

Apocynaceae (Dogbane Family)

Phenology: flowering late April and May, fruiting June through August.

Management Responsibility: Tohono O'odham Nation, BLM (Tucson Field Office), USFWS (Buenos Aires NWR), private.

Similar Species: *A. grandiflora* typically occurs at slightly higher elevations in oak woodlands and is glabrous, its leaves are longer and narrower, its corolla is longer, and its fruits are terete and not constricted between seeds.

Notes: for conservation purposes, a population was introduced into a canyon on the east slope of the Baboquivari Mountains in 1988/89. A substantial decline in this population was noted following floods in 1990. Recent surveys and new locations have broadened the definition of occupied habitats for the species.

Habitat: dry, open, slopes (20-30 degrees) at 4,000-6,000 ft (1220-1830 m) elevation in Madrean evergreen woodland/interior chaparral transition zone and on stable, partially-shaded, coarse alluvium along dry washes at 3,600-3,800 ft (1095-1160 m) elevation under deciduous riparian trees and shrubs in Sonoran desertscrub or desertscrub-grassland ecotone.
