Student Impact

- 968 full-time (from 2015 census)
- 95% of first-year students were in the top quarter of their high school class
- 96% live on campus in one of Scripps' 10 residence halls
- Just over 70% work on-campus and nearly half report working part-time offcampus

Academic Impact

Scripps Experience Impact

- More than 80% of Scripps students hold at least one internship, and nearly 1 in 4 report completing three or more. Companies and organizations Scripps students have interned with include Amigos de las Americas, Merrill Lynch, Los Angeles Times, Women's Action to Gain Economic Security (WAGES), and Warner Bros.
- Nearly 60% of students choose to study abroad in 120+ approved programs

- Capstone Day, formally adopted as a Scripps tradition in 2009, is a day each May when the entire Scripps community comes together to celebrate and showcase the accomplishments of the Senior class.
- Leadership opportunities: Scripps Associated Students (SAS) is the student governing body of Scripps College, and in Scripps Clubs and Organizations (CLORGS) women hold every student leadership position on campus: government, clubs, organizations— and even on Board of Trustees committees.

Consortium Impact—The Claremont Colleges

The Scripps experience is amplified by the Claremont consortium, a group of five prestigious undergraduate and two graduate institutions where more than 5,000 students call home. Students have the opportunity to choose from more than 2,000 courses and 65 majors.

Through the consortium, students have access to:

- 5 swimming pools
- 4 fitness centers
- 7 dining halls
- 12 playing fields

Support Impact

- Scripps College meets 100% of admitted students' demonstrated need
- More than half of Scripps students receive financial aid through grants, scholarships, work study, and loans
- Average student debt upon graduation is \$18,692—Scripps ranks among top 25 national liberal arts colleges with least debt, according to *U.S. News & World Report*
- IDEA: As part of its ongoing focus on strengthening a campus-wide culture of inclusion, in 2013, Scripps College established the IDEA Initiative, a comprehensive plan to align resources, programs, and events to advance inclusion, diversity, equity, and access throughout the Scripps community.

Graduates Impact

- 95% of alumnae five years out,* who responded to an alumnae survey, indicated that they are satisfied or very satisfied with their Scripps College education (*based on survey responses of alumnae from Classes of 2010 and 2011 to the HEDS Alumni Survey administered in 2016)
- Nearly 92% of graduating seniors*, who responded to a survey, would recommend Scripps to others (based on survey responses of Class of 2015 seniors to the HERI College Senior Survey in 2015)
- 20% of Scripps graduates pursue graduate or professional degrees within their first year of graduation

- Scripps graduates attend top national graduate schools, including the University of Chicago, University of Michigan, Duke University, Vanderbilt University, and Massachusetts Institute of Technology
- More than 50% of Scripps graduates begin work full-time within three months of graduation

U.S. News & World Report

Scripps College ranks 23rd on the *U.S. News & World Report* annual rankings of America's Best Liberal Arts Colleges for 2017. Scripps ranks high—22nd overall—among high school counselors surveyed. Counselors were asked to rate schools based on their insights and knowledge, in addition to their views of each college's academic record, curriculum, faculty, programs, and graduates. In addition, in 2016 Scripps College was ranked 24 as a National Liberal Arts College with the least debt.

Top-tier placement by *U.S. News & World Report* is measured by key factors such as academic reputation, selectivity, and faculty resources. Assessment of data from several national liberal arts colleges are gathered from each college and used as indicators of academic excellence.

Kiplinger's Personal Finance

Kiplinger's Personal Finance ranks Scripps College as #34 among the Top 100 Best Values in Liberal Arts Colleges in the U.S. for 2016. Kiplinger assesses value by measurable standards of academic quality and affordability. Quality measures include the admission rate, the percentage of students who return for sophomore year, the student-faculty ratio, and four-year graduation rate. Cost criteria include sticker price, financial aid, and average debt at graduation.

Forbes

Forbes magazine ranks Scripps College one of America's top colleges, with an overall ranking of 83 in its Top Colleges 2016 list. Scripps comes in at 14 in the national publication's Top 25 Western Colleges list, 69th in best private colleges, and 40 in Liberal Arts Universities.
