Bishop David Alan Bard has been the presiding bishop of the Michigan Area Conference since September 2016. Bard previously served at First United Methodist Church in Duluth,

Minnesota, starting there in 2005. He has been in ministry for more than 30 years serving both the Minnesota Annual Conference and the General Church.

Stefan Koch and Robert Conway Present Concert in Memory of Bay View Musician Hugo Gottesmann Submitted by Mary Jane Doerr

In honor of longtime Bay View violinist, Hugo Gottesman, cellist Stefan Koch and pianist Robert Conway will present music of Viennese composer Richard Stöhr at 8 p.m., August 27, 2017, in Bay View's Voorhies Hall. The concert is sponsored in part by the Gottesmann family in memory of Elisabeth and



in Gottesmann

Joseph Weber.

Both Gottesmann and Stöhr had to leave Austria in the 1930s due to mounting anti-Semitism. Stöhr was a professor at the famed Vienna Academy of Music and Gottesmann's teacher and colleague. He

eventually settled in Vermont. Gottesmann took a position in Sweden where former Bay View president Bishop Raymond J. Wade arranged visas for him and his wife, Lia. Gottesmann was on the Bay View music staff for 28 years.

Stefan Koch and Robert Conway have recorded two cello and piano works by Stöhr. Their CD was released on Toccata Classics (London, UK) in 2014. For more information,

New Historic Marker Submitted by the Historic Awareness Committee

A new sign has recently been installed on Campus, informing Bay View members and guests more about our rich history. Ever wonder about the big rock and old tree stump? They were class gifts to Bay View from Bay View Reading Circle students, class of 1900 and 1901 respectively. The 15-foot portion of Big Cedar was considered the largest cedar tree in the state of Michigan before it fell in a wind storm in 1896. John M. Hall launched the Bay View Reading Circle in 1893, the program was based on the study of the art, culture, history, and language of one European country each



year. At its height, there were 25,000 members from nearly every state. In 1914, at the time of Hall's death, the Reading Circles numbered 1,600. You can read and see more about BVRC on the new sign in campus.

Bard received a BA from the University of Minnesota, Duluth in 1981; his Master of Divinity was earned at United Theological Seminary, Twin Cities 1984; and in 1994 he received a Ph.D. from Southern Methodist University, with a focus on Christian ethics.

He has been a General and Jurisdictional Conference delegate and an episcopal nominee in both 2004 and 2008.

Within the Minnesota Conference, Bard was chair of the Episcopacy Committee and the Higher Education Ministry Team, and he served on the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Congregational Response Team. He has also served as the conference parliamentarian, a district superintendent, and he spent three years on the Commission on Religion and Race.

Within the General Church, Bard serves on the Study on Ministry Commission, the Committee on Faith and Order, and the North Central Jurisdiction Committee on Episcopacy. He has also served on the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, the Commission on General Conference, and the Commission on Theological Education. Bard and his wife, Julie, have three adult children. In his free time, he enjoys music, reading, baseball, and walking.




Stefan Koch is a member of the Utah Festival Opera in Logan, Utah. He received his musical training at Temple University in Philadelphia,

where he studied with Hirofumi Kanno and Orlando Cole. He holds a Master's Degree in Philosophy from the University of Michigan. He was formerly a national buyer of books and CDs for Borders Books and Music. He now is a member of the Lansing Symphony and the Birmingham-Bloomfield Symphony and a frequent performer with the Ka-

lamazoo Symphony, West Michigan Symphony, Toledo Symphony, Michigan Opera Theatre, and Grand Rapids Symphony. For three years he toured North America with the Carl Rosa Opera Company (London, UK). He has performed with Sarah Brightman, Anne Murray, Barbara Cook, Dionne Warwick and Burt

Bacharach, Steve Lawrence and Eydie Gorme, Garrison Keillor, Dave Brubeck, The Boys Choir of Harlem, Mannheim Steamroller, Bernadette Peters, Amy Grant, the Von Trapp





States as an Artistic Ambassador of the United States Information Agency on tour in South Asia and the Middle East, as well as acting as a Department of State Cultural Envoy to Jamaica and Azerbaijan. As a soloist and chamber musician, he has appeared at numerous national and international festivals, performed concertos with many orchestras, collaborated with prestigious composers, given countless premieres, and is featured on several recordings on a variety of labels. Conway received a bachelor's degree in piano performance from the New England Conservatory and master's and doctoral degrees in piano performance from the University of Michigan. His principal teachers were Theodore Lettvin, Rudolf Kolisch and Eugene Bossart.

Last year, the duo performed at Crooked Tree Art Center under the auspices of Temple B'nai Israel who recommended them to the Bay View Music Festival.
