No. 1.
Classes and denominations of her Majesty's ships.

1. Rated ships, viz :-

First rate.-All three-decked ships.
Second rate.-One of her Majesty's yachts, and all two-decked ships whose war complements consist of 700 men and upward.

Third rate.-Her Majesty's other yachts, and all such yachts as may bear the flag or pendant of an admiral or captain superintending one of her Majesty's dock-yards, and all ships whose complements are under 700 and not less than 600.

Fourth rate.-Ships whose complements are under 600, and not less than 400.

Fifth rate.-Ships whose complements are under 400, and not less than 250.

Sixth rate.-Ships under 250.
2. Sloops and bomb-vessels : all such as are commanded by commanders.
3. All other smaller vessels, such as are commanded by lieutenants or inferior officers.

Calculations made at $\$ 480$ the pound sterling.
Table showing the net sea-pay of the flag officers of her Majesty's fleet, with the net sed-pay and number of their retinue, and also the net seapay of commission, warrant, petty, and non-commissioned officers, and the ratings of every description, both of seamen and marines, allowed to each class of her Majesty's ships, and distinguishing the several classes. for sharing the produce of seizures.

* To engineers when serving on board one of her Majesty's steam-vessels in commission; or in any of her Majesty's dock-yards, whenever their services may be required there ; or in repairing their own or any other vessel in the home dock-yards, Holyhead, the river Thames, Portsmouth, or Plymouth harbor; or when the vessel to which they belong is paid off, and they are still retained on board: First class, $\$ 5760$ per lunar month, and 12 cents a day for each engineer's boy whom they instruct. Second class, $\$ 3840$ per lunar month. Third class, $\$ 2544$ per lunar month.

When serving on board one of her Majesty's steam-vessels within the tropics; while the steam is up, one half the amount of pay of the respective classes in addition. Engineers of vessels in commission, when employed in repairing defects in other vessels than those in which they are serving, except in the home dock-yards, Holyhead, the river Thames, Portsmouth, or Plymouth harbor, to be allowed extra pay as warrant officers in addition, according to the scale established by her Majesty's regulations.

When borne on the books of the guard-ships of the ordinary, and not actually employed in the change or repair of steam machinery : First class, per month, $\$ 3768$. Second class, per month, $\$ 2352$. Third class, per month, $\$ 1632$. Superannuation to be upon the scale establi-hed for warrant officers of the royal navy, by Order in Council of 4th April, 1838

Pay of engineer boys: First class, $\$ 816$-Second class, $\$ 624$-Third class, $\$ 552$-Fourth class, $\$ 348$-per lunar month.

Pursers.-The pay of pursers was not affected by the law of 3d March, 1835: it is yet $\$ 40$ per month and two rations per day̧. Their emoluments are 10 to 25 per cent. on issues to the crew.
