Lake Apopka summit draws officials to talk about ecotourism on North Shore

Local congressmen, state senators and state representatives, Orange and Lake county commissioners and multi-city representatives, including Apopka, all shared their vision for ecotourism centering around Lake Apopka and the adjacent North Shore Restoration Area at a regional summit meeting Friday, February 8, in Mount Dora.

"Ecotourism can support businesses and enhance the tax base, residents also get to enjoy the amenities every day," said Leslie Campione, chair of the Lake County Commission which hosted the event. "Our chance of success expands exponentially as we work together as partners."

U.S. congressmen John Mica and Dan Webster both said they were thrilled with the cooperation displayed at the

summit and said they were on board to contribute where possible.

"We stand today on the shoulders of earlier legislators such as Toni Jennings and Everett Kelly who were responsible for the purchase of the muck farms in 1996 and 1997. We will hold a Birdapalooza at Magnolia Park and give tours of the North Shore Restora-

tion Area on Saturday, March 9. This is our effort to begin the process of ecotourism," said Fred Brummer, Orange County commissioner.

"St. Johns River Water Management District is all ears today," said Hans Tanzler, director. "This is a real example of democracy. It is the people's land and it is a palette of potential."

"Our primary goal right now is to get that water in Lake Apopka right," said state Sen. Alan Hays. "Without water that is suitable, you will have nothing but a big mud hole. My idea is that we are to be stewards and use in our resources in a way the benefits everybody. It is critical to maintain our team-

Officials said Patel conspired with others to fill fraudulent prescriptions for oxycodone at prices up to three times the normal value. The pharmacy may be closed for good by the state.

Apopka's Old Florida Outdoor Festival is smokin' good time

Participants at the Old Florida Outdoor Festival said Apopka lived up to its name as 14th friendliest city in America February 8-10 during the Old Florida Outdoor Festival at the Northwest Recreation Complex in Apopka.

The festival included country music concerts, lots of food, birding tours, Dock Dogs, a duck-calling contest, exhibits by hunting and fishing outfitters, a chili cook-off, and a statewide barbecue contest.

Both local officials and officials with the Florida Bar-B-Que Association said they were thrilled with the outcome

of the event.

"There's no doubt this first-year contest in Apopka was a major success," said Tony Wolfe, president of the Florida Bar-B-Que Association. "Just ask Myron Mixon, he's already booked it for next year. Jack's Old South doesn't just win contests - they do it with a perfect score - this time in pork and a first in brisket that was less than two points from perfect."

Celebrity chef Mixon of Unadilla, Ga. left Apopka \$3,000 richer with one more trophy after his Jack's Old South team won grand champion of the pro division of the Florida Bar-B-Que Association sanctioned cook-off with

763.53330 points out of a possible 800 points. Mixon had the first 2013 perfect score in the pork category and missed a perfect score in the brisket category by less than .02.

Unknown BBQ from Winter Haven came in as reserve champions and Hot Wachula's from Lakeland took third place in the pro division.

In the backyard division, there were 17 teams. Two G's Next Generation BBQ Crew from Okeechobee came in first and Chow'n Down the Q from Orlando came in second. Big Rack BBQ, made up of the Apopka team of Jesse Fowler (AHS 2003) and his wife,

City will get up to 4.5 million gallons of free reuse water per day

Under an agreement with the city of Altamonte Springs and three state agencies, the city of Apopka will receive up to 4.5 million gallons of reuse water per day at no charge.

The free water is a result of a project between Apopka, Altamonte Springs, the St. Johns River Water Management District, the state Department of Transportation, and the state Department of Environmental

Protection.

The \$12.5 million project calls for Apopka to receive excess reuse water from Altamonte Springs, water that would have otherwise been pumped into the Little Wekiva and Wekiva rivers. Apopka will pay nothing for the water other than to connect to Altamonte Springs' reuse water system.

The net effect environmental-

ly, officials said, will mean lower amounts of nutrients entering the rivers.

For Apopka, the water will augment the amount available to its reuse program that goes for landscape irrigation throughout the city.

"We never had enough of it (reuse water)," said Richard Anderson, Apopka's chief administrative officer. "This does not affect our consump-

tive use permit at all. Our citizens get the benefit of more reuse water available." The consumptive use permit determines how much water an entity such as Apopka can pull out of the ground.

"It does give us more (reuse water) quantity," Anderson said. "We've really been having to limit it during drought conditions. Hopefully, we won't have to limit it as much. Some

places, we just have to turn it off because there's not enough water. This will allow us to increase the supply without having to pull it out of the ground."

Officials said the project will prevent 27,000 pounds per year of total phosphorus and 59,000 pounds per year of total nutrients from being dis-

Aldi will open Apopka grocery store in middle of March

The new Aldi at 1636 E. Semoran Boulevard in Apopka will hold a ribbon cutting Thursday, March 14, at 8:45 a.m. The store's official public opening, which will include product sampling, and on-site sweepstakes, will begin at 9 a.m.

"The new store will showcase the new look of Aldi," said Arwa Luqman, spokeswoman. "With higher ceilings, improved natural lighting and environmentally friendly building materials - such as recycled materials and energy-saving refrigeration and light bulbs - the store will offer customers a simple and easy-to-navigate shopping experience. From the moment customers walk into the store, efficiencies have been built in at every level, including the cart rental system,"

said Luqman. "Customers use a quarter to retrieve a cart and get a quarter refunded when they return the cart to the corral at the end of their shopping trip. New customers may be surprised to see a system in place but appreciate that they not only get their deposit back, but also that their cars are not dented by stray carts in the parking lot. By keeping overhead costs low and implementing cost-effective practices, such as not having to hire someone to police the shopping carts, we are able to pass the savings on to our customers."

The Apopka location, which is approximately 10,000 square feet of retail space per store, looks larger than the Altamonte Springs store, but the square footage is approximately the same.

"The difference in perceived size is related to the ground up build as compared to an inline space," Luqman said. "Aldi stores have a consistent store layout, which is four to five aisles, compared to more than 30 at other gro-

cers. We have spacious checkouts and uncluttered, eight-foot wide aisles.

A typical Aldi store employs 15-20 people who are specifically trained for their job.

"Shift managers may also

work regular shifts as cashiers in addition to shifts at the managerial level," Luqman said. "Aldi employees receive generous wages and benefits that are significantly higher than the

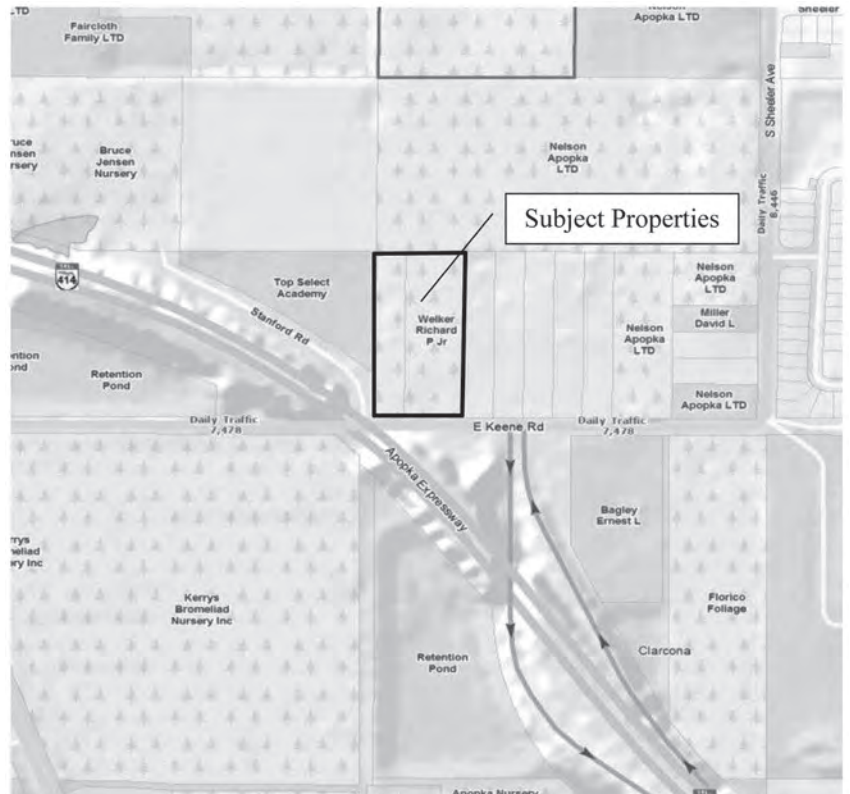

Alyssa Hebert Fowler, (AHS 2005) came in third. The Apopka team also won the "People's Choice" award for their pork Boston butt out of all 44 of the competitors, both professional and backyard.

It was the first competition for the Apopka team.

"This was me and my wife's first barbecue competition," Fowler said. "After watching Pitmasters, and, having a passion for barbecuing, we decided to see if this is something we could do. Months of practicing really paid off. When we saw that there was a barbecue competition this year and it was in our own backyard, we decided to take a stab at it. We had a great time last weekend and met some really awesome people. My wife and I have grown up in Apopka and we were proud to represent our hometown. The FBA has a great association and we will definitely be back next year. Our next planned competition is in Oviedo in May."

"We are overly enthusiastic about the turnout we had for the barbecue cook-off," said Chuck Carnesale, Apopka Fire Department spokesman. "We are so happy this was a great success. Myron Mixon said this is one of the top three shows he has been to in Florida and he

was amazed how well organized we were since it was our first year and said he believes we can easily hit 100 teams next year. For a first year competition to have no major problems was amazing."

The winners in the Adam Stratton Memorial Foundation Chili Cook-off were, first place, The Crooked Spoon from Clermont; second place, World's Smokin' Que from Orlando; and third place, Green Mean Chili Machine – firefighter Phil Lamphere, who participated to help his daughter's Girl Scout Troop – from Apopka.

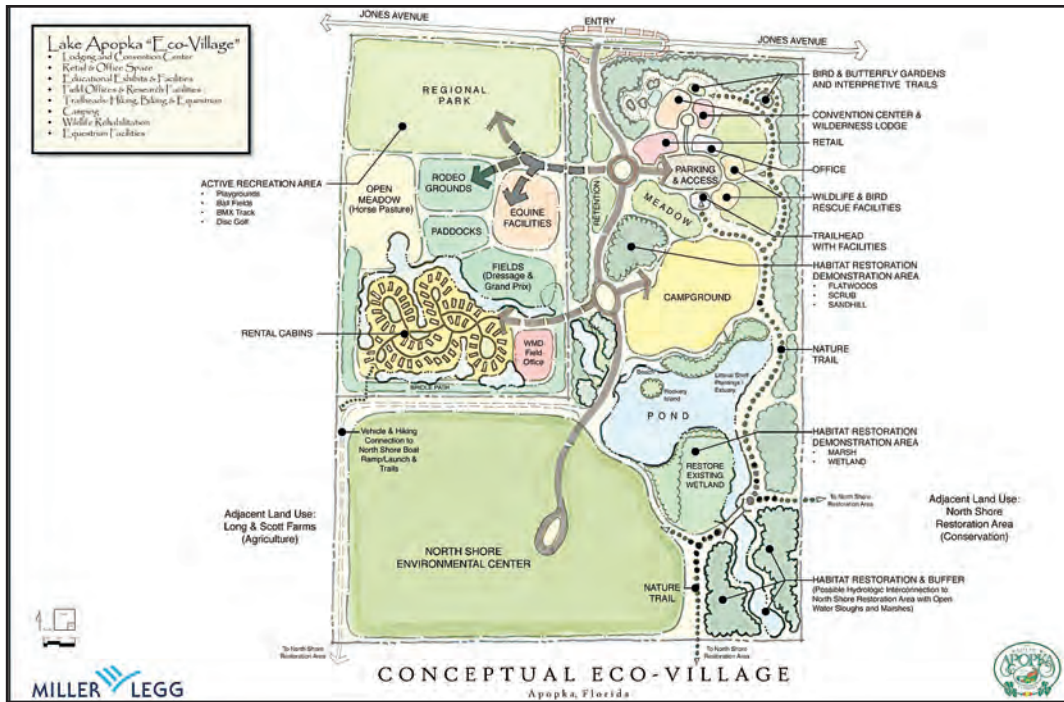

City shows conceptual eco-village drawing

In preparation for a regional summit on ecotourism Friday, February 8, in Mount Dora, the city of Apopka hired a consultant from Miller Legg to conceptualize an ecotourism plan, which was presented to the public at the event for the first time. The plan envisions a three-phase eco-village that would feature a Disney-type lodge, a campground, cabins and more, near the North Shore Restoration Area of Lake Apopka.

"Lake County Commission Chair Leslie Campione's office invited the city of Apopka to participate in a summit to discuss ecotourism so we hired Miller Legg, a company we have used a lot in the past, to draw up plans that would help us visualize what that could mean in Apopka," said David Moon, planning manager. "The other purpose of the study was to demonstrate that the North Shore Restoration Area on Lake Apopka could co-exist with the Orlando Apopka Airport in the long term."

Barry Wilcox, Miller Legg planning services manager, said the planning for the eco-village began in January. "We just put together a conceptual plan to begin to think what ecotourism could mean for the city of Apopka," Wilcox said. "I believe the

North Shore Restoration Area is what Hans Tanzler, director of the St. Johns River Water Management District said, 'A palette of potential.'"

Wilcox said the North Shore has tremendous potential for recreational activities such as hiking, cycling, birding, car tours, camping, fishing and hunting; agritourism, such as what Long and Scott is currently promoting on their farm; and ecoindustry, which in-

cludes clean energy, such as solar fields, research and development, green industries and agricultural research.

Moon said the city had such short notice about the summit that the concept plan was not presented to the City Council beforehand, but would be presented in the near future. The city did, however, call a meeting of the stakeholders Friday, February 1, which included representatives of the city, Miller

Legg, Florida Audubon, landowners adjacent to the North Shore Restoration Area, which included representatives from Long and Scott Farm, and members of the St. Johns River Water Management District, to ascertain their ideas.

"At this point it is just a concept - there may be other ideas," Moon said. "And from this point, we feel it is the part of leadership to take the initiative and to develop further plans.

work. (State) Rep. Bryan Nelson (of Apopka) has been a stellar supporter of Lake Apopka. He and I have worked together without even knowing what the other one was doing."

During the summit, environmental groups such as the Friends of Lake Apopka, Audubon Florida and the Sierra Club, state agencies such as the Florida Fish and Wildlife and the District, county agencies such as Orange County Parks and Recreation and others shared their vision.

Dr. Jim Thomas, the leader on a proposal to make the North Shore a National Wildlife Refuge, said he would turn the completed proposal over to the district and let them decide on the time to approach national authorities.

Dennis Renfro, a biologist with the

Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, said Florida has more anglers than any other state and, as a result, recreational fishing brought \$4.4 billion of revenue into the state each year.

"Florida is the fishing capital of the world," Renfro said. "Freshwater fishermen spend more time in the water."

In the first half of the 1900s, Lake Apopka was known for world-class bass fishing. Renfro said the FWC is working to restore the quality of recreational fishing through restocking the lake with sunshine bass and creating fish habitats that encourage breeding. Parts of Lake Apopka are being dredged in order to give boats easier access for fishing.

Guy Haggard, chairman of the West Orange Airport Authority shared the plans to expand one of three airports in Northwest Orange County. Jim Wikstrom of

the Florida Department of Transportation spoke of what is necessary before airports can be entered into the state system.

Based on Haggard's presentation, the emphasis for airport growth appeared to change from the controversial North Orlando Airpark on Jones Avenue to Orlando-Apopka Airport on U.S. Highway 441.

Greg Gensheimer of the Green Mountain Scenic Byway said his organization has entered into an agreement with the city of Mount Dora and the Byway will be elongated to come around Lake Apopka into Mount Dora.

"Lake Apopka is not only our future, but also a reminder of our past," Webster said. "Together, with the cities and counties that are involved and the other organizations that are involved in this public-private partnership, I think we will love what is going to happen."

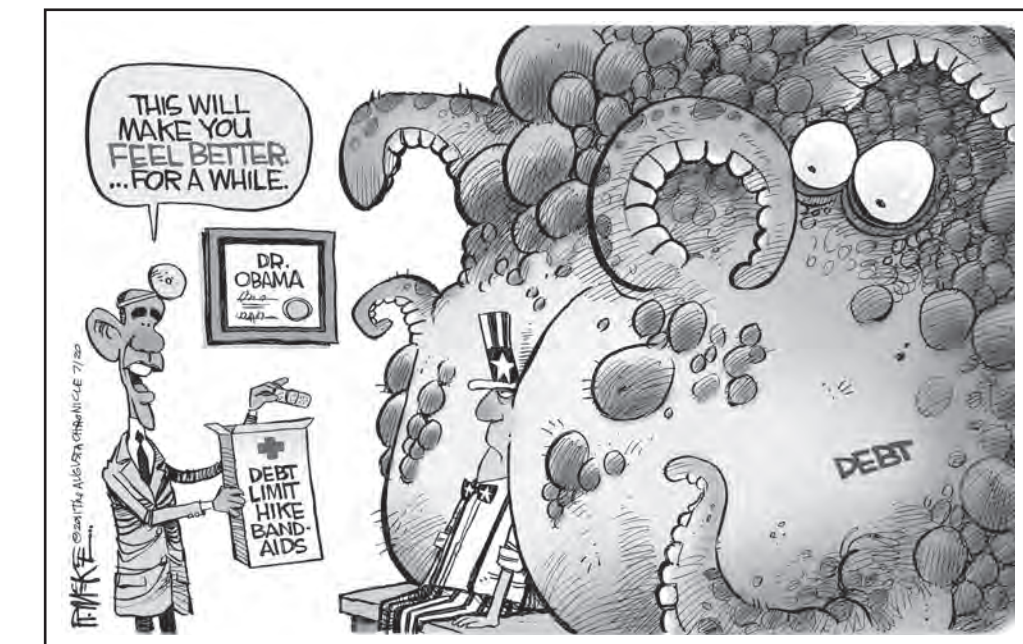

Gov. Scott focusing on education, jobs

Two weeks ago, Governor Scott unveiled his budget and priorities for the 2013-2014 fiscal year. Anyone from the public can view the governor's proposed budget by going to www.letsgettowork.state.fl.us. The governor is proposing a budget of \$74 billion which is an increase of \$4 billion over last year's budget. The top two priorities that the governor says he is focusing on are improving education and fostering job creation.

The governor is offering several proposals to help private industry foster job creation. Governor Scott is proposing to eliminate taxes on the equipment purchases of manufacturing companies and to remove some of the regulations that are required for these exemptions. The governor's budget also reduces the amount of growth a new company needs to demonstrate to qualify for a sales tax exemp-

tion. Right now, companies have to show an increase in output of 10 percent, but the governor's proposal is to reduce that to 5 percent.

Another proposal of the budget is to recommend approximately \$289 million in the Florida Regional Workforce Boards, as well as \$2.3 million for the Ready to Work Program, which matches up prospective employees with companies looking for a specific skill set.

The largest section of the budget deals with social services, and more specifically Medicaid. Out of the pro-

posed budget of \$74 billion, more than \$18 billion will go to Medicaid Services for Individuals and another \$5 billion will go to long term Medicaid patients. The budget for the Agency for Health Care Administration is a \$1-billion increase from last year. Other agencies, such as the Department of Children and Families and the Agency for Persons with Disability, saw their budgets reduced.

The section of the budget that received the biggest influx of dollars was education. The governor's budget increases education funding by \$1.7 billion. More than \$1 billion of the increase will go to elementary and secondary education, including \$100 million in a new technology modernization initiative and another \$10 million for school safety. By far, the largest section of increase in funding will go to improv-

Lincoln insisted slavery was a moral evil

Stephen Spielberg's masterful movie on Lincoln and the 150th anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation have recently brought even greater attention than usual to Abraham Lincoln. Holidays like Presidents Day remind us of Lincoln's position on slavery and his role in its eradication in the United States.

For 25 years before the Civil War began, Lincoln consistently opposed the extension of slavery, strove to prevent a confrontation between the North and the South, and worked to gradually abolish slavery where it existed.

Although Lincoln was neither an abolitionist nor a leader in the antislavery crusade, he insisted for three decades that slavery was a moral evil. He risked his political future by denouncing slavery as a mem-

ber of the Illinois legislature in the 1830s and 1840s, when the state passed laws to prevent free blacks from settling there.

Lincoln strongly opposed the Kansas-Nebraska Act of 1854 because it implied that enslaving fellow human beings was right, contravened the principle of liberty, and contradicted the views of the nation's founders. Moreover, he warned, permitting the extension of slavery would make compromise between the North and South more difficult and a civil war more likely. In 1858, he called the battle against slavery a crucial part of "the eternal struggle between right and wrong throughout the world."

Lincoln's approach differed from that of most abolitionists in two major ways. First, his opposition to slavery did not primarily rest on the Bible. In 1860 Lincoln declared that both revelation and

"natural theology" proved that slavery was "morally wrong and a direct violation" of the "principle of equality." When a nation "dared the Almighty" by enslaving any group, he warned, its citizens "had cause to dread His wrath."

In condemning slavery, Lincoln often referred to God's justice, the Golden Rule, and the curse requiring Adam to provide for himself by his own labor, not someone else's. Because God commanded all human beings to labor, "the effort of some to shift their share of the burthen to the shoulders of others" was despicable. However, in repudiating slavery, Lincoln appealed principally to the Declaration of Independence and people's "natural sense of justice." America's practice of slavery blatantly contradicted the Declaration's emphasis on human equality.

Second, while opposing

as most surgeons.

One of his most notable occurred on September 5, 1987, in an operation requiring 22 hours and a surgical team he led of 70 people.

Twin boys, 7-months old, were joined at the head. They were born connected at the back of the head and shared a major

vein. In medical terms, this was the first successful separation of occipital craniopagus Siamese twins.

I first heard of Dr. Ben Carson several years ago through Pat Robertson's 700 Club TV broadcast, where the story presented was of a failing grammar school student in Detroit, with a mother, who was one of 24 children, who refused to allow her son to continue failing. She had him read Solomon's "Proverbs" in the Bible over and over again throughout his public school studies, plus two books a week. He became the class ac-

ademic leader.

As an outstanding academic, he was in demand among the highest-ranked universities. He earned a B.A. in psychology from Yale and a medical degree from the University of Michigan School of Medicine in 1977, and he soon became one of the leading neurosurgeons in the nation, probably the world.

If you haven't watched Fox News or listened to Rush and other conservative talk radio shows, Dr. Carson's appearance as a speaker at the National Prayer Breakfast last week, and his simple solutions to America's major problems

in 30 minutes haven't reached you, watch Fox News – they have been interviewing him daily since.

Speaking just one seat away from another speaker, President Obama, Carson presented solutions to our national disasters in simple language used by men of God.

These included out-of-control tax policies (80,000 pages of tax laws). Carson-Just follow God's principle of tithing. If everyone, no matter their income level, just gave 10 percent, we would be awash in money. This is, of course, the flat tax that would eliminate the armies of tax lawyers and

IRS agents.

Also included are medical costs that are bankrupting the wage earners. Carson-When someone is born, give him a birth certificate, an identity card and an electronic medical account the parents pay into until maturity and they keep going until they're 85 or more and decide to pass it on to family. No more death panels.

The poor can start an account and be helped by private charitable contributions. Get the government out of health-care. These and other proposals prompted *The Wall Street*

the expansion of slavery on moral grounds, Lincoln, unlike most abolitionists, refused to excoriate slaveholders and pointed out the moral flaws of both owners and their critics. While Lincoln criticized Southern slave owners for violating the Golden Rule, he insisted that Northerners shared in the sin of slavery because their region profited financially from it.

Lincoln argued in his second inaugural address that the Civil War was clearly "a divine punishment for the sin of slavery" in which both Northerners and Southerners had participated.

Lincoln lamented that "the friends of the Union" had diverse views of slavery: some wanted to perpetuate it; others wanted to abolish it immediately without reimbursing owners; still others wanted to abolish slavery gradually with

compensation; some wanted to colonize free blacks in another country, while others preferred they remain in the United States.

Abolishing slavery instantly without compensating owners and giving blacks equality, he warned, would produce even more violence and might permanently split the nation.

As president, Lincoln feared, with good justification, that efforts to eliminate slavery would push the border states into the Confederacy and prompt northern Democrats to oppose the war.

For Lincoln, preserving the Union was a higher goal than ending slavery because he believed the United States, despite its practice of slavery, was the chief vehicle for advancing liberty around the world.

Lincoln proposed a plan for the gradual, compensated emancipation of slaves residing in the District of Colum-

bia, which Congress passed in April 1862. The president also offered financial aid to any border states that devised a plan to free its slaves.

In issuing the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863, which freed the slaves only in states in rebellion against the Union, Lincoln declared that "upon this act of justice I invoke the considerate judgment of mankind and the gracious favor of Almighty God."

Some scholars fault Lincoln for not transcending his racist culture and more forcefully condemning slavery and working to abolish it more quickly.

Spielberg's movie poignantly depicts the pressures Lincoln faced in trying to pass the 13th Amendment in 1865 to free all slaves.

Given the obstacles he faced, Lincoln's efforts to abolish slavery were commendable. As we continue to deal with the legacy of this

horrific practice and try to end the tragedy of human trafficking today, we would do well to remember Lincoln's words and actions.

ing the salary and benefits of teachers at \$480 million over last year's budget. This is in line with the governor's call to give every teacher in the state a raise. Another key increase is in the discretionary lottery fund, which saw a \$30 million increase.

Crafting a budget is one of the most important duties that the state must do. Un-

like at the federal level, Florida law requires that the state budget must be balanced every year. Also, unlike the federal government, the governor has the opportunity to exercise his line-item veto and remove parts of the budget without vetoing the entire bill.

The governor's budget is the start of a conversation that will continue throughout the upcoming legislative session. The House and Senate Appro-

priations Committees are still crafting a budget and will be working on it throughout the session and will pass a budget.

Journal on the day following the "Breakfast" to print a major editorial headlined, "Carson for President."

Dr. Carson co-founded Angels in the OR which provides grants to uninsured patients to cover the cost of surgery. He is also co-founder and president of the Carson Scholars Fund which awards scholarships to students for their academic achievements and humanitarian efforts. The fund has awarded more than 3,400 scholarships since 1994.

Carson holds more than 80 honorary degrees and has received hundreds of awards and citations. He sits on the board of directors of dozens of organizations. His efforts, contributions to our nation and its citizens are considerably more than those of, say, a Chicago neighborhood organizer, as are his qualifications to be president. In a lengthy interview by *The Saturday Evening Post* in July 1999, Carson was asked: Why do you believe in God when many in the scientific

community do not?

Carson answered: "I guess it's because I'm a logical person. I look at the complexity of the brain and the human body, and I say, 'That wouldn't come out of a slime pit. It's much too complex.' I look at the universe: you don't have to go to the whole universe; just look at our solar system. Look at the precise Earth orbit around the sun and the rotation of the Earth upon its axis.

"Look at the Earth in relationship to other planets in our solar system. How incredibly organized and predictable it is. We can even set the clocks by it. We can predict 75 years hence when a comet is coming. That is incredible precision!"

I'll never forget Obama's facial expression as Carson used God's wisdom and love as the primary solution to avoid our nation's downfall. The Obama brain, which obviously has construed teaching constitutional law as planning its destruction, could only keep a frozen smile, a grimace if you will, in place for the 30

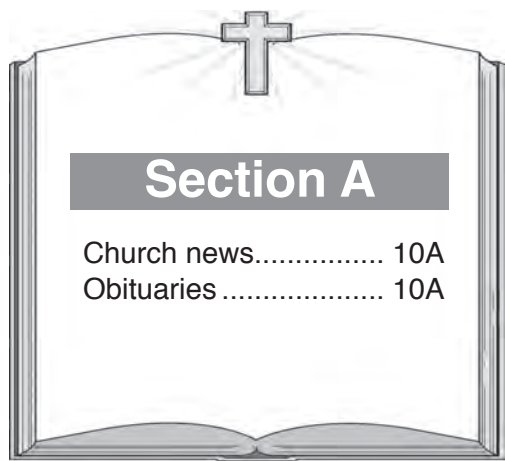

Apopkan writes of black history in South Apopka area

Olivian Peterson-Brown decided one day last year that she would be the change she wanted to see. The 61-year-old South Apopka great-grandmother remembered what it was like to be a student at the all-black Phyllis Wheatley High School and to literally be on the other side of the tracks in Apopka.

She decided to write a book about the history of blacks in the Apopka area and has recently completed **Black Heritage Part I Apopka and Surrounding Areas**. A copy is available for public viewing as part of the Black History Month exhibit at the Museum of the Apopkans, 122 E. Fifth Street, Apopka.

"I took a look at what I could find on the history of black people in Apopka and I couldn't find anything," Peterson-Brown said. "I knew we should have a lot more to tell the young people and so writing the book became a passion. I wanted the kids and grandkids and great-grandkids to know we were really here and

the contributions we made. The kids today need role models."

Peterson-Brown was born in Georgia and when she was three years old, the family moved to Zellwood. Throughout her

school years, the family would move back and forth from Georgia to Zellwood. She left school her senior year at Phyllis Wheatley, then obtained her high school diploma at a later date through

Hungerford High School in Eatonville.

"I gave people a sheet of questions to answer," Peterson-Brown said. "Whoever gave the information back, I typed it out, then gave the information back to them to look at to be sure it was accurate. I gave a book to each person I interviewed, a copy to the Museum of the Apopkans and I kept a book for myself. It is not for sale - but strictly for the sake of history. My husband, Paul Brown, has been my hero through the whole thing because he knew how important it was to me."

Approximately 12 long-time residents were interviewed for the book, including William Gladden who writes the Perrine Slim column for *The Apopka Chief*. She is currently working on the second volume of the series.

"I want people to know that there is a project going on," Peterson-Brown said. "This is not some gimmick. I will continue on until I get enough informa-

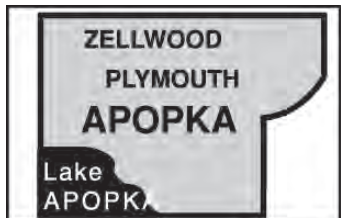

Event to offer fun, educational info on Wekiva

The beautiful National Wild and Scenic Wekiva River, which has its springhead in Apopka is impaired and local officials are stepping up to the plate to do something about it.

This Saturday, February 16, former Senator Bob Graham (also former governor), Seminole County Commissioner Lee Constantine, the Florida Conservation Coalition (FCC), Friends of the Wekiva River (FOWR), League of Women Voters of Florida, and St. Johns Riverkeeper will hold a meeting "Speak Up Wekiva" at Wekiwa Springs State Park to raise awareness about the need to restore the impaired Wekiva River, the troubled springs that feed it, and all of Florida's treasured waterways. The Wekiva is an important tributary of the St. Johns River.

"Water is the lifeblood of Florida," said Graham, a long-time environmental advocate who founded the bipartisan FCC with other conservationists in 2011. "It ties our state together, provides untold recreational opportunities and draws millions of visitors each year to our state, supporting jobs and economic growth."

The Wekiva River and the springs, which feed it remain significantly impaired in terms of both water quality and quantity.

"Nutrients typically manifest in the Wekiva River as a proliferation of exotic species and filamentous algae," said Deborah Shelley, Wekiva-Middle St.

Johns-Tomoka Marsh Aquatic Preserves manager with the DEP. "The water remains clear even though we have higher nutrients because of the flow. Unicellular algae is the type of algae that causes our lakes and slower moving rivers to turn green. Unicellular algae require residence time to grow, which we don't have in the Wekiva due to the flow. During the summer months, we often have algae blooms downstream in the slower moving St. Johns River. So the nutrients coming out of the Wekiva also affect the St. Johns River. In the Wekiva River, the filamentous algae *Lynghya* (a fine hair-like algae) can uptake the extra nutrients so we see a proliferation of this species in many areas along the Wekiva."

Shelley said it took many years for nutrients to become elevated in the Wekiva River and

it will likely take a prolonged effort on several fronts to reduce nutrient levels.

"We have to look at the sources of nutrients - from the scientific research conducted - and address each source with specific strategies designed to reduce impacts from that particular source," she said. "A Wekiva Basin Management Action Plan (Wekiva BMAP) is currently being developed which will address reducing nutrient inputs to the Wekiva."

"The 'Wekiva BMAP will address water bodies covered under two TMDLs, both adopted in 2008," said Dee Ann Miller, DEP spokeswoman. "These include the TMDL for nitrate and phosphorus in the Wekiva River, Wekiwa Spring, and Rock Springs Run."

Miller said the TMDL restoration targets for the Wekiva

River TMDL are 0.286 mg/L for nitrate and 0.065 mg/L for phosphorus. These require reductions of 47 to 81 percent for nitrate and 23 to 78 percent for phosphorus, depending on the water body or water body segment.

"The actions to reduce nutrients in the draft BMAP will include projects to reduce nutrient loads to the rivers and closed depressions that reach the river system and springs via ground water flow," Miller said. "These include storm water treatment projects; agricultural best management practices to better manage nutrients; and wastewater projects to convey wastewater for reuse instead of direct discharge; and to repair leaking sewer lines, upgrade lift stations and extend sewer lines to areas on septic tanks."

Miller said the DEP would solicit comment from the many stakeholders already engaged in development of the draft BMAP and the general public.

"Science shows that Wekiwa and Rock Springs have nitrate levels five times that of a healthy spring and that the flows of both have steadily declined since the 1930s," said Bill Belleville, author and filmmaker, who will speak at the event.

The event will also include educational and outdoor activities, live music, artists with original artwork from the Wekiva, guided hikes, and tram rides.

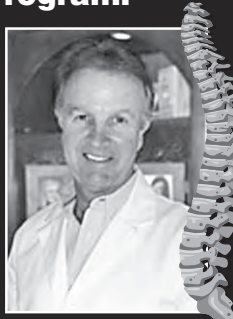

Remembering frequent meetings with MLK 63 years ago in Atlanta, Ga.

Martin Luther King Jr. wrote these words while a college student in Atlanta, "We must remember that intelligence is not enough. Intelligence plus character – this is the goal of true education."

Monday, January 21, was a federal holiday honoring the late Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday. He was born on January 15, 1929, in the sovereign state of Georgia the same year the great financial depression began.

Being that the United States of America was having

its presidential inauguration for the 44th president in conjunction with the federal holiday as previously noted, brought to Perrine Slim's memory the numerous memorable encounters at Graves Hall in Atlanta, Georgia, he had with MLK along with two native Floridians in the persons of Carlton A.B. Jackson from Zuber, Flor-

ida and Clarence Lee Baskin, Sr., from Apopka, while living in that area during the 1950s.

Dr. Benjamin E. Mays, who resided and was teaching in Atlanta at that point in time (1941-1960), was considered as one of the leaders in the civil rights movement striving and demanding for complete civil rights.

MLK, under the tutelage and watchful eyes of Dr. Benjamin E. Mays, was encouraged to address and emphasize the important issue of civil rights in conjunction with theology. It is quite obvious why then MLK chose civil rights after the persistent prodding from his chief mentor and adviser Dr. Benja-

min E. Mays even until MLK's tragic demise.

Most of Perrine Slim's encounters with MLK involved his relating how important being academically prepared for the system of things was, along with how you treat your fellow person as you like to be treated. He also related that we must obey Jehovah's commandments, tenets, statutes and consolidate among ourselves wherein to ascertain the goal so desperately desired.

Apopkan directed air traffic in SW Asian war zone

Senior Airman Shaun Simmons, 23, a former Apopkan who has been deployed at Aviano Air Force Base, Italy, for the past six months, will soon be on his way to a new assignment at Pope Air Force Base in North Carolina.

“La Casse is a part of the 603rd Air Control Squadron, one of two Air Force theater air control systems in Europe,” said 2nd Lt. Allie Delury. “Since the start of the squadron’s deployment in July, the squadron controlled 129,000 miles of airspace, assisted in 50,000 combat missions, controlled 41,000 aircraft and supported three rescue missions.”

“My job title is Command and Control Battle Management,” Simmons said. “It is kind of like an air traffic controller’s job. We control tactical aircraft overhead air strikes in Southwest Asia. We tell the

planes, which are protecting aid in their refueling process.” Delury said the squadron, which is being inactivated as

part of a larger effort to help meet Budget Control Act resource levels, has a rich history with roots reaching back to the very beginnings of the Air Force.

“It was officially activated as the 603rd ACS on December 31, 1945 under the Army Air Corps,” she said. “The squadron’s early years provided air control for major air operations, including support of the Berlin Airlift.”

Simmons attended ninth grade at Apopka High School, then transferred to Edgewater High School, where he graduated in 2007. He then graduated from Valencia Community College with an associate’s degree in general studies in 2010 and enlisted in the Air Force three months later.

“I talked to a recruiter and gave him my job preferences,” Simmons said. “Then he called and told me this job was open and it sounded pretty good. I am currently pursuing my

bachelor’s degree through the American Military University, where 100 percent of my tuition costs are paid. That is one of the reasons I wanted to enlist, to continue my education and not have a big school bill.”

His mother, Karen Simmons, stepfather, Gregory Parker, and siblings still live in Apopka. His sister, Megan Simmons, 22, is out of school and twins Alex and Amya, 14, are students at Piedmont Lakes Middle School looking forward to attending Wekiva High School next year.

While in the military, Simmons met his fiancé, Sr. Airman Noremil Rodriguez, who is in the same squadron. The couple is currently planning a June wedding in Lake Mary.

“I am grateful for all the opportunities given by the Air Force,” Simmons said. “For the past six months, I have lived in Italy and have traveled all around Europe and seen a lot of things that a lot of people don’t

get to see. It has given me a lot of different perspectives and has been a life filled with camaraderie. It has been like having a second family and given me a big sense of accomplishment. All the benefits – traveling, education and more – I don’t think you can get them anywhere else and highly recommend it to anyone considering the military.”

Although Simmons has served two-and-a-half years, he still has three-and-a-half years left of his commitment. He said whether he will continue on in the Air Force as a career or return to civilian life is a decision he and his future wife will make in time. He looks forward to returning to Central Florida for his wedding.

“I am so grateful for the support of the Apopka community,” he said.

First Birdapalooza will be held March 9

The first Lake Apopka Wildlife Festival & Birdapalooza will offer free 90-minute guided bus tours of the 20,000-acre North Shore Restoration Area, home to the richest diversity of avian species of any inland location in Florida, on Saturday, March 9, from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. at Magnolia Park, 2929 S. Binion Road, Apopka.

The festival, organized by Orange County Parks and Recreation, the Orange Audubon Society (OAS) and the St. Johns River Water Management District, (SJRWMD) also will feature free entertainment, wildlife exhibitions, and vendors who special-

ize in outdoor-recreation gear. Food will be sold by vendors.

“The Birdapalooza will offer birding tours of the North Shore Restoration Area of Lake Apopka,” said Orange County Commissioner Fred Brummer. “This is our effort to begin the process of ecotourism in Orange County.”

In the past, the North Shore has had the highest inland bird count in the entire continental U.S., making it a prime destination to see a variety of birds, some of which are rare. More than 360 individual species of birds have been identified at the restoration area, designated as a

Globally Important Bird Area by the American Bird Conservancy. Lake Apopka also has been designated as one of Florida’s Special Places by Audubon Florida.

“Bring binoculars if you have them,” said Apopka City Commissioner Joe Kilsheimer. “Among the many species of birds that can be regularly seen in the Lake Apopka Restoration Area are bald eagles, ospreys, great blue herons, snowy egrets, sandhill cranes and red-tailed hawks. Seasonal species that visit the area include the peregrine falcon – the fastest animal on the planet – swallow-tailed kites and northern harrier hawks.”

Apopka Fair set for March 7-10

Organized by the Rotary Club of Apopka and the city of Apopka, the Apopka Fair has grown into a once-during-the-year distinctively unique Apopka event, which was and remains the purpose. Every year, the fair takes its place as an important component of the event calendar in Apopka.

This year’s fair, the 12th annual, is scheduled for the weekend of Thursday, March 7, through Sunday, March 10, at Kit Land Nelson Park and Edwards Field, located on Park Avenue between First and Orange streets. It is being sponsored by Lake Apopka Natural Gas, Florida Hospital, Waste Management, and *The Apopka Chief*.

Over the last few years, that essence has become more expansive as more activities and pieces have become a part of the fair, in particular, musical and performing-arts type entertainment. However, the 12th edition will see a return to what was the essence of its earlier editions with a shift to concentrating heavily on family-friendly activities.

“The challenge has always been to make the fair fun for the family while making the activities distinctive,” said Chris DeClue, Rotary’s advertising director of the fair. “Over the years, we have done enough activities and focused on enough different formats to know what works and what doesn’t. For the most part, we felt it was best to think and get outside of the box of entertainment this year. We have had some success with the entertainment over the last few years.

“But what has always been successful all the time is the family-friendly activities. That is because what makes the area unique is it being conducive to raising children and to growing family themes. Also, in general, no event can remain the same. Every event has to change with the times. It was time to make them after 12 years.

“When we reached the 10th year of the fair, the goal was to focus its growth on being more kid-friendly,” DeClue said. “It grew tremendously during the first decade of its existence, but Apopka’s way of life is centered on the family and its values are

family-based. So if the fair is supposed to represent Apopka, we wanted the family themes to be what drives it. We are just continuing it this year.

“We think we have incorporated the need to keep changing to stay with the times while maintaining the Apopka uniqueness being put on display. We also think the activities can be something huge for this city in the future, because they are for the kids and enjoyable for the whole family to be involved with.”

At the top of lists of new activities and the organizational direction is the Pinewood Derby and Blast Car Races, which are scheduled for Saturday. The races are being hosted by Cub Scout Pack 924.

The Toddler Play Zone will also be a new addition to this year’s fair. It will be open on Saturday and Sunday and will consist of a variety of bounce houses. Games will also be available for the children to play. That area will be for children age 7 and under.

One of the areas that will return is the YesZone as it will still be a part of the fair. YESZone stands for Young Entrepreneur Spirit Zone. It is an opportunity for young adults to experience entrepreneurship.

There will be a maximum number of 20 booths accepted and the 2013 YESZone will be held Saturday from 10 a.m.-4 p.m. Participants must be between 6 and 18 years of age, and will have an opportunity to showcase their business, goods, or service. Booth applications will be accepted based on a variety of criteria including creativity, business potential, and thoroughness. The application deadline is today, Friday, February 15. Participants will receive a YESZone T-shirt to wear the day of the event.

Fair attendees can also see and purchase food from more than 15 of Central Florida’s most sought-after food trucks on Thursday as the Food Truck Roundup takes place. It is for that day only though.

The opening ceremonies will still take place, but it will not be held on Saturday as it has in the past. Instead it will take place Thursday at 5 p.m. as the fair opens with Mayor John H. Land

tentatively scheduled to participate.

The sounds, smell and shining chrome of automobiles will also return as a further expression of the purpose of the fair as the 12th anniversary antique, classic and special interest car show will take place on Saturday.

Other stalwarts of the fair returning are the Apopka police department’s K-9 unit presentation, ice cream eating contests (Saturday) and, of course, various food as well as merchandise vendors. They will be selling and promoting their wares.

And then once again as a part of the tried-and-true formula which gives the Apopka Fair its special flavor, there are the rides and games, the most familiar attractions of any fair. Paradise Amusements will once again provide the midway and will set prices for the rides.

“We also wanted to go in this direction, because of the Old Florida Outdoor Festival,” DeClue said. “They have a lot of good entertainment, which makes it easier for us to decide on the direction we have.

“In general, as I have said in the past and again, we want the fair to be the chance for the families of the area and those who embrace living in the area to enjoy that culture. The parents and children have the opportunity to enjoy the passing down of those values.”

Family Night will once again be held on Thursday. Arm-bands for unlimited rides will be sold for \$15.

charged into the Little Wekiva River.

“By reducing nutrients to the Little Wekiva and Wekiva rivers, this project should ultimately help to better protect Wekiwa Springs,” said DEP Secretary Herschel T. Vinyard Jr. “DEP continues to focus on tangible projects that are protective of the environment, both in terms of water quality and water quantity.”

“This is a great example of intergovernmental cooperation,” said Hans G. Tanzler III, wa-

ter district executive director. “We have two local governments and three government agencies working together on a project that reduces water use in the springshed and provides springs protection by reducing the loading of nutrients.”

FDOT will provide \$4.5 million of the total funding, the water district \$3.5 million, Altamonte Springs \$3 million, and DEP \$1.5 million to the project that combines water quality and water quantity benefits. The city of Apopka will make improvements in its system to store and use the water received from the project.

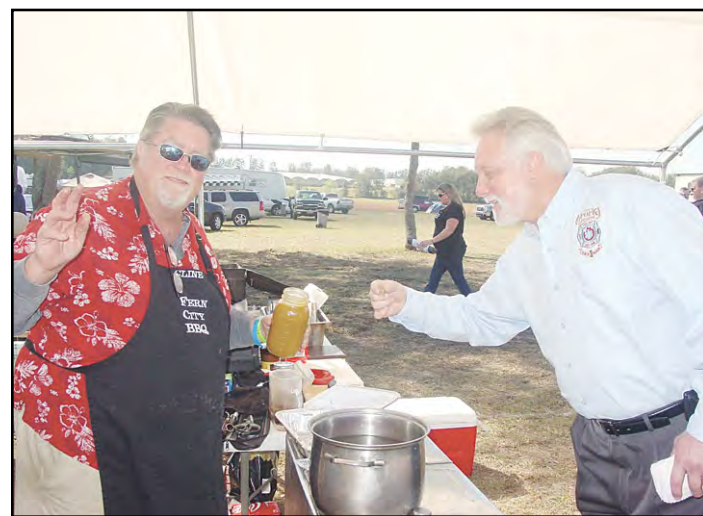

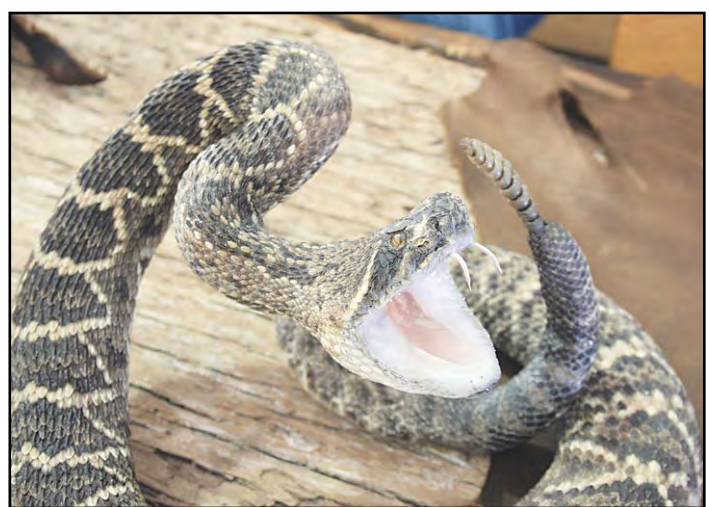

Darters break late-game tie to win district over Mustangs

With Wekiva seeking its first district title in boys basketball in the school's six years and Apopka looking for its first after a long dry spell of 34 years, the match-up between the hometown rivals figured to be a close one since the teams had split a pair of games during the regular season.

The game would not disappoint in terms of excitement, as the Blue Darters broke a tie in the final minute to defeat the Mustangs, 47-43.

"It was just a grind, but we battled back," said Apopka coach Matt Ruta, who grabbed his 100th career victory with the win. "We knew it was going to be difficult, but I am so proud of the guys."

Over the final few minutes of the game, it was difficult for both teams, as the scoring pace became very deliberate. Jabari Grant hit the final field goal of the game for either team when he scored on an offensive put-back

with 2:17 remaining in the fourth period to give the Mustangs a 42-40 lead.

Apopka's Joe Chealey canned a pair of free throws just 12 seconds later to tie the game at 42-42.

With both teams trying to make plays down the stretch, each was called for an offensive foul and it wasn't until Chealey again stepped to the free throw line - this time with just 37.3 seconds remaining - that the tie was broken. The senior nailed two foul shots to give the Darters a 44-42 lead.

The Mustangs (14-12) then got off a good shot, as Ruben Monroe's 15-foot jumper went partially down the cylinder, but twisted out. Apopka's Haleem Brown grabbed the rebound and was fouled. He swished both free throws to give the Darters (23-3) a 46-42 lead with 16.2 seconds remaining.

Josh Filmore, fouled driving to the bucket with 11.1 seconds, hit one of two free throws to pull the Mus-

Diversity effort makes strides

NASCAR's Drive for Diversity program gained some traction last week with the announcements that two of its former participants will be racing full-time this season in the higher levels of NASCAR.

Kyle Larson, who is of Japanese descent, is set to run the full Nationwide Series in a car prepared by Turner Motorsports with veteran crew chief Trent Owens leading the team. Larson is under contract to Sprint Cup car owner Chip Ganassi, who helped put the Nationwide deal together.

And Darrell Wallace Jr., one of only a few black drivers in the sport, will race the full season in the Camping World Truck Series for Kyle Busch Motorsports while also running some Nationwide Series races for Joe Gibbs Racing.

Both drivers appear to be getting career breaks not only because they're fast on the race track and part of the diversity program, but because they're handling themselves well on and off the track, as Ganassi pointed out on a NASCAR teleconference last week.

"You look to his parents, what kind of people they are, what kind of upbringing he had," Ganassi said. "Is he stable in his thought? That usually comes from a stable household."

"You really want guys that understand the sport, that have been in the sport for a long time, not looking for a piece of Hollywood, not looking to be on TMZ at night, just guys that respect the sport and appreciate it and come from a good, solid background with their family."

Team owner Joe Gibbs said in a team release that he has high hopes for Wallace.

"This is exciting for Darrell, for Joe Gibbs Racing and really for NASCAR, I believe," Gibbs said. "NASCAR has made tremendous progress through their diversity program, and we started our diversity program 10 years ago with Reggie White in hopes of providing opportunities to drivers we think have the ability to grow in our sport ... We have a great deal of confidence in Darrell, and this is a big step in his career."

Wallace, 19, worked his way up through NASCAR's developmental circuit, the K&N Pro Series, where he became the K&N circuit's youngest and first African-American to win a race, at Greenville-Pickens [S.C.] Speedway in 2010, along with winning rookie of the year. Last year, he ran four Nationwide Series races and recorded three top-10 finishes and a pole, at Dover International Raceway.

Larson, 19, won the 2012 K&N Pro Series East championship in his rookie season in that division, and also made four Truck Series starts last year. He finished second at Phoenix after leading 43 laps, and led 48 laps at Homestead before wrecking with Ty Dillon. He finished 10th in his series debut at Kentucky Speedway and was sixth in his second start, at Atlanta Motor Speedway.

NASCAR to curb start-and-park

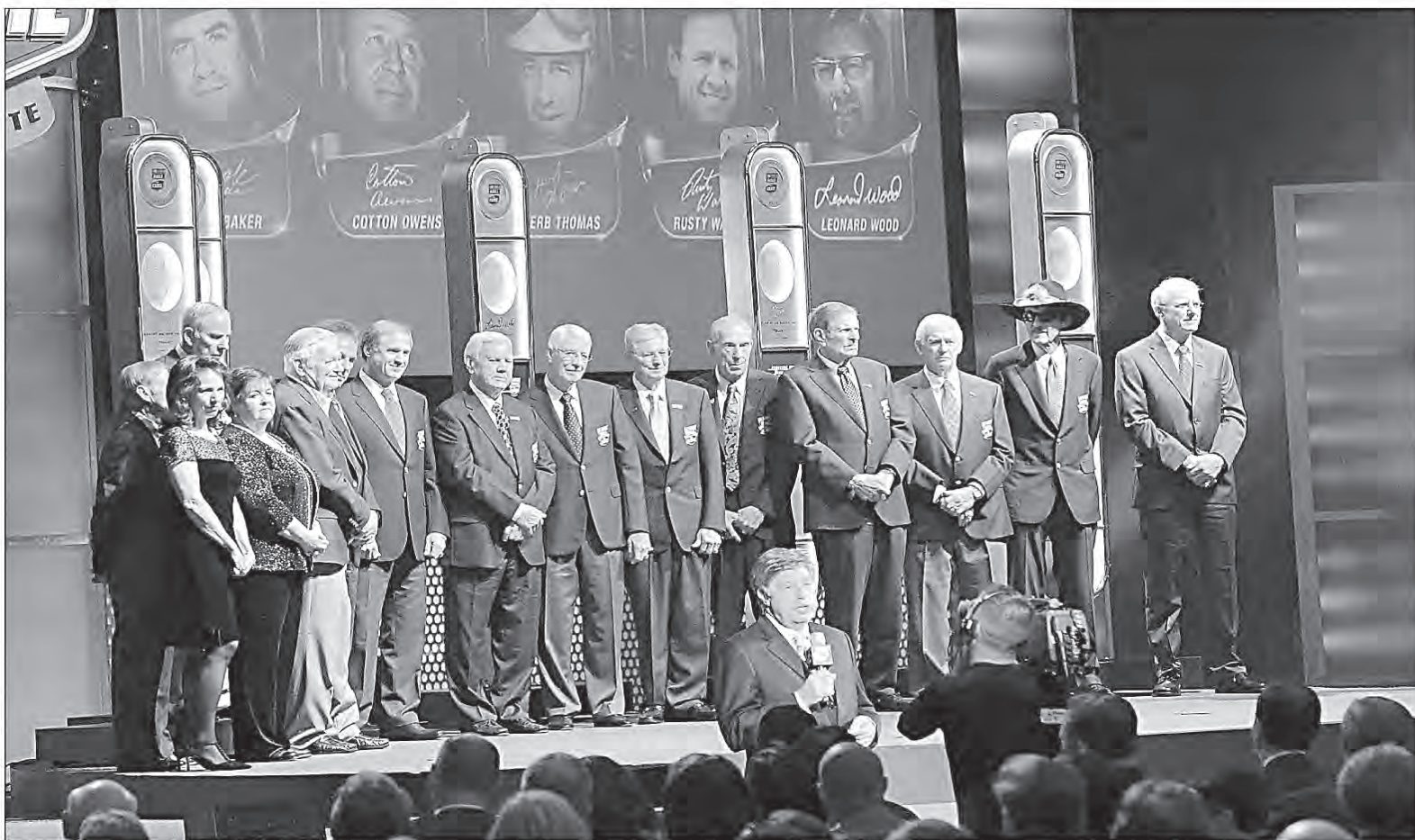
The practice of starting and quickly parking a car in NASCAR races won't be as lucrative this year as it has been in the past. Series officials have whacked money off the bottom positions in the finishing order and moved that money up to mid-pack.

NASCAR president Mike Helton said the change, which is estimated to be about \$4,000 per position, is NASCAR's way of trying to reward struggling teams that are trying to gain a foothold in the sport while penalizing those who are only there to collect some cash.

"We're moving the money to kind of reward owners like Tommy Baldwin and Frankie Stoddard and David Stremme's Swan Racing group," he said. "It's not a lot of money, but it's a starting point."

Helton added that if the blatant starting and parking continues, more changes could be in the offing.

"It's kind of a soft move now, but if it doesn't work we can take more off the bottom and move it up," he said.

Class ties

Hall of Fame night highlights racing's bonds

The induction ceremony for the NASCAR Hall of Fame, the latest of which was held last Friday night in Charlotte, N.C., is a formal affair, but not so stiff that it becomes uncomfortable to the inductees and guests in attendance.

In many ways, it has the feel of a reunion, a time for old-timers and a younger generation to gather and share stories from a bygone era.

The four Hall of Fame induction ceremonies held to date have provided opportunities for people who were once fierce competitors on the track to put aside any old animosities or rivalries and come together as members of the community that is NASCAR.

"The really cool thing about the Hall of Fame is ... every time they have one of these it fixes so many things," said Eddie Wood, who stood on stage last Friday night and inducted his uncle Leonard Wood. "It fixes relationships, and it gives people a chance to say things that they normally wouldn't say, wouldn't be brave enough to say. I know I said things I wouldn't be brave enough to say."

He pointed out how David Pearson, who drove for the Wood Brothers team, and Richard Petty, his chief rival in the 1960s and '70s, both used their Hall inductions to praise each other.

"Pearson and Petty got to say ... 'You were the best, no you were the best,' those kind of things," Wood said. "And I think that's what really makes the Hall of Fame special."

For example, Leonard Wood, the longtime chief mechanic and crew chief for the Wood Brothers No. 21 Fords and Mercurys, talked about his main rival back in the day, Dale Inman, who was crew chief for his cousin Richard Petty.

Wood said Inman was "a great team leader, organizer and called the races. He was one of the best there was in calling races. He kept up with everything that was going on ... He was just a great, intelligent person to call races,

knowing when to pit, when to change tires, when not to and all that. He was great at that."

And Wood also made it clear that the Woods and Pettys were more than just competitors on the race track and in the garage.

"Even though we were really rivals ... at the end of the day they're the best friends we've got," he said.

It also was noted during the induction of the late Cotton Owens just how close he was to his one-time driver David Pearson and to a rival car owner, Walter "Bud" Moore.

Owens' grandson Kyle Owens, representing the Owens family, spoke of his grandparents' relationship with Pearson and Moore.

"I can't tell you how much these guys meant to them throughout the years, and especially when their health took a turn for the worse because those guys came by and saw them weekly," Owens said. "It meant so much to Pop."

Herb Thomas' son Joel Thomas relayed a

side of his late father that showed he was much more than a two-time champion whose winning percentage of .211 has never been bettered.

"Before he started racing, dad successfully operated his own sawmill," Thomas said. "Almost 50 years later, he was excited to teach me how to run it. When dad finally retired from racing in 1962, he returned to the farm where he worked with his family for many years."

"Those were wonderful times. I often rode with him to the market when it was time to sell. When his crops brought top dollar at auction, I could see his satisfaction and contentment."

Buddy Baker, a great racer in his own right and an accomplished broadcaster, talked afterward about how nervous he was going on stage to induct his hero and father, the late two-time NASCAR champion Buck Baker.

"When I started racing he was my hero, and when he passed away he was still my hero," Baker said. "That's pressure. It's so much pressure because you want to do it right and make sure that everybody knows to me he was the champion on the race track, he was the champion in life."

Rusty Wallace, the youngest of the inductees and someone who is rarely fazed, was obviously emotional as he walked on stage. And for someone who was known for his brashness for most of his career, he seemed quite humbled.

"I look out in this crowd and I see some of the biggest stars in history. I look at Robert Yates, one of the best engine builders in the world, Ricky Rudd, Jack Roush, Michael Waltrip, big winner at Daytona, Darrell [Waltrip], everybody," he said. "I am humbled that I've made it here. I'm humbled that I'm standing up here, and I can't thank everybody enough for selecting me to be in the Hall of Fame."

All eyes on Gen 6 cars as competitive debut nears

With NASCAR's Sprint Cup Series set to kick off the 2013 campaign this weekend at Daytona International Speedway with the non-points Sprint Unlimited on Saturday night followed by pole qualifying for the Daytona 500 on Sunday, much of the focus will be on the new Generation 6 race car, which makes its first appearance in a competitive environment.

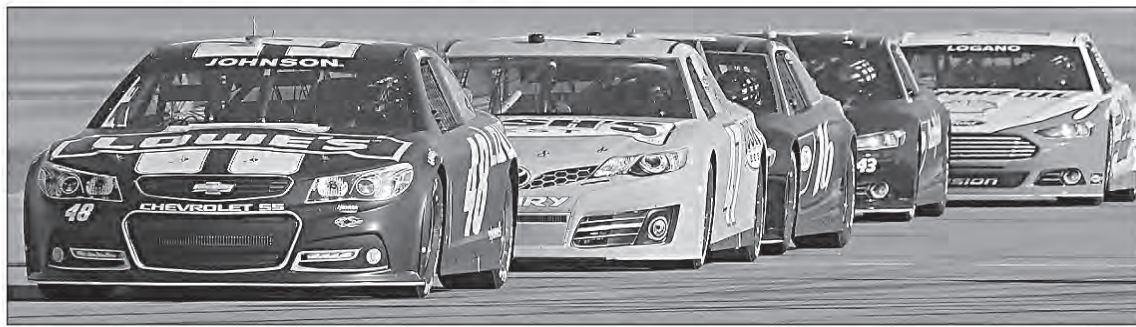
NASCAR president Mike Helton will be watching as closely as anyone, because he's the one who will be responsible for making adjustments if one manufacturer winds up with a significant advantage over its competitors.

The new cars are built to more closely resemble the showroom versions they represent, so Fords, Chevrolets and Toyotas all have different shapes. NASCAR has made every effort to ensure that all cars, while having different characteristics, are equal aerodynamically, but the true test won't come until there are points and money on the line.

Helton said that going into Speedweeks at Daytona, he believes the three manufacturers' products are close aerodynamically.

"We gave the manufacturers the aero numbers to match up to and asked them to design a car that would do that," he said. "In today's world, we can use a lot of science and technology to go into the design of these cars from a competition aspect. Hopefully we've done that correctly, but with the uniqueness of the shapes of these things, we could get back to the days where we have to adjust spoilers or something, but we don't think so."

In an earlier era, it was almost a weekly occurrence to see representatives of race teams and

manufacturers trekking to the NASCAR hauler in the garage to plead with Helton and other officials for rules tweaks to help them overcome disadvantages. Those disadvantages, both real and perceived, also were discussed and debated in many a water-cooler conversation across the NASCAR nation.

Helton said that the return of that kind of debate wouldn't necessarily be a bad thing.

"The design of the cars and matching up to the showroom cars represents a bit of a throwback of its own, so going back to arguing over who's got the best aero package and who's got the best horsepower is part of the rivalry of our sport," he said. "That's something we've got experience with. It's not the worst thing."

Helton also said he'll be watching closely when the Gen-6 car makes its first competitive appearance on an intermediate-length track, at Las

Vegas Motor Speedway on March 10.

"We want the intermediate-track racing to get better," he said. "We'd like to figure out how to keep the guy from getting out by himself and just running away from everybody."

But he believes another unpopular kind of racing, one involving the two-car tandems that dominated recent races at Daytona and Talladega Superspeedway, is a thing of the past with the new car. "I think it's gone," Helton said. "... What we've seen so far - and what the garage area thinks - is that it doesn't work any more."

Helton said the risks involved in tandem racing now far exceed the potential reward.

"In testing, we saw two cars hooking up, and one car by itself could run as fast as they could," he said. "And drivers in the tandem have to rely even more on each other's talent than they did in the past."

Hopefully, game is first of many to come

Having the Apopka and Wekiva boys basketball teams play for the District 8A-3 championship is a game I have been looking forward to since Wekiva's doors opened in 2007.

I knew it would likely take a while for the game to be played, but hopefully, this game will be the first of many throughout the years.

The game was a close one with each team taking charge at one point or another.

Early on, it looked like the Blue Darters were in charge, as they went on a 13-2 run in the first quarter, taking an 18-10 lead with about a minute left in the first. However, that changed pretty quickly, as the Mustangs went to a press and slowed Apopka down big time. After the Blue Darters scored 18 first-period points, the Mustangs held Apopka to just one Joe Chealey bucket midway through the second.

Wekiva, meanwhile, was just chugging along, scoring another 10 points to tie the game at 20-20 at halftime.

Coming into the game, I thought the pace of the game would determine the winner, and it did...sort of.

Apopka wants to play at a much-higher pace than does Wekiva. The Darters play tough defense, but they are always looking to take the first good shot, and they like to run, especially off turnovers created by their offense.

Wekiva looks to play a

much more deliberate game. The Mustangs generally do best when the game is in the 40s. Had the game gotten into the upper 50s, Apopka would have won handily.

As it turned out, the Darters controlled the pace early and late, while the Mustangs took hold in the middle quarters. That's how you get a four-point game with the winner being in the upper 40s, and why it was a tie game at 42-42 into the final minute.

To me, the key during the final minute was that Apopka was able to get to the free throw line by being aggressive on the offensive end and then securing the rebounds defensively.

Add to that the fact that Ruben Monroe's jumper from about 15 feet went partially down the cylinder but popped out. That came after Chealey hit a pair of free throws to give Apopka a two-point lead in the final 30 seconds. Halceem Brown pulled down the rebound after Monroe's shot rimmed out. He also sank two foul shots to give Apopka a four-point lead with less than

20 seconds remaining and that all but assured the Darters of the victory.

As you would expect, the game was a pretty intense one. Yes, it would have been a battle for the district title, no matter which teams had been playing, but there was a little extra edge between these hometown rivals.

The players from these teams know each other well and the coaches respect each other, as both run solid programs on and off the court.

Wekiva's Scott Williams and Apopka's Matt Ruta know how to get the most out of their players, cajoling at times and encouraging at times. But, they also teach respect for their opponents.

More than one time during the district title game, I saw players from one team reach down to help up one of his opponents during a break in play.

There are many ways to show respect for an opponent, but that is certainly one of them.

This rivalry is at a great level in boys basketball. Both teams are outstanding, the players know and respect each other, and the coaches know they can expect the best out of the other.

Hopefully, they'll have a fourth meeting on Tuesday, February 19, at 7 p.m. in a regional semifinal playoff game. If they do, it will be at Apopka due to the Darters winning the district championship.

The regional quarterfinal contests were played Thursday, February 14, past press time.

It's very unfortunate it worked out that way, but I am hoping both teams won, although that won't be easy.

Apopka hosted Dr. Phillips, a team that has won at least 20 games over the past 19 seasons. A win over the Blue Darters would give the Panthers 20 straight seasons of at least 20 victories. That's pretty impressive in high school basketball.

Wekiva, meanwhile, had to hit the road to play at Boone, a team that defeated the Mustangs by 16 on Wekiva's Senior Night.

Our weather has been picture-perfect

Hello Folks,

I hope you don't mind me commentin' on the weather, but to live in Florida and have the weather we have been havin' is great. Other parts of the country, especially the northeast, are havin' a cold winter. Here in Florida, we have picture-perfect weather, especially if you like to fish.

The only thing we need is some rain. Hopefully this week, we will get some and fill our lakes back up. We are about three inches behind in rain for the year, and you can tell it when you are on the water. It has been a little windy for fishin', but the folks who are gettin' on the water have been doin' great. The folks who are goin' fishin' are catchin' limits of specks in most of the lakes in our area.

Captain Joe reports folks in his area are catchin' some real nice specks in the Harris Chain and in Norris Dead River. The specks are movin' towards the shoreline to spawn and folks are catchin' limits of specks in Dead River and Haines Creek in the Harris Chain. Folks are catchin' some nice specks around the pads and the cattails.

Folks are catchin' some specks in the Apopka-Beauclair Canal, too. Most of the

specks are bein' caught on jigs tipped with a minner. You can also catch some nice specks fishin' with minners on just a gold hook. If you like to fish with jigs, make sure you use a bright colored jig like pink, chartreuse, and orange. Lake Carlton, and Lake Griffin have been really good lakes to fish for specks, too.

Up on the St. Johns River, folks are doin' real good in Lake Dexter and Lake Woodruff. You will find the specks in 3 ft. to 4 ft. of water or shallower the closer we get to the full moon. The full moon is on February 25, so between now and the three days after the full moon, the fishin' should be fantastic.

The speck fishin' on Lake Monore is still doin' good, but it was pretty windy over the weekend, so a lot of folks fished in the main river. The specks will be around the is-

lands in the river in the pads. You can get out of the wind, too.

The bass fishin' is startin' to pick up in most of the lakes in our area. The bass will start movin' in to spawn as well, and you can catch some nice bass on shiners and plastic worms. If you want to catch a big bass, try fishin' with shiners in the mouth of the canals, and just off the shoreline cover.

I was fishin' on the Butler Chain over the weekend and I saw plenty of beds in shallow water. We caught 14 bass up to 4 lbs. each on plastic worms, and lizards. We caught a lot of small bass and buck bass along the shoreline. The bucks are movin' into shallow water to fan the beds for the females. If you do catch a nice female and she is in the process of spawnin' and her belly is full of roe, please release her back in the water so she can finish spawnin'. We want to insure that the bass fishin' will be good in years to come for our kids and grandkids.

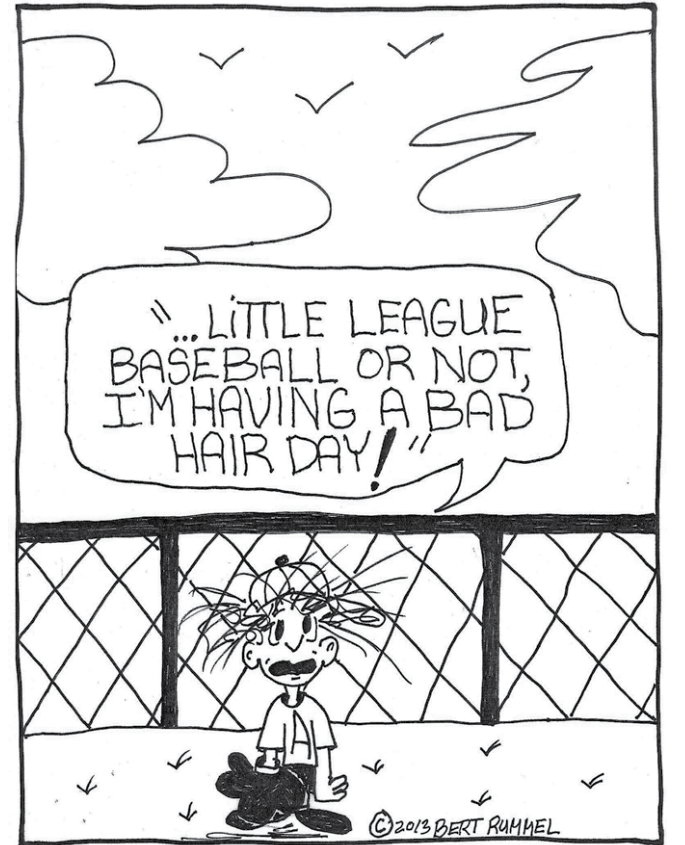
You know sometimes when you are bass fishin', you always try to remind yourself to retie your line after you catch a big fish or a lot of little ones. I always want to make sure I don't miss a fish due to something I could have prevented. Well, an angler friend

of mine who works at the paper, whose initials are JR, was fishin' on the Butler Chain over the weekend, too. JR lost a big bass that would go over 9 lbs. That fish could have won the tournament for him and his partner. But, JR didn't lose the big bass due to not retyn' his line, or that his line broke, or the rod broke, or the reel malfunctioned. JR lost his fish because he was usin' an old net to land his bass. The story is told that when Mrs. Bass jumped and was headed for the net, she went in the net and out of the net. Yes, that's right, she went right out the bottom of the net and back in the water. The net had been used for years, and had landed a lot of bass, but it was never checked to see if it was in good condition or not. So, the moral of the story is to always check your equipment, includin' your landin' net, so you don't have to explain how the big one got away.

Well, folks, the fishin' is great and folks are catchin' plenty of specks and some real nice bass. If the weather stays like it has been 'til the end of the month, this will be the prime time to go fishin'.

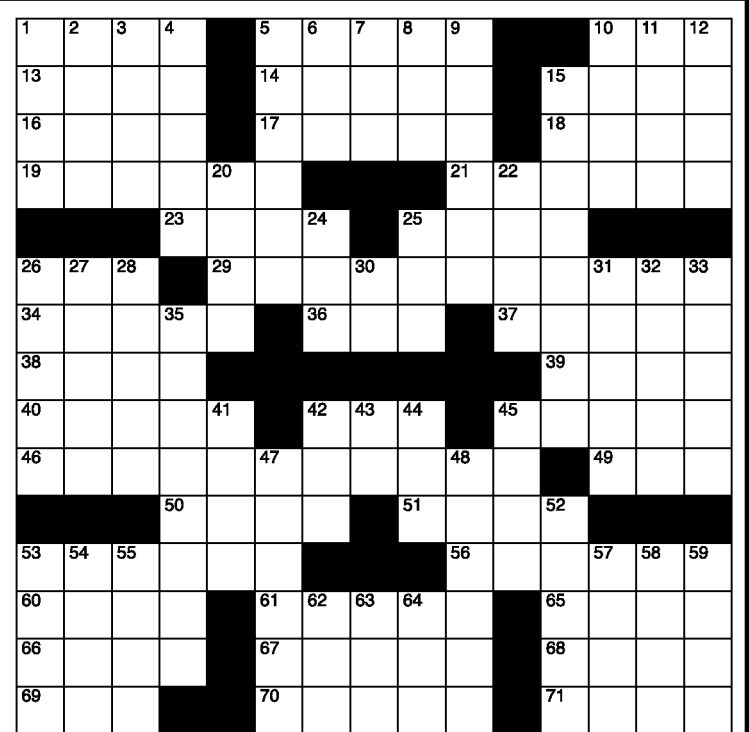

AHS girls basketball coach resigns after nine years leading team

With the end of the 2012-2013 season, the Apopka Blue Darters girls basketball team has also reached the end of an era as the time for a change has come.

Head coach Miriam Jenkins resigned following Apopka's loss to West Orange in the semifinal round of the Class 8A-District 3 championship tournament. After nine years at the helm of the program, she cited, along with her long-time assistant Dementia Richard, it was simply that the time had come for them to move on and pursue other interests. They will continue to teach at the high school.

"As much as we love basketball and coaching, other aspects of life are important, too," Jenkins said. "We just felt after nine years, the time for us to move into the next stage of our lives had come."

Jenkins' first year with the program was 2003-04 and she was its top assistant coach.

Led by Ophelia McMath, Carmen Jones, and Shannon Revolinski, the 2003-04 team claimed the district title, but the season ended with a loss to Oviedo in the regional quarterfinals of the FHSAA postseason tournament.

The next year, Jenkins was named the head coach of the program.

"My goal when I was hired by the high school was to teach and be an assistant coach for the Lady Darters," Jenkins said.

She leaves the girls basketball program with a state final four appearance, one district championship and three berths in the regional rounds of the FHSAA postseason tournament. In 2008, led by Brittany Hardy, Kourtne Berry and Kimberlyn Martin, the Blue Darters advanced to the state final four as it won its three regional rounds games by a combined total of 11 points.

The team finished the regular season with a notable and viable record of 16-9. However, all of its losses were to teams with better records, including then district rival and state power Edgewater.

The team's loss to the Eagles left them in second place in the final regular season district standings. The Blue Darters then lost to Edgewater in the district championship final.

As the district runner-up, Apopka had to play all of its games on the road. However, it defeated Osceola in the regional quarterfinals to set up a rematch with Edgewater.

This time, the Blue Darters made the plays during the final minutes to pull off the upset and right the wrong of its previous two games against the Eagles by a score of 49-45.

In an exciting, dramatic

game which came down to the final second, Sarasota Booker was the next victim as it fell by a margin of 48-47. Apopka led only once and took it with 34 seconds left in the game.

"That team had heart and desire beyond anything I have ever experienced as a head coach," Jenkins said. "We made it to the state championship tournament (the final four). We eventually fell to South Broward (the state champion)." But the love we received from the community was unmatched. It was one of the best experiences I have felt as a coach. Five of the players on that team continue to play college basketball today."

But perhaps Jenkins and Richard's finest coaching job was two years later. With everyone who played a significant role on the final four team graduating, the Blue Darters won their only district championship under Jenkins' guidance.

Once again, the team placed second in the regular district final standings. This time, Dr. Phillips earned the number one seed by finishing first in the district standings. And once again, the difference was their regular season meeting. Undefeated, Dr. Phillips was ranked number one in the state.

Forging an 8-2 run at the beginning of the final period, it was the difference in a low-

scoring physical, grind-it-out game, especially inside the paint. The final score was 42-37 in favor of the Blue Darters.

That game came on the heels of a buzzer-beating 15-foot jumper from Shanequa Shrouder against Olympia to win the semifinal match-up.

Apopka defeated Gateway in the regional quarterfinals at home, and that victory set up a rematch with the Panthers. Meeting for the third time, the Darters fell to the eventual final four participant in the regional semifinals by a 47-41 score.

"When we returned as district champions and defeated Dr. Phillips, it was Shanequa's leadership on the floor which

made it possible," Jenkins said.

It has also been important to Jenkins that the majority of Blue Darters who have passed through the program, at one point or another, returned to help guide other teams.

"Brittany Hardy and Kristina Kemp worked very hard with my 2012-2013 team," Jenkins said. "All the former Apopka players have great pride in this program and wish to see it have continued success."

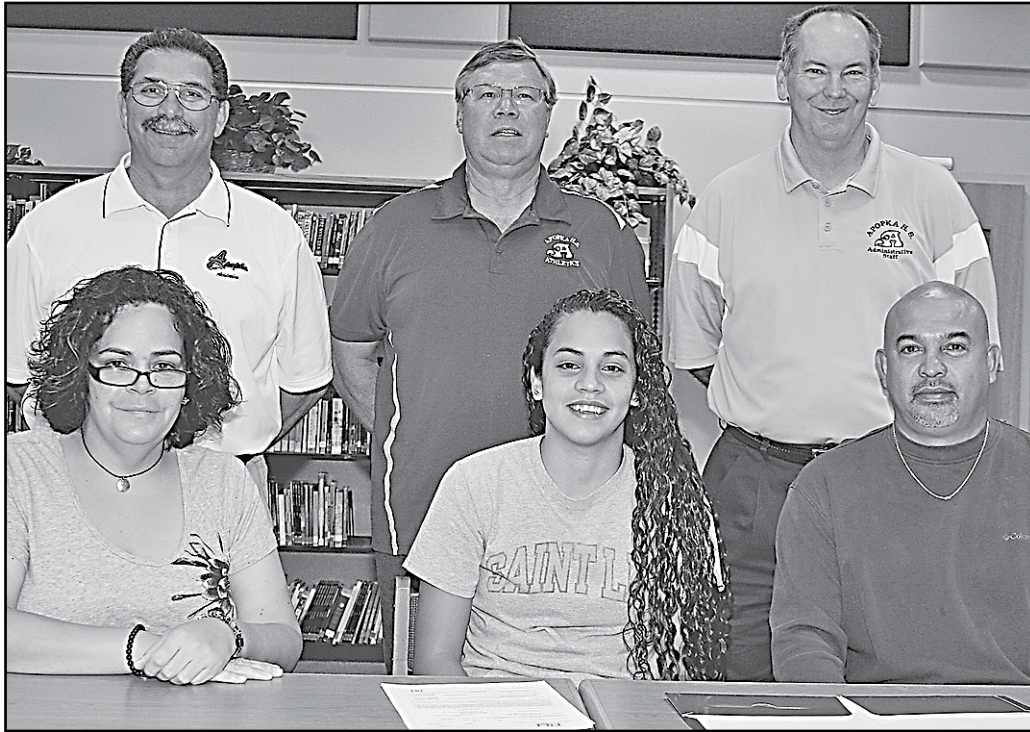
Under Jenkins and Richard, 37 players have earned their high school diploma from Apopka High School through the girls basketball program. Fourteen have received bas-

ketball scholarships to play for higher education institutions.

Jenkins' final record as the Darters head coach is 129-93. During the first six years of Jenkins tenure, Apopka never earned a seed below third for the district championship tournament in a district with at least seven teams as the overall record was over .600. Unfortunately for Jenkins, as successful as the first six years were, the last three season records were under .500 and Apopka lost its first game of the district championship tournament.

A native of Alaska, Jenkins played college basketball and began her coaching career in Oregon.

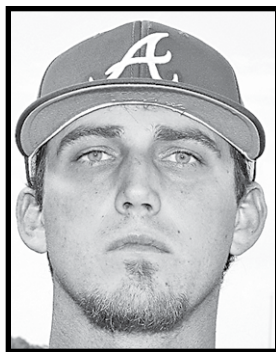
As the low score would indicate, it was a pitcher's duel, even after Apopka starter Craig Savage and Hag-

showcasing one of many Apopkans' and all America's favorite foods. The cookbook is one of the Apopka Historical Society's many projects promoting and benefitting the Apopka community.

Before creating this cookbook, the historical society published an earlier excellent book, **History of Apopka and Northwest Orange County**. It is available for purchase at the Museum of the Apopkans in downtown Apopka.

Enjoy this week's recipes below from **Preserving the Big Potato** and stop by your local historical museum very soon for a glance at and perhaps purchase of these books as well as a tour of all the intriguing artifacts on display there. The museum enables a nostalgic look back over our shoulders into Apopka's extremely interesting historical heritage, an opportunity no current resident should let go unvisited.

Thanks, Apopka Historical Society members, for providing all the diverse and delicious potato recipes in your cookbook as well as for all your often difficult and never-ending work of preserving and showcasing this city's and citizens' greatest treasure, which is its historical past on which today's Apopka and future Apopka were founded.

Potato recipes certainly seem a handy collection to have on hand in a city whose name was inspired by and translates, in this geographical area's indigenous early inhabitants' dialect, as "Big Potato". That original bearer of the name "Big Potato" is better known these days as mega-large Lake Apopka.

Enjoy the diversity and deliciousness of the Historical Society cookbook's recipes included here in this week's *Kitchen Kapers* and all the many other great potato recipes packed into the Apopka Historical Society's **Preserving the Big Potato**.

Potatoes and local history: It's a tasty combination plate!

EASY "BIG POTATO" SOUP

- 1 bag (16-ounces) frozen hash brown potatoes**
- 1 (14-1/2 ounce) can ready-to-serve chicken broth**
- 1 (10-3/4 ounce) can cream of celery**

- soup, undiluted**
- 1 (10-3/4 ounce can) cream of chicken soup**
- 1 cup chopped onion**
- 2 cups water**
- 2 cups milk**
- Optional garnishes: shredded cheese, diced ham or bacon**

Combine potatoes, chopped onion, chicken broth and water in a Dutch oven. Bring to a boil. Cover, reduce heat and simmer for 30 minutes. Stir in soups and milk. Heat thoroughly. Garnish if you wish. Recipe yields 2-1/2 quarts.

PARTY POTATOES

- 4 cups cooked and mashed potatoes, using 8-10 potatoes**
- 1 cup (8 ounces) sour cream**
- 1 (8-ounce) package cream cheese, softened**
- 1 teaspoon dried chives or 1 tablespoon fresh chives**
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder**
- 1/4 cup dry bread crumbs**
- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine, melted**
- 1/2 cup shredded Cheddar cheese**

Peel and cook potatoes until fork tender. Mash the potatoes. In large bowl, combine mashed potatoes, sour cream, cream cheese, chives and garlic powder. Put into a greased 2-quart casserole. Combine bread crumbs with butter and sprinkle over potatoes. Bake at 350 degrees for 50-60 minutes. Top with cheese and serve immediately. Dish can be assembled a day ahead and baked just before serving. Recipe yields 10-12 servings.

EUGENE SCHLIENGER'S

- EUGENE'S BREAKFAST POTATOES**
- 2-1/2 pounds potatoes, diced**
- 2 ounces roasted garlic and onions, combined**
- 16 ounces white Cheddar cheese, shredded**
- 1 quart heavy cream**
- 1 green onion**
- 1/4 ounce seasoning recipe (recipe follows)**

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Combine the above ingredients in a large bowl and mix well. Spread this mixture evenly on a baking sheet. Bake for 20-25 minutes or until golden brown. Recipe serves eight. Note: For this recipe only, use only 1/4 ounce of the seasoning mixture below, reserving most of the 10 ounces of mixture for future uses. **Seasoning mixture for above recipe:** 1/2 cup kosher salt

- 1/4 cup celery salt**
- 1/4 cup granulated onion**
- 1 teaspoon black pepper**
- 1 teaspoon white sugar**

Combine the five seasoning mixture ingredients well and store in airtight container. This is an all-purpose seasoning mixture which can be used for meats, fish, poultry, soups and stews. Recipe yields ten ounces.

CAROLYN BOOTH'S

- APPETIZER POTATO SKINS**
- 3 medium baking potatoes**
- Vegetable oil**
- Salt**
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese**
- 6 slices bacon, cooked and crumbled**
- Sour cream**

Scrub potatoes and rub skins with oil. Bake at 400 degrees for one hour or until done. Allow potatoes to cool to touch. Cut in half lengthwise and carefully scoop out pulp, leaving 1/4- to 1/8-inch shell. (Save removed potato pulp for other uses.) Cut shells in half crosswise and deep fry in hot oil for two minutes. Drain on paper towels. Place potato skins on baking sheet and sprinkle with salt, cheese and bacon. Place under broiler until cheese melts. Serve potato skins with sour cream.

LINDA LAURENEAU'S

- HERB-ROASTED DIJON POTATOES**
- 1 cup Dijon mustard**
- 2 tablespoons olive oil**
- 1/2 teaspoon Italian seasoning**
- Six to eight potatoes, cut into pieces or quartered**

Mix mustard, oil and seasoning. Place potatoes in a 9- x 13-inch lightly greased baking pan. Toss with mustard mixture and bake at 450 degrees for 35-40 minutes or until potatoes are fork tender. Stir occasionally. Serve.

ALICE BETH MINER'S

- VICHYSOISE (COLD POTATO SOUP)**
- 4 large Spanish onions**
- 2-1/2 cups diced potatoes**
- 1/4 teaspoon paprika**
- 1 cup heavy cream**
- Chopped chives**
- 1 tablespoon butter**
- 2 cups chicken stock**
- 2 cups milk**
- Salt and pepper (amounts to your taste)**

Saute sliced onions in skillet with butter until soft but not brown. Add the potatoes, chicken stock and seasonings. Simmer the soup, covered, for 45 minutes or less. Put

mixture into electric blender or run through a sieve. Chill. Add milk and cream. Serve topped with chives.

ALICE BETH MINER'S SWEDISH BROWNEED POTATOES

- 4 large baking potatoes**
 - 1/2 cup melted butter**
 - Salt (amount to your taste)**
- Thinly peel the potatoes and slice them thinly crosswise, without cutting all the way through, like an accordion or fan. Place potatoes in a shallow baking pan, brush liberally with melted butter and sprinkle with salt. Bake in 325 degree oven, brushing them frequently with the butter or use some of the juices from a roast, if this is being cooked alongside. The potatoes are done when they are tender and when the tops of the accordion pleats are golden brown.

MORNING MIX-UP

- 2 cups frozen hash browns**
- 1 cup chopped fully cooked ham**
- 1/2 cup chopped onion**
- 2 tablespoons cooking oil**
- 6 eggs (Eggbeaters can be used.)**
- Salt and pepper (amounts to your taste)**
- 1 cup (four ounces) shredded Cheddar cheese**
- Minced fresh chives**

In large skillet, sauté potatoes, ham and onion in oil for ten minutes or until potatoes are tender. In a small bowl, beat eggs, salt and pepper. Add to the skillet. Cook, stirring occasionally, until eggs are set. Remove from heat and gently stir in cheese. Spoon the potatoes onto serving platter and sprinkle with chives. Recipe serves four or five.

MARY FRANCES MANCUSO'S GARLIC SMASHED POTATOES

- 6 tablespoons butter**
- 4 cloves garlic, peeled**
- 1-1/2 pounds Idaho potatoes, peeled and cut into eighths**
- 1 cup milk or Half and Half**
- Salt and pepper (amounts to your liking)**

Melt half of the butter in a small sauce pan over low heat. Add garlic cloves. Cover and cook until golden and tender, about 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Transfer mixture to a food processor and puree. Cover potatoes with salt water in a large saucepan and boil on medium-high heat until tender. Drain and mash potatoes with a potato masher or electric mixer. Add the remaining butter and the milk, garlic mixture and seasonings. Beat until light and fluffy and serve warm. Recipe serves four.

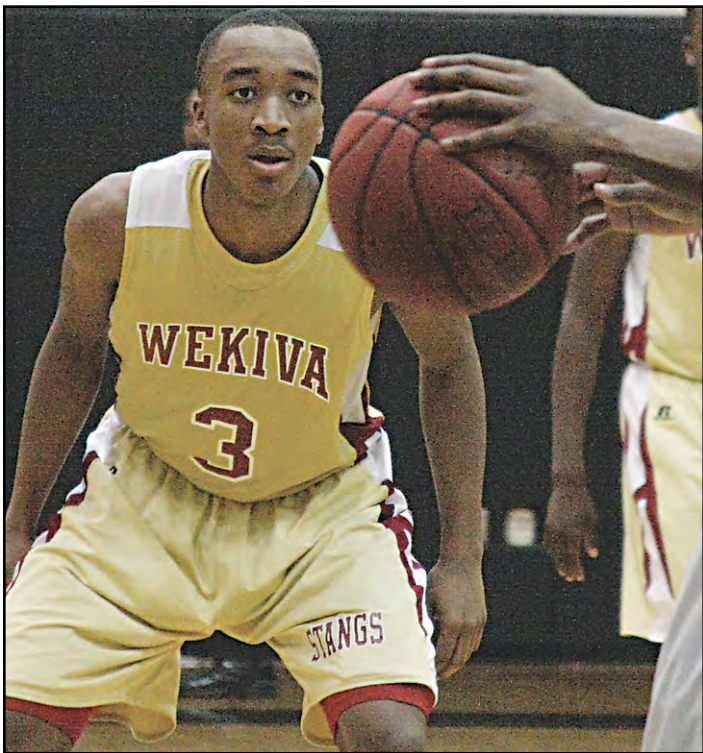

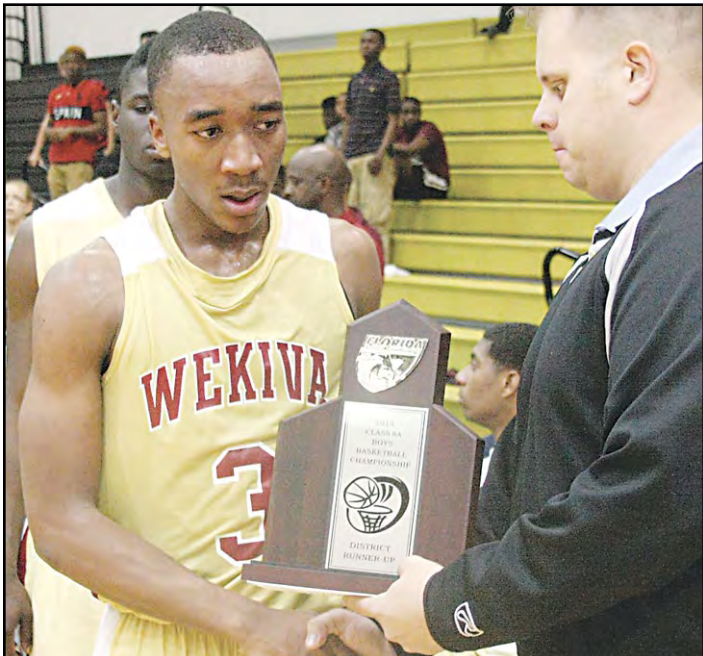

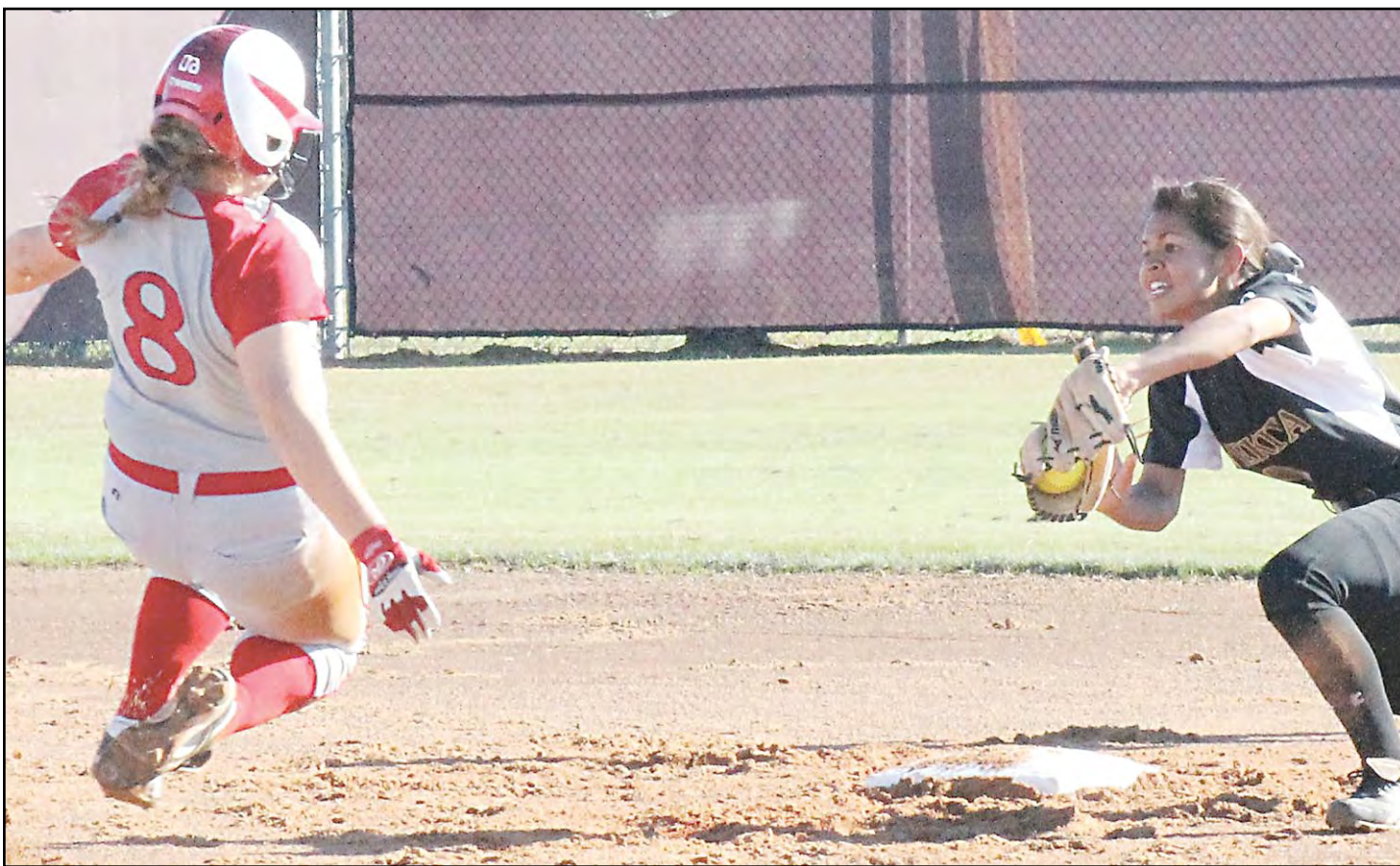

"Both teams competed with honor," Wekiva coach Scott Williams said. "It was a very good basketball game. They were better in the last three minutes of the game."

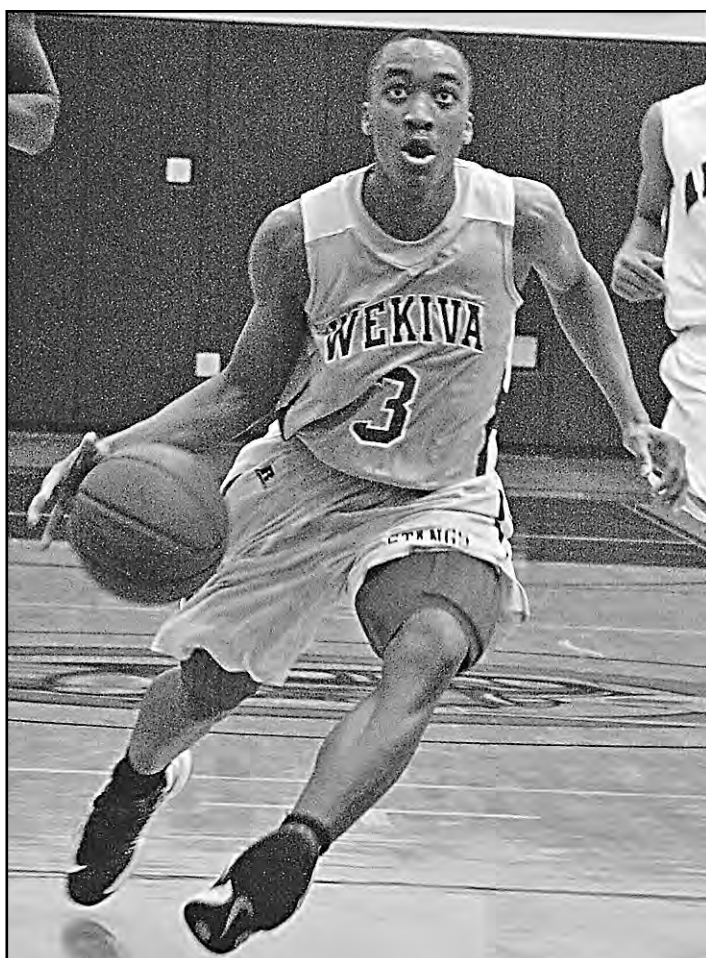
Although the game was tight for most of the contest, each team had its moments where it looked like it might take control.

soming during this, her senior season, as she went from on the border of placing among the state's best to number one on the form chart. She capped off her high school weightlifting career by making good on the long-awaited achievement. The championship is the second such for the program. Niaja Griffin was a three-time state champion.

She hoisted 125 pounds on the bench press and another 140 in the clean-and-jerk. The combined total of 265 pounds was 10 more than second and third places. Kaylie Manchester and Brittany Bentzoni totals were 255 pounds. By virtue of a lighter body weight, Manchester took second.

First through sixth place earn team points. Seven points are added to the team total for claiming the weight class championship. The total for second is five points. Each place after that is one less point.

The two other points were accumulated by Shania Irvin and Regina Nestor.

Competing in the 139-pound weight division, Irvin hoisted a total of 320 pounds. She also tied, but lost out to Michelle Atherly of Port Charlotte for fifth place. The two lifters' total was 15 pounds more than the next highest amount (seventh). She was propelled to sixth place by the total

While Irvin put together a season best, several of the lifters did not come close to their best. If they had done so, they would have scored points and the team would have earned no worse than fifth place.

After earning second place three times, Navarre finally captured the state championship. In a duel with Spruce

tlers qualified for the state championship meet, which is one more than last year. We also finished fifth, which is the highest place Apopka has been in in at least 20 years. We have never had a lot of success at the state championship meet and, in particular, with placing. But we have four wrestlers who might just do it this time. As a side note, Nick (Celella) is the first regional champion I have ever coached and the four wrestlers competing at the state is the most I have ever coached, too. It is a very satisfying feeling for me, but even more for the program."

One week after falling in the finals of the 152-pound weight class, Celella claimed the championship at the regional. Like the team's success, he is the first individual from Apopka to ascend to championship status in at least 20 years.

He defeated four opponents to win the region title. He completed his run to the championship with a convincing, mistake-free 6-0 victory over Andrew Weaver of Orange City University. Celella scored the winning points with about 30 seconds left in the match. During the semifinals, he

put together a combination which netted him the winning points with just seconds to spare. The final score was 3-2 over Lyman's Kyle Harrison.

During the district, he also advanced to the finals by executing a takedown which ended in a point-scoring maneuver and it came with under 30 seconds left in the match as well. Celella will face Albertson Azor of Dwyer in the first round of the state championship tournament. Their individual records are 17-7 and 32-9, respectively.

"He didn't execute a lot of takedowns, but he was efficient in scoring points," Hauser said of Celella. "When he had his shots, he finished them, including the last one in the finals, which were the winning points. Last year, we had three wrestlers who advanced to the state championship meet in their respective classes. But they were all seniors. Nick is a junior this year. His berth in the state championship tournament is great for us for this year. But it is also great for next year. We will have a regional champion and state championship qualifier who is also a senior next year.

"I am so happy for him. He deserves to be a champion. He worked

hard to become a champion and knows he is looked up to. Not only do his teammates look up to him, but his family does, too. We put up the picture of every district, regional and state champion. His younger brother will be on the team next year. That picture will be a reminder to the younger brother what he can do and he has someone who has the experience to pass down to him. That is motivation. Nick has put in a lot of time and training outside of the high school program."

In the 182-pound weight class Apopka's Josh Hernandez took second place. Unfortunately for the Blue Darters, he couldn't quite make enough moves to become a champion. He was pinned by Corey Ray of East River. However, his victory in the semifinal round was over a favorite and showed championship potential as it also came during the waning seconds of the match. Lazaro Segura of Southwest Miami awaits Hernandez at the state championship meet. Their records are almost the same at 27-9 and 27-7, respectively.

Jevric Blocker (138 pounds) and Leo Aldaba (170 pounds) earned fourth in their respective weight classes

and a spot in the state meet.

Blocker also advanced to the finals of his weight division at the regional championship. However, due to an injury, he had to forfeit the finals and settle for second place.

This time, he had no such situation as he knocked off multiple favorites to advance to the semifinals. He lost to David Detwiler of Fleming Island in the semifinal round and then again in the third-place match (consolation final). However, Hauser pointed out both were close losses and if the two meet again, Blocker can win. Coming from a wrestling family with a treasure trove of district, regional and state championships, Meeks is considered the best in the weight class. He was battling illness on Friday. The two wrestled for the district championship with Meeks pinning Ivey.

As a team, Apopka earned fifth place by virtue of amassing 87.5 points. Only 1.5 points separated Apopka from fourth place claimed by Orange City University.

Winter Springs claimed the team championship outdistancing Fleming Island by a margin of 174.5 to 142.5 points. After claiming the Class 3A-District 3 championship, Lyman took third place with 104 points. A total of 34 teams competed.

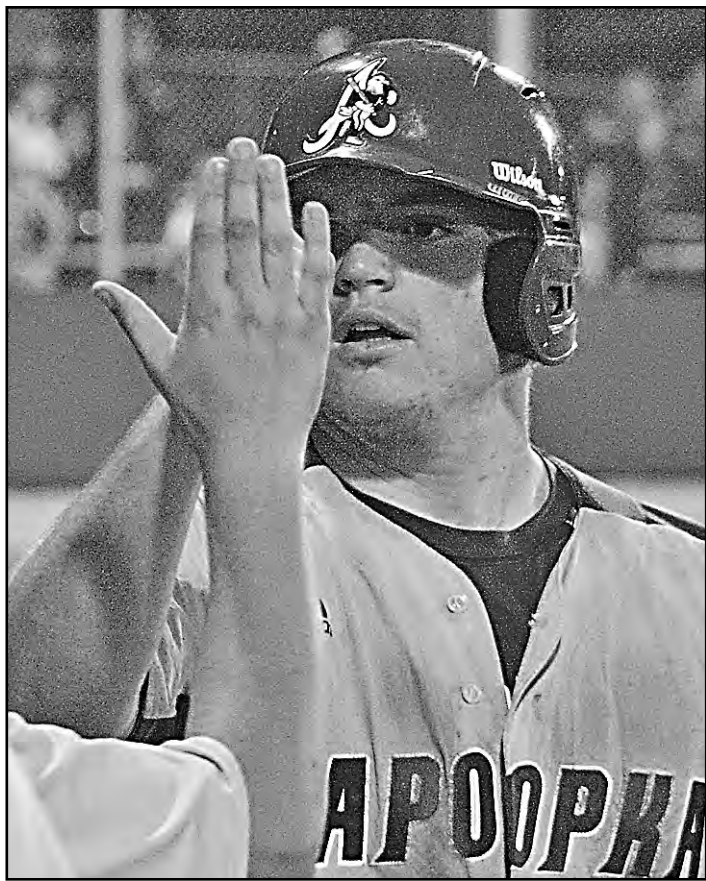

After the preseason came and went with the Wekiva High baseball team losing two games by several runs with all of them coming during two bad innings, the regular season began.

Participating in the Al Haas Winter Park High School Invitational, Wekiva limited the amount of runs it gave up, but the storyline was the same as one bad inning did the team in both times, losing by 9-8 and 4-1 scores.

"I am pleased with where the team is," Mustangs coach Jason Sanders said. "We lost two games by a total of only four runs. That is a lot further ahead of where we were in the fall. When we took over the program in the fall, we had a lot of issues. This week, we lost the two games because we didn't do some of the small baseball things. That is the difference between winning and losing right now, which is normal. We made one mistake on Monday and it was the kind which cost games.

"But that is a lot further than where we were in the fall. We aren't that far from winning. We will win our share of games. Right now, it is about getting that first win and gain-

ing some confidence and experience."

Life was good for Wekiva as the team took a 7-2 lead after four innings in its regular-season opener against Lake Howell. Wekiva scored three runs during both the second and third as they parlayed innocent hits into big innings.

This time, the Mustangs gave up six runs during the top of the fifth, including a grand slam. Multiple errors were

committed. Only one of the runs was earned. Not only did the inning take over an hour to complete, but Wekiva's Austin McWhite was involved in a collision at home and Lake Howell's coach was ejected.

After Wekiva tied the game during its half of the fifth, the Silver Hawks won the game with a walk-off single during the last frame.

Two fielding errors began the seventh, followed by

a walk. Then a single brought in the winning tally, which was unearned.

McWhite went 3-for-5 with 2 RBI. Another two hits were collected by Matt Wansor in three at-bats.

Wansor also knocked in two tallies. The team totaled 12 hits.

"Because we are a small-ball team, we have to win games like these," Sanders said. "We aren't going to score a lot of runs in a lot of games. So we need to make the most of the times we do. We got a good pitching performance and didn't make the most of it. We played well and had a solid game. Our pitchers did their job. But we had one bad inning, again."

Taking on Cypress Creek,

the second game of the event followed the same script as Wekiva took the lead only to lose it the same way. The loss came despite a brilliant pitching performance from Caleb Maggio.

Maggio gave up one hit and one earned run. He struck out five.

McWhite did not leave the previous game. But he sat out the game against the Bears with concussion-like symptoms.

Wansor led off the fourth with a single, stole second and was brought home on another base hit off the bat of Dan Richard.

Cypress Creek scratched out a run during the fifth to tie the game at 1-1. This time, it was an earned run. However, it was sparked by a pitching mis-

take. A lead-off walk began the frame. He was bunted to second and came home on a single.

Then the fielding errors came full circle once again. The Mustangs committed two errors during the sixth which led to the eventual winning run. Another error during the final frame allowed another run to score as the lead was upped to its final total of 4-1.

Richard went 2-for-3 with the RBI.

"Caleb pitched the best game I had seen a while," Sanders said. "We just didn't have the bats and the things we did the night before we didn't do during this game. They were the simple baseball things, like moving runners into scoring position."

varsity team, so nerves probably had something to do with it

But if a team doesn't give up walks or commits errors, that situation or type of game never develops and we are playing small ball, which is our strength."

Two days later the team took to the field facing Oviedo. This time, it was the fourth and fifth innings which did in the Mustangs.

For the first time this season and with Sanders as coach, Wekiva took the lead as it got its lead-off batter on during the second and moved him around the bases.

Abraham Lincoln, the 16th president of the United States of America, was born February 12, 1809, and died April 15, 1865. His presidency was from March 1861 until his assassination in April 1865, President Lincoln successfully led the United States through its greatest constitutional, military, and moral crisis – the American Civil War – preserving the Union while ending slavery and promoting economic and financial modernization. Reared in a poor family on the western frontier, Lincoln was mostly self-educated, and became a country lawyer, a Whig Party leader, Illinois state legislator during the 1830s, and a one-term member of the United States House of Representatives during the 1840s. Lincoln has been consistently ranked by scholars and the public as one of the three greatest U.S. presidents, the others being George Washington and Franklin D. Roosevelt. The following are just a few quotes attributed to Abraham Lincoln:

- “People are just as happy as they make up their minds to be.”
“Whatever you are, be a good one.”
“America will never be destroyed from the outside. If we falter and lose our freedoms, it will be because we destroyed ourselves.”
“...And in the end it is not the years in your life that count, it’s the life in your years.”
“Do I not destroy my enemies when I make them my friends?”
“My Best Friend is a person who will give me a book I have not read.”
“Books serve to show a man that those original thoughts of his aren’t very new after all.”
“Nearly all men can stand adversity, but if you want to test a man’s character, give him power.”
“My concern is not whether God is on our side; my greatest concern is to be on God’s side, for God is always right.”
“When I do good, I feel good. When I do bad, I feel bad. That’s my religion.”
“Those who deny freedom to others deserve it not for themselves.”
“I’m a success today because I had a friend who believed in me and I didn’t have the heart to let him down.”
“...How many legs does a dog have if you call the tail a leg? Four. Calling a tail a leg doesn’t make it a leg.”
“Whenever I hear anyone arguing for slavery, I feel a strong impulse to see it tried on him personally.”
