

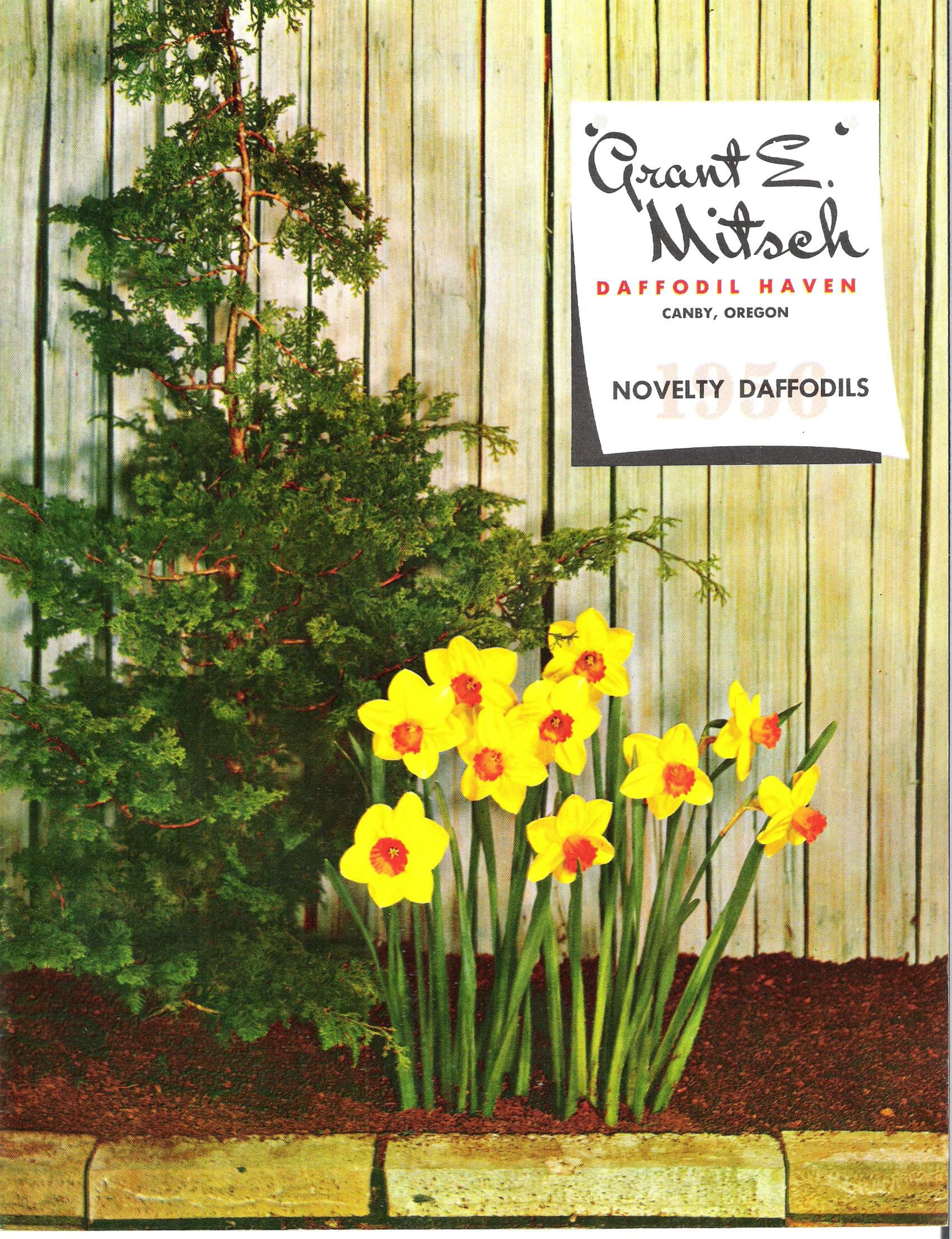

## Foreword . . . .

The Daffodil grower's life is beset with its "ups and downs" quite as much as that one engaged in most other fields of endeavor. The past year has been one of particularly trying circumstances, but not without some compensations. Friends and customers in the southern and central states reported devastating frosts after the flowers were in full bloom last year, with even the foliage being destroyed in some instances. In regions not quite so hard hit, later reports indicated that late flowering varieties still made a creditable showing indicating their sensational powers of recovery. Doubtless most who have grown Daffodils have witnessed buds or blooms being bent over to the soil surface when frozen, only to straighten up and show no evidence of injury when the atmosphere warms up a bit.

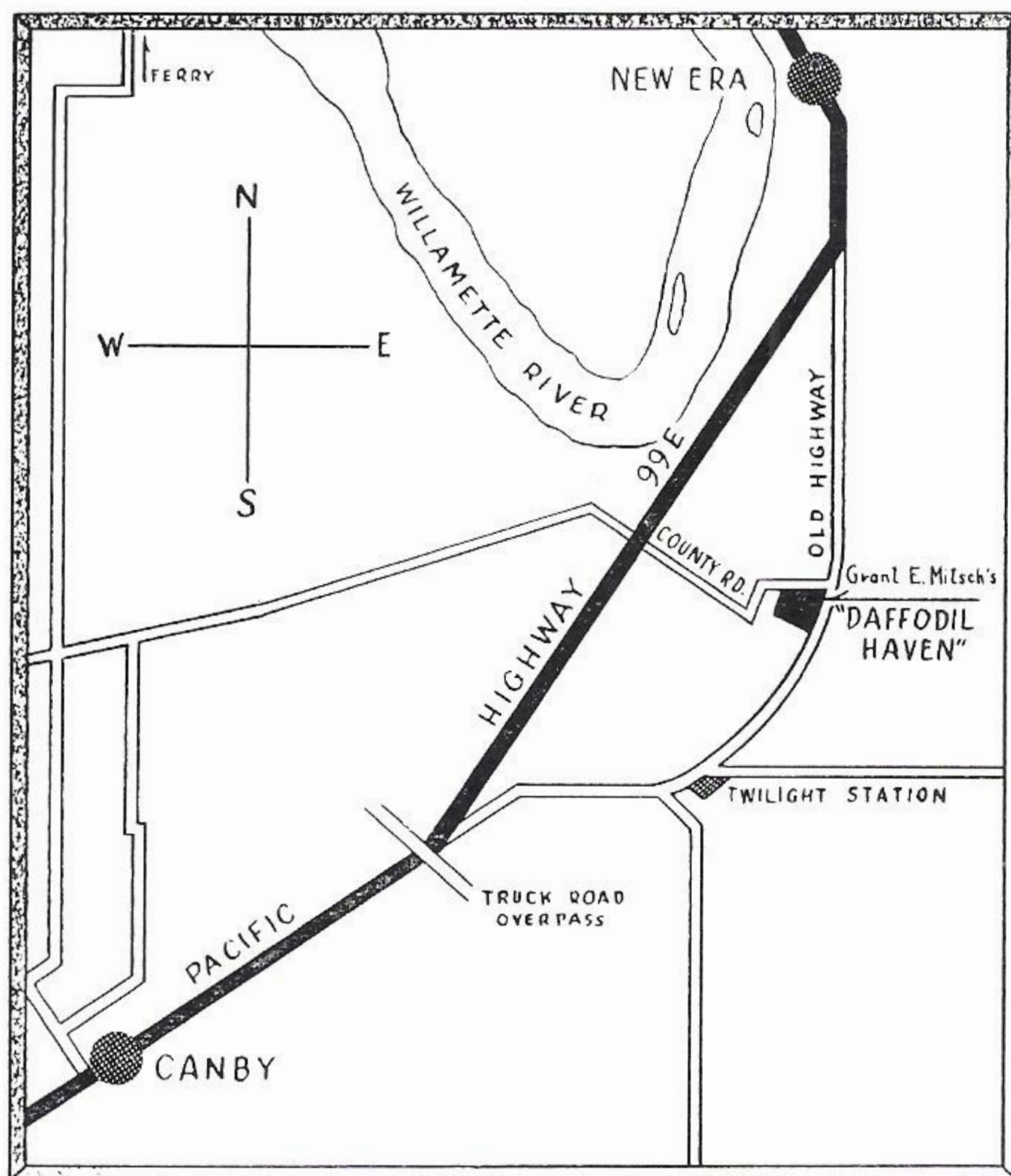
Our own flowers last year were battered in some cases beyond recognition during the early part of the season by a severe gale and all day downpour of rain, but some varieties showed remarkable powers of recuperation. The present season has been one with an unprecedented severe freeze in November following a frostless earlier autumn, after which it was wet and rainy almost constantly until February when another cold snap struck. Rain one day followed by severe freezing the next did considerable injury to small seedlings and even foliage of some of the larger flowered varieties was heaved up and a few leaves broken off. We still anticipate a fine display of blooms.

Our thanks go to our many loyal customers and friends for their support and recommendations to others. If the Daffodil is your favorite flower, we might suggest that you join the new Daffodil Society whose address is given below. Perhaps you may find some of the books we list helpful and interesting. We are not offering Primrose seed this year due to nearly all our plants having been killed by the November freeze but anticipate being able to supply them again another season.

Again this year we are offering a few new Daffodil varieties selected from thousands of seedlings. These are not all world-beaters to be sure and most of them are desirable for decorative purposes rather than exhibition.

Canby has become the home of quite a few flower breeders and a great many more growers. To mention only a few of the former we would include Mrs. Merton G. Ellis whose Oregon Giant Pansies have become world renowned; Fred de Forest, whose Iris originations are highly rated among the world's best; Chet Tompkins, another very prominent Iris hybridizer; Ronald Beatty, a young man of whom I think we will be hearing more in the future; and Swan Island Dahlia Farms, one of the largest in the West. And of course we should mention Jan de Graaff, who has plantings in this area, and Steele's Pansy Gardens, whose farms are near by. To list all the growers in this area would be beyond the scope of this foreword.

For our new Daffodils, see the center spread of this catalog. We would, as in the past, urge that you order as early as possible; and while we do not like to make substitutions, we would suggest, particularly if you order late and alternatives were acceptable, to so inform us.



Visitors welcome at our gardens during the blooming season except on Sundays, when we are closed.

## TERMS

Please send cash with order, or 25% down and the balance before delivery. Prices quoted are prepaid on orders of \$3.50 or more except as noted. On smaller orders add 25c for postage and packing. However, for those willing to pay transportation, we will gladly include extra bulbs valued at more than the estimated cost of shipping. We can send by express collect, or in the case of small orders, send by parcel post and you remit for postage on receipt of order.

On cash orders of \$10.00 or more received before August 1st, except for collections and bulbs priced per 100, we give about 10% extra in bulbs of our selection. Orders sent later also receive extras but we endeavor to be a bit more generous on the early orders. These premium bulbs may consist of either named varieties or some of our selected numbered or named seedlings, to be chosen at our discretion, and dependent on available stocks.

Prices quoted are for good double nose bulbs except for a few species that normally do not make many bulbs of this type. If sold out of double nose size, we endeavor to give equal or greater value in smaller good blooming sizes. We do not price round bulbs of novelties since we need these for our propagation. Ordinarily we start shipping around the first of September but we advise that you **PLEASE SEND ORDERS BY SEPTEMBER 1ST IF POSSIBLE**. We emphasize early ordering as there is a shortage of some varieties. Give second choice if possible.

## KEY TO DESCRIPTIONS

Name of variety is given first, followed by the name of the originator in parenthesis. The number and letter following is the Royal Horticultural Society classification, viz.: 1a means yellow trumpet; 2b means large cupped bi-color. Season of bloom is indicated next but this is only approximate: letters EE indicate extra early; E, early; EM, early midseason; M, midseason; LM, late midseason; L, late. Then the approximate height in inches is given. Both blooming seasons and height must be taken as only approximate relatively.

**ACTAEA** (Lubbe) 9 M. 20". Very large poet with white perianth and red bordered eye. 3 for 50c; \$1.75 per dozen.

**ADA FINCH** (de Graaff) 1c E. 22". Large flowers with wide overlapping informal perianth, and a huge flaring heavily frilled trumpet that opens lemon but fades to ivory. One of the most conspicuous early flowers. Tall for a white. 35c each.

**ALBERNI BEAUTY** (Hilton) 3c L. 24". Gayly poised as butterflies, the pure white flowers with recurved petal edges and small frilly lemon crowns are airily held on very tall stems, as they proclaim the end of the Daffodil season. 40c each.

**ALEMEIN** (Richardson) 2a M. 20". A flower of very high quality, having beautiful smooth, broad flat clear golden yellow perianth segments, and a medium sized cup of intense deep orange red. \$1.75 each.

**ALTYRE** (Brodie) 3c LM. 22". A very large pure white flower from Nelly x Chinese White. \$3.00 each.

**ANGELINE** (A. M. Wilson) 3b M. 21". Earlier than most of its type, this is a delightfully dainty flower for cutting. Pure white perianth and citron white cup with a distinctive narrow golden frill. 25c each.

**APRIL TEARS** (Alec Gray) 5a M. 9". A delightful elfin flower with two or three exquisitely formed pendant lemon blossoms on a stem. \$1.25 each.

**ARANJUEZ** (Warnaar) 2a M. 18". A very well formed flower with rounded overlapping yellow perianth segments, and rather a large bowl shaped crown having a broad band of orange red at the margin. 30c each.

**ARDCLINIS** (G. L. Wilson) 1c M. 19". A very smooth finished white flower of excellent quality. 70c each.

**ARDOUR** (Mitsch) 3a LM. 24". No. 39C29/1 Parentage: Cheerio x Market Merry. An exhibition flower of excellent form and balance. Large flowers with flat, broadly overlapping smooth perianths of golden yellow; and medium sized saucer shaped crown of intense deep orange red. Should be picked early to use for exhibition as the edges of the cup may burn otherwise. Aside from this fault, it is one of the best seedlings we have raised and has proven about the best red cup for breeding, giving numbers of seedlings of fine color and good resistance to weather. Good substance and a strong grower. \$2.00 each.

**ARMADA** (G. L. Wilson) 2a E. 22". A sensational giant early flower, large bold crown of intense tangerine orange red. Holds its color well. A vigorous grower. Only two or three to spare. \$6.00 each.

**ARNOLD NEALE** (Brown) 1b EM. 19". A good quality bi-color trumpet. Smooth finish in both the white perianth and rather narrow lemon trumpet. 25c each.

**ARTIST'S MODEL** (Lewis) 3b L. 17". Very unique is this flower whose color is slightly reminiscent of that of Blarney, the broad smooth perianth being white, while the apricot orange crown has the unusual feature of being nearly flat except for the edges which reflex to touch the perianth. Only two or three to go at \$10.00 each.

**ASKELON** (Brodie) 1c M. 19". A good quality large white trumpet of crepe-like texture. A fine flower whose name is found in the pedigree of a number of our fine white trumpet varieties. 30c each.

**AUTOWIN** (Lewis) 3b L. 18". Well grown specimens of this certainly "ought to win" on the show bench. Has been classed as an improved Therapia. Large rounded flat overlapping white perianth, with a saucer shaped crown of clear yellow edged with an exquisite orange-red frill. \$10.00 each.

**BAHRAM** (Richardson) 2a EM. 20". A large flower of attractive form, having broad smooth overlapping perianth of brilliant yellow, and a medium sized crown of vivid orange red. This is particularly fine in cool weather when it opens slowly. Regarded very highly in England and winner of the F.C.C. there. 35c each; \$3.50 per dozen.

**BALLYFERIS** (Richardson) 1b LM. 19". A large flower of good quality, having smooth flat perianth, and a soft lemon yellow trumpet of nice proportion. 40c each.

**BALMORAL** (Brodie) 2a M. 20". Among the most pleasingly formed of the yellows. Beautiful smooth finish and rich even coloring. 30c each.

**BAMBI** (Dutch) 1b E. 8". An extra early blooming little bicolor trumpet. 50c each.

**BANTRY** (Richardson) 3b LM. 20". A most attractive medium sized flower having pure white perianth, and flat crown of yellow sharply edged orange red. 40c each.

**BEERSHEBA** (Engleheart) 1c EM. 17". This is the most popular and best seller with us of all the Daffodils we list. There are better white trumpets, but this is surely the best in its price class. Pointed, but well overlapping perianth of beautiful texture and substance, and long, narrow trumpet. A great prize winner. 30c each; \$3.00 per dozen.

**BENGHAZI** (Richardson) 2a M. 20". Rounded flat rich yellow perianth, and rather flat crown banded orange red, fading to gold in the center. 60c each.

**EEN HUR** (de Graaff) 1a EM. 18". One of the giants of the yellow trumpets, and among the most showy. Flat perianth stands at right angles to the large flaring frilled trumpet. 30c each; 3 for 80c.



**BERYL** (Williams) 6b EM. 12". Lovely little flower; reflexing yellow perianth which fades to cream, and orange cup fading to gold. 40c each.

**BINKIE** (Wolfhagen) 2d M. 21". A curious and most distinct and yet withal, an attractive flower. Broad, flat, pointed, overlapping perianth, with a well balanced crown. Opens an attractive cool greenish sulphur lemon color, the inside of the crown fading to almost white. A beautiful cut flower. \$2.00 each.

**BITHYNIA** (Mitsch 1955) 2b LM. 22". Combining some of the good qualities of both its parents (Rubra x Sylvia O'Neill) this was one of the best of the first lot of interesting flowers from this cross. Large, flat, well rounded white perianth of good substance, and a flaring, nearly flat, creamy white crown with deeper colored margin. A beautiful, well balanced flower for cutting, and should prove excellent for exhibition. Its pollen has given some very fine seedlings. \$5.00 each.

**BIZERTA** (Richardson) 2b EM. 20". Rather like Polindra in form, the yellow crown being tinged with apricot. 50c each.

**BLARNEY** (Richardson) 3b LM. 21". A lovely flower with white perianth and salmon orange crown. \$1.00 each.

**BLARNEY'S DAUGHTER** (J. L. Richardson) 2b LM. 21". Very flat, pure white, silken smooth perianth, with a medium sized flaring crown of apricot orange with narrow gold rim. A very lovely flower. \$18.00 each.

**BLINKBONNY** (Brodie) 3b L. 19". Medium sized flower of very brilliant coloring. White perianth with cherry red crown. 50c each.

**BOBBY SOXER** (Alec Gray) 7b LM. 8". Small, light yellow flower with nice flat perianth and good sized, nearly flat crown. Not many to spare. 75c each.

**BODILLY** (P. D. Williams) 2b M. 22". Tall, strong stemmed, and with fine large flowers of splendid form and texture. One of the most striking bi-color Daffodils that we raise. Pure white, flat, overlapping perianth of good substance, and bright deep lemon, well frilled crown. Very prolific and vigorous. 25c each.

**BOMBAY** (Richardson) 2a LM. 21". Smooth clear yellow perianth, and rather straight cup of the same color but for a frill of red. A good new one. \$2.00 each.

**BONNEVILLE** (Mitsch-1953) 2c EM. 21". For those who wish to grow the largest Daffodils, we suggest this variety, an enormous white flower with many good qualities, having size, substance, carriage, and vigor. Very large flat perianth, up to six inches across with flaring, trumpet-like crown of pale lemon, fading to milk white. This dwarfs other varieties when in bloom and is quite sensational in the garden or on the show table although not of good balance or form for an exhibition flower. It takes a week or ten days to fully develop. (Ada Finch x Fortune.) \$5.00 each.

**BRAMBLING** (Richardson) 3b L. 18". A very nicely formed and textured flower having broad white perianth and a small cup with a red edge shading through orange and citron to a green eye. A stylish and attractive flower. 75c each.

**BRAVURA** (G. L. Wilson) 3b L. 20". Beautiful pure white perianth of very smooth finish, and a well balanced deep vivid orange scarlet crown. One of the best in its class. \$1.20 each.

**BROUGHSHANE** (G. L. Wilson) 1c LM. 25". Perhaps the most striking white trumpet we have. Massive blooms borne on very tall stems. Very broad smooth white overlapping perianth, and large bell mouthed trumpet. \$4.00 each.

**BRUNSWICK** (P. D. Williams) 2b E. 22". Although one of the first to bloom, this frequently lasts until some later things are past their prime. A flower of surpassing loveliness whose stiff stems hold the flowers erect with splendid poise. Broad overlapping, but pointed, petals of fine texture, and a nicely frilled light lemon crown which passes to white except at the margin, this too, eventually becoming white. Withdrawn from increase.

**BRYHER** (Favell) 3c L. 20". One of those beautiful cool green and white Daffodils, this is large and tall for one of its type. Somewhat intermediate between Chinese White and Foggy Dew in form. A very few bulbs. \$6.00 each.

**BUNCRANA** (Richardson) 2b M. 18". Large broad white perianth with quite a good sized rather long crown of peachy-orange color. \$1.50 each.

**BUNDORAN** (Richardson) 2b M. 18". Another good flower with nice large flat perianth and a large frilled cup with interesting buff tones. \$1.00 each.

**CALIFORNIA GOLD** (Barr) 2a M. 21". Good sized flower of rich clear golden yellow in the smooth flat perianth, having quite a large crown of very vivid orange red intensely frilled at the margin. \$2.00 each.

**CAMBERWELL KING** (Brown) 1a M. 24". Beautiful smooth texture, splendid form, giant size, and rich pure coloring combine to make this one of the best yellow trumpets. Stems could be a little stronger. This has given us the best seedlings we have had in the yellow trumpet class. 60c each.

**CAMPFIRE** (G. L. Wilson) 2a M. 22". One of Wilson's seedlings which we introduced. A stalwart, well formed rich clear yellow with brilliant orange red crown. Prolific. 25c each, \$2.50 doz.

**CANTABILE** (G. L. Wilson) 9 L. 18". Among the most beautiful of the poets. Rounded pure white perianth and a flat deep emerald green eye with yellow band and a red rim. An ideal flower for cutting but should be cut early to preserve the exquisite coloring. 35c each.

**CANTATRICE** (G. L. Wilson) 1c EM. 22". A flower styled after Beersheba but with more even form and build and having a taller stem. Regarded as the most perfect exhibition white trumpet; it has won numerous awards. \$3.50 each.

**CARBINEER** (A. M. Wilson) 2a M. 23". Very broad overlapping deep golden yellow perianth of very heavy substance standing at right angles to the medium sized rich orange red cup shading to yellow at the base. 25c each; \$2.50 per dozen.

**CARDIGAN** (A. M. Wilson) 2b M. 20". Not a new one but one of those finely formed bicolors reminiscent of Bodilly. Of show quality and excellent for breeders. 50c each.

**CARLTON** (P. D. Williams) 2a M. 22". A grand flower of gigantic proportions, having very broad flat rich lemon yellow perianth and nicely proportioned large frilled yellow crown. Very vigorous and prolific. A "must have" for every Daffodil fancier. 25c each; \$2.25 per dozen.

**CARNLOUGH** (G. L. Wilson) 2c EM. 21". Broad white perianth of smooth satiny finish and faint creamy crown with delicate pinkish frill. 25c each.

**CASABIANCA** (Mitsch) 2b M. 22". Distinct in form is this flower with its spreading white perianth, and rather short, but good sized creamy lemon crown, widely flared and nicely crimped. Sturdy stems make this an attractive garden flower, and its form gives it value for cutting. 65c each.

**CEYLON** (Richardson) 2a E. 23". Probably the finest red and yellow exhibition Daffodil available. Large flower of very smooth finish, and deepest intense golden yellow perianth; the crown being a rich deep orange red which intensifies several days after first opening. \$10.00 each

**CHARITY MAY** (C. F. Coleman) 6a EM. 14". One of the series of very lovely cyclamineus hybrids recently raised in England. A charming, graceful flower of clear soft yellow with broad much reflexed perianth; and quite long crown, somewhat expanded at its mouth. Only a few to spare. \$3.50 each.

**CHEERFULNESS** (van de Schoot) 4 M. 22". Clusters of bloom having white petals interspersed with yellow. 3 for 50c; \$1.90 per dozen.

**CHERIE** (Mitchell) 7b M. 22". Ivory white jonquil with pink flushed cup. One to three blooms per stem. Pretty and very unique. 75c each.



**CHEYENNE** (Powell) 7b M. 20". An unusual creamy white cluster flowered jonquil. Limited stock. 70c each.

**CHINA CLAY** (Brodie) 1c M. 16". A small to medium sized flower designed somewhat like Beersheba but with narrower petals and geometrically perfect form and marble like finish. Very pretty. 30c each.

**CHINESE WHITE** (G. L. Wilson) 3c LM. 18". A superbly beautiful flower of crystalline purity. Very large rounded, much overlapping perianth, and a saucer shaped crown with a touch of green in the eye. Demurely droops its head on first opening but straightens up as it expands. \$3.00 each.

**CHINOOK** (Mitsch) 2b EM. 21". Large, flat, milk white perianth, and a very large saucer-shaped crown which varies from salmon orange to yellow depending on weather, soil, and stage of development. A striking garden flower and very showy for cutting. 90c each.

**CHUNGKING** (G. L. Wilson) 3a EM. 20". Probably the best in its class. Magnificent flower with most circular, flat, intense gold perianth and vivid red, rather flat crown. \$1.40 each.

**CIBOLA** (Mitsch) 2a EE. 22". One of the very first of the large flowered Daffodils to bloom here. Better in form and substance, and richer in color than its seed parent, Malvern Gold. The very flat broad perianth is of rich deep golden yellow; the large, widely flaring crown is beautifully crimped. The short necked, stiff stemmed flowers are well faced and have good keeping quality. Withdrawn to increase stock.

**CLACKAMAS** (Mitsch-1954) 2b M. 21". A good sized flower with quite flat overlapping white perianth, and a large nearly flat lemon crown edged pale orange. A good flower for the garden or for cutting. (John Evelyn x Dick Wellband.) \$1.00 each.

**CLACKMAR** (G. L. Wilson) 3a M. 20". Pretty flat bronzy yellow perianth, and brilliant orange red crown. A Wilson seedling introduced here. 20c each; \$2.00 per dozen.

**CLEENA** (Richardson) 2b EM. 20". A Fortune seedling of smooth finish; white perianth, white, primrose and apricot crown. 50c each.

**CLOCKFACE** (G. L. Wilson) 3b L. 20". Satin smooth milk white perianth with a flat crown edged with a ribbon of orange red. A large flower. Very few to go. \$3.50 each.

**CONTENT** (P. D. Williams) 1b EM. 24". Very large flower built along the lines of Beersheba but with wider perianth segments, which are twisted just enough to eliminate any stiffness, yet are very smooth and flat in general appearance. Opens pale greenish lemon but fades to nearly white. Very durable. Great value for breeding. \$2.00 each.

**COOLIN** (A. M. Wilson) 1c M. 20". A massive pure white flower of beautiful form and excellent quality. Very good. 75c each.

**CORONADO** (Mitsch-1953) 2a M. 20". Perhaps the most unique in color of anything we have introduced. Fairly large flower with creamy yellow perianth; and very heavily frilled, long, buff crown. On being cut, the perianth becomes tawny buff, while the crown is pinkish buff-toned. Totally unlike any other of numerous quite worthless seedlings from the same cross. This may have value in breeding. (Tunis x Mrs. Backhouse.) \$2.40 each.

**CORRYMEELA** (G. L. Wilson) 2b M. 18". Good white perianth with expanded, flanged crown of pale, cool primrose flushed rosy salmon. \$2.25 each.

**COVERACK PERFECTION** (Brodie) 2b M. 22". A grand immense flower with overlapping white perianth, and large saucer shaped crown of creamy buff edged salmon apricot under favorable conditions. A fine flower even when not at its best in color. 50c each.

**CRAFORD** (P. D. Williams) 8 EM. 20". One of the best tazettas. Several rather crinkled white blooms with red eyes on each stem. Fine for pots as it forces early and easily. 35c each.

**CREAM CUP** (Mitsch) 2b EM. 22". Large flower of very smooth texture. Broad overlapping white perianth, and good sized light lemon crown fading to cream. 25c each; \$2.50 per dozen.

**CRETE** (Richardson) 3b L. 22". Magnificent red and white with very heavy substance. \$1.00 each.

**CROCUS** (P. D. Williams) 2a LM. 18". A large flower of excellent form, being a self of intense, almost orange gold color. One of the finest yellow Daffodils. 35 each.

**CROWN DERBY** (Brodie) 3b LM. 21". Large white perianth; yellow crown, edged red. Striking. 50c each.

**CUSHENDALL** (G. L. Wilson) 3c L. 18". Small flower of perfect form and ethereal beauty. Very smooth, perfectly flat, circular perianth; small eye, with delicious cream frill and moss green center. \$1.25 each.

**CYCLATAZ** (Tait) 10 E. 5". One of the very interesting miniatures but one of which not much stock is available. Please do not order after August 1st and our stocks may not hold until then. Virtually a miniature Soleil d'Or. \$1.00 each.

**DAISY SCHAFFER** (de Graaff) 2b LM. 21". Giant white with light lemon crown. Much in demand. 25c each; \$2.50 per dozen.

**DAWN** (Engleheart) 5b LM. 14". A curious but pretty and graceful little flower with white reflexed perianth, and very flat disc-like cup. Two or three flowers to a stem. 75c each.

**DERVISH** (G. L. Wilson) 2a M. 20". Buff yellow perianth and brick red crown. Quite unique in color. 50c each.

**DEW POND** (G. L. Wilson) 2c LM. 17". Lovely large smooth white flower with bowl shaped crown. \$5.50 each.

**DICK WELLBAND** (Mrs. Backhouse) 2b M. 21". One of the most colorful and easy to grow of the red cups. White perianth with brilliant orange red crown. Very showy. 30c each; 3 for 80c.

**DIOLITE** (Miss Evelyn) 2a EM. 24". An outstanding large flower with very smooth finish. Well formed, large, flat perianth of clear yellow, good sized crown of yellow, edged with a band of orange red. Strong vigorous grower. 25c each; \$2.50 per dozen.

**DIOTIMA** (de Graaff) 1a E. 25". Size and earliness combine to make this one of the most sought after of yellow Daffodils. Very large star-like flat perianth, and long crimped trumpet. 40c each.

**DOVE WINGS** (C. F. Coleman) 6a EM. 14". A sister seedling to Charity May, this one has a reflexed white perianth, and medium length cup with indented rim. A very few to go at \$3.50 each.

**DREAMLIGHT** (G. L. Wilson) 3b L. 17". Sparkling snow-white circular perianth with overlapping petals; white eye, overlaid soft gray-green, with a distinct rim of cerise. Perfect for cutting. 40c each.

**DUNKELD** (Brodie) 2a LM. 20". The individual perianth segments are almost round, making this a most circular flower. Flat clear yellow perianth, and saucer shaped shallow crown of vivid orange red. Prolific. 50c each.

**DUKE OF WINDSOR** (Uit den Boogaard) 2b M. A very large flower of John Evelyn type, having white perianth of heavy thick texture, and a very large flaring ruffled crown of yellow becoming deeper at the edge. **FAIRY MOTHER** (Lewis) 2b LM. 17". Quite large rounded white perianth, crown of a rich pinkish orange salmon. Very few bulbs. \$3.00 each.

**FAIRY NYMPH** (Barr) 7b LM. 16". An interesting creamy white rather small jonquil with heads of two or three flowers. 50c each.

**FAIRY TALE** (G. L. Wilson) 3b M. 18". A flower of fine quality with smooth rounded white perianth, with rather flat crown of citron, margined with an orange band. \$6.50 each.

**FEBRUARY GOLD** (de Graaff) 6a EE. 14". One of the first Daffodils to bloom. Lemon yellow perianth, deeper yellow trumpet. 25c each.

The flat, rounded, overlapping white perianth serves as an excellent foil for the medium sized flaring cup, which is also white but with a heavy frill of apricot that is quite as entrancing as the trill of a prima donna as the name might suggest. Excellent capabilities on the show bench and in the hands of hybridists seem evident. A lovely flower showing much promise. \$25.00 each.

**MADRIGAL** (Mitsch-1956) 2b LM. 16". No. M11/1 (Chinese White x Green Island). From the reverse cross that produced COLORATURA, this is a striking but perhaps more plebian flower. Less refined in form but with an even more lavish frill. With a perianth so broad as to tend towards coarseness, particularly in freshly opened blossoms, the immense, very flat crown is pleated, puckered, and frilled with a great amount of substance. Not very tall on first opening, it soon grows to average height. The golden apricot rim gives it added attractiveness, and its unique form will find many admirers. \$12.00 each.

**MOUNT JEFFERSON** (Mitsch-1956) 1c EM. No. J37/5 (Kanchenjunga x Ada Finch). A huge white trumpet with fringed and lacinated border. Somewhat like a much longer stemmed Kanchenjunga but with not quite so broad a perianth. Taller than most of the big white trumpets, and a little earlier to bloom. \$8.00 each.

**LEBANON** (Mitsch-1956) 2b LM 21". (John Evelyn x Fortune.)

As one might expect from its ancestry, this is not one of the smoothest of flowers. The white perianth, can, I think be compared in form to that of Fortune. It is quite a large flower with a nearly flat crown of exceptional size, that for sheer impressiveness with its embellishments of fringes, lacinations, and flutings is quite unrivaled. One who does not like the John Evelyn type flower is not likely to care for this. For those to whom Pinwheel and Linn appeal, this should have more attraction. If you want something striking and unusual in your garden, plant this one. \$3.00 each.

**MEADOWLARK** (Mitsch-1956) 2b EM. 24". 38C90/2 (Tunis x Fortune).

Neither particularly striking nor of exhibition caliber, this might be called a garden Daffodil. We have debated offering it, but it is so consistently good in habit and growth year after year, and it lasts so long in the garden despite inclement weather, that we have come to love it for its staying qualities. Like its namesake, it does not make a great splurge on the scene but its cheerful appearance and durability make us think of friends who do not seek the limelight but are ever ready to befriend one in time of need. After the style of Fortune but with creamy white perianth and buff yellow crown shading lighter at the base. \$3.00 each.

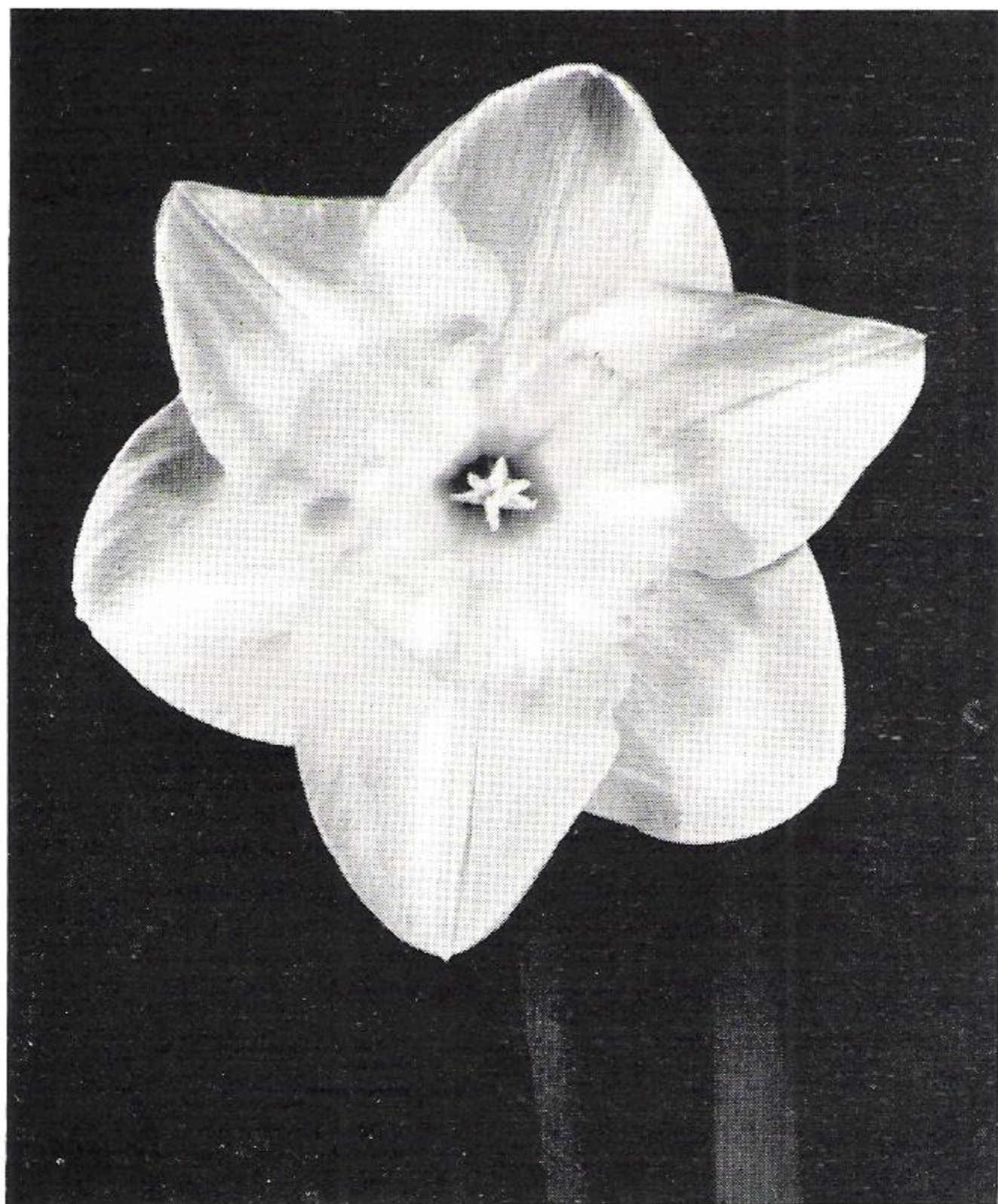

- WHITE PROSPECT** (J. L. Richardson) 1c M. 22". Giant white trumpet with fine broad overlapping perianth; and slender trumpet with wide rolled flange. Reputed to be about the finest in its class. \$45.00 each.
- WHITE WEDGWOOD** (de Graaff) 7b LM. 18". A pale yellow to ivory Jonquil that is no longer widely grown, but because of the paucity of flowers of its type we are offering it. 35c each.
- WILD ROSE** (Brodie) 2b LM. 18". A small to medium sized flower of quite good form, having pure white perianth, and a good sized crown of pink. In favorable years it comes deep, almost rose pink. 75c each.
- WILLAMETTE** (Mitsch-1954) 2b EM. 24". A very tall, early mid-season Daffodil with large flowers borne on strong stems, having the smoothness of the pollen parent and the stems of the seed parent. Very smooth, polished, clean white perianth, and good sized, well balanced, clear yellow crown. A nicely proportioned flower suitable for garden, cutting, and exhibition. Blooms seem to be very long lasting in the field. A rapid increaser. (Tunis x Mitylene.) \$1.20 each; \$12.00 per dozen.
- YELLOW CHEERFULNESS** (Eggink Bros.) 4 M. 22". A delightful flower with clusters of small double blossoms just like its counterpart, Cheerfulness, except for color, this being an attractive deep lemon yellow. 30c each.
- YELLOW WARBLER** (Mitsch-1954) 5a EM. 14". Similar to Lemon Drops and from the same cross, this being slightly paler in color, and opens about two weeks earlier. Usually two or three drooping light yellow blooms to a stem. Prolific of bloom and increase. (Fortune x Triandrus albus.) \$1.50 each.
- ZERO** (G. L. Wilson) 2c E. 24". A magnificent giant snowy white flower. Flat, overlapping perianth with pointed petals, and a long well balanced, nicely frilled crown. Is very white on first opening and lasts a long time. A really fine white Daffodil. \$4.50 each.
- ZEST** (Mitsch) 1b EM. 24". A sister seedling to Silverdale. Very vigorous and prolific, making many blooms on long, strong stems, with flat overlapping perianths and pale yellow trumpets fading to cream. A good garden flower and nice for cutting. 40c each.

## NARCISSUS SPECIES

This year we are adding a few to the list of species that we have been offering, and expect in the future to have more to offer. Some such as *N. cyclamineus* and *N. minimus* are considerably higher in price than imported bulbs but many of the latter are collected wild bulbs. We make no claims for the performance of ours but think they have a better chance of giving good bloom the first year than collected bulbs. Stocks are quite limited, and we hope to replant bulbs early.

- N. Bulbocodium conspicuum**—The yellow hoop petticoat Daffodil. Narrow, inconspicuous petals and large trumpet. About 8 inches. 10c each; \$1.00 per dozen.
- N. Canaliculatus**—A miniature "Chinese Lily" or tazetta hybrid. Small white flowers with yellow cups borne in clusters. Not a free bloomer everywhere. 10c each, \$1.00 per dozen.
- N. cyclamineus**—A perky little flower growing about six inches tall, with narrow, extremely reflexed perianth, and long trumpet-like crown with flanged rim. Not happy everywhere but a delightful elfin flower where it succeeds. 50c each.
- N. Jonquilla simplex**—Clusters of very sweetly scented small deep yellow flowers. 10c each; \$1.00 per dozen.

- N. Juncifolius**—A miniature jonquil with one to three tiny sweet scented blossoms on each stem. Comes easily from seed but usually not very long lived. 20c each.
- N. Maximus superbus**—Botanically this is *N. hispanicus*, the giant of the trumpet species. The ancestor of most modern yellow trumpets. 15c each.
- N. minimus (asturiensis)**—The smallest of the trumpet Daffodils. A real treasure. Considerable variation in form. Clear pure yellow. 3 inches. 30 each.
- N. minor**—Another little trumpet growing to about four inches. Very few to spare. 50c each.
- N. nanus**—Very nicely formed with flat, smooth perianth. Rapid increaser but not always free in bloom. About 8 inches high. 30c each.
- N. pumilus**—Next to minor in size. A very few to go. 50c each.
- N. Pumilus plenus**—A double form of one of the dwarf species. Very double flowers resembling a giant dandelion with some green petals. Not pretty, but a curious little flower. 50c each.
- N. watieri**—Similar to *N. juncifolius* in form, but a little larger, pure white, and with but one flower to a stem. One of the loveliest of all the little ones. 50c each.



# MIXTURES

From our testing grounds, we have thousands of seedlings yearly which are of insufficient merit to warrant selection with a view to further observation and perhaps eventual introduction, and among these are many that are as fine as ordinary named varieties; some proving later to be better than some that were selected and moved to our secondary trial plantings. These bulbs are placed together and sold as our **GENERAL MIXTURE**.

Out of the many seedlings grown, there are usually two to four hundred selected for further trial each year, but after from two to five or six years or even longer, most of these are deemed to be of insufficient merit, or not sufficiently distinct from the best varieties on the market or other seedlings still carried on, and these, which in most cases, have increased a great deal, are dumped together and offered now as our **BETTER MIXTURE**.

Then there are a few seedlings that are especially striking or interesting for some reason from which we select one bulb of each to go into our **SELECT MIXTURE**. This was our Better Mixture of 1953.

Having done a good deal of breeding for pinks, there are naturally hundreds of seedlings with more or less pink, salmon, buff, and apricot tones that have been selected over a period of years,

most of which are obviously unworthy of introduction. Some of these will doubtless not show any pink tones in some localities and during some seasons, and it is possible that a few in the mixture may show no color under favorable conditions, but there are a great many very interesting flowers in this lot. They are offered this year as our **PINK MIXTURE**.

In addition, we have a **RED CUP MIXTURE**, and **SMALL CUP MIXTURE**, the latter being largely Poeticus types. Much that is said about the PINK MIXTURE applies to these as well as there may be an occasional off colored or off-type flower in each group. These mixtures are offered as follows:

**GENERAL MIXTURE.** 25 double nose bulbs for \$3.00; \$10.50 per 100 prepaid. Round bulbs and large slabs, \$6.50 per 100 prepaid.

**BETTER MIXTURE.** \$2.50 per dozen.

## REVISED SYSTEM FOR THE CLASSIFICATION OF DAFFODILS

In Use Since January 1, 1950

- (i) "Colored" means yellow or some other color than white.
- (ii) "White" means white or whitish.
- (iii) The length of a perianth segment is the extreme length measured on the inside from its junction with the corona along the midrib to the extreme tip, and the length of the corona is the extreme length measured from its junction with the perianth to the end of its furthest extension when the edge is flattened out.

### Division 1—TRUMPET NARCISSI of Garden Origin

Distinguishing characters: One flower to a stem; Trumpet or Corona as long or longer than the Perianth segments.

- (a) Perianth colored; Corona colored, not paler than the Perianth.
- (b) Perianth white; Corona colored.
- (c) Perianth white; Corona white, not paler than the Perianth.
- (d) Any color combination not falling into (a), (b), or (c).

### Div. 2—LARGE-CUPPED NARCISSI of Garden Origin

Distinguishing characters: One flower to a stem; Cup or Corona more than one-third, but less than equal to the length of the Perianth segments.

- (a) Perianth colored, Corona colored, not paler than the Perianth.
- (b) Perianth white; Corona colored.
- (c) Perianth white; Corona white, not pale than the Perianth.
- (d) Any color combination not falling into (a), (b), or (c).

### Div. 3—SMALL-CUPPED NARCISSI of Garden Origin

Distinguishing characters: One flower to a stem; Cup or Corona not more than one-third the length of the Perianth segments.

- (a) Perianth colored; Corona colored, not paler than the Perianth.
- (b) Perianth white; Corona colored.
- (c) Perianth white; Corona white, not paler than the Perianth.
- (d) Any color combination not falling into (a), (b), or (c).

### Division 4—DOUBLE NARCISSI of Garden Origin

Distinguishing character: Double flowers.

### Division 5—TRIANDRUS NARCISSI of Garden Origin

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of *Narcissus triandrus* clearly evident.

- (a) Cup or Corona not less than two-thirds the length of the Perianth segments.
- (b) Cup or Corona less than two-thirds the length of the Perianth segments.

### Div. 6—CYCLAMINEUS NARCISSI of Garden Origin

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of *Narcissus cyclamineus* clearly evident.

- (a) Cup or Corona not less than two-thirds the length of the Perianth segments.
- (b) Cup or Corona less than two-thirds the length of the Perianth segments.

### Div. 7—JONQUILLA NARCISSI of Garden Origin

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of any of the *Narcissus Jonquilla* group clearly evident.

- (a) Cup or Corona not less than two-thirds the length of the Perianth segments.
- (b) Cup or Corona less than two-thirds the length of the Perianth segments.

### Division 8—TAZETTA NARCISSI of Garden Origin

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of the *Narcissus Tazetta* group clearly evident.

### Division 9—POETICUS NARCISSI of Garden Origin

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of the *Narcissus poeticus* group without admixture of any other.

### Div. 10—SPECIES and WILD FORMS and HYBRIDS

All species and wild, or reputedly wild, forms and hybrids.

### Division 11—MISCELLANEOUS NARCISSI

All Narcissi not falling into any of the foregoing Divisions.

## DAFFODIL BOOKS

- "DAFFODILS"—M. J. Jefferson-Brown \$4.50  
The most authoritative and complete book on Daffodils to our knowledge. Well written and superbly illustrated, it is a comprehensive store of useful information for Daffodil fanciers, giving points on classification, culture, exhibiting, breeding, and many other interesting facts. The chapter on Dwarf Narcissi for the Rock Garden is noteworthy. Those interested in hybridizing and botanical structure and relationships among Narcissi should find the section on cytology useful. The newest British Daffodils and breeding work with them are discussed.

A smaller book by the same author, this one is designed for less experienced gardeners and places most emphasis on problems of culture, both in the garden and with potted bulbs.

Though a small volume, this book gives much information relative to general culture, growing from seed, hybridizing, and varieties and species of the little Daffodils. Mr. Gray is an authority with many years of experience, specializing in these dwarf varieties. A number are illustrated.

Most avid gardeners, particularly those whose interest is tied to one or two groups of plants, sooner or later want to try their hand at hybridizing. To them we would suggest this book to acquire some practical ideas as to how to proceed with their hobby. And there will doubtless be some pointers for those who have already engaged in this fascinating pastime.



# DAFFODILS IN 1954-55

Our feathered friends' visits to the bird feeder may prove a greater drawing card than the Daffodil planting at this season of the year, and I suspect that many a Daffodil fancier is also a bird lover. Whether the days be soggy with a surfeit of moisture, or brisk with the visitation of a north-east wind, our visitors are on hand to see what is on their menu. The Towhees with their greater size might well deprive their lesser neighbors of a place at the table, but Juncos, Song Sparrows, and Finches are unperturbed, and manage to slip in and get their full portion! Even the diminutive Chickadees, both Chestnut-backed and Oregon varieties were undaunted by their seemingly formidable rivals and claimed their full share of the repast. Their spritely manners and gay mood would endear them to any nature lover, and I hope some day to introduce a cyclamineus hybrid Daffodil with their name if it is not pre-empted.

This started out to be a discourse on Daffodils, and although it has taken an ornithological trend, perhaps we can retrace our steps and look at last year's Daffodils in retrospect. It is usual to interject a few remarks relative to Polyanthus Primroses and we will not dispense with this precedent, although after the havoc wrought with this year's crop, there may be little to say next year. With no frosts at all, and with such tender things as tomatoes, squash and other similar plants in full lush growth on November 10th, followed by six days in which temperatures never rose to the frost point with a minimum of nine degrees here and lower in some spots, virtually all Primroses growing in the open were killed, and many plants normally hardy in extremely cold areas were damaged to some extent. Other comparatively tender plants such as Camellias were in some cases unscathed. Apparently plants which had become dormant in spite of the wet, warm weather escaped. Other much hardier plants sustained varying degrees of injury. It was a condition certainly unprecedented! But we were to speak of last season!

Last winter was an open one with Primroses and some other flowers blooming constantly from November on. In early March there was a severe frost that destroyed open blooms and most of the buds on Primroses, thus delaying the main display until mid-April or later. The Daffodils seemed to anticipate this frost and came on very slowly, making very little color in the fields until April. Of course we had some of the miniatures blooming under some protection from the time the first blossom of *N. bulbocodium* x *Nylon* opened in mid-November until early June when FRIGID and some rather small flowering seedlings with poetic ancestry folded. It was doubtless the longest Daffodil season we have seen but the bulk of the flowers came during a few weeks in April. A heavy all day rain accompanied by a gale ruined the flowers open about April 1st. Seldom have I seen flowers bruised and shredded so badly by sleet. However, there was a fine display during the later part of the season.

As is usual, BAMBI and PREFACE opened the season. The latter is a cyclamineus hybrid which we like very much although it would not be of much value later in the season. There seemed to be considerable virus in the stock last year and we are withholding it this year to check further. Some do not care for the cyclamineus varieties but they hold an especial appeal for us, perhaps partly because of the earliness of some of the family, and their jaunty grace which appears to challenge the inclement elements. Not all are early, of course, but nearly all have a characteristic charm. A pot of MITE which we had emptied after blooming along side the office some years ago thrived and increased as though it relished the lack of attention shown it, and made a most charming display last spring. It is one of the smallest of its class, and one of the most perky. On the other hand, PEEPING TOM is the giant, but it carries the unmistakable earmarks of its clan, and like most of the others, has very durable substance. BARTLEY is probably a synonym, or it appears to be so. A long time favorite of ours has been PEPYS, but it has been slow to increase, and seems to have been a particularly delectable morsel for the bulb flies before modern chemical controls came along. Perhaps eventually it will increase sufficiently so that there will be bulbs to share. TREWIRGIE, GOLDEN CYCLE, and LE BEAU are attractive relatives, and bearing some of the same traits in a less well balanced flower is LITTLE WITCH. Among the most beautiful of the lot are CHARITY MAY, with its profusion of good sized, heavily reflexed, clear lemon yellow blooms, DOVE WINGS, a pale bicolor of prolific blooming habit and delightful poise, and JENNY, a paler bicolor fading to white. We anticipate seeing another of the series this year, THE KNAVE. Last season we potted a few bulbs of ESTRELLITA and found it a very lasting flower. Its petals do not reflex as in other cyclamineus hybrids, but are arranged in quite geometrically perfect pattern. Although a good grower and increaser, it has a yellow-green foliage and stems which were not evident in the pot grown speci-

mens. Some years ago we pollenized a JOHN EVELYN X FORTUNE seedling with *N. cyclamineus*, and as I recall, only one or two plants resulted from the cross. At any rate, one clone is still being grown, which as an individual flower has little to recommend it, but due to its profuse blooming, earliness, and spritely habit should be a useful subject for the rockery. A rich orange cupped flower came from ROUGE X *N. cyclamineus* but it has been deficient in substance. A much finer flower but with less intensity of coloring resulted from RUBRA X *N. cyclamineus*. Before finishing with this type mention should be made of CYCLATAZ, a completely unique hybrid which appears to be a dwarf, very short edition of SOLEIL d'OR.

Since the discussion has been running to the smaller Daffodils, other little ones will be considered before passing to the larger, more widely known and grown varieties. For a long time APRIL TEARS has been a favorite but for some reason stocks did not increase greatly until the last few years. We have been mulching our miniatures with sawdust for some time to eliminate part of the weeding problem. This past year although not an excessively moist one, the soil where APRIL TEARS was planted, even though on quite a slope was very wet, almost muddy, at digging time, and bulbs of this variety did not turn out well, being very rough in appearance. This year they are planted in the open field again. HAWERA is a somewhat similar flower but not quite as tall or strong. BEBOP, BOBBY SOXER, and SUNDISC are a trio of exquisite little flat cupped flowers. Somewhat larger, LINTIE bears several flowers to a stem with light yellow perianths and flat orange cups. Quite distinctive is KIDLING, the progeny of a cross between a small form of *N. jonquilla* and *N. juncifolius*. Of similar character is a most delightful little flower found by our good friend and neighbor, Mr. M. Fowlds, among his stock of *N. juncifolius*, evidently a natural hybrid between this species and *N. jonquilla simplex*. If it continues to be as prolific, thrifty, and free blooming as already indicated, it should be a valuable acquisition. We grow comparatively few doubles but like very much the little double jonquil, PENCREBAR.

While not true miniatures, LEPRECHAUN and MAGHERALLY are much smaller than most of their class, and the former in particular is a jewel for arrangements, provided, of course, that it is picked when fresh. Like many other redcups, it has a penchant for burning! Though not a strong grower, FAIRY CIRCLE, and the only slightly larger CUSHENDALL are exquisite gems that more than counterbalance in beauty any deficiency in prolific growth and increase. Larger than these, but scarcely less lovely are DREAM-LIGHT and CANTABLE. Entirely different from these, we have described YELLOW WARBLER as being considerably earlier than LEMON DROPS. This past season they opened together!

An indicated earlier in this article, a storm nearly demolished flowers in bloom in early April. Among these were most of the sulphur-lemon trumpets and reverse bi-colors. Included were MOONSTRUCK, LUNA MOTH, SPELLBINDER, GRAPEFRUIT, LUNAR SEA, and a large group of selected seedlings. Of some of these I picked a few blooms prior to the storm, or there were a few buds to open afterwards. LUNA MOTH was one of which I saved a few blooms, and one or two of these kept for several weeks after cutting, and elicited more interest and favorable comment than about anything else we had. The large size, fine form, and intriguing color appealed to all. Unfortunately, this variety does not have very strong stems, a trait shared to some degree by its parent, CONTENT, which is, nevertheless, one of our favorites. LUNAR SEA is taller and stronger stemmed, and I think the most strongly contrasted reverse bi-color of good form that I have seen among introduced varieties. One of our seedlings from BINKIE X (KING OF THE NORTH X CONTENT) is quite the finest thing of its type yet seen here. It has the characteristic perfect form of BINKIE but is a much larger flower with more luminous and much deeper coloring in the perianth, while the inside of the crown becomes almost pure white. There are several other notably fine flowers from this cross, one being of trumpet proportions and of special interest because it blooms after nearly all other trumpet varieties are gone.

In previous seasonal notes we have mentioned the whites obtained from KANCHENJUNGA X ZERO, one in particular being a flower of superb form, with the attributes of a good exhibition flower, and possibilities in the commercial field if it maintains its present promise as a good vigorous grower. A sister seedling is almost identical but a rich ivory self instead of white. This year we plan to introduce an ADA FINCH X KANCHENJUNGA seedling as MT. JEFFERSON. It bears some resemblance to its pollen parent but is much taller. WHITE MONARCH proved a real mammoth for size if lacking in quality. Our

BONNEVILLE dwarfs nearly everything else when it is in bloom and is most striking as a garden flower but is too coarse for exhibition.

Each year we think that less time should be used in crossing pink Daffodils, but invariably a few seedlings show qualities improved from preceding years, new ones show up for the first time, on crosses made with either seedlings or named varieties as parents come into bloom and suggest new lines of approach, with the result that perhaps more pink crosses were made in 1955 than ever before. It would be a waste of time and space to recount many of our activities and finds in this field but mention of a few of the highlights may be of interest to some of you who read this missive. Two seedlings in particular pleased us this past season. Out of a series from GLENSHANE X MABEL TAYLOR, perhaps half the lot had cups with more or less pink coloring, some with quite intense rosy- or salmon-pink; but one shone out above all the rest, with a large flat white perianth, much after the style of GLENSHANE, and a large bowl shaped crown, with a wide margin heavily frilled and ruffled, the whole crown being a rich salmon rose which held up well. The second was derived from GREEN ISLAND X (WHITE SENTINEL X MRS. BACKHOUSE) X WILD ROSE. The flower resembled its seed parent but was, I believe, a little smaller and smoother, with a heavily, but very delicately frilled margin on the solid rosy pink crown. A number of older pink clones might be mentioned, but we will limit ourselves to two or three. Perhaps the richest pink coloring in a large flower with a crown approaching trumpet dimensions is in a CORALIE X DAWNGLOW seedling of which we had several beautiful blooms this year. While ROSE RIBBON, one of our 1955 introductions, did not have as much rose in its coloring this year but was more of a salmon apricot tone, it had among the tallest, strongest stems that we have seen on a pink. A seedling from MABEL TAYLOR X INTERIM, the reverse of the ROSE RIBBON parentage, this one also with quite tall stems and a very wide flaring crown, had a wide band of very intense orange rose, almost rose red. A large series from this cross coming into bloom for the first time displayed a great range of coloring, from almost pure pink cups, through salmon and rose tones to tomato red. Perhaps we can eventually develop good red and white Daffodils by breeding from pink varieties rather than through the orthodox methods. Pink coloring is very difficult to stabilize in that soil moisture, air humidity and temperature, and light all have a bearing on the amount of color present and its permanence. Before concluding with this group I would like to mention two seedlings from WILD ROSE X *N. jonquilla simplex*. Neither were very tall nor did they have the best of substance, but they were prolific bloomers, and with the clusters of small white flowers with quite pink cups, it is easy to visualize their usefulness for cutting.

It would take pages to describe other interesting seedlings but no attempt will be made to include more than a few of the most interesting clones and a few successful crosses. GREEN ISLAND X CHINESE WHITE with the cup very prettily frilled with apricot has been named COLORATURA. One that we have from the reverse cross is not so smooth but has an extremely broad overlapping white perianth and very flat wide crown with an intensely frilled lemon-apricot margin is called MADRIGAL. Some crosses which gave particularly interesting results were GREEN ISLAND X BITHYNIA, MABEL TAYLOR X PINK LACE, SERAGLIO X FOGGY DEW, ALBERNI BEAUTY X SYLVIA O'NEILL, GREEN ISLAND X RADIATION, and WATERVILLE X CHINESE WHITE.

There are always some varieties that stand out each year above their normal behavior. Among the pinks, many were not quite so colorful as usual whereas the Dutch pinks displayed more color than heretofore. MABEL TAYLOR is perhaps as consistent as any and should make a popular garden flower eventually although it cannot compete on the show bench with many others. Our RADIATION has been particularly good the last two years. A few bulbs of CORONADO planted late in the season in front of an evergreen shrub made quite a stunning sight last spring. Never had we seen ARTIST'S MODEL so large or so striking, and it gave a prodigious amount of blooms. KILWORTH was exceptionally fine and so was GREEN ISLAND. ARDOUR gives promise of becoming a good commercial flower with its rich coloring and fine long stems, and we noted that one of the merits of SACAJAWEA was its ability to stand up under adverse weather. FESTIVITY and TUDOR MINSTREL were the finest flowers of their class, while PREAMBLE is tops in the bi-color trumpets.

We are about out of space but should not omit that where garden decoration is of prime consideration such flowers as DUKE OF WINDSOR, SELMA LAGERLOF, LINN, PENVOSE, RUSTOM PASHA, BODILLY, DIOTIMA, MIRTH, and CARLTON should be planted. This, of course, is only a starter but one must come to an end somewhere!
