clay.

Showing no signs of rust after skipping clay-court tournaments the last two seasons, Federer cruised to a 6-2, 6-3 win over Richard Gasquet at the Madrid Open on Tuesday.

The fourth-seeded Federer needed less than an hour to win his first match on clay since 2016 and reach the third round in the Spanish capital.

"It feels good to be back on the clay," Federer said. "I enjoyed it. Some of these rallies, where you get pushed to the side, you slide. You can play in a different manner than you do on the hard courts or the grass."

The 37-year-old Federer skipped the clay season the last two years to make sure he was fit for the rest of the year. The 20-time Grand Slam champion is preparing to make his first French Open appearance since 2015. He has won

two hard-court titles this season, in Dubai and Miami. He is a three-time winner in Madrid, with his last title in 2012.

The fourth-seeded Swiss converted his three break points and didn't concede any to the 39th-ranked Gasquet at the "Magic Box" center court.

Gasquet was playing in his first tournament after enduring a going injury early in the year.

"I think Richard was also maybe a little bit hurt from his match yesterday, so it was nice seeing him back after so many months being away from the tour with injury," Federer said. "I think for both of us it was a special match being back here in Madrid."

Earlier, top-ranked Novak Djokovic started with a 6-4, 6-2 win over Taylor Fritz. He broke the American's serve once in the first set and twice in the second, conceding only one break opportunity. The top-seeded Serb had seven aces and lost only two service points in the second set.

"I don't think he was

playing at his best today," Djokovic said. "But I think it was a solid opening match for me in the tournament."

Djokovic is seeking his second title of the year, and third overall in Madrid. He began the year by winning the Australian Open.

David Ferrer extended his career with a 6-4, 4-6, 6-4 win over Roberto Bautista Agut, setting up a second-round meeting with defending champion Alexander Zverev. The 37-year-old Ferrer is retiring after the tournament.

"I want to be with my family and try to enjoy as much as possible the time that I have to play in this center court," the Spaniard said. "And tomorrow I have another opportunity and I'll go out there to try to enjoy every single feeling that I might experience out there."

Stan Wawrinka ended a three-match losing streak in Madrid by defeating Pierre-Hugues Herbert 6-2, 6-3.

Hard part for Homa was waiting his turn

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — He was among the best as an amateur, winning a prestigious national title and moving onto the PGA Tour. While he never thought it was going to be easy, making it tougher was seeing so many peers from his college days collecting trophies as he wondered when, if ever, his turn would come.

So there was great satisfaction, and a small measure of relief, when former NCAA champion Max Homa won at Quail Hollow.

Mark O'Meara fits the same description.

O'Meara won the 1979 U.S. Amateur over

John Cook, who won the previous year over Scott Hoch. They were part of a strong generation of young stars that included Hal Sutton (who won the 1980 U.S. Amateur), Gary Hallberg and Payne Stewart.

All of them won within a few years on the PGA Tour.

O'Meara, now in the World Golf Hall of Fame, didn't win until his 129th start, late in his fourth year.

"You're happy for your buddy to get the win, but it's like, 'Hey, I need to do this.' It pushes everybody," O'Meara said Tuesday. "That was a driving force. Just because you're a top amateur, top college player, there's no guarantee it's

going to carry on. It gives you an edge. But that edge goes away when you have to step it up on the next level. And all of us put tremendous pressure on ourselves to succeed."

Curtis Strange hit 1-iron to 6 feet on the final hole to win the 1975 NCAA title at Wake Forest and tied for 15th at the Masters the following year as an amateur. He didn't make it through Q-school on his first try. In the three years and 83 tries before winning, he watched Gary Koch, Jerry Pate and Jay Haas win tournaments. Pate won the U.S. Open.

"Do you have patience to lose and to learn?" Strange said Tuesday. "It was hard. I hit that practice tee every single

day."

It's been that way for years, even as each generation gets a little better and a little deeper.

Justin Thomas, as honest as his drives are long, spoke about the mixture of joy and jealousy toward the end of 2017, after he won his first major at the PGA Championship. He grew up in golf with Jordan Spieth, who won so often so quickly that for the longest time, Thomas was known on first reference as Spieth's buddy. His first year on tour, he lost out on rookie of the year to Daniel Berger.

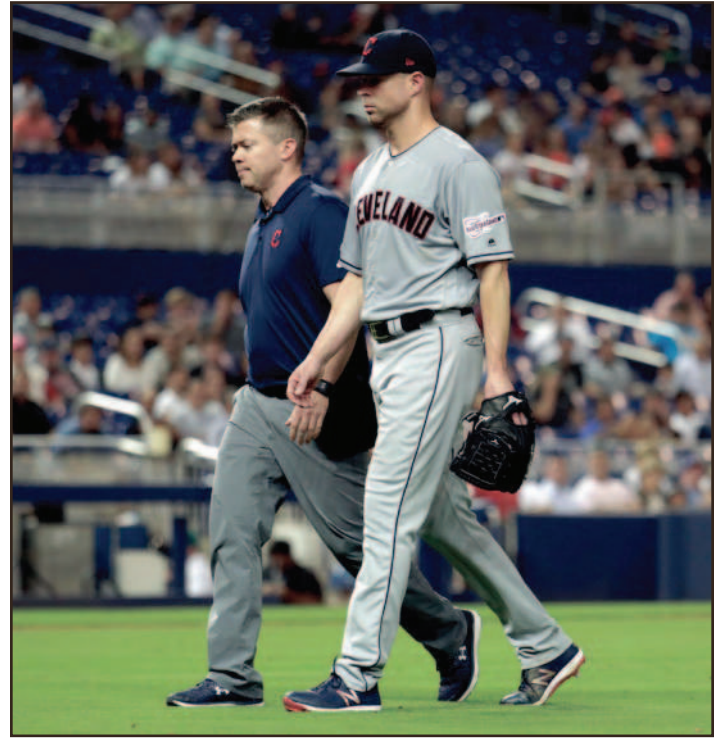
"We're all excited and happy for each other," Thomas said. "But it definitely puts a little bit of fire in us."

Joe Namath says giving up drinking saved his life

Jets legend Joe Namath opened up about his struggles with alcohol and said he doesn't believe he would be alive today if he hadn't quit drinking.

"I'd probably be dead now," Namath said in his new autobiography, "All the Way: My Life in Four Quarters," that was released on Tuesday.

Namath appeared on the "Michael Kay Show" on 98.7 ESPN Radio to promote the book and talked about his infamous interview in 2003 with ESPN's Suzy Kolber when he told her he wanted to kiss her.

Namath said he was drunk and didn't know

what he had done until someone told him. He said he called Kolber the next morning and apologized and then sought help. He said he hasn't had a drink since then. That ended up being the turning point in Namath's life.

"I really believe I wouldn't be here today," Namath said during the radio interview. "I wouldn't be a healthy Joe Namath today. I wouldn't be lucky today with my family and living every day and sharing every day with my grandchildren. I really believe I would have been somewhere else on a different level. Not how we are living here. I don't think I would have survived.

"I let everybody down. Not myself. My family, my friends, I was crushed. Suzy, I embarrassed her. To put her through that to that degree — and she handled it beautifully. When I talked with her that next morning, she was kind enough and understanding enough to make me feel like she's going to be all right and for me to suck it up and go on. So I reached out and I got help.

"It was awful. It was worse than throwing five interceptions in a game in a sense. I needed to get help and I went and got an education. To this day, I am sober, clean, happy, healthy."

In his book, Namath provides details of the Jets only Super Bowl

championship in January 1969, which he guaranteed. The Hall of Fame quarterback still has that famous bravado at 75, saying if he was young enough to play in today's NFL he would have been just as successful.

"If I came into play these days, I could have adjusted," Namath said. "If these cats that are running around on the field today could do it, I know damn well I could. I bet I could do it better. How about that?"

Namath also believes the Jets are in good hands with Sam Darnold running the offense. Namath almost guaranteed that Darnold would lead the Jets to a Super Bowl title, but he said he needs the right

pieces around him.

"We have witnessed in one season some really positive things that if he keeps growing, the championship is where he's going, is where he's going to take the team," Namath said. "He's going to be an All-Pro if he keeps getting better. If you don't have the rest of the pieces you're not going to get it done.

"Last year with the Jets we saw him more times than not playing better than poorly. You got to learn on the job. It's a tough way to go. We got Sam, and I think he can win a championship for us if we get the rest of the pieces put together. (Coach Adam) Gase and his staff is a key, a major key. You got to have

the players."

Namath went on to say Darnold's ceiling is very high, almost as high as Patriots great Tom Brady.

"Excuse me, I'm not going to put the ceiling up at Brady's level, but it could be near it," Namath said. "I don't know. We don't know. We've seen him throw every pass you need to throw out there on the field. He's got velocity, accuracy, he's got determination, he's a leader on the football team. He'll play hard. He doesn't show any quit and he's tough.

"He's got what it takes between the ears and in his chest, his heart, man. Let's just hope he keeps growing. He's the one that's got to stay determined."

Edmonton names Ken Holland as GM, president of hockey ops

EDMONTON, Alberta (AP) — The Edmonton Oilers hired longtime Detroit Red Wings executive Ken Holland as their new general manager and president of hockey operations Tuesday.

Holland takes over the struggling team from interim GM Keith Gretzky and one of his first tasks will be finding a new coach. Veteran Ken Hitchcock will not be back next season after taking over in November for the fired Todd McLellan.

"Right now times are tough. The team's made the playoffs once in 13 years," Holland said at a news conference, flanked by Oilers CEO Bob Nicholson and team owner Daryl Katz. "Daryl and Bob have made a decision to bring me in. I've got to come in and I've got to change the culture."

Edmonton has made the playoffs just once since advancing to the Stanley Cup Final in 2006, and the Oilers hope Holland is the GM who

can finally build a contender around superstars Connor McDavid and Leon Draisaitl.

"There's lots of great pieces in place here," Holland said. "I'd like to think we're talking playoffs in '19-20 when you look at some of the young players on this team."

Behind McDavid, Draisaitl and Ryan Nugent-Hopkins, there is not a lot of firepower and the defense is thin. Goaltender Mikko Koskinen, who signed a three-year extension at \$4.5 million per year in January, struggled after Cam Talbot was traded in February. The Oilers, like the Red Wings, are bumping up against the salary cap and are saddled with anchor contracts like that belonging to underperforming winger Milan Lucic.

"There's a great core. You have to build around that core," Holland said. "I don't have a magic wand. It's a move at a time, it's a piece at a time."

Holland led the Detroit Red Wings to 25 straight playoff appearances and four Stanley Cup titles. But after years of success, the Red Wings have missed the playoffs the last three seasons and were eliminated in the first round of the playoffs the three seasons before that.

The Red Wings promoted Holland to senior

vice president in April after hiring Steve Yzerman as general manager. Holland said a trip to the under-18 world hockey championship last month with Yzerman and the Red Wings staff made him realize he still had the appetite for a hands-on position.

"I realized that I had the passion, the energy, the enthusiasm (and) the

desire to continue to be a general manager in the National Hockey League," he said.

The Oilers fired general manager Peter Chiarelli in January as the team struggled to stay in the Western Conference playoff race despite having a team led by McDavid, arguably the best player in the world.

Chiarelli was in his

fourth season with the club, leading the team to a single playoff appearance in 2016-17. The Oilers advanced to the second round before losing to Anaheim in seven games.

The Oilers hope the combination of Holland and a new head coach, which will be the team's eighth since 2009, will give the team the stability it expected to get with Chiarelli and McLellan running the show.

"We have not delivered in the promise we made to our fans in recent years," Katz said. "You know it, I know it, we all know it."

Katz said Holland has full autonomy on hockey decisions: "He knows how to build a culture of winning."

"And while accountability for this falls on everyone in our organization it starts and it stops with me," the owner said. "We're listening to our fans. We get it and we're doing everything we can to get it right."

Durant-Harden duel may go distance

OAKLAND, Calif. — Kevin Durant vs. James Harden. This duel may just go the distance, and the two stars know it.

Everyone figured the Western Conference semifinal between Golden State and Houston had a chance to be more like the NBA Finals in terms of talent on each side, and now it's tied at 2-1.

The NBA's best are dazzling on defense and trading big shots on offense.

"The way both teams are playing with such intensity and aggression, it's fun to be out there," Durant said. "We're looking forward to Game 5."

The series resumes Wednesday night at Oracle Arena, which could host its final game if Golden State doesn't handle business at home. The Warriors will move to new Chase Center in San Francisco next season.

"The mood's good. Playoffs, this is what it's about," Warriors coach Steve Kerr said Tuesday afternoon once his team touched down in Oakland. "Our team has been here many times. We've been in much worse situations, being

down in a series, being on the road for Game 7s. We've pretty much seen it all. This is just another chapter in the book."

Also Wednesday, Boston will try to stave off elimination playing at Milwaukee. The Bucks are up 3-1.

"These kinds of situations show a lot about people," Celtics coach Brad Stevens said. "It doesn't always mean you're going to have success. But competing at the level you need to compete and making sure you're as urgent as you've ever been on every possession is of ultimate importance."

Back in the Bay Area, Splash Brothers Stephen Curry and Klay Thompson will try to find their shooting touch. They combined to shoot 9 of 35 on 3-pointers and 30 of 79 overall the past two games.

Curry and Durant each missed good looks from long range with a chance to tie Game 4 in the waning seconds.

Chris Paul and Harden, meanwhile, know they might have swung momentum after evening the series with Monday night's 112-108 victory.

"I hope so. I hope we have it," Harden said. "We're not going to let

up. We're going to keep coming at you until the end of the game."

ROCKETS AT WARRIORS

Series tied at 2. Game 5, 10:30 p.m. EDT, TNT

NEED TO KNOW: The Warriors have acknowledged their lack of focus at times this season, losing badly at home on a handful of occasions and struggling with the basics such as taking care of the ball.

Now, they will try to channel positive energy into another performance like their 115-109 Game 2 victory at Oracle in which Golden State showed intensity on both ends.

"We love it. Obviously, we would love to be up 3-1 or have the series over, but there's no panic," Curry said. "We're together and we understand what the task at hand is. It's very similar to the last series where you just roll with the punches and get the job done any way you can. We can take control of the series at home and take it from there."

INJURY WATCH: Golden State flew later in the day Tuesday so players could receive treatment and get some

recovery time, Kerr said.

Starting forward Andre Iguodala is probable after hyperextending his left knee late in Monday's loss.

Meanwhile, Harden's left eye is still red from an injury in Game 2.

"It just looks crazy but it's getting better," he said. "The doctor said it might be a couple of days or it might be a week before it clears up."

Durant grabbed his right elbow repeatedly during Game 4. The two-time reigning finals MVP was hurt when he trailed Harden on an early fast break and bumped the Houston star in the head while attempting to block the shot from behind.

In addition, guard Shaun Livingston is "a little banged up," Kerr said.

KEEP AN EYE ON: Rebounding. The Rockets outrebounded the Warriors 55-35 in their Game 3 win then 50-43 on Monday — getting 20 from Clint Capela in the two victories.

Golden State held an edge on the boards in Games 1 and 2.

It starts with defense to generate rebounding opportunities like the Warriors had in their two wins at home.

Derby winner Country House out of Preakness due to illness

Blood work shows virus in Derby winner

After being declared the winner of the Kentucky Derby by disqualification, Country House will not run in the Preakness because of illness, ending any chance a Triple Crown this year. Trainer Bill Mott said Tuesday the long shot winner of horse racing's biggest event was no longer being considered to run in the second jewel of the Triple

Crown after it looked like Country House was getting sick. After the horse started coughing, which Mott called unusual, blood work showed he was harboring some sort of virus. "Hopefully just rest and a little time is going to be what the doctor ordered," Mott told The Associated Press. "Other than that, he doesn't actually act sick. He's kind of a big, tough horse, but there's signs that things are not going in the

right direction with him." Country House was elevated to the winner's circle at the Kentucky Derby in sloppy conditions Saturday after Maximum Security was disqualified for impeding other horses. His absence at the Preakness means there won't be a third Triple Crown winner in five years. Bob Baffert-trained Justify and American Pharoah have each won it since 2015. Country House is the first

Kentucky Derby winner not to enter the Preakness since Grindstone in 1996. Grindstone, who was found to have bone chips in one of his knees, was the first Derby winner to be retired immediately after that race since Bubbling Over in 1926. Because of how the Kentucky Derby went, Mott said he and those around the horse were not as disappointed by this as they would've been under normal circumstances. "I guess it's been an unusual ride anyway," Mott

said of his first Derby victory. "I don't think it hit any of us as hard as what it might have. I think we're grateful to have the win we had and hopefully he bounces back for some races later on." Country House joins Maximum Security in skipping the Preakness. The 1 3/16-mile Preakness is May 18 at Pimlico Race Course in Baltimore. Though shorter than the Kentucky Derby, the race requires a quick turnaround. Maximum Security owner Gary West didn't want to burden his

colt with the Triple Crown off the table. West on Monday appealed the decision to disqualify the horse from the Derby, which was quickly rejected by the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission because the stewards' decision isn't subject to appeal. Country House was 65-1 to win the Derby, the second-longest odds in the 145-year history of the race. It was the first time the horse who crossed the finish line first was not declared the winner.

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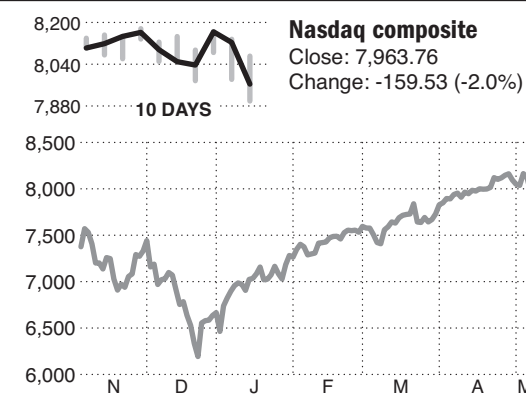
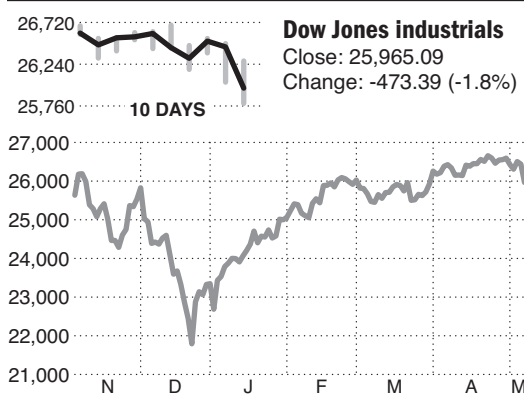
