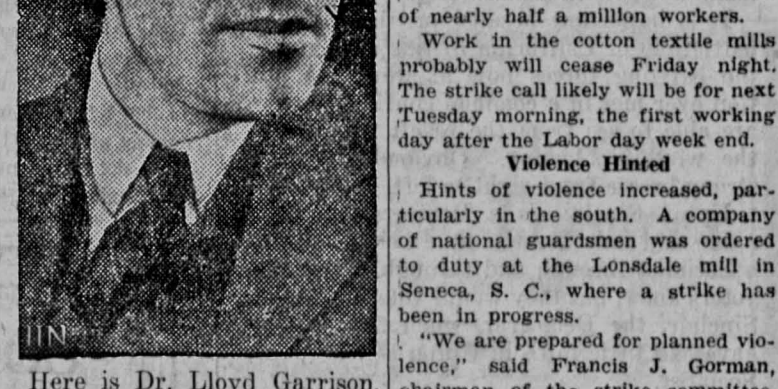

# 1934-1935 Education Costs Retain Lows of Last Year

## Estimates Placed at \$178 To \$420 for Academic Year

### Cooperative Dormitories Best Bargain For Needy Students

Quotations in the educational market at Iowa in 1934-35 will hold fast to the record lows established last year, when the university slashed costs to a minimum of \$175 for a year's education.

Official cost estimates released yesterday by university officials show that students this year will be able to purchase a full term of education for from \$178 to \$420, depending upon his living quarters and financial condition. These amounts are almost identical with last year's costs, which established a modern record for economy.

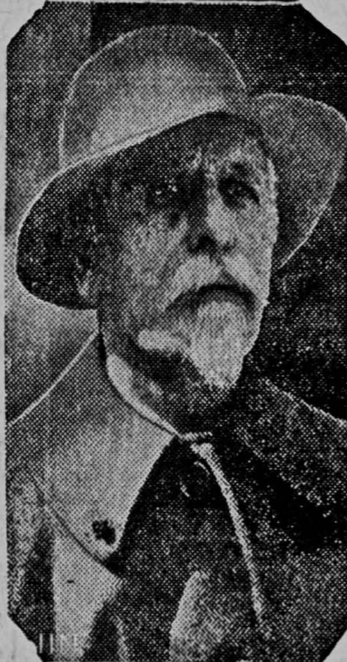

### SINCLAIR Predicts Nation-Wide Campaign Extension

Downey of Sacramento would be Sinclair's lieutenant governorship running mate. George H. Hatfield, former United States attorney here, will run with Merriam.

Comment from Democratic organization sources on Sinclair's victory was not forthcoming. Maurice E. Harrison, chairman of the state central committee, declined to comment. Other Democratic leaders could not be reached.

### Brings "History" to Fore

This situation brought into relief Sinclair's "history" of his political future when he wrote:

"The news that the Democratic voters of California had committed their party to the E.P.I.C. (end poverty in California) plan caused a sensation throughout the country. It resulted in the formation of an E.P.I.C. plan for the nation. A statement endorsing Sinclair for governor was signed by a hundred leading writers, and college groups were formed everywhere. . . . to recommend the plan for their cities and states. A group of forward-looking economists endorsed the plan and letters of support were received from a score of United States senators and some 50 congressmen. . . ."

### "New Alignment"

"The indorsements of E.P.I.C. came equally from Democrats and progressive Republicans. A new alignment was taking place throughout the country, cutting squarely across the old parties.

"Those Democrats who believed in a system of government by big business found themselves thinking the same thoughts and speaking the same words as the Republican candidate, who had the backing of Herbert Hoover and the financial support of the great bankers.

"History saw a repetition of the behavior of the gold standard Democrats of 1896."

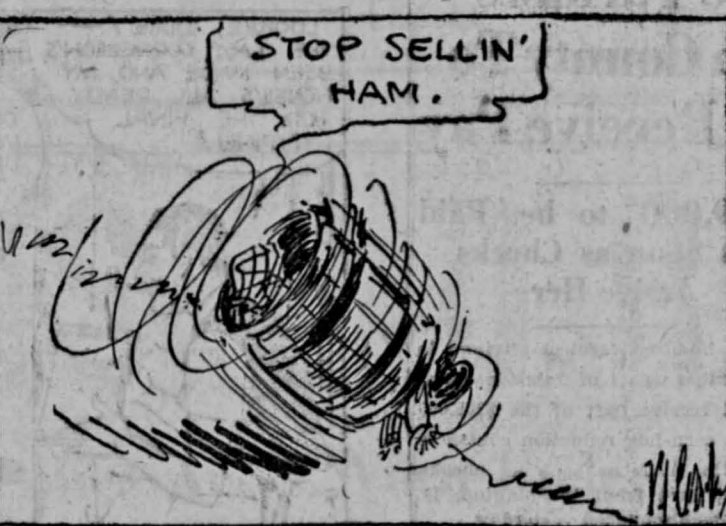

### 200 Farmers In County To Receive Pay

#### \$209,000 to be Paid As Soon as Checks Arrive Here

Two hundred farmers living in the northern part of Johnson county will receive part of the \$209,000 due on corn-hog reduction contracts from the AAA as soon as checks can get here from Washington, D. C., it was announced yesterday.

The checks have been held up during an investigation of local contracts, but were released yesterday. Only contracts in perfect order are included in the 200 on which payments will be made.

As soon as AAA checkers now working at the Farm Bureau office here put their approval on 200 more contracts, they will also be sent to Washington. Payments on the first lot should come through within the next week, according to County Agent S. Lyle Duncan.

Contracts about which investigators have doubts will be held up while signers are interviewed. The investigation was started to see if Iowa crop reduction contracts were made out on the same terms as those in other states. Only a few Johnson county contracts are under suspicion, it was indicated.

### Special PWA Conditions

Special conditions, with which the city must comply if it gets a PWA loan and grant for a municipal light and power plant, are as follows:

2. The applicant shall obtain a decision from the supreme court of Iowa satisfactory to counsel for the government, passing favorably upon all matters pertaining to the applicant's power to authorize the issuance and sale of the proposed bonds, including among others, the following:
  - (a) The applicant's power to authorize and sell the bonds and to make the following among other covenants in the resolution authorizing the issuance of the bonds.
  - (b) To fix and maintain rates and

collect charges for the services afforded by the plant and additions thereto or extensions thereof, which shall be sufficient at all times to pay the costs of operation and maintenance of the plant and to provide for the payment of the interest and principal of the bonds and maintain a reasonable reserve therefor;

3. No free service shall be rendered by the applicant's electric department and if the applicant or its agencies or instrumentalities, from time to time elect to avail themselves of such service they shall pay for such service a reasonable charge as the service accrues.
4. The municipality shall furnish evidence satisfactory to the administrator that the Iowa City Light and Power company will upon completion of municipal power plant be without legal authority to sell electrical energy within the municipal limits or if such evidence can not be produced, it shall produce evidence satisfying the financial division that it will have a sufficient portion of the gross business so that the project's estimated revenues will be
