Willson files ethics charge on Moore

A former Venice City Council member has filed an ethics complaint against a sitting member over the settlement of the Venice Sunshine lawsuit.

Bill Willson, who lost to Ernie Zavodnyik in his bid for re-election in 2007, said he filed the complaint with the Florida Commission on Ethics on Monday, and acknowledged there could be more to

"Essentially, the city accepted all responsibility for the individuals responsible for vio-

lations based on the notion the city had not adequately trained these council members on the requirements of the Sunshine law," Willson said in a telephone interview on Tuesday.

"So it boils down to a retired judge pleading he has no responsibility due to his ignorance of the law. I was always led to believe ignorance of the law is no excuse. Can any right-thinking person believe an educated attorney who was elevated to the status and responsibility of a judge was incapable of understanding a relatively simple law?"

If the ethics complaint is successful, Willson said, he may file others.

"I believe John Moore to have the most egregious violation due to his status as a retired judge and thus earned the first submission," Willson said, "not that there aren't many dirty hands involved in what I consider a scam perpe-

trated against the taxpayers of Venice.'

Moore said Tuesday he just returned from vacation and had not yet heard about the complaint. The Florida Ethics Commission does not acknowledge receipt of complaints, although the person filing it and the subject of the complaint are free to disclose the information.

"I hate to comment on something I haven't seen," said Moore. "I guess in this litigious age anybody can litigate anything."

#### The complaint

The complaint "questions the motives of the council members involved and their three-stage manipulative methodology to circumvent the spirit and intent of the law" for the sole purpose of personal gain, Willson said.

# SCF trustees eye more openness

Still smarting from complaints about a sudden name change, State College of Florida trustees have asked the administration for workshops in an effort to make their deliberations more understandable

and transparent to the public. On July 1, the college formally changed its name from Manatee Community College, a controversial move that has drawn criticism for both its complexity and the hasty fashion nearly devoid of public comment in which it was adopted.

Trustee Beverly Beall has asked for a workshop on "process and communication," saying that she is continuing to hear comments from members of the "Old Bradenton" establishment that identified with the name "Manatee Community College" in a way they apparently don't with the new name, abbreviated SCF.

Saying she felt they need to reach out to that group, Beall noted there "ought to be more transparency."

Communicating the board's process is what it needs to work on, she said during the meeting June 24 at the Bradenton campus.

"I feel I need to apologize," she said, adding she did not want to be in that position again.

Fellow trustee Susan Miller Kelly said she also had heard complaints and concerns.

The board discussed the necessity of speed when the



renaming was under consideration, a process that the school said began March 25 and ended with a favorable 6-1 vote April 15. The college also changed its mascot and nickname from "Lancers" to "Manatees."

The college needed to hurry because it had won approval from the state Board of Education to offer a four-year nursing degree. Legislation passed last year allowed community colleges to offer fouryear programs, allowing them to change their names in order to do so. Many of the state's

community colleges change their names, most dropping the word "community" from their titles.

#### Sunshine issues

During the spring session of the Florida Legislature, lawmakers approved the college's new name, enabling it to award baccalaureate degrees to students completing the new nursing program slated to begin next year. The college also has campuses in Venice and Lakewood Ranch.

SCF President Lars A. Hafner contends that part of the problem is that the public does not seem to understand the requirements imposed by the state's strict Sunshine Law, which prohibits board members from discussing public issues in private among themselves. He said that when he discusses items with the board during its meetings, it's the first time anyone has heard anything about the subject.

He listed as possible workshop topics a charter school proposed for the Bradenton campus, the budget, and future objectives and legislative priorities. The workshops probably would start in the fall,

# Laurel residents cold to jail site

A standing-room-only group of Laurel-area residents came to the most recent Criminal Justice Commission Community Partners Work Group to deliver a message: Don't put the new Sarasota County jail here.

The work group is charged with ranking sites for the proposed correctional facility and forwarding the results to the CJC, which then will send its top three choices to county commissioners. The jail is expected to house 300 beds,

with the possibility of an intake center included. The preliminary cost for construction is estimated at \$44 million.

For most of the year, work group meetings at the Laurel Community Center involved only group members, county staff and about four or five members of the public. On July 1, the parking lot overflow of cars onto street side areas or across the street into a grass lot indicated a wider interest in meeting goings-on.

Inside, a meeting that usually took up half of a divided



# Delays could jeopardize park purchases

The city of Venice Parks and Recreation Advisory Board has agreed again to delay its ranking of five proposed park land acquisition candidates until a July 20 meeting.

To expedite the process, county officials earlier asked the city not to re-rank last year's candidates for the county-run Parks and Environmentally Sensitive Lands Acquisition

The Cemex property near the Venice Train Depot was on the top of the previous list. Since it was purchased by the city to create Legacy Park, the Wen Chung property (Curry Creek), located east along U.S. 41 adjoining Roberts Bay, moves up to No. 1.

A parcel off East Venice Avenue known as Blue Haven was ranked the lowest priority of the original three nominations, but the owner has since entered confidential negotiations to sell the property, according to City Manager Isaac Turner. And county officials

were unable to reach a mutually agreeable purchase price.

Dawn Stoddart, who serves double duty on the county and city parks boards, said two weeks ago that delaying the city's input any longer could put Venice's nominated properties at risk.

She said there's only \$16 million left in the program and the county is already looking closely at two properties, one in North County and Warm Mineral Springs in South County.

"It's a great program (yet) I have a serious concern that over the past two years nothing has been spent in Venice,"

She said the county keeps waiting for Venice to come through with its updated list. Another delay could kill the city's chance of participating this year in the program, she warned.

"In the meantime, money will be spent North and South County with Venice getting nothing in the middle," she said.

"Even if it is not our property," said Jacqueline Ring, who nominated property she owns, "if you are serious about trying to obtain part of that funding," you should expedite the process.

"Two months have passed. Nothing has transpired. I'm disappointed to see everything has changed," Ring said, referring to a new draft city policy on nominations.

"All nominees would like to know ... are (we) in the running?"

#### The holdup

The current holdup is the city's response to a county request to formalize its review process. Staff recently asked the city parks board to review new nomination criteria and

The new procedure allows the county to gather formal comments on each property from the city. The city's new procedure includes what might be described as a partial end-run around the parks board. When it comes to considering environmentally sensitive lands nominated for the program, the Environmental Task Force will forward its comments to city council for

its consideration. The Parks and Recreation Advisory Board will handle the others.

From there, a recommendation is made by city council and forwarded to the county parks board and eventually to the county commission.

Individuals may still nominate park properties.

#### This year's nominees

Five Venice properties were nominated this year.

Caithness Construction nominated 105 acres of land that includes trees, scrub jays and wetlands near the Myakka River, with a 5-acre parcel jutting out eastward at the northeast corner connecting to the river for boat and kayak access.

Paul Hamilton nominated a parcel on Tarpon Road with 216 feet of seawalled waterfront property that includes docks for 15 wet slips with electric and water hookup and overhead lighting and a small building currently leased to a real estate company. According to a nomination form submitted by Hamilton, the site could potentially be used as a temporary mooring location for the public, since the city is currently studying short term mooring near Higel Marine Park.

Mike Pachota of Osprey Courtyard LLC nominated property along the east side of Osprey Street between Laguna Drive and Apalachicola Road on the island as a potential large stormwater retention pond and neighborhood park.

Nearby, Jacqueline Ring nominated 1.73 acres close to the beach near Tarpon Center. The property runs east and west from behind Casa Seville condominiums to Osprey Street, and north and south between Pillitteri Place and Higel Drive on the island. According to Ring's nomination form, the parcel includes the second oldest existing house in Venice (built in 1898).

Michael and Pamela Shelter nominated what was formerly restaurant property at the corner of U.S. 41 Bypass North and U.S. 41 Business as a park and additional parking for Legacy Trail.

# Millions cut from Orioles package

# State money only good for Reds deal

BY CAROL SAKOWITZ STAFF WRITER

A \$7.5 million grant from the state Office of Tourism, Trade and Economic Development is not available for Sarasota County's proposed spring training deal with the Baltimore Orioles, county commissioners learned

Deputy County Administrator Dave Bullock informed commissioners at the Robert L. Anderson Administration Center that OTTED money is designated only for the now-defunct deal with the Cincinnati Reds. Bullock has been the county's point man in the negotiations and just recently announced that talks had resumed between the two

Throughout the county's dealings with Major League Baseball organizations — first the Cincinnati Reds, then the Boston Red Sox and now the Baltimore Orioles — the OTTED grant was included as a funding source. The grant was created by the state as an incentive for MLB teams to remain in









the state for spring training.

Bullock said he learned of the funding glitch when he was told by OTTED, through Larry Pendleton, president and CEO of Florida Sports Foundation Inc., that there is "no leeway in the state statute to change the original certification." OTTED had been contacted regarding the availability of the grant, Bullock said, when negotiations with

Baltimore and the county resumed. "We were surprised," Bullock said of the notification.

He called the grant "a huge part of the deal," and the OTTED ruling "the most significant issue" in the negotiations. He said he doesn't know what part of the current deal could affect the grant.

The offer proposed to the Orioles for use of Ed Smith Stadium for spring training is \$28.2 million, with \$7.5 million originally coming from the OTTED



Staub

grant and the rest from the county. Including another \$3 million in the deal has been part of the dis-

Bullock said he has informed Baltimore and the city of Sarasota about the OTTED opinion. There is no plan of action cur-

rently, he said, and neither he nor county staff has fully discussed the situation with the city.

"Our plan is to still have the city bond the money, and the city contribute the grant money," Bullock said. "We never asked the city not to be a recipient (of the grant).

As commissioners discussed this new turn of events, Bullock told them that the opinion had not been delivered in writing. Later, he said, that in his experience, the fact it was not written down might sometimes signal an opportunity.

County Commissioner Nora Patterson questioned Bullock during the meeting as to how negotiations could have proceeded only to get the money

Both Bullock and Commissioner Joe Barbetta, the board's liaison to Major League Baseball, said there always was

the impression that the funds would be available.

During negotiations with the Red Sox, the county had asked for a similar opinion from OTTED regarding that

# Budget task force asks hard questions

Like a family of unsatisfied diners picking at a chicken carcass, the Sarasota County Budget Task Force is delving into the line items of the proposed county budget served up by County Administrator Jim Ley and his senior staff.

The task force, meeting July 1 in the same third-floor think tank that was the site of June county budget workshops, heard much of the same information that was presented to the county commissioners. However, the task force members also asked questions and offered advice to senior administrators.

County commissioners are scheduled to hold a second series of budget workshops on Sept. 3 and 4 on the proposed \$981,381,854 budget for fiscal year 2010.

The task force, chaired by former county commissioner Robert L. Anderson, is expected to make its presentation to the commission on Sept. 8. In preparation, the task force has scheduled meetings on core service budgets this month and into August.

#### Phone call

The task force session took about three hours as members heard from Larry Arnold, executive director of community services; Carolyn Gregov, general manager of the Cooperative Extension; Sarabeth Kalajian, general manager of county libraries; Dave Cash, executive director of operations and maintenance; and John F. McCarthy, general manager of parks and recreation, and of the history center.

However, throughout the meeting, Robert Hanson, county chief information officer, was brought to the microphone to answer questions about IT service. "Voice communications" figured in many of the questions directed to him, especially by Anderson.

After Gregov spoke about Cooperative Extension programs, Anderson went straight into line-item budgeting, saying, "I have difficulty understanding 'Voice and Communications,' " and questioning \$21,000 for extensions.

Gregov replied that the money is for a telephone system used by everyone, prompting Hanson to weigh in. Hanson compared the budgeting of the county's communications system with a utility, saying that the total voice communications expense is broken down by department, with higher usage being charged more.

Hanson told the task force

that communications includes wireless phones, computer costs and other technological equipment. Follow-up comments to

Hanson included questions about the amount of personal calls made on cell phones by staff, and suggestions that technological equipment be kept in service longer.

Twenty years ago a mom-and-pop local airport transport service was founded. Blue Sky Airport Limousines, 137-A Seaboard Ave., has grown with strong customer support and now has launched Blue Sky Medical Transportation to assist customers who are nonambulatory or handicapped.

General Manager Rick Kelly feels that this is a niche service the company can fill, particularly helping folks in this predominantly retirement community who are confined to wheelchairs.

"People with special transportation needs will call the office as they do for our airport services, telling us which service they need," he said. "Where customers are ambulatory, they will be offered the facility of using a beautiful Lincoln town car.

Providing nonemergency transportation in compliance with the American with Disabilities Act, drivers are fully trained in wheelchair lift operation and qualified in CPR. Vehicles are similar to the existing fleet but custom-built to take four wheelchairs and four passengers. They are fitted with a safe, smooth side-load wheelchair lift providing 56 inches of headroom. Each wheelchair is securely anchored. Comfort is provided with dual air-conditioning systems.

Transportation available to a doctor, therapy, to and from local hospitals, with a nurse's aide — anything associated with medical needs.

"Depending upon needs," Kelly said, "we can wait for the customer. Because we are using a special custom converted standard passenger van, they can even take groups for out-

Fully licensed and insured, the company recently received vehicle and business service permits. Kelly is hoping to

get into the medical community as a local CTC service provider. The long-term plan is to be working with the local Medicare provider dispatcher assigned to the individual counties.

The objective is to effectively provide a service everybody is comfortable with, in a timely fashion, combining it with 24/7 Blue Sky Airport Limo services. Communication is by cell phone, with computer dispatch and operators monitoring traffic conditions.

A former Marine and California police officer, Kelly, a business efficiency troubleshooter, joined Blue Sky Airport Limousines a year and a half ago. The drivers are mostly retired, mature, responsible and refined.

Services operate from 8 a.m. daily with an answering service to cover the three county area of Manatee, Sarasota and Charlotte. Call 207-2583.

# Buyer lined up for Axcess MRI

It is business as usual at the nine centers of Axcess Medical Imaging Corporation following the company's Chapter 11 bankruptcy filing last week.

"There is already a buyer lined up, whom I cannot name at this stage, as we work through the bankruptcy proceedings," said Douglas Badertscher, chief restructuring officer.

The business will be acquired by a national medical company, then emerge from bankruptcy as a stronger company, said Badertscher, who has in-depth health-care management and turnaround expertise. Patients and referring physicians can expect to receive the same high level of service and quality during the transition, he said.

In a statement, Dr. Steven Miley, Axcess' chief executive officer, said the company's problems stem from the continuing economic downturn, reductions in reimbursement for services rendered, significant long-term debt and the company's rapid expansion.

A major local business success story, Axcess was launched in Venice in 2001 by Miley. Following 24 years in medicine, mostly as an emergency-room doctor at Bon Secours Venice Hospital (now Venice Regional Medical Center), he founded the new company.

Axcess opened its first major imaging center at Sunset Lakes Boulevard in March 2004. The project cost \$10 million.

A fast-growth period for the company began with the opening of a second center, in Bradenton, and, two years, later a third, in Sarasota.

In May this year, the company acquired seven Medical Resources Inc. diagnostic centers for \$200,000 cash and \$3.8 million in financing. Those locations are in Port Charlotte, Naples, Jacksonville, Titusville, Pinellas Park, Clearwater and Bradenton, which was then closed.

Axcess has 129 employees who remain employed with no anticipated changes, according to Badertscher. In the bankruptcy filing, the debt of the company was estimated as \$16.1 million and company assets at \$4.4 million. Revenues last year were \$11 million and this year are budgeted at \$22 million-\$24 million.

# Real estate as I see it

Take a peek at a real estate "money tree" program.

On July 1, the state of Florida set aside more than \$30 million to help home buyers with a down payment. The program is designed to function in conjunction with the existing \$8,000 federal IRS tax credit for the same

The idea is to turn the \$8,000 federal tax credit into real cash to be used for the down payment or, in some instances, other potential closing costs. The state would advance the funds to the buyer for use up front at closing on the real estate purchase. The buyer would return the money to the state upon receipt of the \$8,000  $\,$ IRS refund.

This could be a winwin situation for everyone. The feds get to stimulate

the economy, in particular the housing market. The state of Florida advances money to the consumer and then receives it back, via the IRS rebate, and Mr. John Q. Public in Venice gets a sweetheart home buyer deal.

It is OK to applaud here for the astute job that our Legislature has done to enhance the federal initiative. The IRS tax credit pro-

gram ends on Dec. 1 (you must close on a new home) while the state advanced funds portion began on July 1, creating the windfall and yet another buying window of opportunity to realize your Venice homeownership dream. That purchase window may also be narrowed somewhat by the recent creep-up in mortgage interest rates. As rates increase (a likely scenario), so will the monthly mortgage payment, making it more difficult to qualify for the home loan.

Restrictions to the program are few, and include:

1. The purchaser must be a "first-time home buyer," defined as a buyer or spouse that has not owned a home in the previous three years.

2. The federal tax cred-

it and advanced state funding will be 10 percent of the house purchase price not to exceed \$8,000.

3. The IRS tax credit could be claimed on either the 2008 or 2009 tax return.

4. The state cash advance may also be used for Federal Housing Administration mortgage loan costs, but it is still unclear whether it can be applied to the mandatory FHA 3.5-percent down payment.

Very soon, business groups, trade organizations, and government agencies will be publishing educational and public service material for the consumer as these different stimulus options ramp up. Keep a sharp eye and a sharper pencil on hand to map your best fit to invest in our sunshine community. It will certainly be well worth the time and effort spent.

The federal government has planted a money tree. The state government has added fertilizer. Are you a firsttime home buyer who will pick the fruit?

John Simmonds, Mayor Ed Martin and a former airport board member — all named defendants — submitted nearly \$300,000 in bills from private attorneys related to the Sunshine suit, which council later agreed to pay. Moore's bill totaled \$126,000.

Council Member Sue Lang, also a defendant, previously said she incurred approximately \$2,000 in private attorney fees but didn't seek reimbursement.

Willson said that was no coincidence. The "manipulative methodology" required Moore be dropped from the lawsuit, followed by Lang agreeing in writing not to seek reimbursement for her private attorney fees in order to vote on whether the city should pay the attorney fees of her fellow council members. The final act of manipulation, according

to Willson, was council's vote to use city funds to pay private attorney fees related to the Sunshine lawsuit

In return for acknowledging city violations of the Florida in the Sunshine Law and Public Records Law, plaintiff Anthony Lorenzo agreed to drop the individually named defendants from the suit.

Willson said he regretted being the person to initiate the ethics complaint.

'Following the election of 2007, I by design removed myself from the limelight of our local political scene. I did so knowing any negative comments or actions I took would be dismissed as sour grapes having lost the election," he said. "I am very cognizant that view will still surface with certain members of our community today. Despite that reality, I cannot sit back and idly watch as some of our elected officials misuse their authority to maneuver a settlement relieving the misdeeds of all involved and paying the bills of most

paying the bills of most.

"A settlement that only benefited these elected officials, and whose cost is in the millions of dollars, will likely be borne by the innocent taxpayers of our city. Somebody has to step up to the plate."

An ethics complaint was filed by Venice resident Winston Wilmore against Council Member Sue Lang on Oct. 9, 2008. The commission dismissed it on Dec. 5, for "lack of legal sufficiency," but it has refused to consider Sunshine suit-related charges because they were the subject of litigation.

All that remains is a judge's order in September stipulating how much the city will pay the plaintiff for attorneys' fees and costs.

conference room expanded into the second half, with about 75 spectators either sitting in chairs or ringing the walls of the room.

Five potential sites in central Sarasota County were scheduled to be ranked during the twoand-a-half-hour session, but a public comment portion left only 30 minutes for reviews. Only one area, a privately owned parcel on Knights Trail Road, was able to be ranked according to its size, location, access, ownership/development/construction costs, operational costs and environmental impact.

Knights Trail Rowco, a 40-acre parcel, received 69 points by the work group. In previous work group considerations, the highest score given so far — 89.5 points — went to Fruitville Park of Commerce, located off Fruitville Road in North County.

With one lone exception, Patrick McCarthy of Nokomis, residents who spoke to the work group detailed reasons why a correctional facility should not be placed in the Laurel area.

Jim Bowers, president of the Venetian Golf & River Club Community Association, requested that the Knights Trail sites be eliminated by the work group. Among the reasons he cited for their removal were the limited access from Laurel Road East, the amount of county-owned property that can be used instead, the approximately 1,000

existing single-family homes in the area, an increased burden on local infrastructure and the availability of communities that would welcome a detention center.

Speaker Lucy Koitsch asked work group members to travel to the sites and view them before making a decision.

The Community Partners Work Group is expected to review and rank potential sites by late summer to send to the CJC.

The top three sites will be submitted to the county commissioners, who are expected to direct technical staff to evaluate the sites. A decision on a final site is not expected until early 2010.

he said.

Trustee Kelvin Lumpkin said flatly, "I reject the notion we're not transparent." Still, he said later that he thought the workshops were a good idea.

Trustee Christine Robinson of Venice, who cast the only "no" vote in April on the name change, stressed the value of the Sunshine Law.

"What I wanted to focus on is what a lot of folks don't understand, is the fact we have to operate in the sunshine, which means anything that's talked about between the board members has to be talked about during a publicly noticed meeting," she said.

Robinson said she still feels the same about the name change, but added, "I certainly defend the reasons we made the decision."

# New law makes it easier for police to hand out tickets

A. J. Lamantia's last memory of his girlfriend Katie Marchetti, 16, was her being ejected from his car and run over by another vehicle.

The 19-year-old was driving home to Valrico, Fla., from a family reunion in Sarasota. Marchetti was in the passenger seat reclined back to take a nap. She wasn't wearing her seat belt.

It was about 10:30 p.m., on March 3, 2006, when Lamantia reportedly nodded off for a split second. He lost control of the car and careened into a guard rail and then a concrete wall.

Marchetti was ejected from the car into the path of oncoming traffic. Lamantia, who was wearing a seat belt, regained consciousness, only to watch as Marchetti was run over by another vehicle. She died the next day at Tampa General Hospital.

According to a Web site created in Katie's memory, her mother, Laura Marchetti, said the simple truth is that her daughter died "because she wasn't wearing her seat belt."

Starting Wednesday, police will have a stronger role in making sure everyone wears a seat belt.

The new Dori Slosberg and Katie Marchetti Safety Belt Law — named for Marchetti and another crash victim not wearing her seat belt — was signed into law on May 6 by Gov. Charlie Crist. It means police can pull a car over and ticket anyone not wearing a belt. Previously, police had to

have another reason — such as speeding or expired tags — to check for seat belt violations.

Police expect the law to make an impact.

"The police department is predicting that seat belt usage in the city will increase by the end of next year as a result of this new law," said Tony Siriani of the North Port Traffic Enforcement Unit, adding the fine is \$99

In Charlotte County, sheriff's deputies will not automatically ticket drivers at first. However, in time, residents are expected to know the new law.

"It's education — education at first and then it will be no excuse for not knowing the law over time," said CCSO spokesman Michael Maschmeier.

Florida's new seat belt law will not only save lives, it will also entitle the state to \$35.5 million from a soon-to-expire federal incentive plan that rewards states for increasing safety belt use, according to AAA Auto Club.

The National Highway
Traffic Safety
Administration estimates
the new law will lower
seat-belt-related fatalities by about 125 a year.

Laura Marchetti, who established a foundation in her daughter's name, was instrumental in getting the new law passed. She arranged two buses with more than 100 adults and teens to lobby in Tallahassee in favor of tough seat belt legislation

was Irving Slosberg, a former state representative. His daughter, Dori, who was not wearing a seat belt, died in a car crash in 1996 on Palmetto Park Road west of Boca Raton.

Slosberg began lobbying Tallahassee for a mandatory seat belt law. Slosberg, who is a millionaire, started a traffic safety foundation.

Nowadays when Laura Marchetti speaks to students she ends with this statement, "Every time you fasten your seat belt, it crosses over your heart."

She says she wants auto manufactures to design vehicles that "will not start" until the seat belt is fastened or will not stop buzzing unless the belt is buckled.

"Passage of this lifesaving bill has been a long time coming, but the lives that will be saved and the injuries prevented make it all worthwhile," said AAA spokesman Kevin Bakewell in a statement.

# Don't let opportunity go up in smoke

igarette smokers got another good reason to quit last week when Florida's tobacco tax jumped by \$1 per pack.

As if the constant drum beat of bad news about the killer health effects of smoking weren't enough, they now feel the pain in their wallets.

On April 1, federal taxes rose 62 cents, to \$1.01 per pack. Florida's tax rose from 34 cents to \$1.34 on July 1, so a carton of cigarettes will now include \$23.50 in combined taxes.

We're for it. Florida's tax, last raised in 1990, had been ridiculously low. Florida now vaults from fourth-lowest state tax to the middle, 22nd in the country. (Rhode Island's tax is highest, at \$3.46.) In the midst of a severe budget crunch, the new tax is expected to bring in revenues of more than \$900 million a year.

But the greater impacts will be on

the other side of the ledger. The Centers for Disease Control figures that illnesses related to smoking cost citizens \$75 billion a year. Florida sells more cigarettes than any other state, and by some estimates, medical costs for smoking-related diseases are some \$6 billion a year here.

The Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids cites studies that show that every 10-percent increase in cigarette prices cuts smoking rates by 4 percent, 7 percent among young people. The higher tax will save lives, especially in the long term because it will stop youngsters from getting hooked in the first place. The Campaign estimates some 79,000 lives will be saved in the long run because of the higher

We can't vouch for the specific figures — statistics are fluid, to say the least — but there is absolutely no doubt that the tax hike will stop more people from picking up the habit, will prompt more people to quit and will save us all from higher health-care costs. Bottom line, it will prevent diseases from developing and save many lives.

But tobacco smoking is a nasty, addictive habit, and the additional tax costs will be a real burden for many tobacco addicts. They may want to quit — for financial, family or health reasons — but it's rarely easy.

If you've never gone through it, you may not know how agonizing it can be. So for those who don't smoke, it's important to encourage friends to quit now. Be supportive. Be a help.

And for those who want to quit, don't feel a need to go solo. There is a lot of support out there. Use it.

We suggest starting with on the Internet. Google "stop smoking" and go from there. You'll find plenty of good advice.

Smokefree.gov suggests using the START plan. Set a quitting date. Tell everyone you are planning to quit. Anticipate the challenges. Remove tobacco from your life. Talk to a doc-

A doctor may help steer you to one of the prescription drugs now available. We've seen a number of people use the prescription Chantix successfully. It's not cheap, but the cost is far less than continued smoking. Nicotine gum and patches also help many people.

You also have to understand your own behavioral triggers and the psychological impulses that contribute to the habit. Smokers need help to overcome their addiction, but there is plenty of it available.

The higher tax will push more people toward a healthier, smoke-free life. That's the ultimate benefit.

Beach meeting blue Gulf waters on the front page of the Gondolier Sun is unlikely to excite many beachgoers to visit our town. Comments on the Web page of our former beach motel, the Best Western Sandbar, that the motel was close to sugar-white Siesta Beach may have been inspired by the decision in the 1990s to renourish Venice Beach with dark sand.

Comments that dark sand gets hotter than light-colored sands are true. I checked the temperature of Venice Beach and Siesta Beach sands with a surface thermometer on a clear June day. The sands were both 76 degrees at sunrise. By 9 a.m., the Venice Beach sand was 106 degrees and the Siesta beach sand 94 degrees. By noon, the Venice Beach sand was 124 degrees and the Siesta Beach sand 105 degrees. By comparison, clean concrete and recently blacktopped roadway rose from 80 degrees to 113 and 133 degrees at noon.

It has been reported that beach temperatures affect plant and animal life as well as the sexual ratio in turtle nests. I have previously noted that the dark material in beach sands often has a high phosphorus content that could promote red tide.

Why aren't environmental groups, especially Mote Marine, plus the general public helping direct the renourishment programs?

Mote Marine still has not defined the cause of red tide and expresses disinterest in Bob Rigby's method for controlling red tide outbreaks.

# Lions club gives \$30,000 in grants and scholarships

On June 4, representatives from many local nonprofit organizations and a Venice High School student received monetary awards totaling \$30,000 from the Venice Lions Club. The awards were handed out during a dinner party and evening of "Lionism" at Venice Regional Medical Center.

Awards went to Bear Ladies, Friends of Jacaranda Library, Lions Conklin Center, Florida Council of the Blind, Florida Lions Camp, Lions Eye Institute, Friends of Venice Public Library, Project Graduation, Warehouse of Venice, Southeastern Guide Dogs, Our Mother's House in Venice and InStride Therapy. Venice High School student Aaron Turner received a scholarship. Present for the event was Corki, a retired seeing-eye dog from Southeastern Guide Dogs.

"The Lions Clubs of Venice-Nokomis-Englewood has a large footprint in the area it serves," said Barbara McGillicuddy, president. It reaches from Blackburn Point Road to the north, Boca Grande to the south, Myakka River to the east and the Gulf of Mexico to the west.

#### **History**

The Venice Lions Club began in 1947 with 29 members, and the VLC Foundation started in 1985. In 1994, the Lions Club Vision Center opened at the Venice Regional Medical Center HealthPark at Jacaranda Boulevard and Center Road.

The Vision Center helps about 40 patients a month, based on income guidelines established by the Alfred G. and Ingeborg Keerl fund, which is designed to help those within the boundaries outlined. Those seen for vision screenings are also eligible to undergo hearing tests and assistance.

The Lions Club started in the United States when Melvin Jones, a Chicago business leader. and his group wanted to do more than they were doing in 1917 and formed the Association of Lions Clubs. It soon went international. Then, in 1925, Helen Keller spoke



Q 1 - As South, vulnerable, you hold:

A KJ5 ♥ 84 ♦ K109532 483

Partner opens the bidding with one no trump. What do you respond?

- A With 7 points and a reasonable sixcard suit, your hand is too good to simply bid diamonds by whatever method you employ. Bid two no trump. If partner has a reasonable diamond fit, your hand could be worth a good few tricks.
- Q 2 As South, vulnerable, you hold:

▲ 106 ♥ 976 ♦ AQJ964 +93

Partner opens the bidding with one no trump. What do you respond?

- A This is no time to count points. You could easily be bringing five or six tricks to the partnership - more than many 10-12 point hands. Bid three no trump.
- Q 3 Both vulnerable, as South you

A KQ3 ♥ 85 ♦ AJ953 +754

Partner opens the bidding with one spade. What do you respond?

- A That depends on your methods. A - A close decision. However, your flat hand and good intermediates suggest that no trump should play better than a Moysian 4-3 fit in a major. Bid one no trump.

Q 6 - Both vulnerable, as South you hold:

A A J 10 8 7 4 3 ♥ 9 4 ♦ 5 2 ♣ 7 6

Your right-hand opponent opens the bidding with one diamond. What action do you take?

A - This is the perfect hand for a preempt and, usually, with a seven-card suit we would suggest a leap to the three-level. However, here you have the death holding in all three side suits - a low doubleton. We recommend a jump to two spades.

# Fish oil – an inexpensive fix for many conditions

SUZY COHEN, R.PH. DEAR PHARMACIST

Q: I take medications for blood pressure, diabetes and arthritis, five drugs in all. My doctor is happy with my progress but my wife is urging me to take fish oils to lower my blood pressure. I am not a vitamin type of person, but I don't like some of the side effects I'm experiencing on the medications. What should I do? —G.S. Tampa, Fla.

A: Stay on your medications until your physician tells you otherwise and listen to

your wife. When you supplement with fish oils (or cod liver oil), over time, your body should start behaving more efficiently. Undertake this with your physician's blessings and supervision, because at some point, the combination of your fish oil supplements with your medications might cause dizziness or light-headedness. This could mean an unusual drop in blood pressure or blood sugar has taken place. It's your cue that a drug dosage needs to be reduced or a drug eliminated by your physician.

Omega 3 fatty acids are one of the most wellresearched dietary supplements in the world. It's the EPA (eicosapentaenoic acid) and DHA (docosahexaenoic acid) in fish oils that improve

the way your cells 'talk' to one another and suppress pain-causing chemicals. In some people, fish oils help to lower blood pressure, improve cholesterol ratios, thin the blood, and reduce pain. Other conditions that may benefit from fish oil include depression, constipation and eczema. Omega 3 fish oils could be the number one simplest, most cost-effective fix for someone with heart disease, atherosclerosis, diabetes, hypertension, autoimmune disorders and arthritis.

WELL-BEING

The American Heart Association hasn't advocated that people buy fish oil supplements yet, but they do concede that eating certain types of seafood which contain essential fatty acids can reduce your risk of developing heart dis-

ease. And speaking of food, if you eat a lot of fried goodies, meats or vegetable oils, you will need bigger doses of omega 3 fish oils to compensate for the bad fats in your diet. So how do you get more of these beneficial omega 3s? 1. Eat wild-caught seafood such as mackerel, herring, tuna, Arctic char, cod or salmon. Farm-raised seafood does not contain the same amount of healthy omega 3s that wildcaught does. 2. Buy natural fish oil

supplements over-thecounter. Krill or Cod liver oil are two other incredible sources of omega 3s. Always take these with food to enhance absorption. I know of two companies that assure their products are free of ocean contaminants: Udo's Choice and Nordic

Naturals brand. 3. You can also take a prescription drug called Lovaza, but this is last on my list because it's just an expensive, patented version of regular natural fish oils; this drug form may have more side effects than regular fish oils sold without prescription.

#### Did you know?

Acetaminophen is found in many cold remedies, sleep aids and pain medications. Be careful not to combine those because it could damage your liver.



# Doctor helps homeless man heal his life

Three years Everett Atkinson was a medical disaster waiting to happen.

The 6-foot-7 homeless man couldn't stand up long without his legs swelling dangerously. His heart was bad, his circulatory system was damaged and his body was giving out after years of alcoholism, drug abuse and neglect.

Help came his way, unexpectedly, from a doctor who had bought StreetWise newspapers from Atkinson for years. When Dr. Allen Goldberg learned Atkinson had been thrown out of a flop house because he couldn't pay the bill, the doctor offered him a chance to live in his building for a while and rebuild his health.

It was an act of compassion that reverberates to this day. The retired pediatrician has become a mentor to a man who lost his way and wanted a fresh start. Each man, in coming to know the other, has opened his eyes to another way of

"I had never met a person who had nothing before," said Goldberg, 66, a past president of the American College of Chest Physicians who devoted his professional life to working with severely disabled children. "I guess I found out what poverty really meant."

#### Insights

Now Goldberg uses insights from Atkinson example, how African-Americans in poor communities can distrust white doctors in his volunteer work in tough city neighborhoods. "He helps me understand a lot because who knows better about being disadvantaged?" Goldberg said.

In a way, Atkinson has found in the bearded, "I had never met a person who had nothing before."

take-charge doctor the attentive father figure he didn't have as a child.

"There's nothing I haven't tried to do where he and Evi (the doctor's wife) haven't helped me," said Atkinson, 57. "That gives me insight — that if they can help me like this, I can help others."

A talkative Atkinson traces his downward slide to a defining event of his youth: finding out at 18 his parents had adopted him as an infant. His father had died eight years before; as an only child he was extremely attached to his mother, who passed away in

"(She) used to tell me: Whatever you do, Everett, tell the truth. And then I found out, she never told me the truth about who I was," he said, sighing. Atkinson said his drinking and drug use started after he found his biological fam- a father who was abusive, a mother who got hurt, and a dozen frightened brothers and

#### Together

For a while, Atkinson said, he pulled himself together and became a salesman for a men's retail chain. Then he worked as a bouncer in clubs, high on cocaine and liquor. The addiction broke up his marriage and drove away his son, who Atkinson says has disappeared. On several occasions in the 1970s and 1980s, he said, he spent time in Chicago's Cook County Jail on charges of burglary and 2003 he pleaded guilty to a charge of misdemeanor battery and was sentenced to probation.

Goldberg and his wife, a retired anesthesiologist, also have known hardship. The doctor's father, a New York City firefighter, was badly injured in the course of duty and the family had little to live on when he retired on disability. Evi grew up in Germany after World War II, and her family was among the many displaced in the wreckage of that con-

"So many homes were bombed, people would take you in," she said, remembering living on another family's farm. "So it didn't seem strange to think about doing that for someone here."

The couple had come to know Atkinson as he sold StreetWise at a Walgreen's store for more Unfailingly polite, he would talk with customers about his dreams of changing his own circumstances as well as helping others. "I realized he was unusual," Goldberg said.

Five years ago, the Chicago Tribune wrote about Atkinson when he persuaded two universities to offer writing workshops to StreetWise vendors. That effort fizzled after a relatively short time, but it impressed Goldberg. "He didn't get depressed by his lack of success and he didn't give up," the doctor said.

Needing a new direction, Atkinson decided to become a soul food chef, using recipes his mother taught him. He began cooking occasionally at bars, but there wasn't enough money to start a business or even pay for a place to sleep at night.

When Atkinson told Goldberg about being forced out of a flophouse, Evi insisted the couple had to intervene. "He

weapons possession. In needs some place to get back on his feet," she recalls saying. "We have an apartment and it's empty right now."

"That's why became doctors — to help people," she said. In November 2006 Atkinson moved in, and the doctor established ground rules. No smoking. No other people staying overnight regularly. No using the kitchen for commercial cooking. Atkinson signed a lease and agreed to pay an amount of his choosing in rent. He was and is still selling StreetWise.

"I didn't want him to feel like he was a charity case," Goldberg said. "The whole point was help him become independent."

#### Building independence

Then the doctor sprang into action, trying to find ways to make that said he didn't qualify for any government benefits, Goldberg found a social worker who discovered he was eligible for Social Security Disability and the state's Medicaid health care program. When applications for aid stalled, Goldberg enlisted help from the office of then-U.S. Rep. Rahm Emanuel.

Atkinson's habit is to "back away when someone says no" and not push his case, Goldberg noted. "Either people are going to help out or they're not," Atkinson explained. "I don't want people to be thinking: Everett's always asking,

he's always nagging." Before checks from the government arrived, Goldberg took Atkinson to his bank and used his own money to open an account. Worried about the tall man's feet, Goldberg persuaded a local shoe store to donate a pair of size 14 New Balance sneakers. For the winter, the doctor and his wife made a gift of a pair

of sturdy, fur-lined boots.

If you want to work in this neighborhood you have to get connected, the doctor told Atkinson. With an introduction from Goldberg, Atkinson became part of a neighborhood organization in 2007 and "everyone knows him," said Diann Marsalak, president of the organization.

Now, the two men meet about twice a week to go over what Atkinson needs to do to get a catering business established. On a recent afternoon, the doctor emphasized the importance of securing liability insurance quickly, before the city's street fairs began.

Through their interactions, Goldberg said he has come to understand how much he assumed other people thought just like he did. But Atkinson has his own way of understanding the possible. When Atkinson world, rooted in very different experiences

The doctor said he has learned the need to listen to other people deeply, carefully and without judgment — a lesson he's using in volunteer work with the Chicago Asthma Consortium. The group plans to hold "listening sessions" with residents of poor neighborhoods later this year about ways to reduce asthma's bur-

"Overcoming inequalities in health care has to be done in the community, with the community, by the community," the doctor said. The same could be said of the former homeless man; though Goldberg can provide support, the ability to change his life has to come from within.

Both men understand their arrangement isn't permanent. "I want to see him succeed and become self-sufficient,' the doctor said. "I want to be like everybody else and pay my rent, have my own place, pay my taxes," Atkinson said.

The formerly home-

less man's health has improved. For the first time in decades, Atkinson has a personal physician who helps him manage his high blood pressure, congestive heart disease and peripheral vascular disease. In September, he had a procedure to open a blocked artery. Finally, he's stopped drinking. (Atkinson gave up a longtime cocaine and crack addiction in the early 1990s.)

Having a place to call home made all the difference, along with constant support from Goldberg and his wife.

"It lifts your health to have a place to rest and get some peace and quiet and it helps with your mental condition," said Atkinson, a man with a ready smile. "When you're homeless, you're a disposable person. When you've got an address and a phone number, you're coming back into society again.



# Local psychologist offers tips for talking to kids about sex

Local psychologist Chris Cortman, Ph.D, offers the following tips on age appropriate communication with children.

 Preschool age: "At this age the relationship with parents is all about building trust, safety and security. Children naturally go through stages where they fear and avoid strangers, but then other times they'll go to total strangers easily and freely. The key during this time is to make sure you know the people who are watching your children at all times. Be careful to investigate day-care groups and sitters to make sure they are bonded and have excellent track records

and references.

"When children are verbal, it's not too early to teach them about their private areas and what good and bad touch means. It is sometimes a good idea to set an emergency code word between parents and children; a stranger or caregiver attempting to get the child in the car when not planned with a parent must say the code word to the child first. If the person cannot recite the code word, then the child needs to run away and seek

The best thing with young children is adequate supervision. We may think that our little ones are smart and growing up so fast, but we need to keep in mind that these types of situations are unusual for

young children and that uncertainty could make them impulsive in their decision to follow a stranger. Sometimes role playing can be a very good tool and using family members to play the 'villain' can really help the child to stop and make a thought-out decision in the future.'

 First- through fifth**graders:** "Continue to emphasize the good/bad touch lessons, as well as which adults you have preapproved them to ride in cars with, have overnights with, etc. No one else do they trust to do those things. Parents need to emphasize the importance that their children keep no secrets whatsoever from them, especially with other adults. This includes relatives

and even the other parent. Children need to know that any time an adult instructs the child to not share something with a parent, the adult is doing wrong and it is always OK to tell the parents everything. Remember, prepubescent children are curious about everything but are not sexual.'

• Puberty, ages 11-13: "Typically these youngsters are becoming sexual creatures in every sense of the word. Their education about sexuality should include not only the way their bodies function sexually and reproductively, but also the realities of venereal diseases, teenage pregnancy and the costs of behaving sexually when emotionally immature. Religious and

social mores are also emphasized by well-meaning parents during this period of develop-

"It is important that these youth have developed a positive sense of self and value their own self-worth so they don't take sexual intimacy lightly. Children also need to understand the differences between the sexes, including that males are more likely to separate sex and love, while females tend to keep them in the same jar. Thus, males are often willing to engage in casual sex under the pretense that they are 'in love with' or committed to a desired female."



# Too many fail to follow hand-washing guidelines

Everyone knows how to wash their hands. Warm water, lots of soap, a vigorous and thorough scrubbing, a good drying. Moms pound it into us from the time we're

Why, then, don't people follow the

"In many studies, people are able to score very well on their handwashing knowledge," according to Dr. Anna Bowen, a medical epidemiologist for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in the National Center for Zoonotic, Vectorborne and Enteric Diseases in Atlanta. "But (when) these same people are observed, they don't perform the proper hand-washing behaviors completely or consistently."

So what are we to do? Post large "Remember what Mom said" signs over bathroom sinks? Use stimulus money to hire bathroom police for public restrooms? A good start would be to remind folks of the CDC's hand-washing guidelines (available at cdc.gov/cleanhands):

Wet your hands with clean running water and apply soap. Use warm water if it is available.

Rub hands together to make a lather and scrub all surfaces.

Continue rubbing hands for 20 seconds. Need a timer? Imagine singing 'Happy Birthday" twice to a friend.

Rinse hands well under running water.

Dry your hands using a paper towel or air dryer. If possible, use your paper towel to turn off the faucet.

Bowen notes that even all the publicity about washing your hands to avoid swine flu isn't enough to change behaviors.

"Research has repeatedly shown that health claims do not necessarily motivate people to wash hands, and that in many cultures, a desire to look clean, to be a good parent or disgust at the thought of dirt/germs, are more important motivators.'

We decided to try a test of our own. Lurking in a corner of a men's room at a train station, an observer noted how 50 visitors washed their hands. It wasn't pretty.

Only five followed hand-washing guidelines offered by the CDC; 33 washed their hands for less than 20 seconds. Charmingly, two of those just got their hands wet so they could run them through their hair. Maybe worse, 12 avoided handwashing altogether.

# How to treat a sunburn

While the best way to deal with sunburn is not to get one - think sunscreen, limited midday exposure and hats — here's what to do if you get

Cool it down. Soak a cloth with cool water and rest it on burns for about 20 minutes. Then apply a balm such as aloe vera. You also can use a mild lotion

- aim for one without perfume or dye - to help keep skin moisturized.

Bathe with cool water. Don't take hot showers or baths and avoid cleaning burned areas with soap, which can be an irritant. Pat your skin dry with a towel instead of rubbing.

Wear comfortable clothes. Choose loose-fitting cotton; wool and man-made materials such as polyester may chafe against a burn. You also can lie down a soft cotton blanket on couches, chairs

Don't peel your skin. Picking at a burned spot will irritate it and slow healing.

Stay out of the sun. Some people think that if they're already burned, it can't get worse. Not true. Wait until your skin has healed or cover up as much as possible.

Drink lots of water. You can dehydrate more quickly if you are sunburned.

Take painkillers. If your burns both-

er you, get an over-the-counter medicine with acetaminophen or ibuprofen, such as Tylenol, Advil or Motrin.

Try natural remedies. Some people have had luck with putting cold, wet teabags on burns or adding a half cup of baking soda or oatmeal to a cool

See a doctor if needed. Call if your skin blisters or peels severely. You could be at risk for an infection and may need medication.

are overwhelmingly male and will typically hone in on younger, inexperienced victims, male or female. Children need to know that unless an adult is pre-approved by their parents or officially sanctioned by school, Scouts, Little League, etc., they have no business hanging around children. Adults who hang out at parks and playgrounds who have no children of their own may be looking for trouble if they are approaching unsupervised children or teens.

"Unfortunately, sometimes the predators are the pre-approved relatives, friends or coaches, so teens need to be aware to be on guard against anyone making an inappropriate sexual advance, regardless of who it is. Once again, the importance of keeping no secret pacts with

other adults needs to be emphasized. The safe bond hopefully established between parents and children in earlier stages of development will pay dividends during the teen years, when children feel safe enough to discuss sexual issues with them.

"Normalizing their desires, urges and conflicts rather than shaming, dismissing or belittling will contribute to keeping the communication lines open between parents and teens. Finally, strong loving relationships between parents and children seem to discourage inappropriate sexual behavior and promiscuity.

"There are many age appropriate books that

children and parents can read to explore these topics in a more concrete manner."





his area's oldest performing arts organization—
The 80-year-old Players
Theatre in Sarasota—has a serious money problem. It is a sign of the times but, for this area, it could have dire consequences for many others.

This area is a mecca for people interested in the arts. Arts money drives the local economy but also brings more big-spending visitors to the area than the beaches. When those people return as permanent residents, everyone wins. They support the arts, demand and pay for better schools and add their money to the local economy. That money has led to the creation of New College, the University of South Florida, and supported Rotary, Sertoma, Kiwanis and a plethora of other clubs and organizations enriching the area. When one is in danger, all are in danger. The current weak economy has forced belt tightening, including staff layoffs most everywhere.

The Players, like many organizations, is now at that point where pay and staff cutting is not enough. Unless it finds \$35,000 (\$5,000 for each of seven shows), the Players will have to stop giving previewnight tickets to local non-profit charities for distribution to people who might otherwise never be able to see and be inspired by live theater.

## Techie turns troubador

He doesn't drive a pickup, take the train or have a dog. He's happily married.

two broken arms, broken ribs, a punctured lung, bruised kidney, and 186 stitches to the face," Loder said. "They had the technology. They rebuilt me — I am the Six Million Dollar Man."

It was during the long recovery, nearly a year in the hospital and another year and a half of physical therapy, when he began to teach himself to play the guitar.

"This began to shape my music: Harry Chapin, James Taylor, Jimmy Buffet and Bruce Springsteen," he explained.

Loder's love of music lured him to the business, but behind the scenes, where he eventually wound up working on world tours with several country music artists including Jeff Carson, Chely Wright and Sara Evans. The more country shows he worked, the more he began to appreciate the genre.

Along the way, Loder wound up stopping in Port Charlotte, where he went to work at the

"Live at the Opry will be presented at 7 p.m. July 11 at the Cultural Center Theatre, 2280 Aaron St., Port Charlotte.



Lemon Bay Playhouse closes out their current season with a strong comedy by playwright and screenwriter Leonard Gershe. "Butterflies Are Free" was a hit when it opened on Broadway in October, 1969, and was made into a movie in 1972 starring Goldie Hawn, Edward Albert and Eileen Heckart, who won an Oscar as best supporting actress.

The Playhouse production is directed by Michelle Strauss who directed the dramatically gripping "Wait Until Dark" earlier this season. Her experience and theatrical sensitivity are apparent in every aspect of this play. Her casting of the acting roles, their character

development and the way she utilizes the small stage are masterful.

The Playhouse production brings two new young actors to the roles created by the film stars. Ryan Dowd Urch plays Don Baker, a 19-year-old blind boy who is trying his wings and escaping from his over-protective mother by living alone in a onebedroom apartment. Paper thin walls and a connecting door permit him to meet his next door neighbor, Jill Tanner, played by Molly Healy. The minute these two meet you can sense the chemistry doing its work. Mr. Urch has the portrayal of a blind person down pat. A tall handsome young man with a beautiful stage voice, he speaks with poetic

preciousness, at the same time playing the character as crisp and self-reliant.

Miss Healy as Jill, the girl next door, is the freest of free spirits. A recent 20 vear old divorcée, (she was married for six whole days) she wrings laughs from the audience with clever one liners and marvelous timing. Her seduction of the blind boy is accomplished with saucy eccentricity and tantalizing sexiness. Just when it looks like the couple will live happily ever after.....the boy's mother shows up.

Played with steely reserve by veteran Playhouse actress, Michelle Neitzel, she meets and immediately hates the young girl, who happens to be in a state of delicious undress. Miss Neitzel's acting experience is on display as she jumps nimbly from shrewishness to emotional understanding. It's a pleasure to watch this fine actress.

Charlie Tyler appears competently and briefly as the boy's rival.

The production manager of the show is Bob LaSalle, who also did the lighting and set décor. Jim Suchomel and his crew built the set from a design created by Jim and director Strauss.

## Banyan Theater Company opens season with McDonagh hit

Banyan Theater Company's production of "The Beauty Queen of Lenane" is Irish tragicomedy at its best. There are moments that are horrific and other moments that elicit loud laughter.

The tragedy seems to be that Maureen Folan (Jessica K. Peterson), 40 something, is stuck as the lone caregiver for her 70year-old mother, Mag Folan (Kim Crow). Mag gives new meaning to the term "hypochondriac" and also to the term "princess" or, given her age, "Queen." Unable to leave her mother for very long, the daughter is like a prisoner in her home virginal for lack of opportunity rather than

by design.

On the other hand, the tragedy may be connected with the mental status of the daughter who has spent time in an asylum. That her mother likes to throw that in her face does not help.

Nor does it help that two married sisters seem to have washed their hands of these two mental misfits.

Into the mix steps Pato Dooley (Derry Woodhouse) and his brother Ray (Gordon Myles Woods). Pato seems to offer a way out for Maureen but, this is first and foremost a tragedy, so playwright Martin McDonough tossed in plenty of road blocks along the way. That Ray is not the brightest star in the sky and also ham-

pered by an inability to get rid of some long-held grudges, are signs of not only his intelligence but of what he might do or not do in certain situations.

Directed by Gil Lazier, the actors do a fine job of maintaining their Irish accents while also staying in character no matter what is going on or being said by fellow actors. Woodhouse delivers a fine and lengthy soliloquy of a letter he is writing to Maureen from England, finally, after bating around the bush for a long time, getting around to what might be construed as a proposal. When he sends this and some other notes off to his brother Ray for delivery, the future becomes fraught with

possibilities.

## Butte Folk Festival readies for second year

ASSOCIATED PRESS WRITER HELENA, Mont. — The lineup for the second National Folk Festival taking place in "Butte, America" July 10-12 stars about 250 singers, dancers and other artists, along with hoofed performers from all over Montana.

The three-day multicultural event, which is riding with a theme of Western horse culture, is expected to bring about 150,000 visitors — double the number visiting last year — to the old mining center nestled near the mountains of the Continental Divide. Plateau, Appaloosa and other Montana-bred horses will also be in attendance to prance in a parade and participate in arena demonstrations, from trick roping to draftteam driving.

The festival is in its second year of a three-year engagement with Butte, which was chosen over 22 other cities to host the event by the National Council for the Traditional Arts. Since 1934, the council has chosen 26 communities across the nation to present artwork and performances that celebrate

American folk

culture.

"This will be the only time the festival will be out West perhaps in our lifetime," said Barbara Miller, director of fundraising for the event.

Denver was the last Western city visited by the gala in 1966.

For its return to the West last year, thousands of dollars were spent reinforcing a headframe at a former mine yard turned 10,000-seat amphitheater that serves as the event's main stage. A marketplace was organized to showcase the work of Montana's Native American artists

and other regional crafts-people. And the arrival of an estimated 75,000 people revived the copper mining town's heyday as a major destination on the vaudeville circuit, when it attracted such marquee names as Charlie Chaplin, W.C. Fields and Clark Gable.

"Butte used to be called the Las Vegas of Montana. There were five train routes coming from all directions," said George Everett, the festival's director.

For this year's festival, 21

separate acts will be performing on six separate stages.

Although special attention falls to Western culture during its Butte incarnation, visiting artists will roll in from all over the country, bringing everything from the sounds of bluegrass and gospel, to Mariachi music, a Finnish kantele harp musician, and the traditional sounds of Balkan tambaritza as played by Eastern European immigrants in the Midwest.

Last year the festival cost an estimated \$1.4 million, but a survey completed by the University of Montana found it generated about \$8 million in revenues for businesses in the region, Miller said.

Organizers estimate they must raise about another \$200,000, of a total \$1.2 million, to stage the festival for the second time this year.

"This is the year of the great recession, so of course it's been a great challenge, but there's way more folks coming forward with smaller amounts this year," Miller said.

The fundraising crunch also eased a bit when the Montana Legislature approved spending \$200,000 in state money on the event over the next two years. And The Dennis and Phyllis Washington Foundation, which is funded by a group of companies headquartered throughout Montana, recently made a grant of \$100,000, which is 10 times what it contributed last vear.

The event also requires an army of close to 1,000 volunteers. Many of them contribute a four-hour shift and then set off to explore the festival.

"It's a great opportunity to have a great time in your own backyard and we're hoping people in the area will stop by on their way to Yellowstone and Glacier," Everett said.

## Sacha Baron Cohen's Bruno' is an equal opportunity offender

Among the narrowly focused special-interest groups poised to get lathered up over "Bruno" comic-critic Sacha Baron Cohen's new exercise in carefully calibrated bad taste — are Gays. Jews. Blacks. Wrestling fans. Austrians. Hamas. Ron Paul. People who watch daytime talk shows. People born south of New Jersey.

In his follow-up to the wildly successful and outrageous "Borat," Cohen has again made a movie whose notoriety precedes it. And which has the homosexual community feeling particularly anxious: "Bruno" title character, first seen on "Da Ali G Show," is a flamboyantly homosexual fashionista and seeker-aftercelebrity who wants to be "the biggest Austrian

superstar since Adolf Hitler." His sexual proclivities are extreme.

Arguably, it's Bruno's insatiable desire to maneuver his Teutonic self into the public eye that's really the heart of the film and its social criticism. And the release of the film, so close to Michael Jackson's death, is one of those weird convergences of fact and fiction. Jackson never had to seek out

fame, but judging by "Bruno," his brand of eccentric celebrity still serves as tropes for the attention-hungry including Jackson's sister LaToya, who was removed from a scene "out of respect for the Jackson family," according to a Universal representative.

In a way, the humor of "Bruno" is in a tradition of American humor that stretches back decades

and decades, to the Lower East Side in the North, to the Chittlin' Circuit of the South, and points in between. "I think it's important in life when you're dealing with the daily struggles of inequality that you take a second to sit back and laugh," said David Kilmnick, CEO of Long Island Gay and Lesbian Youth. "That's always been the medicine for those who've been oppressed."

## King of Pop completed video piece before death

ASSOCIATED PRESS WRITER LOS ANGELES — Two weeks before he died,

Michael Jackson wrapped up work on an elaborate production dubbed the "Dome Project" that could be the final finished video piece overseen by the King of Pop, The Associated Press has learned.

Jackson was apparently preparing to dazzle concert audiences in London with a high-tech show in which 3D images — some inspired by his "Thriller" era — would flash behind him as he performed on stage.

"It was a groundbreaking effort," said Vince Pace, whose company provided cameras for the shoot, a 3D system he created with filmmaker James Cameron.

'To think that Michael's gone now, that's probably the last documented footage of him to be shot in that manner," Pace said.

Two people with knowledge of the secre-

tive project confirmed its existence Monday to the AP on condition they not be identified because they signed confidentiality agreements.

They said it was a fiveweek project filmed at Culver Studios, which 70 vears ago was the set for the classic film "Gone With the Wind." Four sets were constructed for Jackson's production, including a cemetery recalling his 1983 "Thriller" video.

With 3D technology "the audience would have felt like they were visiting the 'Thriller' experience, like they were there," Pace said.

Shooting for the project lasted from June 1-9, with Jackson on the set most days. The project was in post-production, at the time of Jackson's death, and had been expected to be completed next month. It was not immediately clear what would be made of the video footage now.

Producer Robb Wagner, founder of music-video

company Stimulated Inc., did not immediately return a message seeking comment on the project.

Michael Roth, a spokesman for Jackson's Los Angeles-based promoter AEG Live, said he hadn't heard about the production but did not rule that it could be part of the company's contract with the entertainer.

According to one of the people with knowledge of the project, a willow-thin, pallid Jackson left a memorable impression on the crew, arriving in a caravan of SUVs with hulking security guards in tow. The person said **Jackson** introduced himself to workers on the set and walked with a spring in his step but at one point needed assistance as he descended steps off a stage.

Besides the cemetery, one set was draped in black with an oversized portrait of Jackson in his "Thriller" werewolf costume. Another set was designed to simulate a lush jungle, and a fourth

was built to replicate a construction site, with a screen in the back to allow projection of different backgrounds.

Taping took place in marathon sessions ending early in the morning. One scene filmed on the construction site set included scantily clad male dancers wearing carpenter's belts.

According to Stimulated's Web site, the company was hired to produce screen content for Jackson's planned comeback concerts in London. Stimulated has worked with Def Leppard and the Pussycat Dolls, and produced content for the Academy Awards and the Emmys.

Last year, U2 released the concert film "U2 3D," a film of the band's 2005-06 Vertigo tour, shot at several shows in South America with 3-D technology.

At the time, guitarist The Edge told The Associated Press the 3-D technology allowed "the songs to shine through."

## Allman Bros Band's 'Big House' to open as museum

MACON, Ga. — It's the place where the Allman Brothers Band founded their Southern rock sound, the place where the song "Ramblin' Man" was penned and the last place Duane Allman visited before dying in a motorcycle crash in 1971.

The Big House in Macon, where the band lived when its fame took flight in the early 1970s, has been the place music lovers flocked during pilgrimages to the South over the last few decades looking to experience a small piece of the Allman Brothers Band, Now, the three-story Tudor house where the band got its start is set to become a museum with the help of dedicated fans who have spent years collecting memorabilia and doing renovations.

The museum is scheduled to open in December with a fanfare expected to draw thousands from across the globe to this Georgia town to honor the band.

"We're just a big family," said Greg Potter, president of the Georgia Allman Brothers Band Association and one of the museum's organizers, as he stood in the Big House on a recent muggy afternoon. "This band has touched so many people, not just here in the U.S., but all over the world. This band started a whole

new outlook on music."

The museum will feature more than 300,000 pieces of memorabilia collected by Kirk West, the band's longtime photographer and tour manager everything from Duane Allman's jacket, which was draped over a guitar case next to his coffin during his funeral, to one of the Hammond Organs played by Gregg Allman. It will include posters, photographs and live recordings of the band with interactive computer terminals where guests can flip through digital photos and scan concert footage.

Duane Allman's bedroom will be decorated the way he had it when he lived in the house. On the top floor, the museum will hold music classes for school children, and outside will be a bandstand where musicians can put on shows, said West's wife, Kirsten West, the managing director of the Big House Foundation.

"It was never meant to

be just a house with a number of things hanging on the walls but to be active in promoting music in the community," she said.

For now, renovations are going, but a big sign in the front yard declares what it will be: "Allman Brothers Band Museum."

The project is a labor of love by a group of fans who wanted to commemorate the band's early days when communal living and sometimes bathing, based on the large sevenhead shower on the second floor of the house — made them not just a musical group, but a family. The majority of the renovations to the house have been donated — free windows, free roof, free paint, free landscaping by companies from across the country who employ Allman Brothers Band fans.

The 6,000-square-foot house, built in the early 1900s, became the band's home in 1970 after bassist Berry Oakley and his wife, Linda, rented it for the musicians and their families. They called it the Big House because it was larger than any other place any of them lived.

And it quickly became the center of the band's world — where they practiced, wrote songs and met before going out on tour. It's where the wives, girlfriends and children remained when the band

was on the road.

Some of the band's most famous songs were penned there, including "Blue Sky" and "Midnight Rider." It's where the band planned the famed 1971 show at the Fillmore East concert hall in New York City, a live recording that was later released as a double album — now considered one of the most influential records in rock history and one of the best live recordings of its time.

The band had moved to Macon in the late 1960s at the request of Phil Walden, former manager for soul singer Otis Redding and the brains behind the Macon-based Capricorn Records, the core of the Southern rock movement. They lived at the Big House until 1973 when they were evicted, another blow after the deaths of Duane Allman and Berry Oakley, who both died in motorcycle crashes a year apart in the same Macon neighborhood.

The group split up in 1976 after personality conflicts and drug abuse damaged the family-like atmosphere they'd developed at the Big House. The band eventually reunited in 1989 with some new members and has been touring and recording ever since.

"It was right after we left the Big House that everything kind of started drifting away from music

and we started focusing more on being rock stars," said drummer Butch Trucks, who never lived in the house but spent enough time there to call it home. "Little by little, it led to 1976 when we finally said, 'This is silly. It's time to stop.' I think leaving the Big House was part of that."

The house changed hands over the years from a beauty parlor to a lawver's home — and eventually fell into disrepair until it was bought in 1990 by the Wests, who dreamed of creating a shrine to the band. The couple lived there 15 years, entertaining more than 20,000 fans from Japan, Germany and Finland who wandered by to get a

glimpse of Duane's bedroom or sit where the band held jam sessions.

Members of the Allman Brothers Band would stop by, too, when they were in town, looking for a jaunt down memory lane or to jam one more time in the place that provided so much inspiration.

"There were several places we made our base, but nothing was like the Big House," Trucks said. "A lot of incredible things happened there. I remember walking around one morning and (band member) Dickey (Betts) was sitting there at the kitchen table. I could hear him humming this sound, and it turned out to be 'Ramblin' Man."

## Gatorz is a popular place for long and 'happy' hours

atorz is, as its name suggests, essentially a bar and grill, with a friendly and good-looking wait staff.

The interior is dominated by a large center bar with low lighting, bar stools, some tables, and the usual neon beer ads as the primary décor.

Outside on the pleasant porch there are more tables, some bar-high with bar stools and several with regular chairs, and the corner bar is smaller, but just as busy.

Here are gatorz (spelled with a "z") everywhere: in a fountain, in pictures, in statues, and carved on benches outside in the garden. The "z" also shows up in the menu to remind you where you are.

There is a long list of appetizers, or "Gaterizerz," ranging in price from \$2.50 for a taco to \$9.99 for crab cakes. Since their buffalo wings are a popular choice, we decided to share an order

of 10 "naked" (not breaded) going for the extra 95 cents to get drums only (\$7.94). We thought Pot Stickers (\$5.99) would be a good contrast but, like the wings, they were deep fried. They had a rich filling and an Asian sauce. The wings were hot and crispy. We tried two sauces (\$.50 extra), an interesting Terivaki and the Hot, which was not as hot as he likes, but good.

There are a half-dozen other sauces and, on Tuesdays and Wednesdays, the wings are 25 cents each when ordered with a drink.

A monthly menu lists daily lunch and dinner specials. He decided to try the special Angus Beef Cheeseburger (\$6.99, normally \$7.99), and she

was intrigued by the house salad (\$6.69) served in a garlic tortilla shell and garnished with fruit and "nutz."

The burger was served on an onion roll, a good touch, with a mild cheese, sliced tomato and onion, lettuce, a tiny bit of coleslaw, and pickle. It was large and meaty and cooked medium as he prefers even though he was not asked. He also got an order of sweet potato "friez" (\$2.29). Her salad was covered with shredded cheese and black olives, and the fruit and nuts turned out to be

a trail mix including chocolate chips.

Since the desserts are not made here, we decided against them although "Fried Cheesecake" (\$3.99) may have been interesting.

Although we would have thought that most customers come for the drinks and company more than for the food, there was clearly a soft drink/iced tea crowd enjoying lunch.

Later on in the evening, with daily entertainment and drink specials, Gatorz is a very popular place for long and "happy" hours.

## Recession adds to challenges for suburban arts

ASSOCIATED PRESS WRITER WHITE PLAINS, N.Y. —When he hired Itzhak Perlman as artistic director of the Westchester Philharmonic in 2007, Joshua Worby thought he'd hit a grand slam.

He figured that Perlman, a popular, world-famous violinist, would attract new subscribers, raise the reputation of a suburban orchestra just outside New York City and spur fundraising by 40 percent.

"That's the way we projected it," said Worby, the Philharmonic's executive director, "and most of it came true."

Sure enough, attendance doubled. Perlman said he was "extremely happy." Even one category of fundraising, donations from individuals, went up 25 percent.

Then the economy tanked, corporate giving dried up and the orchestra ended the 2008-09 season with a deficit instead of a surplus.

Orchestras, theaters, museums and other arts organizations in the nation's suburbs face the challenge to attract customers — and donors — from the same population going to the Chicago Symphony, the Smithsonian or Broadway plays.

With the recession cutting into corporate and government funding and making Americans cautious about their spending, the groups are working harder to promote their small-town advantages — especially an easier commute and cheaper ticket prices.

"You can see a show at

our theater for what you would pay for parking downtown," says Terry James, executive director of the Marriott Theater in Lincolnshire, Ill., 35 miles outside Chicago, "Our average price is \$30, our top ticket is \$45. Our parking is free." And attendance is booming.

Producers warn. however, that convenience and low prices in the suburbs won't be a draw unless quality at least approaches what's available in the city.

"The appeal of the Westchester Philharmonic — and this is probably true of suburban orchestras throughout the country includes the ease with which you can get to us, afford the tickets, park, get in and out," Worby said. "But it's a slippery slope because you can't fool audiences if your product is substandard. Manhattan is just 20 miles down the road."

Perlman agrees. "Convenience is just icing on the cake," he said. "Nobody is going to say, 'I don't care what I listen to as long as it's close."

Outside San Francisco, the Berkelev Symphony also stresses convenience.

"We do play that up, that you don't have to drive across the Bay Bridge and pay your \$4 toll or whatever or take a BART train," says spokesman Kevin Shuck. "But part of our message to the Berkeley audience is that you don't have to go to the San Francisco Symphony to get high quality."

The Berkeley has also built a reputation as a champion of 20th century music under Kent Nagano, not hassling with the who has just stepped down after 30 years as music director. Shuck said attendance was up 6 percent in Nagano's final season and the orchestra is hoping that excitement over new music director Joana Carneiro will keep attendance, corporate support and donations from dropping.

In Chicago's suburbs, musical theater is a major enterprise, with full-time professional theaters north, south and west of the city, all selling convenience unashamedly and all heavily subscribed and apparently recession-proof.

The 900-seat Marriott Theater, which is part of a resort and turns a profit, has almost 40,000 subscribers who see five musicals a vear.

"We have not seen a dip in recent years, even after 9/11," James says. "But we know it's discretionary income and we know we can't just throw junk out there for people to see. I think our reputation stands up to downtown."

He says there's plenty of room for the suburban theaters, even when city theater is flourishing.

"If 'Wicked' is playing downtown, that's going to be competition," he says. But a show like that would also draw thousands of new theater customers, "and a lot of these new customers live in the suburbs," he said.

Kyle DeSantis, who runs the for-profit Drury Lane theater in Oakbrook Terrace, Ill., says convenience plays a role in the theater's success, where he says attendance is up.

"People like the idea of

driving and paving for the parking," he says. "But I'd like to hope the quality of the productions also brings people in."

He said it's possible the lower-priced suburban theaters could even benefit from the recession, but added: "If there's a hit, a show people want to see, people tend to pay whatever it costs."

At the nonprofit Theater at the Center, 35 minutes from downtown Chicago in Munster, Ind., artistic director William Pullinsi says sales have been going up for three years.

The theater's only bow to the recession is to lower prices for next season, Pullinsi said.

"We haven't been as dependent as most nonprofits are on contributions," he said. "I've been hearing from other people in the nonprofit sector that that money has taken a hit."

That was certainly true for the White Plains Performing Arts Center. which established a nonprofit musical theater 22 miles from Manhattan in 2007 and nearly got through two seasons before it had to cancel "Hello, Dolly!" this spring.

The theater had 1,100 subscribers and seven productions "and then the economic sky seemed to fall in all around us," board Chairman John Joris said. "We lost a lot of our corporate and municipal support."

He has retrenched. however, and expects to announce a new season shortly, confident that musicals can sell in the

New York suburbs.

"Our tickets are less expensive than Broadway and we're attached to a building with a parking garage in it," he said. "I

think parking is \$3. A big part of our audience has said they'd rather come to us than go to New York if they have a valid reason to do that."

## No petting allowed

Petting the cats at Big Cat Rescue in Tampa is not allowed. it matters not if you are a visitor, a volunteer or the founder of what is considered the world's largest sanctuary for big cats.

Within its fenced and gated site are lions and tigers and panthers and some smaller cats such as servals and bobcats but none so small as domestic housecats. Many of the felines at Big Cat Rescue are retired circus performers. The tigers that once belonged to the world's great animal trainer, the late Gunther Gebel-Williams of Venice are there, living in their own separate but equal cages. Their upkeep is paid for by the Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Circus, in which Gebel-Williams starred. As tigers are generally one-man animals, when illness forced the retirement of Gebel-Williams, the circus arranged to send his cats to Carole Lewis, Big Cat Rescue's founder.

It was there that those tigers, who had been born in captivity, finally learned to swim. Lewis arranged to have a small pool in each of their caged areas and, despite the doubts of the circus experts, each of the former circus performers has since learned to swim.

But not all of the cats at Big Cat lived such happy and interesting

lives. That has been found to be a key to their longevity in contrast to cats raised in the wild, which have the shortest lives and even to those in zoos, which live longer than animals in the wild but still not as long as those in the better circuses such as the Ringling show, Lewis told me when I first met her years ago. Sadly, animals are not treated so well in every circus.

The remaining animals at Big Cat came from people who tried to keep them as pets, abandoned animals and a few that were confiscated from drug dealers.

Cute as young lions and tigers and leopards may be, when they grow up, they are likely to do far more than simply scratch the furniture.

The best thing to do is simply sponsor a cat at Big Cat. Whether you donate \$25 or \$5,000, you will be money ahead on saved furniture alone and you will know you have helped sustain the life of one of these magnificent creatures. Consider that it takes \$100 to feed a tiger for one week.

Food is not all they get. From toys to neutering of the males and lifelong medical care, their needs are met. Most even have their own pools and enjoy spinning their exercise balls in them.

Volunteers handle nearly all the work at Big Cats, which helps to hold costs down. The volunteers lead tours, clean cages and feed the animals.

All these workers must be doing something right for the animals there do seem to be living longer. Shatia, a female Canada lynx that died recently, arrived at Big Cat with a heart condition yet still managed to live until the age of 16, dying peacefully in its sleep in its private area.

A serval named Esmerelda has been thriving at Big Cat Rescue 1995 when it was 3.

Big Cat also has done well with its Bobcat rehabilitation program. Several of these Florida natives have been released back

into the wild.

There are five ways to tour Big Cat Rescue. Children under 10, accompanied by an adult guardian, may come only at 9 a.m. Saturday mornings, The price is \$15 per child 9 and under and \$25 per person for those 10 and older.

Daily, there are 90 minute tours for those 10 and older beginning at 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. Saturday, the tours begin at 9:30 a.m., 11:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. The cost is \$25 per person. Call 813-426-5948 for reservations.

Friday and Saturday, there is a feeding tour at dusk, by reservation only. The cost is \$50 per person. Limited to those 10 and older, visitors accompany volunteers on their feeding rounds.

those 10 and above will go behind the scenes to see the keepers hand out enrichment treats and food puzzles and do some training. This tour is offered Saturday at 2 p.m. and also on the last Friday of the month at 2 p.m.

A special night tour for those 10 and older is offered at \$50 per person and only by reservation. Call the number above.
