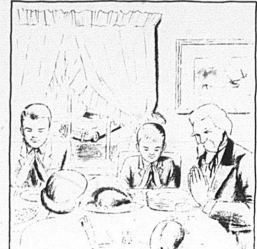

Agree Or Not

I Say What I Think

Frankfort, Ky.—The political analysts and observers are going to do a lot of analyzing on Tuesday's election returns in the Senate, Congressional races and vote on the proposed new constitution.

Senator John Sherman Cooper's record-breaking victory of 212,000 along with William O. Rogers and M. Coge Snyder victories are giving the Democrats cause for concern in the gubernatorial race next year.

Certainly the anti-administration faction of the Democratic Party is going to try to read into the constitutional defeat something in their favor for the primary next May. This is because Gov. Edward T. Breathitt put his reputation on the line in the closing weeks of the battle. But this should be tempered with the knowledge that Kentuckians usually are constitutionally opposed to changing the constitution. Too, the great majority of county officials across the state opposed the new charter, and they are the most effective lobby in the state when something affects them.

Republicans are buoyed by their victories and the good challenges they made in the First and Second Congressional Districts, particularly Republican Richard Nicholson got 25,000 votes against veteran Frank Abbott Smith, and this is the greatest victory of Democracy.

Long time foe of the party which switched his allegiance from the Democrats to Republicans gathered 35,427 votes while incumbent Bill Natcher was getting 1,292. The story is also true in the Sixth and Seventh Districts where virtually unknown Republicans, without any campaigning, ran more than a respectable vote against two Congressional stalwarts with seniority in Washington.

Jefferson County Judge Marlow Cook emerges as a big factor in the Republican Party for next year, Cooper's victory was buoyed by his majority in Jefferson County, while Republicans in Northern Kentucky County. Cook can justly take credit for the whopping majority Senator Cooper rolled up in Jefferson County. This is a little credit to the Northern Kentucky campaign manager in Cooper's majority. But he must be about the same as it was in the Third but then he can't be. The fact that Frank Chell carried both Kenton and Campbell counties against Snyder, Chell, retiring from the re-elected Fourth District, because he ran up the ticket, was rushed back into the race 48 hours before voting time because of the untimely death of State Senator John J. Moloney who was the nominee.

Cook spoke in all seven congressional districts for Cooper and the party and worked actively for Ford in the Second District. Cook was the party house in Lexington and speaking across the state for the nominees.
His star has not yet shined within the party when it comes to making the choice for the gubernatorial nominee next year. He was vice chairman of the Constitution Revision Assembly, but opposed the document out of what he calls "personal convictions" that "aren't drafted properly."
Some writers here have been projecting that Senator Thurston H. Morton may be induced to run for governor, but it's hard to believe that he would leave his position in the U. S. Senate and national party stature to take a four-year office when he cannot succeed himself.

Central 441 Camp has some 21,000 4-H members as well as many other boys and girls who have the opportunity to benefit from the enjoyable, educational experiences of 4-H camping. In addition, the camp also can be used by other youth and adult groups in the area when 441 Camp is not in session." Ranta noted.

Kentucky's North Central 441 Camp was officially presented to the University of Kentucky at a ceremony in Lexington, Nov. 1, K. K. President John W. Caswell accepted the camp deed from officers of the North-Central 441 Camp Committee. The new camp, located northeast of Carlisle in Nicholas County, was given to the University to use for the UK Cooperative Extension Service's 4-H club program and other related educational activities. Although some funds are needed to complete the camp's facilities, camping materials have been held there for the past two summers. The camp committee, made up of friends of 441 in the 27-county area which the camp serves, has been in charge of raising funds for and supervising the development of the camp. Officers of the committee have been John Perkins, Carroll, chairman; Mrs. Cecil Holt, Georgetown, secretary; and Forness Woodruff, Richmond, treasurer.

The fund-raising campaign, led by the Camp Committee, has brought in thus far some 3/4 of the total \$34,000 needed to complete the camp. The funds have been used to build 71 cabins, a shelter house, a dining room and kitchen, a swimming pool and two bath houses, and a caretaker's house. The camp site includes 344 acres and a small lake.

Nicholas Countyans raised \$29,600 of the total amount. The people of Nicholas County are their fine job of raising this money so the camp could be located in our county. Chairman of this fund-raising drive was Harvey Wagner.

"Camping is one of the highlights of the 4-H year," according to Dr. Ray H. Hays, chairman of UK Extension Youth programs. "It gives 441 youth people experience in group living, specialized training, citizenship and leadership, and a chance to gain new knowledge and make new friends—as well as the fun of camp life."
