Eskimo Viburnum



Not particularly attractive to deer who tend to leave it alone in favor of tastier treats.





Viburnum utile 'Eskimo'

- <u>Use</u>: An extraordinary flowering shrub with stunning parents
 (V. "Cayuga' and V. untile). The pink-edged buds eventually open into elegant ivory snowballs.
- Exposure/Soil: Easily grown in average, medium moisture, well-drained soils in full sun to part shade. Prefers moist loams, but tolerates a wide range of soils. Established plants have some drought tolerance. Prune as needed immediately after flowering. Tolerates clay and growing under black walnut trees.
- **Growth**: Quickly growing to 3-6' tall and wide. (May reach reach 6' tall and 10' wide in 15 years without pruning)
- *Hardiness:* Zone 6-8; Shrub
- <u>Foliage</u>: Semi-evergreen. Fine-textured leaves that resemble dark green leather. In the fall, the plant retains 60% of its leaves, which turn purple-black as fall progresses.
- **Flower:** It is covered with 3- to 4-inch-diameter sturdy white, spring flowers. This variety requires a different selection of the same species growing nearby in order to set fruit.
