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**HEAVY WIND STORM
REPORTED ON FRIDAY**

REACHED VELOCITY OF 40 MILES
AN HOUR AT NEWBERRY.

Was More or Less Severe as Far
South as Morriston, But No
Damage Reported.

A terrific wind-storm was reported Friday from Newberry and points south by subscribers along the line of the East Florida Telephone Company.

From Newberry it was learned that at one time the wind reached a velocity of fully forty miles an hour, but fortunately no buildings were blown down, and the only damage reported was the felling of a few trees.

Montbrook and Williston sections also suffered in this way, but at Montbrook the wind seemed to be a little stronger than further up the line. The wires in this section were damaged and nothing could be heard regarding the fury of the gale there.

In and around Gainesville the rain was more severe than the wind, and the people generally were glad to see the rain, regardless of the ill effects that it may hereafter cause, about the only disagreeable feature being the muddy streets.

Colder weather is anticipated, but it is not thought that we will have anything like a freezing temperature.

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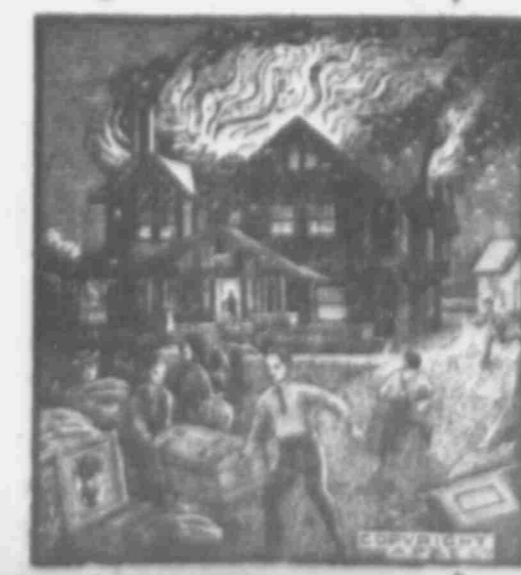
