Heliocarpus popayanensis Kunth Syn. H. americana var. popayanensis

Family: Tiliaceae

Description: Tall tree with young branches hairy. Leaves ovate to heart-shaped, 1 ft long by 7 inches wide, 3-lobed, 5–7 prominent veins, hairy, margins finely serrated, apex acutely pointed. Petioles 3 inches long. Flowers pale yellow in terminal clusters of up to 20 blossoms. Fruits are capsules covered with feathery bristles. Seeds ovoid, 0.1 inch long. Name *helios*, sun; *karpos*, fruit for fruit with radiating bristles^(59,70); *popayanensis*, after Popayan, Colombia.

Distribution: Native range Mexico to Argentina. Introduced by Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association and used in reforestation projects before 1930. Planted and naturalized on Kaua'i; Tantalus, O'ahu; and Waiakea, Hawai'i^(59, 70).



Environmental impact: Grows rapidly and spreads readily in disturbed wetter mesic forests⁽⁵⁹⁾.

Management: No work reported.
