THE

Dr. Anna Munster COLLECTION

DR. ANNA MUNSTER was a distinguished physician from Romania who studied first in Vienna, completing her Bachelor's degree at age 17, then at the University of Strasbourg in France. A medical doctor by age 23, Anna pursued a specialty in lung diseases and was certified by age 27. At the time when Dr. Munster was preparing to become a practicing physician, she found herself fleeing the Nazi regime. A journey that brought her to southern France as a grape-picker, where she was spared from the list of Jewish people to be brought to camps. She then traveled over a 6,000 ft. snowy mountain to the sanctuary of Switzerland. It was in Switzerland that Dr. Munster provided medical care for women and children in six refugee camps. After departing from the camps she was appointed to a post at a tuberculosis treatment station. Within the few years following the end of the war, Anna, along with her family, first moved to New

York. While living in New York, Dr. Munster became the Chief Resident at Montefiore's Tuberculosis Sanatorium and began to seriously pursue the field of psychiatry, completing her residency at Pinewood. A few years later Dr. Munster left New York for Israel where she


served a community of children at a tuberculosis hospital near Jerusalem for two years.

Upon returning to the United States in 1956, Dr. Munster settled in Pearl River, New York, and began her tenure at Rockland State Hospital as the Senior Psychiatrist of seven wards treating female children and adolescents ages 5-16. There, Dr. Munster completely transformed her unit by implementing a short-term

care program that

dramatically decreased the population of longterm patients at the institution. When it came to retiring from Rockland State Hospital after thirteen years of service, Dr. Munster used that ending as a new beginning. She began her





TAPPAN TROOP #71

IN MARCH OF 2023, the museum received a sentimental donation including memorabilia from the Tappan Troop #71 of Girl Scouts of America, c.1960s. This donation was made on the behalf of Annette Rein and consists of the troop flag, a sash sewn with patches and pins, the "Cadette" Girl Scout Handbook, and many photographs of the adventures of Troop #71. Martina Gomez, a volunteer at the museum, has been diligently processing this collection and noticed that the acquired badges represent a wide range of activities and tasks including: Troop Camper, Campcraft, Hospitality, Childcare, Housekeeper, Homemaker, Pioneer, Tree & Shrub, and Conservation. While the badges may look a little different these days, what remains the same is the long lasting camaraderie shared between the individuals in the troops. In a parting letter dated October 31, 1965, Annette's Troop Leader reminds the girls to always try to do their best, take time to help others and be friendly, and lastly "The nice thing about memories is that no one can take them away from you."

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fellowship in child psychiatry at Mt. Sinai at age 50. As a Board certified physician and child psychiatrist, Dr. Munster became the clinical assistant professor at Cornell and Mt. Sinai Medical Schools for the next two decades.

Dr. Munster's dedicated service to her patients over the years is memorialized in the donation we received from her granddaughter. An abundant collection comprised of 48 objects and an assortment of archives, we are fortunate to be the home to Anna's belongings. The story of these antique medical tools—ranging from a sphygmometer to a pristine collection of forceps—is supported by thorough paper records preserved by Dr. Munster, detailing her career—from her personal study notes through her official offer letters from each hospital. Perhaps one of the most inspiring items in this collection is the handwritten memoir titled "A Woman's Life" that Anna had scribed on the back side of work papers. Having Anna's own account and thoughts about her life and accomplishments certainly enhances the story we are able to assemble with this collection. It adds a primary source, a human spark, to her tools that is incredibly valuable to the museum's insight on Dr. Anna Munster.

While processing this accession, I was reminded of one of my favorite museum narratives— the present connects to the past. Ties across generations are especially magnified in this collection. As the granddaughter of a woman who spent many years working in the Rockland State Hospital Children's Unit myself, this collection feels special to me in many ways. The Dr. Anna Munster Collection is an extensive showcase of the triumphs of her life among extraordinary circumstances. One of Dr. Munster's medical bags can currently be seen on display at the DePew House.
