BRAZIL'S EASTERN AMAZONIA

Brazil's Eastern Amazonia gets better and better, this fourth edition was again a splendid tour through Pará and adjacent States in northern Brazil, with over five hundred species (520) of birds recorded plus thirteen mammals, highlighting this time a shocking sighting of a black Jaguar in front of our bus! A total of 41 genuine Brazilian endemics were seen on this amazing trip, including some of the most amazing Amazonian parrots, raptors, woodpeckers, antbirds, Woodcreepers, flycatchers and Cotingas, plus a final selection with some of the best birds from Northeast Brazil. Some spectacular birds can be easily highlighted at every place we have been birding on this tour, to mention species like Buff-browed Chachalaca, Pale-tailed Barbthroat, Red-necked Aracari, White-winged Parakeet, Sapphire-rumped Parrotlet, White-bellied Parrot, Willis's Antbird, Black-chested Tyrant and Olive Oropendola [bifasciatus] seen near Belém, the state capital;

the marvellous Golden Parakeet and Vulturine Parrot plus White-browed Hawk, a male Crimson Topaz, Gould's Toucanet, Brown-chested and Black-girdled Barbets, Sand-colored Nighthawks, Collared and Spotted Puffbirds, the fascinating Harlequin Antbird, Black-bellied Gnateater, Alta Floresta Antpitta, Snowcapped and Flame-crested Manakins and the stunning White-tailed Cotinga at Amazonia National Park; amazing Dark-winged Trumpeters [dextralis], a young Harpy Eagle on the nest, the rare Kaempfer's Woodpecker, Rufous-necked Puffbird, Cryptic Forest Falcon, the largest Hyacinth Macaw, Pearly Parakeet, the rare Wing-banded Antbird, Curve-billed Scythebill [multostriatus], the mega Peruvian Recurvebill, Pointtailed Palmcreeper, Chestnut-belted and Black-bellied Gnateaters, Amazonian and Snethlage's Antpittas, the fascinating White Bellbird, Guianan Red, Purple-breasted, White-tailed and Spangled Cotingas, the beautiful Opal-crowned Manakin and the shocking black Jaguar at Carajás National Forest; the cute Longtailed Ground Dove, Caatinga Puffbird, Rusty-backed Antwren, Red-billed Scythebill, adorable Campo Troupial, the rare Scarlet-throated Tanager and White-rumped Tanager in Campo Maior; the superb and rare endemic Moustached Woodcreeper, Crescent-chested Puffbird [minor] and Hooded Gnateater at Palmares National Forest near Teresina; and finally Cinnamon-throated (Maranhao) Hermit, the endemic Pectoral Antwren, the undescribed 'Maranhao-Piaui' Pygmy Tyrant, the surprising Smoky-fronted Tody-Flycatcher, Curl-crested Jay, amazing Coal-crested and Blue Finches and the uncommon Blackish-blue Seedeater seen in Caxias.

The fourth edition of Brazil's Eastern Amazonia started on June 19th in Belém, capital of Pará state. Tour started in the afternoon with a light session at the backyard of Hotel Vila Rica next to the airport. A session which provided nice birds like Hook-billed Kite, Spotted Tody-Flycatcher, Short-tailed Swift, Neotropical Palm Swift, Sulphury Flycatcher, the Brazilian endemic Buff-browed Chachalaca, Violaceous Euphonia, Chestnut-backed Antshrike, close views of the handsome White-winged Parakeet, Straight-billed Woodcreeper, Greylined Hawk and Lineated Woodpecker.

June 20th was a full day of birding around Belém. The morning was spent at the good forest from Menino Jesus community, south bank of the large Guamá River, only around 25 minutes from our hotel. The session was very productive where highlights were the rare Black-chested Tyrant, a pair of the localized Willis's Antbird, Yellow-green Grosbeak, the stunning Red-necked Aracari [bitorquatus], Double-toothed Kite, Orange-winged Amazon, Turquoise Tanager, Southern White-fringed Antwren, Grey-chested Greenlet, Blue-backed Manakin, Amazonian Trogon, Striped Woodcreeper, White-shouldered Antshrike, the nice Pale-tailed Barbthroat, Band-tailed Manakin, Helmeted Pygmy Tyrant, several Purple-throated Fruitcrow and a shy pair of uncommon Sapphire-rumped Parrotlet which offered brief views while feeding in a tree canopy. In the afternoon we moved nearby to Gunma Ecological Reserve in Santa Barbará do Pará. It was a holiday and the site was quite full of people but we managed to cover some good forest edge which entertained us with some nice birds, to mention Grey-crowned Flatbill; an ant-swarm with several White-backed Fire-eye, some Black-spotted Bare-eye and the Xingu Scale-backed Antbird; Long-billed Gnatwren, the cute White-browed Purpletuft, Purple Honeycreeper and a nice male Black-throated Trogon. End of the day.

June 21st. We repeated the Menino Jesus community on our final morning of birding in Belém. On this day the bird activity seemed to come later but with some very enjoyable birds such as Little Cuckoo, Moustached Wren, Lettered Aracari, the beautiful Olive (Para) Oropendola [bifasciatus], a pair of Red-necked Woodpecker, White-fronted Nunbird, a gorgeous male Golden-sided Euphonia, Yellow-browed Tody-Flycatcher, Layard's Woodcreeper, Pink-throated Becard, Grey Antwren, Flame-crested Tanager, Double-toothed Kite again and a close group of the lovely White-bellied Parrot. Lunch was at Belém airport before we get our internal flight to Itaituba in western Pará where we arrived close to five pm. Itaituba is located on the west bank of the big Tapajos River and from the airport we met our good local guide Gilberto and drove south about an hour to reach the beautiful riverside at our simple pousada attached to Amazonia National Park. A beautiful sunset closed the day with some White-banded Swallow flying over the river.

We had a very productive birding time during a day and a half around the state capital of Belém. The visited sites include a fine selection of birds not seen anywhere else on the tour. Below some of the photographed species (Eduardo Patrial):

June 22nd. Our first day at Amazonia National Park was one of the bests on the tour. It was simply a superb morning in terra firme forest along Picarreira Trail. Starting with Bar-breasted Piculet, Rondonia Woodcreeper and Fulvous-crested Tanager, the gorgeous Blue-necked Jacamar, Spix's Warbling Antbird, brief looks at Banded Antbird and Plain-throated Antwren; a spectacular lucky moment in a forest clearing where we got the best views of local endemics Brown-chested Barbet and the rare and odd Vulturine Parrot in perfect light, including also a stunning male Gould's Toucanet and group of Red-billed Pied Tanager. The morning session still provided terrific encounters with the most special and local Harlequin Antbird (a couple and youngster), great scope views of the secretive Collared Puffbird in the mid-level forest, plus a number of other fantastic birds such as Cream-colored and Ringed Woodpeckers, White-necked Puffbird, Black-faced Antbird, Great Jacamar, Short-billed Honeycreeper and the charming Snow-capped Manakin. Back to the pousada for lunch, we had time to enjoy the very pleasant view of the Tapajos and some lovely birds like White-banded and Black-collared Swallows, Large-billed and Yellow-billed Terns, Sand-colored Nighthawk (for the first time on the tour seen daytime-roosting next to the lodge), Yellow-crowned Tyrannulet and a tame Yellow-browed Sparrow. The afternoon session at Uruá Base continued delivering some great birds, to mention Natterer's Slaty Antshrike, Spotted Puffbird, a stunning male Flame-crested Manakin, a close group of Black and White Tassel-ear Marmoset, great views of amazing Red-fan Parrot and a little mixed flock with Cinereous and Saturnine Antshrikes and Long-winged Antwrens. End of day was finished with Scarlet Macaw, White-throated Toucan, Bat Falcon and Red-throated Piping Guan. What a day!

June 23rd. On this day we visited in the park the more distant Capelinha trail. On our way we spotted a Lowland Tapir crossing the road. Then at Capelinha trail's entrance we were graced by some Opal-rumped Tanagers and a fabulous male Crimson Topaz which was calling and behaving over the stream; amazing scope views were taken. The trail later wasn't that busy but even so we managed a morning with good records, such as close views of the endemic Alta Floresta Antpitta, plus species like Black-necked Aracari, Elegant and Spot-throated Woodcreepers, Black-throated Trogon, Red-crowned Ant-Tanager, Cinereous and Saturnine Antshrikes, Rufous-tailed Flatbill and our first Black-bellied Gnateater, a shy little jewel. We had a late lunch back at the lodge and nice break to enjoy the garden and the Tapajos. Later in the afternoon we walked most of the Tracoá trail (which goes along the small tributary of same name until the bank of the

Tapajos), always an interesting trail to do. This time it provided Green-tailed Jacamar, Plain-throated and Amazonian Streaked Antwrens, the endemic Glossy Antshrike, glimpses of Ferruginous-backed Antbird and scope views of Santarem Parakeet. Few more birds – Southern Mealy Amazon and Chestnut-fronted Macaw - were spotted on the road before daylight had gone. Later attempt for Zigzag Heron didn't work this time.

June 24th. Morning was spent along Acaizal Trail and roadside next to the Uruá Base. The trail was actually quite slow, being the greatest reward the close views of the uncommon White-browed Hawk. Some of the other birds seen at Açaizal were Black-eared Fairy, Buff-cheeked Greenlet, Long-tailed Woodcreeper, Buffthroated Foliage-gleaner and Brown-winged Schiffornis. The late morning got more interesting when we got back to the roadside, noticing some tanager flocks, more calls and movement. From the road we spotted Bronzy Jacamar, an Amazonian Pygmy Owl that got mobbed by many other birds - Forest Elaenia, Green Honeycreeper, Short-crested Flycatcher, Purple Honeycreeper, Flame-crested and Bay-headed Tanagers, Zimmer's Tody-Tyrant and Natterer's Slaty Antshrike -, also Swallow-tailed and Plumbeous Kites, Black Hawk-Eagle, Short-tailed Pygmy Tyrant and surprisingly great views of the stunning endemic White-tailed Cotinga, an adult male and females as well. In the afternoon we decided to try Golden Parakeet at the kilometre 90, a known roosting site about an hour away from the lodge. Endemic White-crested Guan (two on the road) was spotted on the way. At km 90 all we got from Golden Parakeet was very distant calls, but roadside birding in the area wasn't bad at all, there we got looks at Black-capped Donacobius, Rufescent Tiger Heron, Horned Screamer, Lesser Kiskadee, Channel-billed Toucan, Lettered Aracari, Olive Oropendola, Blackish Antbird, Greyish Mourner, Red-fan Parrot, White-necked Puffbird, Red-billed Pied Tanager, Paradise Jacamar, Double Toothed Kite, Buff-throated Woodcreeper, Scarlet and Red-and-green Macaws, Lineated and Crimson-crested Woodpeckers, Thrush-like Wren, a male Spangled Cotinga, surprisingly some Masked Crimson Tanager, and Yellow-crowned and Orange-winged Amazons flying over.

June 25th was our last full day in Amazonia NP. We supposed to take a boat across the Tapajos in the morning but pilot didn't show up in time so we decided to take our chances doing the whole loop of Gameleira Trail in the Uruá Base. A Luckily the best decision we could take that morning, we finally found a group of Golden Parakeet feeding on fruits of giant Murici trees. Around sixteen birds were present, and some really cooperated with great views through the tall forest. The trail still offered a good selection of birds that morning, with Spotted Puffbird, White-fronted Nunbird, stunning Ferruginous-backed Antbird, Ornate, White-flanked and Ihering's Antwrens, Plain-brown Woodcreeper, Rufous-faced Antbird, Green-backed Trogon, a group of Red-nosed Bearded Saki, Rufous Motmot, Fasciated Antshrike and a pair of Duskychested Flycatcher. Boat trip came later in the afternoon, where from the pousada we enjoyed first the roosting of Sand-colored Nighthawk and the numerous Grey-breasted Martins together. Heading up and across the Tapajos we found a Western Osprey, Pied Plover, Large-billed and Yellow-billed Terns and plenty of White-banded and Black-collared Swallows. At Tapajos east bank, a site called Farias, we had some time in riverine forest and secondary terra firme, which allowed us to see some interesting birds such as Greater Ani, Chestnut Woodpecker, Band-tailed Antbird and a very much welcomed couple of Black-girdled Barbet. From there we took the river edge to see Amazonian Inezia and went down the river to check a river island (Rayol) next to our pousada, an easy site to see the restricted Blackish-grey Antshrike. Both male and female cooperated with good views, plus some Pale-vented Pigeons and few more of the common species. Day was finished with an amazing sunset by the Tapajos.

June 26th was the day we left the Amazonia National Park in the early morning. There was a roadside birding stop at the second bridge (from the lodge to Itaituba), where forest edge produced some good birds such as Tiny Hawk, some White-winged Parakeets, Yellow Tyrannulet, Glossy Antshrike, Buff-breasted Wren and for a second, Collared Forest Falcon perched on a *Cecropia*! Rest of the day was flying to Belém and from there to Serra dos Carajás in eastern Pará, where we landed by the end of daylight. Cliff Flycatcher, White-lined and Silver-beaked Tanagers and Wing-barred Seedeater were spotted at Carajás airport before we drive down the hills to our hotel in Parauapebas.

June 27th. After breakfast and meeting our good local guide Filho, the first day in Carajás National Forest began with the 'New' Trail in the morning near the Carajás village (near km 20). After checking some Redhanded Howler Monkey, the very tall terra firme put fine quality that morning with birds like Chestnut-belted and Black-bellied Gnateaters (better views of Black-bellied), the rare, peculiar but locally abundant Wingbanded Antbird (male and female); plus Rufous-rumped and Rufous-tailed Foliage-gleaners, Buff-throated Woodcreeper, Red-billed Pied, Swallow and Guira Tanagers, Coraya Wren, the endemic Brigida's Woodcreeper and Snethlage's Tody-Tyrant. Lunch time at the village we were lucky to find a pair of Jandaia Parakeet perched next to the restaurant. We had an appropriated time enjoying this stunning parakeet. In the afternoon we first visited the Carajás Zoo-botanical Park, a good area to be done during the heat of the day. There we got nice views of Amazonian Scrub Flycatcher, White-crested Guan, Bare-faced Curassow, Santarem Parakeet, Guianan Tyrannulet, Masked Tanager, Layard's Woodcreeper, close White Hawk, White-throated Woodpecker, Slaty-capped Shrike-Vireo, Screaming Piha, Violaceous Euphonia, Whitefronted Nunbird and a female White-tailed Cotinga. Then later in forests at the village we managed to locate the usually shy Marbled Wood Quail, also Amazonian Barred (Xingu) Woodcreeper [retentus], the endemic Chestnut-headed Chachalaca, Black-necked Aracari, Green Oropendola, another Bare-faced Curassow, King Vulture and Yellow-bellied and Wing-barred Seedeaters before sun goes down and finish the day.

June 28th. On this day we visited the amazing foothills of Carajás near the Itacaiunas River, a road known as Pojuca and which comprises good stands of bamboo. Chestnut-fronted Macaw and Horned Screamer were seen on our arrival. Pojuca road made justice in the early morning providing us Ruddy Spinetail, Ornate Antwren, Red-and-green Macaw, a shy Para Foliage-gleaner, amazing views of the rare Peruvian Recurvebill, the special Black-and-white Tody-Flycatcher, Eastern Striolated Puffbird [torridus], the secretive Amazonian Antpitta and Chestnut-crowned Foliage-gleaner, King Vulture, a brief Dot-backed Antbird, adorable Rufous-capped Nunlet and the uncommon localized endemic Pearly Parakeet [anerythra]. By late morning we transferred ourselves to the bank of Itacauinas River to have our lunch box. Unexpected stop

put us outside the bus to see three Hyacinth Macaws in a beautiful tree. We had pleasant scope looks at them, such an amazing bird. Lunch time at the river bank was killed exceptionally well, watching some White-banded Swallows, Greater Yellow-headed Vultures, Dusky-capped Flycatcher, Swallow-winged Puffbirds, the bamboo specialist Manu Antbird, Blackish and White-browed Antbirds and a very cooperative Black-chested Tyrant. The afternoon session happened just beside our lunch site at the Castanheira Trail, a new one recently opened in the area. Our time there was certainly a little slower but not bad at all. We had good views of endemic Spix's Woodcreeper, a couple of Rose-breasted Chat and after trying for a long time, finally a mega view of the shy Cryptic Forest Falcon to finish this brilliant day in Carajás.

June 29th. In the morning of this day we went close to the Parauapebas River track, just beyond the main gate of the National Forest. In general the place was quiet but as general we always manage to see few good things, to mention Slaty-headed Tody-Flycatcher, Cinnamon-throated and Black-banded Woodcreepers, Black Caracara, Band-tailed Manakin and a very shy Snethlage's Anpitta (which gave us hard work and a long time standing in deep forest to see it). Lunch happened uphill at the Carajás Village and from there we went to the distant Águas Claras area, making a quick roadside stop near the 'Canga' (savanna) N1, a site where we saw the simply aberrant male White Bellbird and few more goodies like White-winged Shrike-Tanager and the uncommon Yellow-shouldered Grosbeak. Finally later in the Águas Claras area, the endemic Opal-crowned Manakin took us more than an hour to get good views of a bright male, for sure we could wait longer to see that small gem. Another good one in the same area was the uncommon Blackish Pewee. Staying there until dusk we also managed few sightings of the uncommon Silkytailed Nightjar, first perched a bit distant, later flying over the clearing. We even tried for few more night species but had no luck that evening.

June 30th. The morning of this day was spent in the forest next to the 'Canga' N1. Mostly roadside birding brought us a good number of birds that morning, including species like Guira, Swallow and Flame-crested Tanagers, Dusky-capped Greenlet, Blue Dacnis, Waved Woodpecker, White Bellbird (at the usual perch!), Spotted Tanager, Amazonian Barred (Xingu) Woodcreeper, Rothschild's Grosbeak, Blue-necked Jacamar, Black-necked Aracari, Rufous-rumped Foliage-gleaner, White-winged Shrike-Tanager, Bay-headed Tanager, Buff-throated Saltator, Red-stained Woodpecker, a stunning male Purple-breasted Cotinga, White Hawk, King Vulture, Double-toothed Kite and White-browed Purpletuft. Lunch was again at the Carajás Village, followed by an afternoon session along the New Trail (near km 20). Trail was quiet (as expected) and we saw Chestnut-belted Gnateater, Screaming Piha, one Marbled Wood Quail (for some), a very brief Wingbanded Antbird and closely only heard some Dark-winged Trumpeters which despite all efforts, we just couldn't see them through the dense forest. End of the day.

July 1st. Back to the bamboo-rich foothill forest (near Pojuca), this time doing the track Grota Funda in the early morning. A nesting pair of Hyacinth Macaw welcomed us to that exceptionally rewarding morning. It happened when we entered the first bamboo clump, where a close call paralysed me just like a fright, the mythical Kaempfer's Woodpecker was there right next to us. And happily we got the best advantage from that, the bird quickly attended the tape perching on a single bamboo totally in open view. So happy to count on luck with this bird in Carajás this time, it was simply wonderful views of it. The Grota Funda still provided that morning Bare-faced Curassow, Blue-headed Parrot, superb views of the uncommon bamboo favouring Chestnut-throated Spinetail and more of Pearly Parakeet (!!!), Santarem Parakeet, Red-and-green Macaw, Spix's Warbling Antbird, Turquoise Tanager, Plain-winged Antshrike, Trush-like Wren, Grey-lined Hawk and surprisingly good views of a Curve-billed (Xingu) Scythebill [multostriatus]. By mid-morning we drove first for a brief stop on the Itacaiunas riverbank. Searching for Pavonine Cuckoo this time we found some Scaled Doves, a nice Dusky-billed Parrotlet and a male Chestnut-bellied Seed Finch in that place. From there, still in the morning and across the Itacaiuna River into the Tapirapé-Aquiri National Forest (linked to Carajás), we birded good forest on a dirt road next to the Salobo project. It was warm but gain came with splendid looks at Poin-tailed Palmcreeper and the shy Rufous-necked Puffbird. We have also encountered with Yellowthroated Woodpecker, Fasciated Antshrike, Grey Antwren, Red-throated Caracara and Epaulet Oriole. A later lunch box was taken by the riverbank again, this time accompanied by Rufous-tailed Jacamar, Brownchested Martin, White-banded and White-winged Swallows, Little Cuckoo, White-throated Woodpecker, endemic Glossy Antshrike and Cinnamon Attila. Rest of the day we did all the way to the river on the new

Castanheira Trail, having very few birds like Sunbittern, Great Black Hawk and common Black-fronted Nunbirds. Day finished with our drive back to Parauapebas.

July 2nd was another memorable day on the tour. We went early to the far Águas Claras Road, getting to the right place at right time for the unreal colours of a male Guianan Red Cotinga. Not bad starting the day with that amazing RED! And predicting the birds we wanted in that place, we saw well Para Foliage-gleaner (who was giving a hard time) and even better, a small group of the fascinating and most-wanted Dark-winged Trumpeter [dextralis] behaving calmly in a corner on the edge of the road. It was still early and we could not ask for more. Perhaps we could and next mission that morning was driving to the deep Igarapé Bahia area to visit a Harpy Eagle's nest. And it certainly got more exciting when a BLACK Jaguar crossed the road right in front our bus on our long way to the nest. Just unreal! It was guick and only some of us saw that massive cat looking aside to the bus (not a friendly look) and disappearing on the other side of the road. That was quite shocking! Then at noon at Igarapé Bahia we finally had our walk downhill to approach the eagle nest. Besides the beautiful young Harpy Eagle we closely saw on the nest, the session also provided Pied Puffbird, Screaming Piha, another male Opal-crowned Manakin, Slate-colored Grosbeak and a Laughing Falcon. On the long drive back later in the afternoon we still enjoyed some more birds stopping near the Águas Claras, a place where we finished the day with White Hawk, Spangled and White-tailed Cotingas (males and females), Dusky-chested and Boat-billed Flycatchers, Black-faced Dacnis, Green Honeycreeper and the smart Masked Tanager. What a day!

July 3rd. Our last session in Carajás occurred uphill with a morning visit to the trail Lagoa da Mata. The weather was kind of grey that morning and forest was quiet. We got Long-tailed Hermit, better views of Brigida's Woodcreeper, surprisingly two chicks of Brazilian Tinamous (probably nesting near the trail), a roosting Great Potoo, Cinreous Mourner, Red-headed Manakin and Pectoral Sparrow. A little later at the lake's clearing we had more species such as Lesser Kiskadee, Rusty-margined Flycatcher, Swallow-winged Puffbird, Scarlet-shouldered Parrotlet (flight views), Least Grebe, Santarem Parakeet, Masked Tanager, a displaying Green Oropendola and Rufous-sided and Russet-crowned Crakes. After lunch we had the drive to Marabá with some of the big water birds seen on the journey – Wood Stork, Horned Screamer, Cocoi Heron, etc. Night in Marabá to get our flight to Teresina in the next morning.

Carajás is undoubtedly one of the best places for birding in the Eastern Amazon, offering a bunch of rare and endemic species (Eduardo Patrial):





July 4th began very early with our flight to Teresina (capital of Piauí state), followed by the drive to Campo Maior where we arrived near ten thirty am. Still before lunch we had time to check two interesting lakes in the town that provided a new array of birds after two weeks in the Amazon, like a bunch of Purple and Common Gallinules, also Pied-billed and Least Grebes, Limpkin, White-headed Marsh Tyrant, Masked and Blackbacked Water Tyrants, Yellow-chinned Spinetail, White-faced Whistling Duck, Brazilian Teal, Snail Kite, Chestnut-capped Blackbird, a nice male Lined Seedeater and the endemics Band-tailed Hornero and Caatinga Cacholote. Like in the last year, the afternoon of birding was next to the town at the nice 'carnaubal' habitat and gallery forest from Surubim River. It wasn't so warm that day so the session was extremely pleasant and with some really nice birds, to mention a small group of Long-tailed Ground Doves, the striking endemics Campo Troupial and Red-cowled Cardinal, several Picui and Scaled Ground Doves, Peach-fronted Parakeet, Narrow-billed Woodcreeper, endemics Pale Baywing and Caatinga Puffbird, the amazing Red-billed Scythebill, several Orange-headed Tanager, Stripe-necked Tody-Tyrant, Rusty-backed Spinetail, Hooded Tanager, the adorable endemic Spotted Piculet, Glittering-throated Emerald, Ashy-headed Greenlet, endemic Long-billed Wren, Pale-legged Hornero, a group of Scarlet-throated Tanager (amazing record this time of this rare and nomadic NE endemic), Lesser Yellow-headed Vulture, Savanna Hawk, the lovely Chotoy Spinetail, Black-throated Saltator, Blue-winged Parrotlet, endemic White-throated Seedeater and at dusk close views of Band-tailed Nighthawk and Paurague. Dinner and overnight was at convenient hotel in Campo Maior.


July 5th. Leaving Campo Maior in the early morning towards Teresina, we had a first stop in 'carnaubal' and Cerrado habitats next to Raposo River, an interesting road where we got great views of a couple Whiterumped Tanager, Suiriri Flycatcher, plus Spotted Nothura, Lineated Woodpecker, Plain-breasted and Longtailed Ground Doves, Plain-crested and Lesser Elaenias, Southern Scrub Flycatcher, an immature Whitenaped Xenopsaris, Grey Pileated Finch, a stunning pair of Rusty-backed Antwren and White Woodpecker. At about seven am we drove then to visit the good Palmares National Forest in Altos, already close to Teresina. Our mid-morning there in the deciduous forest was again outstanding having seen all endemic targets we wanted: Hooded Gnateater, Crescent-chested Puffbird [minor], the rare Moustached Woodcreeper and Ochre-backed Woodpecker. Views of the Gnateater, male and female so close, and the pair of Moustached Woodcreeper, were unbelievable. Mobbing calls brought few more species as Ferruginous Pygmy Owl, Ochre-lored Flatbill, Guira and Hooded Tanagers, Chestnut-vented Conebill, Pale-legged Hornero and Glittering-throated Emerald. Then from the National Forest we drove another hour or so to Caxias in Maranhão state, where we had lunch and check-in at hotel. Afternoon in Caxias became with forest, a private property next to the town. There we spent a good time until finding our main target in the forest canopy, the poorly known and still undescribed 'Maranhao-Piaui' Pygmy Tyrant (Myiornis sp.). Rest of afternoon was spent in more typical Cerrado (between few rocky mounds) on road to Aldeias Altas, where we had a great end with some of the finest Cerrado species such as a bunch of amazing Coal-crested Finch, nice looks at Curl-crested Jay and the most-wanted male (and female) Blue Finch (which was necessary a good teamwork to see it well:). Some other birds we saw in this nice Cerrado include Plain-crested Elaenia, Southern Scrub Flycatcher, Red-winged Tinamou (flushed!), Grassland Sparrow, Red Tanager, Aplomado Falcon and Least Nighthawk. It was another day on the tour to rank among the bests.

July 6th. We visited in the early morning the Cerrado gallery forest of Inhamum Reserve next to Caxias, a site we went early mainly to check if Bearded Bellbird was already calling this time of the year, but unfortunately it didn't happen this time. There we didn't stay long and all we got was brief looks at Grey-headed Kite (for some), Neotropical Palm Swifts, Squirrel Cuckoo and Olivaceous Woodcreeper. From there we drove out of Caxias to the road towards Coelho Neto where we covered good dense and tall Cerrado type of habitat. We have been visiting this area since the first Eastern Amazonia and we like it! There we finish the morning with several goodies such as Southern White-fringed, Black-capped and endemic Pectoral Antwrens, Ochrecheeked Spinetail, Rufous-tailed Jacamar, Planalto Slaty Antshrike, amazing views of Cinnamon-throated (Maranhao) Hermit; a surprising Buff-browed Chachalaca, Pale-bellied Tyrant-Manakin, Blue-crowned Trogon, Moustached Wren, Caatinga Puffbird and for the first time the uncommon Smoky-fronted Tody-Flycatcher. In the afternoon we did a late afternoon and evening walk on the forest trail of Inhamum Reserve. After hearing about a Buff-fronted Owl record in Caxias we decided (without knowing the right place) to take our chances there. Like in the morning, the forest was pretty quiet. Daylight records include Burnished-buff

Tanager, Grey Elaenia and Planalto Woodcreeper [*intermedius*]. Night birding provided only Common Potoo. Rufous Nightjar was heard close but not seen. No sign either of the Owl.

July 7th. The final session on the tour happened near Caxias in forest reach in bamboo. Our main target that morning was the uncommon Blackish-blue Seedeater which after a good searching and attempts with tapes we finally found a responsive male that offered perfect views and good recordings too. Few more were noticed in the forest that morning like Crimson-crested Woodpecker, endemic Hooded Gnateater and the new 'Maranhao-Piaui' Pygmy-Tyrant. We also checked a private lake before getting back to the hotel. Some Social Flycatchers, Yellow-chevroned Parakeets previously common species showed up there. We said good-bye to Caxias after an early lunch, returning to Teresina airport to get our respective connecting flights. That finished another fabulous e very successful tour Brazil's Eastern Amazonia!

Some great Northeast Brazil endemics and a very pleasant contrast found in Piauí and Maranhão states to finish this great tour. We visited beautiful habitats such as 'carnaubal', typical and tall Cerrado and rich deciduous and gallery forests (Photos from Eduardo Patrial and thankfully to tour participant David Williamson (DW):



Blue-grey Tanager *Thraupis episcopus* Common in the Amazonian part.

Palm Tanager *Thraupis palmarum* Very common on the tour.

Turquoise Tanager Tangara mexicana Belem, ANP and Carajás.

Spotted Tanager *Tangara punctata* Quite common at Carajas.

Bay-headed Tanager Tangara gyrola ANP and Carajás NF.

Masked Tanager Tangara nigrocincta Good views at Carajás NF.

Opal-rumped Tanager Tangara velia Seen well at ANP.

Swallow Tanager Tersina viridis Carajás NF.

Black-faced Dacnis Dacnis lineata ANP and Carajas.

Blue Dacnis Dacnis cayana Common on the tour.

Short-billed Honeycreeper *Cyanerpes nitidus* A good one at ANP. **Purple Honeycreeper** *Cyanerpes caeruleus* Seen near Belem and at ANP. **Green Honeycreeper** *Chlorophanes spiza* ANP and at Carajás NF.
