Lineworker Appreciation Day is April 11... Lineworkers are the power behind your power

You've likely noticed Eastern Iowa REC's crews out and about, working on power lines and other electrical equipment in our community. It's no secret that a lineworker's job is tough—but it's a job that's essential and must be done, often in challenging conditions. As we celebrate Lineworker Appreciation Day on April 11, here are some interesting facts about electric lineworkers.

The work can be heavy, in more ways than one. Did you know the equipment and tools that a lineworker carries while climbing a utility pole can weigh up to 50 pounds? That's the same as carrying six gallons of water. Speaking of utilpoles, lineworkers are ity required to climb poles ranging anywhere from 30 to 120 feet tall. Needless to say, if you have a fear of heights, this likely isn't the career path for you.

Lineworkers must be committed to their career--because it's not just a job, it's a lifestyle. The long hours and ever-present danger can truly take a toll. In fact, being a lineworker is listed in the top 10 most dangerous jobs in the U.S.

Lineworkers often work non-traditional hours, outdoors in difficult conditions. While the job does not require a college degree, it does require

technical skills, years of training and hands-on learning. Did you know that becoming a journeyman lineworker can take more than 7,000 hours of training (or about four years)? That's because working with high-voltage equipment re- quires specialized skills, experience and an ongoing mental toughness. Shortcuts are not an option, and there is no room for error in this line of work.

Despite the many challenges, Eastern Iowa REC's lineworkers are committed to approximately 120,000 elec-

powering our local community. During severe weather events that bring major power outages, lineworkers are among the first ones called. They must be ready to leave the comfort of their home and families unexpectedly, and they don't return until the job is done, often days later. That's why the lineworker's family is also dedicated to service. They understand the importance of the job to the community.

tric lineworkers. Eastern Iowa REC has 36 lineworkers that are responsible for keeping power flowing 24/7, 365 days a year. To do this, they maintain more than 4,800 miles of power lines across all or parts of 12 counties. In addition to the highly visible tasks lineworkers perform, their job today goes far beyond climbing utility poles to repair a wire. Today's lineworkers are information experts who can pinpoint power outages from miles away. Line crews now use laptops, tablets and other technologies to map outages, survey damage and troubleshoot problems. 100694801

Being a lineworker may not seem like a glamorous job, but it is absolutely essential to the life of our community. Without the exceptional dedication and commitment of these hardworking men and women, we simply would not have the reliable electricity that we need for everyday life.


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Director nomination deadline is near Anyone seeking to run for a position on the Eastern Iowa

REC Board of Directors has about two weeks to submit their initial nomination paperwork. Potential director candi-

dates are asked to submit an address verification form. This will enable the Cooperative to ensure the potential candidate is eligible to run within the district they indicate on the form.

Information regarding qualifications to seek election, director compensation and the district boundary map can be found on the Cooperative's website, www.easterniowa. com under the "My Co-op" tab, Director Elections or call 1-800-728-1242 to request the information. 11008103 The next step is for the candidate to complete a petition signed by at least 15 memberships of their district by April 1. All candidates who submit qualifying petitions will then be asked to fill out a brief biographical form and return it to the Cooperative by May 16. This information will be used for the candidate profiles which will be published in the June issue of the Current *News*. All profiles will be published verbatim, as submitted.



The nomination process

This nomination process in no way screens or filters potential candidates for seats on the Cooperative's board. Anyone who successfully completes the nomination papers and meets qualifica-tions as described will be placed on the ballot.

All candidates should note the time requirements of a director are more than just the 12 monthly meetings. Directors should be prepared to devote an average of 25-30 days per year to Cooperative business-related activities.

puts no limit on the number of candidates in a given district.

To serve on the board: \checkmark A candidate must hold an active membership and be a bonafide resident in the district he or she is to represent. \checkmark A candidate cannot be in any way employed by or financially interested in a competing enterprise or business selling electric energy or supplies to the Cooperative, or a business primarily engaged in selling electrical or plumbing appliances, fixtures or supplies to the members of the Cooperative. \checkmark No close relative of a candidate, as defined by board policy, can be employed by the Cooperative.

All candidates, who complete the nomination process, will be profiled in the June Current News prior to district meetings.

At this time, one board seat is up for election in each of the five Cooperative districts. The elections will be held during the 2022 district meetings.

The incumbent directors whose terms expire in 2022 are: Kurt Olson, district 1; Allan Duffe, district 2; Nancy Varner, district 3; Tom Hotz, district 4; and Kathy Wunderlich, district 5.

This Spring: Watch ditch fires and call before you dig

Eastern Iowa REC is asking for extra sets of eyes to look for potentially dangerous situations this spring--ditch fires.

It is that time of year, when many may be burning the weeds and grass in roadside ditches. This burning can help "clean things up," but it can also cause a great deal of trouble if the fire is allowed to burn around Cooperative poles, guy wire anchors or underground cable cabinets.

Uncontrolled fires endanger lives, damage electrical facilities and cause unnecessary interruptions in electric service. Please take care when burning ditches and keep fires away from all electrical facilities.


Other potential safety haz-

ards are signs, reflectors and other items attached to power poles. Please do not nail, staple or post any kind of material on utility poles.

This is also the time of year people begin preparations for their spring landscaping plans. You might not think twice before you push that shovel into the ground.

In many areas, homes are served by underground electric lines. If you cut into a line, not only will you probably interrupt service to your home, but you could also receive a serious shock!

Improve household energy efficiency by getting your ducts in a row

Q: My HVAC system is a mystery to me. What can I do to maintain it and keep my *home comfortable year-round?*

A: For most people, the inner workings of the HVAC system are out of sight, out of mind. The system is ignored until something goes wrong.

Understanding the basics of how a heating and cooling system works will help you create a more efficient, comfortable living space. To get started, let's go over how it works.

If you have a forced air system, you have ducts. A forced air system consists of the equipment that heats or cools the air and the ductwork that moves it around the home.

Your furnace, or air handler, has a fan inside that pushes the heated or cooled air through the supply ducts into the rooms. The return ducts bring air back to the furnace to be heated or cooled again and sent back through the home.

This continuous loop of supply and return is susceptible to inefficient practices and leakage.

Here are some steps you can take to keep your system running efficiently and maintain a leak, you are wasting energy.

comfortable living space. Make sure the air you paid

to heat or cool is freely moving through the home.

I wish vents were made without dampers because the feature creates the misconception they should be closed. Closing registers does not save energy. It can cause your system to work harder, shortening its lifespan and increasing duct leakage.

If you don't do anything else after you read this, do check that your supply register dampers are open and not blocked by furniture or rugs throughout your home. This is easy to do and costs nothing.

If your ductwork travels through an attic, crawl space or other unconditioned-not heated or cooled-space, it could have holes, cracks or gaps that cause duct leakage.

This wastes energy and money by heating or cooling spaces you don't use.

The U.S. Department of Energy estimates 20% to 30% of the air moved through duct systems is lost due to duct leakage. You could have the most efficient heating or cooling unit available, but if your ducts

In addition to wasted energy, leaky ducts can cause air-quality issues. Leaks in the return ducts can pull air into the ducts from surrounding spaces, through the furnace and then deliver it into the home. This can introduce dust, dirt, insulation particles and other gross stuff that is in your attic, crawl space or walls.

Sealing ducts can be difficult because they are hidden behind the walls, floor and/or heating and cooling efficiency. ceiling. Attics and crawl spaces can be hard places to work. You can hire a professional to test your duct system for leakage with specialized equipment and seal your ducts.

If you seal ducts yourself, do not use duct tape. I know it is hard to believe, but duct tape dries out quickly and loses its adhesion. Seal with metal tape or duct mastic specifically designed for the job.

One relatively easy place to seal is where the duct meets the floor, wall or ceiling. Remove the registers and look for cracks or gaps around the edges. Remember to wear gloves to protect your hands.

The filter is on the return side of the duct system. It could be in the return registers or in the furnace. Checking your system's filter regularly and replacing it when dirty can help you improve your

When it comes to filters, my philosophy is buy cheap and replace often. I don't know about you, but I have a much more difficult time throwing away a \$20 filter than a \$5 filter. Save by buying filters in bulk or set up auto ship for every three months.

In most cases, filters are designed to protect the furnace, not improve air quality. If you are worried about your home's air quality, getting the ducts cleaned and sealed can help. Add an air purifier if you need additional air filtration.

You can apply immediately for the 2021-2022 Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP).

This program is funded through the Iowa Department of Human Rights, and has been established to help qualifying families meet home heating costs. Qualifying Iowa residents can submit applications until April 30, 2022.

Low-income Iowa homeowners and renters can obtain assistance to help pay for a portion of their primary heat-ing costs through LIHEAP.

The assistance is based on household income, size, type of fuel used to heat the home and type of housing.

One of the legislative priorities for Iowa's electric cooperatives this session is dealing with an issue created in 2018 when the Legislature tackled significant tax policy by passing a bill that included a new sales and use tax rate of 6% on digital products and software. This bill included an exemption covering for-profit companies and some non-profits. Electric cooperatives, which are non-profit and owned by those they serve, were unintentionally left out of this exemption.

As a result, for the last three years, rural Iowans have been paying higher taxes through their energy bills than urban and suburban residents. The Iowa Association of Electric Cooperatives estimates that the total increase is approaching \$1 million in additional taxes on rural lowans, based on an unintended consequence of the 2018 law.

Iowa's electric cooperatives are asking the Iowa Legislature to support HF 2520 which solves this rural-urban tax inequality by putting rural electric cooperative members in the same sales tax status as their urban/suburban counterparts. Simply because a person lives in rural Iowa should not mean that taxes on their utilities be higher than those who live in population-rich areas.

In addition to advocating for the best interest of the Cooperative membership with our legislators, electric cooperatives are structured to be accountable, transparent and locally responsive to the communities we serve. Your attendance at the Cooperative's district and annual meetings are ways Cooperative leaders receive direct feedback from members.

Cooperatives are locally governed with an elected board that actively participate in setting policies and making long-term decisions.

This local business structure has been at the heart of Eastern Iowa REC since the very beginning. We work hard to hold open and fair director elections and we make sure our directors receive cooperative training and education so they can make informed decisions and manage fiduciary responsibilities on your behalf.

We also work to keep all members informed about the co-op through several communication channels, including the Cooperative newsletter Current News, social media posts on Facebook, our website www.easterniowa.com and monthly bill messages. An informed and educated membership is in our best interest as a locally owned cooperative.

An entire section of our website is dedicated to sharing Cooperative information with our members.





The first key to developing a power restoration plan is to ensure the Cooperative has collected all outage details. This is done by evaluating the calls received from Cooperative members.

When a storm strikes, crews immediately begin the restoration process. Repairs are made at the substations first, followed by major feeder lines, branch lines off the feeder lines and then individual service lines. 14145805 The last portion of the plan, dealing with individual outage situations, can take the greatest amount of time. During that stage, crews move house-tohouse making repairs. With



You can use SmartHub® to report power outages

SmartHub[®] can be used for more than just managing your Eastern Iowa REC account or paying your bill. You can also report a power outage using SmartHub®.

This can be done through both the SmartHub® website at www.easterniowa.com or by using the SmartHub® Mobile App.

When using the SmartHub® website, after logging in to your SmartHub[®] account there is a button in the top right corner of the screen that says "Report an Issue/Inquiry".

Click this button and choose "Power Outage". Your account number will appear. If you have more than one account, be sure to have the correct account selected, then choose an outage description. If none of the descriptions fit your outage situation, choose the most fitting one and please add additional comments. Click "Continue".

Creamy Beef Tips with Egg Noodles

- 2 lbs. sirloin tips, cubed ¹/₂ yellow onion, chopped 2 (10.75 oz.) cans condensed cream of mushroom soup 1 C. milk
- $\frac{1}{2}$ C. red wine 1 (1.25 oz.) package beef with onion soup mix
- 2 (16 oz.) packages egg noodles

Heat a large skillet over medium-high heat. Saute beef sirloin tips with onion in the hot skillet until beef is browned, about 5 minutes. Stir cream of mushroom soup, milk, red wine, and beef with onion soup mix together in a bowl, pour into the skillet, and stir to coat beef in the soup mixture; bring to a simmer, reduce heat to low, place a cover on the skillet, and cook until the beef tips are tender, about 2 hours. Reduce heat to lowest setting and continue cooking until the beef pulls apart easily with a fork, at least 4 hours more. Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil. Cook egg noodles in the boiling water, stirring occasionally until cooked through but firm to the bite, about 5 minutes. Drain. Ladle beef tips mixture over egg noodles.

Add peanuts to pan; saute until fragrant, about 2 minutes. Remove from heat; cool slightly. Combine peanuts, soy sauce, sambal oelek, sugar, garlic, and ginger in a mini food chopper; process until finely ground. Cook pork and salt in a wok over medium-high heat until no longer pink, stirring to crumble, about 8 minutes. Add peanut mixture and 3/4 cup cooking liquid to pork; bring to a boil. Cook for 1 minute, stirring frequently. Add pork mixture, cucumber, green onions, cilantro, and lime juice to noodles; toss well. Serve.


