What is National Board Certification?

The National Board for Professional Teaching Standards (NBPTS) is a national standards board that defines and recognizes accomplished teaching across different subject areas. Educators seeking National Board Certification undertake a process in which they demonstrate accomplished teaching by completing four components:

Component 1 • Content Knowledge

Component 2 • Differentiation in Instruction

Component 3 • Teaching Practice and Learning Environment

Component 4 • Effective and Reflective Practitioner

What is the CA National Board Incentive Program?

That California State Budget allocated \$250,000,000 to attract and retain National Board Certified Teachers in high-priority schools, defined as schools with 55 percent or more of its pupils classified as an English learner, foster youth, or eligible for free or reduced-price meal.

The program awards incentive grants of up to \$25,000, paid in \$5,000 installments, to any teacher who has attained National Board Certification and commits to teaching in a high-priority school for five years. The program also awards subsidies of \$2,500, paid in two installments, to teachers at high-priority schools who initiate the National Board Certification process.

What Support is Available for Candidates?







The <u>National Board Resource Center at Stanford</u> offers an online support group open to candidates from any certificate area, school type, or geographic location, and candidates are welcome to join at any time. The program costs \$400/year.

<u>UCLA National Board Certification Support</u> offers candidate support from National Board Certified Teachers and professional learning facilitators. Participants meet virtually and costs are variable depending on which components candidates pursue.

The <u>UTLA/LAUSD National Board Support Network</u> is dedicated to providing assistance to National Board candidates as they embark in the certification process. Using a network model, teachers work with one another to demonstrate their practice is aligned with NBPTS standards.
