performed








# SEPTEMBER - LITTLE FOREST CENTRE

- 6. Does your culture experience racism or prejudice? How would you handle these issues if you are challenged with them?

The purpose of the questionnaire was to create relationships and build bonds amongst our learners and to discover something new about their peers. This was a great success, and it was such a pleasure to see our learners meeting new people and understanding the differences that make our nation so unique.

In August, our goal was to create awareness on the continued issues with Gender Based Violence in South Africa. In addition, we wanted to highlight the plight of underprivileged females in the broader community by supporting the sanitary pad community service initiative. Together, we collected and donated over 150 packs of sanitary pads. To create awareness for Gender Based Violence and to show our support, we asked the learners to participate in a silent protest on 12 August outside the Galaxy Hall. This protest exceeded our expectations; our learners made posters to express their opinions and concerns and we could not be prouder of their efforts.
