#### PART II—PROCEEDINGS

Hours of 9-12 a m. were made the time of meeting and adjournment.

## Part III—Reports of Boards, Committees, Etc.

#### BOARD OF MISSIONS-REPORT NO. 1.

We ask your concurrence in our recommendations to the Bishop presiding that he appoint Rev. Ira S. Patterson, Conference Missionary Secretary, (as provided for in Par. 289 of the Discipline); Rev. C. H. Summers, be appointed Conference Missionary, under the direction of the Board and supported by it (as provided for in Par. 291 of the Discipline); that Rev. J. S. Chapman be appointed Conference Evangelist under the direction of the Board, but not supported by it (as provided for in Par. 286 of the Discipline): that Rev. W. G. Fletcher be appointed to Army Y. M. C. A. work (as provided for in Par. 121 of the Discipline).

We endorse and recommend as Evangelists, (as provided for in Par. 286 of the Discipline) the following local preachers: Rev. John B. Culpepper, Rev. Will H. McLeod, Rev. Frank P. McCall, Rev. Sam A. McCook, Rev. Amandus D. Buck, Rev. T. E. York, and Rev. C. M. Dunaway.

#### Report No. 2.

With thanksgiving your Board of Missions reports a year of unparalleled labors and achievements. Our very successes create for us a new responsibility and bring to us a sense of humility and need for a new consecration of prayer life.

There has been a most healthy growth every way in the interest in missions, and a large increase over last year in the amount of money raised for missions, not including the Centenary contributions.

#### Conference Missions and Missionaries

For the year 1919, the Board supported fifty-eight (58) Conference Missions, and the number of these for the ensuing year has been increased to sixty-one (61). Thus it will be seen that the demands of the field do not decrease, but increase.

Our missionaries, both the members of the Conference, and the supplies, have labored faithfully, and the result of their labors will be seen in the tabulated reports. These missions and missionaries contributed their full share to the success of the Centenary in all of its phases. The missionaries have been required to make reports quarterly to the Board. These reports have been first sent to the residing Elder of the district for his approval, and when approved by him have become the basis for payment of the appropriation to the missionary. This policy has so fully vindicated itself to the Board as to make its continuance permanent. Likewise, it places the missionary on a level with the missionaries on the foreign field. And consideration as any other of our missionaries.

#### Conference Missionary Work

During the latter half of the year Rev. C. H. Summers has served as Conference Missionary under the direction of the Board, and supported by it. He has held meetings in a number of the districts. These meetings have been productive of large returns, both in additions to the Church, and in the stimulation of the finances of the missions where the meetings were held. It is the plan of the Board that this work be continued and that through it a number of our "A" grade missions may be brought to self-support this year.

#### Revivals

Many of our missions have been blessed the past year with gracious revivals. We urge our missionaries to plan for, and devote themselves to the promotion of a revival, that will reach every church and the last person in their charges. Under Par. 285 of the Discipline, the Board of Missions through its Committee on Evangelism is charged with the responsibility of promoting revival work throughout the Conference. We, therefore, urge not only our missionaries, but all our pastors to devote themselves whole-heartedly to the promotion of a Conference-wide revival.

#### The Centenary

The success of the Centenary rises so far above mere human power and skill as to forbid pride or boasting. It calls for humble gratitude, for "God hath done great things for us." And our Conference is not a whit behind any other Conference in its record of Centenary achievements. We went well over our goal in the matter of money; our quota being \$734,7770, and our churches pledging \$814,664; our Epworth Leagues \$11,051, and Sunday schools \$85,000, making a total of \$910,715.

And in other respects the results are seen in the eight thousand six hundred eighty-eight (8,688) Intercessors, and two thousand seven hundred fifteen (2,715) Tithers, who have been enrolled in these departments. Many others have taken up their duty as Tithers, and are exercising their privileges as Intercessors for others before the Throne of Grace.

Much of the credit due for the notable success of the Centenary must be given to our Missionary Secretary, Dr. Ira S. Patterson, Rev. C. H. Summers, Conference Missionary, Rev. R. Ira Barnett, the chairman of the Conference Centenary Commission, Dr. J. H. Therrell, Field Secretary of the Sunday School Board, and the Florida Christian Advocate. Of course nothing notable could have been done without the fullest co-operation of all the presiding elders, pastors and laymen.

The period of Conservation is now upon us. We must not allow the fruit of this enormous enterprise to be wasted. The collections of the pledges must be pressed with the utmost vigor, or else we shall lose enormously. The report of the Conference Centenary Treasurer, Mr. Roger Dodd, up to December 10th, shows the following summary:

Eighty per cent of the money returned to the Conference Board from the Centenary has been made subject to appropriation by the Board this year; twenty per cent has been set aside as a reserve fund. It is the plan of the Board that by setting aisde each year a part of the moneys derived from the Centenary your Board will accumulate a fund sufficient to enable it to pay our missionaries in advance, and to save interest now being paid on borrowed money.

We would call the attention of the members of the Conference that in addition to the ten per cent returned to us for the Centenary Fund. mission work in Florida will benefit to the amount of over \$30,000 this coming year.

In addition to stressing the payment of Centenary pledges, we urge that emphasis be given to the Life Service and Stewardship campaigns.

#### Regular Income

The Centenary must not be allowed to obscure our regular assessments. These are the base line of our finances. The budget plan under which we are working requires the utmost diligence in the making of full collections unless the income to the Board from our regular assessments is to decrease. And any decrease in the income of your Board means a decrease in the amount of salary paid to our faithful missionaries, this must not be allowed to occur.

#### New Policies

The Board has undertaken as a fixed policy to divide our Conference Missions into three grades: "A," "B," and "C.,' In the "A" grade will be placed such missions as can be raised to self-support within a period of three years; in "B" grade such as can be brought to self-support within a period of six years; in "C" grade all others. It is the hope of the Board that many charges may be stimulated and brought to self-support under this new policy, and thereby enable the Board to project new missions.

Henceforth the Board will endeavor to provide a minimum salary of \$1,000 for our Conference Missionaries, who are married, and members of the Conference, and \$600 for unmarried missionaries, who are members of the Conference and without family. It may not be possible in all cases to reach this goal, but the Board fixes this as its policy.

#### **Finances**

The most rigid economy has been exercised in the management of the Board's finances, and yet we have been compelled to borrow heavily each quarter in order to pay our missionaries. These borrowings have required a considerable outlay in interest which might have been avoided if collections on the Conference work budget had

been made early in the year, and the monies promptly sent to the Conference Treasurer. Unless this is done this year, the Board will again have to borrow unless our missionaries are to go without their money for months; and this could only mean suffering for them and their families. We urge therefore, that in the very beginning of the year the assessments for Conference work be taken up, and sent at once to the Conference Treasurer.

We are asking the same assessment for Conference Missions and Board work as last year, but as will be seen, we have largely increased the number of our missions and the sums appropriated to our missionaries. The high cost of living imperatively demands that our missionaries have increased salaries. These can only be paid by a very largely increased percentage being collected on assessments. Whether these men shall receive the sum appropriated will be decided by the pastors in charge this year.

#### BOARD OF MISSIONS-REPORT NO. 3

We are glad to again report that our missionaries have been paid in full for the year. This was made possible by the help of payment made by the Centenary.

Although your Board increased the mission charges to fifty-eight, being an increase of six charges over 1918, the interests of the Church have made necessary the establishment of three additional charges for 1920, and also larger appropriations in a number of those already established, amounting to \$5,223 more than was appropriated in 1919.

We present herewith the appropriations as granted for the Mission charges of the Florida Conference for the year 1920.

#### BOARD OF EDUCATION-REPORT NO. 1.

We note with pleasure the progress being made by the General Board in preparing for the Educational Drive and pledge ourselves to hearty co-operation with the Educational Commission in working out all details in putting on the great Church-wide Educational Campaign, whereby is to be provided financial assistance for the various schools throughout our connection. We call attention to the fact that not alone in our own Conference, but throughout our connection generally, the increased patronage of our schools is making necessary the expenditure of large sums of money on the part of the various boards conducting these institutions that they may be able to meet the demands for educational advantages.

Your Board has nad before it the communications of Dr. Stone-wall Anderson, our Corresponding Secretary, and of Dr. R. H. Bennett, Secretary of Ministerial Supply and Training, the latter of whom we have had the pleasure of hearing. We note the recommendations in the above mentioned communications, and give our hearty endorsement thereto.

We call special attention to the ministerial supply shortage, and urge our people in this hour of our great need to take cognizance of our Lord's injunction and method for meeting this need: "Pray ye, therefore, the Lord, of the harvest that He may send forth laborers into the harvest."

We urge that the Sunday schools observe vocation day; that the pastors preach upon the subject of the call to the ministry in all their congregations and look carefully to directing the young people to lines of special service, viz: the ministry, missionary work, etc.; that the authorities of our colleges and schools give their assistance to the life service campaign; that there be created a fund for the assistance of those consecrating themselves for life service.

This Board in accordance with the suggestion of Dr. Bennett has elected W. A. Cooper, D. D., and L. W. Duval, who, with the Secretary of Education, will compose the Commission of Religious Education.

Dr. R. H. Alderman, President of Southern College, has brought to our attention the very gratifying conditions existing at Southern College in the harmony, personnel and enthusiasm of the faculty and student body of this institution. There has never been a time when this college has had better prospects for meeting the needs that it is set to supply. The increased patronage, along with the necessary repairs to the plant, made necessary the expenditure of large sums of money to take care of those who desired to attend our College. After these improvements we have been unable to take care of those knocking at our College door. Hence, the necessity of the Board of Trustees making further improvements in the immediate future. This Board pledges its hearty co-operation with the Board of Trustees of Southern College and the special movement on the part of the laymen of the Conference for raising funds to meet these demands.

#### Report No. 2.

A visiting committee of three has been provided to visit Southern College during the school term, the same to be appointed by the chairman of this board.

We submit for your confirmation the name of O. O. McCollum, as Trustee for Wesleyan Female College, he having been elected by the trustees of said college.

We also submit for confirmation the name of W. O. Lemasters, of Brooksville, Fla., who has been elected Secretary of Education by this Board.

We call special attention to the report of Bishop W. A. Candler, Chancellor of Emory University, and tender to him our grateful thanks for the great work he is doing in this capacity for the Church.

We invoke the hearty co-operation of the Presiding Elders and pastors with the special movement among our laymen to raise \$50,000 in the next sixty days with which they hope to meet the pressing needs of Southern College at this time, and call your attention to the fact that all moneys so provided will be duly credited on the great educational fund to be raised in the educational drive.

We recommend to the presiding bishop, Dr. R. H. Alderman to be appointed as President of Southern College, and the appointment of E. M. Stanton, Jr., to be Assistant Professor in the College.

#### BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

You will be pleased to learn that the work of the General Board has continued with uninterrupted progress. The increase in the income this year over last was \$144,295.85. The loan fund now amounts to \$1,195,627.64. At the last meeting of the Board applications for loans aggregating more than \$500,000 were sought. Not more than half this amount was available.

Attention is called to the Sunday School Loan Fund obtained through birthday jars in the Sunday schools. This fund is not growing as fast as it might. In our Conference only six schools carried these jars last year. We urge our pastors to bring this matter to the attention of the superintendents in order that this fund may grow to an amount worth while.

The Architectural Secretary, Rev. J. A. Baylor, now has four draughtsmen in his office assisting in the preparation of plans for churches and parsonages. No new church plan ought to be finally adopted by any building committee without his approval.

Since the combining of the assessments in one budget, there will

be a temptation to neglect the preaching on the subject of Church Extension. We urge all our pastors to keep their congregations informed by preaching sermons on the subject, and the distribution of the leaflets gotten out by the parent board.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

We are glad to report continued progress in the work committed to our hands. Every department has shown advancement.

Our total enrollment has increased more than 2800. Sixteen hundred and forty pupils have united with the Church from the Sunday schools. A very successful Wesley Bible Class Federation, on departmental lines, was held in October. Our Sunday schools pledged \$85,642 to the Centenary fund; and have paid 100 cents on the dollar of amount due to date.

The attendance at our Standard Training School for Workers, held at Lake Junaluska, N. C., was larger than in former years; and a number of our workers took the courses of study and received certificates of credit.

In order to insure further advancement we ask your approval of our employment of Dr. J. H. Therrell as Sunday School Field Secretary, and Miss Lola Lawler as Elementary Superintendent for the coming year.

Our plans for next year include a Standard Training School, District Organization, a Wesley Bible Class Federation, observance of Sunday School Day in every school, larger attendance at Junaluska next summer.

We ask the continued co-operation of pastors and superintendents in the efforts of our field workers.

#### EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD

Your Board has found full opportunities for service this year. The Epworth League Chapters in our Conference now number 156, having 4,837 members.

The forward movement in our church following the impetus of the Centenary campaign has met a ready response from our young people. In every instance its organization was found complete and ready to carry forward the Centenary objectives.

The Life Service Committee of the Centenary has committed to the Epworth League the forming of bands to conserve the interest of young people, who are volunteering for the ministry, and other lifetime service. In every church where there are two or more life service volunteers, such bands should be formed. Your attention is called to the fact that these bands are for volunteers irrespective of the organization from which they respond. The part time service will enroll a large number of young people not committed to other service, and most diligent care must be given in seeing to it that proper fields for work be provided for those who may thus offer their time. We must be alert else we will be overwhelmed by the number of those who will be anxious to serve. Part time service enrollment cards will be filed, and kept only in the local church, and the service that such volunteers will render is expected to be within the limits of local opportunities.

For the sake of those who respond to life serivce places of activity in the local church must be provided. For those who serve in the ministry, and the mission fields, can only hope to continue work already begun. Through organization presented by the Epworth League practical opportunities for service are outlined, and full advantage should be taken of this in permitting young people to assume responsibilities of the church.

In order to make a careful study, and to present the needs of each district, a member of our Board will attend each District Conference assisting in the program on such occasions, and your co-operation is requested in making this work as effective as possible.

tion is requested in making this work as effective as possible.

Young People's Day, the second Sunday in May is celebrated throughout the Church observing the policies presented through the Epworth League. This should be observed in the morning service in every church, and in those churches where there is no organization a sermon should be preached on the claims of the Church for organized leadership.

Mission study has been fruitful in giving to the Church its prepared leaders.

Tithing as a recognition of our stewardship has enlisted a larger number of our membership than ever before, but less than fifteen per cent of church membership has been enlisted. Most careful direction should be given that every young man and woman be committed to this plan of giving.

The summer conferences which have held a large place in the interest of our young people, have enlarged to the extent that the coming year an assembly of five days will be held at Southern College, at which a program embracing a school of methods and inspirational studies will be carried out.

In providing for the expense of Conference work by an appropriation, the Leagues have responded in a large way by contributing to the claims of the Church. It is our policy in meeting these expenses to avoid expending all the funds appropriated each year, in order that there be cash on hand for the demands at the beginning of the new year. Epworth Leagues have responded cheerfully in raising their share of the Centenary askings of \$380,000 for work in the Congo, and the building program of Paine College. In addition to this, Florida leads in making possible a building program in the Latin District in West Tampa.

It is the policy of the Board to conserve and strengthen the field of the District Secretary, and to place funds at his disposal for work in the district, rather than to employ a full-time field worker.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. R. E. Smith in place of Leroy Roberts, and Rev. I. W. Longacre in place of Prof. Garfield Evans on the Epworth League Board.

#### BIBLE BOARD

We are glad to report that the past year has been the most active and fruitful of the several Bible Societies of the Christian churches in the good work of placing the written word of God in the hands of individuals, societies, and nations.

The American Bible Society has broken all previous records in printing and circulating the scriptures in whole or in part since its organization, over a hundred years ago. During the past year the Bible and portions of it were published in six hundred and fifty languages and dialects. It employs over three thousand colporteurs to carry this message of light and love to the poor and needy of all nations, having printing houses in nine strategic centers of the world.

It issued the past year, at home, 4,480,058 volumes; abroad, 1,560,649; a total of 6,040,707 volumes.

Since its birth, in 1816, it has issued in the United States 80,962,-687 scriptures; in foreign lands, 53,188,943; a total of 134,151,630 volumes.

The annual expenditure of the American Bible Society is \$900,000, with an endowment which brings in about \$85,000 a year.

The Society must have increased gifts from its friends if it is to meet the hunger and need of the world.

We recommend for the purpose of keeping our people educated in the great Bible work that our pastors continue to follow the disciplinary plan of presenting the A. B. S. cause to each congregation once a year and receive free-will offerings for same, and that these funds be sent through the regular course of all the other benevolences.

#### TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

We beg to call the attention of the Conference to the Social Service Creed of the Churches of Christ in America inserted in paragraph 808 of the Discipline by order of the General Conference.

As an application of the principles of that creed to the conditions that obtain within our state, we recommend that our preachers and members of the Florida Conference shall exert their influence and energies to accomplish:

- 1. The suppression of every form of gambling;
- 2. The enactment and enforcement of laws to suppress commercialized vice;
- 3. The strict and uniform enforcement of the laws protecting the Sabbath from commercial and other forms of desecration;
- 4. The consecration of the wealth of the State, conservation and development of the children of the State, with respect to their moral welfare, their health and their education. And to this end we will seek to use the material resources and the civil and Christian agencies of the State to the full extent of the need.
- 5. The nactment of laws to bring effective support and care to all the helpless and dependent in our midst; that is, to the sick, the orphans, the blind, the aged, the feeble-minded, and other unfortunates;
- 6. The investigation of the problem of juvenile delinquency, and the effort to save these unfortunates through better laws and incerased Christian activities;
- 7. The improvement of the convict system, and the support of every endeavor of the Church and State to reclaim and reform criminals
- 8. The endorsement and support of the efforts of the State Board of Health to combat disease; and the enactment and enforcement of laws to bring the whole power of the State to bear upon the solution of this problem;
- 9. The Social Service Committee requests of the Conference the authority to raise a voluntary collection through the Social Service

committees of the local churches, acting by and with the consent and co-operation of the pastors, for such sum as shall be found necessary to bring the Social Service arm of the church into free and efficient action;

- 10. We recommend that the committee be authorized to raise in the same way an incidental expense fund, not to exceed \$100,00, for the support of the work of the Social Service Committee of the General Conference.
- 11. We invite the co-operation of the other churches and Christian bodies in the State in the effort to achieve the ends aimed at in this report.
- 12. We request that every pastor in the Conference will read paragraph 808 of the Discipline once during the year in every congregation, and will preach a series of sermons on the great moral economic problems of our social life.

We are profoundly thankful to God to realize that our Flag no longer waves over a nation which licenses and protects the infamous traffic in intoxicating liquors.

But with this bright outlook of clean National life there comes a cloud in the sky.

When we ratified the eighteenth amendment there were two things we did not do. We did not kill the thirst of the liquor drinker, and we did not kill the greed of the liquor seller. And these two are getting together in defiance of the law in many parts of our nation and State.

Liquor is made in the home in inaccessible places; stored in basements, and smuggled in from the Bahamas and from Cuba by airplane as well as by boat.

THEREFORE, be it resolved:

That to check these infractions of the law we hereby call upon the Anti-Saloon League, which is the Church in Action, against the beverage liquor traffic, to put forth every effort and to use every means to destroy this illegal traffic.

We pledge our support to the federal officials for the enforcement of constitutional prohibition.

We recommend that our pastors set apart one Sunday's service in the year for preaching on the law and its enforcement.

We recommend that the Bishop be requested to appoint C. W. Crooke as Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of Florida, and Rev. Olin Boggess as Field Secretary of the Anti-Saloon League.

At the beginning of the Conference year the Centenary campaign was in progress, with our leading laymen taking an active part. The success of this campaign is well known to all. We beg to call the attention to our laymen that the Centenary campaign runs for a period of five years, and to urge that every lay leader enter whole-heartedly into the conservation period and continue in the work until every dollar shall have been collected and remitted to the Conference Centenary Treasurer.

The Board of Lay Activities most heartily commends the work of the Methodist Minute Men and earnestly requests presiding elders, pastors and laymen to make large use of their services not only as speakers, but as active workers of the Church.

We recommend that all-day leaders and Methodist Minute Men co-operate loyally and whole-heartedly with their pastors in evangelistic work.

We commend the efforts to raise an adequte fund for the support of Southern College and we urge all laymen to co-operate.

We urge that laymen relieve their pastors of all financial responsibility in their churches to the end that they may give themselves wholly to the ministry of God's Word.

The time has come for every church to pay every claim in full and more.

We recommend that the assessment plan and the the every-member canvass be carried out in every congregation and that the committee on Lay Activities in each congregation begin at once.

We recommend that laymen continue to secure pledges of Stewardship until all of our laymen tithe both their income and their time.

We further recommend that Church Lay Leaders endeavor to enlist all laymen in their churches in reading the Bible every day and in intercession of the work of the Church.

We appreciate the long faithful services rendered by Bro. A. W. McLeran. Upon his nomination, Bro. L. P. McCord, of Jacksonville, is recommended for election to succeed him as Conference Lay Leader.

#### TRUSTEES SOUTHERN COLLEGE

We are indeed gratified for the many encouraging evidences of growth in our educational work. Not only are we able to report a large attendance, but an excellent class of students, and a fine spirit prevailing throughout the institution.

Our growth is our embarrassment at the present time. Our dormitories are filled to their present capacity, and students have been turned away. The Board is trying to provide additional equipment to take care of the needs.

We call attention to the number and splendid record of the graduates of the College in every walk of life. This is especially true of those who have entered the ministry. The conference is receiving a splendid dividend for every dollar put into educational work.

We have a splendid plant in excellent condition, but there is need of additional buildings and equipment. We are looking forward to, and planning for, the educational campaign which is to occupy the last two years of the present quadrennium to give us not only the money needed for buildings and equipment, but an endowment which will give us the necessary money for operating expenses. Your co-operation in this movement is absolutely necessary to make this campaign a success.

The most encouraging feature of our work is the interest the laymen are taking in the college. The laymen's movement for Southern College is the dawn of a new day in our educational work.

The Board has secured the services of one of our most successful and prominent laymen to act as treasurer. A detailed financial state-

ment is being prepared and will be placed in the hands of each member of the conference in a short time.

The necassary improvements and the deficit on running expenses due to the small attendance and high prices, has increased our financial burden, but the laymen are planning to take care of this. It is costing us twice as much to run the college as it did a few years ago, and the increase in income has been very small. An endowment is necessary to make possible the work which we are called upon to do for the Church. The Board of Trustees is thoroughly in sympathy with the Board of Education in their plans for the educational campaign, and urges a Conference-wide co-operation. In order that there might be a closer co-operation between the two boards we suggest that the Board of Education appoint a visiting committee from their body to visit the college annually and advise with the trustees as to ways and means of advancing our educational work. We urge the presiding elders and the members of the conference to visit the College.

We appreciate the fact that during the year two more of the districts—Bartow and Orlando—paid out their educational special, and urge those districts which have not, to do at once. There is still a balance due on this special of over \$3,000. This paid would help us meet pressing obligations.

We urge that there be no curtailment in the educational assessment—rather an increase if possible. This is our only source of income to take care of the increased cost of operating expenses.

We regret that other conference duties necessitated the resignation of Revs. J. B. Mitchell and W. F. Dunkle. We nominate Revs. S. W. Walker and Rev. L. M. Broyles to fill these vacancies.

In conclusion, brethren, we ask your prayers and sympathy. We are doing the best we can with our limited means to build a great institution that will conserve every interest of the Church.

#### ORPHANAGE BOARD-REPORT NO. 1

The Orphanage Board respectfully asks the Conference to take the following action:

- 1. Instruct the Conference Commission on Finance to recommend an assessment of \$10,000 to be distributed among the districts as are the other assessments.
- 2. Request District Stewards to lay the orphanage assessment upon the charges as a separate item from the Conference work budget.
- 3. Instruct the Conference Treasurer to receive and handle the orphanage money as a separate item.

#### Report No. 2

There are some things we note with great regret and sincere sorrow, and others calling for grateful thanksgiving and joyful hearts.

The Orphanage lost the services of a truly consecrated friend in the sickness and permanent disability of the President of the Board, Rev. T. Griffith, and suffered a most grievous calamity in the death of Rev. J. Lawton Moon in his country's service.

The Orphanage, however, has had a successful year, notwithstanding the continued high cost of maintenance and the children,— your children,—are in good health and as happy as a family of forty-four can be.

There has been no serious illness among them, though two severe accidents occurred, one a boy, who recovered, and a girl, who accidently burned her face and body, but is reovering nicely. We arevery fortunate in having a superintendent who is not only capable as a manager, tender as a mother, but skillful as a nurse in first aid requirements. being the widow of a physician, and she is invaluable incase of sickness or accident.

In her report to the Board she attributes the remarkable health of the children to the frequent use of the large bathing pool recently built in the grove of trees near to the ever-flowing sulphur spring, and to the constant supervision of the teeth by a competent dentist of DeLand, who gives his valuable service free of charge.

The religious and educational condition of the children is carefully looked after, all of them attending the Sunday school and church services, and the larger ones the mid-week prayer services. All are members of the Epworth League, and give attention to systematic Bible study each Sunday evening.

The county of Volusia has provided a good school building and the course of study includes the twelfth grade, with commendable progress on the part of the children.

Considerable work has been done on the new home during the year, though it is still in an unfinished condition. The droughth of last summer interfered sadly with profitable working of the farm, but it is remarkable what has been accomplished by the boys.

While the Orphanage can get along in a hand-to-mouth sort of way by the methods in use and can hold its own with an appropriation proportionate to the H. C. of L., if we really propose to build a sure-enough Florida Orphange, a much larger investment must be made.

#### SABBATH OBSERVANCE

The test of any civilization is found in man's attitude toward its most sacred institutions. No man or nation may ignore or violate these with impunity. Chiefest of these institutions is the Sabbath. We deplore the Sabbath breaking tendency of our complex modern life. "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy" is one of God's commands just as truly as is: "Thou shalt have no other God's before me." Yet, all around us the holy day of the Lord is being desecreated by buying, selling, picnicing and general pleasure-seeking.

On the statute books of our own fair state the following laws appear: Chapter 3565, Act of 1903, "Whoever follows any pursuit, busi-

ness or trade on Sunday, either by manual labor or with animal or mechanical power, except the work be of necessity, shall be punished by fine not exceeding fifty dollars." In chapter 3567, Act of 1832, it further says, "Whoever employs his apprentice or servant in labor or other business on Sunday, except it be in the ordinary household business of daily necessity, or other work of necessity or charity, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars for every such offence."

From existing facts, we are aware that the above laws of our State are not being enforced, and that punishments necessary to make them effective are too small to preserve the dignity of the law. We, therefore, request action of this body that our senators and representatives of the State Legislature be requested to enact such legislation as will increase the effectiveness of these laws, and make it the duty of our court officials to respect and enforce these existing laws.

We further request that a stronger and more insistent note be sounded on the very spirit and inner meaning of the Sabbath. May not our pastors be urged to set themselves steadfastly to the task of educating and informing our people in the fundamental virtue of reverence for God's holy day? Once the proper attitude is secured and the conscience trained, the question of what not to do and where not to go will, automatically, be answered.

As in many other problems here, also, the home is basic. God intended the family as the unit of society, and the home as the sacred center of morality. Placing the Sabbath as the first institution, He set the home as second and corallary of the first. Our modern home, without family altars and with divided interests and with individual members of the family living tangential lives which do not rotate about any sacred center, must be reorganized and reconstructed,—family religion must be revived and the Sabbath conserved.

Let us return to the old paths remembering the great prophets ultimatum: "If thou turn away thy foot from the Sabbath from doing thy pleasure on my holy day; and call the Sabbath a delight, the holy of the Lord Honorable; and shalt honor Him, not doing thine own ways, not finding thine own pleasure, not speaking thine own words: Then shalt thou delight thyself in the Lord; and I will cause thee to ride upon the high places of the earth, and feed thee with the heritage of Jacob, thy Father; for the mouth of the Lord has spoken it." Isa. 58:13-41.

#### COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION

- 2. That the transportation expenses of the lay members of the Conference and members of the Conference Boards be estimated on the basis of three cents per mile from the place of residence and the seat of the Conference and the return.
- 4. That a Secretary and Treasurer be elected by the Annual Conference for each section to hold office four years. That the said secretary and treasurer make estimate of expenses and settlement according to this plan.
- 5. That any question in dispute be settled by a vive voce vote of the section voting, viz: if clerical by the clerical vote; if laymen by the vote of laymen.

### Part IV—Memoirs

#### Eugene Amelius Harrison

Was born in Macon, Georgia, November 2, 1850, the son of Mr. and Mrs. William B. Harrison.

He was converted and joined the Church in early life, and at the age of seventeen he entered Emory College, Oxford, Georgia, where with his literary course, he received theological instruction.

For several years after leaving school he served as engineer on the Georgia Central Railroad.

Later he taught school at Darien and St. Marys, Georgia, and in 1882 came to Florida, having married Miss Margery Elizabeth King of St. Marys, July 16, 1881.

Settling in Lecanto, Citrus county, he gave his entire time to teaching and educational work in general, until 1884. For this work he had great fondness, and for which he was well fitted.

In 1884 he was licensed to preach by a Quarterly Conference, Rev. Thos. W. Tomkies presiding.

For twelve years he was superintendent of public schools of Citrus county, but serving as a local preacher, he filled some pulpit each Sunday where his congregation heard the pure gospel of Jesus Christ.

During these years he received no pecuniary compensation for his work as a minister, and on one occasion when handed a check from mission funds, returned it saying that he had other financial resources and was doing the work because he loved it.

In 1897 he entered the itinerancy in Florida, where he did twentytwo years of active service, filling a number of our important charges.

In 1914 he was located at his own request, and for two years was principal of Davidson Street Grammar School, Key West.

His last charge was Lemon City where he was doing an excellent work when he heard the voice of his Lord calling him to higher service.

As an expression of the appreciation of his services by his brethren, his expenses were paid by them to the Centenary celebration in Columbus, Ohio, last summer, and while there he was elected chairman of the Florida delegation.

With one exception, since 1904, he and his companion spent Christmas with daughters in Key West. Holding watch-night services there, large numbers were always present, who greatly enjoyed his excellent talks on such occasions.

His last words were, "Bless the Lord oh my soul, and all that is within me bless his holy name."

Accompanied by the members of his family the remains were carried to Key West and placed in the soil he loved so well, and where the murmuring tides sing a requiem to his pathetic dust. Funeral services were conducted from First Church by his presiding elder, Rev. M. H. Norton, assisted by resident pastors.

He left to mourn their loss, his life companion, and two daughters, Mrs. Lorena H. Sanderson and Mrs. Minnie Robinson, all of whom live in Key West. They have the sympathy and love of the Florida Conference.

#### J. Lawton Moon

The death of Rev. John Lawton Moon, which occurred at Cherbourg, France, Feb. 22, 1919, was shocking beyond all exaggeration and produced the profoundest sorrow in the hearts of his many friends. Cut off as he was in the prime of life and in the midst of almost unprecedented usefulness is one of the insoluble mysteries of this life. We are comforted, however, that by his translation to the heavenly world our heavenly Father has made no mistake and that if he could speak to us before the throne he would not choose to have it otherwise.

He was born Nov. 21st, 1879, at Certersville, Ga., and was "born again" when a little boy eight years old and then gave his life to the Church. From his father, Rev. J. L. Moon, at one time a member of the North Georgia Conference and later of the Floirda Conference, and his devoted Christian mother, Elizabeth Thomas Moon, he received the splendid qualities that helped to make him wise and good. He graduated with highest honors from Emory College, Oxford, Ga., in the class of 1903, numbering forty-five. It was during his college course that he had his heavenly vision and was not disobedient to it, and henceforth sought to prepare himself for the great work of the Christian ministry. He spent six months as a missionary at Santiago, Cuba, and in December 1904, he joined the Florida Conference. His first appointment was as City Missionary in Jacksonville, Fla. Here he was happily married to Miss Carrie Lewis Chappell, Dec. 6th, 1906, in Riverside Methodist Church, Rev. R. H. Barnett, officiating.

The results of his six years pastorate in Jacksonville were extraordinary not to say phenomenal. Souls were converted and added to the Church in considerable numbers, and besides he built our Springfield Church, the Phoenix Park Church and King's Road Church, a chapel near the A. C. L. shops, and he also secured the present lot for the Wesley Memorial Church. Two of his six years were given as pastor at St. Matthews, a difficult field, yet the Lord's work prospered in his hands.

His next appointment was at Fort Meade where he remained four years. He did all the work of a Methodist preacher, his membership grew in numbers and spirituality and the fine new church was built and dedicated under his remarkably fine work. Then he had two good years at Clearwater, followed by two good years as pastor-professor at Sutherland, where he conducted a great revival, doing all the preaching himself. The college and community were blessed in an uncommon degree. His last pastorate was at Bradentown which promised to be the best of his life. He conducted his own revival services at Bradentown and quite wore himself out in the excessive labors as pastor and in patriotic services in the various war drives.

Early in the year he felt called to Y. M. C. A. work overseas, but because of the illness of his little boy he was prevented from offering his services at that time. In the fall of the year the call was renewed and as he realized the great perils that threatened our boys over there during the period of domobilization and reconstruction, he offered his services and was accepted. His ministry was not merely professional. His soul burned with divine ardor, and, while on the high seas, though a stranger, he won all hearts by his uniform courtesy and thoughtful consideration for the happiness of others, impressing his associates with the fact that he was a follower of the Lamb and a worthy representative of the high calling to which he had dedicated his life. He conducted several inspiring and helpful services aboard the ship and had accepted an invitation to preach the

day after his death, expressing his pleasure at the prospect of preaching the blessed gospel. It was at his suggestion that evening prayers were held on the voyage across the sea. As they neared the shores of France, he stood upon the deck enjoying with his friends the view of the harbor. He then descended to the lower deck and was reminded by the steward that his bath that he had ordered was ready. A few minutes later in response to his call for assistance, it was found that he was very ill. He was helped to his state-room and two physicians who were aboard the ship were summoned, but in spite of all that medical skill could do, he rapidly grew worse, and the end came peacefully and without suffering at 8:20 p.m. The immediate cause of his death was cerebral hemorrhage and acute dilation of heart. In a letter to Mrs. Moon, from Rev. J. L. Keedy, the following facts are given regarding his burial: "When we landed at Havre, two Y. M. C. A. Secretaries met us and after they learned the sad news, they informed Major Hunter, senior chaplain for that district. He arranged for the care and burial of the body. I conducted the sevices, and the six men of our party who acted as pallbearers were all Masons and some Methodists. The body was taken from the ship Monday, Feb. 24th, at ten a. m., the members of the party assisting the chaplain, all being devout and reverent; at 11:30 we left Y. M. C. A. headquarters, and at 1:30 we proceeded to St. Maria cemetery at Le Havre. There we were joined by a squad of American soldiers. They led the way; the chaplain and I followed; then came three Y. M. C. A. Secretaries stationed at Le Havre; then the body of your dear husband with casket draped with the National colors borne upon the shoulders of the six members of our ship's party. When we reached the grave the body was lowered; I read the burial service, slowly and tenderly, committing the body to earth and commending the soul to the good Father whose servant your husband was. Then the squad of soldiers fired three volleys across the grave, the bugler stepped forth and the splendid tones of the bugle rang out in final taps for an eternal rest. That concluded the services but we tarried at the grave for some time and some of the men took pictures which will be forwarded to you."

Our beloved brother was ideal in all the relations of life. As a son he was obedient, loving, and at all times considerate of the happiness of his parents. As a husband and father he was worthy of all praise. His sorrowing wife, who now rejoices that she was always in sympathy with him in all his work, writes: "He was always a most lovable and enjoyable companion, so true, so tender and thoughtful of me, and a most devoted father. His little son. Lawton, says, I am sure when Jesus comes he will bring Daddy with him."

Now without making any invidious comparisons I desire to record that there was no man among us more useful or more promising. He was in easy reach of the first appointments and the most responsible positions. He was a princely man in the Heavenly Kingdom. By his domestic fidelity, his clean living, his arduous labors, his devotion to the highest ideals and his pre-eminent usefulness he endeared himself to the brethren and now by our love for him we are resolved that his memory shall never perish among us.

#### Rev. Frederick Pasco, D. D.

Dr. Pasco was born in Charlotown, Prince Edward Island, May 4, 1844, his parents being John Pasco and Amelia Nash, formerly of England.

In his boyhood days his parents moved to this country and located at Cambridge, Mass., where Frederick the boy and young man, graduated from Harvard in the class of 1865.

For a few years after his graduation he lived in the west, but came to Florida at the time of the marriage of his brother, the late Hon. Samuel Pasco, formerly a United States Senator from Florida.

A little later he was married to Miss Maria Catherine Doggett of Jacksonville, who in 1874 or 1875 passed into the spirit world.

This union was blessed with three children, Frederick Leike of Boston, Samuel Nash of New York City, and Sidney Doggett, who died in infancy.

As an educator he stood among the leaders of our State, having been principal of Duval High School, and for several years superintendent of the schools of Duval county; professor of the East Florida Seminary and for several years superintended the Government school for the deaf and dumb in St. Augustine. However, along with his educational work where he had a splendid influence over the young manhood of our State, he remained in the active ranks of his Conference, and did much preaching for his brethren.

But his main work was that of the ministry and in this ministry of more than fifty years, he filled many of the most responsible charges of the Conference, and his name is held in grateful remembrance by the thousands of brethren whom he served. And whether as presiding elder or pastor or teacher he was always faithful to his high trust and loyal to his brethren. The records show that Dr. Pasco was secretary of the Florida Conference for forty-five years, and he did his work well.

In his going, he left only his two sons, Frederick and Samuel, of his immediate family, but these worthy sons will be remembered by the brethren of their ascended father.

The writer of this obituary is almost doing violence to the many

times expressed wishes of our friend and brother who has gone from us, as he often expressed a preference for but few words in telling of his work.

Dr. Pasco has gone and we will miss him when we come together in the sessions of our Annual Conference, but we will meet him by and by where separations are not known.

That which is mortal rests in the Old City Cemetery, Jacksonville, by the side of the dust of his companion, who had preceded him so many years to the home above. But his choice spirit has gone home to God who gave it.

#### Rev. and Mrs. William H. Steinmeyer

Not before this has the Committee on Memoirs been called on to present a paper in the memorial service with the name of a pastorand his companion connected. In life they were of the same spirit, and in death they are not divided.

Rev. William H. Steinmeyer was born in Charleston, South Carolina, Sept. 30, 1843, and received his education at the Citadel Academy, of his native city.

He was converted in early manhood and served in the Confederate Army, where he displayed the same courage and loyalty that he did in after years in the itinerant ministry.

He was happily married to Miss Susan Erma Bradford, of Sumter, South Carolina, January 10, 1866.

Brother Steinmeyer came to Florida in 1880, and having been licensed to preach, and serving as a supply for a little more than a year, was admitted on trial in the traveling connection at the Conference that met in Monticello, January 1882.

He served faithfully many of the charges of the Florida Conference, and was always a true minister of the Lord Jesus Christ. He was always true and loyal to his brethren, and endeared himself to all of them. In many instances it was clearly seen that he preferred others to himself.

For a number of years he was trustee of Florida Conference College and did excellent work.

Not eloquent, but always thoughtful and forceful in his preaching, he delivered a message that carried conviction and gave inspiration to a better life. His sincere and unselfish love for his people, always gave him access to their hearts and homes.

On account of failing health, he was granted a superannuate relation to the Conference a few years ago, after an active and successful ministry for more than thirty years. And after his supeannuation he labored faithfully for the Master as his health and opportunities permitted. His last charge was Dixieland and Myrtle Street, and in this charge there are many to stand up and bless his memory.

Mrs. William H. Steinmeyer, was born in Sumter, South Carolina, May 30, 1843, and joined the Church at the age of thirteen. Her marriage to Rev. W. H. Steinmeyer was blessed with the motherhood of eight children, one of whom died in infancy. Another son died in Jacksonville a few months ago. Three sons and three daughters are now living: Rev. F. E. Steinmeyer, of Live Oak; Leon, of DeLand; Harry who is living in Georgia; Mrs. L. M Clough. of Lakeland; Mrs. Don McDonald of Lakeland, and Mrs. H. B. McCall of Oviedo, Fla.

Sister Steinmeyer spent her life in noble service for her family and the Church. In the charges served by her ascended companion,

she was faithful to every trust reposed in her, and those whom she served loved her for her own, and her work's sake.

She was a devoted mother, always tender and patient in her dealings with her children, and always setting an example before them that was worthy of their emulation. Her gentle disposition, patience and resignation in her suffering, commended to all the religion that she possessed. As one has said, "The expression of her countenance reflected the joy and light of her inner life." After a lingering illness she passed away from the home of her daughter in Lakeland, January 3, 1919, preceding her husband only a few months. The dear ones who are left may walk in the footsteps of father and mother, and meet them again in the upper and better world.
