

THE SERMON Fr. Samuel

Celebrant: Let us confess our faith in the words of the Nicene Creed:

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THE MINISTRATION OF COMMUNION

BCP, p. 119

(Facing the People, the Celebrant may say the following invitation:)

The gifts of God for the people of God. [Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.]

(or this:)

Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those who are invited to the marriage supper of the Lamb. (*John 1:29, Revelation 19:9*)

All baptized Christians, including children, are welcome to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion at the altar rail. We kneel, if possible, as a sign of humility and gratitude for Christ's gift of himself to us.

To receive the bread, cup your hands together, palms open and lifted. To receive the wine, assist the server in guiding the chalice to your lips, or retain the bread and dip it into the wine.

Anyone not receiving the Sacrament is welcome to come forward and receive a blessing; please indicate this intention by crossing your arms over your chest.

Those not able to come forward may notify an usher of their need to be served in the pew.

Gluten-free wafers are available at the left end of the altar rail (the organ side).

Weekly Wednesday Services: Children's Catechesis from 4pm-6pm; Midweek Eucharist at 5pm in the Pendleton Chapel; Confession at 5:30pm in the Retreat Room; Evening Prayer and Adult Catechesis from 6pm in the church.

Upcoming Services: St. Andrew's Day, Thursday, 11/20, at 5pm in the Pendleton Chapel.

Adult Christian Education

Newcomer's Classes: Our "Christian Foundations Course" is offered every Sunday morning at 9am in the Pendleton Chapel. The class is geared toward newcomers, but open to everyone and can be joined at any time. It is required before receiving baptism or confirmation, and essentially covers the contents of the Apostles' Creed, the Our Father, and the Ten Commandments.

Adult Sunday School Classes: Every Sunday at 9am in the Parish Hall we are offering "A Deep Well: The Story of the Church." This class will be walking through the lives and teachings of some of the great "ecumenical" saints commemorated in the Book of Common Prayer from the Apostles to the 4th century.

Evening Prayer and Catechesis: Every Wednesday at 6pm in the Church we offer Evening Prayer and Adult Catechesis. This semester we are studying the 39 Articles.

Liturgical Notes: The General Confession

After the Prayers of the People, comes the general confession and absolution. This portion of the liturgy, including the "Comfortable Words" that follow it, was the first instance of the use of the English language to be added to the liturgies of the Church of England in 1548, making it older than the prayerbook. At that time, the liturgy was still in Latin. The general confession in English was added to encourage the faithful to receive Holy Communion on a more regular basis. In the early church, sins were confessed publicly in the presence of the whole congregation before absolution was offered. Recognizing this precedent, the prayerbook attempts to move closer to that early ideal by offering public confession and absolution "until said discipline may be restored again." The function of placing Confession at this point in the liturgy is to help the faithful prepare to be worthy receivers of the Blessed Sacrament, following St. Paul in I Cor. 11:27-28, "Whoever, therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty concerning the body and blood of the Lord. Let a person examine himself, then, and so eat of the bread and drink of the cup." Christ tells us in Matt. 5:23-24, "if you are offering your gift at the altar and there remember that your brother has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go. First be reconciled to your brother, and then come and offer your gift." The Kiss of Peace, which is one of the earliest ritual features of Christian liturgy, tracing back to the time of the Apostles, is the crowning moment of this rite of Confession and Absolution. Far from being a mere opportunity for "greeting," it is intended to allow each communicant to express that they are reconciled with their neighbor before receiving the Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood.

Children at CTR

Children in Level II(6-9 year olds) have been working this Fall on creating their own Sunday bulletin. One of the parents noted that our Sunday bulletin is difficult to follow for those who either do not read yet or are just beginning to read. She thought if there were a bulletin with pictures for each part of the service they would have a much easier time following the service.

We spent time each week in our atrium thinking about each different part of the service what they saw and what we heard or said and then they drew pictures. We would look at all the pictures for each part and they would decide which one they liked the best.

Take some time in the next few weeks to look at the drawings some of them are quite profound.

Beginning this Sunday the children will be able to pick up a bulletin at the back of the church at the beginning of the service and then return it at the end of the service.
