COVER STORY

Camellia japonica 'Emmett Pfungstl' is an older, but a favourite registration from our American cousins. The International Camellia Register description is:


U.S. Plant Patent No.927, issued May, 21, 1950. A variegated form of Joseph Pfungstl. Dark red and white. Synonyms: 'Dorothy Parker', 'Joseph Pfungstl Variegated'. Originated in Pfungstl's Nursery, Montgomery, Alabama, USA. See black and white photo, p.80, Hertrich, 1959, *Camellias in the Huntington Gardens*, vol.III. Colour plate, p.85, Macoboy, 1981, *The Colour Dictionary of Camellias* and the front cover, ACRS, 1982, *Camellia News*, No.83. Orthographic error: 'Emmett Pfungstle'. Chinese synonym 'Aimeite'.

The cover photo (Photo 1) is from the Wagga Show in 2012, where 'Emmett Pfungstl', benched by Bill and Ann Mitchell, won the Best Formal Double of Show.

However it normally "varies widely in style from irregular semi-double to loose peony form with deeply waved inner petals", Excerpt from Macoboy's 'What Camellia is That?', see Macoboy's photo at No. 2.

The plant is readily available through specialist camellia nurseries like Camellia Glen, whose photo caption says "Medium, dark red and white variegated, irregular semi double, compact upright.". See their website photo at No. 3.

The image on the cover of *Camellia News* No 83, December 1982, is very similar to the Macoboy's image and is captioned as an informal double.

Questionnaire Feedback

Thanks to all of our members who completed the questionnaire, which was most of you. After receiving the completed surveys, we adjusted the final figures for those that did not submit their questionnaire to reflect the majority result from those who did. This action was explained in the questionnaire. The final result was:

- 89% wanted hard copy, the remainder wanted either electronic or both.
- 86% wanted 3 copies per annum, remainder happy with 2 or 1.
- 100% happy with fee increase across all printing options except 2 were not happy for a fee increase if we went electronic.
- 100% were against our affiliate making regular donations (which is what the CA info asked for, as opposed to a once off or irregular donation should funding allow).
- 100% were against affiliates paying for advertising or paying to distribute the journal.

These results have been forwarded to Camellias Australia for further discussion at either ZOOM meetings or at the Congress planned, at this stage, for September in Warragal, Victoria.

A ZOOM meeting is set for 5 March 2021, but the information from that meeting will not be available before we go to print for this newsletter.

Anything of particular importance will be discussed at our next meeting and members will be advised accordingly.

Who Needs Flowers?

Should it be all about a pretty face, or the complete package. We've all heard the 'blonde bimbo' jokes and ones about the new-age, metro-sexual, exfoliating Adonis'.

We can't all be Hugh Jackman or Elle MacPherson, but do these people really look that good when they fall out of bed in the mornings? Our camellias are much the same. Most of them look stunning when they are in full plumage (flowering), but what about when they're not. Do they have to be resigned to the back garden stalls as innocuous background shrubs or can they offer more? Camellias can suffer from the same expectational fate as roses in that we can only think of them in terms of their flowers.

Many camellias (like roses) can also feature great foliage colours, textures and shapes. As a landscaper, I am always trying to think beyond the standard seasonal repertoire of the full spring symphony and the autumnal amen. Intermingling and juxtaposing

foliage colours and textures can go a long way towards adding garden





interest in the interceding periods when your camellias aren't being too sexy for their leaves. Enter stage left the species and many hybrid cultivars.

We should always grow more camellias, so why not rip out some of those other boring background shrubs you haven't noticed in years and plant some of the camellia species cultivars. Try the 'orientalness' and fragrance of species *C. lutchuensis*, the weeping, twistedness of *C. tsaii* and the burnished salaciousness of *C. salicifolia*. Other species with interesting foliage are *C. minutiflora*, *C. transnokoensis*, *C. nitidissima*, *C. microcarpa* and *C. assimilis*.

If you're a exhibiting junkie then many hybrids might take your fancy. While the dark flowers of *C. hybrid* 'Night Rider' have mysterious appeal, so does its claret-coloured foliage regrowth. Fine-leaved cultivars such as *C. sasanqua* 'Slim-n-Trim' and *C. hybrid* 'Transtasman'. The weeping cascading ones like *C. japonica* 'Kujaku-tsubaki' (Peacock Camellia), *C. hybrid* 'Sweet Emily Kate', *C. hybrid* 'Will's Wonder', *C. hybrid* 'Bridal Bouquet' and *C. sasanqua* 'Marge Miller'. If you're looking for some foliage variegation

to brighten up a background try *C. japonica* 'Benten-tsubaki' or *C. hybrid* 'Golden Spangles'. For quirkiness try *C. japonica* 'Quercifolia' (the fish-tailed camellia), or *C. japonica* 'Holly Bright' with it's crepe-like flowers and holly-like serrated foliage.



Tom Savige's 'Wirlinga' Series

Tom Savige and his wife, Olive, moved to Wirlinga, NSW, near Lake Hume and Albury in 1970. They were members of Hume Camellia Society when it first opened in the 1977.


Tom was a prolific hybridiser, specialising in cluster-flowering varieties. Many of the 'Wirlinga' series were cluster-flowering and are especially pleasing plants when in bloom.

In 1994 Hume Camellia Society commissioned the painting of 'Wirlinga Bride' for the "Tom and Olive Savige Perpetual Trophy". The trophy was competed for at the Albury Camellia Show for the "Best cut of cluster-flowered miniature hybrid or species".

The Following list includes the Australian Registration Number and the bloom nomenclature:

156 'Wirlinga Belle', 204 'Wirlinga Princess', 268 'Wirlinga Gem', 350 'Wirlinga Cascade', 410 'Wirlinga Bride', 472 'Wirlinga Rosette', 501 'Wirlinga Snow Drift', 502 'Wirlinga Garland', 503 'Wirlinga Jewel', 505 'Wirlinga Ruffles' and 530 'Wirlinga Plum Blossom'.

What a lot of rain & a cool summer will do!

C.j 'Brushfields Yellow', a little older and taller than 'Tootsie', gave a few less blooms in 2020 than is usual (although still a good number), but the regular summer appearance of seed pods has seen very large specimens. Normal size for our plant over time is as big as a grape, but this year the pods resemble very green golf balls. Not as many pods as previous seasons, but they are all huge. See bottom left.

After the extended drought across the nation many of our camellia plants got into some bad habits. For example my plant of *C.j* 'Tootsie' (bloom from 2015 shown above), did not bloom in 2020. This favourite pure white formal double miniature bloom's bush, is probably more than 20 years old, standing about 2.5m high, and whilst it is not a prolific bloomer, I think this is the first year where no blooms occurred. All plants in the area were watered during summer of 2019/2020, but you cannot replace the benefit of rain.

The other front garden plants thrived also, thanks to the rain, see *C.j* 'Man Size' see bottom centre, and *C.s* 'Plantation Pink', bottom right.

We also removed the very large Liquid Amber which shaded many camellias, just hope the future summer western sun is not too damaging.

Our Dona Herzilia... and the two E.G. Waterhouse plants are also thriving.

After record breaking rain over the second half of 2020, 'Tootsie' has burst into new season growth and has flower buds aplenty, as shown at right! Still not planning for dozens of blooms as only one bud per stem is evident.
