Background

J.R Kantor's Interbehaviorism was first developed in the early 20th century. Interbehaviorism characterizes a system from a naturalistic foundation to explain all scientific psychology, behavior, and activity.

To our knowledge, the most recent objective evaluation of the impact of and trends in Interbehavioral psychology was researched by Ruben (1984), who conducted a citation analysis of scholarly work between 1937 and 1983.

Consensus on the relative utility of Interbehaviorism in contemporary behavior science appears to be mixed (Dixon & Belisle, 2021; Hayes & Fryling, 2019; Jacobs, 2020; Rehfeldt et al., 2020).

Purpose of Review

Contribute a form of objective data to evaluate the relative utility and influence of Interbehaviorism between 1984 and 2021.

Provide a contemporary account of research on Interbehaviorism which extends the 1937-1983 citation analysis provided by Ruben (1984).

Evaluate the contemporary publishing trends in Interbehaviorism (i.e., dominated by a particular author, country, or type of research).

manipulation, measures, results), and Country of Origin


Empirical = cited at least one of the search terms in text and presented original data

• Non-Empirical (NE)


 NE Review = book reviews, literature reviews, editorial overview articles, commentaries on target articles, replies to commentaries that cited at least one of the search terms

• NE Conceptual = theoretical papers that cited at least one of the search terms












Fig 2. Number of Empirical and Non-Empirical (Conceptual and Review)

Results

Our review yielded 91 peer-reviewed articles. 10 were categorized as Empirical, 81 were Non-Empirical. Out of the Non-Empirical articles, 21 were review articles, and 60 were conceptual. The number of articles published in the U.S.A was 78. Within the U.S.A, 22 were published in Nevada. 16 were published outside of the U.S.A.

Discussion

The number of Non-Empirical articles far-exceed the number of Empirical articles. Most research was localized to the U.S, particularly Reno, NV.
