YOUR GARDEN This Week

Time to Dust Corn To Combat Borers

The adult moths of the European corn borer are on the wing and have laid eggs on the underside of the young corn leaves, warns Eric H. Peterson, Jr., assistant agricultural agent of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Four dustings of five-day-insecticide type just as new growth starts, are recommended. Dust is causing the wilting and death of applied so that it will settle in the top shoot, often in each crochets of the leaves and the branch. The result is that dormant growing point or whorl of the stem buds start and the plant takes on where the newly hatched larva or a bunchy, dwarfed appearance. No present treatment is to try to less than two nozzles to the prevent entrance of the insect. Adults emerge usually about June 10, and this year it may be a little earlier. They start to lay eggs almost at once, and the corn is to have some material present that will kill the young ones as soon as they hatch.

Usually the time to spray is governed by the emergence of the adults, by examining the tips of the trees frequently, this can be determined by the presence of the pupae in the whorls. If these are seen, on about June 10 to 15, spray with DDT. If you use the 25 per cent emulsion (not for household use) — use two to three gallons of solution per acre. If you can get only the 50 per cent wettable powder, use one-fourth ounce in three gallons of water. Spray thoroughly and repeat the spray in about two weeks.
