Editorial

With the arrival of autumn and days of sunshine we look back at another tourist season with events marked by more than the average amount of rain. Is this to be expected? Should we be reducing our fossil fuel usage? Killin Cutting Carbon seeks to help us to make our personal mark and reduce household expenditure at the same time. Engines are becoming more fuel-efficient and people are turning to alternative means of transport as the price of fuel rises. Killin is in an unenviable position as its local industries and population are heavily fuel dependent and more likely to suffer the effects of increased costs. Survival in a changing world calls for adaptation and to thrive entails anticipation. Learning new ways is what it is all about.

What can we do with the Breadalbane Park? This question was asked of Stirling Council in the light of their "Openspace" policy. One suggestion was to consider a butterfly meadow. What better diversity could be produced at this time of diminishing peat lands than a piece of natural bog. What activities could we engineer to take advantage of the present condition of the park? Answers on a postcard... The intrusion onto the football pitch provides a natural hazard. How would this go down in Hampden Park? For more on the subject see Pages 4 & 36.

Bring back the halcyon days when we had a street officer who cared for Killin. We cared for him and he cared for us. Who cares now? The Community Council cares. Their concerns appear to fall on deaf ears. Are we committed to enduring the build up of earth on pavements, delays in cleaning up the rubbish that follows busy weekends, glass on pathways, dirt and untidiness in other facilities around the village? A village officer post whose remit is answering to the needs of Killin would surely provide full time work.

Someone with the skills, a brush and white paint might help with the white line problem. What problem? You might have noticed the deficiency in white and yellow lines around Killin that should be there to help the traffic flow. Used to following road markings in city areas, visitors expect to find them on the road and their absence gives drivers a "right" to park in areas where a vehicle may cause obstruction. Little notices attached to lamp posts are not enough. A proper reassessment of local needs might even improve on what used to be there. Markings on the A827 fall within the responsibility of Stirling Council. We were informed by the Council that replacing and renewing the lines in Killin are on the agenda but will not be done within the next two months. The parking free-for-all continues...

No wonder the Community Councils of Killin, Strathfillan, Strathyre and Balquhidder are meeting with representatives of Stirling Council and the National Park (as mentioned on page 4) to discuss dissatisfaction with responses and reactions to shared problems. Maybe a reason for this will be discovered, rural locality, relative isolation, lack of communication, lack of understanding, defined priorities, centralisation of responsibility, morale, impecuniousness or something yet to be discovered. We wait with baited breath for a reasonable outcome that supports and enhances our communities.

Killin Cutting Carbon **Project**



KAT is delighted scotland to announce that The Climate

Challenge Fund (CCF) has agreed to fund the Trust's energy project and work has already started. An application to ScottishPower Energy People Trust (SPEPT) to enhance and extend the scope of the project was not successful.

Why are we trying to cut carbon in Killin? The cost of fossil energy has increased. In the last five years electricity has increased from 7p per unit to 13p per unit and oil from 21p per litre to 66p - a virtual doubling in the cost of electricity and trebling in the cost of oil. Killin

does not have the advantages of a mains gas supply and is exposed to levels of cold, wet and wind that require extra levels of energy to maintain heat levels. At the same time the minimum wage has not kept pace with the rising cost having risen from £4.50 to £5.52 per hour - an income of about £11,500 a year. If a household depending on a single minimum wage spends more than £1,150 (10%) on domestic energy, it falls into the category of 'fuel poverty'. The increasing fuel costs will drive many more households into fuel poverty. The main aim of KCC is to reduce heat loss with insulation and discover where energy is wasted. All the households in the FK21 (Killin Community Council) postcode area are being targeted so that those who participate can see how much they can save by increasing insulation and adopting acceptable lifestyle changes to reduce spending on energy. Businesses and those responsible for community buildings will also be contacted. Every household that participates can gain from this exercise and as a result the whole community gains by increasing the disposable income of the area. Grants and subsidies are available for everyone in some form or other. Free loft insulation up to present day standards and cavity wall insulation is available to

those over 70 and to those on benefits. Others will be able to obtain cavity and loft insulation at discounted rates.

It is estimated that participants are likely to save over £300 per year. vear on vear from insulation measures alone. Some houses will not be suitable for some types of insulation but the assessors who visit will be in a position to discuss a number of ways in which energy savings can be made. They will enable householders with special interests such as microgeneration, air or ground sourced heating or wood chip burners, to discuss their ideas with experts in the field. Businesses wishing to reduce fuel costs will have an opportunity to have their businesses assessed and learn about the availability of interest free loans paid back at the rate at which fuel savings are likely to be made.

There is something for everyone in this package and we hope you will consider participation in some form or other. All households and businesses will receive a letter explaining the process.

Launch Event

Come, meet and question the experts, the surveyors and advisors who will be directly involved in the project in Killin, at the launch event. The launch event will be advertised and held in the Lesser McLaren Hall on the morning of Saturday 3rd October.

Two New Part Time Jobs Available

The funding for Killin Cutting Carbon includes the training and employment of two energy advisors. It also includes money to provide for an office from which they will work and which will double as an office for KAT. Applicants will attend a three day course in Energy Awareness (6176) and achieve a City & Guilds Diploma. Employment will be available up to the end of March 2011 in the field of domestic energy advice. Watch out for advertisements in the Courier. Killin Community Council Meeting September

Apologies: All three Stirling

Councillors

Owen McKee is out of hospital following his car crash and staying with his son. **Scottish Native Woods**: Victor Clements of Scottish Native Woods

addressed the meeting.

Funding could be available to employ four bailiffs to patrol and monitor four areas, Loch Tay and Glenlochav, the Dochart catchment area, Glenlyon, and the Tummel system. These areas are under the control of three authorities, Stirling Council, Perth and Kinross Council and the Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park. They also form a buffer zone between the two national parks. Land owners in the area are keen to have employees in the posts who are not under the control of the local authorities. Bailiffs would liaise with game keepers and NP rangers. Their job would entail monitoring the area, controlling illegal fishing, litter and camping. There was support for the project from all nine councillors present.

Rural Housing: The Ballechroisk site planning application is now with the NP. If passed it is hoped that work will begin in January.

Village Officer: Despite repeated requests for a reaction to the two persons who have expressed interest in doing the job, there has been no response from the department in Stirling Council as to whether a village officer can be employed.

Community Councils and local

authorities: There is to be a meeting of the local community council chairs (Strathfillan, Strathyre, Balquhidder and Killin) with Stirling Council and the National Park to air dissatisfaction with the lack of action regarding requests for various facilities and services.

Roads: Tim Frost to contact Les

Goodfellow to request an on-site meeting in Killin to discuss local problems

Ardeonaig Road: This will be closed 14th-18thSept except at the times of the school run.

Road accidents: An apparent increase in the number of accidents may be due to diesel on the roads. This is a concern to the schools as all the Primary School teaching staff and secondary pupils travel to and from Killin

Play Park: There are funds available to refurbish the play park.

National Park Local Plan: This is now in the final stage for consultation. A copy is available in the Library.

Car Park: The newly refurbished car park is being used by tourists and travellers for overnight stopping leaving rubbish behind when they leave.

Gents Public Toilet: This is now closed for essential maintenance Bench Manse Road: The ground identified does belong to the council. A

bench will be in place soon. **Speed limit:** A reduced speed of 30 mph is being considered on the A827

between the Bridge of Lochay and the present 30 mph sign.

Planning permission: New legislation introduced throughout Scotland will set a new tier for appeals regarding planning permission. An initial planning application will be dealt with by the planning officer. If it is rejected it can then be sent to the planning committee. At that point if the application is rejected it can be sent to the Scottish parliament who can take the final decision. Planning permission once granted will now only last for three years not five.

Any planning applicant who submits a

Any planning applicant who submits a plan to the appropriate authority will not be required to contact the relevant neighbours. This will be done by the authority instead.

Once an application has been submitted, a response should be

returned more quickly than before. **School Playground:** The ongoing drainage problem in the school playground needs to be resolved before the planned refurbishment of the play equipment and the implementation of the plan including the building of walls in the play ground.

Drainage in Breadalbane Park: The committees of the Agricultural Society and the Games committee are meeting to discuss the state of the ground in the park.

Every year when events are held in the Breadalbane Park a deposit of £500 is made in case of damage. In order to set up events it is necessary for vehicles to drive on the grass. Unfortunately much of the Park is waterlogged. Pools of water and rushes that even intrude onto the football pitch indicate that whatever drainage there used to be no longer works. To help the situation volunteers used hardcore to extend the track. This trackway worked well but as soon as vehicles left the hardcore they sank into soft mud and grass. Without proper attention to drainage the park is still totally unsuited for events.

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Progress at last?



The tenants of No. 6 Monemore are still living in the Killin Hotel, nearly six months after the fire. We understand problems after the fire have been:

No tarpaulin was placed over the roof of No. 6 so all the contents, not just some, were ruined in the heavy rain which followed

Drying out could not take place because there was no electricity - and electricity could not be restored because of the house was not dried out!

New roof timbers put in place had for some reason to be changed. Maybe the repairs will be completed before Christmas?

Discovery on Ben Lawers

Pre-historic artwork which has lain undiscovered for centuries has been uncovered on Ben Lawers by an amateur archaeologist.

The ancient carvings were discovered by rock art enthusiast George Currie on land cared for by the National Trust for Scotland. The art is similar to other prehistoric pieces found in the area, consisting of concave depressions known as cup marks or cup and ring marks, which are carved upon rocks.

The purpose of the artworks is still unknown.

The newly-discovered rock is unusual because it has more than ninety cup marks and at least four cup and ring marks. A number of linear grooves can also be seen, with some still showing the individual blows of the craftsman's stone pick. This is a much higher concentration of the markings than is normally found. It is an exciting find as it shows that there remains undiscovered prehistoric rock art to be found in the Scottish hills. More surprising are the quantity and variety of the symbols displayed on this houlder

Through both targeted

research by professional archaeologists and the work of dedicated amateurs like George Currie, we now know that Ben Lawers forms one of the major concentrations of cup and ring marks in the Highlands, which suggests it was a very significant landscape in prehistory.

XP/VISTA and Windows 7

With the launch of Windows 7 scheduled for 22nd October 2009, I am wondering what impact this new operating system will have on the marketplace.

I have been using a pre-release version of Windows 7 for the past two months and I am quite impressed. It is similar to VISTA in appearance but seems to be more user friendly. My current thought is that Microsoft may, at last, have a potential success, but only time will tell

In 2006 Microsoft released VISTA and they were hoping that this new operating system would replace the ever popular Windows XP. However time has proven that XP is still the most used operating system for

personal computers - in fact there are currently around eight times as many computers using XP as there are using VISTA.

I feel that VISTA was launched too quickly and it was not ready for the marketplace, still contained bugs, and was not properly tested. This, unfortunately, gave VISTA a bad reputation. Even though it is a fine operating system now that many of the bugs have been fixed, it is still not trusted by the computer users, whereas XP is the public favourite. Microsoft have kept this very much in mind when designing Windows 7 and have integrated an add-on which will allow XP applications to run on Windows 7 machines. However, the method used has specific constraint on your machine and, as such, will unfortunately not work on all computers.

I expect that we will see over time the demise of VISTA, XP holding its own, and a rapid uptake of Windows 7, so that within a couple of years there will be a mixture of Windows 7 and XP being used universally. I am hoping, if this is the case, that Microsoft will then look at more integration between these operating systems.

Backing up your Data

I know I keep mentioning this topic,

but I still see the majority of computer users with little or no backup process in place. Every month I get frantic phone calls from people whose machines have died and they desperately need their data recovered from the dead machine. A basic backup system can be deployed for well under £100 and this would be sufficient for most home users. For businesses, or home users who need additional protection, you should consider automatic backups over the internet. This is especially important for small businesses where the loss of your data would mean the collapse of your business. A tool that is widely used is Memeo

A tool that is widely used is memobackup (www.memeo.com) - this allows configuration of automatic backups, and allows you to chose what to back up and, in some versions of the software, it even allows you to specify a time of day to back up your data. Earlier versions of this software have bugs that in some circumstances will stop backups from working and in others will slow down your machine. These problems are fixed in later versions of the software, which are available from the Memeo website.

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Strathfillan Community Council meeting 14th September

Advice on benefits for all tenants in the area:

Rural Stirling Housing Assoc [RSHA] employs an Income Maximisation Officer [IMO] jointly with Forth Housing, Stirling Council has employed an IMO for the past eighteen months for council tenants. They are now employing an extra two IMOs and the service will be for all tenants whether council or private. Contact Eammon O'Boyle on 01786 442456 or email obovlee@stirling.gov.uk.

Eammon has already managed to get £900,000 previously unclaimed for tenants in the area.

Jimmy Allardice, Village Officer, Crianlarich, recently took annual leave. Although he had booked his holidays a month in advance, Stirling Council failed to arrange adequate cover. The Rural Team came out for two days in the first week and this resulted in about twenty eight complaints from the public. In the third week the toilets were closed on the Wednesday. Isla Craig phoned David Crichton, Stirling Council, and was told that no cover was available and the toilets would remain closed until Jimmy returned to work on the following Monday. On the Friday David phoned Isla to say that the

Rural Team would provide cover over the weekend and the toilets would open on the Saturday. Fergus Woods will take this up with the appropriate departments to try to ensure that there is always adequate cover when the Village Officers are off duty.

Alan Clarke, Secretary, Balquidder CC, has got together with the Chairs and Secretaries of Killin and Strathfillan CC to see what are issues of common concern and what ioint action we can take.

The CC has spent a lot of time and effort responding to consultations recently, two of which have been finalised. The model scheme for CC, which Stirling Council is proposing to adopt, we believe ignores all our suggestions. The Strategic Review of the NP consulted on by the Scottish Government - resulted in one change; namely to reduce the number of members on the Board. It seems that we are wasting our time if none of our ideas are implemented or just answered negatively

Stirling Council Housing Services is being inspected by the Scottish Housing Regulator.

The NP is planning to be heavy handed in their response to ASB including inappropriate wild-camping, litter and alcohol abuse. It will cost money to enforce but once it gets known then things should improve and make the NP an enjoyable place for all to visit.

Crianlarich School

Forty years ago, in February 1969, Perth and Kinross Council decided that two village primary schools, Tyndrum and Crianlarich, should merge into one and Crianlarich School was officially opened by Mrs Colquhoun, wife of Rev John Colquhoun, who was minister of Killin at the time.

In a new building, in place of the old

one which was knocked down, the children enjoyed for the first time luxuries such as indoor toilets, hot water and a brand new piano. The school ran under the headship of Mrs Galbraith until her retirement in the 80's, when she was succeeded by Mrs Irene Henderson, who had worked as assistant teacher in the school for many years while bringing up her young family. Mrs Henderson retired from teaching in 1996 and not only still lives in the village but also keeps in close contact with 'her' school. Although since then there have been a number of head teachers in charge of the school, the class teachers, teaching assistants, parents and children all maintain their close knit family community and they guard it jealously. The school registration book has seen a rise and fall of numbers over the years, with as many as forty five children registered in 2005, compared to a possible seventeen to eighteen in 1969. The rise and fall

of numbers wasn't just due to families coming and going from the area but also to family commitments such as 'tattie hawking' or bringing in the harvest, which meant that it was all hands on deck and this could result in the school closing. Classes within the school mix the children's year groups and, depending on numbers, there could be between one, as in 1969, and four classes. This mix allows the children to grow and learn from each other, both in and out of the classroom and also to help each other in a way not normally found in larger schools. More importantly, it creates a strong feeling of community and loyalty within the school and in the community of the village itself which lasts well into adulthood.

One child in particular who gained from this type of schooling was a little boy who joined the school in 2005 when his family moved to the area. This little boy was severely dyslexic and very low in self confidence. He could not read or write and, in his words, thought he was 'really dumb'. His social skills were limited, which meant he found it hard to interact with his peers and the adults around him. The job of teaching him was down to the head teacher, Mrs Comrie, and his class teacher, Mrs Fallon. Mrs Fallon's gentle but firm approach worked wonders on both his confidence and education and this approach turned his life around and gave him the skills and confidence he needed to move forward. This is to the credit of the school as a whole for its acceptance of all children, with and without problems, into the community. This acceptance gives the children the perfect base to learn the skills that will see them through the rest of their school life and beyond.

Wednesday 14th October The story of the elements

Joe Connolly PhD, DSc (Glasgow) FRSE, like all professors of chemistry, depends on the periodic table. Everything we see and detect around us is made from one or more of a hundred and fourteen known elements such as oxygen, iron, gold and so on. Knowledge of all the elements, their properties, similarities, differences and ways in

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which they interact has been made possible by their organization into the periodic table. What is the periodic table? How was it developed? Should Mendeleev be ranked with Darwin? Why is the periodic table the most important organizing principle for chemists?

Wednesday 18th November Practical approaches to reducing the domestic carbon footprint

Timothy Booth BSc (Manchester), Institute of Chartered Engineers. worked on big engineering projects including construction of the M62, M55 and M58. Tim then started his own company, Fuelmizas (AT) Ltd., promoting and maintaining multifuel stoves, cookers, boilers and solar heating systems. What is meant by the domestic carbon footprint? Can it be measured? How can we best use Alternative Technology (AT). embracing solar, wind and biomass power, and latent energy below ground, to attain a reduced domestic footprint?

Wednesday 10th February One of the challenges facing the conservation of rare plants

David Mardon BSc, MSc (Aberdeen), has recently retired from the National Trust for Scotland after serving as manager of the Ben Lawers NNR. He has established programmes of "species recovery" and "habitat restoration" to conserve rare plants. Conservation depends on knowledge of the distribution and abundance of target species and detecting patterns in their numbers over time. How is data collected? How is data interpreted? How will we know if the conservation strategy is successful? What can we learn from the study of snow pearlwort over 25 years?

Thursday 11th March Opening and closing a can of worms

Vaughan Southgate BSc (Aberystwyth), PhD (Cambridge), is President of the Linnean Society of London. His distinguished scientific career at the Natural History Museum has helped our understanding of the parasitic worms that cause schistosomiasis (Bilharzia), a nasty tropical disease. About 120 million people, mainly in Africa, suffer from this affliction. Prince William has been successfully treated. How did he become infected? Can we stop transmission? Why do we need to study freshwater snails? Will drugresistant worms appear? Why is water management so important? What might be the impact of climate change?

Killin Conservation

Historic chimney repairs, restoring waterwheels and tin churches - these are just some of the diverse projects funded as part of the Killin Conservation Area Regeneration Scheme (CARS) and the Park Authority are looking for more. These projects were all funded through conservation grants available to property owners and tenants to assist with the repair and restoration of historic buildings in the Killin Outstanding Conservation Area.

The scheme is jointly funded by Loch Lomond and The Trossachs National Park Authority and Historic Scotland and aims to encourage and support the conservation and enhancement of historic buildings and streets in the Killin Outstanding Conservation Area. It awards grants for general repair of historic

buildings (up to 70% of the cost of the work) or the reinstatement of architectural details such as railings and sash and case windows (up to 85%). The scheme has been extended to run until 2012 and the total project fund is approximately £125,000.

There is also funding available for small community research and education projects. The Park is currently working with P6 and P7 at Killin Primary School on a project to record and research historic buildings in the village. The children have chosen buildings such as the Killin Hotel, the Breadalbane Folklore Centre, Finlarig Castle, MacLaren Hall and the Old Smiddy to record and research. They hope to draw on the historic knowledge of the local heritage group and their collection of historic photos to help with their

research and then to produce leaflets about their buildings. Geologists at British Geological Survey are currently carrying out a Building Stone Audit of Killin. The Audit is identifying the main building stone types in Killin and looking at the historic quarries surrounding the area which supplied the building stone. The aim is to help with future stone repair and the use of stone in new buildings.

Once again we would like to say thanks to the youth of Killin for their support and to all those who have supported the Cadets over the years.

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







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Where Are They Now?

It serves to remind us of how much talent exists in our area.















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Loch Lomond & the Trossachs National Park

Plans to Tackle Visitor Pressures LL&TNP unveiled a series of

measures to deal with the effects of visitor pressure within Scotland's first National Park and is focused on ensuring a high quality visitor experience and stamping out the unacceptable behaviour of a small minority.

The Park is one of the most visited rural areas of Scotland with over 3.5 million visitors every year. The area also generates an estimated £247 million for the economy per annum and the NPA is looking to put in place long term solutions that will help conserve this special area of Scotland. The large visitor number has led to issues that the NPA and partners need to resolve, including informal camping, litter, toileting and traffic management. There is also the problem of anti-social behaviour including drunkenness, vandalism, criminal damage, assault and vehicular trespass that we wish to reduce through increased management.

Amongst the initiatives being introduced are plans for informal campsites with toilet and litter facilities backed by camping by-laws excluding camping from certain areas. These will be on trial in three key areas - East Loch Lomond, Loch Venacher/Lubnaig and Luss. The Authority is also tackling the

issues presented by the volume of traffic within the Park and will be considering measures to reduce traffic and car park congestion at peak times.

We are currently investing £2 million in visitor management in 2009 and we are taking action to put in place long term solutions that deal with this range of issues that will lead to improvements in the visitor experience in the Park.

Annual report to March 2009 Achievements in key areas were

reported.

Conservation: the publication of the first National Park Biodiversity Action Plan; a collection of threevear actions set within a longer term vision to put Loch Lomond & The Trossachs at the forefront of nature conservation

Visitor experience: meeting the European Charter for Sustainable Development in Protected Areas and continued close working with the police to tackle antisocial behaviour. Rural development: Issuing the first Park Local Plan for consultation, after earlier extensive discussions with our communities.

Electoral Registration

The annual Electoral Registration Form, which has been posted to every address, lists the current electors registered to vote at the address. If there are no changes needed, electors can opt to register "no change" by e.mail, telephone, text, or by posting the form in the reply paid envelope.

Electors may withhold their names from the Edited Register of Electors (which can be sold to anyone) and request a form to vote by post at future elections.

If changes to names, details or address are needed the form should be clearly amended to show the changes, then signed and returned by post, fax or scanned e.mail attachment as soon as possible. As a Parliamentary Election must be held before June 2010, it is important that all eligible electors are registered in time to vote. Should the election be called at the minimum notice required (seventeen working days) electors would have less than a week to register or to apply for a postal vote)



The Summer that Never Was

In any "good" season, weatherwise, there are always a few "bad" days or short spells of less settled conditions, likewise in a "bad" season slightly better interludes or occasional "PET" days occur. So now, in early September, summer 2009 has been buried without regret. It has been the third "Summer that never was" in a row. However, despite our moans and groans, and sense of once again being cheated, the old adage of "This is nothing new under the sun" kicks in.

Old records as far back as the mid 1600s, perhaps not as accurate or sophisticated as today's, have highlighted the oscillations of our weather over the centuries. For instance, the 1790s produced a run of wet and stormy summers, 1816 was known as "the year without a summer" and there were many more references to summer seasons varying from severe droughts to extremely disturbed periods of wet and cold. The mid 1840s were also noted for a series of disastrous summers which contributed to the potato blight epidemic in Ireland and Scotland, which in turn was integral to "The Clearances" in these countries

Again the 1870s suffered some exceptionally wet seasons causing an agricultural recession that lasted for decades. The poor summers of 1903 and 1912 would appear to have owed their falls from grace (1912 holding the record for the wettest summer documented) to

volcanic eruptions, 1903 in central America and the Caribbean, including Mount Pelee which destroyed the city of St. Pierre in Martinique, and in 1912 Novarupta in Alaska.

The years 2007-2009 however have no such excuse. Climate Change or Global Warming seems to be the "whipping boy" for many departures from the ordinary, not only in weather extremes. There is no doubt that the British Isles, rainfall, stormy conditions and higher mean temperatures have increased over the past decade or so with attendant side effects, and here I make no excuse for rabbiting on vet again regarding the increasing boscage scrub woodland, weed growth, and that insidious plant bracken - which is increasing by up to 10% per annum and a haven for ticks which can harbour various ailments including Lyme Disease. Its spread can almost be likened to the science fiction tale of the Triffids! Contributory causes to climate change have been listed, among other factors, as methane emissions from ruminants and greenhouse gases. As to the former, surely the number of flatulent ruminants has not varied much over many decades and as to air pollution, every situation seems to have compensating stand points. So what about "The Dark Satanic Mills" and "The Smogs" of yesteryear which gave the appellation "The Black Country" to the Northern Midlands of England? Though there are some who still use that term in a completely different context!

Breadalhane Park

The Breadalbane Park is fast turning, in places, into a quagmire due to the totally inadequate and much publicised drainage system. Stirling Council have only once contracted a company to clear the drain, which runs along the west boundary. This failed miserably and indeed the section from the central manhole to the hill fence was never touched

At a meeting in the park many years ago, the collapsed sections of the old field drainage system were pointed out and paced to give an approximate length. At that meeting the Council representative agreed to have some exploratory holes excavated to confirm the extent of the problem. This was never carried out. It was also agreed that a costing would be compiled to give a ball park figure for target fund raising by the then Killin Initiative Committee. This also was never produced. The only work carried out by the Council is grass cutting and of course the paths and liahtina.

It was left to the Killin Agricultural Committee to scrape away soft ground and extend the roadway to assist in the problem of vehicles getting stuck on the wet ground, before the show day.

Money deposits are still being asked from organisations, prior to the use of the park, but the amount is not uniform and some events pay less than others. Then there have been occasions when sums have been deducted from deposits for so called repairs but what and when these were carried out is a mystery. The approaches made to Stirling Council with regard to the deposits made against damage done by major events, are not addressing the problem, merely aggravating the users.

At present there is a substantial area of the park permanently

unusable and other parts best kept clear of any use.

It is time a lead was taken by the main users and the Community Council to insist that representatives of Stirling Council and the National Park come to a village meeting where the locals can have their views heard and those in positions of authority be made to bring forward firm proposals and a time table for dealing with solving the problem and upgrading the park before it is too late.

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

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
