## PARK TAXES UP ONE MILL

**Thursday, May 9**  
**CANADIAN PRIME MINISTER PIERRE TRUDEAU's** minority Liberal government was defeated on the floor of the House of Commons in the wake of inflation and anger over a proposed government budget. Trudeau will now face a new contest for political survival, as he dissolves Parliament and seeks a formal election order from Governor-General Jules Léger, the representative of Queen Elizabeth in Canada. The election is expected to be held on July 8, and Trudeau will remain prime minister until that time.

**Friday, May 10**  
**REPUBLICAN CONGRESSIONAL LEADERS** have suggested that President Nixon consider resigning for the good of the country and the GOP. Some Republicans have already met secretly to discuss a plan to send a bipartisan delegation of national figures to the White House to urge the President to resign. No decision has been reached on the outcome of the meeting but one Republican leader said one would be forthcoming, "very soon." House Minority Leader John Rhodes said Mr. Nixon's transcripts are having a devastating effect and there are signs he may be losing his capacity to govern.

**Saturday, May 11**  
**THE U.S. GOVERNMENT** is making available \$10.3 billion for housing. The homes more cheaply and hopefully stimulate the nation's stagnant housing market. The latest effort centers on subsidies for both government-insured and conventional home mortgages. For buyers under the government-insured plan, the programs would mean a savings of about \$16 in their \$263 monthly payments for a \$30,000 mortgage financed over 30 years. A government spokesman said the move marks the government's first general subsidies for conventional mortgages.

**Sunday, May 12**  
**PRESIDENT NIXON**, vowing never to give up, told a university commencement crowd that Congress should promptly dispose of the impeachment issue. The President addressed the graduating class of Oklahoma State University and only once in his 35 minute speech did he refer directly to efforts to ouster him from office. He declared that he had presented all the evidence to Congress and that he trusted the House of Representatives would act promptly so the President and Congress could get on with the peoples' business. The crowd was generally quiet but some of Mr. Nixon's statements provoked scattered shouting.

**Monday, May 13**  
**THE CITY OF DETROIT** has experienced a 65 percent rise in the number of armed robberies committed against banks, bars, party stores, cleaners, grocery stores and restaurants, according to police figures for the first four months of 1974. Gas station holdups have declined 66 percent, but police credit this to gas station closings. They attributed the high robbery rate to an increase in the number of narcotics users, a higher price for narcotics and a high unemployment rate. A police spokesman estimated that 90 to 95 percent of all robberies are dope-related.

**Tuesday, May 14**  
**THE SUPREME COURT** has unanimously ruled that the U.S. Justice Department, under the direction of former Attorney General John Mitchell, illegally wiretapped suspects. The court further ruled that evidence obtained in those wiretaps could not be used against defendants because of the violation of the law involved.

### Youth Service Division Meeting Called to Clear Air on Policy Changes

Story Published in NEWS Surprises Top Officials in Woods; YSD Officers and Counselors Attend Session

A meeting which helped "clear the air" regarding policy changes in the Youth Service Division (YSD) was held Wednesday, May 8, between Woods City Administrator Chester E. Petersen, YSD coordinator, Public Safety Director Henry Marchand, the division's four officers and three counselors.

This session stemmed from the release of information of the YSD's new group counseling program on the part of counselors Fred Coonce and Thomas Canasi, and the subsequent story published in the Thursday, April 18, edition of the NEWS.

**General Order**  
This story surprised both Mr. Petersen and Director Marchand, who were aware of such a group format, but apparently not the overall scope of its program as presented by the counselors. Both expressed concern over the release of the information as they felt it looked as if the counselors were making policy for the YSD. The men also stressed they wanted to keep the YSD concept as that of a police agency, not a social agency.

At the same time, Director Marchand issued a general order to all public safety employees focusing upon news releases, (the day after the front page story on the program was published). It said all information on department policy, policy changes and feature stories shall be released only by the director. The only exception was the interviewing of an officer regarding a specific case in which he was involved.

Mr. Petersen said the meeting "cleared the air on any such policy changes, which must be cleared through my

### Guard Prevents Spread of Fire

Quick thinking on the part of a City park guard prevented a small fire from spreading to other boats in the marina of the Norbert P. Neff Memorial Park on Sunday, May 5.

Park guard Fred Schieman spotted the fire aboard a 25 foot cruiser at around 4 p.m. and promptly telephoned the City Fire Department.

The firefighters responded with all apparatus and found the cabin of the cruiser filled with smoke. Utilizing a booster line through the front hatch, the firemen managed to extinguish the flames which were centered in the overhead of the cabin, over the stove.

"The guard was on the ball," said Fire Chief Robert Marshall, "and as a result, only minor damage was done. The guard's quick notice was as important as anything in this case."

Chief Marshall said the fire was probably started by a short in the light over the stove. The firemen who brought the blaze under control, Lieutenant Tim Champagne, Sergeant Bill Taylor, and Firemen Dick Tucker and Al Fincham, disconnected the battery, ventilated the cabin and notified the boat's owner, James H. Finney, of Notre Dame avenue.

### Plan Public Hearing on Hockey Rink

Woods Planning Commission Sets Date for Airing Proposed Project at UL School

The Woods Planning Commission will hold a public hearing to consider the application of University Liggett School, which was made Monday, April 22, for approval, by the Commission, of the proposed enclosure of McCann Ice Rink.

This hearing is set for Tuesday, May 28, at 8 p.m. in the Woods Municipal Building, 2025 Mack avenue. This date was unanimously selected by the commissioners at their meeting Tuesday, April 30, after ULS Headmaster Raymond P. Robbins and some area residents discussed the project.

Last month, the school decided to abandon two proposals, principally because many citizens felt they were too "commercial" in nature. These included enclosing the rink and constructing indoor tennis facilities on school grounds. Together, the project would have cost an estimated \$1.8 million.

The site plan and elevations for this pair of proposals were to be handled by Rossetti Associates, Incorporated, architect for the partnership which planned to develop the site.

**Relations Cherished**  
After scrapping these proposals, Mr. Robbins, who recognized a commercial aspect in the use of the facilities and stressed the school was proud of its good relationship with its neighbors, made it clear enclosing the rink was a "high priority item."

So, while the Commission, at its April 30 session, held no public hearing on the previous proposals, it heard from Mr. Robbins and some citizens on the new project before setting the hearing date.

Mr. Robbins told the NEWS the entire rink enclosure project, including landscaping and brick facing, would cost an estimated \$300,000. "It will be made as attractive as possible and in keeping with the surrounding area," he said.

The project will be financed by the school raising funds through donations. Its principal use is for the school and its students. The rink also will be utilized for the Grosse Pointe Hockey Association's "younger skaters" and for Woods residents on Wednesday evenings as it is now.

**Plan Same Usage**  
Mr. Robbins stated the utilization of the rink, after enclosure, would not significantly

### Earth Fest '74 Set for May 18 At GP Hunt Club

Hundreds of Detroit Area Businesses, Groups and Individuals Involved to Assure Success of Big Project

Hundreds of Detroit area businesses, groups and individuals are banding together to assure the success of Earth Fest '74, community-wide ecology fair scheduled for May 18 by Environmental Action Now, (EAN), fledgling Grosse Pointe citizens' organization.

The fair will be held from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. at Grosse Pointe Hunt Club, 655 Cook road. Parking is available at University Liggett's University School campus, from where a continuous shuttle will ferry Fest-ers to the Hunt Club.

It will be preceded by a wine-and-cheese preview party from 7 to 9 p.m., May 17, at the Hunt Club. Some 2,000 are being invited for an advance peek at the 80 booths being set up for the Earth Fest.

### Woods Gives Approval to New Budget

Half-Mill Raise in Tax Levy Moves Rate to 9.98; Public Hearing on Park Plans Set

The Woods Council, via a resolution, unanimously approved the city's budget for fiscal year 1974-75 after a "silent" public hearing came to a quick close at the regular meeting Monday, May 13.

The budget, which has a total general fund appropriation of \$2,638,317, (down slightly from the 1973-74 fiscal year figure of \$2,643,641), calls for a half mill increase in the tax levy — from 9.48 mills to 9.98 mills.

On the revenue side, the "estimated revenues" from sources other than property taxes are anticipated to be \$1,148,509. The additional amount necessary to meet the appropriation, together with an estimated collection of \$3,000 in delinquent taxes and interest thereon, is \$1,489,808 which will be raised by an ad valorem tax on all real and personal property within the city.

The amount is scheduled for spreading on the 1974-75 city tax roll at the rate of 9.98 mills per thousand of the city's current assessed valuation, (\$9.98 per \$1,000 of State equalized assessed valuation).

**Calls Raise Minimal**  
Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos termed the half mill increase "not bad at all" and "very minimal." He said the increase means that Woods homeowners will be paying around \$10 more in city taxes, and then cited an example.

The average home in the city has an estimated State equalized valuation of \$20,000 or a true market value of \$40,000. Under the 9.48 tax levy, which the city maintained for two fiscal years in a row, the taxes would be \$189.60. Under the 9.98 levy, the amount would be about \$199.60.

Mayor Pinkos cited various reasons for the tax levy hike including increased salaries, other wages and cost of materials but he also stressed there has been no increases in assessments for the last three years.

### New Budget Given Okay By Council

No Complaints Heard from Taxpayers at Public Hearing; Figure Set at \$2,558,000

At a public hearing held on Monday, May 13, The Park Council approved the city's 1974-75 fiscal budget amounting to \$2,588,000, an increase of \$104,000 over that of the current 1973-74 fiscal year budget which ends June 30. The solons also approved a one mill hike in the tax levy, from 16.5 mills, or \$16.50 per \$1,000 State equalized valuation, to 17.5 mills, with the one mill for debt service remaining the same.

City Manager Robert Slone said that in spite of the increase of the 1974-75 fiscal budget and the raise in the tax levy, the new budget is definitely not a deficit budget. The one mill for the retirement of the debt service is still the same, and is not a part of the 17.5 mills, he added.

**Within Limitation**  
He pointed out that the one mill for the debt service is separate, and does not affect the 20-mill limitation set by the voters of The Park.

Slone also pointed out that the city property tax in 1973-74 was \$1,487,500, and that for 1974-75 it is \$1,573,000, an increase of \$85,500.

The city manager informed the council that the major hikes in the new budget were due to Personnel Service, \$60,000; Workmen's Compensation, \$12,000; Street Lighting, \$14,000; Rubbish Pick-Up, \$9,000; Pensions, \$15,000 and Social Security Taxes, \$5,000.

He noted that although a majority of municipal employees receive a pension when they retire, certain city workers are covered under the Social Security Law.

**To Get Federal Funds**  
Slone noted that the 1974-75 budget includes an estimated Federal Revenue Sharing income in the amount of \$61,000, to partially finance a new Aerial Ladder Truck for the Fire Department.

### SDM License Dispute Ended

The Woods has received a reply from the Liquor Control Commission, (LCC), in its dispute over the LCC's issuance of a new SDM license at the Farmer Jack Super Market, 20382 Mack avenue, to which the council strongly objected.

In answer to a letter of April 18 sent by City Attorney George Catlin, and in response to a March council resolution requesting that a public hearing be held as to the "necessity and desirability of the issuance of such a license," Roger J. Rosendale, director of the LCC's Licensing and Enforcement Division, said in an April 26 letter, it was his opinion that there is no legal basis upon which the city's resolution could be honored.

Mr. Rosendale also stated, "A study of the file in question and the law leads to the conclusion that there was no impediment in the issuance of the subject license and that, therefore, it was properly issued."

So, the solons, without comment, unanimously received and placed on file the communications from Mr. Catlin and Mr. Rosendale at the regular meeting Monday, May 6.

Last December, The Woods indicated its disapproval of such a license to the market because there were other SDM licenses in close proximity to that location.

The solons felt that the LCC's action, of which, according to the resolution, the council wasn't notified, indicated an example of the erosion of the "home rule" concept of government.

**Many Groups Involved**

These include area Audubon Society chapters, garden clubs, Scout troops, church groups and Concern, Inc.

Others are Trout Unlimited, which will demonstrate fly casting and tying; the Junior League of Detroit, offering a herb luncheon prepared under the direction of Mrs. Hilary H. Micou, Jr., and a lecture on herb cooking by author-lecturer Mrs. Richard Gerathy, and Job Opportunities for Youth (JOY), a Neighborhood Club employment service matching youngsters available for part-time work with those offering jobs.

Mrs. Ronald C. Birgbauer, JOY chairman, said youngsters in the program will be offering their employers the option of making a donation to EAN in lieu of paying for work performed.

For gardening enthusiasts, the fair will offer a plant sale and horticultural tips. Also on sale will be works by members of the Grosse Pointe Artists Association.

The art works will be exhibited prior to the festival in the National Bank of Detroit's Grosse Pointe Regional Banking Center, Kercheval and St. Clair.

Additional activities will include kayak demonstrations, a bike-a-thon, a jog-a-thon, trampoline demonstrations, pony rides, puppet shows and games.

Entertainment for both the preview and festival will include the Foresters, a family band group; Sunago, a rock group; the Aging Children, folk musicians; a professional Indian dance group; a Dixieland band; Lakeview High School students presenting excerpts from their production of "No, No Nannette," and Mr. Inflation who will present a panoramic exhibit on ecology with his balloon creations.

Mrs. John B. Renick is chairman for arranging entertainment.

Also available at the festival will be copies of EAN's ecology reference book printed on recycled paper and sponsored by Detroit businesses, organizations and individuals.

Titled "Earth Fest '74," the 104-page book will list voluntary and governmental agencies concerned with environmental problems, ecology, art, photography, ecological information and consumer tips.

Michigan artist-poet-printer Gwen 'Froslic' has donated the covers and a selection of her writings for the book.

A Grosse Pointe artist, Mrs. Allen Freiwald, designed and supervised the production of the book bearing EAN's prize-winning logo created by Grosse Pointe North High School student Wendy Johnson.

Copies of the book will be distributed at the fair and sent to local, state and national environmental groups.

**Hope To Be Copied**

"We hope to encourage others to emulate Earth Fest '74," Mrs. Schooff said. "We believe our community-wide salute to ecology may well become the prototype for similar endeavors across the country and even around the globe."

Proceeds from the festival, related events and the book will underwrite EAN's educational and service programs and pay the salary for a full-time environmental director.

(Continued from Page 1) which will cost approximately \$93,000. The Park already has \$40,000 set aside toward the purchase price. Delivery date of the truck is not definite, but it is expected within the next few weeks.

This is the breakdown of the new budget, as approved: Administration and General, \$293,000; Public Safety (Police and Fire Departments), \$947,800; Parks and Recreation, \$126,100; Public Works, \$937,100; Employee Pension and Insurance, \$264,000; Contingency Fund, \$25,000; Capital Improvement Appropriation, \$35,000; and Highway Fund Appropriation, \$65,000.

**Revenue Sources**

The revenue sources are listed as: Property Tax, \$1,573,000; Miscellaneous Revenue, \$1,011,000; and Appropriation of Surplus, \$108,000.

The city manager told the council that he was very pleased that there have been no complaints from the city's taxpayers regarding the new budget since no one was present in the audience during the public hearing to voice any opposition to either the increase in the budget, or the one mill hike.

He also said that the complete proposed budget was available for public inspection at the City Clerk's Office in the Municipal Building during the week of May 6, and not a single taxpayer came in to inspect or challenge it.

Capital Punishment will be the topic of a talk and discussion at the Center on Thursday, June 20. Both meetings begin at 9:15 a.m. and are open to the public.



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### Woods Awards Two Contracts

The Woods Council unanimously awarded two contracts, both to the T and T Cement Company, at the regular meeting Monday, May 6.

One is for the replacement of a water main in Hampton road, (\$75,742.10), and the other is for construction of a municipal parking lot at Mack avenue and Newcastle road, (\$14,354.15).

The monies for the water main project will be charged to either the Water-Sewer Enterprise Fund and/or the Municipal Improvement Fund, while the lot construction will be charged to the Parking

Enterprise Fund. Work is scheduled to begin on both projects Tuesday, May 21. It will take around 90 days for the water main replacement and about 60 days to complete the lot.

The water main cost includes all labor, material and equipment for installing approximately 3,405 lineal feet of eight-inch diameter cast or ductile iron pipe, plus all necessary appurtenances in Hampton road from Mack to 350 feet easterly of Marter road, replacing the existing four-inch main.

"We are replacing the undersized main with the larger main to give people in the area more water pressure and better fire protection," commented City Administrator Chester E. Petersen. "This is the last four-inch main in our entire system."

As for the parking lot, it will have an ornamental brick wall similar to other municipal lots, a concrete surface and will contain 16 spaces.

### Young Composer Speaks of Christ Through Music

When South High School's music department performs "Christ, the Reason for Man" at its May and June concerts, it will be premiering the second sacred work for choir and orchestra with text and music by David Coolidge, Jr.

Coolidge, 17, a senior and an honor student, began composing during his sophomore year in a music theory class taught by Russell Reed, head of instrumental music.

That also was the year he became a Christian, and to him, composing is one way of expressing his faith.

"I accepted Christ as my Saviour in December 1971, right here in my own basement. I wasn't raised in a church but I knew some kids who were Christian. I came to what you might call a value vacuum in my life. I became a Christian because I thought it jibed with who I am," he said.

Coolidge, slender, with gentle, intelligent brown eyes behind steel-rimmed glasses, is no proselytizer. "I don't think I need to jam Christ down people's throats. But I compose to try to reach people."

Last year, having received encouragement from Reed and from Leonard Riccinto, head of vocal music, to compose a work, he sketched out, scored, coached and conducted "His Kingdom Beckons."

"I wrote my own text about Christianity, encouraging people to open their hearts. At that same concert, I conducted a piece for wind septet and piano, variations on a medieval chant. I wrote the variations in different modes. It was fascinating."

Despite the obvious musical aptitude, drawn in part, no doubt from Detroit composer, pianist and ardent worker for Detroit musical groups, Mrs. Frank W. Coolidge, his grandmother, he was reluctant to start the new work.

Scoring and copying out parts is time consuming, and he modestly neglects to mention the many other school, community, and re-

ligious projects which occupy him: drug counseling, teaching Sunday School, social service and brokering a disturbed young boy.

"When I was contemplating beginning my new piece, I knew what I was in for. I tried to put it off. But it got to the point where I gave in. If God wanted to speak through me, it wasn't my business to shut my mouth. "I feel the vocation of a

Christian artist is needed. Too often in today's world, Christian music is regarded as mediocre," he said. Coolidge, who reads voraciously and loves to write, ("I write and write and write, poetry, fiction, my diary, commentary"), thinks carefully as he explains his ideas about composing and God.

He says of his new work, "If the title sounds a little

cryptic, I meant it that way. My personal interpretation — well — if you begin with the Biblical God as creative, loving, a God of communication, the reason I as a person am important, then it's important for me to be creative. In essence, I'm expressing being made in the image of God as contrasted to being the product of a random, impersonal process."

He began sketching the new composition last September 30. He began the score on January 27 of this year and completed it on February 11.

"Those two weeks turned out to be two of the most enjoyable I ever spent. It was just a question of finding the right instruments," said Coolidge.

The closing lines of his text, his message to fellow human beings who he sees today as "utterly noble and utterly lost," are:

In their lives men search For Love, for purpose, God, hear their cry.

"Christ, the Reason for Man" will be presented for the first time at St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church, Chalfonte and Lothrop, on Sunday, May 19, at 2 p.m. It will be repeated at the annual concerto concert in June.

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## Problems Delay Approval of Woods Corporal's Pact

A transcribing error has caused some problems between the city and the Grosse Pointe Woods Police Officers Association, (GPWPOA), towards reaching a final agreement on the proposed two-year contract, (fiscal year 1973-75), for public safety department corporals.

The ratification of the agreement came before the council at its Monday, April 15, meeting at which time City Administrator Chester E. Petersen mentioned the error, which affected the corporal's proposed pay during the second year. The solons unanimously decided to table action on ratification to the Monday, May 6, session. Then, on the 6th, the council unanimously concurred in the recommendation of Mr. Petersen that ratification of the proposed contract provisions be denied and that the matter be referred back to Mr. Petersen for further negotiations at the bargaining table.

Early last month, both sides came to a tentative verbal agreement at a bargaining session, Mr. Petersen said. "I made a transcribing error in writing it up," he continued. So, for the second year of the contract, the corporals should receive \$15,796 plus \$200 shift differential making a total of \$15,996, he said. However, as written up, the figure was \$15,996, plus \$200 shift differential, totaling \$16,196.

"The tentative agreement was submitted to be ratified by both parties and I signed it with the stipulation that this is agreed to tentatively on the basis it shall be ratified by both parties. Then, 10 minutes later I noticed the error," stated Mr. Petersen, who then wrote a letter to the association. The city administrator also said he requested, on two occasions, that negotiations be resumed so the contract could be finalized per the verbal agreement. However, the association takes a different view. GPW-

POA president Patrick Fagan stressed the problem of taking the corporals off of a professional package to a straight salary package as the corporals are part of the association's bargaining unit.

He cited the confusion of calculating the base wage of a public safety officer and a corporal. Officer Fagan said Mr. Petersen offered to take this matter back at a session last month to figure a formula for a new wage. Mr. Petersen then sent the revised package back with the wage, the officer said. It went to the three corporals, who unanimously voted for it, he added.

Then, "everyone signed it as an agreement" on April 9, Officer Fagan said. The city presented the proposal, it was agreed upon and "I see no further need for future negotiations on this," he added, while noting there was no conflict surrounding the pay proposals for the first year.

Reviewing the events, Officer Fagan said a while later he was informed of the transcribing error in the package. "We knew nothing of the error and we ratified on the figures given us."

"We contend we had signed the agreement," he stressed. "We have an agreement.

They, (the city), want to go back to negotiations. We disagree."

On the proposed contract, the officer said, "We requested the corporals get exactly the same package we received except for the wage, which would be higher. There is no controversy over benefits." And he called the situation "unfortunate" as negotiation sessions had gone smoothly.

Mr. Petersen, who admitted the error was his alone, felt the association was taking advantage of the mistake. He said the verbal proposals were read to the corporals twice for their consideration, while emphasizing, "We are bargaining with the association which represents the corporals. The past practice was that the association had to ratify the contract but they say 'No,'" he stated.

Officer Fagan said the entire association votes on a public safety officers' contract including the corporals but only the trio of corporals ratify their contract.

The NEWS was unable to reach GPWPOA attorney Michael C. Kovaleski to see what action, if any, he plans to take in this matter.

That motorist, George F. Clark, of Yorkshire road, Detroit, said he was going east on Lakeshore where he was flagged down by a woman, who told him a car was in the water. Mr. Clark said he heard a voice screaming

from the lake, jumped in and then assisted Mrs. Spano to shore.

Assisting at the scene Friday evening were both Farms and Woods officers, along with Shores Sergeant Charles Wenrich, Gary Mitchell and John Trevillian. Three divers also provided aid including Shores Officer John Frasad, Clifford Apers, of St. Clair Shores, and Leon Sehojan, of Colonial road.

On Saturday morning, an attempt was made to raise the car from the lake but divers were unable to hook the chain to the auto's frame because of rough water conditions. After a two-hour effort, they decided to wait for a calmer day. The divers included Officers Frasad and Michael Kenyon, along with Mr. Apers and Mr. Sehojan.

But on Monday morning, it was a "beautiful day for

diving" with the divers, (Officers Frasad and Bruce Darlington), doing a "fabulous job," said Public Safety Director Joseph Vitale.

The auto, which was some 75-feet away from shore the night of the accident, was now hugging the sea wall as the divers managed to hook a chain around, and over, the roof. But when the crane began to rise, the roof section began to pull away so the divers had to hook another chain to the frame so they wouldn't lose the vehicle.

So, after a few minutes, the divers, who were in 50-degree water at an eight-foot depth, made "connections" and not a split second too soon. For just as they completed their task, the roof section ripped apart from the body and dangled aimlessly in the air.

With methodical dexterity,

the operator slowly backed up dragging his catch, spewing with water, to shore. After the car appeared propped against the sea wall, and within reach of officers, the chains were readjusted on the frame. As this was transpiring, one of the divers yelled, "You made a convertible out of it!"

Again, the crane began dragging the listless auto from the lake. As it was approaching a 90-degree angle, Director Vitale told the operator to "get it down," which he did. "Back up," directed the chief, and, finally, the car cleared the seawall and was pulled upon the grass to be unceremoniously hauled away by a waiting wrecker.

Director Vitale said, while his department's venue ends at the sea wall, (from that point on it's the county's responsibility), "for years we have given the public the best service possible."

Meanwhile, the chilled diving tandem stripped off their red suits and received verbal praise from their boss. The director commented, "I'm real glad we have our own divers now," referring to the completion of a scuba diving course by Officers Darlington, Frasad, Kenyon and Archie Grieve, (each of whom supplies his own equipment), earlier this year. This was the first recovery operation for Officers Darlington and Frasad since that course.

Police said no violation was issued in this incident.

"We have been very economical in our operation of the city. We are operating the city efficiently like a good, going business," he said. On the new services side, he mentioned the tree pruning program will be increased as much as possible.

To Name Director

In this regard, City Administrator Chester E. Petersen had earlier told the NEWS that a part time director of senior citizens activities will be appointed sometime in July. This director, who will be paid on an hourly basis, will work closely with the recently formed Senior Citizens' Commission, who will provide input to the council on various programs and needs.

As most Woods citizens know, a public hearing will be held Monday, June 3, for a proposed bond election on the Lake Front Park Improvement Program. This hearing, along with the regular council meeting, will be conducted at Parcels School, 20600 Mack avenue.

After the hearing, Mayor Pinkos said the council will determine how much to spend towards such improvements and if the city will definitely go the bond issue route.

Levy Could Jump

If the entire park improvement package is approved, including such areas as a new pool, asphalt paving, concrete deck area, lighting, fencing, alterations of the existing bath house, filling and landscaping the existing pool, eight tennis courts, engineering and architectural fees, etc., the levy could jump from 9.98 mills to around 11.28 mills.

However, a portion of this possible 1.3 mill hike would only be levied this fiscal year if a bond issue passes. This is on the assumption that the entire package is approved. However, the mayor cautioned, if the entire package isn't placed on the bond issue, the tax levy jump would be less than the 1.3 figure. "The date the bonds are sold is the date taxes are levied," he said.

But these possibilities regarding the park improvement package, how much is specifically improved, whether the city will definitely go the bond issue route and precise tax levy figures will all be finalized after the public hearing.

Breakdown Given

Looking more closely at the total fund appropriation, its breakdown shows: department of general government, \$274,568; department of public safety, \$1,204,372; department of public works, \$967,454; department of parks and recreation, \$171,005; debt service, \$5,820, and contingency, \$25,000.

At the same time, the council approved the special funds budget, which totals \$874,823, and the enterprise funds budget, which isn't supported by tax monies, which reaches \$807,574.

As part of the enterprise funds budget, the Youth Service Division, (YSD), which is supported by each Pointe and the school board, will receive \$118,217 from The Woods in 1974-75, a jump over the 1973-74 figure of \$107,740.

Use Federal Funds

In a final note, Mr. Petersen recently told the NEWS that there would have been more of a tax levy increase than the 9.98 figure, regarding the costs of various employee contracts, if the city didn't apply Federal Revenue Sharing funds, (under the special funds budget), to the street budget.

Federal Revenue Sharing monies totaling an anticipated \$92,000 to be received by The Woods during fiscal year 1974-75, plus a remaining cash balance of \$41,000 from the prior fiscal year, are to be utilized for engineering, maintenance and improvement of the local street system.

Such monies will be directly utilized to offset any further additional increase in the city's tax levy.

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## Bank Wants to Purchase Additional Land in Park

The Michigan National Bank, which has a branch located at Jefferson, avenue and Barrington road, approached the Park council on Monday, May 13, to petition for a rezoning of Lot No. 354, from residential to commercial. The bank proposes to use the property either for expansion or additional off-street parking.

The bank has purchased the lot under an option from the Brandau family of Detroit. The lot, which is on the corner of Jefferson and Pemberton, directly faces the avenue, and is adjacent to the branch bank building and property.

An attorney for the bank, who outlined the expansion plans, told the council that the land can be used for the construction of three drive-in teller windows, or for parking. He said that the bank would like to buy, if the city is receptive, Lot Nos. 355 and 356, owned by the Park, also at the Jefferson-Pemberton corner. All three lots are located within the Windmill Pointe Subdivision, on the south side of Jefferson.

Although there are several commercial buildings between Barrington and Westchester on the avenue, subdivision residents have in the past, vigorously opposed the rezoning of the several vacant lots from residential to commercial. Most of the lots are owned by the McBrearty family of the Pointe.

The McBrearty and Brandaus had for years sought to upset the Park Zoning Ordinance in Circuit Court, on the grounds that the ordinance was unconstitutional. The Park and the subdivision residents were upheld by the courts in their fight to retain the ordinance.

City Manager Robert Slone informed the council that off-street parking, under permit, does not require rezoning, if the bank wishes to only use the land for such a facility. The attorney spokesman for the bank said that the land could be developed for 56 car spaces, which would alleviate the on-street parking problem.

Or, he added, if the lot is rezoned for commercial use, the bank can construct three drive-in windows, for the added convenience of its customers, and still have ample parking spaces.

Michigan National Bank is willing to negotiate the purchase of the two lots owned by the city, the attorney said, which would not only allow the branch to expand and to add the parking lot, but it would enable it to construct a medical clinic on the site, without loss of any parking space. The clinic could either be leased or sold to members of the medical profession.

The spokesman said that if the purchase of the lots is concluded, the bank will extend its masonry wall, with an attractively screening green planting.

The council suggested that both proposed plans, purchase and development of the Brandau property, and the city-owned land, if it is acquired, be presented to the Park City Planning Commission for study and recommendation. The commission will meet on Tuesday, May 21, at 7:30 p.m.

If the council approves the commission's recommendations, then a public hearing date on the matter will have to be set.

Skid marks left by the car's tires when Belloli attempted to stop measured 72 feet. The vehicle itself was totally demolished.

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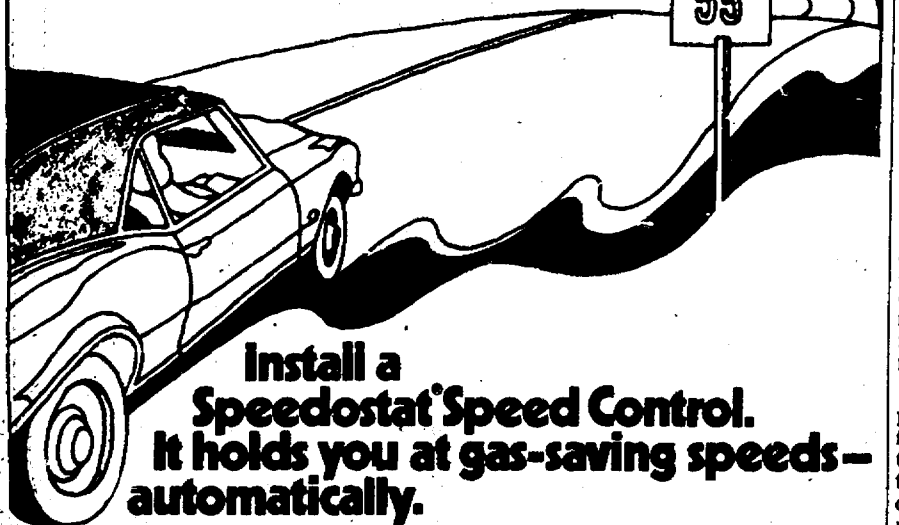

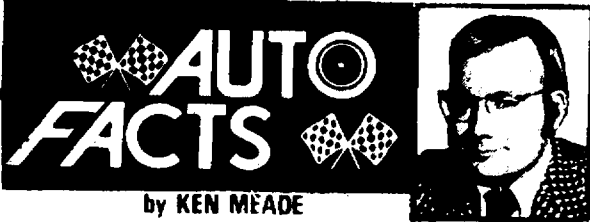

**Woods Receives Petitions Nixing Proposed Measure**

Petitions bearing 255 signatures or residents against the proposed "recreational vehicle ordinance" were presented to The Woods Council at the regular meeting Monday, May 13.

But what isn't really clear from the petitions is this: Are the citizens against the entire measure, certain parts of it or the maximum 28-foot length provision for boats and recreational vehicles regarding storage on residential property. Arthur W. Hollar, of South Oxford road, gathered all the signatures in an effort to present citizens' feelings to the council. Mr. Hollar also submitted a visual presentation showing various recreational vehicles parked on private property. One photograph was taken in The Woods, while numerous others were lensed in St. Clair Shores. These, he felt, indicated the unsightliness of such vehicles on residential property.

Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos expressed his appreciation to Mr. Hollar for his efforts and said all his comments, plus the visuals, would be studied by the Parks and Recreation Committee.

Councilman George S. Freeman, Parks and Recreation Committee member, told Mr. Hollar the council has been working on this measure for two years. Not without a touch of surprise, Mr. Freeman stated the council has had past opposition from citizens who felt the proposed ordinance was "too rigid." But, he continued, "this is the first time we've heard that it was not rigid enough." After Mr. Hollar discussed the measure, the solons unanimously approved the motion of Councilman Ronald R. Kefgen, Parks and Recreation Committee chairman, to refer all the communications to the Committee of the Whole for further study.

In his presentation, Mr. Hollar said he felt the ordinance was wrong and gave some suggestions and alternatives based upon the opinions he had received.

Points he mentioned included his feeling that the ordinance ignored the "very great" variations in lot sizes regarding storage. He also called "arbitrary" the need for written permission of adjoining property owners for the storage of such vehicles and, if an applicant is unable to get such written consent, that he may appeal a denial to the Planning Commission.

The petitions express the desire of a good many people of the community, many of whom desired to sign it, he said. "Eighty-five percent of the people I contacted signed the petitions and were against the ordinance." At the same time, Mr. Hollar reported he didn't approach people who had recreational vehicles on their property.

After showing the council his visual display, Mr. Hollar stated, "Most of our houses are built with a nice view from our backyards." The height of fences are limited to four feet, he continued, and a person could be allowed to pull up a 10-ft high camper trailer. "I just can't see the sense of it."

He suggested some alternatives for the storage of such vehicles: using a city lot on Marler road and an "existing alternative," storing equipment at Millers Marina, off of Jefferson avenue, or using other storage areas.

Mr. Hollar then cited the extremes of barring everything or storing anything. He wondered where the council would place itself on this issue, or if they would take a "middle-of-the-road" position. When questioned by the council, Mr. Hollar said the people didn't want the items "we're speaking of" but some wouldn't mind if one vehicle drove up, was packed for a trip and then drove away. Mr. Hollar stated he wasn't completely certain if all who signed the petition were completely opposed to the entire measure. Most of the people who signed the petitions didn't read the ordinance, he continued, but "took my word" for it regarding his explanations.

Finally, Mr. Hollar told the council he worked only in a concentrated residential area and hoped the opinions presented would be of help. He also offered to assist the solons further as a "leg man" if they requested his aid. The council appreciated his concern and efforts.

At the conclusion of the meeting, a resident asked to be heard on this subject. He said there was some confusion on the wording of the petition, which says, "We, the undersigned, oppose the proposed ordinance that would allow the storage of boats and recreational vehicles up to 28 feet in length on residential property."

On each page of petitions, the signatures of residents follow this sentence. It doesn't seem completely clear, therefore, if the signers nixed the total ordinance, certain sections or the length point alone.

This resident said he called two of the signers who said, when they found out what they had signed, and when told of the efforts towards controlling storage sites, they would have removed their signatures. One citizen said he had no objection to the storage of such vehicles on a person's property as long as they were out of sight, the resident revealed.

Finally, when asked if he hand any comments on Mr. Hollar's presentation, Mr. Kefgen said his communications will be received with everything else pertaining to the ordinance.

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

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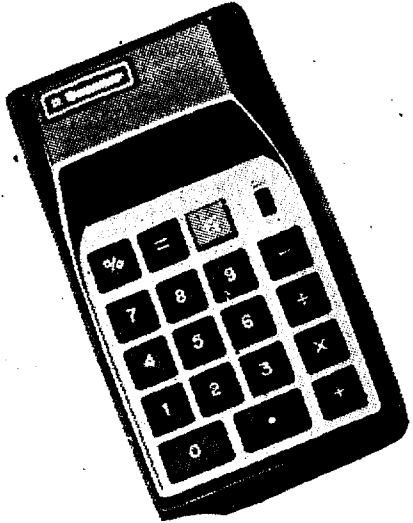

The source of support for this service is a NIMH Grant to our office. The Northeast Guidance Clinic uses the facility known as Detroit Transit Alternatives for the service.

"In terms of alcoholism services, the entire East side of the City of Detroit is rather bereft in alcoholism services. Our office has attempted to develop a program utilizing Saint John Hospital as a base for the delivery of alcoholism treatment services. However to date, we have never been able to satisfactorily arrange a contract between our office and Saint John Hospital. This is true despite the fact that we have specifically listed these services in our budget during this past fiscal year."

## What Goes On at Your Library

The past week the Detroit Loves, the local entry in the new professional tennis league, opened their season at Cobo Hall. The birth of the WTT is yet another indicator of the phenomenal growth in popularity of the game of tennis. Tennis in its present form, is 101 years old this year, but it is only in the last few years that the sport has boomed. In fact, it is estimated that tennis players now outnumber golfers. Like the sport itself, the publishing of books about tennis has mushroomed and I would like to bring to your attention several of the new tennis titles purchased by your Grosse Pointe Public Library.

One of the most informative new books is TENNIS: A BASIC GUIDE by Clare Riessen (Lothrop). Coordinating his explicit directions with action photographs, the coach of the Northwestern University tennis team has written an authoritative guide to tennis for beginners and experienced players. Riessen outlines the rules of the game, describes the equipment, and shows methods of gripping the racket. Continuing step-by-step to the more difficult techniques, he demonstrates the serve, the forehand, the backhand, the lob, and strokes used in the net game. A short review of instructions at the end of each chapter and a glossary of tennis terms add to the book's usefulness.

In HOW TO BEAT BETTER TENNIS PLAYERS by Loring Fiske (Doubleday), the author explains how any player—regardless of physical build, sex or age—can develop a winning style suited to his or her own individual temperament and physique. The vast experience of Fiske, a teaching professional, is evident on every page. Tips for consistent play and words of wisdom for all ages are presented for all levels of ability and all phases of the game. The illustrations are clear and helpful, and critical discussion extends to topics often neglected, such as metal rackets, the possible ill-effects of backboard practice, and pointers for left-handers.

A book of a little different type is Simon Ramo's EXTRAORDINARY TENNIS FOR THE ORDINARY PLAYER (Crown). Here a scientist-engineer presents an analysis of tennis and suggests techniques that will enable average players to reduce errors, win more points, and add enjoyment to the game. Ramo suggests that such players should always

play doubles and provides playing principles in regard to the serve, return to serve, backhand, net play, lob shot, where to stand, selection of a partner, and other aspects of the game. The author incorporates amusing drawings throughout this entertainingly written text that will interest players of all ages.

For those whose game is mixed doubles, we have MIXED DOUBLES TENNIS by Clark and Carole Graebner (McGraw-Hill). In this book two top professional tennis players draw on their own experiences to advise players wanting to improve their game in mixed doubles. They cover philosophy, teamwork, strokes, tactics, and strategy along with equipment and clothing, and also include suggestions for arranging a tournament, and a chapter on psyching an opponent.

TENNIS TO WIN by Billie Jean King covers tennis from the fundamentals of the games to aspects of modern strategy. While the book gives instructions for all levels, the advanced player will probably get more from this book than the beginner. Particularly valuable are the chapters on the return of service, the lob and the intricacies of percentage tennis. Mrs. King also offers advice on practice drills and conditioning, tennis psychology, and playing on different court surfaces.

On our shelves, along with Mrs. King, we have Bobby Riggs. In case anyone has forgotten, Riggs is the 55-year old former tennis champion who last year, in an effort to demonstrate male supremacy, challenged Billie Jean King, (aged 29), to a game of tennis and lost.

Riggs' literary contribution is in the form of an autobiography entitled COURT HUSTLER (Lippincott). Riggs tells many interesting stories behind his accomplishments as a amateur and professional player, and recounts his numerous victories over many of the great players. The chapters presenting his thoughts on open tennis, the current state of tennis management, sex, booze, drugs, and the black man's role in the game, (which contain a very good section on Arthur Ashe), are entertaining and enlightening. The final chapter, in which Riggs explains his basic playing philosophy, will be useful to players lacking the physical ability to overpower their opponents. Written in a straightforward and easy-to-read style, this is a book that is fun to read.
