About us

Welcome to the Adelman Peony Gardens' 'Peony Paradise'. Our farm grows a large collection of peonies covering about thirty acres in the small community of Brooks near Salem, Oregon, in the beautiful Willamette Valley. Currently, there are more than 500 named peonies growing in our fields with many additional planned for the future.

As the original owners, Jim & Carol Adelman, we purchased the farm property back in 1974. We raised our five children and farmed the land, originally growing crops such as peppermint, peaches, hazelnuts, and grass

for seed, with the main crop being apples for 25 years.

In 1993, we planted our first peonies as a crop. Our goal was to give a customer experience, not previously available for peony lovers, by providing blocks of color with spacious grass walkways allowing guests to experience the peony flowers up close. In 1995, that was the first year we invited the public to come visit the farm. From there on, the operation has slowly grown into what it is today. The gardens are open for visitors, during bloom season each and every spring, approximately six weeks. When the gardens close, we begin to prepare orders and ship bare root peonies around the world in the Fall for our customers to enjoy the following Spring in their gardens.

We established and continue to oversee the entire company and have passed along our knowledge to the second and third generations of Adelman Peony Gardens' growers. Steve Adelman is the operations manager, and his daughter, Kady Adelman, manages the retail sales and office. Together, the Adelman family and long-time crew members strive to provide our customers with the highest quality peonies available.

Herbaceous and Intersectional Peonies

Herbaceous or bush peonies:

Die down to the ground in the winter and emerge in March or when the snow melts. Many find they are deer resistant. Peonies are long lived, minimal care plants.

There are two types of bush peonies: Lactifloras are the most common species found in nurseries, its native location is China. Most lactiflora cultivars produce side buds

Hybrids are crosses between two or more species. They bring additional colors, foliage types, and an earlier bloom season. Most hybrid cultivars only produce one bloom per stem.

Intersectional or Itoh peonies:

Are a cross between the herbaceous (or bush) peony and the tree peony. These crosses have produced new and exciting colors. The plants have the lovely leaf form of the tree peonies but die down to the ground in the winter. The plants are strong and healthy with a nice, rounded bush. Often referred as Itoh in honor of Mr. Toichi Itoh of Japan, who made the first successful cross between the herbaceous and tree peony.

Award Of Landscape Merit This award is granted to peonies that have outstanding landscape and growth characteristics. It was designed to provide information on particular peony varieties that would be desirable for landscapers to use in their garden designs. Included in characteristics are the ability to stand up in inclement weather and to be disease resistant. The first round of nominations were made by APS members in 2008 and the awards were presented by the respected and knowledgeable committee members. A handful of varieties have been added each year since.



Ada Niva (Niva/Snelson, 1999)

Red, japanese, slightly fragrant, midseason, 30" tall, lactiflora. Glossy and lustrous foliage. Center petaloids edged with gold/white. No support needed.



Alexander Woollcott (Saunders, 1941)

\$70

Red, semi-double, early, 30" tall, hybrid. Rarely available. A strong, warm red bloom held high above the foliage. The glow on this shorter plant can brighten a spot in your garden.



Amalia Olson (Olson, 1959)

\$32

White, double, fragrant, late, 32" tall, lactiflora. Pure white dome-shaped, very fragrant flower with strong stems. Stands up well in wet weather. APS Gold Medal 2011.



Angel Cheeks (C. Klehm, 1970)

Cameo-pink, bomb, very fragrant, midseason, 32" tall, lactiflora. A charming pastel pink with a narrow band of ivory petals at the base. APS Gold Medal 2005.



Anika (Burrell, 1995)



White, single, very early, 24" tall, hybrid. White flower with predominant dark pink to lavender veins present at opening and tend to fade out, good stem strength.



Anne Oveson (Tolomeo, 2005)

RARE \$50

Pink, semi-double, fragrant, midseason, 35" tall, lactiflora. Strong stems hold the large up-facing 6"- 8" bloom erect. Rose red stigmas add liveliness.



Armistice (Kelsey, 1938)

\$26

Pink, double, very fragrant, late-midseason, 32" tall, lactiflora. Rose-type flower with a deep pink hue on strong stems.



Ann Cousins (Cousins, 1946)

\$26

White, full double, very fragrant, late, 32" tall, lactiflora. Large, lovely, full double flowers need support. You'll love the rose fragrance!



Athena (Saunders, 1955)

\$30

White, single, very early, 30" tall, quadruple hybrid. This white flower glows with raspberry flares surrounding yellow stamens.



Avalanche (Crousse, 1886)

\$34

White, double, lightly fragrant, midseason, 35" tall, lactiflora. A full flower with red flecks on petal edges. Excellent cut flower.



Ballarena de Saval (TOH) \$45 (Tolomeo, 2001)

Pale lavender, single, midseason, 32" tall, intersectional. A delicate lavender flower with color intensifying in the center. Outstanding landscape plant.



Bartzella (Anderson, 1986)

Yellow, semi-double to double, lightly fragrant, midseason, 34" tall, intersectional. Lemon-scented flowers on an outstanding landscape plant. APS Gold Medal 2006.

Belleville (H. Wolfe/Hollingsworth, 1998)

Light Cyclamen purple, anemone-bomb, lightly fragrant, midseason, 34" tall, lactiflora. Striking color contrast of darker guard petals surrounding a mound of smaller, lighter center petals. May need support.



Big Ben (Auten, 1943)

Red, bomb, very fragrant, early-midseason, 36" tall, lactiflora. Excellent flower on stiff stems. Good in hot climates. Love that fragrance - rare in red peonies!



Blaze (Orville W. Fay, 1973)

Red, single to semi-double, lightly fragrant, midseason, 32" tall, hybrid. Bright red wavy petals with a golden center. It is a strong grower with a sturdy plant habit.



Blushing Princess (Saunders/Reath/Rogers, 1991)

Pale pink to white, semi-double, early, 32" tall, fragrant, hybrid. A frilly pale pink bloom that glows from the red carpal tips. Strong stems and large, glossy foliage.



Border Charm (Hollingsworth, 1984)

Yellow, single, midseason, 22" tall, intersectional. This light yellow intersectional is short and bushy. Nice landscape plant.



Bowl of Cream (C. Klehm, 1963) Creamy white double

Creamy white, double, lightly fragrant, midseason, 34" tall, lactiflora. Very large, luscious cream-white flower. Wonderful cut flower! APS Gold Medal 1981.



Bridal Shower (R. Klehm, 1981)

White, bomb, fragrant, midseason, 34" tall, lactiflora. An elegant ivory-white bloom with graceful form.



Bowl of Beauty (Hoogendorn, 1949)

Pink, japanese, very fragrant, midseason, 32" tall, lactiflora. Pink outer petals surround a creamy center. When vigorous it may send rose petals bursting from center!



Bride's Dream (Krekler, 1965)

White, japanese, midseason, 34" tall, lactiflora. An all white flower with abundant thin petaloids filling the center. Will stand up nicely in spring rain.



Brother Chuck (R. Klehm, 1995)

\$34

White, double, fragrant, midseason, 28" tall, lactiflora. A white rose-shaped bloom with a pink glow. APS Best of Show 2008.



Buckeye Belle (Mains, 1956)



Very dark red, semi-double, lightly fragrant, early, 30" tall, hybrid. Very dark almost chocolate-red petals are sprinkled with golden stamens. APS Gold Medal 2010.



Canary Brilliants (ALM) \$55 (Anderson, 1999)

Creamy yellow with apricot hues in center, semi-double to double, lightly fragrant, midseason, 28" tall, intersectional. A wonderful color combination with healthy foliage.



Candy Stripe (Anderson, 1992)

\$42

White with red stripes, double, lightly fragrant, mid to late season, 32" tall, lactiflora. Amazing bi-color with unusual dark pink/red striping, may need support.



Capital Dome (Bigger, 1979)

\$20

White/blush, bomb, light fragrance, midseason, 34" tall, lactiflora. A puffy white bloom on strong stems from Myron Bigger's selections.



Carina (Saunders, 1944)

\$24

Scarlet, single to semi-double, early, 33" tall, hybrid. Scarlet petals cupped around a small yellow center. Nice cut flower with brilliant color.



Carnation Bouquet (Seidl, 1996)

\$40

Pink, double, very fragrant, midseason, 32" tall, hybrid. Petals of uniform size give a carnation appearance. Wonderful spicy fragrance. Unusual bud form.



Chalice (Saunders, 1929)

Cream, single, very early, 36" tall, hybrid. This bloom is the largest single flower I have seen. As a macrophylla x lactiflora cross it has very large glossy leaves. One of our very first to bloom.



Charlie's White (C. Klehm, 1951)

White, crown double, lightly fragrant, early, 36" tall, lactiflora. Large outer petals surround white center glowing yellow from inside.

Red, double, fragrant, midseason, 30" tall, hybrid. A recent introduction of a bright red tight bloom that stands upright on a strong stem.

Magenta, japanese, lightly fragrant, midseason, 36" tall, lactiflora. A striking color contrast in a bright flower that will cheer the gardener.



Class Act (R. Klehm, 1991)

White, double, fragrant, midseason, 36" tall, lactiflora. A creamy white full, fragrant bloom with pleasingly cupped petals.



Color Magnet (Hollingsworth, 1994)

Bright violet-pink, single, midseason, 32" tall, fertile hybrid. A bright color that attracts attention in the garden. Stands up nicely without support.



Commando (Glasscock, 1944)

Dark red, bomb, early, 36" tall, hybrid. The dark burgundy flowers are very compact with the guard petals presenting the center pouf delectibly. One of our very darkest red peonies.



Cora Louise (Anderson, 1986)

White w/deep lavender flares, semi-double, lightly fragrant, midseason, 24" tall, intersectional. Striking lavender flares in this white bloom.



Coral Charm (Wissing, 1964)

Coral, semi-double, early-midseason, 40" tall, hybrid. Large cup-shaped flowers of exotic deep coral fades softly. Needs staking. APS Gold Medal 1986.



Coral Fay (Fay/Reath, 1973)

\$32

Pink, semi-double, fragrant, early, 30" tall, hybrid. A radiant pink bloom on strong stems. The bright color shows its P. peregrina color and the finely cut foliage shows its P. tenuifolia parentage.



Coral 'n Gold (Cousins/R. Klehm, 1981)

Coral-peach, single, midseason, 34" tall, hybrid. Deep coral cup-shaped flowers enhanced by a center of golden stamens.



Coral Sunset (Wissing/C. Klehm, 1965)

Coral, semi-double, early, 32" tall, hybrid. Ruffled edges increase the flower fullness. Fades from coral to ivory. Our most spectacular coral flower! APS Gold Medal 2003.



Courage (Bigger, 1968)

Light pink, semi-double, very fragrant, midseason, 32" tall, lactiflora. Light pink petals have darker pink 'paint flecks' evenly distributed.



Cream Puff (Marx/Rogers, 1981)

Pink, japanese, lightly fragrant, midseason, 36" tall, lactiflora. A delicate, lacy center of 'shredded' yellow and pink staminodes cupped inside guard petals.

Deep rose, semi-double, early, 24" tall, hybrid. Lovely deep rose colored cupped flowers. APS Gold Medal 1980. A sought-after color!



Dr. F.G. Brethour (H.P. Sass, 1938)

White, double, light fragrance, late, 34" tall, lactiflora. A romantically fluffy full bloom with an inner yellow glow with a bonus of fragrance.



Dark Eyes (Laning, 1996)



Red, single, light fragrance, early-midseason, 28" tall, intersectional. Very deep dark coloring. Smaller flowers on a strong bushy plant.



Dawn Pink (Sass, 1946)



Rose pink, single, lightly fragrant, midseason, 34" tall, lactiflora. Striking bright pink single with a glowing yellow center. A row in bloom makes a "sea of warm pink"!



Dresden Pink (Wild & Son, 1957)

\$28

Pink, double, very fragrant, late, 36" tall, lactiflora. Beautiful symmetrical blooms, shaped like a rose, with consistent dark pink color.



Duchess de Nemours (Calot, 1856)

\$24

Creamy-white, double, very fragrant, midseason, 34" tall, lactiflora. Globe-shaped, creamy-white flower with green carpels and a yellow center glow. A much loved old favorite!



Earlybird (Saunders, 1951)

Red, single, very early, 20" tall, hybrid. Handsome little plants with finely-cut foliage and an abundance of bright crimson flowers. One of the first peonies to bloom in the Spring.



Eastern Star (Bigger, 1975)

White, bomb double, midseason, 30" tall, lactiflora. A large, pure white flower named after the Masonic organization Myron Bigger was active in for many years.



Edulis Superba (Lemon, 1824)

\$20

Pink, double, fragrant, midseason, 36" tall, lactiflora. A deep pink double with a collar of smaller ivory petals at the base. A very old, tried and true variety with a bonus of fragrance!



Eliza Lundy (Krekler, 1976)

ALM \$42

Crimson red, bomb, lightly fragrant, early midseason, 22" tall, hybrid. Ruffled blooms hold their color well. One bloom per stem, held above the foliage.



Ellen Cowley (Saunders, 1940)

ALM \$24

Sharp pink, semi-double, midseason, 33" tall, hybrid. Lovely plant with many stems and many flowers. Can tolerate some shade.



Elsa Sass (Sass, 1930)

\$26

White, double, very fragrant, late, 28" tall, lactiflora. Large, perfectly formed rose-type flowers with a texture like velvet. Among the last peonies to bloom. APS Gold Medal 1943.



Etched Salmon \$42 (Cousins/R. Klehm, 1981)

Salmon-pink, double, lightly fragrant, midseason, 34" tall, hybrid. A perfect symmetry of finely cupped petals with deeper color at the base. APS Gold Medal 2002.



Fairy Princess (Glasscock/Falk, 1955)

RARE \$24

Red, single, midseason, 20" tall, hybrid. Brilliant, true red petals surround golden stamens for regal splendor. A nice border plant.



Feather Top (Wild, 1970)

\$24

Rose-pink, japanese, late, 32" tall, lactiflora. A center poof of slightly lighter pink petals is surrounded by golden staminodes. A real charmer!



Felix Crousse (Crousse, 1881)

\$20

Raspberry red, double, midseason, 32" tall, lactiflora. A dependable and brilliant light red flower with a silky luster. Strong stems, makes an excellent cut flower.



Felix Supreme (Kriek, 1955)

Ruby red, double, lightly fragrant, midseason, 34" tall, lactiflora. Frothy petals make it an excellent cut flower. Dark green foliage and strong growth habit.



Fernleaf Hybrid (hybridizer unknown)

Magenta, single, very early, 24" tall, hybrid. The fern-type foliage is a wonderful compliment to the landscape. Our best growing fernleaf peony.



Festiva Maxima (Miellez, 1851)

White, double, very fragrant, early, 36" tall, lactiflora. Its sterling qualities of growth, color and fragrance make it most desirable even after 150 years! Red flecking on petals.



Garden Lace (Hollingsworth, 1992)

Pink, japanese, lightly fragrant, midseason, 30" tall, lactiflora. Soft pink luminous petals cup a center of pale yellow lacy staminodes. Abundant fragrant flowers stand up well.



First Arrival (Anderson, 1986)



Lavender-pink, semi-double, lightly fragrant, early, 28" tall, intersectional. Pink to lavender semi-double with red flares that bloom in abundance at the top of the lovely plant.



Garden Peace (Saunders, 1941)

\$26

White, single, early midseason, 36" tall, hybrid. Red accents make lovely simplicity on the white bloom. Nice rounded foliage. Many side buds for a good show of blossoms.



Fizzy (Adelman, 2023)



Light yellow, semi-double, midseason, 34" tall, intersectional. A sport found in Lemon Dream. It is set apart by the 'pinking shear' petal edges. Most blooms are fully yellow with a few showing a slight rosy blush in the center.



Garden Treasure (Hollingsworth, 1984)

Yellow, semi-double, very fragrant, mid-late season, 30" tall, intersectional. Rare yellow flowers with muted red flares. Many side buds for long bloom. Lemon scent. APS Gold Medal 1996.



Gardenia (Lins, 1955)

\$26

Blush-white, double, fragrant, midseason, 34" tall, lactiflora. Golden stamens mixed with center petals on a very beautiful gardenia shaped flower. Glows creamy yellow.



Gay Paree (ALM) \$26 (Auten, 1933)

Cerise pink, japanese, lightly fragrant, midseason, 33" tall, lactiflora. Bright pink guard petals cheerfully surround a full center of mixed pink and creamy white petaloids.



Georgiana Shaylor (Shaylor, 1908)

\$34

Pink, double, late-midseason, very fragrant, 32" tall, lactiflora. A very large, romantic rose-type flower with wonderful fragrance. Needs support.



Goldilocks (Gilbertson, 1975)

RARE \$50

Yellow, anemone to bomb double, slight fragrance, late-midseason, 28" tall, hybrid. A gorgeous yellow. As the plant matures the flower form turns from anemone to double.



Golly (Krekler, 1965)

\$22

Pink, double, lightly fragrant, midseason, 34" tall, lactiflora. A dreamy pink double flower with a ring of stamens surrounding a pouf of petals from its center.



Gordon E. Simonson (TOP) \$85 (Anderson, 2010)

Pink, semi-double, midseason, 26" tall, intersectional. Brilliant fuchsia pink with pale creamy stamens and wavy petals making a statement of simple beauty.



Greenland \$75 (Pehrson/Seidl, 1989)

White, double, early, 30" tall, hybrid. Flower opens white, can be blush. Shaded green guard petals shown in bud or underneath once flower opens. No support needed.



Halcyon (Saunders, 1948)

RARE \$34

White, single, early, 32" tall, hybrid. Crimson stems, stigmas and filaments accent the pure white petals. As near to perfection that a flower can get!



Henry Bockstoce (Bockstoce, 1955)

\$26

Rich cardinal red, double, fragrant, midseason, 40" tall, hybrid. Heavy petal substance with a deep red sheen. Large flowers on long stems. May need support.



Henry Sass \$24 (Sass/Interstate Nurseries, 1949)

White, double, lightly fragrant, midseason, 34" tall, lactiflora. A magnificent large, pure white double. Strong stems and dark foliage.



Hillary (ALM ITOH \$50 (Anderson, 1999)

Creamy red, semi-double, midseason, 30" tall, intersectional. Red fades to cream while holding its darker center color. Graceful foliage that holds the flowers on display.



Hot Chocolate (H. Sass/Reynolds, 1971)

\$32

Chocolate red, japanese, midseason, 36" tall, lactiflora. An unusual color combined with an unusual flower form will make a focal point in your Spring flower bed.



Itoba (Japan, unknown)

Red, single, very early, 12" tall, hybrid. A delight of a plant with fine foliage for a garden contrast. The short stature is perfect for the front border.



Joanna Marlene (Anderson, 1999)

ITOH \$55

Yellow, semi-double, midseason, 30" tall, intersectional. A delightful flower that changes color as it matures. A lovely landscape plant.



Jan van Leeuwen (van Leeuwen, 1928)

\$26

White, japanese, midseason, 28" tall, lactiflora. Flower is pure white with yellow staminodes. Showy flowers on this compact landscape plant.



Jean Ericksen (Ericksen/Joslin, 1999)

Red, japanese, midseason, 36" tall, lactiflora. A deep red flower with feathery petals in the center. Compact and sturdy bloom that does not need support.

Red, double, midseason, 30" tall, lactiflora. Treasured for the dark red color that glows like satin. The feathered petal edges cup the contrasting yellow center.

Cherry red, single to semi-double, fragrant, midseason, 28" tall, intersectional. Opens cherry red fading to orange then yellow. There can be three colors of flowers at the same time.

Red, double, fragrant, midseason, 36" tall, lactiflora. Rose-type flowers of watermelonred on strong dark green stems. APS Gold Medal 1957.



Kopper Kettle (Anderson, 1999)

Orange, semi-double, midseason, 32" tall, intersectional. Tones of red, yellow and orange combine to give a copper appearance to the flower. A shorter, slow growing dark green plant.



Krinkled White (Brand, 1928)

Pure white, single, midseason, 34" tall, lactiflora. Large, white, crepe-paper textured petals with small tuft of golden yellow stamens. Stands up in rain. Spectacular in a grouping!

Pink, japanese, fragrant, midseason, 36" tall, lactiflora. Canary yellow centers set off the pink petals of a very upright flower on dark green foliage.

Tree Peonies

Tree peonies: called tree peonies for the woody stems that they have. Tree peonies have woody stems that defoliate in the fall, but the wood stems stay intact, above the ground. They tend to bloom earlier and with larger flowers than the bush peony. They are generally slow to increase. Some are sold as named varieties; however, they are frequently sold by color. Tree peonies can have a height as little as 20" tall all the way up to over 8' tall, depending on the plant habit, maturity, and pruning.

All of our tree peonies are field grown on their own roots.

Other growers use a quick way to increase tree peonies by grafting a piece from the parent plant onto a piece of herbaceous root to provide a quick-start energy supply for the tree peony. Sometimes the vigorous herbaceous root takes over to the detriment of the tree peony. In some cases the herbaceous will come up and bloom beside the tree peony. Own-root peonies are also an advantage if the top is damaged by severe freezing or accidental cut down the root will send up more buds and stems that will be the same variety as planted.

Cut Flower Care

It is best to cut flowers early in the morning in the cooler weather, while the buds are still cool. Leave at least three sets of leaves on the plant to keep the plant vigorous. Most varieties can be cut when the bud feels like a large, firm marshmallow or when you observe the first petal move away from the bud. When cut in too tight of a bud, the flower may not open.

Wash and bleach all tools, buckets, and vases to reduce flower contact with bacteria. Place the stems immediately in cool water. Remove all foliage that will be below water level in your final arrangement, as foliage will begin to break down under water and give your flowers a shorter vase life. Cut the stems again, this time submerged underwater before placing them in the arrangement. Air blocks the water uptake, when stems are cut out of water. A bead of water will remain over the pores at the end of the stem, as you transfer them to the vase.

Keep the flowers out of direct sunlight and heat. Change the water in vases daily if possible, to reduce the bacteria count. In floral arrangements you might want to use a commercial flower food that contains a bacterial inhibitor. Flowers shouldn't be refrigerated with fruit. Fruit emits ethylene gas which speeds flower maturity when you want to slow maturity.

To open flowers faster, place them in warm water in a warm room. To slow the progress, place them in a dark, cool room and if desperate- add ice to the water.

Where will peonies grow?

Bush and Itoh Peonies are suitable for USDA zones 2-8 and Tree Peonies for USDA zones 4-8. They must have dormancy every winter to bloom and thrive. Peonies are not generally successfully grown south of Birmingham, Alabama or south of Monterey, California. However, southern areas with higher elevation may receive the cold period needed. Check online or with your local extension service to know what USDA zone you are in.





Planting Requirements

Peonies do best with half to full day sun; aerated, well-drained soil; space around the plant to allow for air circulation; and a winter dormancy period. Fall is the correct time for planting, giving the feeder roots a chance to become established before Spring bloom.

Bare root peonies ordered will be shipped in the fall for fall planting. Planting instructions will be included with each shipment and are are also available on our website. While following our planting instructions, prepare your soil, plant your peonies, and wait until spring for them to emerge. Make sure to avoid planting in wet areas and put no more than two inches of soil over the growing eyes. If you purchased potted peonies while visiting our open house, those are ready to be transferred to your prepared garden soil. **Peony care includes:** 1) light fertilization with a tulip/daffodil bulb fertilizer twice a year, once at time of emergence and again in the fall, 2) maintaining moderate soil moisture during the Summer, 3) cutting foliage off at soil level on herbaceous and intersectional peonies in the late Fall to reduce disease and induce dormancy in warm climates (tree peonies do not get cut down to the ground), 4) maintaining only two inches of soil cover over the growing eyes (shallower in warm zones).

Disease Prevention: The main disease affecting peonies is botrytis, or gray mold, which is a fungus and should be treated with copper sulfate or a fungicide used for black spot in roses. Allowing for air circulation around the plant as well as cutting and disposing of foliage in the Fall will greatly reduce the possibility of disease.

1. How are peonies sold?

We sell peonies as bare-root tubers. 3-5 eye divisions. For an order of one, you will receive one division. Bare-root peonies are best planted in the fall for the most success.

2. How will I receive my peonies?

You will receive your peonies as bare roots, each root will be tagged with the variety name. They will be packaged in a lightly moist peat moss shipped out to you September 15th – October 15th.

3. What care do peonies require?

Peonies require little care. Watering, fertilizing twice a year, cutting the foliage down in the fall (tree peonies do not get cut down).

4. Do peonies only bloom once?

Yes, peonies only bloom once a year. You can extend the time you have peonies in bloom by selecting one variety from each season, very early to late season.

5. How long can peonies live?

Peonies come back every year, some are known to be at least 100 years old. They may outlive you!

6. Do I need to dig and divide my plants?

Peonies are not like some other perennials that need to be dug and divided every year. They can stay in ground, if you wish to share your plant or increase your collection, you can divide your plants in the fall.

7. Why do I have ants on my peonies?

When peonies are in tight bud they secrete a sugary substance, the ants are just there eating the sugar. Ants are not needed to open the bloom. If they are a problem, shake the blooms off before bringing them in or look for an Ant Block product at your garden center.

8. My peonies aren't blooming, any suggestions?

Top reasons why peonies don't bloom is they are planted too deep, not receiving enough sunlight, over-fertilized or fertilized with a lawn or general-purpose fertilizer, crowded by other plants or don't have enough space.

9. Where are your peonies grown?

Everything we sell and ship is field grown in our fields here in the Willamette Valley of Salem, Oregon. Your order will be 100% filled from plants from our fields.

10. Why are there so many different price points?

The newest peonies are going to be at the highest price points, it is a slow process to create a new peony so generally brand new introductions are going to be more expensive right out and will slowly lower as they become more readily available. Rare and hard to find peonies will usually command a higher price as well.



Types of Peony Blooms



Single

SINGLE peonies are composed of five or more broad petals which surround a mass of pollen-bearing stamens and seed-bearing carpels.

Examples: Athena, Krinkled White, Scarlett O'Hara

roselette

Japanese

With JAPANESE-type blooms the doubling process has begun. The stamens have widened into staminodes that may look like shredded petals that are surrounded by larger outer petals. This flower form stands up well in weather.

Examples: Madame Butterfly, Nippon Beauty, Sword Dance

cream puff

Semi–Double

SEMI-DOUBLE flowers always have prominent pollen-bearing stamens intermixed with large petals. Examples: Buckeye Belle, Coral Charm, Feather Top, Minnie Shaylor

anne oveson

Bamb

The BOMB-type flower has smaller petals that form a mound or bomb in the center of the larger, outer petals of the same color. Examples: Angel Cheeks, Mister Ed, Red Charm

angel cheeks

Full Double

The FULL DOUBLE bloom completes the process of doubling. All the stamens and carpels have developed into petals resembling the guard petals. Examples: Ann Cousins, Gardenia, Kansas, Paul M. Wild,
