Before spending any funds secured under these Acts, the agency or institution shall certify its efforts to the Board of Public Works and state the reason for any failure to obtain federal funds. If federal funds are obtained, they shall be used to defray the costs of the project described in these Acts, not to expand its scope.

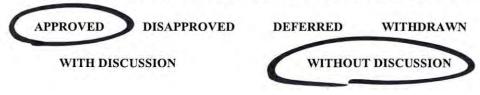

Historic Annapolis Foundation (HAF) - Fiscal Year 2010 Grant Funds

Recommendation:. That the Board of Public Works approve an amendment to the grant agreement between the State and the Historic Annapolis Foundation that will permit grant funds authorized by the fiscal year 2010 Budget Bill to be disbursed. The 2010 Budget Bill contains a grant of \$507,000 for Historic Annapolis.

Background: The State of Maryland owns historic properties in the City of Annapolis. To ensure prudent stewardship of the State's historic properties, the Board leases to HAF certain premises of historical significance in the City of Annapolis including the William Paca House and Gardens, the Shiplap House, The Barracks, and The Found House. For more than 30 years, the Board has given grant funds to HAF annually to assist in the operation, maintenance and management of the leased properties. The grant funds are appropriated from the State General Fund. The Board approved a grant agreement with HAF on June 21, 2006 (Sec. Agenda 13-\$686,000).

9. MARYLAND DEPARTMENT OF THE ENVIRONMENT

Recommendation: That the Board of Public Works approve further funding to the Town of Delmar for the Delmar Wastewater Treatment Plant Biological Nutrient Removal (BNR) and Enhanced Nutrient Removal (ENR) Upgrade and Expansion project in Wicomico County (Legislative District 38B). This project involves multiple sources of funding which are being provided over several years based on project schedule.

- A. New Grant up to \$2,000,000 American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (WQSG08-528-23L)
- B. Grant Increase up to \$2,344,000 Bay Restoration Fund (BR-NR 01.23)

Project Description:

The proposed project entails planning, design and construction of Biological Nutrient Removal (BNR) and Enhanced Nutrient Removal (ENR) facilities at the existing 0.65 million gallons per day (mgd) wastewater treatment plant to achieve effluent concentration goal of 3 mg/l for Total Nitrogen and 0.3 mg/l for Total Phosphorous. In addition, the plant will be expanded to 0.85 mgd. The BNR upgrade will be funded at the existing plant capacity of 0.65 mgd, while the ENR upgrade will be funded at the ENR approved design capacity of 0.85 mgd.

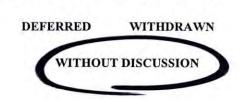

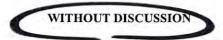

The Secretary of Natural Resources recommends that the Board of Public Works approve the naming the Maryland portion of the Great Eastern Trail and Overlook at Green Ridge State Forest in honor of **FRANCIS ZUMBRUN**, a forester for the Department of Natural Resources since September 20, 1978.

During his career Francis Zumbrun has been a tireless promoter of scientific forest management. He used Green Ridge State Forest, an approximately 46,000 acre mixed oak forest in Allegany County, to demonstrate ecologically sensitive management techniques.

Francis is very aware of the value of forest recreation to bring citizens into the forest providing an opportunity to educate them. He has gone above and beyond his assigned forest management duties to get the Great Eastern Trail, a trail that will one day be comparable to the Appalachian Trail, to be routed through Green Ridge State Forest. The trail now crosses the forest from the Potomac River to the Pennsylvania State Line.

Few foresters have the vision, drive and dedication that Francis Zumbrun has demonstrated in his over 30 years of service --- he has served Maryland well.

For this and the remaining energy lease projects under the Master Lease, Contractor has agreed to return to the original interest rates it bid based on the percentage (discount) of 10-year Treasury Notes.

In order to proceed in the financing and construction of the State Police project at an appropriate rate of interest, to lower the State's cost of energy financing, and to avoid additional delays and the costs associated with such delays, the Treasurer recommends approval of the second amendment. Background: Reference is made to Open Space (Department of Natural Resource Rural Legacy Program) Agenda Item 5A (October 4, 2000) in which the Board approved the release of grant funds for easement acquisition from the Rural Legacy Fund. The Maryland Environmental Trust (MET) and Lower Shore Land Trust (LSLT) co-hold the easement in the Coastal Bays Rural Legacy Area. The easement permits one (1) primary residence and one (1) size-restricted non-residential hunting lodge, with approximate dimensions of twenty four (24) x forty (40) feet. The hunting lodge existed at the time of the Rural Legacy Program easement sale. In 2005 MET discovered that the hunting lodge had been enlarged such that the structure no longer met the size-restriction. The new owner, Bayview Road, LLC, enlarged the hunting lodge without the consent of MET and LSLT. This action violated the terms of the easement. The MET Board of Trustees found: (1) the violation did not negatively impact the conservation values of the property; (2) the Amendment will bring the violation into compliance with the easement and; (3) the Amendment does not negatively impact the conservation values of the property.

An assistant attorney general has reviewed and approved the amended Rural Legacy Deed of Conservation Easement for legal form and sufficiency. The Board of the Maryland Environmental Trust and the Rural Legacy Board recommends ratification by the Board of Public Works. (Estimated Value: \$0 – the amendment will have no effect on the conservation values of the original easement; the amendment does not eliminate a reserved right which would have an effect on valuation)

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: A notice of the availability of the Request For Proposals (RFP) was advertised on *eMarylandMarketplace.com* and the Department of Veteran's Affairs website. Copies of the solicitation notice were mailed directly to ten prospective vendors, four of which are Maryland firms, and included three MBEs. A copy of the notice was also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

Three proposals were received in response to the RFP. However, only two proposals were deemed reasonably susceptible of being selected for award. The third vendor was rejected for failure to submit proper MBE documentation. Award is recommended to HMR of Maryland LLC (HMR), the incumbent, as having the more advantageous offer for the State. HMR had the higher technical ranking and even though its price is just over 3% higher, its technical superiority was determined to outweigh the difference in price.

Besides operating the Charlotte Hall Veterans Home for the past seven years, HMR also operates five additional veteran's homes and 21 other skilled nursing and/or assisted living homes in North Carolina South Carolina, Georgia and Alabama. The combined capacity of the 27 homes, including Charlotte Hall, is 3,241 beds.

DVA's Charlotte Hall Veterans Home ("Home") was established for the purpose of operating and managing a home for veterans of the State of Maryland. The Home is located at Charlotte Hall, St. Mary's County, Maryland and is now licensed for 184 assisted living beds and 278 comprehensive care (nursing home) beds for a total of 462 beds. The Home is open to honorably discharged Maryland veterans who have served in the armed forces of the United States, and are of retirement age or are unable to work due to a disability recognized by the Veterans Administration or the Social Security Administration.

The Award Amount and the Financial Offer amounts are different. The Financial Offer amount is based upon an initial one year price to operate the Home at weighted resident occupancy levels from 250 to 462. The RFP limited the price for all future contract years to the percentage of the Consumer Price Adjustment change over initially this first year price, and subsequently each succeeding year's price. The current census level of 394 residents, which has been as high as 402, is expected to increase over the base term of the contract to around 430 residents with an

estimated 3% CPI increase from the second through the fifth years giving the requested approval amount of \$155 million.

For the two-year renewal option period, the requested approval amount of \$68 million is based upon the approximate 430 census and a 3% CPI for each year. If the census is more of less than 430 residents and the CPI is more or less than 3%, the actual amount of funding for the contract will vary. If additional funding is needed, the request for funding will be submitted to the Board of Public Works for approval.

After reviewing the availability of qualified subcontractors in the sub-contractible areas of transportation, housekeeping, laundry, dietary, facility maintenance and security, a 20% MBE participation goal was established for the RFP due to the isolated location of the Home (approx. 40 miles from Washington, DC and 70 miles from Baltimore) and finding a qualified workforce is a challenge for both the prime and its subcontractors. However, HMR has committed to 21.1% MBE participation.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: A notice of the availability of the Request for Proposals (RFP) was not advertised on *eMarylandMarketplace.com* (eMM). Copies of the RFP were mailed directly to four prospective vendors, one of which is a Maryland firm and one is an MBE. A copy was also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

This is the second RFP for these services due to problems with the first solicitation, requiring the solicitation to be cancelled and reissued. MIA did not realize that the second solicitation also needed to be advertised on eMM, since the vendors directly solicited were the only vendors who responded to the first solicitation. Because of this omission, MIA is requesting that the Board of Public Works (BPW) approve the contract as voidable per COMAR 21.03.01.03.A because (1) all parties have acted in good faith; (2) ratification of the procurement contract would not undermine the purposes of Title 21; and (3) the violation was insignificant or otherwise did not prevent substantial compliance with Title 21.

Three proposals were received in response to the RFP; all three proposals were determined to be reasonably susceptible of being selected for award. As per the terms of the RFP, one contract is being awarded. Award is recommended to Prometric because it has been determined to be the most advantageous offeror to the State with the overall #1 ranking.

Prometric's technical proposal was ranked #1 with the best experience and the best understanding of the project. Prometric had the second lowest financial proposal. Even though Prometric's financial proposal was almost 13.5% higher than the lowest priced offer, the technical superiority of Prometric's proposal was judged to outweigh the difference in price. Included as part of the technical evaluation is the fact that Prometric is a Maryland firm was judged to provide greater economic benefit to the State.

The Maryland Insurance Administration (MIA) issues licenses to individuals and firms to act as insurance producers. The resident individual insurance producer (licensee) must complete 16 continuing education (CE) credit hours every two years in order to renew the license, as required by Section 10-116 of the Insurance Article, Annotated Core of Maryland. Legislation effective 10/1/2009 will increase the number of CE credit hours needed for license renewals to 24 and mandated that three CE credits must be in Ethics along with other changes in tracking and issuing licenses.

ITEM: 2-S (Cont.)

The scope of work anticipated under this Contract will include, but is not limited to the following services:

- CE Course Approval and Audit Requirements: Review, evaluation and approval of all CE courses, instructors and providers;
- CE Credit Reporting: Provide secure electronic means for CE providers to report attendees (licensees) of CE courses;
- CE Banking of CE Credits of Licensee: Provide a web-based system which will be updated daily for banking the CE credits of the licensee and provide access to the reported/banked CE credits of the licensee;
- CE Compliance: Determine whether each licensee has or has not met the CE requirements and provide 90-days notice to the licensee if the required CE credits have not been met; and
- IT Work Requirements: Maintain a master database of the approved CE courses, providers and instructors to be updated daily; maintain a database of the reported and banked CE credits for individual licensees to be updated daily; and transmit the CE datat to the MIA on a daily basis.

CE Course providers are responsible for submitting applications for the CE courses and reporting roster entries for the CE credit hours to the Contractor. The Contractor invoices the providers based on the number of new course/renewal course applications being submitted and by the number of roster entries for licensees per credit hours per course being reported.

The Financial Proposal and Award Amount are based upon the Fixed Unit Prices for different types of CE course approvals – new, out-of-state, or renewals and the Fixed Unit Prices for different types of CE credit hour reporting – paper or electronic roster entries multiplied by the estimated number of courses and/or credit hours that would be needed to perform the services. The estimated courses/credit hours are based upon the history of courses/credit hours. The Award Amount is slightly higher than the proposal amount due to the contract start date being estimated in the RFP as May 1st and is now August 1st. With the new legislation starting in October 2009 requiring more courses to be completed for the license renewals, the prices are higher to accommodate the increase in courses for more months during the base contract period than if the contract start date was in May.

MIA established a 15% MBE participation goal for this contract; however Prometric requested a 2% waiver. MIA determined that a good faith effort was made to acquire MBE participation, and therefore granted the 2% waiver and accepted the 13% commitment from Prometric.

A total of nine bids were received in response to the IFB to perform the forensic toxicology drug testing on collected specimens. Phamatech, Inc. had the lowest bid and was determined to be a responsible bidder. Therefore, award is recommended to Phamatech, Inc.

The State of Maryland has been testing applicants and employees for the illegal use of drugs since 1990 to assure its citizens that State employees are not impaired by the illegal use of drugs in the workplace. This practice ensures compliance with the Federal Omnibus Drug Abuse Act of 1988 ("Federal Act") which requires any State receiving Federal funds to establish a drug-free workplace.

The Federal Act also requires the State to have a policy on the use of substances, an employee awareness program and a procedure for employees to report their own convictions. The State conducts testing in seven different situations and for a panel of seven illegal drugs. The contractor will provide all labor, materials and equipment necessary for the transportation and testing of urine specimens.

In accordance with Executive Order 01.01.1991.16 and Code of Maryland Regulations (COMAR) 17.04.09, all applicants for employment in designated sensitive State job categories, as well as State employees in the same sensitive categories, must be tested to detect the presence of illegal drugs in their urine. In addition, any employee for which there is reasonable suspicion of using illegal drugs must be tested. The bulk of the sensitive positions that require testing are Correctional Officers and other personnel of the Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services (DPSCS).

All specimen collections take place at designated collection sites at State and local government facilities throughout the State.

An estimated 6,317 specimen collections and subsequent drug tests will be performed each year. The price bids were evaluated based upon a model used in the IFB for evaluation purposes. The *Award Amount* above is estimated based on the projected amount of collections and subsequent lab tests which were used in the financial evaluation model. Since this is an indefinite quantity, fixed unit price contract, the contractor will be paid for lab testing services based on the actual amount and type of services provided and at the unit prices that are fixed in the contract.

There was no MBE goal established for this contract for the following two reasons: (1) there is a need to strengthen the legal defensibility of the chain of custody of the samples being collected and tested by having as few vendors as possible involved in these contracts; and (2) there are no sub-contracting opportunities in conducting the lab tests. Two bids were received in response to the IFB. Both bids were determined to be responsive and the bidders are responsible. The IFB stated that awards would be made to all qualified bidders; therefore award is recommended to Interim Physicians, LLC, the incumbent, and Jackson & Coker.

Vendor comments were received from two companies expressing their regards in not submitting bids. One vendor stated the specifications were too restrictive/too risky and the insurance requirements were prohibitive. The second vendor stated its firm seeks to provide agencies and facilities with permanent professional positions not temporary help.

The Thomas B. Finan Hospital Center (Center), located in Cumberland, Maryland, is an integral part of the Mental Hygiene Administration Service Delivery Systems of the State of Maryland. The Center is one of a network of facilities administered by the Mental Hygiene Administration, Maryland Department of Health and Mental Hygiene. The Center is licensed for 119 psychiatric inpatient beds and currently operates three 22 bed units and a 22 bed Assisted Living Unit for a total of 88 patients.

Accordingly, Prometric was ranked highest technically and its technical superiority was judged to outweigh the difference in price.

Additionally, Prometric's proposal was fully conversant regarding the intricacies and complexities of the DLLR electronic examination requirements and has an impeccable record of customer service, timeliness of turnaround time and resolution of problems. The company is quite cognizant of the critical nature of the business and previous volume of the licensees that requires testing in the barber and cosmetology business.

The Contractor shall provide dental services to youth residing at the Victor Cullen Center (VCC). Youth to be served are males, aged 12 to 20, who are adjudicated delinquents and committed to DJS. VCC has a maximum daily population of 48 male youth. The average length of stay is nine months with a range of six to 12 months. All youth are expected to have a dental examination within 30 days of admission and are to receive timely care for dental problems that are identified.

Dental services are critical to the State in order to protect the health of youth in the care and custody of DJS. The youth are receiving dental examinations and routine dental care, as needed. These youth are often diagnosed with unmet and complicated dental needs. The contract provides for up to eight hours of dental care every two weeks depending on the number of youth requiring services and the level of care required.

Dentrust Dental Maryland P.A. is currently providing quality dental services at the Charles H. Hickey School.

Since VCC opened 7/1/2007, dental services have been provided through Small Procurements until the current IFB was developed, approved, issued and awarded for a long term contract. Dentrust Dental was awarded the first small procurement contract for 6½ months and John K. Taylor/St. Francis Dental had the second small procurement contract for the past year and four months. The contract with John K. Taylor/St. Francis Dental ended on 5/31/2009 and it would not extend the contract for two months in order to bring the new contract to the Board of Public Works for approval. So, Dentrust Dental was willing to do a two month purchase order for June and July 2009 totaling \$6,864.00.

A 5% MBE participation goal was established to provide dental supplies and equipment.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS:

This contract provides investment management services for the MSRP Stable Value Fund. The contractor is a Plan fiduciary and manages this pool of assets as one of the investment options for the participants of the Maryland 457 Plan, 401(k) Plan, and 401(a) Match Plan. The Stable Value Fund, also referred to as the Investment Contract Pool, is currently valued at about \$750 million.

As is customary in many investment manager agreements, the fees for this stable value arrangement are paid out of earnings or assets of the Stable Value Fund. These charges are invoiced and monitored through the Board of Trustees' staff and payment initiated through the third-party administrator (currently Nationwide Retirement Solutions, Inc. of Columbus, Ohio.)

The Maryland Supplemental Retirement Plans (MSRP) Board of Trustees (the Board) has general oversight authority and responsibility for the above-mentioned Plans. MSRP enables State employees and teachers to participate in voluntary, tax-favored retirement savings plans. The Board has ongoing authority for (1) reviewing plans administration performance and results, and (2) assisting with employee communication materials, and (3) meeting tax, securities, and various other regulatory promulgations and requirements of administering the Plans.

It is in the best interest of the State to exercise this two-year renewal option. The fee arrangement on this contract includes a decreasing scale that reduces total percentage cost as the asset size if the managed investment grows. Recent increases have exceeded projections, lowering the effective total fee rate to about six and three-quarter basis points (0.0675%). Contacts to several other state government supplemental retirement plan sponsors confirmed that they are paying comparable scaled fees for similar services. MSRP's investment advisor consultant has confirmed that the fee arrangement is a competitive arrangement as written. In addition to costs, recent financial turnoil and credit market difficulties are best managed by the incumbent who has performed more than satisfactorily.

MSRP expects to publish a RFP around October 2010 to present the award of a new Stable Value Manager contract in January 2011.

An 8% MBE participation goal was established for the MBE subcontractor to invest 8% of the total assets. To date the MBE has been investing 11.3% of the assets or \$85,200,000 of the \$729,099,986 total assets.

Currently, the Fee for Service (FFS) Preferred Drug List (PDL) is maintained by the vendor on the EpocratesTM Formulary Listing Service software. This inclusion provides the prescribers with a comprehensive and accurate resource of all covered medications under the Maryland Managed Care and FFS programs and reduces unnecessary denials and delays for the recipients in obtaining their much needed medication. In addition, it will continue to improve medication compliance with the Managed Care Organizations (MCO) and FFS formularies, hence allowing for long term savings on effective, yet less expensive medications.

Health Information Design (HID) provides technical and administrative support and acts as the executive secretariat to the Drug Utilization Review (DUR) Board as required in the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act (OBRA) of 1990. The objectives of this Contract are for HID to: (1) Perform retrospective DUR analyses; (2) Manage the State DUR Board; (3) Provide advice and recommendations to DHMH for DUR related educational and administrative interventions; and (4) Provide oversight and evaluation of the DUR programs in the Medicaid fee-for-service, managed care, and mental health programs.

It is in the best interest of the State to exercise this two-year renewal option with the current vendor to enable continued administration of pharmaceutical services provided to the Maryland Medicaid recipients and the providers that serve them and also to keep in compliance with Federal regulations. In addition, continuity of the current vendor's services ensures that ongoing cost containment efforts remain in place for prescribers to have comprehensive and accurate information provided through the EpocratesTM Formulary Listing Service software that is maintained by HID.

HID also agreed to reduce the price paid by the State for the renewal option. This renewal option price is \$23,525 less than the modification renewal option amount approved on the 2/27/2008 DBM BPW Agenda, Item 7-S-MOD.

The Department has finalized the procurement and has submitted Item 7-S on this Agenda with an award recommendation; however the new examination rates proposed by the recommended awardee will be increased \$5 for each test category in the new contract. These new fee amounts must be changed in regulations. The normal length of time needed to process a regulation change is four months; therefore this extension will allow time to complete the regulation change process.

This contract requires performance of a broad array of services relating to licensing examination development and administration on behalf of the State Board of Barbers and the State Board of Cosmetologists. The two Boards regulate 50,000 licensed practitioners, salons and shops.

There are no direct payments from the State to the contractor under this contract. Instead, the contractor collects a specified per candidate fee from each candidate which fully covers all services provided by the contractor. Fees are \$45 or \$75 per candidate depending on the category tested, and whether a full or partial exam is being administered. As listed in Item 6-S, these fees will increase to \$50 and \$80. The average number of exams per month is expected to be 600 during the extension of this contract. The monthly value of exams is expected to be \$30,000 per month.

Services ("Department"), through the Office of the Attorney General (OAG), requests approval to enter into a settlement of all claims against the Department as the sole defendant in *Kim V. Williams v. Department of Public Safety & Correctional Services*, U.S. District Court, District of Maryland, Civil Action No. JFM-08-2956. This case involves a claim of gender discrimination (sexual harassment) and retaliation brought pursuant to Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 by an employee of the Department's Division of Pretrial Detention and Services.

REQUESTING AGENCY'S REMARKS: The plaintiff, a female Correctional Maintenance Officer, alleges that she was subjected to gender discrimination and a hostile work environment created by the conduct of at least nine of her male co-workers while she was employed in the maintenance shop at Baltimore City Detention Center from July of 2004 until May of 2007. Plaintiff made her first complaints of sex harassment in May of 2005. In May of 2007, the Department's Equal Employment Opportunity Division sustained Plaintiff's allegations of a hostile work environment. The proposed settlement requires the Department to pay Plaintiff \$65,000, inclusive of attorneys' fees. Plaintiff would dismiss her case with prejudice and release all claims against the Department, the State and its employees arising from the events described above.

The members of the Maryland Transportation Authority met on April 22, 2009 and formally approve the terms of the proposed agreement and also this request to the Board.

The Maryland Transportation Authority and the Office of the Attorney General recommend that the Board find that the Officers were neither grossly negligent nor malicious in the performance of their duties and approve this settlement to be paid from the State Insurance Trust Fund under §12-404, §12-405, §12-406, and §12-501 of the State Government Article.

The above referenced action arises out of the arrest of Plaintiff, George Spicka, on 10/11/2006 at his home in Woodlawn, Maryland. The arresting officers were Detectives Aaron Chapman and Jeffery Stewart of the Maryland Transportation Authority Police Force. This case also involves the search of Mr. Spicka's home after his arrest and subsequent announcement to the media of the details of the arrest. DVA's Charlotte Hall Veterans Home ("Home") was established for the purpose of operating and managing a home for veterans of the State of Maryland. The Home is located at Charlotte Hall, St. Mary's County, Maryland and is now licensed for 184 assisted living beds and 278 comprehensive care (nursing home) beds for a total of 462 beds. The Home is open to honorably discharged Maryland veterans who have served in the armed forces of the United States, and are of retirement age or are unable to work due to a disability recognized by the Veterans Administration or the Social Security Administration.

The estimated amount of funding needed for the two one-month extensions is approximately \$5.0 million; however, the total estimated contract amount of \$169,741,622 for the base contract, option period and one-month extension period will not have been exceeded as of the end of the current contract term on July 31, 2009. It is estimated that approximately \$11.5 million of spending authorization will be left on the contract, which will more than cover the amount needed for these two one-month extensions.

Under the provisions of §7-213(a), State Finance and Procurement Article, the Governor, with the approval of the Board of Public Works, may reduce, by not more than 25%, any appropriation the Governor considers unnecessary.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: The Backup to this Item, for the Board's approval, is the Governor's list of reductions for fiscal year 2010, by Department and Independent Agency. Consistent with the provisions of §7-213(b) of the State Finance and Procurement Article, no appropriations have been reduced for the payment of the principal and interest on State Debt, public schools mandated funding (including the School for the Deaf and the School for the Blind), or the salary of a public officer during the term of office. No reduction exceeds 25% of the appropriation.

Reversion amounts and fund balance transfers are shown for informational purposes for the General Assembly, the Judiciary and Executive Branch agencies. These reversions will not be part of the reductions to be approved by the Board. These reversions were agreed to by staff of each of the departments.

The Backup sets out the total amount of the reductions for each Agency. These reductions will result in the elimination of 57.5 State employee positions, of which 39.0 are currently filled. The Backup also lists the positions to be eliminated.

REMARKS: The Board of Nursing initially contracted with System Automation, Inc. as the result of the award of an RFP for a licensing database in 1995. The licensing database moved the Board's records from the Annapolis Data Center and the mainframe to a client server environment using Oracle as the database engine. This system was called the Nursing Information System (NIS).

NIS provided the ability to issue and renew nursing licenses and track complaint and rehabilitation issues for nurses. The Nursing Board was able to do away with a number of manual tracking processes and maintain more efficient and effective records by using the database. All licenses were printed at the Nursing Board's office rather than off site which allowed for better control of the process. Bubble scanning was implemented at approximately the same time. All renewal applications were scanned and the file imported into NIS for renewal and printing.

In 1997, the Nursing Board moved to an imaging system using handwriting recognition software and with workflow. This system was integrated to work well with the licensing database and both systems have continued to thrive. In 1999 the Nursing Board was mandated to begin certifying nursing assistants as of January 1, 2000. DHMH moved to a more generic version of the licensing database called License 2000.

A Waiver of Priority and Subordination Agreement. Vesta Enteka, Inc. has a financing agreement with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) with the condition that the State agrees to subordinate its right of recovery to HUD's first deed of trust in the amount of \$945,300.00. The mortgage amount includes \$906,035.00 for acquiring the properties and \$39,265.00 for renovations.

REMARKS

*Matching funds for this project are being provided partly by a HUD 811 mortgage. As part of the process in applying for a HUD loan, HUD required Way Station, Inc., the sponsoring organization, to form a project team. The team included a developer (Vesta, Inc.), an architect (Zemaitis & Associates Architects), and a contractor (Trionfo Builders, Inc.). The team, along with a HUD representative, inspected the identified properties and developed a scope of work as a result of the findings. Once the scope was determined, the general contractor bid out each of the individual trades to develop a project cost.

Before HUD approved the loan, it also required Building Consultants, Inc. of Columbia, MD. to prepare an independent cost analysis of the proposed project budget. Based on this review, Building Consultants has certified that the costs are reasonable for the proposed scope of work. Trionfo Builders, Inc. was chosen to participate in the project team based upon prior experience in rehabilitating Vesta properties.

Vesta Enteka, Inc. is a newly formed nonprofit for the specific purpose of purchasing and renovating the two buildings. HUD regulations require that project sponsors form separate nonprofit corporations to own and operate projects funded under Section 811 of the National Affordable Housing Act of 1996. The sponsor, Vesta, is a provider of mental health psychiatric residential and rehabilitation day services to individuals with serious mental illness.

In accordance with Subtitle 6 of the Health-General Article of the *Annotated Code of Maryland*, the Board's approval is further contingent upon the State's right of recovery being included in the Deed(s) or otherwise recorded among the Land Records of Prince George's County.

No State funds will be disbursed until after such time as the loan recipient has presented suitable evidence to the Comptroller that it has expended its portion of the required matching funds for the project.
