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ABSTRACT

Although this generously annotated selective bibliography primarily emphasizes audiovisual reference works of interest to educational researchers, a secondary emphasis is on publications in various specific subject areas. In addition to their value for researchers, the latter materials are of potential interest to educators planning to use or develop audiovisual materials. The general reference works are grouped by types which include bibliographies, dictionaries, encyclopedias, yearbooks and surveys, indexes, review sources, periodicals, and directories. There are separate subject sections for equipment, media lists, sources of free and inexpensive material, instructional media centers, media cataloging, media use in classroom, copyright, script writing, film, television, audio, photography, visual aids, microforms, and computer and programmed instruction. An annotated list is also provided of national and regional organizations active in the audiovisual field. The works listed are primarily post-1970. Periodicals date back to 1929. All entries appear in one section only. (STS)

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INTRODUCTION

The field of audiovisual education is enormous. Generally speaking, audiovisual education is designated as that part of the broad field of education concerned with the study of pictorial and aural messages as they relate to the learning process. In some AV areas such as film, there is a plethora of information whereas, in other areas, there is a dearth. Lines have to be drawn; decisions have to be made. In an attempt to achieve a balanced bibliography, extra searching was conducted for some sections. The "simple" mediums such as transparencies and lettering presented searching problems while the sophisticated, "complex" mediums such as film were covered fairly easily.

When compared to the literature of library science, the audiovisual literature is underdeveloped. The major reasons are (a) AV literature has not been around as long, (b) AV literature covers a broader area, and (c) many AV specialists spend most of their time producing, not writing. The development of AV literature would be even slower if it were not for the great influence of commercial companies. AV hardware companies, for example, have sponsored organizations, professors, and freelance writers to produce the gamut of written material from instructional booklets to comprehensive reference works. The more people know about their companies' products and how they can be used in the curricula, the greater the financial return. Also, more developments in AV techniques and equipment have come from the companies than from specialists in education and government.

Even a cursory glance at this bibliography shows that certain large publishing companies such as Bowker, Billboard, and North American Publishing Co. are responsible for many printed sources. Bowker sometimes popularizes a book by publishing it even though it was published at lower cost by a smaller organization. Organizations such as Educational Film

Library Association and the Association for Educational Communications and Technology are the other major publishers. Usually, their material is high quality.

The emphasis in this bibliography is on reference works. The user may consider them as springboards to his research interests. The compiler's aim was to choose the better printed sources in every subject area. In order to include the most current information, most of the items listed were published after 1970. Because this bibliography is selective and it is impossible to be aware of every work in the audiovisual field, this bibliography should not be judged by whether it includes your favorite book or not. In addition, this bibliography is technically out-of-date as soon as it is printed. New books and revisions of standard works appear on the market faster than a bibliographer can keep track of them. Suggestions and additions are always welcome.

Only a few important Educational Resources Information Center documents are included in this bibliography. For a more extensive search, it is recommended that the researcher utilize ERIC's valuable indexes and, possibly, initiate an ERIC computer search.

Every attempt has been made to place each book in the proper category. However, it is impossible to peruse every book. Some works cover two or more categories. As a rule, if a book discussed one medium, it was included in that medium. If a book covered two mediums, it was included in the general or format categories. Entries are never repeated. If a category grew too large, it was subdivided. Even with these guidelines, the divisions sometimes overlap and are not clear.

Many books and periodicals try to be so many things to so many people that it is difficult to label them. This was particularly true for reviews. Almost every periodical reviews hardware and/or software to some extent and selecting the better ones was difficult. The user is suggested to examine the items listed in the main category first and then

select related categories for further information.

Acknowledgements go to Mr. James Limbacher, author of A Reference Guide to Audiovisual Instruction, for providing a firm foundation of titles and annotations. Bowker's Audio-visual Market Place was very useful in expanding the project's scope. Last, but not least, the James Adams Library at Rhode Island College published a small guide to source materials for non-book media in education which made me realize that a bibliography could be done for students and faculty.

Special thanks go to Nell Ward, Sue Hardesty, Marcia Lewis, and Rosemarie Lewis for their cooperation and support.
