Martin Luther King

If you are beginning to have a sense of living in apocalyptic times, don't blame your own excessive imagination.

The troubles and turmoil, the nightmarish acts and deeds and situations which keep thrusting themselves across our murky skies seem to be increasing in number and in pace and in the way they threaten to interlock with one another into one great final destructive

The assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, the man of peace, the man of on-violence, is ironic, terrible tragedy in itself, and in its ramifications. The shattered flesh and blood of this one good man-as good a man as any human being ever gets to be-illustrates the measure of the journey the principle of non-violence still has to go. At the same time, it raises, all across the country, in every community, that same temperature toward violence he was trying to restrain, he was trying to substitute for.

Somewhere in the human heart there has to be the answer to nightmare, the before it is too late, the will to do the individual little something positive which may help build a people's dam against the wild-rising waves of unreason, of

We do not have many Martin Luther Kings to contribute to the cause of our own salvation, our own possible survival as a free and decent people.

Last night, from every network, the burning eloquence, the dedicated passion of this man came powerfully, hauntingly, into millions of American homes, every great and gallant word ringed with the fire and flame of his death

think that in every home there was some portion of a resolve toward alliance with the spirit and purpose of Martin Luther King.

A Wisconsin Convenience

We had always respected Wisconsin, from a distance, as one of our most ivilized states, a sort of Athens of the Mid-West, but we never knew how refined and thoughtful a system of living it had devised for itself until we happened to be watching the returns in the presidential primary on the evening of

That was our first information that the system of primary voting in Wisconsin is considerate enough of the potential judgments and emotions of its voters to provide a special lever on which the voter may register his or her vote as being in favor of "No One Of These."

Examine, for a moment, the subtlety of this convenience offered the voter. The voter who felt that way could just

Or he could go to the polls and, if he found no one he wanted to vote for on he printed ballot, go through the procedure of writing in some name of his

But neither of these procedures could satisfy the precise instincts of a certain

He would be a fellow who felt it a part of good citizenship to make the actual physical journey to the polls and perform the actual rite of voting.

He would find himself powerless make an affirmative decision in favor of anybody the political parties were offering him, and yet he would feel neither the energy nor the capacity to go out and drum up some more worthy candidate of his own.

So, in Wisconsin at least, he can go nto the voting booth, give an especially savage and forceful yank to the "No One of These" lever, and thus deliver is warning to the nation's political sys-

fast if it ever expects him actually to vote for somebody. Not too surprisingly, there were in Wisconsin, on both sides of the primary, several thousand voters who found that the "No One Of These" place on the ballot was the precise place they want-

ed to use.

Illusions of "Happiness" There is a juxtaposition of discoveries in the news which sends all kinds of warning signals tingling up and down

One discovery comes from a survey o the U.S. Public Health Service, which studied happiness and came up with a number of conclusions. One is that healthy people are happier than sick people, which is not necessarily true because sick people at least have some abiding, consistent interest in life, which is to receive attention. Another conclusion of the survey is that people with money are happier than people without money, and there are all kinds of philosophical retorts to that one, too.

But the conclusion which seems most questionable to us, and most alarming when taken in conjunction with another discovery also in the current news, is that educated people are happier than uneducated people. This we would wish to refute on all

counts. The more one knows the more discontented one grows with the way the area of what one doesn't know has kept expanding. The wider one's potential capacity for understanding, the larger the byrinthian puzzle from which one never emerges with any clear and final solution. The supposed proper study of mankind is man, but the more one studies man the more cynical and distillusioned and bitter one becomes.

Such miseries are the fruits of becoming, at one's peril, an educated person. Some group of euphorians must have

Bad luck, then, to that scientist now in the news who says that a proper selection of chemicals judiciously administered will soon be able to raise the intelligence of human beings to whatever level may be desired.

This discovery raises the illusion that such an easy way to intelligence could thrown in, the infallible formula for har piness. But heaven knows how much more misery we could create for ourselves if we were any smarter than we

This is the reason he gives for withdrawing. And what he is confessing then -in action if not in words -is his feeling that he, personally, has contributed to that division. He is saying in effect that he thinks some one other than himself can do better in healing the division, can better give the country the kind of leadership which Mr. Johnson himsel wishes for this country.

The President's action is, therefore, confession of failure; not necessarily a failure in his policies, which he plainly still believes in, but of failure in himself as a political leader of the nation, He is saying that while he might fight, and win, the next election the cost of hat political battle might be to open

greater wounds in the country.

With this confession of failure it is difficult to quarrel. There is not only Vietnam, which has grown worse no better during his term, but the social reakdown, the rioting in the streets the erosion of our foreign alliances and the near breakdown of our monetary system. If they are not all due to Johnosn policies, none have been ameliorated by his actions. And beyond these specifics, the President has clearly not succeeded in giving the people the confidence that can, and will, offer the leadership

It is never possible to praise a man for failure. But if it turns out that this is the end of Lyndon Johnson's public career, we expect the sad ending will still earn him a high place in the his-

The Vote in Bolton To the Editor,

At first glance the vote in the recent referendum in Bol-ton considering Project Concern-type programs indicates a preference on the part of th voters to remain isolated from social action programs, Forty per cent of the voters were in layor of the proposition that Bolton should become involved while sixty per cent were op-

Upon reflection, however, the vote shows a rather surprising affirmation of support for the program. One factor which must not be overlooked in anslyzing the outcome, is the strong inherent tendency of people to resist any change specially where it is not read apparent that the change will benefit them directly. Historically, social programs are proposed first by the

called "bleeding-heart intelled tuals", then gradually gain ac ceptance among the better edity, and finally, alowly, the bulk of the people (if it is a sensible and needed program) come o realize the need. This process goes fastest where the people can easily forsee how they will benefit (as in the case of Medicare) and slowest where if takes some thought to see how the program will benefit the community as a whole (as in the cases of air and water pol-

Unfortunately the process sometimes proceeds so slowly that considerable damage is done and the resulting program costs more than it need have. The school building program which we in Bolton have just approved by a wide margin is an example of where costs have multiplied because of the re luctance to change, but finally it became apparent to all that change was necessary. It is not readily apparent to

all (especially the old-fash ioned thinkers or non-thinkers) that a social action program such as Project Concern can b not only moral, but beneficial to everybody in the long run and consequently the accept ance is slow, but it is snowballing. Ten years ago people would have laughed. Five years ago it would have been defeated by a tremendous margin. But today almost half the voters of Bolton have indicated their understanding of and desire to participate in a Proj ect Concern-type program. This is especially encouraging when we consider further that Bolton is a traditionally conservative town and, in addition, in the same referendum we were aaked to vastly increase our outlays for educational facilities. It is also important to note that Concern was spontaneously circulated by the high school stu-
