Peonies and Iris 1971



Fellow Flower Lovers,

As promised, this catalog issue features the Year of the Peony. While the startling news suggested in our last issue is more academic than tangible, it nonetheless projects a whole new field of development in the widening of

Peony cultivation and enjoyment.

Introduced last year were four Peonies resulting from a cross of an unspecified Lactiflora (vegetative) peony type with the Tree Peony Alice Harding. This mating produced a group of seedlings essentially vegetative in growth habit, but introducing a new type of yellow into the growing range of color in Peonies. Developed in Japan, this accomplishment stimulated American breeders to parallel efforts, and today there are several hybridizers in the United States at work on similar breeding lines.

Fairly early in the American work was the discovery that several other hybrids of P. lutea were also fertile to P. lactiflora, so that the possible range of variety in both color and growth habit has been considerably enhanced. As yet, because of the painfully slow rate of propagation of Peonies, none of the Western varieties are available, but it is safe to say that within five years

there will be many new varieties of the type being offered.

Meanwhile, work on the vegetative hybrids goes on, with new color breaks becoming almost routine. There will also, for several years to come, continue to be improved varieties of lactiflora Peonies offered, of which the three we present this year are an example. Encouragingly, Peony breeders are considering parentage more carefully, and the time is not too distant when, as

with the Iris, few Peonies will be registered without pedigree.

As with Iris, too, more use is being made of previously obscure species, and offerings of F2 and F3 generations involving as many as four or five species are even now available. Some care, I think, need be given to Hybrid adaptability to local climatic conditions, and it would be well to proceed with some caution in selecting Hybrids which will perform well in your particular locality. The best answer here is to visit a Peony specialist, commercial or amateur, in your own area and observe how the various Hybrid varieties perform.

Because propagation is so much quicker and easier with Iris than with Peonies there are literally hundreds of times the number of breeders. Because of this mass effort, a great many more "off-beat" combinations can be and have been attempted, so that a breakthrough comparable to the Peony story is continually less likely. However, it is not improbable that new races of Iris will yet be developed. The advent of the "Aril-med" is a current example, and this area is far from being exhausted. So far, we haven't acquired a representative planting of these new hybrids, but it is certain that we will do so in the next few years.

Iris breeding in all lines continues to increase, with registrations and introductions jumping each year. Comparison of quality and evaluation of new things against proven varieties becomes ever more difficult. Therefore, we are most gratified that our two 1971 introductions have already received the approval of a great number of Judges and Iris fanciers over a wide geographic area, so that you need not be hesitant in selecting them for good performance and as probable further award winning varieties.

We cannot conclude this introduction without a sincere tender of thanks to all of you who thru your orders made the past year a fantastic one in We had no idea that our decision to return to national distribution would so greatly multiply our response, and we were literally overwhelmed in trying to fill your needs. To those of you who experienced delays, lack of communication, shortages or substitutions we offer our sincere apologies. We are making a sincere effort to see that these shortcomings are not duplicated in the coming year, and we do appreciate no end the forbearance that most of you showed toward our past transgressions. Please, if ANY of you feel that you have in any way been "short-changed", write us early and we will make adjustment to your entire satisfaction this season.

In Iris, we have added some 50 or 60 new varieties in all types but mostly in Medians and Spurias, as we think there is more room here for novelty. With Tall Bearded there is increasingly a narrower area of selection, but

perfection has not yet been reached even here, and differences of individual preference will always provide room for new offerings.

On the other hand, we have dropped some 100 varieties from our listing, mostly of the older sorts, and a few newer varieties that just didn't prove adaptable to our growing conditions. Increasing costs—of labor, transportation and packing—have forced us to abandon all prepaid shipments. Our postage table on Page 30 will allow you to predetermine delivered prices, and we will try to include extrast to compensate for the apparent increase in cost we will try to include extras to compensate for the apparent increase in cost to you. So it's really with a great sigh of relief that we say goodbye to the 49c Iris and the 79c Peony—it just doesn't cost us any more per plant to grow and ship the \$1.00 to \$25.00 ones.

This year the National Iris and Peony meetings are about a month apart,

so we hope to have time between them to catch our breath and be on hand to greet you here thru most of the blooming season. Details of both meetings follows, as well as directions to our garden. We do hope you can visit us

this season.

Again, most heartfelt thanks for your orders and general words of encouragement. We wish you the happiest season of bloom in 1971.



HYBRID PEONIES

The new Hybrid Peonies are a special breed. Actually, all Peonies except a few species are hybrids, but until fairly recently they were mostly variants of a single species, P. lactiflora; either from natural mutation and hybridization or by planned crossing of these variants. In late years such noted hybridizers as Prof. A. P. Saunders, Lyman Glasscock, Edward Auten and others secured species from many parts of the world, bred them and produced hybrids which could not have occurred naturally. Some of these have in turn been intercrossed, producing a whole new race of Peonies, introducing a new range of color, plant form and season of bloom for your enjoyment. Most of them are a week to ten days earlier than the lactiflora sorts, and for the most part have only one flower per stem, making them extremely desirable for cutting.

Your postmaster will readily supply your Zone. Then read across the weight line which applies to your order until you come to the applicable zone. This is the amount to add to your remittance. No excess postage will be refunded, but we promise to include extras by way of thanks for your trouble.

Our Instant Credit Plan!

It's simple. If your order totals \$10.00 or more, send us 1/3 of the net amount with your order, together with your account number with any national Credit Card service (Diner's Club, American Express, Bank Americard, major oil company, etc.) We will then bill you at shipping time, adding only actual postage and packing cost. You then pay half of the bill in 30 days and half in 60 days.

Guarantee

All stock is guaranteed true to name, free from disease and of size normal for the variety. Claims should be filed within ten days of receipt if for unsatisfactory stock, 60 days for Iris failing to grow properly, and immediately after the first growing season for stock not true to name or Peonies failing to grow. In all cases, claims should be substantiated by return of the unsatisfactory stock, postpaid. Full replacement or refund at our option, will be made on all claims.

Shipping Dates

Bearded Iris will be shipped from the last week in June thru September. Spuria Iris will be shipped from the last week in August to late October. Peonies will be shipped from the first week in September thru November.

Shipment of Spurias may be combined with other Iris for shipment only late August thru September, or with Peonies from Sept. 1 to mid October. If you want combined shipment, please specify on your order.

Parcel Post Zone Chart

In estimating postage on plant orders, the minimum weight (2 pounds) will cover six Tall Bearded or Spuria Iris, ten Median Iris, or three Peonies. For each additional four Tall or Spuria Iris, six Medians or two Peonies, add one pound of weight.
