


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# WESTMOUNT PEOPLE'S PARK STHELIER



A preview of Jersey's 2013 festival of visual culture by **Grant Runyon** 

If you're a lover of art you were probably thrilled down to your watercolours by the recent open studios event at the weighbridge, where Jersey's flattest area of cobbles played host to an intriguing series of tiny galleries housed inside old shipping containers.

The return of this event represents a bold and fascinating direction for Jersey's cultural policy, ambushing the brains of our unsuspecting populace in an area of St Helier more usually known for the drunken accountancy brawls that erupt about its sausage-strewn taxi rank.

The event has been an unexpected success in a community for whom art is normally something that decorates tea towels and mouse mats. I watched a scene unfold that evoked the early minutes of 2001: A Space Odyssey, as a party of fishermen from St Clement en route to the steam clock were seen to scamper like hooting apes around this unexplained monolith of visual culture, placed by beings unknown in the deeply symbolic location of Jersey's petanque championships. Clearly our Island was to witness the dawn of a new age. An art age.

Smelling an opportunity (or possibly a decomposing seagull in the bushes), I decided to waste no time in contacting sponsors at several choice hedge funds. Drunk on novelty, Jersey had entered into a flirtation with art, and it was up to us to arrange a saucy romp in the bushes before the Island had the opportunity to sober up and fasten its bodice. Our community must have more art, smeared about the Island like chocolate mousse on a hotel duvet, and so I pleaded with the luminaries of visual culture to stage an event that would signify that Jersey was out of the nunnery and hanging out on the street corners of culture. We also contacted Charles Saatchi, who is apparently at a bit of a loose end at the moment. One and all agreed with both our noble aims and our cheque books, and at last agreed to deposit their art-seed in our fertile, glistening crevice.

#### Damien Hirst

The Enfant Terrible of British Art (\*\*) was thrilled to receive our invite to create a unique commission for Jersey, especially once he had asked a cowering minion where the Island was and realised that he would be able to combine the trip with an opportunity to visit his bank vault and swim in art-cash like Scrooge McDuck. Hirst plans to revisit his world famous "dead shark" installation by erecting a formaldehyde tank in the middle of King Street. It is expected to contain a tourist, dressed as a nazi, riding a cow through a pile of potatoes, and will be titled "Post-ironic postcard / bucket and spade brigade (can I have my money please)". It will then be sold for 20 million pounds to a private equity firm based in Geneva. #### Tracy **Emin**

#### Yoko Ono

She has been described as "living national treasure", "the queen of the avant garde" and "the shrieking Japanese bag lady who broke up The Beatles". Yoko Ono is an evergreen presence at the centre of modern art and Jersey is honoured to welcome her to a complementary suite at our most expensive hotel, where she will dine exclusively on green aubergines and semicolons. 
#### **Dwindling Democracy?**

We often don't have the time or inclination to comment on the hilarious subject matter of Island politics. However, the result of the referendum, or 'giant waste of everyone's time and money' last month seem to have really shown everyone how futile a democracic voice can be for its populous.

The expression that got bandied around to us is that 'Turkeys don't vote for Christmas'. It seemed fitting at first as clearly, the sauna and redcurrent jelly body scrub certainly doesn't end very well, in the same way that having to find a job when you've had an easy ride as a politican (in some instances) when your people vote to reduce your numbers just seems like a savage end.

The turkeys would have less to fear if they got paid above the average wage, got some decent expenses, free parking spaces and could change their minds on December the 24th anyway. Because, clearly, your vote in the referendum meant diddley squat anyway.

The problem is that policitians are OUR turkeys. You and I pay them through our 'contributions' (what an amazing term for the dubious methods of monetary extraction employed by the States) and, as such, we should be able to determine, between us, how best Christmas is served. That's democracy. Turkeys DON'T vote for Christmas, because if they did, we'd all be goosed. We spotted a few comentaries on the subject worthy of presentation this month, a blog entry and a cartoon. 'All animals are equal, but some animals are more equal than others.'

Jersey politics is an interesting melting pot. One of the invigorating things about island life is that our political masters are not distant creatures living behind security barriers. They are ordinary men and women who live, work and play shoulder to shoulder with us in our community.

The result of this freshness, and smallness, should be an agile and adroit political leadership that responds to the needs (and directions) of a very available and communicative electorate.

However, there are, as with most bureaucracies, frustrations with process, and many many imperfections. One such imperfection exists in our very bloated assembly.

There are 51 elected members of the States: 10 Senators, 12 Connétables and 29 Deputies. In the most recent election, some have been voted in with as little as 291 votes (John Le Bailly, St Mary's), most constables are elected unopposed, and senators need an island-wide mandate (Sir Philip Bailhache topped the poll with 17,538 votes). Strikingly, each member has equal power in the assembly (and receives the same remuneration of c.£40k).

The elected members in their wisdom saw that this state of affairs could not continue. So, on the 15th March 2011, they voted for an Electoral Commission to be created, to review various options and to bring these options to the public in the form of a referendum. The expected cost was £200k, and to their credit the Electoral Commission delivered on their mandate with a mere spend of £192k.

So, the Electoral Commission goes off, does its work and presents three options to the public. (I'm not interested here in the merits of the options, or the outcome). The public duly vote in Option B, and now we turn to the 16th July 2013 where the States has the opportunity to vote on whether Option B should be enacted. The results are here.

In my view, the entire States Assembly had a legal responsibility to enact the democratic will of the people of Jersey. 28 members decided that "some animals are more equal than others" and that option B should be rejected. If these same states members hadn't voted for a £200k Electoral

Commission, they might have a vague justification for ignoring the results of the referendum.


In reality, the following members have therefore consciously wasted £200k of tax payer's money, untold hours of States time, the time consumed by the people of Jersey in participating in this pantomine, and criminally, they have lost the faith of the electorate.



#### **TIGHT LIPPED**



#### **BUTTERFLIES**

Surely butterflies are everyone's favourite insects - they don't sting or bite and they look so beautiful with their colourful patterned wings.

The colours are due to tiny microscopic scales which cover the wings like tiles on a roof. If you have ever touched a butterfly's wing the scales rub off to leave a powder on your fingers (but don't do it deliberately!). Moths have similar wings but you can always recognise a butterfly by its clubbed antennae.

The name butterfly is thought to have originally referred to the brimstone butterfly with its pale lemon wings. Gradually it came to mean all butterflies and the brimstone got a new name linking its lemon wings to sulphur. There are 59 species of butterfly which breed in Britain and around 50 species have been recorded in Jersey – of these about 25 species are regularly seen each year. This is only a small fraction of the worldwide total of 17,500 species.

They have wonderful names – red admiral, gatekeeper, speckled wood to name just a few. Many, such as the peacock, have a false eye in the pattern on their wings. This is thought to fool predators into attacking the wing so that the butterfly is able to survive with only a damaged wing.

Some of the butterflies we see have travelled a long way. Many of our red admirals fly over from France and the painted ladies migrate from Africa – a distance of 600 miles. The champion travellers are the monarch butterflies which sometimes get blown across the Atlantic from America.

Some of the earliest butterflies to appear in spring have hibernated in a garage or shed so that they can appear with the first warm day. Butterflies feed on nectar, sucking it up through their long proboscis like a straw. When not in use it is coiled up like a watch spring.

Many myths about butterflies concern death and rebirth or transformation. In Mexico monarch butterflies are thought to be the souls of dead children. Japanese people believe they are reincarnations and so it is lucky if they enter your house.

Cool wet summers like this one are bad for butterflies so you can help them by planting nectar - rich flowers in your garden such as Buddleia - the butterfly bush , or Michaelmas daisies. Also encourage them by leaving a wild corner with nettles and other food plants for their caterpillars.

# **POWER & GRACE**

GERARD BOYMANS PHOTOGRAPHS DANCERS & MILITARY AIRCRAFT.
LAST YEAR, HE SHOT BOTH AT ONCE.

DESPITE HAVING TAKEN A TRIP THERE WITH BLUE ISLANDS A FEW MONTHS BACK AND SOME EVENTS WITH HEINEKEN, GALLERY DOESN'T HAVE A GREAT DEAL OF INTERACTION WITH THE DUTCH.

However, this year we've had a number of calls at the office from the '31' country code. The dialer was a Mr Gerard Boymans who has an unlikely link to Jersey. Gerard is a photographer who splits his dedication between specialisms in photography of dance and military aircraft. I know, it sounds odd at first but when you consider both as rapid moving targets the link becomes clearer. Gerard visits Jersey each year to photograph the Jersey Air Show and last year went beyond the hardware. Combining his two loves Gerard took this great shot of our local dancer Grace Hoy. Working with talented dancers is a challenging part of Gerard's photography. His dream is to publish an art calendar of his shots.





Gerard regularly shoots ballerinas of the Dutch National Ballet and dancers of top contemporary dance companies such as Introdans and Scapino Ballet, shown here painted by body artists Yvonne Zonnenberg and Gareth Hughes. One of Gerard's favourite images was taken during sundown with the winners of the Dutch edition of So You Think You Can Dance in 2011. The dynamic pose captured features Ballerina Nina Plantefève and Juvat Westendorp. Gerard tell us that one of the ingredients to create an amazing image are unique locations, such as Royaldelft with dancer Alena Krivileva and at the castle Ammersoyen with dancer Kabba Jallow painted in the striking body paint work of YC-Art.

Whilst we're sure the dancers present memorable moments, Gerard's most notable photographic memory was one of flying with the Royal Navy no less in 801 Naval Air Squadron. The project was to photograph the last days of the fabled Harrier jump jet. Gerard tells us 'Yeovilton's mission plan board looked promising with a 2 vs 2 DACT mission of Sea Harriers and a departure of 2 Royal Navy Hawks of the training unit. My pilot was the very experienced pilot John Beattie, who is the Royal Navy Historic Flight manager'. Gerard's shot captured a '4-ship' of Sea Harriers during sundown, presenting an amazing photographic opportunity seldom to be repeated as striking sunbeams touched the wings of the jets. A photographer's dream became reality but Gerard's pilot had a different vision; 'John brought his jet in a left hand circle, straight behind the 'box' formation, framing the 'box' formation of 'Shars' straight through the full moon. The accelerating 4-ship vanished in the silhouette of the moon starting their initial mission, a 2 vs 2 fight in the Bristol skies' Gerard explained.

To become a good aerial photographer is fraught with safety regulations and a great deal of necessary training. Gerard stresses that forward planning is essential, stating 'It is not going to happen when you don't tell the involved pilots what sort of photo you want'. Anyone that's watched clips on YouTube where people take a ride in a fighter jet, you'll appreciate that learning to cope with G-forces is also essential. Taking Gs and taking shots, Gerard describes his time flying with John Beattie as 'an honour and a privilege, especially when the photographic challenge concerns the special Sea Harrier'.

For 30 years Gerard has been travelling the world to see aircraft and air shows. His passion to photograph aircraft has fulfilled his ultimate desire to fly in military jets, as a photographer. Taking the back seat in an F-4 Phantom, A-4 Skyhawk, Saab Lansen and Royal Navy Hawks has resulted in 7 cover photos in internationally known aviation magazines. During that time Gerard has visited the Jersey International Air Display several times. During this

time he met Mike Higgins, the Air Display organiser, in addition to Robert Gaines-Cooper, one of the JIAD sponsors. It's great to hear approval from an experienced photographer for Jersey's show; 'It's a great show with lots of rare and interesting planes and it's doing a great job for a small island'.

The photos here are a few of the many exciting encounters Gerard has had involving incredible flying machines and our Jersey coastline. Several are photographed from the T-28 Fennec with the experienced pilot Martin Willing, whose classic plane is 'a superb photography platform and is capable of keeping up with jets'. If you have an interest in photography or not, the images Gerard captures capture the imagination.

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#### **FAR FROM A TOKEN GESTURE**

#### IF YOU COULD GO ANYWHERE IN THE WORLD, WHERE WOULD IT BE?

Kashmir. I've been there about eight or nine times. The first time was about 20 years ago and I fell in love with the place.

#### WHAT MAKES IT SO SPECIAL?

The sheer beauty and the tranquillity! The locals are wonderful too; they're so friendly.

#### WHEN'S THE BEST TIME TO GO?

Well, I've been to Kashmir in every season, but I'd really recommend going in the spring time - especially if you've never been there before. In spring the lakes are covered in masses of pink water lilies and it's absolutely beautiful.

#### HOW DO YOU GET TO KASHMIR?

If you don't have time to see India beforehand, you can fly from Delhi to Srinagar direct for about \$150. It's about an hour's flight. The first time I went to Kashmir was overland from Nepal via the strange "moonscape" of Leh - which is near Ladakh.

#### AND FROM LADAKH?

I met the son of a houseboat owner there. He'd just sold the last of his possessions to raise funds to go to Ladakh and get tourists for his family's houseboat! He's my age and we became really great friends. He's really looked after us since the beginning and it's been wonderful seeing his family growing up over the last 20 years or so. His father is convinced we were brothers in a past life!

### OCCASIONALLY YOU HEAR OF PROBLEMS IN KASHMIR, DID YOU EXPERIENCE ANY YOURSELF?

A few years ago, yes. I got held up at gunpoint trekking near the Pakistani border! It was right after some Israelis were taken hostage but because of their military training the hostages ended up killing the kidnappers ... and I was mistaken for an Israeli! Another trekker had to run off and get my passport to prove my identity. I never go anywhere without my passport these days!

#### TRAVEL EMBARGOS TO THE REGION HAVE RECENTLY **BEEN LIFTED ...**

Yes, tourism to Kashmir has been decimated. As with any insurgency situation, the people just want to get on.

When I first went to Kashmir it was actually during the troubles, but now the embargos have been lifted, I think it's a really great time to go there ... before it gets too touristy.

# WHAT DO YOU RECOMMEND DOING WHILE YOU'RE THERE?

There's something for everyone in Kashmir! If you want the hustle and bustle, there's always the city of Srinagar. In the winter time you can even go skiing. But I always enjoy trekking, fishing or water trekking.

#### WATER TREKKING?

Well, there are three main lakes interconnected by cold rivers from the mountains so you can take a Shikara around a lake. A Shikara's a boat that looks like a gondola with a four-poster bed on top. You can fish from the boat, cook your catch on-board over an oil burner and eat it along with the local herbs and spices. Delicious! In winter - when it's really cold - the locals sit with huge smocks covering them, with a bowl of burning embers in their laps to keep them warm!

# STAYING ON THE LAKE ITSELF MUST BE REALLY SPECIAL...

Yes, it's always been an amazing place - in fact, it was a retreat for the British Raj when the heat of the plains became too much for them to bear.

All sorts of famous people come to stay on the houseboats. My friends, the Thulla family, started off with just one houseboat and now they've got several. I helped them set up a website a couple of Christmases ago and they've had some great reviews from their guests. They've had lots of famous people staying with them including Indira Gandhi! It's my favourite place in the world ... and I really look forward to going back there.

### SURPRISING FACTS ABOUT KASHMIR

**FACT:** The lush Kashmir Valley forms part of the state of Jammu and Kashmir in the far north of India and is surrounded by some of the highest mountains in the world. There are two alternate capitals: Srinagar in the summer and Jammu in the winter. It is bordered by areas controlled by Pakistan and China, including some disputed zones.

**FACT:** Weddings in Kashmir usually go on for several days. The bride's side of the family can steal the groom's shoes and hold them for ransom!




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## **NEW BLOOD:** THE ALHAMBRA GALLERY

I REMEMBER THE EXCITEMENT OF LEARNING TO ANIMATE AT SCHOOL; WORKING METICULOUSLY ON MULTIPLE DRAWINGS THAT WERE ALL SLIGHTLY DIFFERENT AND COMPILING THEM TO ENJOY THE THRILL OF SEEING THEM COME TO LIFE.

Granted the subject matter was usually basic but it was always fun. Animation is great fun and, even if you've not done it 'properly', if you've never drawn stick men at the corner of a textbook and flicked the pages to make him move then you haven't lived. Technology has given a helping hand with apps now developed to speed up your creativity and the short animation has been reborn. With the advent of Vine and Instragram moving into video spot frame and short videos are now big business. These apps are great but videos of your face and bedroom will soon get boring and learning how to draw and animate properly will be what sets your creations apart.

The love of animation is what made local digital artist David Gregory and Joanna Brown come up with the idea for Motion Studio. David tells us "We started looking for animation classes for our twins last year, when they both first got hooked on creating stop-frame Lego animations at home. It is such a creative way to use technology. They completely forgot about the usual computer games and spent ages totally engrossed in their new hobby, planning out stories and trying out new apps". David started to teach them some basics using various programs. He had been working on digital illustrations for a children's book using a cintig and decided to start teaching animation and digital/drawing.

The couple have been running weekend workshops and courses for children age 6 to 14 at St. Brelade College, teaching them how to use their computers and Ipads creatively. Stop frame animation a is great tool for story-telling. The children can work in pairs or teams to bring their stories to life. And it has proved that our twins are not the only ones who love stop-frame animation. The lego animation especially has been a great hit .A lot of kids are already producing some excellent work at home and just need a bit of guidance. Others come and then get hooked. Although we have mainly been using lego there is a huge scope for experimentation with different materials. One kid recently animated his lunch using googly eyes!

Digital drawing has also been very popular at the Studio. They use variety of equipment from wacom tablets and cintiqs to iPads, embracing technology to aid education. The children are able to build up drawings in layers and it has been really satisfying to see how their work has developed and improved. The added bonus is that it teaches them the fundamentals of more advance programs like Photoshop and Manga Studios; useful in so many areas from graphic design to photography.

Over the Summer Motion Studios will be running a range of courses from teaching kids to draw cartoon critters on their iPads to group animation projects. # **PARIS**

# **LONDON**THE RAIN ROOM AT

THE BARBICAN

Ever wondered how it might feel to control the rain? Created by the contemporary art group Random International, the Rain Room, which ran until March 2013, was an installation like no other. The best part? The cleverly installed sensors that allowed spectators to sidestep hundreds upon thousands of falling droplets.



# **VENICE**

CHURCH OF SAN STAE FALLING GARDEN BY GERDA STEINER & JORG LENZLINGER

Imagine staring up at a beautiful church ceiling that also happens to have a scenic garden hanging from its realms? Well now you can – this astounding installation created by Swiss artists Gerda Steiner and Jorg Lenzlinger drapes from the ceiling of the Church of San Stae, and was originally created for the 50th Venice Biennial.



# **DUSSELDORF**

THE HANGING GARDENS OF DUSSELDORF

Three long years and three-tonnes of netting later – Argentine artist Tomas Saraceno has finally completed the much-anticipated Hanging Gardens of Dusseldorf. Aptly named 'in orbit' this 2500-square metre installation boasts various gigantic air-filled PVC balls that can hold up to ten people at one time.



WUHAN

AN ANIMAL ZOO MADE OUT OF LOUIS VUITTON HANDBAGS

Fashion can be adventurous at the best of times, with many designers choosing to create statement clobber in hot hues, outrageous materials and OTT styles. One week we'll spot models cartwheeling down the catwalk and the next, donning outlandish masks. Louis Vuitton, a brand to watch – when other designers are walking, they're running! In response to a store opening at the Wuhan International Plaza in Central China's Hubei province, an entire animal zoo was erected, with many of the sculptures comprising of almost 100 Louis Vuitton handbags each!



# **VENICE**

SPIRAL OF GALAXY AT THE CINE FOUNDATION

Standing at 333 centimetres high, this epic bronze sculpture is one of Marc Quinn's greatest and most significant pieces to date. Notorious for his controversial work, including the famous gold statue of supermodel Kate Moss and a replica of his head created from his very own blood, this bronze shell may seem a little on the tame side. However, it marks the return of Quinn to Venice and highlights his ever-growing passion for contemporary art.



# **HONG KONG**

INDUSTRIAL FOREST BY ESKYIU

This non-profit art space comprises of hundreds of 4-metre-high, pin-thin filaments, which interact with spectators by bending towards them. These aluminium strands take centre stage on a raised highway terrace in the Wong Chuk Hang district of Hong Kong. Created as a resonance of the yellow bamboo that once thrived in the area, this interactive forest is set to evolve even more so in the future, comprising of sound components, herbal gardens, sensors and artificial grass.



# **HOUSTON**

CHAIN LINK FENCING AS ART

This glistening abstract installation was laborious to install, yet well worth the wait The end result – a total of 37 individual units created out of a luminous chain linking. This sculptural masterpiece by the artist Soo Sunny Park focuses predominantly on light. As you walk from one end to the other, the iridescent Plexiglas releases a rainbow of colours.



# **SINGAPORE**

SINGAPORE TOWER COMPLEX

Singapore regularly ranks as one of Asia's more habitable cities, yet individual, high-rise and isolated towers progressively dominate it. Such constructions tend to favour exclusion over societal connectivity. This was the case until the Singapore Tower Complex was erected. Consisting of half hanging garden, half glass block, it currently stands as an exemplary model for urban architecture in the 21st century.



# **NEW YORK**

BALLOON DOG FRIEZE NEW YORK SCULPTURE PARK

Every dog has its day and this is certainly the case for Paul McCarthy's 80-foot Balloon sculpture. McCarthy, who appears to have jumped on the anti-koons bandwagon, is renowned for blurring the lines between desire and reality, and anyone to stumble upon this whimsical sculpture would see why. The whacky installation has reportedly sold for an amount not far from one million pounds.

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# T T JANE JAMES



Now, where did I leave  $\it that$  paintbrush...?

o some, a cluttered desk is a nuisance, yet to others, it's an asset. This is exactly the case for Jane James, whose desk plays home to a multitude of ceramic implements, shells, driftwood, a sole coffee stirring stick (her favourite tool) and various on-going projects.

Does Jane's desk illustrate an insight into her personality? Yes, she describes herself as having a cluttered brain, an individual who's unable to throw anything away as she'll always find a use for it. Her working space is the epitome of organised chaos, and although she likes the idea of a tidy desk, she feels that she wouldn't be anywhere near as creative if her working space suddenly adopted a minimalistic form.

Jane studied a National Diploma in Art and Design, and then another in photography, yet ceramics wasn't a vocation she pictured herself in. Handmade Coastal Ceramics was born from a hobby, which quickly evolved into a successful business.

Jane's St Helier studio, which opened in March last year, is located close to the Central Market. This shabby chic space

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boasts a definite coastal theme and one that doubles up as an ample workspace as well as a gift shop. The benefit of combining the two allows budding artists to view a number of Jane's works from start to finish. Both children and adults visiting the Paint-Your-Own-Ceramics area take inspiration from the surrounding artwork, whilst Jane gains her creativeness from the picturesque coastline that envelopes Jersey and holidays abroad – Antigua being one of her favourite destinations. She spends her free time scouring the local beaches for washed up driftwood, which she then incorporates into her art. The entire process is a very organic one.

The main concept behind this studio come gift shop is to offer local artists a platform in which to showcase and sell unique works of art. Broadening her production, she's now opened another gallery and gift shop, situated in the charming Gorey Harbour. When I ask her what her preferred piece is, she tells me it's at home – she won't sell it until another favourite comes along!

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# IT'S NICE TO HAVE YOU BACK IN JERSEY. YOU LEFT 3 YEARS AGO... FILL US IN?

It's nice to be back! I've been quite a busy boy over the last three years. In 2010 I started a Master of Fine Arts in Painting at The New York Studio School - a wonderful and totally unique institution that focuses very heavily on drawing skills and teaches a deep love of Art History while urging you to not be easily satisfied by what you have created. For two years I locked myself (literally) in my studio and worked all hours of the day and night on a number of very large paintings, many of which never saw the light of day, but the best ones made it into my Thesis Show in 2012, which was very well received. Several iconic artists and writers came, and I gave them all a piece of chalk to write their responses with on the walls of one of my three showing rooms which was painted black (all of the rooms had different interiors that I based on various grand houses in Europe and the US). Ross Bleckner, a brilliant American painter, came with my friend Jeffrey and when we spoke he said "I love your work", to which I replied "I've loved your work forever" - meeting your heroes is nice! Since then I have been painting with the same degree of intensity, but have realised that I

don't need to give over the entire

day to it.

This was so important to hear because truthfully many young painters think that to show your worth you have to shut yourself in your studio all day and night, even if you are only staring at the wall. In fact I find that the remaining time in the day outside of the studio is incredibly useful: I spend a great deal of this time going to exhibitions and museums for research, working on performance projects and with other artists, or doing the all important social networking that sits at the heart of this great city's thriving art scene. Art, like anything else, is a profession and requires so much more than just the making, though of course that is the most important aspect, and I'm fanatical about not losing sight of that.

YOUR WORK HAS ALWAYS BEEN EXPRESSIVE AND, DARE I SAY, ALTERNATIVE, HOW HAS THAT GROWN NOW YOU'RE IN A LARGER ARENA?

Well oddly enough I think the "alternativeness" has become a little less glaringly obvious. For me and a great many of the artists I know and care about one of the key things is that the form of the work be strong. I am of course still trying to make arresting images OF THINGS (because abstract art is for people who are either really clever, really inept or complete conartists, and I am none of these things), but so much of that arresting quality comes from the finished piece being worked out in rock solid formal movements. It's the same with anything - you can read a beautifully descriptive piece of poetry but if the punctuation and structure is a mess then it will leave you cold. Unless of course it is purposefully messed-UP by design to push the boundaries of the form (like e.e.

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cummings), and that really is something all of the most exciting artists across the board and in every era are striving for. It's about knowing what you're doing but not letting that knowledge control or blinker you.

That's certainly what I've been aiming for in the three shows I've had in the last year, and in the new work that I am preparing for my next show in November.

My shows this year - 'Vagaries', 'Denizens' and 'Reminders' - were all concerned with memory, and this is still a major thrust in my creative narrative. 'Vagaries' looked back to times spent in Jersey C.I., one summer in particular where there was a lot



of friendship, a lot of adventures (one night a certain brilliant Jersey-born performer with the initials WHJ and I slept on top of Faldouet Dolmen under a picnic blanket) and a lot of romantic, ahem, 'overlaps'. The paintings in 'Vagaries' attempted to depict, deconstruct and allegorise these experiences. The following show, 'Denizens', was made shortly after I had spent six weeks living and rehearsing in the middle of the woods in Vermont with a troupe of performers and makers, and ultimately touring the East Coast of the USA staging our own interpretation of a well-known musical (we affectionately called it "Less Miserable"). I performed in it and also had painted a lot of the scenery. Despite the title, on ultimately returning to New York I was distinctly more miserable - though I hasten to add not because I was back in the city (I had spent a lot of the time in the woods whinging about how one could not find a latte for love nor money). I think the paintings I made then

reflected that feeling by being entirely stripped of colour - they were all black and whites. But the choice of palette also suggested the nostalgia of an old photograph - though I was exhausted and heartbroken, the woods had been a profound and beautiful experience that I still think about daily. A week after 'Denizens' opened the Guggenheim put up a huge Picasso show called 'Black and White'. I do not hesitate in

with a did it better than me. But I still liked my show. It got stuff out of my system. Sort of. Then my following show 'Reminders' was a colour-fest! In many ways, because it was the most recent, I am still digesting its meaning. Plus, whereas the other shows concerned relationships and places which had passed, 'Reminders' was largely about such things which are ongoing, so the paintings were less like epitaphs and more like love letters, post-it notes and warnings (figuratively speaking - I didn't paint actual post-it notes). I think the return of bright color in my work is a very good sign; but I'll let the viewer be the judge.

# ...AND YOU CALL NEW YORK HOME NOW?

In so many ways, yes. It's what my teenage self who would drive to St. Ouens beach and stare at the horizon was staring at. I am totally in love with it. And what's

so wonderful are the people here, artists in particular, who affirm through their enjoyment of my work that I have a place here as an artist. On any given evening there is so much going on that it seems like a nearimpossible task to rally together an audience for one's own show; so when I look around on my opening nights and see a roomful of some of the greatest artists, intellectuals and social icons in America I am deeply humbled and profoundly happy. Every week I have lunch with my dearest friend Caroline, who grew up in Australia with a similar New York dream as I, and never do we fail to talk about how utterly blessed we both feel in having been allowed to be part of this magnificent melting pot.

JERSEY HAS ALWAYS BEEN CRYING OUT FOR ARTIST WORKSPACE, BUT IT'S NOT ALWAYS AVAILABLE. NO DOUBT NEW YORK HAS PRESENTED GREAT OPPORTUNITIES FOR A WORKSPACE?

Yes indeed, but as with Jersey space is always an issue. In fact, space is one of the main subjects of conversation among New Yorkers, alongside politics and

Among artists there is a noticeable struggle for the right workspace - I have moved studios several times during my career, for multifarious reasons, but now have found one (in the über arty neighbourhood of Bushwick in Brooklyn) where I am very happy. It's pretty compact, but in all honesty I prefer that - even when I had a cavernous space at the old Westmount quarry I found myself breaking it down into little compartments, and I've certainly let go of much bigger spaces in New York to be in this one - small dimensions create a more focused energy for me. Frank Auerbach, one of my favourite British painters, has been working in the same tiny studio in Camden forever, and looking at his work as a child was one of the stimuli that got me painting in the first place.

Gallery space is altogether a different matter, and I truly believe that it has a lot to do with luck; a good deal of socialising and paying attention to the art world help, but it's ultimately got to be about the work. I have been so lucky to meet the people in NY who have helped me show my work, reviewed it and bought it. I am especially lucky to know Damien of Eyeheart Gallery in Chelsea, Manhattan, where I have a solo show in early November. He's that rare kind - a gallerist who is also an artist - so he totally understands all of my ideas for the space and the work, and gets excited as I do. He's a real treat!

YOUR WORK IS NO DOUBT GETTING ESTABLISHED. HAVE YOU HAD YOUR WORK APPEAR ANYWHERE EXCITING? I think the most exciting place for me was in the web series "The 3 Bits", which is an off-the-wall and totally genius project of two amazingly talented Brooklynites. The piece is a large painting of a squirrel sitting next

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to a book of Chekhov plays - a slightly catty (or should that be rodenty?) retort to an exboyfriend telling me we were "not on the same page" (considering that I am among the many visual artists who find reading at length to be quite difficult I found this statement to be a particular slight). As it happens, "The 3 Bits" is the creation of two people I love very much (one of whom in a weak-at-the-knees kind of way) and is causing a veritable sensation in New York right now, so it's a great thrill when people who have seen it come up to me and say "I love the squirrel painting!" I feel like I have fathered a celebrity rodent; take that Mickey Mouse!

I also have work in some pretty impressive private collections. I hate to brag, but it feels really good when one of your own paintings is on the same wall as something by someone you've admired since your Hautlieu days (I'm not telling...).

WHENEVER I GO TO NEW YORK I JUST LOVE SOAKING UP THE CULTURE AND LIFE. WHAT WOULD YOU RECOMMEND NOW THAT YOU'RE OUR 'MAN ON THE GROUND' THERE?

BROOKLYN! Don't get me wrong, Manhattan truly is a wonder of the world, but I feel like so many people visit New York and miss out on some of the greatest things because they spend their entire time in Manhattan. Last weekend I spent the most wonderful day on the beach in the Rockaways, which got really badly hit by Hurricane Sandy but is jumping back to life for summer. There are just so many glorious restaurants, parks, museums and historic Neighbourhoods in Brooklyn (and Queens and the Bronx for that

matter) that they almost warrant a separate trip. But, while in Manhattan, I would say that one of the absolute gems which rarely gets enough attention is The Cloisters - a reconstructed medieval monastery that houses a huge collection owned by the Metropolitan Museum, including the Unicorn Tapestries, which are utterly breathtaking. And the gardens

are splendid. It's like a day in an entirely different world. But with a café.


SO YOU'RE ESTABLISHED, CONNECTED, LIVING THE LIFE AND PART OF A RICH TAPESTRY OF CULTURE OVER THERE, WHAT'S NEXT?

Well, I'm not eligible to run for President, but... I am currently applying for an artist's visa so that I can continue to fight the good creative fight in the place where I think it matters most. Americans really do seek social progress through creative means, and in my own way I want to be part of that. I have never been a very political person, but I truly believe that art is inherently political as it demands that you adjust your world view to absorb it. So I speak of politics in a broader sense: the politics of space, seeing and thinking. I have always deeply believed that the United States is where I can make art that matters. But the wonderful thing about the world we live in now is how many ways there are to communicate globally, especially artistically. I recently worked on one of my friend Marie Christine's walking performances in which one of the performers tweeted our words and directions ("take fifty steps, turn left, look up...") to an international audience so that they might recreate our route in their own towns, which I thought was so fabulous (although I did joke that I hoped no one was participating too close to any cliffs). This got me thinking about an interactive, international element for my next show, but, as artists are famous for saying, "I'm still working on it...". I'll see you at the show!

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# **GUERILLA VIDEO**

We often hear of people that leave the island to pursue an artistic career. Whether an art degree, acting, dancing or other creative output, the road to success is a tough one.

Jerseyites sometimes return home for the summer and end up whisked up by our magnetic island into the world of 'temporary' work never to follow that path again. This month we had a visit from Isla Ure, a familiar face and name that featured in early Gallery editions before leaving to study acting in the UK. Since then Isla has acted on stage and screen playing characters from A Clockwork Orange on stage to voicing the two females in a mechanical love triangle with Lister in Red Dwarf.

Isla is one of those that stayed. Having moved from actor to director / producer, she is about to embark on production of her own feature. It's a tale of chance meetings to be adapted from, and building on the premise of, her 'Passengers' short film. The film (vimeo.com/44924654 if you're reading this digitally) tells the tale of two strangers who meet in passing at a London bus stop and fill their share time with a poised, considered need for company and a listening ear. It's a commentary on the solitude and limited discourse in the world that is both romantic and compelling.

With just £50 and a Canon 7D, the short was filmed guerilla style on a public bus. Having scoped out a few different bus routes that might provide what was required, they found one that would be quiet for long enough for Isla, her one man crew and her opposite number, Tommy, to find time between screaming babies to get a full take. Critical praise followed and following a gap between roles it gave Isla the confidence to pursue her vision for the feature, entitled 'Halycon Heights'.

The tale, however, is a bittersweet one as Tommy, the co-star of Passengers and Isla's partner, passed away earlier this year. The development of Halcyon Heights is therefore his legacy and any profits are being donated to 'The Tommy Fund' - a fund set up to support young actors and film makers. The film itself is being funded through the IndieGoGo crowd source platform so you can be a part of it and contribute accordingly. Whether just £1 or £1000 to become an executive producer, you can help Isla and her team realise their dream.


#### SPINE TINGLING

#### EVER HEARD OF THE 'VAMPIRE FACIAL'? WELL, IF NOT, DO READ ON ...

There's been a few articles and images in the media reporting about the effects of the pioneering new procedure dubbed 'The Vampire Facial', with polar opposite celebs, Kerry Katona and Kim Kardashian both having given it a go. Kim Kardashian looks visibly amazing – with a youthful glow and suppleness to her skin and Kerry, well, Miss Katona reportedly had a reaction and ended up with a slightly puffy face (personally, I think she looked better than normal so I reckon the procedure did wonders for her and I'm always rather dubious about her newsworthiness, considering she'll do anything to get herself in the papers!)... The truth is, you CAN look a little puffy following the procedure, for approximately 24 hours. Naturally, after having been injected, the face can be a little swollen and a bit red.

So, 3 weeks ago, in the name of journalism and in order to bring to you Gallery readers an honest account of the PRGF Endoret facial rejuvenation procedure, I took myself down to Spectrum Smiles on Gloucester Street, lay back and had blood taken from my arm and the plasma from it injected into my face... Sounds rather ominous but let me tell you – it was a pretty pain free procedure indeed and the results are starting to make me look 28 again. On arrival at Spectrum Smiles, I was met by leading non-surgical anti-aging consultant and award winning cosmetic dentist, Dr Mitra Nafaji. Dr Mitra explained the whole process before starting and the crowd of ladies that were there to watch was immediately intrigued (did I mention I was the guinea pig?).

A short but insightful presentation was given and whilst my audience sat sipping champagne, I prepared myself. As I'm not a massive fan of needles, I was a little nervous, but Dr Mitra and her assistant had me calm and in fact, giggling within seconds. Blood

was taken from my arm, and a numbing cream applied to my face... It was on – here goes, The Vampire Facial...

The blood taken from my arm was put into a centrifuge, spun around for a few minutes and taken out again... Dr Mitra showed me the result; the blood's healing proteins had separated from the blood itself – the golden elixir, known as plasma, was ready to be injected into my face.

Tens of tiny pin pricks permeated my face - as I mentioned earlier, I'm a tad nervy about needles, but this was relatively pain free and presented no trouble in terms of my tension; in fact, I felt relaxed throughout - even with a group of ladies watching me have it done. After about 20 minutes of injections, it was over... My face tingled slightly and the puffiness and rouge was minimal indeed. The remaining plasma, which hadn't been injected, was soaked into some gauze and placed upon my face - this felt wonderful... My own body had produced the very ingredient that was to make my skin feel rejuvenated and supple - it felt better than any other treatment I've ever had before (and I've done the botox thing on a few occasions and tried all manner of facials in the past). As Dr Mitra had explained, the initial treatment doesn't result in any long term effect, the second treatment lasts approximately a week and the third lasts for anything up to a year - so, two more treatments to go before my plasma kicks in and brings me back to a youthful and healthy complexion.

Although the initial treatment has little effect for much time, I could see my skin radiating a rather youthful glow the next morning and it felt beautifully supple and fresh. Look out in next month's gallery for the next installment and an interview with Dr Mitra.

As I approach Banjo, I already have a clear vision in my mind. A vision of grandeur, opulence and effortless style. And I'm not wrong. This unique venue is all if not more, yet with a slight twist. Unlike the majority of stately restaurants, Banjo boasts a sophisticated vibe and one that's more in tune with a European city.

On entering the remarkable tiled hallway, a friendly gentleman leads me past the main brasserie and into the back Café Bar – a room I haven't yet been to. I'm instantly transported to another world and for a second, I forget that I'm in the heart of Jersey.

The first thing I notice is the décor. In this room, Banjo Café Bar has truly brought the outdoors in and on a day like today, the entire space appears drenched in sunlight. Interior pieces have been handpicked from all corners of the globe. From the exquisite wallpaper that flows freely from one design to another, to the hovering clouds that hang daintily from the ceiling – everything about this venue screams unique, and the kitsch backdrop creates a refreshing ambience unlike like anything else on the island.

As I'm busy drinking up the impressive surroundings, one of the Jones' brothers strolls directly up to me, and not just any Jones' brother – a relation to the illustrious banjoist Ernest Jones. This is of course where the name 'Banjo' comes from. This historic reference is further reflected in each of the distinctively dressed bedrooms, all of which have been named after a band member – Edith, Ernest, Leslie and Percy.

When the owners of Jersey Pottery first bought into this magnificent building, once a successful gentleman's club, is was in need of renovation. 34 contractors later and a great deal of hard work and Banjo was born. Where possible, all of the original features are intact, including the characterful period plaster ceilings

and the artistic banisters. A meander down to the famous 'loo lobby' reveals an insight into Ernest's fascinating past, whilst the main bathroom foyer showcases a mesmerising display of colour-changing wallpaper.

Back at the table I'm served several plates of tantalising treats from the lighter bar menu, whilst both the chef and my new acquaintance chat freely about the tastes and flavours before me. This is a venue where effort is of the essence and nothing is finalised until perfected! Even the annual 1000 litres of olive oil come directly from a family friend in Tuscany. The soon to be released new bar menu is light, delicate and cultured. A concoction of fresh tagliatelle, artichoke and thyme literally melts in my

mouth, whilst the Cumin Roast Carrots, Orange, Avocado and Watercress salad poses as the perfect lunchtime delicacy. Small plates are ideal for sharing, whilst the lighter brasserie dishes offer a vision of the main dining experience - all part of the new Café Bar menu Banjo has in store. Everything tastes different!

As another exquisitely presented plateful arrives at the table, the chef launches into an animated explanation of the dish I'm dying to try – Chilli Bolotti Bean Bruschetta with infusions of white wine, extra virgin olive oil and shallots. Although on a smaller scale, each and every offering is of the same caliber as the brasserie.

Despite what many may perceive, the lunch and dinner price tag is a far cry from what the lavish surroundings would suggest. Price doesn't however

comprise on quality and each and every dish captures elements of sophisticated flavour, colour and crispness. I was informed that all ingredients are sourced locally where possible and a quick trip to the kitchen revealed some of the freshest bass I've ever set eyes on.

As the sun beamed down on our table, I felt as if I was enjoying the sights and sounds of a quaint eatery in the French Riviera, and on a warm day like today, I welcomed the idea of Banjo's back bar - with its organic, Mediterranean feel, this bright and cool room allowed me to enjoy the sunlight without the heat.

Come evening, the Café Bar takes on an entirely different vibe. One of the bartenders kindly illustrated this – the botanical paradise quickly evolves into a trendy cocktail bar as the ceiling shutters come together at the touch of a button. Blue lights illuminate the trees, whilst a soft green hue casts playful shadows across the walls.

I left feeling satisfied yet not so full that I was unable to return to work. My experience at Banjo was first-rate, and it's certainly a venue I'll be recommending to friends and family – not just for dinner, but for quick lunches and snacks in Banjo Café Bar too.

## APPETITE NEWS



Phani Kundeti, Head Pastry Chef at Saffrons in Hotel de France, gets our taste buds going talking through some of his favourtie dishes from the Saffrons menu and how he creates them:

## Madrasi Style Red Mullet, Tomato Chutney, Bombay 'Vitelotte', Potatoes, Tempered Carrots and Asparagus.

This dish is a result of a re-work on one of my favourites, Madrasi classic Meen Chettinad. Appolo fish or a pomfret is cooked in freshly ground spiced tomato and tamarind based sauce. Here at Saffrons we are using Red Mullet marinated in whole spices oil overnight, cooked sous vide and finished on a hot griddle. The sauce is de-constructed using green zebra, ida gold and black kirm varieties of heritage tomatoes, sauteed with coriander and cumin, the fish chettinad sauce is served separately.

#### Pistachio and Green Chutney Crusted Lamb Fillet, Cassia Bark scented Salsifies, Baby Artichokes, Aloo Fry, Saffron spiked Chanterelle, Lamb Jus.

This dish has its influences from Indian Lamb Green Curry. Lamb fillet is marinated for 24 hours in ginger and garlic paste and a

further 6 hours with a second marinade of spices. The fillet is gently cooked in a water bath, seared on a griddle then rolled in green crust based on pistachios, bread crumbs, mint coriander, green chillies, garlic and ginger. The lamb is served with Chat Masala fried Potatoes, Saffron spiked Chanterelles, baby Artichokes and Salsifies.

#### Raspberry, Kalamansi and Pistachio - Kalamansi Crémeaux, Raspberry Mousseline, Pistachio Micro Sponge and Kalamansi Ice Cream.

This dish is Saffrons take on the refreshing Kalamansi and raspberries to balance the spices on the palate. Using the latest techniques and imaginative presentation with a delicate balance of textures and subtle flavours like popping Kalamansi Ice Cream, Kalamansi marshmallow knots dipped in chocolate, airy Pistachio micro sponge and crunchy pistachios.



From the outside, this old state house looks just like any other, yet on entering the property, an industrial chic façade quickly makes itself known.

No two surfaces are the same and unlike those that prefer a minimalistic approach, each and every crevice is jam packed with curious trinkets, books and jewels. Objects, paintings and furnishings are all locally sourced, after all, why buy elsewhere when you can find a multitude of knickknacks



on your front doorstep? To illustrate this, Julian shows me something that he purchased only a few hours before we met – a glass jar encasing a genuine floral display, which he tells me, he only paid one pound for.

You've probably established that this is not your average dynasty; it's a town house with an industrial heart. It's also Thébault's sixth renovation project to date. Inspired by Julian's love for all unwanted objects – this establishment is jam packed with 70's style furniture, aboriginal art, mannequin hands peeping through the walls and

colour-changing lamps. From picking up the pigments in paints to lasers that sit pointedly at the end of the kitchen, casting dancing shadows across the worktops, ceiling and floor – the lamps are possibly the most astounding feature.

Those that helped put this space together knew from the beginning that Thébault would be an unusual client – the salvaged kitchen walls appear in the same fashion as that of the workstations and cabinets, whilst the blinds boast a gathering of several colourful bands, all of which were painstakingly put together one by one.

Many will think that this project took months upon months to complete, however, this is far from the case. When Julian first arrived, it's fair to say the entire gutting process was a drastic one to say the least - rotting floorboards complemented the woodchip wallpaper, which ultimately resulted in a few of the plaster walls caving in. Despite these initial setbacks, a year later and it's now a treasure chest of interesting finds. Julian feels there isn't enough colour in the lives of people today, yet it's something that's so simple to achieve, and adding extraordinary objects to a simple space can completely change the look and feel of a place.

Decorating with thrift store finds appears to be a popular theme at present, and Julian, a budding collectomaniac who believes imperfections give each piece a sense of character and distinction, also believes in sustainability. He leans less on the advent of effectual technologies and more on the long-lived history of product re-use. Every interior comfort has been rescued - Thébault takes great pride in finding unwanted objects a home - combining random items and pairing pieces together that most wouldn't dream of uniting. Such as an old piece of driftwood (haggled for in a charity shop) and a 19th century factory light, several clock faces from several eras and a seventies style psychedelic chair.



It's amazing how much we accumulate in our lives and by being frivolous; creating a quirky, modern-day home doesn't have to cost the earth. So the next time you're about to throw away an old seat, chair, light or table, consider giving it a new lease of life. Otherwise, hand it over to Julian and I'm sure he'll find a creative use for it.

The Foundry, Julian Thébault's next brain child will be going live in the very near future, an online platform in which you can purchase a number of his extraordinary creations. He'll even let you try before you buy!

#### To most, a stone lying on the ground may seem useless, yet to a stonemason, this stone can be morphed into a magnificent work of art.

Jersey is home to some of the most inspirational stone masonry in the Channel Islands. Take a stroll through the charming country lanes and you'll be struck by a mass of characterful granite establishments, astounding manor houses and expertly crafted cottages. Little wonder then that the phonebook is bursting with stonemasons offering their expertise. Keen to learn more of this ancient art form, I caught up with the founder of 'I Love Masonry'.

Destined for a life-long love affair with stonework, Richard Payne created 'I Love Masonry', a company that offers a particularly personal approach to construction. When I ask him what first attracted him to this art form, he launches into a detailed description of his 'once' walk to school. Richard was lucky enough to experience the grandeur of Wells Cathedral on a daily basis, often stopping to appreciate the precision and accuracy of this astonishing structure – in fact; the intricate designs used to create this building still confuse people today.

From the sandstone villas of Tuscany to the dry stone walling in North England, stonemasonry the world over takes on many different forms. On completing a project, Richard explains that he feels a great sense of achievement. A large proportion of this satisfaction comes from knowing that this structure has been designed to last, and will only improve over time.

With a number of stonemasons in and around Jersey, I was keen to learn of Richard's influences. He goes on to explain that the structures that excite him the most are also the structures that inspire him. 'Walking through the scissor arches in the nave of Wells Cathedral sends tingles down my spine.' Payne is also a big fan of gothic masonry, which Jersey doesn't have a lot of, yet if you're willing to look hard enough, you will find it.

Richard feels privileged to work on a number of Jersey's impressive manor houses, many of which blend into the surrounding countryside. His proudest moment so far – setting up his own business. His future goals include adding his own personal touch to some of the hidden properties tucked away in the green lanes.

In stonemasonry, each and every project boasts a diverse challenge and many of the ancient buildings in Jersey necessitate different execution methods, including lime work. Richard explains he had to take a course in this very specific masonry method. His future aspirations involve creating something that conjures up a Gothic feel complete with pointed arches, rib vaults and buttresses.

So what's his favourite Jersey building? Richard is in awe of the craftsmanship behind St Ouens Manor. 'From the intricate archways to the grand entrance, everything about this building showcases a certain element of complexity, magnitude and scale.'

Although technology is rife in the construction world, especially when it comes to the towering city skyscrapers that pop up in a matter of months, creativity is always appreciated. Stonemasonry is an art form that differs greatly from the efforts of the average construction worker and is instead something that requires personal innovation. After speaking to Richard, I'm certainly more in tune with the ancient yet inspiring craft of stonemasonry!

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### **NEW HOUSING REGULATIONS**

Kerrie Carlyon | The Mortgage Shop

July saw the introduction of two important pieces of legislation that will have an impact one way or another on everybody who lives in the Island.

#### **NEW HOUSING REGULATIONS**

The first of these, saw the implementation of the Control of Housing and Work (Jersey) Law 2012. The changes embodied in this law will make the occupation of property and the employment of new staff that much easier to understand and to implement. The four new categories will remove the current alphabetical designation from 'a to h', 'j cat.' and 'k'. In addition, the terms 'qualified' and 'non qualified' will also disappear, to be replaced by:

Registered - previously unqualified,

Licensed - previously 'J cats',

Entitled to Work - those resident for 5 years plus

Entitled – locals (those who have lived in the Island for over 10 years), and previously 'k' designated residents

The Social Security and Population Offices will be administering the scheme and no action has to be taken by anybody unless they are applying for new employment, planning to rent or buy property, or are 16 or older and have just moved to the Island and have been resident for 3 months. Once residential status has been gained, this will be retained for life

### STARTER HOME DEPOSIT LOAN SCHEME

The much discussed and long awaited States Starter Home Deposit Loan Scheme has also been launched with an initial budget of £3m and a trial period of six months, or until the funds run out, when The States will then debate whether they should extend the scheme or close it down.

At the time of writing, the terms and conditions of this scheme were not yet available, although we have been able to clarify that the second charge – the 15% deposit from the States that has to be repaid over a term of twenty years (or sooner if the property is sold), will be at an interest rate of zero percent . This is great news, as it means that the additional monthly cost of the borrowing will be kept to the absolute minimum.

For the three property types that the scheme has used as illustrations, the monthly cost of the repayment of the maximum 15% mortgage in each case will be:

### **JERSEY HOUSING MARKET**

So far this year, the housing market has moved forward at a steady pace, with flurries of activity at the beginning of the year, and also when the weather improved at the beginning of June. Although the start of the holiday season seems to have called a halt to any growth in further activity for the time being.

It is a fact that correctly priced property will sell even in this market, although it is essential that vendors do not find themselves in a situation where desperation sets in and they are then forced to transact at a level which even they had not anticipated.

**BASE RATE PROJECTIONS** 

The projections for Bank of England base rate this month indicate a rise in the summer of 2015, rather than the earlier predictions of 2016, even 2018. The return to growth in the British economy, the extremely strong performance of the stock markets, the arrival of Mark Carney as The Bank of England's new governor and the on/off crises of failing members of the EU, will all have an impact on future predictions, with the result that all borrowers should keep a constant eye on the situation.

At present, exceptionally low rates of interest have become the norm for most households, who now tend to budget less for the mortgage and more on other household expenses, their children's education, as well as holidays. However, do be aware, a return to more realistic rates of interest will happen, although when is still more guesswork than reality.

# Common home-buying questions

How long will my purchase take to complete? This will vary according to the complexity of the transaction and the specific circumstances of you and your Vendor (seller). Arranging a completion date is one of the first things that you should discuss with your lawyer. Transactional chains, legal issues and difficulties with finance could all cause a delay. As a rule of thumb, it's possible to complete a simple purchase, in around 4 weeks. When a chain exists, completion can take anywhere between 4 and 6 weeks. This period can extend indefinitely, if there are any property issues which are tricky to resolve. Your lawyer will work with you, to ensure a time frame that suits you.

### Are any contents included in the sale price?

The sale of a property will often include contents. It is worth noting that stamp duty is only applicable to the value of the realty (bricks and mortar) being conveyed and not against any contents. Your lawyer should be able to legitimately reduce the stamp duty payable, by splitting the price of the property, into realty and contents. This may only save you a small amount, in what can be an expressive process, but every little counts!

### Will my contract be in French or English?

Jersey property contracts were traditionally written in French. The language used being a form of legal French, nurtured by conveyancers over the years to include anglicised elements. In 2006 contracts began to be drafted in English, in an effort to make them more accessible to the public. English contracts still rely on legal terminology and often require interpretation by a suitably qualified person, so it is always worth contacting your lawyer, should you have any property related queries, irrelevant of the language used.

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Faced with the sea of Ford Fiesta hire cars that'll soon flood our streets now that summer\* appears to have arrived, I've decided to take a tour of colourful cult creations via a handful of iconic racing liveries and how a certain issue of social acceptance once threatened to change the face of them forever.

The brainchild of French racing driver Hervé Poulain in 1975, Poulain wanted something a little different for the livery of his BMW 3.0 CSL for that year's 24 Heures du Mans race and invited artist and friend Alexander Calder to visit him along with a few litres of paint. The resulting red, yellow and blue BMW has since spawned sixteen further art car projects from BMW alone, as well as more than a few unofficial ones bearing the same badge. Swiss designer Walter Maurer's E36 compact is directly left of this line and looks good enough to be officially sanctioned. I can think of three that have lived in Jersey alone. The creation of art cars has a cult following worldwide, but what I find most interesting are those that are recognised on an international scale, often exhibited across continents and followed by millions, often with a bird's eye view; the racing cars.

Although the BMW Art Car project's purpose has changed somewhat during its 33 year lifespan so far, evolving from the cars being used solely as competition vehicles and after a departure in 2009 that saw the car being used as a tool to create the art rather than becoming the art itself when Robin Rhode used a Z4 with painted tyres to create a giant canvas, they later returned to their roots in 2010 when Jeff Koons designed the livery for their M3 GT2 that ran at Le Mans. It didn't finish, but it did look as if it were travelling at lightspeed even whilst standing still.

Many of the ensuing artists involved need no introduction; Lichtenstein's dot and colour adorned imposing wide-bodied E21 turbo; Warhol's colourful pop-scrawl with a hint of fingerpainting; Rauschenberg's dark offering on a 635CSi and Brit David Hockney making more than just a splash with his animals and nature inspired 850 CSi (I particularly like the dog reaching for the door handle).

Personally, of the vehicles in the collection covered in wild brushstrokes it is Sandro Chia's E36 that stands out, whilst Frank Stella, of minimalist fame, who created the second ever BMW Art Car painstakingly hand painted a fine grid over the entirety of his vehicle, the precision bordering upon the incredible as with much of his other work. All of the vehicles are on display at the BMW museum in Munich, if you're ever passing by.

These works all began life as an artistic expression to be exhibited on racecourses worldwide, but are some sponsor liveries not works of art too, designed to catch the eye and etch themselves into your memory? I remember the Dodge Viper GT cars of French racing team ORECA in eyewateringly bright fluorescent colours burning my retinas whilst simultaneously inviting me to 'rent a car' as a child (not that they specialised in renting vehicles to underage drivers, it was more that I was of that age at the time) but more powerfully will always relate anything black and gold to the myriad John Player Special Lotus racing cars of old even to this day. Fortunately for JPS and Lotus at the time, the social acceptance of smoking swung in their favour.

Take the red bodywork sporting a white triangle on the bonnet of four-time WRC champion Tommi Makkinen that proudly advertised Marlboro cigarettes though, which must have had ad-execs and rally bosses scratching heads in a fit of panic when cigarette advertising was banned in motorsport. Fortunately, the brand was so iconic that they managed to convince the powers that so strangled them that removing the text would be sufficient to run, even though the advertising message was practically as strong. Can it be argued that removing the sponsor names from vehicles in this way will slow the uptake of smoking amongst the youth? I doubt it, because if I'm honest I had no idea that John Player made cigarettes, only that the cars and bikes they sponsored looked sharp and moved fast, and that you could get a Capri in black and gold to match the stars on your Sunday screen.



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
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


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### Food for thought
