2020 was indeed a strange year but botanists are a resilient lot and although many field meetings were cancelled, individuals or small groups of botanists throughout Wales were still actively recording with the discovery of many exciting natives and neophytes in new places. Elsa Wood and I were gratified by the response to our request for records for the BSBI Bulletin Cymru section and enjoyed reading of the notable finds from Anglesey to Breconshire.

In my own vice-county of Monmouthshire several of us have been out together regularly especially once lockdown ended in May and I am also privileged to be able to visit land belonging to new members of our local Meadows Group. The Group started back in 2003 before meadows became more fashionable, we are able to offer all members a free initial survey and management advice. Despite Phase I surveys and many grassland surveys by the local wildlife trust, it is amazing that many new sites worthy of SSSI status and certainly Local Wildlife Site status continue to surface. In 2020 several such grasslands were found hidden away on various smallholdings as in the Cas Troggi and Trothy valleys and also high on the slopes of the Blorenge.

I must congratulate my Vice-county Joint Recorder, Elsa Wood and also, Meadow Group members Jon and Marilyn Dunkelman, who have done a vast amount of work in 2020 producing a revised second edition of their excellent grassland fungi book. Waxcaps, pinkgills and spindles are always a joy to find and usually denote good quality flower-rich grassland too and in Elsa and Jon's book all are beautifully illustrated and described. If you haven't a copy already you really should buy one. They are available from NHBS (the Natural History Book Service).

Editorial

I know you will echo my hearty congratulations to Dr Steph Tyler on being awarded the honour of MBE in the Queen's New Year's Honours List for services to nature conservation in the UK and Africa. After her PhD at Cambridge, Steph went to live first in the UAE and then in Ethiopia and other African states, carrying out various ornithological researches. In the 1980s, back in this country, she settled in Monmouthshire, working for the Gwent Wildlife Trust and then the RSPB, becoming its Wales Conservation Officer. She researched and co-wrote, the

standard volume on Dippers, together with numerous authoritative papers highlighting the impact of acid rain and forestry on water quality, insects, as well as the Dipper, in the Welsh uplands. At that time, acidification in the uplands became a major concern and Steph was instrumental in bringing the facts into the open that subsequently brought about essential environmental improvements.

She has also been and remains very active in the voluntary conservation world including her continued work for the Gwent Wildlife Trust and has been involved in local ornithology since settling in the county, including serving on the Committee of the Gwent Ornithological Society, as BTO Regional Rep and as coorganiser and author of both Gwent breeding bird atlases. She was a trustee of the Welsh Ornithological Society and editor of the WOS' journal, *Birds in Wales*, culminating in 2015, when she won the WOS Lifetime Achievement Award. She is also Chair of the Monmouthshire Meadows Group – indeed it was Steph who was the inspiration behind the formation of the very successful Carmarthenshire Meadows Group which has led to similar groups being formed in other counties.

Over the past few years BSBI's Welsh activities have benefitted from Steph's prominent role as Chair of the BSBI Committee for Wales and, of course, she has been, and continues to be, very active as Joint Vice-county Recorder, with Elsa Wood, in recording the Monmouthshire flora, whilst also continuing to encourage and mentor local BSBI members. Her constant and consistent energy is reflected in the number of articles she produces for the Welsh Bulletin.

Steph is such a modest person, but, over the years, has influenced many aspects of nature conservation, as well as many people, both in Wales and in Africa. Despite my prior knowledge of her involvement in many aspects of conservation, a brief look online highlighted more of her achievements which I for one, feel humbled by. I'm sure you will agree that she fully deserves this new honour.

In addition to Steph's contributions to this Bulletin, we have accounts of botanical recording in 2020 in Anglesey and Breconshire. We also have an article by Tim Rich on the status of *Hieracium prenanthoides* and Chloe Griffiths' account of progress with the *Nature in our Village Project* in Aberystwyth. The final article is Dave Barden's summary of his detailed work at Llantrisant Common culminating in the publication of his very authoritative book which I can thoroughly recommend. This issue concludes with the second part of the 2019 Welsh Plant Records.

I and my co-editors, wish all members and friends a Happy New Year and hope that we are all soon able, once again, to get out into the field to carry-on recording without restriction.

BSBI Wales Annual Meeting and AGM Bangor (v.c.49)

Friday 2nd - Sunday 4th July 2021

The 2021 BSBI Wales Annual Meeting, exhibition and AGM together with the associated field excursions will be based at the Reichel Hall, Bangor University, Ffriddoedd Rd, Bangor LL57 2TW. Accommodation will be in *en suite* single-occupancy rooms.

Chairman's Report 2019/2020

I am only sorry that I cannot welcome you all in person to our 58th AGM in Wales. Circumstances however, sadly dictate otherwise. I very much hope that you all have survived lockdown and have managed to get out and botanise during this strange period. I very much regret to say that Margaret Perring who attended and enjoyed the last Welsh AGM, has died not from Covid 19 but from a long illness.

My report will understandably be very brief but I would like to draw attention to the fact that our Wales Officer, Barbara Brown, has very reluctantly had to leave her post, entirely because of the lack of funding. We are grateful to NRW for the funds that enabled Barbara to be in post for 16 months but we do need longer-term commitments as in Ireland and Scotland from the statutory conservation bodies. I did write to Clare Pillman at NRW on 25 March this year but as yet have had no response. Barbara did an amazing job in the short time she was with the BSBI and

we would love to have retained her as the Wales Officer but wish her well in her future life.

Since the last AGM your Committee for Wales had held two committee meetings, in October 2019 in Newtown and in early March 2020 in Aberystwyth just before lockdown was imposed. We were delighted to co-opt two new members at the March meeting. Firstly, Chloe Griffiths, who organises the Aberystwyth Botanical Society and is a key player in 'The Nature of our Village' project at Penparcau in Ceredigion. Hieracium prenanthoides in Wales

Hieracium prenanthoides Rough-leaved hawkweed is a rare species in Wales. It is easily distinguished as a tall hawkweed with many stem leaves with clasping bases, small flower heads with densely glandular involucral bracts and peduncles, and pale seeds.

In Wales, it was mapped in four hectads by Sell & West (1968), in three hectads by Rich & McCosh (2011) and in two hectads in Rich & McCosh (2018). To clarify its status in Wales further, I have now undertaken a more detailed study combined with field work and summarise the details of the three localities below, all of which occur in two hectads in v.c.42 Brecon.

Tarren yr Esgob (SO23)

Augustin Ley first found *H. prenanthoides* in Breconshire on 25 September 1874 on "mountain cliffs, near Llanthony, in plenty, though on a very restricted spot, about a rill of strongly petrifying water" (BM, CGE) and he cultivated and distributed duplicates in 1877 (CGE). A second specimen collected at Tarren yr Esgob on 25 August 1880 was added to the 1874 specimen and annotated "growing with *Rosa spinosissima* (Scotch Rose) and *Geranium sylvaticum* (Wood Crane's-bill) and a mountain form of *Poa nemoralis* (Wood Bluegrass) for about 15 yards of the cliffs which was quite golden with the bloom" (CGE). Ley also collected it on 12 August 1903 (BM) and from the 'highest part' 17 September 1907 (BM). As far as I can interpret, all these records refer to one site in hectad SO23; hectad records for SO22 arose from plotting the location as 'Llanthony' rather than Tarren yr Esgob.

On 21 September 2014 whilst collecting *Sorbus stenophylla* (Llanthony Whitebeam) fruit, I found a patch of *H. prenanthoides* about 1 m long on a narrow ledge difficult to access which agreed with Ley's description but I did not take exact details. On 30 August 2020, I went to count the population but could not re-find my 2014 plants. Instead, I found three plants (one vegetative, one in flower, one in fruit) over 20 m on a steep, tiered, slippery cliff face adjacent to *Rosa spinosissima* and *Geranium sylvaticum* immediately south-east of the obvious tufa waterfall at SO23833153 (see image 2 on page 3). This was clearly Ley's site; further searches at peak flowering time in mid-summer will probably reveal more plants.

Craig Cwm-du, Senni Valley (SN92)

H. prenanthoides was first recorded on 'Craig-du' by A. Ley on 13 June 1893 (BM), and again on 24 July 1899. B.A. Miles recorded it from the east end of the cliffs at

SN948213 at 520 m altitude on 22 August 1964 (CGE) and G. Motley, M. Porter and T. Rich recorded as frequent on rocks on 22 July 2004 (NMW).

On 31 July and 26 August 2016, I carried out a more detailed survey when collecting seed for the Millennium Seed Bank. Four subpopulations were found with a total of about 50 plants (10+ plants on eastern-most low crag at SN94912148; 20-30 plants on low crag east of main face at SN94712133; 10 plants over 30 m at the east end of the main cliff face at SN/94612130; 6 plants on the main cliff face by a big larch tree SN94492128; K; see image 3 on page 3). The removal of sheep has benefitted much of the flora of the National Nature Reserve and allowed the development of many flowers and herb-rich ledges.

Craig Cerrig-gleisiad (SN92)

There are records of *H. prenanthoides* for Craig Cerrig-gleisiad (c. SN9621) by W. A. Shoolbred on 16 August 1894 (NMW) and by R. M. Harley in July 1961 (NMW). I have not re-found it in eight visits looking for *Hieracium* since 1999 though there is plenty of suitable habitat.

Discussion

Hieracium prenanthoides is currently known in two out of three Welsh sites, with a good population at Craig Cwm-du. I have not traced any records for hectad SN82 (Sell & West 1968). The sites are at the southern limit of its distribution in Britain, though it occurs widely in the European mountains to the south.

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Filago minima (Small Cudweed) in eastern Monmouthshire

Filago minima (Small Cudweed) is not a common plant in Britain and Ireland, where Preston et al. (2002) noted that it was undergoing a continuing slow decline. Its Welsh strongholds from the New Atlas were in the vice-counties of Glamorgan and Monmouthshire. In Glamorgan it is still quite frequent on old spoil tips especially in the Neath Port Talbot area (Julian Woodman, in litt.). In Monmouthshire, Evans (2007) reported the species from 56 tetrads, the majority (46) of these being on coal waste in the west. Two more tetrads were at industrial sites near Newport, six scattered in the southern part of the vice-county including MOD Caerwent and two in the east in SO40Z and SO50E.

F. minima is still quite common on old coal tips in the west of the vice-county although, since 2000, it has been found in only 27 coalfield tetrads as well as in two more tetrads in industrial areas near Newport. However, it does appear to have declined in the vice county possibly because so many coal tips are now too well vegetated. None have been found recently in Wentwood or in MOD Caerwent or, despite searches, in the two eastern tetrads noted by Evans (2007). There are post 2000 records however, from two 'new' eastern sites in one tetrad, SO50D near Trellech.

The Trellech Plateau between Monmouth and Chepstow is capped with Quartz Conglomerate (pudding stone) overlying normal sandstone layers of the Old Red Sandstone. Much of this acidic rocky, former heathland on the plateau was planted with conifers in the 1950s/60s and more recently two areas (Beacon Hill and Broadmeend) have been restored as heath although birch scrub has rather taken over.

Many of the forest tracks are well vegetated, shaded or covered with limestone chippings with various calcicoles such as *Blackstonia perfoliata* (Yellow-wort) growing along them but very few areas have open, bare, sandy or gravelly substrate. Two tracks on Beacon Hill do still boast this habitat and there, localised species such as *Aira praecox* (Early Hair-grass), *Ornithopus perpusillus* (Bird's foot) and *Spergularia rubra* (Sand Spurrey) occur sparingly. One other excellent bare open sunny area of sand and gravel is at a former quarry on Trellech Hill. This quarry, with its steep slopes and dips, is a favourite area for motor-bike scrambling which has resulted in much of the quarry being kept as bare sand and gravel with scattered patches of Eared Willow (*Salix aurita*) and *S. cinerea* (Grey Sallow) and

hybrids, *Betula pubescens* (Downy Birch) scrub and heather and deep ruts and pools.

On 15 August 2008 I found several plants of *Filago minima* in the Trellech Hill quarry at SO504069 at the edge of the bike tracks where lichen, mosses and other plants were growing. I also noted several plants of *Carlina vulgaris* (Carline Thistle) which seemed strange on such an acidic substrate. On 10 September 2013 I again noted about five *F. minima* plants as well as other dry, acid-loving species such as *Senecio sylvaticus* (Heath Groundsel). Elsa and Adrian Wood visited the quarry on 29 June 2014 and noted about 25 plants of *F. minima*.

On 24 September 2013 I found about 24 small plants of *F. minima* along a dry gravelly track on Trellech Hill near a car park at SO508063, uphill from the Trellech Observatory. This colony persisted for another year or two but I haven't seen any there since.

On 23 July 2020 I returned to the Trellech Hill quarry with two botanist friends, Anne Griffiths and Lauri Maclean, specifically to look for *Filago minima* and ensure it was still there. Almost as soon as we climbed up a track into the quarry Lauri found a single large plant on a sparsely covered bank among *Fragaria vesca* (Wild Strawberry). Further exploration of the quarry revealed at least four areas close to bike tracks where there were numerous small plants of the cudweed. One patch had over 200. Other species growing with *Filago minima* were *Aira praecox, Rumex acetosella* (Sheep's Sorrel), *Sagina procumbens* (Procumbent Pearlwort), *Luzula multiflora* (Heath Wood-rush), *Aphanes arvensis* (Parsley-piert), much *Hypericum humifusum* (Trailing St John's-wort), *Veronica serpyllifolia* (Thyme-leaved Speedwell), *V. officinalis* (Heath Speedwell) and *Centaurium erythrea* (Common Centaury). We estimated that there were in excess of 300 plants of *F. minima* in the quarry in July 2020.

In slightly better vegetated areas, we found two flowering *Carlina vulgaris* plants and two old flower heads from the previous year. Apart from on limestone in the south-east of the vice-county and on western hills the only other site in the east of v.c.35 for *C. vulgaris* was at Craig y Dorth in SO4909 in June 2014 (SEWBReC Wildwood consultancy record), in the tetrad SO40Z mentioned by Evans (2007) for *F. minima*. In damper areas in the quarry there were a few plants of *Epilobium brunnescens* (New Zealand Willowherb) and in water-filled pools abundant *Lythrum portula* (Water Purslane); these two species are more associated with the west of the vice-county.

Filago minima appears to have a healthy population at Trellech Hill quarry and so long as the quarry is kept disturbed and open by motorbikes, this small annual should persist there. Sadly, Filago vulgaris (Common Cudweed) has virtually disappeared from the east of the vice-county, the last record being of one weak plant seen by Mark Kitchen and Trevor Evans on 16 July 2000 by a small parking area north of Cotland, Trellech at SO511048. I saw it there that year but, despite searches, not since. It is still locally abundant on the MOD Caerwent base in two tetrads along roads and the old railway line; elsewhere in v.c.35 it has been found post 2000 in eight tetrads in the coalfields of western Monmouthshire. Evans noted it in just three western tetrads, in the two at MOD Caerwent and the Trellech tetrad SO50C, so possibly this species has actually increased.

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Monmouthshire 2020 noteworthy botanical finds

Local walks by some members and meadow surveys continued this spring and summer in Monmouthshire v.c.35. Rewards included a new hectad record for *Schoenoplectus lacustris* (Common Club-rush), found by Steph Tyler (SJT) in SO4214 in a pond in the Afon Trothy catchment. Another new hectad record was a colony of about 200 *Epipactis palustris* (Marsh Helleborine) that Lee Gregory found at Garn Lakes in SO2210 in the west of the vice-county. Over 1,100 *E. palustris* were also seen by Martyn Jones at a known site at an old steelworks (former Alpha Steel) near Newport in ST3384.

Osmunda regalis (Royal Fern), considered by Evans (2008) as extinct in the vice-county, continues to turn up at new sites in the Coalfields. Until 2020 there were three records by Elsa Wood, Adrian Wood and me from coal tips and two more along streams that may have originated from gardens. In late June 2020 one plant was found by Steve Williams in acid flushes on a coal tip on Mynydd Varteg (SO2507) (see image 13 on back page) and another on a coal tip at Canada Tips, Blaenavon (SO2410).

Centaurium pulchellum (Lesser Centaury) was in the Monmouthshire Rare Plant Register but we now have 13 post 2000 records for it so it has been demoted. It is however, always a joy to find it and Elsa Wood (EW) and SJT in July 2018 found numerous plants in part of King's Wood near The Hendre. This year it was not relocated in the same area but elsewhere in King's Wood, Anne Griffiths (AG) recorded it in July; a subsequent visit on 30 July by EW, SJT and AG revealed a minimum of between 450 and 500 plants over an extensive area along forest tracks in three monads in SO41R and SO41W.

Lauri Maclean re-found *Eleogiton fluitans* (Floating Club-rush) in a drying pond in Chepstow Park Wood in SO4897, where Dave Green and SJT had seen it in 2010. It is surprisingly rare in Monmouthshire with only one record given by Evans (2007) in a reen on the Gwent Levels. There is an unsubstantiated record too from marshy grassland at Big Pit, Blaenavon in 2004.

Heather Colls (HC) has been tackling the identification of *Hieracium* (hawkweeds) and she has found or re-found plants of *H. cambrense* (*stenstroemii*) and *H. grandidens* (Grand-toothed Hawkweed) in Tintern (SO5200), over 100 *H. subaudum* (Autumn Hawkweed) near Trellech, *H. exotericum* at Troy (SO5011) and *H. consociatum* at Skenfrith Castle (SO4520).

At the Blackcliff (ST530988) Dave Green, when looking for whitebeams (*Sorbus* sp.) in the lower Wye Valley found a new site (and new tetrad) for *Hypericum montanum* (Pale St John's-wort). He noted about 8 plants. Other new tetrad records included *Nitella flexilis* s.l. (Smooth Stonewort) found in a lake at Llanover House by EW & SJT (SO3108), *Barbarea intermedia* (Medium-flowered Wintercress) found by Heather Colls near Treowen (SO4610), *Setaria pumila* (Yellow Bristlegrass) by Mike Ogden near The Bryn ((SO3209), *Erigeron acris* (Blue Fleabane) by AG at Tyla quarry (SO21K), *Linum bienne* (Pale Flax) by Steve Smith in a field near Lasgarn Wood (SO2704) (see image 10 and 11 on back cover) and *Sorbus torminalis* (Wild Service-tree) by SJT along Offa's Dyke near Great Hendre Farm (SO4612).

EW and Adrian Wood reported that the patch of *Diphasiastrum alpinum* (Alpine Clubmoss) at Canada Tips, Blaenavon first recorded by Steve Williams in July 2017, has spread substantially to cover several square metres.

The lack of regular mowing by the local council has been a bonus for many plants including 36 *Anacamptis morio* (Pyramidal Orchids) on a verge in Monmouth (SO5102) and a wonderful display of *Pimpinella saxifraga* (Burnet-saxifrage) flowers at an ironworks site (usually mown as a lawn) in the Angidy Valley near Tintern (SO5100). The spring of 2020 was an odd one for orchids with many people

reporting very few orchids, especially *Dactylorhiza fuchsii* (Common Spotted Orchid), in their meadows. Jan Winder however, counted over 12,000 *Anacamptis morio* (Green-winged Orchid) at New Grove Meadows, a Gwent Wildlife Trust reserve near Trellech (SO5006/07). A previous count in 2012 by members of the Monmouthshire Meadows Group was of only 5,000 plants.

In March Sam Bosanquet found gametophytes of *Trichomanes speciosa* (Killarney Fern) at several small rocky watercourses in woodland in SO5309 at Penallt. He also found *Ornithopus perpusillus* (Bird's-foot) at the Kymin near Monmouth on 21 November, the ninth post 2000 record for this species in v.c.35, and many plants of *Cynodon dactylon* (Bermuda-grass) by a wall near Monmouth library on 13 November.

Postscript

In late September AG, LM and SJT had some more hectad records for ST39 and SO30 by Llandegfedd Reservoir. *Panicum dichotomiflorum* (Autumn Millet) was frequent along the eastern shores of the reservoir in both ST3399 and SO3300 and a single plant of *Centaurium pulchellum* (Lesser Centaury) (see image 12 on back cover) growing on the extensive drying banks of the reservoir in SO3300 amid various chenopods, *Alopecurus aequalis* (Orange Foxtail), *Rorippa sylvestris* (Creeping Yellowcress) and *R. palustris* (Marsh Yellowcress). Both *Veronica scutellata* (Pink Water Speedwell) and *Thalictrum flavum* (Common Meadow-rue) were new tetrad records for SO30F.

Anglesey 2020

Nigel Brown, with considerable assistance from Ian Bonner

As ever Ivor and Jane Rees got the year off to a prompt start by logging 26 species in bloom on a BSBI New Year Plant Hunt around Menai Bridge and 23 species on Aberffraw headland while Ian Bonner and I spent time validating records. It was inspiring to see how the database had grown as a result of extra recorder effort last year. Among many points of interest we discussed Ivor's on-going research into the island's Scurvy-grass (*Cochlearia* sps.) populations which he has shown to be variable and in the opinion of the referee, Peter Wyse-Jackson, a fertile mix of hybrids between *Cochlearia officinalis* (Common Scurvy-grass) and *C. anglica* (English Scurvy-grass) and now known as *C. x hollandica*. Ivor had recently sent us

winter images of scurvy-grass plants from Porth Cwyfan on Anglesey's south-west coast which clearly showed the cuneate leaves of *C. anglica* and it appears that plants from muddier intertidal sites are closest to *C. anglica*.

Our first gathering of the Anglesey Flora Group was in the warm and convivial surrounds of a coastal pub in early January where we (naively) plotted our programme for 2020 and suggested some target species. Shortly afterwards several members of the Group attended an informative review of plant identification apps by Professor Hamlyn Jones from Dundee University who gave a seminar in Bangor University.

This was followed by our first, and as it turned out, our last field trip in early March, again on the coast, and again the venue a pub – but a pub uniquely surrounded by a SSSI – the dunes of Tywyn Llyn a kilometre south-east of Rhosneigr on Anglesey's west coast. Here we searched for Early Sand Grass (*Mibora minima*), a Red Data Book species restricted in a native state to Anglesey, Gower, North Uist and the Channel Isles. The Aberffraw dunes on Anglesey's west coast boast the largest population in Britain with smaller metapopulations occurring on dunes at Newborough and the Rhosneigr area, some of which have not been assessed recently. Unfortunately, we were not able to re-find *Mibora* at Tywyn Llyn but later that day we finally had success when the trembling anthers of the world's smallest grass caught Hugh Knott's attention in dunes to the north of Rhosneigr, close to where Jane and Ivor Rees has seen some a few weeks earlier.

From then on botanising on the island became a solitary affair as Covid restrictions prevented any further group gatherings. Pleasingly however plant recording continued as individuals scrutinised their local areas. Tim Blackstock found Mistletoe (Viscum album) on hawthorn (Crataegus monogyna) in Beaumaris, only the second recent record for the island. James and Joanna Robertson reported a good colony of Green Hellebore (Helleborus viridis) in flower at Plas Newydd at only its second Anglesey site. They went on to find a fine colony of Shepherd's Cress (Teesdalia nudicaulis) just south-west of Llys Rhosyr, Newborough with thousands of plants in flower in mid-March. Their find takes the Anglesey tally of monads for this species to 10 but 5 of these do not enjoy post 2000 records. Jane and Ivor Rees reported a particularly fine show of the white-flowered form of Sweet Violet (Viola odorata subsp. dumetorum) at Llanidan, near Brynsiencyn. Charles Aron spotted V. reichenbachiana in a new monad near his home in Pentraeth taking the known monad tally for this scarce island plant to 17, all in the south and east and mostly on limestone. Charles's record was particularly interesting as the substrate was Pre Cambrian chlorite-schist.

Tim Blackstock came up trumps again when in May he rediscovered Dropwort (*Filipendula vulgaris*) at Mariandyrys near Penmon in the south-east of the island. In North Wales as with other parts of the Principality, this is a decidedly local species. The main populations in the north are on the limestone headlands of the Great and Little Ormes at Llandudno. On Anglesey the only truly native area for Dropwort is the Penmon district, within view of Llandudno and also on limestone. RH Roberts regarded Dropwort as frequent in the Mariandyrys area in the early 1980s but Ian Bonner and David Evans found it far less common a decade later. With no record since 2005, Tim decided to take up the challenge and follow up previous records. He re-found Dropwort in an area which had recently been cleared of gorse on the North Wales Wildlife Trust's Mariandyrys Reserve indicating how necessary and effective targeted scrub removal can be for grassland species.

The fine dry weather of April and May probably benefitted stress-tolerators such as Dropwort as well as legumes such as Subterranean Clover (*Trifolium subterraneum*) which Mandy and Glen Forde found in a new monad on thin soils over Pre-Cambrian rock on their small holding on the southern margin of Llyn Traffwll in early May. This is another local species on Anglesey, recorded from just 15 monads, mostly coastal and clustered in the north and north-west of the island. Jane and Ivor Rees have previously pointed out that these north-west Anglesey populations frequently display a rusty-red collar on the calyx as clearly seen in Mandy's excellent image (see image 7 on page inside back cover).

Mandy and Glen made another very interesting find shortly after when they discovered Bur Chervil (*Anthriscus caucalis*) (see image 6 on inside back cover) on their land and sent excellent images to help confirm it. This rather small, daintily flowered annual umbellifer is a mainly eastern and/or coastal species in the British Isles. It is rather scarce in Wales and largely confined to coastal areas, especially in North Wales. Here on Anglesey, we have records from just a handful of sites covering in total 10 monads. Five of these are pre-2000 only (Bodorgan, Tywyn Fferam just south of Rhosneigr and Newborough/Dwyran area). The more recent, post 2000 records are clustered between Beddmanarch Bay and Church Bay in the north-west of the island and there is a single record from Aberffraw. Mandy and Glen's population is in a new monad but mirrors the west coast distribution of the other records. This is a plant of dry sandy disturbed sites such as field margins, roadside verges, dunes and rock outcrops. Theoretically it could occur more widely on Anglesey and it is puzzling that it appears to be restricted to the west.

In early June Ian Hawkins found 7 flowering spikes of Southern Marsh Orchid (*Dactylorhiza praetermissa*) on his land on the SW side of Brynsiencyn, only the third known site for Anglesey (see image 4 on page 3). Southern Marsh Orchid was

first recorded on the island in 2013 in the Coronation Meadow at Plas Newydd. It then appeared at Plas Cadnant in 2017 where it has persisted as a single plant. It seems very likely that we are witnessing a natural colonisation by this species which first came to my attention when a strong colony became established at Parc Menai on the mainland side of the Britannia Bridge c.2000. As the only other colonies in north-west Wales are in the Upper Ogwen valley, Portmadog/Harlech area and at Llandudno Junction it seems likely that the Parc Menai colony has spawned the spread of this highly attractive native orchid on to Anglesey. The seed is, like all orchids, wind dispersed, and it is interesting that the two previous sites (Plas Newydd and Plas Cadnant) both lie just 3km from Parc Menai and well within the range of active wind dispersal of the very light weight seeds. Ian's site is a further 4.5km south-west of Plas Newydd. It will be fascinating to see how the island population of this quite distinctive marsh orchid develops over the coming years. Suitable habitat still abounds on Anglesey, e.g. Newborough Warren and Aberffraw with their orchid rich dune slacks, fens and marshes such as Cors Erddreiniog and Cors Ddyga and even man-made habitats such as roadside verges and business parks which are well used by the widespread populations of this species in Lancashire.

Not far from Ian Hawkins' Southern Marsh Orchid site, James Robertson reported a three-fold increase in his population of Early Purple Orchid (*Orchis mascula*) following introduction of stock and manual removal of rampant ivy (*Hedera hibernica*) in an area of damp deciduous woodland by the Afon Briant.

Another orchid, a rarity and one of serious conservation concern on Anglesey - Frog Orchid (Coeloglossum viride) occupied my mind in June. This somewhat demure greenish-purple flowered orchid of calcareous grassland and scrub has been found in just 11 monads in total, 6 of those without post-2000 records. The extant sites are restricted to a relatively small area of Carboniferous limestone between Cors Erddreiniog and Brynteg to the north and Talwrn and Cors Goch to the south. Happily, for me it grows just 20m beyond our garden on a lane-side verge where I first noticed it in 2016. I check the single plant each day during the growing season and as the inflorescence lengthened in June, I have to admit that I watered it a few times. It's a precious thing - there may be fewer than 100 plants left on the island. However, it may be overlooked as it is not the showiest of orchids and it can occur in partial scrub and be difficult to locate. It would be pleasing to re-find it on one of the historic sites in the Llanddona area or elsewhere in the limestone zone I described. My own experience of finding it on an otherwise fairly unnoteworthy verge provides some hope that this is an under-recorded species of orchid on Anglesey. Sadly, just at the point of seed set this specimen was run over by a vehicle weaving in between two verge defenders kindly installed by the Ynys Mon's Highways Dept the year before and I know of no other records of Frog Orchid on the island in 2020.

The fine dry Spring and reduced traffic of lock-down prompted my wife and I to try our hand at bike botany and it proved very productive and immensely enjoyable, expanding our horizons in significant ways. Anglesey is blessed with some good hedgerows and some varied cycle routes along which we suddenly discovered species such as Zig-zag Clover (*Trifolium medium*). With just over 50 monads to its name this species is regarded as local on the island. Nationally it is a declining species associated with permanent species-rich pastures, and roadside verges may be increasingly important refuges for this attractive legume. Here and there, with no apparent consistency or explanation, bobbles of Bladder Campion (*Silene vulgaris*) catch the cycling eye. Recorded in just 30 monads on the island this taxon is scarce especially in the south of Anglesey. Most records refer to just a handful of plants at each site. Looking at its UK wide range it shares with Zig-zag Clover an affinity with calcareous soils and is strongly associated with the chalk and limestone formations of central and southern England. In Wales it is surprisingly thin on the ground in the south, while in the north is mainly coastal and limestone loving.

Just outside the village of Llanbedrgoch sits one of the island's prettiest little churches - St. Pedr's - with a wildlife-rich churchyard to match. Outstanding among its floral display are 40+ mature plants of Greater Knapweed (*Centaurea scabiosa*), a local plant on Anglesey, with records from just 17 monads, again mostly over limestone in the east. Indeed, both locally and nationally the distribution of Greater Knapweed mirrors that of Bladder Campion and for both species it is unlikely that their populations on the island number more than 500 plants. Probably the best-known site for Greater Knapweed is the roadside verge population which welcomes you to Benllech as you drive along the A5025 from Pentraeth – it is a magnificent poster for the town!

Undoubtedly one of the surprise finds of 2020 was Wild Clary (*Salvia verbenaca*) noted at Llanddwyn by visiting botanist and BSBI member Matt Jones from Liverpool during the final week of July. Matt kindly passed his record straight on to Ian Bonner, and Caroline and I visited the site a few days later and noted 4 flowering plants (with a total of 6 flowering shoots) and 9 rosettes (one of which displayed part of an old flower stem perhaps from last year) at SH 3864.6254. The site is c.25m south of the far end of the Pilot Cottages and 15m above a sandy beach. It lies c.2.5m off a sandy track and consists of sparse marram grass (Ammophila arenaria) with *Lotus corniculatus*(Bird's-foot Trefoil) , *Anthyllis vulneraria* (Kidney Vetch) and *Leontodon saxatilis* (Lesser Hawkbit) scattered amongst moderate

amounts of bare sand. The level ground soon slopes steeply down to the beach and is exposed and probably subject to some movement of sand.

Until this point, Wild Clary was considered restricted to a single location on Anglesey, near Penmon Priory on the east coast where it was recorded by Hugh Davies in the early 19th century and then again by JE Griffith in the latter part of the 19th century. Davies also recorded Wild Clary at Holyhead and Mynydd Mechell but there have been no records at these localities since his day. The most recent record was 21 August 2004 when Geoff Radford found 12 rosettes near Penmon Priory.

Wild Clary is an aromatic perennial herb with a Mediterranean-Atlantic distribution in Europe and found in 481 hectads in Great Britain where it is commonest in East Anglia. It is associated with open calcareous grassland and disturbed ground in the lowlands of south and east England thinning out to the north and west and where it becomes increasingly coastal. In Ireland it is known from just 20 hectads, all coastal, mainly dune, and mostly in the south-east. The same trend is apparent here in Wales where Wild Clary is a decidedly scarce species found scattered along the south coast and, similarly, largely coastal in north Wales, though there are pre-2000 records for the Vale of Clwyd. The main populations in North Wales are West Shore and North Shore, Llandudno where it is associated with disturbed sandy grassland, and on the Great Orme where it occurs in 7 sites on limestone grassland, a habitat similar to its Anglesey locality near Penmon Priory.

Although Wild Clary is undoubtedly native in the British Isles it has been nurtured in the past for its medicinal properties and this may have influenced its distribution. In some parts of south-east England it is also strongly associated with churchyards. Clary is thought to be a derivative of 'clear-eye' alluding to its former wide use in soothing inflammation of the eye. The seeds, once soaked in water, exude a mucilage which soothed and cleansed the eye membranes when seeds were placed there. The Welsh names for this species, as referred to by Hugh Davies, reflect these historic traditions. Torfagl - perhaps meaning 'bright-eye' (though without a direct modern Welsh equivalent) and Golwg Crist meaning 'Christ's Sight'. Although Penmon on Anglesey is largely limestone grassland and scrub and therefore suitable for Wild Clary its close proximity to the Priory does beg the question as to whether it was also cultivated thereabouts in the past by ecclesiastical herbalists. Never-the-less this species does appear to have a good historic provenance on Anglesey.

Its occurrence at Llanddwyn at the southern tip on the island comes as a complete surprise. Firstly, Llanddwyn is a National Nature Reserve and botanically well known. If Wild Clary had been growing there long then it would surely have been recorded by now? Can we therefore assume that it is a relatively recent arrival? If

so, how has it arrived? This species displays very little vegetative spread. It reproduces by seed but the dispersal agent is not known. Llanddwyn lies some 25 km south-west of Penmon, its nearest known population. Interestingly, Wendy McCarthy tells me that Wild Clary has recently turned up on roadside verges along the North Wales Expressway near Conwy.

While looking for Wild Clary we were delighted to see how well the colony of Maiden Pink (*Dianthus deltoides*) is doing by the north-east entrance to Llanddwyn at SH 3907.6326. We counted 350 flowers, a big increase from the size of the colony when it was first discovered by one of our Group, the late Barry Wrightson in 2017. And just a few metres away Caroline found another previously unrecorded colony of some 135 flowers. Earlier in July we counted almost 1500 flowers at its main population on Newborough Warren. It is a delightful species and of some relevance to Wild Clary since the nearest colonies are around Llandudno where it occupies sandy coastal grassland. Perhaps these two taxa are bound by coincidental ecological and biogeographical factors and have responded to historical land use changes in similar ways.

Another striking-looking member of the *Gentianaceae*, Yellow-wort (*Blackstonia perfoliata*) is very scarce on Anglesey, recorded in just 6 monads. It is similar to Wild Clary and Maiden Pink in having an affinity for open, often disturbed calcareous ground and a sub-Mediterranean-sub-Atlantic biogeographical distribution. Despite its scarcity on Anglesey, it is generally commoner at national level than either Clary or Maiden Pink and in North Wales is found quite abundantly in calcareous places from the Llandudno area eastwards. In August, Charles Aron found Yellow-wort growing in the vicinity of the old Octel Works at Amlwch where it is reasonably frequent in disturbed stony ground. This is a new hectad record and the first time it has been recorded in the northern half of the island.

Charles also reported that here on Anglesey we had just put up with the dullest and wettest June - July period since his records commenced in 1998. June's rainfall was 89mm and July's 157mm. What made July even more disappointing was how cool it was in the first half of the month with a significant number of days which did not reach 60 degrees Fahrenheit (15.5 degrees centigrade). These two months stand in stark contrast to the previous two of course when we experienced the driest, brightest spring for perhaps 40 years with just 35mm of rain delivered in a total of 13 rain days in April and May combined. The droughting seen then was thoroughly alleviated by summer rains and nowhere was this seen more plainly seen than the dune grasslands of Anglesey's west coast — by late summer their rich verdure amply revealed the full extent of the hydrating effect of the miserable mid-summer

weather. And we must not forget that February had also seen exceptionally high rainfall – 214mm at Pentraeth, a new February record for the island.

Midsummer saw a fine show of 13 flowering shoots of Broad-leaved Helleborine (*Epipactis helleborine*) in a new hectad at Plas Newydd taking the Anglesey hectad tally for this species to 4 and the monad tally to 10 (6 post-2000, 4 pre-2000). All the known sites are along the Menai Strait. Its close relative, Dune Helleborine (*E. dunensis*) turned up in a new monad at Brynsiencyn in a surprisingly shaded, damp situation beneath ornamental poplars (*Populus* sp.) 7km north-east of its more familiar dune environment at Newborough. This taxon is proving surprisingly ecologically adaptable on Anglesey – we now have several recent records from wooded gardens and tracksides in the south and in the north-east of the island. However, its main habitats remain dune slacks on both the open sand dunes, and those afforested, and associated with Creeping Willow (*Salix repens*) and/or *Pinaceae*.

Our thanks to Flora Group members who have submitted records from their immediate home areas during 2020. Pat Denne recorded 100 species in her beautiful natural garden in LlanfairPG and Jane Stevens added many new monad records for her home village of Llangristiolus. Simon Retallick and Gwen Vaughan have similarly improved our knowledge of the Llandegfan area. As ever, Jane and Ivor Rees have submitted a significant number of records with special emphasis on coastal species and critical taxa. Mandy Forde whose remarkable efforts have documented 180 taxa of native and introduced plants on her lovely home-patch by Llyn Traffwll, added 80 taxa to the monad list for SH3276 including the previously mentioned Bur Chervil and Subterranean Clover as well as Thorow-wax (Bupleurum rotundifolium) and most recently Common Cudweed (Filago germanica). Common Cudweed has been previously recorded in just 8 monads on the island, 4 of which are pre-2000 only. The older records include fixed dunes at Newborough and Aberffraw but it has not been seen in such habitat since 1959. There are also old records from open, disturbed areas of limestone in the Penmon area - Llangoed in 1967 and Penmon Church in 1971. Post-2000 records are from recently cleared scrub along the Coast Path near Brynsiencyn (2011), gravelly areas in a ride in the commercial plantation at Pentraeth Forest (2011), and most recently two monads in SH37, both as a result of Flora Group meetings. In 2018, 100 plants were discovered on a thin-soiled rock outcrop close by Plas Bog RSPB Reserve at Cae Hywel, less than half a kilometre east of Llyn Traffwll. In 2019 we found several plants on the airfield at nearby RAF Valley. Mandy's record in dry open grassland, close to the last two mentioned sites but in a new neighbouring monad, augments this cluster of recent records around Llyn Traffwll.

Filago germanica is a member of the Southern Temperate element of the European flora extending to Iran and North Africa and as far north as Caithness in Scotland and Jutland in Denmark. It has become widely naturalised in North America. In Britain it is concentrated in the east, south and south-east. In Wales it is largely confined to coastal districts but there has been a sharp decline recently. The main threats are due to agricultural operations, especially the application of fertilisers and herbicides associated with more intensive, year-round cultivation.

Late in the season, Tim Blackstock found Wild Madder (*Rubia peregrina*) thriving in a hedge bank just south of Penmon Priory, seemingly a single vigorous plant which had striven to great heights through a hawthorn bush, but bore no fruit - Tim wonders whether the hermaphrodite, insect pollinated flowers are self-incompatible? If they are, that may well limit the spread of this scarce plant whose population on Anglesey may be fewer than 100 plants. The specific epithet, which means wanderer in Latin, may well only apply to the rampant vegetative growth this species, and Tim's specimen, can achieve. Wild Madder has a Mediterranean-Atlantic distribution in Europe and is approaching its northerly limit in North Wales. On Anglesey it is recorded in 7 monads, two which are pre-2000 only. They are all coastal localities and all but one are in the south-eastern sector of the island.

As the autumn progressed it became obvious that many species were carrying on flowering and/or having a second flush of flowering into November including the following taxa: Bulbous Buttercup (Ranunculus bulbosus), Ox-eye Daisy (Leucanthemum vulgare), Hemp Agrimony (Eupatorium cannabinum), Hedge Bedstraw (Galium album), Nipplewort (Lapsana communis), Hogweed (Heracleum sphondylium), Cow Parsley (Anthriscus sylvestris), Wild Carrot (Daucus carota), Wild Thyme (Thymus serpyllum), Common Milkwort (Polygala serpyllum), Common Whitlowgrass (Erophila verna ssp verna), Cornsalad (Valerianella carinata), Lesser Stitchwort (Stellaria graminea), Hairy Tare (Ervilia hirsuta), Wild Clematis (Clematis vitalba), Musk Mallow (Malva moschata), Flag Iris (Iris pseudacolor), Threecornered Leek (Allium triquetrum), and even Marsh Marigold (Caltha palustris) and Alexanders (Smyrnium olusatrum). Flora Group member, Robbie Blackhall-Miles suggests that the hot dry spring followed by a cool wet summer has perhaps fooled some species into thinking that it is now spring once again. Robbie has noted a significant number of garden plants second flowering this autumn including fruit trees producing fresh flower buds on next year's spur shoots while laden with this year's fruit.

Robbie's combined interest and expertise in both native and horticultural flora puts him in an excellent position to undertake two needy and worthwhile ex-situ conservation initiatives on the island. Under license he has taken propagation

material of Wild Leek (*Allium ampeloprasum* var. *ampeloprasum*) from its only known site on Anglesey near South Stack where it is vulnerable to roadside verge events as well as the worrying possibility of being consumed by a proposed major civil engineering project. If successful, then new leek plants will be relocated to safer and more suitable sites nearby. The other species which is receiving his attention is Dwarf Rush (*Juncus capitatus*), again with only one extant site, where it may be in decline due to lack of disturbance. Robbie has had permission to take several soil samples in the hope that they contain a seed bank of *J. capitatus* which can be germinated ex-situ and returned to the original site once remedial management work has been undertaken to re-instate suitable open, damp, peaty areas.

It is interesting to note that *Erigeron floribundus* (Bilbao Fleabane) was in full flower in November at a new monad south of Llangefni (where it had been found for the first time in 2019). And Ivor and Jane Rees report Sea Radish (*Raphanus raphanistrum* subsp. *maritimum*) in flower in mid-November and explain that this species is often a biennial and in some cases a few flower in their first autumn.

As the year draws to a close, Natural Resources Wales has undertaken control of a large colony of Sea Buckthorn (*Hippophae rhamnoides*) on mobile dunes north of Rhosneigr. Elsewhere in the wider landscape, especially in the south and east of the island we are having to adjust to the loss of Ash (*Fraxinus excelsior*) as Ash Die-back tightens its grip, no doubt encouraged by the dryness of spring.

Despite Covid restrictions it is pleasing to report that, to date, 7 new vice county records have been added to Anglesey's list this year and 47 new hectad records (of which 9 are probably native). It is also pleasing to report that one of the Flora Group members, Jen Towill was appointed Local Wildlife Officer for Ynys Môn in August and has been promoting botanical causes on the island at County Council Level. Some members turned their attention to other worthy pursuits when field botany became difficult including Ivor Rees who undertook a re-evaluation of the taxonomy and ecology of the island's Sea-Lavenders (*Limoniun* species), Hugh Knott who made some exquisite plant portraits to add to his already excellent and comprehensive gallery of Anglesey plants (cambriaflora.net) (see image 8 on inside back cover) and Debbie Evans who co-authored a book on Downy Mildews and Blister-rusts of Wales. Ian Bonner, so frustrated at not having been able to visit Anglesey as planned, instead turned his attention to writing species accounts for a revised Flora of Anglesey as well as keeping right up to date with data inputting.

Lockdown Botany in Brecknock

We managed three outings before the lockdown – a successful New Year Plant Hunt (the highlight of which was dead *Agrimonia procera* (Fragrant Agrimony) at Hirwaun SN9505); a trip up the Nedd Fechan (SN9010) to see *Hymenophyllum* species (Filmy Ferns) (passing *Asplenium trichomanes* ssp. *trichomanes* (Delicate Maidenhair Spleenwort) on the way) and a walk around Llanelly (SO2314) just as things were obviously closing down due to Covid-19.

The pandemic inevitably prevented us from carrying on as planned. Of course, this is of small importance in the scale of the suffering that Covid-19 has caused to many but what does a lockdown botanist do with their time?

I did have plenty of the admin work that goes with being a recorder to get on with and a small garden to take much better care of than normal. However, there is always that itch to be out and see what is developing botanically in the countryside. Members of my loyal botany group were similarly restricted, but we are all lucky enough to be living in places where the permitted local exercise still offered opportunities to "see what is going on".

The scramble to record as widely and comprehensively as possible for the Atlas project that finished on 31st December did also lead to an "identify, tick the list and move on" botanical culture that we were looking forward to leaving behind this year. We would have taken things more slowly in any case, and now we really had to. An interesting young plant spotted on the walk could always be re-evaluated on a future occasion when there is better evidence to be sure exactly what it is. We could also observe and learn from almost daily observations of exactly how particular plants develop.

It was an incredible spring with rain and heat alternating in just the way many plants seem to like and an abundance of choice species was reported by many of the group: we cover the county reasonably well - from Crickhowell and Hay via Brecon and Talybont down to Coelbren.

One plant that almost immediately started to be reported from many new places was *Adoxa moschatellina* (Moschatel). The display near Hay where I live (SO2241) covering several square metres was not a new site but a big contrast with the few small plants I had seen in previous years. Other plants, such as *Saxifraga tridactylites* (Rue-leaved Saxifrage), took advantage of quieter pavements – it even seemed more abundant than usual on walls.

Working over the internet (with a lot of discussion of pictures and descriptions), members of the botany group rapidly learned more about the things I had been hastily telling them when out ticking lists. We decided to start work on an Axiophyte list for Brecknock. This was published at the end of April. We have some on our list that "break the rule" that Rare Plant Register plants are not suitable as axiophytes — mainly because these examples (e.g. *Vicia orobus* (Wood Bitter-vetch)) are not actually rare in our county but listed as threatened countrywide. But also, we included some where my hunch was that they should not be on the Register. I resisted a (tongue in cheek?) suggestion of *Molinia caerulea* (Purple Moor-grass)!

Working close to home with regular patrolling of the same routes soon paid dividends. I did not know *Viola reichenbachiana* (Early Dog-violet) grew only 100m from my home until this year.

Another species that got more attention was *Ranunculus auricomus* group (Goldilocks Buttercup). It is easy to believe that this could be the century's *Hieracium* (Hawkweed) if someone wants to take it on. The variation even within my two local populations is huge, I even pressed some from the more abundant population. Maybe it will get named in the future?

In late April I received reports of an abundance of *Orchis mascula* (Early-purple Orchid) just above Brecon (SO0528) which was well within walking distance of several people's homes, and reachable as part of the daily exercise allowed under strict lockdown at this time. I must say I had never myself encountered this plant growing like this, it is one I remember from childhood scattered in the local Bluebell wood.

In May, Joan Millard noticed *Plantago coronopus* (Buck's-horn Plantain) in the main Brecon car park (SO0428). This species had been new to the county up on the Epynt early in 2015.

One of my group (Nina Krauzewicz) started to get into her local dandelions (despite my warnings about their difficulty) and was lucky enough to have a *Taraxacum euryphyllum* (Wide-stalked Dandelion) (or maybe *T. maculatum* (Yellowish-green Dandelion) – we couldn't get it certain despite many attempts!) on her driveway. Mostly, however other members of the group started by classifying them into their broader taxonomic groups.

An *Allium triquetrum* (Three-cornered Garlic) candidate at Joan Millard's local churchyard at Llandefalle (SO1035), on more careful examination and discussion online, turned out to be *A. trifoliatum* (Hirsute Garlic) proving, I hope, that we were

not cutting any corners by working remotely. Paul Green was able to confirm *A. trifoliatum* remotely as referee, a new Wales record, I think.

A walk along the Wye (SO2242) looking for early signs of the *Persicaria mitis* (Tasteless Water-pepper) that was found last year, revealed a small population of *Scirpus sylvaticus* (Wood Club-rush) right by the water. It was last seen in about the same area in 1979 and is not at all commonly recorded in our county. I managed to get images for a reasonable "focus stacked" picture while my feet got steadily wetter.

It was towards the end of June that one or two of us started meeting to explore slightly more remote areas (from our homes) and an exploration of Waun Ddu raised bog (at Craig y Cilau SO1816) resulted in several good records including *Carex montana* (Soft-leaved Sedge) and *Eleocharis quinqueflora* (Few-flowered Spikerush). A week later, Anne Griffiths finally found *Hornungia petraea* (Hutchinsia) on the cliffs above (a personal quest) - in dead form but still unmistakeable. It made a good picture for Twitter, with comments along the lines of "When is the Dead Plants handbook coming out?"

I had noticed records for Gymnadenia conopsea (Fragrant Orchid), Platanthera chlorantha (Greater Butterfly-orchid) and Epipactis palustris (Marsh Helleborine) in 2015 near Libanus (SN9724) from an unknown recorder. They had been confirmed by Fred Rumsey on the DDb, so there was no reason to doubt them and so getting a request to visit from the landowner was welcome. I went as soon as I could to find a delightful wet meadow that the owners had left on minimal grazing since acquiring the property. Not only were there the previously mentioned orchids that had been recorded in a Kew scheme "Orchid Observers" that asked for photographic submission, but there was Eriophorum latifolium (Broad-leaved Cotton-grass) as well, and a host of other axiophytes. Even better, I was told that a neighbouring farm had a small amount of Genista tinctoria (Dyer's Greenweed) which had not been recorded in a long time in the area. Again, a visit was most rewarding and benign neglect was the regime. This time the owner, who walked me through his fields to the wet site, apologised for the Rhinanthus minor (Yellow-rattle) not being native. It turned out he had spread hay from a nearby farm he had worked on several years back thus introducing it in what I would say is an entirely natural way. This farm also had Epipactis palustris and Eriophorum latifolium as well as abundant Cirsium dissectum (Meadow Thistle). I was also able to find roadside Epipactis palustris between Brecon and Hay on the way home, this site had had a few fallow years but was back!

I was delighted that Tim Rich re-found our *Orthilia secunda* (Serrated Wintergreen) population complete with fruiting stems up on the top cliffs of Craig Cerrig-gleisiad

(SN9621). I had been shown it by intrepid wardens in 2013, and Mike Porter had climbed down to it in the 1970s more than once, with Ray Woods providing the confirmation for the 1980s. Not many of us have seen it close-up since Beverly A. Miles first recorded it in 1955.

Anne Griffiths likes to explore limestone near where she lives in Monmouthshire. She found *Erigeron acris* (Blue Fleabane), initially in v.c.35 where there are many sites, but later also on the Breconshire side near Gilwern (SO2413). It had not been recorded in either vice county for some time.

Undoubtedly the most exciting record of the year was *Pyrola minor* (Common Wintergreen). It had been recorded in 1911 from the border of v.c.41 and 42, but it is not possible to confirm this record's vice county. However in 2020, Arlene Jones found it very definitely in Breconshire at Abercraf (SN8212) in quite large numbers and area of distribution. The site is subject to development, but we were able to confirm a large and extensive population. The plants are mostly in *Larix* (Larch) woodland replanted on opencast spoil which seems to suit them very well. Some plants are in more naturally regenerated areas and there is a plan to relocate some of the population if the development scheme goes ahead. For Arlene, this was a totally new species that she had to identify on her own, with many exchanges of pictures and discussions of style and stigma morphology over the internet.

A bryological exploration by Claire Halpin and Sharon Pilkington resulted in new vascular plant records; namely *Sagina nodosa* (Knotted Pearlwort) and *Lycopodium clavatum* (Stag's-horn Clubmoss) in Cwm Callan (SO0715). The pearlwort was only the third county record since 2000.

Finally, Tim Rich has been updating records of our endemic and rare *Hieracium* species with some in decline and others doing well. See his videos on YouTube (http://bit.ly/hawktim). While doing this, he reported a single plant high up on Tarren yr Esgob (SO2431) of *Rosa spinosissima* (Burnet Rose). Tarren yr Esgob straddles our border with v.c.35 but this was in our patch and a first record for a very long time for the county and, I think, the hectad.

Sharing Nature Together, and Apart: Botanical surveys during Lockdown

The date of writing this piece, the 3 November 2020, marks 5 years of biological recording in our community, running sessions which encompass all botanical interests, as well as invertebrates and mammals. I often think our motto should be "We count everything, because everything counts!" However, back on the 17 March 2020 we took the unprecedented step of cancelling all public sessions of the Nature of our Village project until further notice. Here in Wales, we remain unable to run public surveys, because field sessions rely on a group gathering closely together to observe finds, and we have found that this is not possible whilst keeping the regulation 2m away from each other. It's simply too tempting to huddle up over an exciting species! As the Project Officer, I am lucky to live in the survey area, and so was able to continue to run all the surveys which would ordinarily have been run with the public, on my own, without driving or social contact. I continued to share all the photos from the surveys online and this remains a popular way of sharing our work with our members. We are very pleased at the big increase of people who are sharing their own village wildlife sightings on our Facebook page, as this often starts conversations and brings the group together virtually.

I was allowed access to a traditionally managed hay meadow on Pen Dinas (SN 58149 80351), just before it was cut in June, and managed to find 63 different species of wild flowers. This included 3 species which were found for the first time: *Petasites pyrenaicus* (Winter Heliotrope), *Polygonum aviculare* (Knotgrass) and *Rumex acetosella* (Sheep's Sorrel). The *P. pyrenaicus* acts in an invasive manner in this location, having spread in from a footpath. Elsewhere on the nearby cycle path it is also establishing a monoculture along parts of the northern side of this route.

In July we re-visited a wooded location near some allotments (SN 58946 80832) to check on its orchids and were delighted to find 9 plants of the *Epipactis helleborine* (Broad-leaved helleborine) see image 9 on back cover. When we reported on this find to our County Plant Recorder, he wrote: "*Epipactis helleborine* is always terribly exciting to find even if it is not one of the rarest orchids." (Steve Chambers, *pers. comm.*).

One August survey that was exciting for all the wrong reasons was to check on the progress of a small local woodland known as Llwyn yr Eos woods (SN 59471 79922), where the search for species of interest was interrupted by a drug deal! I did wonder why all these people were arriving, in heavy rain, in the middle of a wood! In spite of this oddity, 55 species were re-found from last year's survey and 12 species recorded here for the first time. These included *Athyrium filix-femina* (Lady Fern), *Epilobium lanceolatum* (Spear-leaved Willowherb) and *Capsella bursa-pastoris* (Shepherd's Purse). We thank the local branch of the Co-op for their contribution of the funds to buy the guide to Britain's Ferns by James

Merryweather, which has made fern identification an easier task. This site continues to scrub over, and light levels are dropping, brambles have now colonised the hedge bank and perhaps this is why there was only 1 small *Epipactis helleborine* found during this survey (where 5 had been found in 2019).

A botanical survey of the roadside verge near Parc y Llyn (SN 59485 80408) which is managed by the Wildlife Trust with Ceredigion County Council proved very productive. This small area is treated as a hay meadow, with just one late cut and the removal of the arisings. This style of management has been very successful for wildlife, and both the number of insect and of plant species has been increasing steadily. We were pleased to record Leucanthemum vulgare (Ox-eye Daisy) there for the first time in 2020 out of a total of 77 plants species. As a very public location, by the side of a busy road, it was also useful for outreach, answering questions from the public about the flowers at a safe distance. Epilobium ciliatum (American Willowherb) also appeared for the first time this year, a plant referred to by the Biological Records Centre as "one of our most frequent aliens". Interestingly, the site once held Orchis mascula (Early Purple Orchids) that had been translocated by the Ceredigion County Council from a verge to the south of the county, which had been due to be lost to road widening. They were moved in 2016, noted as still present in 2017, but have not been seen since. In this highly public site it is entirely possible that they were dug up by human hand, or even by canine paw! Reading the entry on this species in Arthur Chater's Flora of Cardiganshire shows that this orchid is far more abundant in the south of the county, so perhaps the soil and conditions proved unsuitable.

Those readers who know the superb scenery to the south of Aberystwyth may already be aware of the winding "Nanny Goat's Walk", (SN 58036 80028) which follows the south side of the river Ystwyth and has surprisingly rich botanical interest, considering how frequently dog-walked it is. This year, 73 species were noted, with 22 recorded for the first time in 2020. Some of these records will be new because I simply did not know these species in previous years, having made my start in botany only a decade ago and needing to learn new species every year! *Stachys palustris* (Marsh Woundwort), *Hypericum maculatum* (Imperforate St.John's-wort) and *Artemisia vulgaris* (Mugwort), as well as the tiny and beautiful *Vicia hirsuta* (Hairy Tare), were a pleasure to find.

Funding to continue our project remains uncertain, but we hope that we will be able to continue in 2021. If you would like to take part in future botanical surveys with our group, please get in touch via chloe.griffiths.ecology@gmail.com.

Nine years' intensive recording on a SSSI: What are the benefits?

Since we moved to Wales from East Anglia in April 2011, we've lived in Llantrisant, literally two minutes' walk from Llantrisant Common and Pastures SSSI. This is about 120 hectares of undulating rhôs pasture, which lies immediately north of the old town (see image 5 on page 3).

What makes Llantrisant Common special is its long history of grazing by cattle and horses, and its diversity of habitats – including marshes and flushes, acid/neutral grassland, wet heath, streams, scrub and woodland.

This habitat diversity results in a wide range of species being present, and in the nine years since we moved there, I've gradually increased my knowledge about what's present. At first, I simply noted down the more interesting finds, but in about 2017 I started to record the species more comprehensively, and also record populations and locations in more detail, mostly at 10 m resolution or better.

The result of this effort has been that I've made nearly 11,800 records, during a total of about 300 hours, spread over 378 days. I've mostly recorded in notebooks, with 69% of records at 10 m resolution or greater. I've also sampled over 40 quadrats.

But what are the benefits of this detailed approach? I think there are four main advantages, described below.

1. Increasing the number of taxa recorded




Figure 1: Cumulative number of taxa (excluding infraspecific taxa) found on Llantrisant Common and Pastures SSSI from 2011–2020.

In total, I've recorded over 408 taxa, from vice-county rarities to little-recorded hybrids and naturalised garden escapes. As shown in Figure 1, the number of taxa continued to increase during the years I studied the site, only plateauing in 2019 when I think I started to reach 'saturation point' – admittedly without having tackled *Taraxacum* (Dandelions) or *Rubus* (Brambles)! Each bar is subdivided according to the main reason why I didn't find the taxon earlier, and these reasons are discussed further below.

A modest increase over the nine years was simply because I was making an effort to be more comprehensive — ie not ignoring certain ubiquitous species such as *Bellis perennis* (Daisy), *Hedera hibernica* (Irish Ivy), *Trifolium dubium* (Lesser Trefoil) or *Cynosurus cristatus* (Crested Dog's-tail), which were all first seen from 2015 onwards. By having my eyes on the ground a lot of the time, I was also susceptible to a failure to spot trees; as a result, a large roadside stand of *Ulmus* (an as-yet undermined Elm) and fine specimen of *Castanea sativa* (Sweet Chestnut) both escaped my attention for longer than they should have done.

In the early years, I also added a lot of species by **improving my coverage of the site**. There were two sides to this: the first was essentially investigating every single corner, which helped to uncover some rare taxa. Populations of *Mycelis muralis* (Wall Lettuce), *Glechoma hederacea* (Ground Ivy) and *Deschampsia cespitosa* (Tufted Hair Grass) were fairly late additions to the list for this reason. The second aspect was visiting the site throughout the year, which helped uncover plants that are inconspicuous when not in flower or fruit, such as *Carex canescens* (White Sedge) and *Carex* × *fulva* (a hybrid sedge) in 2018 and 2019, respectively. A further example of this effect was the finding in 2017 of *Spirodela polyrhiza* (Greater Duckweed), in a pond that I must have walked past dozens if not hundreds of times.

I later noticed that it was only obvious in mid to late summer, after the fronds had become significantly larger than the accompanying *Lemna gibba* (Fat Duckweed), but before they wither and sink.

Especially from 2017 onwards, a major contributor to the taxon list was **improving my understanding of the plants**. Although I was reasonably competent at identification when I arrived in Llantrisant in 2011, my knowledge of many groups (eg sedges, grasses and 'dandelion jobs') was very limited at the time, and tackling hybrids was out of the question!

Through a mix of self-education, and learning from Glamorgan Botany Group excursions, the vice-county recorder, and BSBI referees, I was able to increase the number of taxa identified on the site, to give reasonable coverage of (amongst others) *Agrostis* (Bents), *Alchemilla* (Lady's-mantles), *Betula* (Birches), *Carex* (Sedges), *Dryopteris* (Buckler Ferns), *Euphrasia* (Eyebrights), *Hieracium* (Hawkweeds), *Juncus* (Rushes), *Rumex* (Docks) and *Salix* (Willows). The publication of the *Hybrid Flora of the British Isles* was particularly helpful, either in making me aware that certain hybrids existed, or in providing the identification guidance often absent from regular floras.

As well as better recording of the above-mentioned genera, some highlights of this improved understanding were records of:

- Betula × aurata (a hybrid birch): Although good examples of the parents are
 easy enough to identify, I had found several trees that appeared
 intermediate. However, I struggled to get the Atkinson Discriminant
 Function to work very well. I later became aware that I needed to be more
 careful in my selection of the leaves to measure, and after that I had more
 success.
- Crataegus × subsphaerica (a hybrid hawthorn): This little-recorded hybrid between Crataegus monogyna (Hawthorn) and C. rhipidophylla (Largesepalled Hawthorn) is suspected to have been widely planted as 'Hawthorn' in the past, but is very likely to be overlooked. The specimen I found looks very much like C. monogyna, but with leaves that are usually larger and toothed on the lower margin.
- Epilobium (Willowherb) hybrids: Llantrisant Common was particularly productive for this group, partly due to disturbance of habitats caused by mowing or scrub clearance, and the consequent presence of parent species near to each other. A notable case was the triple-hybrid willowherb Epilobium obscurum × E. palustre × E. parviflorum, which was described by the BSBI referee as a "good candidate", and appears to be the only extant site in Britain.

- Hieracium adelphicum (Glamorganshire Hawkweed): A small colony in roadside scrub was originally noted in 2018, but it took two collections in subsequent years before I collected material that was good enough to identify with certainty. This is currently only the fifth extant British record.
- Nasturtium × sterile (a hybrid watercress): For several years I was aware of a large colony of a Nasturtium in a roadside ditch, but was frustrated that there never seemed to be good fruits to aid determination. Only in 2018 did I become aware of the hybrid and its distinctive empty pods, and I then realised what I was looking at!

Finally, a few species **arrived during the course of the survey**, a factor that is perhaps a little more important for this site than for many grazed pastures, because it backs directly onto Llantrisant town, and is crossed by two well-used roads. This resulted in the finding of (probably) ephemeral annuals of bare areas, garden throw-outs and bird-sown colonists, and even a short-lived seedling of *Solanum lycopersicum* (Tomato) originating from a kitchen window!

2. Finding new populations

Throughout the survey, I was surprised by how often I came across a new population of a plant already on the species list.

Occasionally this was down to management interventions, with one of the most striking examples being the finding in 2020 of a 50-strong population of flowering *Neottia ovata* (Twayblade) in an area where scrub had been cut back the previous year. Previously I had just found small numbers of rosettes in a handful of places, so this was quite exciting.

On other occasions, plants seem to have undergone a genuine increase, such as the *Trifolium micranthum* (Slender Trefoil) that popped up in several places in 2018 and 2019 where the turf had been affected by drought.

Of course, some plants are just elusive, and one that kept on surprising me was *Veronica scutellata* (Marsh Speedwell). Initially, I thought this was rare on the site, but over time I came to see that it was in fact locally plentiful, with the discovery of one particularly large population as late as 2020.

3. Understanding infraspecific variation

Systematically going through books such as Stace's *New Flora of Britain and Ireland* and major works such as Chater's *Flora of Cardiganshire* made me more aware of some subspecies and other infraspecific taxa. Some of these were unsurprising but

good to confirm – such as the *Cerastium fontanum* (Common Mouse-ear) being subsp. *vulgare*.

But others were more complicated, and *Pedicularis sylvatica* (Lousewort) was a case in point. Although the plants keyed out as subsp. *sylvatica*, they were not typical, because they *always* had hairs on the 'throat' of the calyx, and often on its external 'angles' too. In contrast, the *New Flora* stated that this subspecies is "sometimes" hairy on these parts.

Potentilla erecta (Tormentil) was also problematic, and it seemed to me that the relatively robust plants in many parts of the site approached the upland taxon subsp. strictissima rather than the typical subsp. erecta. On seeing my specimens, the BSBI referee said that the situation was not straightforward, and that a simple division between two subspecies did not really cater for the variation in these and similar specimens from elsewhere in Britain.

Another aspect of variation is flower colour, which I've long had an interest in. It was fun to investigate the relative frequency of colour forms of (amongst others) *Polygala serpyllifolia* (Heath Speedwell) and *Succisa pratensis* (Devil's-bit Scabious), and also to keep an eye out for oddities such as white-flowered *Betonica officinalis* (Betony) and *Calluna vulgaris* (Heather). Aberrations such as a remarkable ray-flowered *Succisa pratensis* were also exciting finds (see front cover image).

4. Obtaining insights into distributions

Consistently recording all species using GPS allowed me to plot distribution maps at a resolution that allowed some interesting insights to be obtained.




Figure 2: Distributions of four species at 100 m resolution

At a coarser (100m) resolution, it was nice to see how *Corylus avellana* (Hazel) hugs the ancient boundary of the site, but does not stray into the marshy ground in the centre (Figure 2A). Conversely, *Equisetum fluviatile* (Water Horsetail) is only found on well-flushed slopes and waterlogged ditches in the middle of the site (Figure 2B).

But other species pose a question: why, for example, are the distributions of *Ranunculus omiophyllus* (Moorland Crowfoot) (Figure 2C) and *R. hederaceus* (Ivyleaved Crowfoot) (Figure 2D) so nearly mutually exclusive, given their preference for similar areas of muddy, trampled ground?




Figure 3: Distributions of two species at 10 m resolution.

Looking at a finer (10 m) resolution produces distributions that show more subtle detail. A map of *Betonica officinalis* (Betony) (Figure 3A) ties in with its preference for sloping, well-drained turf. Such detailed mapping may also be useful for monitoring SSSI features, such as the regionally significant population of *Sibthorpia europaea* (Cornish Moneywort) (Figure 3B).

Conclusions

Recording a single site with this high level of detail has been highly time-consuming, and only really feasible because I've lived so close to it for several years. But as I

hope I've demonstrated above, it's also been very rewarding, not just in terms of the species I've found and the insights I've gained into distributions, but in terms of what I've learnt about identifying plants (a slow process, to be sure!).

The records I've made are of course in the BSBI database. But in order to distil all my findings into a more digestible format and make them accessible to regional naturalists in the region, as well as local residents, I have also written a book, *The Wild Plants of Llantrisant Common and Y Gweira*. I've tried to make this rigorous in terms of its coverage of the plants, but also informative and colourful, with identification tips and lots of photographs.

Welsh Plant Records 2019

Part 2: August to December

The Welsh Plant Records for 2019 have been published in two parts – please see Issue 106 for records from January to July 2019.

Welsh Plant Records are compiled by Stephen Coker, Mountain Grove, Clarbeston Road, Haverfordwest, Pembs, SA63 4SG, from reports of BSBI vice-county Recorders to whom records should be sent. Plants are listed for each vice-county in the order of D.H.
