

PLANTS FOR PORTLAND AREA MEADOWS + PRAIRIE GARDENS

There are many options for planting a meadow or prairie in your Portland garden:

- **Turf Alternative Meadow** – *occasional water, annual mow, no fertilizer*
- **Oregon Wildflower Meadow** – *annual Western Oregon wildflowers for pollinators*
- **Willamette Valley Prairie Garden** – *native Willamette shortgrass prairie plants*

Turf Alternative meadow

Establish a patch of grassland by seeding and/or planting plugs of a single species or variable amounts of several; interplant native bulbs and tubers for seasonal color. After establishment, trim or high mow annually in late summer to early fall.

Carex tumulicola (**foothill sedge**)

Deciduous & rhizomatous sedge for sunny mesic soils

Danthonia californica (**California oatgrass**)

Semi-deciduous grass for sunny mesic to xeric soils:
Self sowing after establishment

Festuca rubra ssp. *commutata* (**chewings fescue**)*

Shade tolerant non-native semi-evergreen bunchgrass for mesic/xeric soils

Juncus tenuis (**slender rush**)

Part-shade tolerant deciduous rush for mesic soils;
Self sowing after establishment

Oregon Wildflower Meadow

Sow a mix of annual Western Oregon wildflowers for a temporary meadow or overseed areas planted to widely spaced perennials. Some annuals will self sow the following year.

Plant a site appropriate selection of native Willamette Valley grasses and wildflowers.
