FROM THE BOARD CHAIR



DEAR FRIENDS OF THE NATIONAL ARBORETUM:

There are never enough ways to convey thanks. Looking back with pride at our accomplishments, we note that 2012 was a year in which FONA and the U.S. National Arboretum achieved many significant milestones. So this issue of Arbor Friends is dedicated to all of our amazing supporters who put their trust in

our collaborative efforts. Our annual appeal generated 25% more revenue than the year before, and we exceeded our annual goal by 13%! As we continue to shift our focus of support to a stronger private base, let me thank you and try to convey the direct benefit of these gifts to the Arboretum.

Out of the azalea and boxwood crisis and under Dr. Hefferan's leadership came a comprehensive *Living Collections Policy* that will guide any difficult decisions to be made in the future. FONA also made its first significant gift in the amount of \$110,000 for the purpose of maintaining and enhancing these two cherished collections. Further, the endowment structured to support the collections and a designated boxwood and azalea fund continue to grow more robust each day, promising sustenance in perpetuity. FONA was able to fund a 13-month graduate-level internship for the Asian Collections as the first disbursement of our Meyer Kidder Endowment as well as fund the Arboretum's top priority internship position. This internship will be tasked to the Introduction Collection, which will be re-established in the garden next to the newly renovated administration building. In spite of disappointing delays, the \$9 million renovated building, when it opens this winter, will inspire all of us to continue to move forward on behalf of our "priceless green asset," so named by the Washington Post's Adrian Higgins.

On behalf of the staff and the board, let me say that we're expecting even more great things for 2013. The Washington Youth Garden and the environmental cleanup projects at the Arboretum are just two examples of the energy that's in the air. A clever new exhibit called "Grass Roots" is in the works and promises to entertain as well as educate. Most importantly, the Arboretum and FONA will be guided by a strategic plan that will help balance the esteemed research for which the Arboretum is so well known with the preservation of the heralded green place we love for its ability to restore our spirit. With heartfelt thanks, we ask you to continue the journey with us.

We are seeking your help in finding stories and encouraging authors to share how taking care of lawns helped shaped their life.



THE NATIONAL BONSAI & PENJING MUSEUM'S JAPANESE PAVILION:

Past, Present, and Future

n March 20, 1975, while former Japanese Prime Minister Nobusuke Kishi, U.S. Ambassador James

Hodgson, and U.S. Arboretum Director John Creech were speaking at the Bonsai Presentation Ceremony in Tokyo, Japan, construction of the Japanese Pavilion at the U.S. National Arboretum was already underway. This new pavilion would house and display the 53 bonsai that the United States received from the Japanese people to

commemorate our Bicentennial in 1976. In addition to the 53 bonsai, 6 suiseki (viewing stones) were also donated.

This Bicentennial gift, known as the "Green Mission of Peace," required very special packing and handling. The carefully packed bonsai were flown from Tokyo to Washington, DC, on their own Pan American plane in what was most likely the largest and most expensive air shipment of plants ever made. Upon arrival in the United States, the plants were transported to the USDA Plant Introduction Station in Glenn Dale, Maryland, and placed in quarantine for one year. It was during this time that the new pavilion began to take shape.

Masao Kinoshita of Sasaki Associates, Watertown, Massachusetts, headed up the design for the new pavilion. His challenge was to design a pavilion befitting this gift. His goal was to respect traditional Japanese design while providing an American interpretation—a unique blending of two cultures. This new pavilion would also represent the first phase of a much bigger plan that would create a bonsai museum unlike any the world had ever seen.

A peaceful, contemplative mood would need to be set at the entrance to the pavilion. For this, the Japanese stroll garden was



designed. Beautiful azaleas and pines complemented with boulders strategically placed in this garden along its meandering stone path would indeed set the proper mood for viewing the bonsai.

Inside the new pavilion, the bonsai were displayed on redwood benches with neutral stucco walls as a backdrop. Wide gravel walkways guided guests, and a wooden fence was installed to keep inquisitive visitors from touching the bonsai.

Finally, everything was set for the opening ceremony on July 9, 1976. Some of the bonsai were on display in the new pavilion and some were moved to the administration building's terrace where the ceremony was being held. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, foreign dignitaries, bonsai masters from around the world, and many other guests were on hand to commemorate this auspicious event on a beautiful summer day.

As Arboretum Director John Creech (above) noted, "The bonsai complex will grow to maturity as a tribute to the Japanese people who so generously gave us their treasured gifts to commemorate our 200th anniversary."

Over the past 37 years, the Japanese Pavilion has served us well. However, unlike bonsai that improve with age, the pavilion has not. The pavilion is showing its age and is in need of repair and upgrades. The Bicentennial gift of bonsai is just as precious today as it was in 1976, and the Japanese Pavilion should continue to provide the bonsai with the best home possible.

CAMPAIGN FOR THE JAPANESE PAVILION: A GIFT RENEWED

FOR FONA MEMBERS who frequent the U.S. National Arboretum, the National Bonsai & Penjing Museum is one of the most popular destinations. The Japanese Pavilion within the museum along with the Kato Stroll Garden which leads to that pavilion are the oldest structures in the museum and are in need of major repairs. In May 2012, The National Bonsai Foundation (NBF) began a \$2 million capital campaign to restore these adjoining areas. Construction drawings are now being finalized, and bids will be requested to begin construction in 2013. Detailed drawings of the renovation design, along with the total of funds received to date,

The Advance Sale will return for the third year. As we continue to develop and grow this option, we are working hard to perfect it. This coming year, we will try to get new material and increase the number of offerings. Please be sure to carefully read the description of each plant, particularly information related to the size of the plants. Some of the plants we offer are sufficiently rare that we can obtain only small sizes that need to be nursed along for a few years before finding a final resting place in the garden landscape.

AGAIN THIS COMING YEAR, WE WILL BE SEEKING DONATIONS FOR PURCHASING PLANTS FOR THE ARBORETUM GROUNDS.

Last year for the first time ever, FONA worked with the curators of the USNA staff to buy plants for the Arboretum

This program—referred to as the "Curators' Wish List"—continues, and we ask all of you to be as generous as possible.
