Board Of Regents Approves Degree

Water management, sanitation, and pollution. These subjects of national importance, are dependently related similar subjects. Environmental Technology, an Associate of Science degree, has been approved for GSC by the Board of Regents. Proposals at other schools were also endorsed at the January 7, 1975 meeting, but this type of degree is yet to be offered anywhere else in the state.

Dr. John Chisler, Chairman, Division of Science and Mathematics, says that the courses will be initiated next fall through that department. He will be an instructor, as will Dr. Robert Deal, Dr. Frank Jenio, Mr. John White, and Dr. Ronald Burke. One new instructor is anticipated for next year. The classes that will be offered include Aquatic Biology; Water Quality Analysis; Reclamation Problems, and Techniques; Lakes, Pond & Stream Management; Solid Waste Disposal and Environmental Planning & Development. Course requirements include summer work experience. These jobs will be reviewed for acceptance by the staff.

Some possible occupations for graduates in Environmental Technology include work with the Public Health Service and the Department of Natural Resources.

The new technicians will be authorities in fields such as water recreation management, water and sanitation personnel and pollution control analysts for industry or government.

Erwin, Latos Demonstrate Crafts At Liberty High

Debbie Erwin and Paul Latos, represented the GSC Art Department at Liberty High School's first Mountain Heritage Day last Wednesday. While there, they exhibited their art work and gave demonstrations of painting and wheel thrown pottery.

Liberty High is a new consolidated high school in Clarksburg, W. Va. and their mascot is the mountaineer.

Debbie Erwin is currently a senior art major at GSC. She received a scholarship last summer to study painting on location in Nova Scotia, as an apprentice at the W. Va. State Art & Craft Fair. Miss Erwin has won merit awards in watercolor at the last two Collegiate Art Exhibitions. A native of Glennville, she plans to further her painting and art education by earning a Master of Fine Arts degree from WVU.

Paul Latos is currently a senior art major from Windsor Hts., W. Va. He has won several awards in both adult and student art shows in W. Va. as well as receiving honorable mention in the past W. Va. Collegiate Art Exhibition. He has worked extensively in ceramics for the past four years not only at Glennville but as the head potter at a pottery shop in Sandusky, Ohio. Upon graduation he plans on furthering his studies in ceramics and eventually setting up a shop of his own.

Applications Near For GI Bill Loans

The Veterans Administration is now processing applications for new education loans for veterans attending school under the GI Bill. The loans, up to a maximum of \$600 in one academic year, were established by the Vietnam-era Veterans Readjustment Assistance Act of 1944, enacted by Congress in December.

Glennville State College Vet Rep, On Campus (VROC) Ted Knically said the new measure provides that applicants must have exhausted all efforts to obtain guaranteed student loans administered by the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The student must list all lenders applied to, with dates notified of final decisions. If denied a guaranteed student loan, copies of the denial statement from each lender must accompany the VA application.

All financial resources must be protected by the student, including other educational loans, grants, scholarships, VA educational assistance, cash assets and income.

Ted Knically also said the school must certify the student's course of study, tuition and fees, and any room and board charges.

No loan may be approved for intercession or other enrollment period of less than 10 weeks.

The effective date for the loan program was January 1. However,

Glamour Girl To Be Chosen

GSC has received entry blanks from Glamour Magazine for their Glamour Girl Contest, 1975. Any Glennville coed may enter, but time is short: the deadline is Monday, February 17th.

Along with the entry blanks (available at the Mercury Office), a 500-700 word essay must be written, on what the coed's main involvement and achievements were in college.

The contestant must have two pictures to accompany the essay. She may make arrangements with the Mercury staff for pictures if needed. Also, newspaper clippings, press releases, and other media material pertaining to the student's college career may be submitted in the contest.

All of Glennville entries will then be reviewed by a panel of judges, at

all eligible veterans, wives, widows and children will be considered for initial loans based upon the full amount of their tuition and all other costs of attendance anticipated for the entire 1974-75 academic year. This is considered to have started about September 1.

Under the new law, those granted loans will be required to execute promissory notes agreeing to repayment of principal plus 8 per cent interest. Repayment of principal and interest will be deferred while the student is attending classes at least on a half-time basis.

Installment payments must start nine months after the student ceases at least half-time enrollment, with full payment within 10 years and nine months after that date. Part or all of the loan may be prepaid without penalty. Interest will not accrue on the loan balance until the required beginning date of repayment.

A 3 per cent loan fee will be deducted from the approved loan amount to provide a fund to insure against defaults under the loan program. Defaults will be considered overpayments and recovered in the same manner as other debts due the government.

Play Presents Debut Of Buffington, Smith

It was once said, "A play is an image of human life created in the minds of an audience by the enactment of a pattern of events." Producing that play requires the efforts of many people. All of these serve as the servant of the play. When the Speech Department produces All My Sons on February 27, 28 and March 1 it will be the result of five weeks of zest, energy, dedication, creativity....and work.

The Glennville State College students are starring in Arthur Miller's impressive representative play on the war years. This week The Mercury profiles two leading characters, Ann Deever portrayed by Lisa Smith and Chris Keller played by Steve Buffington. Both are making their debut on the GSC stage.

Ann and the young Keller serve

as the two characters who fall in love and cope with the consequences of their relationship. A unique flair ensues with All My Sons since Chris Keller proposes to marry her dead brother's fiance. Both roles demand sensitivity running the full gambit of human emotion.

Ms. Lisa Smith had this to say about her role, "Ann has a very important place in the plot. As a catalyst, she has information crucial to the deciding events of the play."

In reference to the play itself, Ms. Smith commented, "The most difficult phase of rehearsal is getting into character. All My Sons has numerous dramatic sequences demanding discipline of self at all times."

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond B. Smith of Eureka. Ms. Smith is a freshman Language Arts major, minoring in art.

Mr. Steve Buffington makes his theatrical debut in All My Sons as the surviving Keller son, Chris. A mixture of sensitivity, warmth, inner conflict and a person of integrity, the role of young Chris demands a dynamic counter and complimentary portrayal in Miller's father/son relationship.

In developing the role, Mr. Buffington sees Chris as a son who expects his father to be more than the common man. Chris struggles inwardly to disavow the practicality of war and the degrading demands placed on a man by society during that time. Says Chris, "This is the land of the great big dogs, you don't love a man here, you eat him! That's the principle we live by."

Says Buffington, "Chris has great respect for his father only to have his bubble burst. An All-American type man, he becomes disillusioned by his father and his own life."

His first experience with a play production, Mr. Buffington finds also All My Sons "a great challenge. I'm learning a great deal behind the scenes and the work demanded in putting on a play. In addition to work, it's a great deal of fun."

Buffington has been active on campus, participating in such organizations as Tau Kappa Epsilon. He is past vice-president and past historian of the fraternity. Mr. Buffington is also co-captain of the GSC football team, made All-WVIAC in 1972, and holds or ties all pass receiving records at Glennville.

Mr. Buffington is a senior physical education major, minoring in social studies. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Buffington of Parkersburg.

Ms. Smith and Mr. Buffington both see All My Sons as a play dealing in human emotion. "Tension constantly shifts between conflict and family lightheartedness. It's a play people can identify with. It would be worthwhile to see this very powerful and moving drama by Miller."

They will combine talents with the rest of the cast when All My Sons directed by Ms. Jeanne Kobuszewski, takes stage on February 28, 29 and March 1 at 8:00 pm in the GSC auditorium.

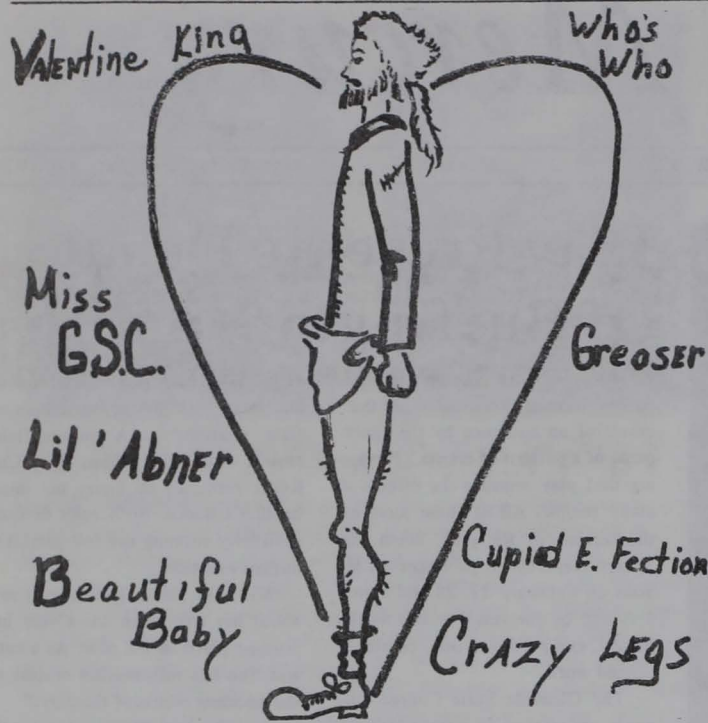

M. H. Eagles Are Downed

The Glenville Pioneers won their ninth basketball game of the season on February 6 when they held off the Morris Harvey Golden Eagles 82-80. The game which was played in Charleston was another exciting contest between the two rivals.

The Pioneers, playing their best away game of the season, built an eight point halftime lead at 42-34. But the Golden Eagles came back strong in the second half and led 76-72 with four and one-half minutes left in the game. The G-Men came back to knot the score when Robert Hawkins and Eric Makle connected for baskets.

The two teams then exchanged buckets when the Eagles' Dave Shepperd scored on a tip-in, then Greg Arnette came back with a basket for the Pioneers. Seconds later Dickie Hardman stole the ball and scored on an easy lay up for the G-Men. Shepperd again scored for the Eagles to tie the score at 80-up with less than a minute left in the game. But Hardman's pressure-free throws with 16 seconds left in the game gave Glenville the win.

Hawkins played his best game as a Pioneer, as he poured in 24 points and hauled down 11 rebounds. Hawkins was followed in scoring by Arnette who scored 15 points and pulled down 10 rebounds. Other G-Men to score in double figures were Arnie David and Eric Makle with 14 each and Hardman with 10.

Five Eagles scored in double figures with freshman Glen Thomas leading the way with 22 points, followed by Carlos Hampton and Bill Mizell with 16 chucks, Shepperd with 14 and John Jividen with 10.

Keglers Win Tournament

The Glenville State Pioneer bowling team won the Second WVIAC Regional Bowling Tournament last Saturday in Oak Hill. The Alderson Broaddus Battlers were tied at the end of the tournament but Glenville was declared the winner by the total number of pin falls.

Leading the Pioneers was Tom Newberry with an average of 195 through eight games. Following Newberry was Sam Ferrell with a 192 average, Mike Simmons with a 180, Rick Goodall with a 174, Gary Humphrey averaged 172 and Rich McFee bowled an average of 168.

Newberry rolled the highest game of the tournament with a 255.

The Pioneers are now tied for second place in the conference race with Alderson Broaddus as both have 11-5 records. The West Liberty Hilltoppers are barely hanging in first place with a 12-4 mark.

With two more regionals to go, three Pioneer bowlers are in contention for the "Bowler of the Year" Award. After sixteen games Tom Newberry has the third best average in the conference at 185, followed closely by Sam Ferrell's 184 and Rich McFee's 177.

The Pioneers' next tournament is the Third WVIAC regional in Clarksburg on February 22 in Compton Lanes starting at twelve noon.

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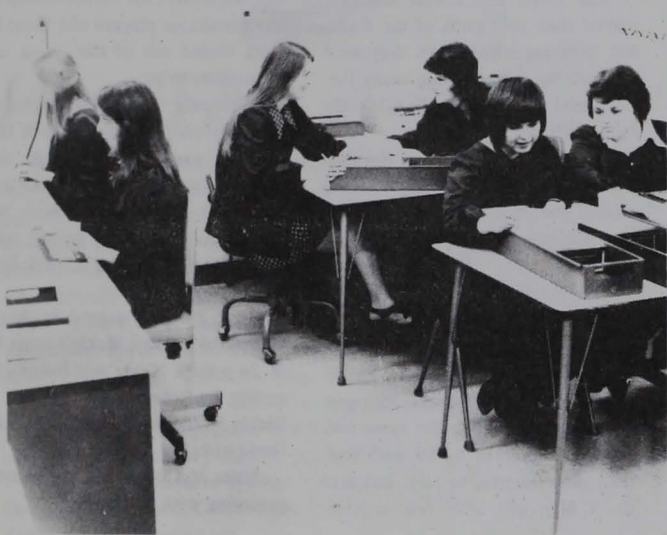

Computer Center Exposed

"Computer Center," a term frequently employed in discourse on the Glenville campus, never the less seems to be a very vague concept in the minds of many. Very few persons are aware of the function of the center, how its services are performed or even who, exactly, comprises the staff. Since the cliché "computers don't make mistakes—humans do" seems to be inevitably synonymous with the output of the center, perhaps an introduction of these supposedly erring persons, along with a summation of their accomplishments would be beneficial in enlightening the "public."

Until last summer, when Mrs. Patricia S. Ratliff, a 1974 Summa Cum Laude Glenville graduate, was hired as assistant director. GSC had the only computer center in the state in which data processing was performed by students. All students in our center were recruited for this work and selected for their ability, dependability and trustworthiness (since much of the data generated is confidential). In order to obtain a position, a student must have a 3.0 average. (The present staff, however, has combined averages equalling a 3.62 for last semester and a 3.668 overall average). Much responsibility is given to these students for they work an average of 14 hours per week, relinquishing part of their vacations at semester beginnings and endings, as well as other times, and still are expected to maintain a high level of academic achievement.

The students who work in the computer center may be divided into two main categories, keypunchers and programmers. The keypunchers are

as follows: Sherry Jones, a senior math and business major from Linn, W.Va.; Shelia Tenney, a junior home economics and English major from French Creek, W.Va.; Lita Jones of Tanner, W.Va., a sophomore art major; Pam Stout, a junior elementary education major from Somerville, N.J. Jane Stump (part-time), a sophomore math major, and Stella Scott, a junior business administration major, both from Glenville. (Stella, however, recently transferred to the business office where she details receipts, disbursements, and payrolls.) These keypunchers are involved in processing many types of data, including profiles, class registration, payrolls, faculty evaluations, drop/adds, surveys, and various other special reports.

The two principal programmers are Kathi McIntyre, a senior math major and Kevin Stalnaker, a sophomore math major, both of Glenville. The systems for grade reporting and Board of Regents work were both developed by Kathi. Kevin, developed the system for payroll planning and W-2 form printing with Mrs. Ratliff's assistants. Also, with Coach Jim Riffle's assistance, Kevin provided our football team with all statistics this season. Innumerable minor programs may also be attributed to these two skilled programmers who employ both Fortran and RPG computer languages. Debbie Swiney, a sophomore English major from Corton, W.Va., is also a programmer of and occasionally assists with keypunching mainly "public relations" material. In addition, she as well as Shelia, served as lab assistant for last semester's computer science classes. In her spare time, Debbie has also created various

seasonal and special picture programs such as the Christmas greeting distributed to the faculty, Halloween picture for the kindergarten students, and a birth announcement for Maggie Marie Bailey. The other programmers, Allan Edwards and Neil Reger, who were December graduates also initiated important programs such as the original system design for registration student data base, and faculty evaluations.

Regular hours are eight to four Monday through Friday and four to ten nightly, Sunday through Thursday, for computer science students.
