Book Clubs for Inmates (BCFI) is a registered charity which organizes volunteer-led book clubs within federal penitentiaries across Canada. Currently, BCFI facilitates 36 book clubs from Nova Scotia to British Columbia.

BCFI runs French and English language book clubs for men and women incarcerated in minimum, medium, and maximum security facilities. Book clubs are usually made up of 10-18 members who meet once a month to discuss books, both fiction and non-fiction, of literary merit.

Every month, hundreds of inmates participate in book clubs across the country and each year thousands of brand new books are purchased, read, and discussed.

It is our mission to establish book clubs in every federal penitentiary across Canada.

Carol Finlay received an honorary degree from St. Thomas University on July 5, 2019. She was recognized for founding BCFI and bringing life and hope through literature to those who are incarcerated and who are among the most marginalized populations in Canada.

Book Clubs: This year we continued to open new book clubs, bringing the number of active clubs up to **36.**

Children of Inmates Reading Program: ChIRP is an exciting program for BCFI which supports healthy parent/child relationships and promotes the love of learning. We have programs operating in four institutions in Ontario and Nova Scotia.

Author visits: Visits by authors to BCFI book clubs is extremely meaningful to our members. In 2019, we were thrilled to host several inspiring authors, including Steven Heighton, Colin Campbell, Tasneem Jamal, Chrystine Brouillet, Joan McEwan, Esi Edugyan, and Kathleen Winter.

Inmate University Education: Through financial support to the Post-Secondary Prison Foundation, BCFI supports inmates pursuing university education while in prison. In 2019, through our support, 13 incarcerated students took courses toward their university degrees.

Recognition: Eric Friesen, a long-serving BCFI volunteer at Collin's Bay Maximum Institution, recently became a member of the Order of Canada. The Order of Canada honours individuals who make extraordinary contributions to the nation. Eric's engagement with Book Club for Inmates is just one of his many outstanding services to society. CHILDREN OF INMATES READING PROGRAM

BCFI's commitment to the successful reintegration of inmates and to stronger, healthier communities includes the development of Children of Inmates Reading Program (ChIRP). The mandate of ChIRP is to build and enhance a healthier parent/child relationship, develop literacy and listening skills, increase vocabulary and attention spans for children and promote a love of learning in children through the consistent presence of a parent and books.

For the past 15 years, Carla Veitch, a children's educator, has been successfully developing and operating a parent/child reading initiative.

Twice a month, volunteers enter the institution and offer inmates the opportunity to select a book for their child and then read that book into a recording device. The book and recording are then mailed to the child.

We currently have four ChIRP groups in Ontario and Nova Scotia. Two new groups are set to open in early 2020.
