

The New Bishop of Winchester

Rumours were afoot in The Bright Waters Benefice in early July – a celebrity was rumoured to be visiting St Peter's Church! Who was it going to be? – why was it so secret? - was it worth hanging about around the church to catch a glimpse?

Well, the celebrity in question was the Rt Revd Philip Mounstephen, currently the Bishop of Truro. On 6th July, the day his appointment was announced, Bishop Philip took the time to meet some people around his diocese. It was definitely an honour that Bishop Philip chose to visit our Benefice.

He was greeted by the bells being rung at St Peter's Church as a sign of welcome and a group of churchwardens, members of the congregation and ministers joined him for lunch inside the church. He was keen to chat and get a taste firsthand of what life was like in our benefice.

After lunch, Bishop Philip moved onto St James in Woodcott where he met farm workers and the estate gardener who presented him with a sapling grown from an 800-year-old yew tree from the churchyard.



Finally, Bishop Philip visited Berehill House Care Home to meet some of the residents and to join them in singing and some prayers.

Of his visit, Bishop Philip said,

"To visit the Bright Waters Benefice was to see rural ministry at its very best. It was to meet a loving warm community (and to be greeted by the sound of bells!). It was to see the Church so embedded in the life of the village: church and pub were right next door to each other. It was to see people who stepping out in service, as an LLM, or a deacon, and in so many other ways. It was to witness the church sharing love and care with the very elderly. It was to see how integral church is to rural life and the farming year. So much to celebrate and rejoice in!"

Hurstbourne Priors May Fair

Following the highly successful May Fair this year, raising a record amount for Village amenities, it was agreed at the 'wash up' meeting in June that there should be a discussion into the running of the May Fair going forward. Not least as the agreed formula for the division of proceeds has been running for many, many years and it was felt that times had changed and it was time to review the division of profits.

The May Fair has always been run in order to provide funds for our three village amenities - St Andrew's Church, the Village Hall and the Recreation Ground & Davilion. Considering the influx of new families to the village and St Mary's Hill over the past few years it is time to review the way in which the May Fair is organised and run.

Over the next couple of months we will be meeting to formulate the plans for the May Fair 2024 and we are looking for ideas which will contribute to another successful event.

As well as the ways the funds are raised and used, but also the set up/break down over the weekend, collection of items for the stalls and new entertainment for visitors to the event.

At the meeting in June there were a number of 'ideas sheets' available or comments and suggestions.

This is the list by way of a prompt as to things which might need to be looked at:

MARQUEE STORAGE

Large space for marquees and trestle tables needed. It must be dry and insured.

ATTRACTIONS

eg: music, bees, wildlife stalls, trade stalls, circus workshop, maypole, pony rides, bouncy castle, kids' games, face painting, toddler area VILLAGE STALLS

eg: plants, cakes, toys, books, bric a brac, nearly new

CATERING

eg: pub, teas, candy floss, BBQ, ice creams SET UP/BREAK DOWN

eg: tents, cadets help, site clearance, lost property

SITE OPERATIONS

eg: loos, bins, car park, signage

VILLAGE COMMS

eg: for volunteers, donations, results

EXTERNAL PUBLICITY

eg signage, programmes, social media

At the Hill & Valley 'Drinks & Nibbles' party in the Village Hall on 22nd June, we said thank-you to our many volunteers and contributors and we welcomed our new editor for Hurstbourne Priors Felicity Long. Retiring editor Fenella Williams was thanked and presented with flowers. A previous presentation had been made to retiring St Mary Bourne editor Pearl Pritchard who was unable to attend the M. Widén party.

Stinkhorn Fungus!

The rich and diverse eco system of Hurstbourne plays home to trout, kingfishers, bees, toads and much more but there's a new fun-gi in town and he's kicking up a bit of a stink!

Last week a fungus so rare only 6 have ever been recorded in the UK (statistic provided by the Daily Mail and therefore wholly accurate) appeared in the compost heap of Stable Cottage, Hurstbourne Priors.

What appeared to be an old red dog toy on closer inspection turned out to be a something quite different, a bright red fleshy looking basket, covered with flies attracted to its stench of rotting flesh.

A quick Google deduced that this was a Basket Stinkhorn Fungus, or clathrus ruber, very rare in the UK but more common in the warmer climate of Europe and North Africa. It's red basket like appearance, makes it easily identifiable along with the smell! It gets weirder as the fungus grows in a white egg type casing from which the fungus erupts.

Not known to be edible, European folklore suggest that all those who handled it succumbed to 'various ailments', needless to say we did not take our chances.

It only lasts for a day or two, which was no bad thing considering the stink! But Google does say they normally appear more than once, as the flies attracted to its odour disperse the spores. Quite why is had chosen to grow in our compost heap we will never know. It has been recorded on the Fungal Records Database.

Gina Annie Yates – 1931 to 2023



Gina was born in Norfolk on 18th September1931, the only child of Percy and Olive Lavington. Percy was gamekeeper on an estate near Norwich and when it was taken over for an aerodrome in 1940, they moved the Hurstbourne Priors where he was to to be gamekeeper at Apsley.

This was the start of Gina's long association with the village. She remembered coming to church with her mother, shortly after they arrived in the village in March 1940 - in 1920, we celebrated Gina's 80 years of worship at St Andrews.

Gina cared for her mother during a long illness until she died in 1954. She then looked after her father until his death just three years later. As an only child, with no local relatives, Gina needed to work. She was a Post Office telephonist and later Supervisor at Andover Exchange for over 18 years and then worked for Test Valley Borough Council for 16 years.

On 22nd August 1960, Gina married her beloved husband Kenneth Yates in St Andrews Church. They met when Gina and her father moved into Andover, and they would wave to each other over the fence. They had a truly happy and loving marriage which lasted almost 45 years until the sudden death of Ken in March 2005.

Ken and Gina served on Hurstbourne Priors PCC for 17 years. During that time, Ken was Churchwarden for six years and Gina was Treasurer for nine years. When Ken was Churchwarden, he and Gina were there faithfully every Sunday setting up the church service.

Planting seeds and cuttings, then seeing them mature and flower was Gina's greatest joy and she felt nearer to God in her garden than anywhere else on earth. She said she could plant and sow, but only God could give the seeds and plants life. Every year, she grew many plants and helped on the plant stall at the May Fair.

Gina was a skilled needlewoman. She hoped to be a dressmaker but gave up her tailoring apprenticeship to care for her mother. Gina still made many of her own clothes and did beautiful cross stitch. She made a wonderful embroidery of a kingfisher for a fundraising auction for St Andrews. In winter, Gina had her knitting. She made delightful cuddly toys for the children's stall at the May Fair and many babies were kept warm in one of Gina's baby cardigans.

Gina had a great gift for friendship with people of all ages. She was so grateful to the many people who helped her when she couldn't quite manage as usual with shopping, lifts, gardening and walking her little dog, Wishes.

Her faith, her friends and the love and companionship of always owning a small dog, helped Gina to live a quiet but happy and contented life. She died peacefully at home on 28th March with Wishes by her side.


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

Mac's Field

Many of you may know that earlier this year I was lucky enough to be able to buy the field next to the recreation ground in St Mary Bourne – commonly known as Bell's Field.

Of course, rumours always abound when land changes hands – speculation on what the new owner wants to do. So I wanted to take this opportunity to share my thoughts and plans - to hear it from the "horse's mouth" as it were.

To those of you who don't know me, my name is Richard Sutcliffe. I am one of the priests in our local ministry team since being ordained in 2012. I originally moved to the village back in 1980, when I was twelve. My parents bought The George Inn and we lived there for six years. I moved away for University, but after we were married, my wife, Swee, and I were keen to move back to the village – we really wanted to be able to bring up a family here. My parents still lived here and my sister had started her own family, all living in the village. After a little while, Swee and I were lucky enough to adopt our wonderful son, Mac, when he was eight years old and he soon settled into village life – enjoying the countryside and the freedom that living here afforded him, until sadly he died in a road accident when he was sixteen.

That's enough about me – but I hope it helps to explain the motivations behind my plans. Above all, I want to make it clear that I have not bought the land with the intention of building large numbers of houses. I am passionate about the village and the way it develops so that it is in the best interests of us all. It has been home to me and my family for most of my life. St Mary Bourne is and always will be very dear to me.

First of all, I have registered the field with the name "Mac's Field". Currently the field is not registered with any name, and I am sure that many will continue to refer to it as Bell's Field. But I hope over time, the new name will come to be used as a tribute to my late son. This village was very important to him, and he particularly loved to be outside, so it seems like a good name to me.

Ideas for the field are at a very early stage – and none of this will happen fast – but I am gathering a group of interested parties together to talk through some of these ideas:

E.g. a place for children to learn outside – both school groups and church groups; community gardens where people can come together to grow and share food; a small orchard; beekeeping.

I'm sure there are loads of other possibilities – my priority is for us to create something that can become an asset to the community as a legacy and tribute to Mac. My late wife, Swee, and I had always hoped that we could do something in his name – something to help all sorts of children ideally – and I am hoping that the field could be used for my ideas there.

Being fully transparent, I would also like to give two small parcels of the land to my nephews, Dan and Richard Grunsell, for them to be able to build modest family homes. They are village boys who very much want to have permanent roots here and the stability to be able to bring up their families in St Mary Bourne.

So that is all there is to know at the moment. I hope this will be a really exciting project for the village. Obviously I'm very interested to hear your thoughts and any ideas or concerns you may have. Please feel free to email me on rev.sutcliffe@btinternet.com.

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Volunteers sought for river monitoring group

Have you ever wondered what hides below the surface of the beautiful Bourne Rivulet? Meet some inhabitants of this incredible ecosystem, and keep an eye on its health, by joining the invertebrate monitoring group!

The Bourne Rivulet is a chalk stream – a hugely rare and precious wildlife habitat. To better understand the stream's condition, local volunteers have been monitoring its invertebrate populations since late 2019.

This monitoring involves disturbing the stream bed before collecting a water sample. The volunteers then count the numbers of certain species – mostly mayflies, stoneflies, and caddisflies – that are good indicators of water quality.

The resulting data is uploaded onto national databases that can be accessed by organisations like the Wildlife Trusts and the Environment Agency. This makes it enormously valuable at both the local and national levels.

Until recently, this crucial task has been undertaken by Sarah Cooney, Mark Thomas, and Tony Prior. Tony is now stepping down – with our thanks for his hard work – so we're seeking other passionate people to join the group.

We visit two sites between Hurstbourne Priors and St Mary Bourne once a month, usually for around two hours. But your time commitment can be flexible; you don't need to attend every time. All training and equipment is provided.

Second-hand September

The fashion industry accounts for about 8-10% of global carbon emissions and nearly 20% of wastewater. And while the environmental impact of flying is now well known, fashion sucks up

more energy than both aviation and shipping combined.

- Buy only second-hand in September to raise awareness
- Donate clothes to second-hand shops, charity shops or second-hand online stores (e.g. re-fashion.co.uk, preworn.ltd bags supplied and free posting)
- Buy and sell on second-hand sites such as Facebook, Vinted
- Look online for second-hand clothes Oxfam, Vinted, refashion.co.uk, theclearoutstore.co.uk, preworn.ltd
- Repair clothes. Take small mends to the Repair Café for the Cycling Seamstress to help you with. Or teach yourself a new handy skill
- Upcycle jeans cut into shorts (fraying is in!), iron-on stickers, dye it, patch it, embroider it, cut it, turn old fabrics into shopping bags such as morsbags (pattern available from morsbags.com), quilts or scrunchies, rags for house cleaning, gift wrap (use pinking shears to stop fraying)
- Organise wardrobe seasonally store away out-of-season clothes that will feel like new when reintroduced into your wardrobe next season.
- If you buy new buy from sustainable clothing brands.
- Washing clothes less often can also reduce your carbon footprint and make your clothes last longer.

St Mary Bourne Lake

The lake is a treasured asset of the village and is valued by all. In recent years there have been a number of problems regarding its maintenance. It is however a huge area, so it will take time to address them all.

When planning the way forward it is necessary to balance the requirements of the villagers, the fishermen and the conservationists – all of whom are equally important and ensure that it is in accordance with Dr Evan's Covenant.

The following are the first areas to be addressed:

- Communication is important and the plan is to keep the village informed as to the aims of the working party.
- b. There will be a regular cutting regime to keep the undergrowth down. This will be done with reference to wildlife, the fishermen and residents.
- c. For the villagers it is important that the lake can be seen therefore to this end some of the trees along the footpath will be trimmed. This will increase visibility and will also increase light levels thus allowing bulbs and wild flowers to be planted.
- d. There is a problem with nettles. Some are beneficial but there are so many they are restricting efforts to diversify the vegetation. To address this, two areas have been identified where the nettles will be controlled and alternative plants added.

Community Facilities on the Recreation Ground - Update

Since the Community Play Space project began in 2021, we have had the addition of a new Village Shop and Community Café and seen the growing popularity of the Junior Cricket Club, alongside the Bowls Club and the new location of Ninny's House. We have received match funding from the Greenham Trust up to £25,000 for our project to improve the play area, the asphalt Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA) and surrounding facilities. The estimated costs, including the removal of the old play area to create more parking, is £125,000. This project is designed to consider the use of the whole recreational ground and the wider facilities; we're excited about what the project could deliver for the community.

That being said, external funding remains a challenge. We will continue to explore different funding routes, but as a local authority, it's harder to find capital grants for this type of community project. To date, we've done several fundraising events and had a successful appeal to the SMB Flower Show and Village Fête. In January, we hosted a Jumble Sale in the Village Hall. In June, we were supported by the Junior Cricket Club who donated BBQ and drinks sales. So far we have raised almost £3,000 and with match funding from the Trust that comes to almost £6,000. We also plan to host a Big Breakfast in the future.

We held a very successful Jazz Evening featuring the Redfern Collective on the $8^{\rm th}$ of July on the rec with all proceeds going to the project.

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
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Postcard from Binley

"Shall I compare thee to a summer's day? Thou art more lovely and more temperate. Rough winds do shake the darling buds of May, And summer's lease hath all too short a date."

Too b****y right it has! But never mind, this is surely a classic British summer, isn't it? The hot bit, the wet bit, the miserable bit and now on the 16th of August the rather lovely bit. Early morning walks are softly trodden on dew wet grass. Leaves, once vibrant are tinged and on the turn, early Autumnal mists are soon burnt off by a still warm sun and the air is filled with the revving and bluster of keeper's Quads as they tear around the lanes and byways of Binley, their newly arrived young poults in pens, vulnerable to the skirmishes of Kite and Buzzard, the fox, the badger... just about anything sharp of tooth and claw. But as good as he/she can be in protecting his/her birds it is the weather that often does for them. The wet. Let's hope for an Indian summer.

But right now, or at least an hour ago to be precise I was out with the dogs on the top of the downs above the house on a perfectly still warm evening. Below me are two fenced meadows. One has gone for haymaking the other was left alone and now around forty Dorset Long Horns are loafing around in the long, sweet grasses. "Creeping Bent", "Cock's Foot", "Crested Dog's Tail", "Yorkshire Fog"! All native grasses which illustrate what an evocative language we have!

A few meters above our herbivorous friends a barn owl is quartering the meadow. I think it has come from the tree owl boxes the Harrisons have put up in the field next door. They have created a perfect habitat with unmowed pasture and it has enhanced this little corner of the village quite immeasurably. A Muntjack deer has carved out a home in the most wickedly sharp and unpenatrative bramble patch at the bottom corner and we have chanced upon each other numerous times over the last few months but I was dismayed to find it a couple of days ago dragged out and half eaten, laid amongst a patch of the bluest cornflowers I think I have ever seen.

But nothing quite prepared me for the thrill a few weeks ago when I rounded a corner and came across a "tussle" of six very young fox cubs bowling around in the lane and very reminiscent of a ball of stoats that I think I have mentioned here before. I have never seen coats so vividly foxy red, they were simply glistening and I was able to stand and observe for a brief moment before one cottoned on to me and as a troop they slunk off through the hedge. I took a few paces forward and examined their exit before I realised they had doubled back and were crossing the lane behind me in to the wood. They are born with a level of cunning that we can only admire.

The other morning I set off on an early run when suddenly I realised I had forgotten something. I'd forgotten I'm an overweight sixty three year old with dodgy knees who can't run for toffee! So I went home. Actually, in truth I never left the house in the first place but there is no harm in having these dreams. And I enjoy every one of them because I never have to carry them out. The thought of turning over new leaves or embarking on regimented regimes chills the blood but I can't tell you how much I admire those that do. The thrill I get from peering out the bedroom window and seeing a sixty something Captain of Industry dragging his creaky frame through Binley in the middle of the day in a heatwave, attached to an expiring labrador just reinforces my belief that the Dunkirk spirit is alive and well and residing in Binley of all places.

Goose for your Gander

In 1532, the House of Commons complained to the king that holy days in general


had become far too numerous, encouraging idleness and partying, thus reducing the practice of piety. Henry VIII, for it was he, responded by directing that all churches should hold their dedication festival on the same day, the first Sunday of October. This seems to be the only Reformation directive which was utterly and completely ignored. Parliament and royalty out of touch with popular sentiment? Surely not. But in the face of the archangel Michael and his angel hosts, even government was powerless.

Firmly carved into the legal, employment, calendrical, astronomical rhythm of life in towns and villages was the feast of St Michael and All Angels, 29 September-Michaelmas. It was effectively the end of the agricultural year, an achievement in itself worth celebrating. Rents were due, manor courts held, university terms begun, fairs held, including at Weyhill. You might celebrate by eating goose, but should be wary of picking blackberries after old Michaelmas Day (11 October). When St Michael and his angels expelled the devil, Lucifer, from heaven (Revelation 12.7-9), he fell from the skies and landed in a prickly blackberry bush. Satan cursed the fruit, scorched them with his fiery breath, stamped, spat, and urinated on them, so that they would be unfit for eating. More pleasantly, one of the few flowers left around at this time of year is the Michaelmas daisy (Aster). 'The Michaelmas daisies, among dead weeds, Bloom for St Michael's valorous deeds...'

Old markers move. Early September is the end of the school holidays, the beginning of the autumn term. In our supermarkets, the harvest is endless and not bound by seasons. A few legalities are still connected to the Michaelmas quarter day. It might be remembered in church that day or the Sunday following. Two of the churches in Andover are dedicated to the archangel. But otherwise, Michaelmas is all but erased as we desacralize time.

Go Star Gazing in September

15 - New Moon. Moon will be located on same side of the Earth as the Sun & will not be visible in night sky. Best time to observe galaxies & star clusters.



- **22 Mercury at Greatest Western Elongation.** Best time to view Mercury in early morning sky. Look for planet low in eastern sky just before sunrise.
- **23 September Equinox.** The sun will shine directly on the equator & there will be nearly equal amounts of day & night throughout the world. This is also first day of fall (autumnal equinox) in Northern Hemisphere & first day of spring (vernal equinox) in Southern Hemisphere.
- **29 Full Moon Supermoon.** Moon will be located on opposite side of the Earth as the Sun & its face will be fully illuminated. This is known as the Harvest Moon as it occurs closest to September Equinox. This is the last of four super moons for 2023. Moon will look near its closest approach to earth & may look slightly larger and brighter than usual. *RS*

Ann Maureen Black 2nd January 1945 – 23rd June 2023

Ann Byford was born on 2nd January 1945 in Old Winton Road, Andover. She was the third daughter of Evelyn and Horace Byford. She had two older sisters, Sheila and Eileen. The family lived at Hilliers Farm, Upper Wyke and the children enjoyed a country childhood, forming lifelong friendships with their neighbours.



Ann would walk to school in St Mary Bourne with her sisters and friends, and later on caught the bus from there to school in Whitchurch. After her schooldays, Ann worked for Lord and Lady Monk at Hurstbourne Manor. It was a long cycle ride but it eventually led to romance as she met Harry Black one day when he helped her out with a problem with her bicycle. At that time Harry's family ran

The Railway Inn (now The Bourne Valley Inn) in Lower Link.

Harry and Ann married in St Peter's Church on 20th November 1965 and started their married life in Southview Terrace, Lower Link. Their son Malcolm was born in 1967 and daughter Hilary followed in 1976. The family then moved to Andover to live on the Southern Water site on River Way where Harry worked for 30 years. After doing the housework and getting a homecooked dinner ready, Ann worked evenings at G B E Legg, Andover

Eventually Malcolm and Hilary left home and started their own families; Malcolm with Angela and daughter Amelia, and Hilary with Geoff and daughters Vicky and Aymee. On their retirement from work, Harry and Ann then decided to move back to St Mary Bourne. They were the first residents in the new-build Stud Farm development which was perfect for them. They settled back happily into village life and enjoyed local activities, the monthly lunch club and the annual flower show.

After Harry passed away in 2020, Ann bravely continued to manage her life independently until her health began to deteriorate and dementia was diagnosed. Nevertheless, with visits from Malcolm and Hilary and regular weekly outings to the Kingfisher Club, Ann stayed at her much-loved home until April this year, when suffering from sickness she was taken into hospital and inoperable cancer was discovered.

Ann received wonderful care and support from the Countess of Brecknock Hospice and Ashbourne Court Care Home but on 23rd June she lost her battle for life. She is now reunited with Harry.

REPORT FROM PC MEETING ON 10 JULY

PERIOD FOR PUBLIC SPEAKING

A number of members of the public attended the meeting to raise concerns and comment on the recent decision by LCPL to remove their General Manager. After the meeting, a summary of the questions and comments raised by members of the public and councillors was sent to LCPL for their response.

PLANNING

The Parish Council had NO OBJECTION to:

• Tree work at Longparish Playground

The PC agreed to suggest to TVBC that **PRIOR APPROVAL IS REQUIRED** for a proposed fish tank/stock pond at the **Watercress Beds (Land north of Nuns Walk)**.

FINANCE

A grant of £200 was approved for Longparish Little School towards the cost of a new wood-working area.

OPEN SPACES – B3048 stream bank maintenance

The Parish Council has a licence to manage and maintain the stretch of stream bank alongside the B3048 close to the Ashburn Rest and is very grateful to Paul Knipe for managing this on behalf of the PC, and reintroducing native wild plants to enhance the wildlife diversity in this area. This verge has been removed from the HCC cutting list for this purpose and must only be cut or strimmed by Paul at the appropriate times. Please report any issues with this bank to the clerk.

HIGHWAYS

The PC agreed to fund line painting and road markings at the junction of Southside Road/Sugar Lane to improve traffic safety in this area.

Plea to Property owners – it is time to cut back hedges that border roads or footpaths

Under the Highways Act, roadside hedges are the responsibility of the landowner who has to: Prevent the hedge from overhanging the highway. Prevent hedges from obscuring streetlights and road signs. Clear the road of debris after hedges have been cut.

Residents can report problem hedges on the Hampshire website. This may result in Highways cutting back the hedge, but the bill will be sent to the property owner, so property owners are well advised to keep hedges cut back from the road or right of way to avoid a hefty bill.


Longparish Speed Indicator Device

Longparish and Barton Stacey bought a Speed Indicator Device three years ago which is rotated between the villages. We have 4 sites in Longparish, near the shop, near the playground, by Buck Close FIELD and by the Forton bus shelter. The device acts as a reminder for drivers to slow down and also gives data for speeds and numbers of vehicles at different times of day and shows the impact of blockages on the A34 or A303. The data confirms that the majority of drivers (80%) drive at 30mph or less through the village.

"When you're driving, it's hard to perceive that a slight increase in speed is really so damaging. It's easy to let speed creep up. But a crash at 30mph involves twice as much energy and destructive potential as a crash at 20mph."

Brake, the Road Safety Charity www.brake.org.uk, an interesting organisation who campaign for safer roads.

It is encouraging to see that most people do drive more slowly past the playground see the pie chart below for a week in April, over 70% driving under 25mph. This is a small change from other years.

Countryside Club - Pond dipping

As part of the Greening Longparish

Initiative, we held the first Countryside Club event since the Covid outbreak. This Ponddipping on the Village Green near Long Bridge was attended by parents and 27 children. It was led by local Naturalist,



Paul Knipe. Despite the overcast conditions we were lucky to see a selection of common species of butterfly; **Comma, Peacock, Red Admiral,** and **Meadow Brown** as well as a **Banded Damselfly**.

The group was split into two parties each taking turns to walk around either the Ox-eye Daisy maze or the Meadow Cranesbill maze while the other party took to the stream Pond-dipping. The health of the river proved to be in good shape with many indicator species being present. These included freshwater shrimp, three bullheads and plenty of stickleback fry. Plants spotted were Hemp Agrimony, Marsh Woundwort, Hay Rattle, Black Knapweed, Meadowsweet and Angelica. The children were well-behaved and enthusiastic with shouts of 'Paul, Paul come and see what we have caught'! Thanks must go to helpers including Becky Hopkinson, Susie Urquhart and to Georgina Knipe for helping with drinks and healthy fruit refreshments.

The children at Longparish Little School awarded a coveted Eco-Schools Green Flag.



The children at **Longparish Little School** have earned an international accreditation this academic year, recognising their amazing work in making their preschool more environmentally friendly and raising eco-awareness.



The Eco-Schools programme was established in 1994 and is now delivered in more than 70 countries across the globe. More than 1 million pupils attended an Eco-School in England in 2022-23. The children at the school first formed an Eco-Committee, then helped our Eco School Coordinator, Sylvia, to

conduct an environmental review, assessing how eco-friendly their preschool is. Building on their findings they planned a year of action designed to advance their green credentials, improve their local environment, and protect our planet. The Eco-Committee connected their work to 3 Eco-Schools topics: litter/ waste, school grounds and global citizenship. They then planned a variety of projects including litter pick around the village, growing our own flowers, fruit and vegetables, re-homing toys in our toy swap and lots of recycling.

The whole of Little School is overwhelmed with excitement after receiving our Eco School's Green Flag. We decided to throw an Eco party to

celebrate all the fantastic things we have achieved. We had a lovely homemade **Eco cake** to enjoy for our snack.
Sylvia Condon said the children were very enthusiastic and engaging in learning



about our planet and different ways in which we can help save it. I am very proud of all the things they learnt on this journey. Charlie aged 4, who was one of the children on the Eco School committee, said, "My favourite things were planting because my sunflower has grown really big. It is important to plant flowers so bees can make honey." Eco-Schools England Manager, Adam Flint, said: "The Eco-Schools Green Flag award is an internationally recognised symbol of high environmental standards. The pupils and school staff that earn the award deserve immense credit for their hard work, determination, and creativity. Their passion for protecting our planet is an inspiration to us all."

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

Longparish Wildlife: How to spot the Lesser Greater Plastic Flamingo



The Lesser Greater
Plastic Flamingo was
first spotted in
Massachusetts,
United States in the
late 1950s. The first
of its kind, fondly
known as Diego, was
discovered by an
American Artist and
avid plastic
ornithologist. His

discovery later earned him a Nobel Prize in Art in 1996. Since the 1950s appreciation and awareness of the Lesser Greater Plastic Flamingo has grown immensely. Normally preferring warmer climates, they can often be found in beach communities along the coastal United States. Some Plastic Flamingos have also been known to thrive in gnome infested gardens, regardless of geographical location. This species of Flamingo is hardy and can now be found on almost every continent.

It is always enjoyable to spot the Lesser Greater Plastic Flamingo. However, it is important to approach them with caution as this species has no known predators and are basically the top of the food chain. Large groups of wild ones have been seen to clean the bones off a full sized dinosaur.

There is a small passive flock that wanders the village from time to time. If tamed they make lovely pets, enthusiastically adorning outfits for every occasion.
