#### Common name

Chinese Photinia

## **Family**

Rosaceae

#### Where found

Naturalised. Mainly Sydney area. Widespread elsewhere but not common.

## **Notes**

Introduced shrub or tree to 12 m high. Leaf margins with fine to saw-like spiny teeth. Fruit fleshy. Young shoots and leaves copperred, slightly hairy, soon hairless. Leaves alternating up the stems, 8–14 cm long, 20–70 mm wide, hairless, upper surface glossy dark green, lower surface yellow-green. Flowers white, with 5 petals each 3–4 mm long. Flowers in many-flowered clusters. Fruit red, almost round to oval, 5–6 mm in diameter.

Family was Malaceae.
