

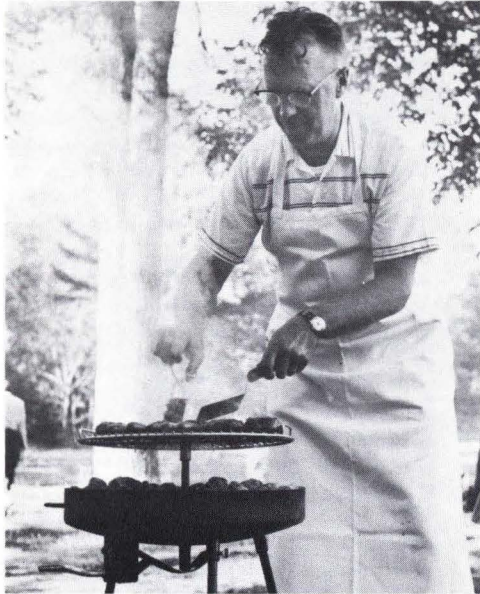

WEEKEND EVENTS CLIMAX PORTORAMA CELEBRATION

Headlining the last big weekend of the Duluth Portorama celebration is the 15th annual International Folk Festival from 12:30-5:00 p.m. tomorrow at Leif Erikson park.

Chairman Harold Hayes of UMD reminds all Summer Session students and staff that the festival is tailor made for family enjoyment.

Most popular with the youngsters is the Children's Fair which will feature rides of all types, various game stands and a special outdoor entertainment show.

Craft Alley annually displays the handiwork of Northeastern Minnesota citizens, many of the exhibits being "live" with the hobbyists showing how they accomplish their art.

The Old World Market sells out quickly with home-made foods from many lands, including stands where you can partake of an exotic festival lunch.

A band concert in the amphitheater in the park at 12:30 will precede the always colorful Folk Festival program at 2:30 p.m. A West African dance group, a Korean choir, an Indian dance number and many other folk dance and musical presentations will be featured.

Events tonight include a concert at 7:30 p.m. at Leif Erikson park by Jimmy Dorsey's orchestra followed by the crowning of the new Miss Seaway-Port of Duluth in a pageant across the street at the Armory.

Other Saturday Portorama events include A Horseshoe Tournament at Wheeler Field, Children's Story Hour and an art display at the College of St. Scholastica, a tropical fish display at Arrow Chevrolet, the South St. Louis fair at Proctor, and a chance to visit a Canadian Navy frigate at the Port Terminal.

On Sunday, Portorama comes to a close with the Duluth Kennel Club Dog Show, auto races at Proctor, Kart races at the Miller Trunk track, water events at Park Point including hydroplane races, a gyrocopter demonstration, water skiing, a rowing regatta, the end of the Bayfield-Duluth sailing race and the finish of the AAU road running race.

EDUCATION CONFERENCE AT UMD AUGUST 19-24

The National Conference of Professors of Educational Administration will hold their 1962 sessions at UMD August 19-24.

At least 140 of the top educators in the nation will attend the conference, according to Dr. Cyril M. Milbrath, assistant professor of secondary education, host coordinator for the meetings. Many of the visitors will bring their wives and children, all of whom will be housed on the campus.

Theme of the conference will be "Political and Economic Trends and Their Influence on Education," according to Chairman Daniel E. Griffiths, New York University.

Dr. Dean A. Crawford, head of secondary education at UMD, will keynote the opening of the conference the night of August 19th in Science Auditorium.

Nationally recognized speakers who will appear the six day sessions include: Dr. Raymond Callahan of Washington University, Professor Russell Gregg of the University of Wisconsin; William Ball, executive director and general counsel for the Pennsylvania Catholic Welfare Committee; Leo Pfeffer, general counsel of the American Jewish Congress; Dr. Harry Schwartz, author and writer for the New York Times on Soviet affairs; Dr. Stephen K. Bailey, Dean of the Maxwell Graduate School of Citizenship and Public Affairs, Syracuse University; and William Butler, vice president for economic research of the Chase Manhattan Bank.

Except for the keynote meeting, all speakers will address the conference in the mornings and discussion sessions by interest groups will take up the afternoons.

UMD and the Department of Educational Administration on the Minneapolis campus will co-host the sessions.

DULUTH GARDEN SOCIETY FLOWER SHOW AT KIRBY

More than 200 entries are expected in the Duluth Garden Flower Society's 35th annual flower show to be held August 14-15 in Kirby Student Center ballroom.

Co-sponsor of the show this year will be the Department of Biology at UMD.

"Floral Classics" will be the theme of the show featuring arrangements and individual entries of begonias, violets, dahlias, roses, gladiolus and dozens of other varieties. \$400 in prizes will be awarded to winners in three divisions.

The show will run from 3:00-9:00 p.m. on Tuesday, August 14, and from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. on Wednesday, August 15 with awards to

be presented the last evening.

A style show of fall fashions with 12 Flower Society mothers and six children serving as models will be presented at 7:30 p.m. August 14 and at 2:00 p.m. August 15.

There will be several large displays of unusual plants, shrubs and flowers from both the UMD Department of Biology and the Northeast Experiment Station.

Mrs. William A. Klein is show committee chairman and Mrs. Como T. Pontliana is director of floor chairmen.

FAR EAST TALK SET

An illustrated lecture on the Far East will be presented by Dr. John A. Dettmann, professor of business and economics, at 8:00 p.m. August 13 in Kirby ballroom.

Dr. Dettmann took a series of colored slides on his return from a year's assignment in Korea at Seoul National University.

The slides include shots from Formosa, Hong Kong, Thailand, the Phillipine Islands and Cambodia.

Because of recent developments in some of these areas, the slides will have particular significance, Dettmann believes.

ENROLLMENT TOTALS 753

Second term Summer Session enrollment at UMD totals 753, including undergraduates and 122 graduate students, Provost Raymond W. Darland announced today.

While the figure is three under the same term last year, first term enrollment at UMD was 1,040 or four percent higher than in 1961 and set a one-term record.

Total University enrollment is 7,976 students, or five percent higher than for the second term last year, according to True E. Pettengill, University recorder. Pettengill said it was the ninth consecutive Summer Session term that the four campuses of the University showed a combined increase.

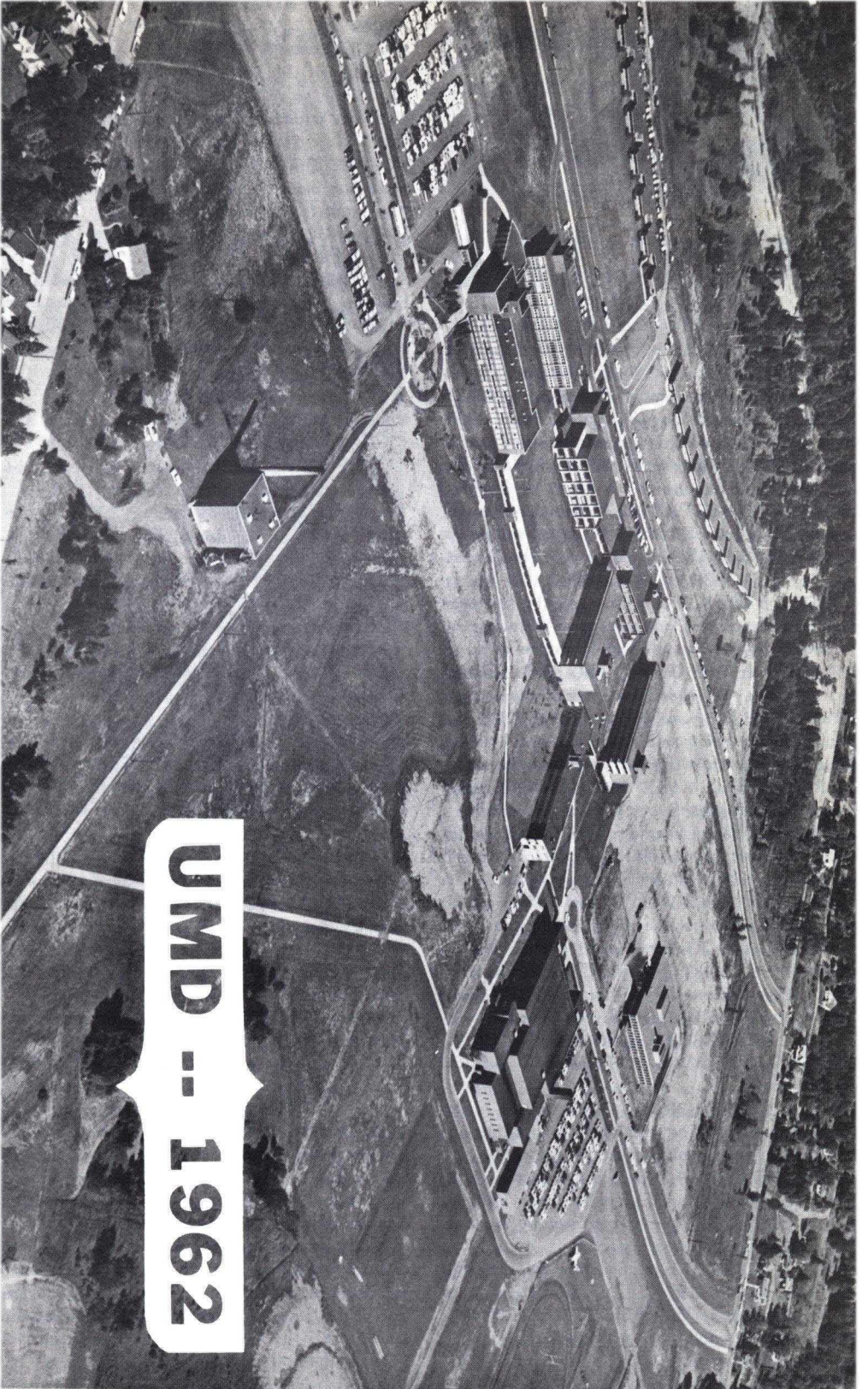
UMD Summer Session students came from 21 states and Canada. During first term (June 11-July 14), 121 Minnesota towns were represented on campus. The second term (July 10-August 18) has students from 79 Minnesota communities.

Almost 12-million dollars already has been expended for buildings and equipment with another 15-million dollars still to be required to complete the campus by 1970. Enrollment then is expected to exceed 4,000 students.
