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Mark LaMont next Idyllwild Fire chief

Acting Idyllwild Fire Chief Mark LaMont has been offered the position of fire chief permanently. Commission President Jerry Buchanan announced the commission's decision Tuesday night at the conclusion of a closed session.

He added that it is still Mark subject to negotiating a satisfactory contract with LaMont. The final decision may still be a few weeks in the future. But LaMont is the commission's preference.

"I'm looking forward to continuing the service that we provide at Idvllwild Fire." LaMont said.

LaMont had been assistant fire chief under Chief Patrick Reitz, who resigned in March under a circumstances that have been kept from public knowledge. Buchanan emphasized that the assistant fire chief position will not be filled.

Normal use of local highways still months away

Last weekend, Caltrans extended the hours Highway 74 was available to motorists, even with a pilot car escort between Valle Vista and Mountain Center.

However, the discouraging news is that Highway 74's use may continue as currently permitted for at least two more months. And the opening of Highway 243 is currently unknown.

Caltrans has provided this summary of the repairs and work on highways 74 and 243. "Additional damage and erosion continue weekly to slopes, culverts and the pavement on both routes," Friday's press re-

Work on Highway 74 may require at least another two months. The storm events in May have reduced the time available to repair the highway. And Caltrans emphasized that the two-month estimate is very much dependent on good weather in June and July.

Not only has the weather delayed work on Highway 243, but it has damaged and impaired some of the work that has already been done.

Repair of the washout at Bay Tree Spring has been washed out itself. This work will have to be redone. Also, the spring has begun flowing again over the work area and has to be rediverted. Finally, the heavy fog in recent weeks has slowed the transport of materials to the site.

Highway 243 remains closed to all traffic between Idyllwild and Banning.

Highway 74 will remain available for use from 4 to 8 a.m. and from 6 p.m. to midnight until further notice.

Rattlesnake bites hiker in Garner Valley

"Helen, it got me," Lee Anderson called out to her friend Helen Hixon of Idyllwild.

Wednesday, May 15, the two women were hiking along a road in Garner Valley. They were not on Thomas Mountain or hiking a trail leading to the Pacific Crest Trail. This trail was chosen because of all the wildflowers blooming and the convenient access from Morris

Ranch Road. trail, but the wildflowers and other plant growth were dense and doing beautifully from the wet winter.

Hixon was a few paces ahead of Anderson when she heard her friend's warning and cry. Then they both watched the rattlesnake slither across the road into the undergrowth after its aggressive act to assert dominion over the area.

After trying to return to the car, Anderson needed to sit. The bite was on her shin and the pain was beginning. Hixon calmly used her cell phone to call 911.

The operator also urged them to just sit. Do not continue walking and wait for emergency help, which would be dispatched immediately. Anderson was grateful that Hixon could use the phone to obtain coordinates for 911 to dispatch the medical help.

Hixon also urged Anderson to slow her breathing. They also knew to remove all


Actually, it was more of a road than a of Anderson's jewelry because the snake venom causes tissue to swell.

This avoids two dangerous problems. The first is, as the tissue on the fingers, toes, arms and legs swells, something tight such as a ring or even a tourniquet could restrict needed blood flow. Secondly, it avoids having to have the jewelry cut or damaged when removed later.

An Idyllwild Fire Department ambulance arrived and sped off with Anderson. After a quick stop at Station 30 in Pinyon to verify that an air ambulance was not available, IFD rushed Anderson to Eisenhower Medical Center.

Even with a paramedic administering an IV in the ambulance, Anderson experienced a lot of pain and discomfort, which continued in the emergency room.

Mountain Fire federal lawsuit appears near settlement

In July 2013, the Mountain Fire caused the evacuation of much of the Hill. The fire originated on property owned by Tarek M. Al-Shawaf in Mountain Center. It swept northeasterly along the east side of South Ridge and formed a crescent-shaped burn area that surrounded Idyllwild on three sides. Some homes and other structures were lost, and much national forest land was burned.

Lawsuits were filed in both state and federal courts against Al-Shawaf and his employees, James and Donna Nowlin. Last year, the state-court lawsuits in Riverside Court were settled, leaving the federal case that had been filed in Los Angeles, the lead plaintiff in that case being the United States of America.

Last Thursday, May 23, the parties filed a joint status report with the federal court regarding the resolution of that lawsuit. In that status report, the parties informed the court that the United States had prepared and circulated a proposed resolution agreement. The report detailed that attorneys for the parties currently are negotiating the terms of the final releases, and that they anticipate filing a stipulated dismissal document within two weeks.

Consequently, the parties requested that the court continue to stay the case pending final resolution, and that it set a further joint status report date of June 10, 2019, if the parties have not filed a request for dismissal by that time. The court granted setting the join status report date as requested.

Accordingly, it appears likely that the federal-case parties will achieve a formal settlement of that lawsuit within the next two weeks.

Winter in May slowly giving way to warmer, drier weather

As June approaches, it appears that winter is finally receding from the Hill and surrendering to the traditional seasons of the calendar.

Last week, there were three separate "winter weather advisories" issued for the Hill areas. The final advisory was from noon to midnight Sunday, May 26. Snow fell from San Jacinto Peak to flurries in town each time.

The May 26 precipitation fell mostly on the San Jacinto Mountains. According to the National Weather Service, the U.S. Forest Service Vista Grande Fire Station recorded 1.4 inches in 24 hours, the most in Southern California. Two of the other top 10 sites were on the mountain, too.

State grants more funds to combat oak borer

Cal Fire has given the Riverside County Fire Department \$766,500 to combat the Gold-spotted oak borer. This is in addition to the \$1 million grant last August for removal of dead and dying trees.

The county plans to conduct most of the work fighting the GSOB in the Idyllwild Infestation Area. Some funds will be directed to combating a second GSOB infestation that has begun in the Beaumont and Banning areas within the San Bernardino National Forest.

The work will begin with a survey of the oak tree population on the Hill, creating a map of the infested areas. This will identify its heal and infestation status. For trees with infestation, a treatment plan will be prepared or the tree will be removed.

The initial estimate is that 2,350 trees will receive pesticide application and up to 200 trees may be removed, if necessary.



Monday, May 27, the Forest Service's Keenwild Fire Station recorded 1.4 inches of rain. The Idyllwild Fire Station recorded 1.3 inches of precipitation during the same period.

Total rainfall received at Keenwild since Oct. 1, 2018, is 31.2 inches; the long-term average for this period is 23.2 inches. Since the winter of 2008-09, Keenwild's total rainfall has exceeded 30 inches twice — 2010-11 and 2016-17.

Since January, El Niño weather conditions have existed, and NWS is forecasting these El Niño conditions will continue into fall.

forming, NWS has described this El Niño as

And precipitation is not the only atypical weather factor this year. The average maximum temperature this month has been 60 degrees compared to the long-term mean of 70 degrees. The average daily temperature has been 49 degrees, 5 below the long-term daily average for May.

While there may be afternoon rain showers Wednesday, temperatures are expected to begin climbing back to normal and next week may feel "hot" by comparison.



Search for John Sturkie resumes this Saturday

The search for John Sturkie will continue Saturday, June 1. Two weeks ago, the initial search discovered some valuable clues, said Theresa Sturkie, his wife of 21 years.

John, a 55-year-old husband and father of four, has been missing since Jan. 5.

A lover of the outdoors, frequent camper and hunter, Sturkie left his Oceanside home Friday, Jan. 4. Theresa said he

frequently went alone on these adventures.

He was last seen Jan. 5 on the Black Mountain Truck Trail. Sometime during the day, three hikers encountered Sturkie, whose truck was stuck in the mud on the truck trail. They helped him free it and continued up the

On their return, they met him with his truck stuck again. This time, according to the family's Facebook page, they could not extricate his vehicle. He chose to stay with the truck rather than return Sunday to free it.

During the day, rain was falling all over the San Jacinto Mountains. And Saturday night, snow arrived. At lower elevations, such as Idyllwild and Fern Valley, 4 inches accumulated. And 9 inches were recorded at the Long Valley Ranger Station, which is much higher. Idyllwild's recorded temperatures that day were a high of 47 degrees and a low of 34 degrees.

John was not prepared to spend extended time in freezing weather.

Theresa and family organized a search on Saturday, May 18. While they did not find Sturkie, the effort uncovered some positive evidence, she said.

"We found an article of clothing definitely his," Theresa said. "It appears as though it was washed downhill."

This was found further up the trail near its edge and near the end of that day's search. They plan to explore

the hillside below the trail on June 1.

Theresa said nearly 70 people signed up and participated two weeks ago.

"We want to know who came. Keep a card and offer safety advice. And explain where to sign in and out," she added.

The organizing location will be the base of the Black Mountain Truck Trail along Highway 243, north of Idyllwild.

Medical Center and one in Colorado, she received her first injection of anti-venom. Within hours she was transported to Loma Lin-

Anderson was not released until Sunday. During those five days, she received 11 injections of anti-venom. That in itself is a possible danger to her kidneys and she had to have her blood tested regularly for three weeks.

She needed a walker upon release because she was still weak from the bite, but on May 23, she said happily, "I'm getting better every day. It was slow at first but much bet-

Anderson lives in La Quinta and Hixon in Pine Cove. They are long-time friends and had planned a walk to photograph the blooming wildflowers, agreeing to meet in the Originally, they were going to go to Lake Hemet and also found the Ramona Trailhead closed, which is how they found the Morris Ranch Road offshoot.

"The flowers and butterflies were gorgeous," Hixon said. They were just walking along the dirt road admiring the flora, when

Anderson was bitten.

"I stepped near a bush. I didn't see or hear it. Then it was terrifying," she said. "You should be aware, but I was looking at the flowers." Then the snake, nearly black, seemed to move toward Hixon, who remained calm, but slowly backed away.

While awaiting the medical help, Anderson admitted she thought she could die from a snake bite.

Both women said they never heard the snake rattle, it just seemed to strike without any warning or

The venom attacks the body's muscles. While recovering in Loma Linda, she felt very weak and initially couldn't stand without help. Her leg, but not her foot, continued to swell for several days, which was why the staff continued to administer the anti-ven-



Both Caltrans and the California Highway Patrol are integral parts maintaining our safety and ability to travel across our mountain roads. When service becomes compromised, everyone must step up to the plate, commuters included.

The facts are simple. Our roads began falling apart long before Valentines Day, with repairs happening only when the collapsed culverts formed deadly sinkholes and loss of roadway, even though identification and repairs could have taken place long before a threat to human life occurred.

As for the Valentine's Day collapses, with the state of substandard roadways, catastrophe was inevitable. An instant draconian realignment of traffic patterns took place onto already dangerous roadways with numerous deadly head-on traffic collisions.

Early morning commutes shifted to before 3 a.m. School buses were on the roads at 4 a.m. The extensive and observable misconduct of commuters passing on double-yellow lines and curves was immediately unten-

I asked state Commissioner Annis and Sheriff Bianco to immediately mitigate this problem. Nothing happened. Weeks and weeks passed, then Capt. Mike Alvarez said the California Highway Patrol is not typically on the road before 6 a.m. unless there's a traffic accident or

oversight and management immediately after this realignment. None was to be found for months.

Finally, only after Highway 74 was opened and months after the February road collapse, the California Highway Patrol announced maximum enforcement within the Anza and Wilson Valley areas. I consider this an example of non-responsive governance.

I am a government servant. I regularly reflect on how to improve my service. More important, I take all constructive criticism to heart.

I expect nothing less from law enforcement, firefighters, paramedics, snowplow operators, road repair crews, water distribution/treatment technicians and our elected officials. Circling the wagons, flashing badges and politicians justifying their conduct to cover up non-responsive governance is arrogant and abusive. No government employee or service is above self-reflection and

improvement. On a personal note, I was criticized and likely lost friends for pointing out this non-responsiveness. It wasn't the first time and it won't be the last.

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
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

The four-year, full-tuition scholarship honoring Chinese-American singer-songwriter Wang Leehom '99 will be presented to Zhengxi Zhang this fall.

Aspiring music producer Zhengxi is the 2019 recipient of the Wang Leehom Scholarship to Berklee College of Music this fall. The annual scholarship, which was announced in 2017, was created for a talented and deserving musician from mainland China with a demonstrated potential to make a significant contribution to society through music.

Zhengxi grew up in Beijing, where he began taking piano lessons at age 4. By the third grade, he had developed in interest in Chinese pop music and began transcribing hit songs on his own.

He later started to write his own music for piano, and developed an interest in guitar and drums, especially alternative rock music. As a student at the **Experimental High** School attached to Beijing Normal University and the Idyllwild Arts Academy, Zhengxi studied songwriting, recording, and music production.

Stone supports limitations on vaccine exemptions

Opposition to bill curbing personal exemptions mischaracterized

In 2015, the California Legislature passed and then Gov. Jerry Brown signed the bill revoking a parent's ability to exempt their children from the measles vaccine. Beginning in 2016, a vaccine exemption required a doctor's justification.

This year, with measles spreading rapidly again, Sen. Richard Pan, D-Sacramento, introduced new legislation limiting physicians' unilaterally power.

Senate Bill 276 passed the state Senate last week, but not without opposition again from parents opposed to vaccinating their children.

This bill requires the state Department of Public Health to oversee the physician exemption and determine that it meets criteria promulgated by the federal Centers for Disease Control.

The bill passed 24-10, totally along party lines.

One of the Republican senators objecting to this bill is Sen. Jeff Stone, R-28, who supported and was co-author of Pan's 2015 legislation.

However, some local and state media have mischaracterized his opposition. Stone stated several times during his floor statement that he supports and agrees with Pan's goal.

But he does not want to empower the DPH with approving physician decisions. Rather, Stone prefers that the state Medical Board review physician actions and if they are wrong or dangerous, the Medical Board can suspend or even revoke the doctor's license.

Some publications used a portion of Stone's statement and described him as "denouncing the bill" "when he said, SB 276 is "... an unprecedented and a dangerous intrusion, not only into the doctor-patient relationship but also the personal liberties of the parents and their children."

While he said those words, he also stated he supported what Pan was trying to achieve. He just doesn't believe SB 276 does it fairly or appropriately and leaves too much power to an entity not part of the situation.

The Federal Communications Commission is alerting consumers to reported waves of "One Ring" or "Wangiri" scam robocalls targeting specific area codes in bursts, often calling multiple times in the middle of the night. These calls are likely trying to prompt consumers to call the number back, often resulting in per-minute toll charges similar to a 900 number. Consumers should not call these numbers back.

Recent reports indicate these calls are using the "222" country code of the West African nation of Mauritania. News reports have indicated widespread overnight calling in New York state and Arizona.

ocaller calls a number and hangs up after a ring or two. They may call repeatedly, hoping the consumer calls back and runs up a toll that is largely paid to the scammer. Consumer tips:

- Do not call back numbers you do not recognize, especially those appearing to originate overseas.
- File a complaint with the FCC if you received these calls: www.fcc.gov/complaints.
- If you never make international calls, consider talking to your phone company about blocking outbound international calls to prevent accidental toll calls.
- · Check your phone bill for charges you don't recog-

Advances in technology allow massive amounts of calls to be made cheaply and easily. In addition, spoofing tools make it easy for scammers to mask their identity. The FCC is working to combat scam calls with enforcement actions, a strong push for caller ID authentication, and support for call blocking tools.



Both parents charged with baby's death in 2016 car crash

Charges against Marcus Green, 54, of Thermal, and against Kristen Lauer, 25, of Rancho Mirage, have been combined into one trial. Green was the driver of a car that went over the side of Highway 74 in May 2016 and resulted in the death of his 5-month-old infant, and Lauer was the ba-

Green was driving his Porsche and Lauer was the passenger. While the parents, wearing seatbelts, survived the crash, the baby, Armani, was thrown from the vehicle and died at the scene.

Green was charged on May 6, 2016, with vehicular manslaughter with gross negligence, willful harm of a child and inflection of great bodily harm, almost immediately after the collision. Green's bail was set at \$1.86 million and he has been in custody since his arrest.

But Lauer was not charged until May 4, 2017, and arraigned on Feb. 20, 2019. Her bail was set at \$100,000 and


she was released on bail. The Riverside County District Attorney's Office moved in early May this year to combine the two cases. The motion cited Penal Code section 1098, which authorizes joint trials. And Deputy District Attorney Samantha Paixao cited case law supporting joint trials "... when defendants are charged with common crimes involving common events and victims."

The California Appeals Courts have agreed that joint trials in these circumstances are an efficient use of judicial re-

In her motion, Paixao wrote, "both defendants are charged with crimes involving the same victim and the same course of conduct. ... Such a process will promote judicial economy, avoid the need of recalling the witnesses in multiple consecutive trials, and eliminate the possible scandal of inconsistent verdicts.

The court concurred on Friday, May 24, and scheduled a new felony settlement conference for May 30.

Free summer golf classes for kids


Grandfathers For Golf, the San Jacinto-based nonprofit dedicated to teaching kids the game of golf for free, is now taking online signups for the summer session.



Livingston departs after 30 years at Idyllwild Arts

Ransom Wilson is back at orchestra

Idyllwild Arts' legendary Summer Orchestra Director Larry Livingston is departing after more than 30 years. During Livingston's tenure with Idyllwild Arts, he consistently received glowing reviews and dramatically enhanced the artistic reputation of Idyllwild Arts around the globe.

This year's 2019 August Summer Culmination Concert at Walt Disney Concert Hall will be the last Livingston conducts, and the performance will be in dedication to him, featuring more than 100 talented young people from High School Summer Chamber Festival Orchestra and Festival Choir of Idyllwild Arts who get the incredible opportunity to perform at the home of the Los Angeles Philharmonic.

Livingston guided the relaunching of the Summer Festival Orchestras three decades ago, after Idyllwild Arts gained its independence from the University of Southern California.

He helped build the summer orchestral program from a small ensemble of local high school students and faculty in 1988, to one of the finest youth orchestras in the United States, with an international reputation that now attracts students from around the world.

While Livingston's departure certainly marks the end of a tremendous era for IA, it also signals the beginning of an exciting new era in which the Summer Program and Academy will become more closely integrated.

Stephanie Yost is next ICC leader

Stephanie Yost may be the newest member of the board for the San Jacinto Mountain Community Center, also known as the Idyllwild Community Center, but she's not a recent or new resident of the Hill.

She was living in Pine Cove more than 30 years ago when she had her eldest child. Although she may have subsequently moved to the Los Angeles environs, she and her family have stayed connected with the Hill.

"I loved Idyllwild. It was the perfect place to live — a friendly small town with no traffic lights," she marveled.

By 2008, she and her husband had a cabin for regular weekend visits. Seven years later, they were looking for a full-sized and full-time residence. Eventually, they bought the Lora Woodhead Steere cabin, and cautiously and carefully restored it, including the additions that naturally appeared over time

Now she wants to return her love to this community.

"It took ICC seven years to [get] where it is: Phase 1 is almost completed. It was a collaborative effort of a coalition of dedicated people. I'm very optimistic about Phase 2," she said.

The current president of the ICC board Janice Lyle intends to end her tenure this summer. After the 20th-annu-

al Idyllwild Summer Concert Series inaugurates the new amphitheater on July 11, Lyle will return to the desert and end her daily commute of 50plus miles. Yost has been asked to become the next ICC president. And starting, overseeing and completing Phase 2, the actual Community Center building, will be her first and most important endeavor.

An attorney by education, Yost's legal positions have given her a broad perspective on business planning and initiatives. From legal counsel for Neopets, she has become executive vice president of Content. As a former entertainment lawyer, negotiating and planning are part of her background.

"Our first step will be finalizing the plans for Phase 2. There will be several rooms for all sorts of groups, a large outdoor activity space and a wonderful view of the amphitheater," she said.

Even as Phase 1 approaches completion, with delays due to the winter storms and travails, Yost, with the help of fellow board member Terry Shirley, and the board are already seeking grants to augment the funding to complete the work.

As the details of Phase 2 come more into focus, Yost is guided by her own view of living on the Hill.

"I believe keep Idyllwild 'Idyllwild' We need tourism to support the inns, restaurants and other businesses. But we can still keep the small-town feeling," she mused. She wants to keep the balance between Idyllwild's small town foundation and the desire of Southern Californians to experience the

rural communities away from freeways, skyscrapers and traffic lights.

Her vision of the future ICC is an opportunity for recreation for all ages. "It has to be a place for kids to play in snow, but not just recreation for young families. There are seniors who care, and want dance and art classes and events," she shared. "It's not just a place for sports. We will meet the needs of the whole community."

Serving the community means a willingness to try new things and not a narrow perspective. Outreach to the community will be critical to identify how ICC can serve all, Yost stressed.

"There are many more things we should be doing and trying, and working with other groups," she said. "I'm concerned that some people don't know what ICC is and what it does."

To broaden ICC's visibility, Yost plans to offer more online connections with the community — for example, signing up and paying for courses online rather than trekking to Town Hall

"What else can we do and should do to be more efficient?" Yost said enthusiastically. "We will listen to what parents say. We're not stuck in what we always did."

So, Phase 2 will be more than construction of a building, Yost envisions ICC evolving into an active community participant.



Fuerte has been named Latino of the Year and has won many other awards, including the Golden Mic. He retired after 48 years in television and now lives with his wife in Rialto.

Butterfly Effect brings \$1,500 to Help Center

Kirsten Ingbretsen, Idyllwild School teacher, organizes charity effort

First you have a goal. It could be as simple as learning a new recipe. Or it could be extensive, such as giving aid to your community.

How do you achieve that goal? Considerable time can be invested in formulating a plan, then it has to be tested and, finally, you proceed.

After the Cranston Fire, while in San Diego at an educational conference, Idyllwild Middle School history teacher Kirsten Ingbretsen had an idea and dream to help the community.

Then she quickly and easily found a means to accomplish this without investing considerable time in developing a new and individualistic plan. She saw the means were already available and she, with help from the Art Alliance of Idyllwild, needed only to adapt it for Idyllwild.

She discovered the philanthropic "Butterfly Effect." "... I was instantly touched and inspired," she said.

The "Butterfly Effect" is the creation of Tasha Wald of San Diego. She started it in 2013 and Ingbretsen brought it to Idyllwild. It combines social media and philanthropy.

"Once an install is authorized, [Wald] will donate from her organization \$1 for every photo taken inside her wings (following some social media hashtag steps) to a charity of our choice for up to one year," Ingbretsen explained.

With the help of AAI, in particular Neil Jenkins and Donna Elliot, two butterflies were created. One was mobile and the other located at Idyllwild School. The mobile butterfly was a major contributor since the Idyllwild School campus is closed to most people. That made it difficult for visitors, as well as residents without students at the school, to get a photograph with the butterfly.

"I'm very excited about the results, but we wouldn't have been successful without Tasha's agreeing to the traveling butterfly," Ingbretson said. "I did not envision this success and am most excited about where the money is going."

And Jenkins added, "I've seen people who have never smiled before, grin ear-to-ear in front of the butterfly."

The mobile butterfly panel has make appearances at

This month, Wald sent Ingbretson a check for \$1,500. That is how many photos of the butterflies were sent to her and identified with the Idyllwild effort. This money

will go to the Idyllwild Help Center.

"It was wonderful. She reached out to us after the Cranston Fire," said Colleen Meyer, executive director of the Help Center. "It was an amazing opportunity and so many people in the community contributed, including the middle school students."

But the effort will not stop. The next step, according to Ingbretson, is to find another organization that will sponsor the effort. If the new organization will donate \$1,000 for 1,000 photos, Ingbretson and the others will emphasize the company's contribution to the effort. It will not be a silent partner.

This step, which others have done, creates the butterfly's ripple effect. Someone will notice the butterfly mural, the photographs, understand the charity work and create their own butterfly effort.

One of Jenkins' friends works on the Ophelia Project in the desert and is already considering undertaking a "Butterfly Effect."

The funds would be used to support the project, which is an effort to empower young women.

Black bears are back in action

California's black bears are waking up hungry from their winter downtime. To help minimize unwanted bear foraging behavior, the California Department of Fish and Wildlife is reminding those living in or visiting bear country to store food and dispose of garbage properly.

Black bears typically prefer remote mountainous areas. However, as more people frequent or live in natural bear habitat, the abundance of food and garbage associated with human activities is a temptation hungry bears find hard to resist.

"Over the years, we have seen bear behavior change significantly in areas where more people live and recreate in bear habitat," said Vicky Monroe, CD-FW's Conflict Programs coordinator. "Beginning with spring and into late fall, we receive a steady stream of calls from the public reporting anything from bears breaking into cabins and tents to bears stealing food off picnic tables."

Black bears, like other bear species, have a highly specialized sense of smell, which can sometimes lead them to towns and recreation areas where they may quickly find an overflowing garbage can, or someone's leftover hamburger and French fries.


